After Supreme Court Hearing

Work to reopen Congo Road remains on hold indefinitely following a Supreme Court hearing last week. Roy Shepherd, the landholder who closed the road, took council to court in an attempt to block plans to reopen the road.

The Shepherds, who operate a sand mine on the land, closed the section of the road that crossed their property in 2021 when concerns were raised about liability and other issues

At a council meeting last November the decision was made to approve a survey of the proposed path to reopen the road and send it to the Registrar General. Once registered, the way will be clear for construction to commence. In the Public Forum at that meeting Norm Shepherd, representing the owners, was critical of the proposed route, saying they preferred a northern alignment that had previously been discussed with council. He said the proposed route meant more trees would have to be removed. He also criticised the lack of consultation by council and questioned why the landowner would have to pay for fencing along a road that was being built by council. Immediately after the council decision Roy Shepherd commenced legal proceedings challenging the council decision. The matter was heard in the Supreme Court in Sydney last Thursday and Friday with Justice Rothman presiding.

Evidence was filed in advance of the hearing and barristers for each party presented submissions over two days. Judgment has been reserved by the court and council has promised to advise the Congo community as soon as the outcome is known. This may take a number of months. Registration of the road survey plan and work on reopening the road is on hold until the legal proceedings have been resolved.

A council spokesperson said council looks forward to the court providing clarity on the matter, especially considering this is the first time these provisions of the Roads Act have been tested in Court.

"We appreciate the patience and goodwill of the Congo community while council attempts to resolve this longstanding matter," she said.

Congo Road Reopening Stalled EPA's Forestry Protocol postponed

NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) has announced today "The commencement of the Coastal Integrated Forestry Operations Approval (CIFOA) protocol and the site-specific biodiversity condition for greater gliders will be postponed by a week.

Last week, we announced changes to the protocol which will have an important role in protecting hollow bearing trees.

We have been consulting with stakeholders and considering their feedback to ensure we find the most appropriate way to address concerns while achieving long-term protections for this endangered species.

Existing requirements remain in force during this period and we will not hesitate to take regulatory action, including stop work orders, where we think there will be non-compliance.

Until the protocol and site-specific biodiversity conditions are finalised, we will treat all glider habitat forests as high risk. We want to thank all stakeholders for working with us as we refine these changes."

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Time to help shape the Shire's future

Mayor Mathew Hatcher is asking Eurobodalla residents to help shape the shire's future.

"People will shortly start to see and hear our 'Towards 2042' advertising around the place, asking the Eurobodalla community to provide input to our Community Strategic Plan. We want everyone to have their say before March 15," he said.

Community strategic plans are reviewed and updated before each new term of Council, and Mayor Hatcher said it's important to check in and make sure the plan is on track with the community's priorities and aspirations.

"Council has a custodial role to initiate and prepare a Community Strategic Plan - making sure it's an accurate representation of our future, so the whole community is working towards a shared vision," Mayor Hatcher said

"It's a long-term plan and we're asking everyone to envision the next 10 years - what makes Eurobodalla a great place to live and what challenges are there?

"Answers to these questions will highlight what our community wants to see Council achieve in the next 10 years and beyond."

"That plan then feeds the Council's four-year delivery program and annual operational plans."

Over the next six weeks, Council staff will collect feedback from residents, businesses and community groups through an <u>online</u> <u>survey</u> and <u>pop-up sessions</u>.

"It takes about six minutes to complete the online survey, but if you're not up for that, Council staff will be at pop-up sessions across the shire to write down your thoughts for our future," Mayor Hatcher said. "They'll also send a discussion guide to community groups and give out drawing sheets to kids for their big ideas too." Feedback from engagement efforts will be used to draft a revised plan in time for the next elected Council to set their agenda.

Mayor Hatcher said the review of the Community Strategic Plan was "a little different" this time.

"We are using the same engagement tools and questions as other councils in the region," Mayor Hatcher said.

"This means we will be able to update our own Community Strategic Plan while also contributing to a regional plan with our neighbouring shires on common matters." To get involved and complete the survey, visit

Council's youth van made its debut at a pool party in Narooma and is ready to pop-up in a space near you. The van is bright and colourful just like the team driving it, says Eurobodalla Mayor Mathew Hatcher.

"I am loving Council's initiative to go mobile and pop-up at different locations across the shire," he said.

"We all know kids are looking for things to do, so this is one way for them to break up routine and have some fun after school with our awesome youth team – Ashley, Michaela and Rhonnie."

The van is stocked with snacks and activities and could turn any open space into a fun scene for youth. The initiative was officially announced at a youth pool party event at Narooma pool on Friday 2 February.

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Productivity Commission releases report on Closing the Gap

The NSW Government has welcomed the Productivity Commission's review on federal and state government progress towards improved life outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and communities across the country.

The report notes that, in order to see change, business-asusual must be a thing of the past.

The NSW Government couldn't agree more, which is why we, together with the NSW Coalition of Aboriginal Peak Organisations – or NSW CAPO – are partnering with Aboriginal communities to design new policies and programs that will make a difference.

But this is a long game. The gap that we seek to close has been created over many decades, and the solutions will take time.

We are deeply committed to that long game and take heart in the fact that the Commission highlights the progress NSW has made in some key areas, such as NSW's unique commitment to transformational reform under Closing the Gap Priority Reform 4.

The report also notes that NSW is one of the few jurisdictions nationwide to have amended our Cabinet and Budget processes to reflect the requirements of the National Agreement.

Over the next 12 months we will continue to deliver the NSW Closing the Gap Implementation Plan 2022-2024, which includes 142 initiatives supported by \$221 million over 4 years from the NSW Government. This includes \$24 million to support NSW CAPO and its important work. Our next Closing the Gap Implementation Plan 2024-25 and subsequent plans, which will be developed in partnership with NSW CAPO, will provide an opportunity for us to consider the recommendations of the Productivity Commission review and how they can be applied in NSW. The report states that the Closing the Gap Agreement requires government decision-makers to accept that they do not know what is best for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

We understand that Aboriginal people and communities in NSW are best placed to make decisions for themselves. This is a key feature of our work under Priority Reform 1, which speaks to formal partnerships and shared decisionmaking.

Our commitment to Closing the Gap and Priority Reform 1 includes our plans to undertake a 12-month consultation process with Aboriginal communities to determine how to best move forward on Treaty and agreement making and what it might look like. This process will commence this year.

It also includes regular meetings with NSW CAPO to discuss how we are jointly progressing against the Closing the Gap priority reforms. The next meeting will take place next week.

We will also shortly announce a new NSW Partnership Agreement with NSW CAPO and Local Government NSW. This new agreement demonstrates our commitment to working in true partnership to share responsibility with Aboriginal organisations to Close the Gap.

We are committed to implementing meaningful and holistic changes to best serve Aboriginal people and communities in this state.

Permanent roles for Aboriginal staff supports cultural safety in classrooms NSW Department of Education

Aboriginal students will benefit from stability and connection in their schools thanks to a NSW Government initiative that has increased the number of permanent Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander teaching and support staff.

NSW Department of Education Secretary Murat Dizdar said 182 Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander staff have accepted permanent employment under the plan to move temporary staff into permanent roles.

This includes 90 Aboriginal Education Officers, 33 teachers, two Aboriginal Community Liaison Officers and 57 Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people in other support roles.

Mr Dizdar said the Department was committed to ensuring every student can learn, grow and belong at school through its NSW Plan for Public Education.

"A permanent position provides our Aboriginal educators and support staff with financial security and allows them to remain in their school as strong cultural support for our students," he said. "This stability and connection will help drive improved outcomes for our Aboriginal students."

There are 2843 Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander staff employed in NSW public schools.

Schools with an eligible Aboriginal Education Officer and all Connected Communities schools were included in the first round of the temporary to permanent scheme, highlighting the importance that the NSW Government places on supporting Aboriginal students in the public education system.

"Our students cannot be what they cannot see. For our Aboriginal students, having Aboriginal leaders in their school as role models opens their eyes to the vast world of post-school opportunities," Mr Dizdar said.

"We want all our schools to be safe and inclusive environments that celebrate the strength of our vibrant, diverse and multicultural communities."

Research shows Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander educators and support staff play a key role ensuring Aboriginal students feel culturally safe in their schools.

As well as supporting their students in the key areas of learning, culture and community, Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander teachers and support staff are role models

NAIDOC Week activity grants open

Eurobodalla Council is offering grants of up to \$500 for NAIDOC Week projects celebrating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history, culture and achievement.

The funding is for community groups, schools and not-forprofits looking to run activities and events that make a positive contribution to the community with creativity, vision and originality during the July celebration.

Grants have previously been awarded for Aboriginal flag-raising ceremonies, story-telling activities, sports and games, cultural artefact displays, language programs, art and craft demonstrations, bush tucker gardens, and murals.

Fels' review confirms corporate practices as key drivers of inflation

The Australia Institute | Centre for Future Work

The Australia Institute welcomes the report of the Inquiry Into Price Gouging and Unfair Pricing Practices, chaired by Prof Allan Fels, and delivered today to the Australian Council of Trade Unions.

Key points:

- The Australia Institute and its Centre for Future Work, which were among the first to identify the role of record-high corporate profits in driving the acceleration of inflation after the COVID lockdowns, made a major <u>submission</u> to the Fels inquiry and appeared before its public hearing in Melbourne in September 2023
- A 2023 Centre for Future Work <u>report</u> showed that over two-thirds of excess economy-wide inflation (above the RBA's 2.5% target) from end-2019 through the September quarter of 2022 was attributable to higher unit corporate profits.
- Australia Institute reports <u>documented</u> that the rise in profits was strongest in industries with concentrated or strategic power in the broader economy: including mining and energy, manufacturing, construction and wholesale trade.

"Prof Fels' careful review confirms that price-setting strategies by corporations, including many obviously unfair and exploitative practices, have contributed significantly to the costof-living crisis afflicting Australian households," said Greg Jericho, Chief Economist for the Australia Institute. "Since the current inflationary cycle began after COVID lockdowns, there has been too much attention on wages, labour costs, and consumer spending as the supposed drivers of higher prices. The RBA and other policy-makers have been too slow to acknowledge the role of profit and greed in pushing up prices.

prices. "This inquiry marshals abundant evidence from official statistical agencies, international economic organisations, think tanks and academic research to show that corporations have taken advantage of the pandemic and its aftermath to exploit consumers and drive up inflation.

"Prof Fels' report contributes to a more accurate understanding of what is causing the cost-of-living crisis, and a more balanced and fair strategy for solving it.

"Australian corporate profits have moderated in the last year, as supply chains were repaired and energy prices retreated. This has been crucial to the partial slowdown in inflation experienced in the same time.

"But further reductions in prices for many essential goods and services are required to fully repair living standards, and Prof Fels' recommendations for more exposure of excess prices and stronger competition measures to reduce them would help a lot."

More choice of cars to save on fuel

The Federal Government is delivering more cars that are cheaper to run, giving motorists choice by introducing a New Vehicle Efficiency Standard for Australia. The United States has had a similar policy in place for fifty years. But because of a decade of delay and denial, Australia still stands alongside Russia as one of the only advanced economies without the Standard. This is costing families and businesses thousands of dollars at the petrol pump.

The Albanese Government's New Vehicle Efficiency Standard will push car makers to give Australian motorists more choices of new cars, utes and vans that use less fuel and that have until now only been available to buyers in overseas markets.

The preferred model for the New Vehicle Efficiency Standard, made available today on cleanercars.gov.au, has been under development since the Government committed to the Standard last year - to ensure it strikes the right balance in giving Australians more choice while using less petrol.

If Australia catches up with the Standard in the U.S. by around 2028, Australians stand to save about \$1000 per vehicle per year.

The Standard will only apply to new passenger and light commercial vehicles, not used or existing vehicles. They work by providing car companies with targets for average emissions per kilometre from new vehicles sold.

The New Vehicle Efficiency Standard will deliver more vehicles to Australia with the latest engine and design technologies to ensure lower fuel bills, meaning bigger savings at the petrol pump.

The Albanese Government will consult on the preferred model for a month and introduce the legislation as soon as possible, with the new cost saving rules to come into effect by 1 January 2025.

Minister for Climate Change and Energy, Chris Bowen said "Because of a lack of action on an Efficiency Standard, Australian families are paying around \$1000 a year more than they need to be for their annual fuel bill – the Albanese Government is delivering long-term cost-of-living relief to fix that for new vehicles and put money back in people's pockets."

"We're giving Australians more choice to spend less on petrol, by catching up with the U.S– this will save Australian motorists \$100bn in fuel costs to 2050."

"This is about ensuring Australian families and businesses can choose the latest and most efficient cars and utes, whether they're petrol and diesel engines, or hybrid, or electric."





What Fungi Feastival Achieved in 2023

The 2023 Fungi Feastival was held over one-month last winter and planning for the 2024 Feastival is well underway. The evaluation for the 2023 Feastival is now complete and found that the Feastival was highly successful. The diverse range of over 30 quality events across Bega Valley and Eurobodalla were enjoyed by locals and attracted visitors to the region in the off-peak tourist season.

In total, over 625 people participated in booked Fungi Feastival events. This is in addition to those that participated in non-booked events and the 25 participating private businesses and three community-based organisations. It is estimated that the total number of participants was between 800 and 1,000.

The Fungi Feastival supported local businesses. Almost 10% of visitors came from outside the area and spent up to \$29,000 in the region over the month. This represents a 4.8 multiplier on the initial investment. Many visitors to Fungi Feastival noted their intent to return at other times of the year. In addition, the Feastival's extensive media coverage also raised the profile of the region we had over 4,000 distinct visitors to the website in a three-month period.

Most of the Fungi Feastival events were fully booked, and most participating businesses considered that the Fungi Feastival met or exceeded their expectations. Overall, they experienced an increase in business during the Feastival, and within two months of the Feastival, almost half had a follow-on increase in business as a result of the Feastival. This was also reflected by survey respondents of whom over 5% had already purchased books on fungi from participating businesses, a further 5 – 10% had purchased materials to grow mushrooms and 12% had purchased a meal (in addition to the booked dinners) within two months of the Feastival. Significantly, over 20% planned to buy more books and materials to grow mushrooms and 50% to purchase meals from participating venues.

As a result of the Fungi Feastival, people learnt how to grow mushrooms and have now started to grow them at home. Others learnt about the contribution of fungi to healthy natural environments, gardens and food production. "I learnt so much about fungi that I previously had no knowledge of! How interconnected plants and trees are underground with fungi ... connecting them, ... how essential and intrinsic fungi are to the environment"

Impressively, 75% of those who had learnt something new, had already applied this knowledge across a wide range of areas; from growing or cooking mushrooms to fungi photography. Others were now managing their garden or property to promote growth of beneficial fungi. For example, one person has "left an area under one tree to experiment with different fallen leaves, sticks, bark to see what diversity I can encourage".



The mushroom and truffle meals were well enjoyed. People tried food and restaurants that they may not normally eat. Jenny said "the dinners were amazing. I normally don't eat mushrooms and now I do – they are really good". The Fungi Feastival is helping develop strong communities. This was through attending events with family or friends which built on or created common interests and improved relationships. Other attendees found the opportunity to meet people with a common interest and establish new networks extremely positive. Some participants noted that they had continued to develop these interrelationships since the Feastival.

The Committee noted how instrumental the initial grant received from Mumbulla Community Foundation was for the success of the Feastival. Their funding enabled the Feastival to secure a nationally recognised keynote speaker - critical in the success of the Feastival. The funding from local Chamber of Commerce (Tilba and Narooma) and businesses (the Whale Real Estate in Narooma and Mushgrow Wood Pellets in Eden) was also critical for the Feastival's success.

There is a gaping hole at the centre of our democracy that is distorting – if not corrupting – our elections. It sucks in the big money to political parties which repay in kind, whatever the cost to those of us who vote on the issues at play.

It makes a mockery of the true test of governance - one vote, one value. The parties use Socratic arguments to muddy the waters, but it is not only a blot on our system, it is fixable. And here's the rub – it would be greatly to Prime Minister Anthony Albanese's advantage to fix it...and I suspect he will. The ideal of course, is public financing of elections with a fair distribution of funds to candidates.

The most obvious example of the problem has been the big consulting firms – Deloitte, EY, KPMG and PwC – who collectively raked in more that \$4 billion in Federal Government contracts over the past decade after an outlay of a mere fraction of their investment to the major parties. This revealed a conflict of interest which resulted in a PwC partner being booted off the Tax Practitioners Board. And they quickly broke off the tentacle of their operation that dealt directly with government and expected us to believe that gaping hole was closed, for them at least. Truth is, the damage was done;

according to the Centre for Public Integrity,

'A peculiar feature of the Big Four's donations is that they are largely party indiscriminate. Between 2012-13 and 2020-22, some 47.8 per cent were to the Labour Party, whereas 52.19 per cent were to the Coalition. [This] shows that their donations are unrelated to any ideological goal or end sought but are rather focused on currying favour with whoever may be in power. 'This trend in bipartisan donations has been observed among other large industries in Australia and characterised as a form of "state capture".' The Albanese government, through Katy Gallagher as Finance Minister, is embarked on the long, tedious task of returning some of the expensive expertise provided by the big four to the APS. Such is the speed of IT research, there will always be a gap between the multiple private frontiers and the public application. But at least that gaping hole can be minimised.

Traditionally, business big and small has backed the Coalition while the Trade Unions have been the mainstay of Labor. While private funding by certain businesses and connected individuals (such as developers) may be simply banned outright, Labor has claimed - correctly, if historically – that its members are simply the parliamentary expression of the unions' ambitions.

That is no longer true, as the Big Four funding illustrated. More importantly, selective funding is now employed piecemeal by affiliated unions to particular factions of Labor, thereby giving them extra power within the party, often to the detriment of good policy, and always to the cost of unity within Labor leadership.

Albanese, on the Left of the Party suffers from the threat of the well-funded right wing, the bailiwick of his long-term opponent Bill Shorten whose eager leadership ambitions are still unrequited. This provides Albanese with the chance to adopt a statesmanlike position that cuts those Union ties as a quid pro quo while cracking down on the chief coalition source to distorting – not to say corrupting – our electoral system.

Does he have the courage and the political finesse to pull it off? Well, If the neat way he dealt with Peter Dutton on the Stage 3 tax issue is any guide, I suspect that gaping hole at the centre of our democracy has an appointment with a political 'shrink'.

Check Your Spam or Junk Email Folder

Email has certainly replaced many other forms of communication that we use to regularly use. Our office use to fax quite a lot of information to solicitors and reports to vendors were printed and posted. Now, most of this is done by email. One person in our office now subscribes to a greeting card service to email animated birthday and other cards to family and friends. BUT, how often have you missed an important email because it ended up in your spam or junk folder and sometimes for no apparent reason. Sometimes technologies like antispam can work "foryou-or-agin-you". So, how often do you check your spam/junk folder? Most email systems will show you a number next to the folder to indicate new emails are in there. 
Mick shook his head.

100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society




09-02-1924

Very deep sympathy is expressed for Messrs. J. A. and J. S. Greig, of

Bingie, and Mrs. McTavish, (North Coast) on the death of their sister, Mrs. R. Vagg of Brogo, whose demise took place in the Bega Hospital last week. Deceased, who was a native of Moruya, was 58 years of age, and was taken seriously ill a few days before admission to hospital. A widower and a family of four are left to mourn their irreparable loss. There passed to his eternal reward on Friday, 31st ult., a nonagenarian in the person of Mr. John Nunan, of Bergalia. Born in Ireland 93 years ago, he came when a boy with his parents to Australia. He served his apprenticeship to his father as a carpenter in the Illawarra district. His marriage with Miss Elizabeth Donnelly, of Dapto, took place in 1861. Subsequently he came to this district, selecting land at Bergalia, where he has resided for over 40 years, and where he reared a highly respected family of 13, ten of whom survive him. In his early days he was an enthusiastic sportsman, being one of the district's noted bowlers, and was often carried shoulder high off the cricket field. He won distinction among the knights of the willow and secured many trophies of victory. ... Left to mourn him is a widow and a grown up family of ten.

On Monday night at a quarter to eight the electric light on the Court House corner pole was switched on by Mr. C. Johnson. There was a good concourse of people to witness and participate in the opening ceremony. Before pressing the button Mr. Johnson said it was a great honor for him to have the privilege of switching on the light, and he hoped that it would be an acquisition to the town and surrounding district. It was the thought of the Progress Association for nearly three years that an electric light, if possible, should be placed at the corner instead of the carbide one. ... Others who spoke in honor of the occasion were Messrs. C. Carter, C. Cheeseman, A. Louttit, and H. J. Thomson. All were of the opinion that the light would be of great benefit to the people in general, and that perhaps it may be the nucleus of a few more lights about town in the near future. 

Summer Whiplash Explained: Climate Change fuelling NSW Summer of extremes

CLIMATE chaos has caught NSW residents off guard this summer, as increasingly volatile weather has flung communities between dangerous fire conditions, extreme heat, fatal floods, and unprecedented humidity.

The Climate Council's report 'Climate whiplash: wild swings between weather extremes' concludes that Australia's summer of dangerous downpours and scorching heat is consistent with six symptoms of a warming planet.

New South Wales' climate whiplash has already seen:

- Australia's driest three months on record, then intense rainfall across much of New South Wales.
- December temperatures well above average across northern New South Wales, despite wet conditions.

Weeks of high humidity, with Sydney hitting its highest dew point on record.

2023's announcement of an El Niño and an early start to fire seasons in New South Wales boded for a hot, dry summer. What NSW experienced instead was wild swings between extreme heat, dangerous rainfall and sweltering humidity.

The report reiterates that climate change, driven by the burning of coal, oil, and gas, is supercharging Australia's weather systems, making them more unpredictable and dangerous than ever before. It also warns that the weather of the past may no longer be a reliable guide for the future. Hot on the heels of El Niño come concerns that La Niña, a climate driver associated with floods and storms, may return as early as mid this year.

Dr Simon Bradshaw, Director of Research at the Climate Council said "For too many communities, the great Australian summer is now something to be feared. Climate change, driven by the burning of coal, oil and gas, means our weather is more extreme, dangerous and unpredictable.

"From intense heat and fierce fire conditions to flooding rains and back again, Australians are experiencing climate whiplash: hurtled from one extreme to another with little time to recover.

"The stifling humidity, intense storms, soaring temperatures and other extremes of recent months are all key signs of a fast-warming planet. "We know what we need to do to better protect Australian communities. It starts with cutting Australia's climate pollution. We must urgently reform our national environment law so that we stop adding fuel to the fire by approving new coal and gas projects, and we must lock in the proposed fuel efficiency standard as soon as possible. At the same time, we must work much harder to prepare communities for the climate impacts of today and tomorrow." Professor Lesley Hughes, Climate Councillor said "Wild swings from fires to floods are threatening the people we love and the places we call home. Climate change, driven by the burning of coal, oil, and gas, has worsened Australia's weather from coast to coast, with almost every state breaking extreme weather records this summer. "This report makes it clear that we can no longer rely on the past to predict the future when it comes to our weather. Climate change is causing erratic swings from sweltering heat to devastating downpours, and it is increasingly hard to predict what each season will bring. "But we are not without hope or guidance - what we can rely on is the science. The same science that has been warning us for decades that days like these would come, also spells out the solutions we so desperately need. The science tells us that the only way out of this is to leave coal,

oil and gas in the ground for good - not tomorrow or the next day, but now." Greg Mullins AOFSM, Founder of Emergency Leaders for

Greg Mullins AOFSM, Founder of Emergency Leaders for Climate Action said: "The start of the fire season was ferocious, and it came too soon. Climate change closed the window we once used to conduct critical hazard reduction burns; suddenly swinging from too wet, to too dry and dangerous. Catastrophic fire warnings were recorded around the country, and homes and lives were lost to deadly blazes all before December.

"Off the back of the driest three months ever recorded in our history came a deluge of floods and storms, once again pushing emergency services to capacity and forcing communities to fend for themselves. Communities must be given what they need to prepare for and respond to disasters.

"It is unfathomable to me that, while we face fires and floods, we continue contributing to the problem. Australia must leave coal, oil and gas behind for the sake of our future. The alternative is simply not an option."

Cuttagee bridge - Council Stance Betrays Community



SAVE CUTTAGEE BRIDGE GROUP Far South Coast community disillusioned by what looks like complete disregard for due process.

Cuttagee Bridge is one of NSW South Coast's iconic timber bridges.

In March, 2021, some 14,000 people signed a petition supporting repair and restoration work to this heritage-listed bridge, whilst expressing overwhelming opposition to its demolition and replacement with a concrete bridge.

In 2023, the NSW State Government, through local member Dr Michael Holland, committed \$15m towards "the restoration of Cuttagee Bridge".

This funding commitment was widely celebrated as an example of government listening to the wishes of local people and others who love the Bega Valley.

Since then, Transport for NSW (TfNSW) has been working with Bega Valley Shire Council to prepare a Deed of Agreement, including options for this work, whilst the community has waited patiently for the public consultation process to begin. We are utterly shocked, therefore, by what took place at the Council meeting held on 31 January.

Mayor Fitzpatrick moved a motion to accept the \$15 million funding but proposed that it should be dedicated only to the demolition and replacement of Cuttagee Bridge and the construction of a two-lane concrete bridge in its place. In an extraordinary further development, the motion delegated the Chief Executive Officer, Anthony McMahon, to unilaterally renegotiate the options within the Deed of Agreement with TfNSW. Mayor Fitzpatrick's motion was presented to the meeting without notice to the community and to the obvious surprise of some of the councillors.

Nonetheless, five councillors, including David Porter and Liz Seckold, who have previously made public commitments to restoring the Bridge, voted in favour of this motion. We applaud the three councillors who kept the faith with our community and voted against: Helen O'Neil, Cathy Griff and Karen Wright.

Councillor Joy Robin was absent.

Our community, and others who visit this region, can rightfully be very disillusioned by what looks like complete disregard for due process. It is now clear that the Council refuses to consider making Cuttagee Bridge safe and fit for purpose whilst preserving its heritage values, despite plentiful professional evidence that this can be achieved. Timber bridges have been recently constructed by NSW councils with great success, for example, the Runnyford Bridge in Eurobodalla and the South Arm Bridge in Byron Shire.

Council's decision denies the community the opportunity to consider and comment on the other options, as included in this Deed of Agreement, and imposes only one possible outcome: a two-lane concrete replacement. Throwing out the other options makes a mockery of community consultation and may imperil the \$15m funding and what future then for Cuttagee Bridge? The community and Save Cuttagee Bridge Group demand that options be reinstated and thoroughly and fairly assessed, and the community must be properly consulted if the Council is to keep faith with its community and demonstrate its commitment to good governance.

Load limits change for four Bega Valley shire bridges

Four council bridges now have new load limits in place following a resolution at December's Council meeting

Council's Structure Engineer, Richard Cunningham said the new limits are due to declining asset conditions and their current limitations in carrying capacity.

"We know imposing new load limits may cause frustration for some users, however safety is Council's first consideration," Mr Cunningham said.

"The new load limits are unlikely to affect most existing road users. "Existing users of Head of Cuttagee and Wapengo Lake Roads will remain largely unaffected, with heavier vehicles, such as most mobile cranes. excluded.'

The new limits will affect Over-Size and Over-Mass (OSOM) vehicles using the Tathra Bermagui Road, who require permits from the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator (NHVR).

A Variable Message Sign (VMS) is in place before Wapengo bridge, advising road users of restrictions at Wapengo and Murrah bridges. These signs will be in place for about two weeks.

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Record funding to support Landcare and deliver on-ground Landcare projects

The aim of the regional and local Landcare coordinators is to deliver and support on-ground projects specific to the needs of the local natural environmental and agricultural systems.

In addition to the delivery of on-ground projects, the local and regional coordinators will deliver on a number of other priorities, including:

- strengthening the capacity of Landcarers which will result in effective, efficient support to landcarer volunteers, farmers and the community
- ensuring effective collaboration and partnerships between Landcare groups, Local Land Services, other government agencies and Landcare NSW
- leveraging funding opportunities to maximise socioeconomic and environmental outcomes.

As part of the funding, each local and regional coordinator can also access up to \$5,000 to undertake professional development over the course of the four year program.

NSW Government commitment to tackle skills shortage

The **NSW Government** is continuing to reskill the State with applications now open for the NSW Public Sector Apprentices and Trainees Program, delivering on the Government's commitment to employ 1000 extra apprentices.

The \$93.5 million investment, committed during the state election, will provide an opportunity for up to 1,000 apprentices and trainees to join more than 30 government agencies and state-owned corporations.

Under the former government the NSW skills sector was undervalued and neglected, which lead to a 33 per cent decline in apprenticeship and traineeship commencements since 2011. But the NSW Labor Government understands how important a strong vocational education system is for skills and training in NSW. With broad skills shortages across the State, apprentices and traineeships provide a unique mix of on-the-job training with formal study that makes them vital additions to the future NSW workforce. Under this program specific industries which have significant skills shortages, including in transport, electricity, water, IT, and cyber security will be targeted.

NSW Government introduces integrity reforms

The **NSW Government** is set to introduce reforms to help restore public trust and improve public integrity, transparency, and accountability. The reform package will include amendments to the Independent Commission Against Corruption Act 1988 to make it a legislative requirement for the Government to respond to recommendations of the Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC) directed to the Government.

The NSW Government is also moving to address recommendations made by the ICAC in Operation Witney and Operation Keppel.

Operation Witney was an investigation into the former Member for Drummoyne and allegations concerning improper influence and breach of public trust.

In response to the investigation's findings, a draft regulation will be tabled in Parliament proposing to:

- expand the interests required to be disclosed by Members of Parliament
- require Members to disclose new matters including conflicts of interest
- require all Members to make disclosures on an ongoing basis instead of periodically, for publication on the NSW Parliament website.

The draft regulation, if made, will implement recommendations 1 and 4 of the Operation Witney report and bring NSW into line with the disclosure obligations in other Australian jurisdictions, including the Commonwealth. The Government intends to introduce the proposed changes on 1 July 2024 after consultation with relevant Parliamentary Committees.

In response to Operation Keppel, which concerned the former Member for Wagga Wagga, the Government will amend the preamble to the NSW Ministerial Code of Conduct to include principles and guiding values recommended by the ICAC. Further reforms include guidelines for the preparation and funding of business cases in respect of grant applications by nongovernment entities, and boosting education programs to ensure Ministers are aware of their integrity obligations.

The package of reforms reaffirms the Government's commitment to the highest standards of integrity. This builds upon recent announcements including a ban on political parties accepting donations from clubs which have gaming machines and the tightening of government grant regulations.



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Fishing report from Tackle World Moruya Moruya River.

Warmer temps and clean water have really kicked Moruya in gear this past few weeks, and we are starting to see some life return back into the river.

There have been some nice sized whiting finally reported in the Moruya river this last week, with fish around the 40cm mark being reported from the airport flats to the back of the hole-in the-wall all the way up to the bridge flats and up past the hospital! A great sign for the following weeks of summer. These fish have been taken on both live nippers, pipi's and strip squid baits as well as surface lures.

Whiting haven't been the only captures this week, with flathead, bream, Luderick and a few trevally all being reported throughout the system. Both baits and lures are working, so the choice of technique is yours to make.

Up the fresh water reaches of the river, the bass crews are still having good success as well. Spinnerbaits and hard body lures during the daylight hours and surface lures or frogs, cicadas and poppers during the low light periods have all been working. It really has been a great summer season on the bass this year, even despite the rains.

Tuross River.

Tuross is slowly starting to shed some of the turbidity that has been hanging around all summer, and the fishing is improving every day. The flathead are being taken throughout the system all the way up to the Bumbo area. The bream and estuary perch similarly are still readily available around the oyster racks and snags that line the many kilometres of banks that this system has to offer.

The lower sand flats around potato point and the boat ramp area, also have bream, whiting, flathead of offer as well.

With the weather looking good this weekend, all be it a bit windy, there will be good option all through the system.

Rock and Beach.

With plenty of flathead, bream and whiting still holding court on the beaches this past week, the action has been plentiful to say the least. Along with the usual salmon on the beaches, the beaches are really offering a good mixture of fishing for anyone that likes getting some sand between their toes.

For this that like to fish the stones, I have been hearing a few reports of some nice squid also being caught. I haven't had a good feed of squid in a few years, so I'm going to target a few of this weekend, I'll let you know how I go.


Offshore.

Snapper, flathead, mowong and a good mix of reef species have all been available this past week. The winds have kept a few anglers parked up, but hopefully this weekend allows you to get put and wet a line.

As we move into the feb/March period, the water temps will be at their warmest and will offer a good mixed bag of species. So get out and try for a few snapper and flathead till the water starts to drop as we move towards the winter season. We do still have several months of great fishing before the seasons change up. We do have a new addition to the bait options this week. We are now stocking a range of whole and filleted mackerel and yakkas, as well as whiting and sauries. Theses will be prime baits options for all you land based fishos, boaties and game fishos as well. So come and have a look at the range, all are nicely cryo-vacced and good value. SouEast Seafood in Ulladulla are suppling the bait, and we are looking forward to long and successful partnership.

The tweed freezer is well stocked also, with Hawksbury prawns & whitebait being the notable absentee's. Block pilchards are also starting to get low, as they were unavailable this week also. Stay safe everyone and remember, "Every days a good day for fishing...'



BBSC Sailing Report 3/2/24

"It was a great day for sailing on Saturday February 3rd when Batemans Bay Sailing Club held the seventh Bay Cup race of the 2023/4 sailing season. It was a beautiful day with a fresh nor'easter blowing. Six boats went out. The drama started well before the start after a mayday call was picked up from a boat off Lilli Pilli. The committee boat crew of Terry Paton and Andrew Bain leapt into action and soon had the "Dave Magill" heading towards Lilli Pilli at 20 knots+, only to be stood down by Marine Rescue who had the situation under control.

The course was over a triangle with the windward mark in Chain Bay, Marine Park Middle Mark as the wing mark and the leeward mark at Caseys Beach.

Race Officer Paton set a boat end favoured line. At the start "Wishful Thinking" (Simon Dunlop) held "Accolade" (Lachlan Brown) out at the boat end, so "Accolade" sailed around the front of the committee boat then bore away to dip behind the start line and get on with the race. It turned out that "Wishful Thinking" was over the line a fraction early so had to go back and restart. The rest of the fleet started more conservatively further down the start line. "Accolade" led around the top mark from "Moonmist" (Tony Sutton), pulling away on the second reach under spinnaker. When it came time to douse the spinnaker it dropped in the water, bringing forward progress to an abrupt halt. Luckily the spinnaker was soon retrieved along with a few prawns for the after race BBQ.

Further back "Cool Change" (Richard Dunne) had a full crew for a change and was making good progress. On the running legs the crew were seen sitting across the bench at the stern of the boat taking in the view while the skipper did the steering. The sea breeze strengthened throughout the afternoon, gusting up to 25 knots. The conditions became excessive for Peter Paterson who was sailing "Avior" single handed and for John Drummond's crew aboard "Sail La Vie" and they retired from the race.

At the finish "Accolade" was 6 minutes ahead of "Moonmist" with a further 21 minutes to "Cool Change". That was close enough for "Cool Change" to win on PHS while "Accolade" took the win on AMS.
