Moruya midwives offer continuity of care for women in Eurobodalla

Pregnant women in Eurobodalla now have access to a new Midwifery Group Practice (MGP) model of care at Moruya Hospital, offering continuity and personalised care to women in the region.

Minister for Health, Ryan Park said the service enables women to be cared for by a known midwife throughout their pregnancy, during childbirth and in the early weeks at home with their new baby.

"It is exciting to officially launch this service in Moruya, which empowers and supports women's choices in the Eurobodalla." Mr Park said. "Women and their families gain reassurance from getting to know their midwife personally and can establish a familiar and trusted support base when they need help or advice, with a direct phone number they can call.

"This primary midwife is supported by a secondary or 'backup' midwife and works collaboratively with doctors when required." Mr Park said.

Parliamentary Secretary for Health and Regional Health and Member for Bega Dr Michael Holland says he is proud to see the establishment of a new Midwifery Group Practice in the maternity unit where he worked for twenty years.

"The continuity and personalised care from midwifery professionals will complement the existing midwifery service and the GP and specialist obstetric services." Dr Holland said. "This will provide a functional and collaborative model of care providing women with more choice, greater satisfaction, and continued safety for them and their babies."

Southern NSW Local Health District (SNSWLHD) Midwifery District Manager, Bek Bowman said robust international evidence supports continuity of care models as best practice for improved pregnancy and birth outcomes and satisfaction for women.

"The opportunity to form close relationships with women in our communities in the very early stages of their pregnancy and walk alongside them during their birth and postnatal care is truly a privilege," Ms Bowman said.

"The MGP model implemented in Moruya gives our professional and dedicated team of midwives the chance to use their clinical practice skills to achieve better outcomes for women and babies."

The launch forms part of SNSWLHD's 'Know Your Midwife continuity of care strategy', which sees tailored models of care implemented within Maternity Services across the District.

Queanbeyan Hospital and Health Service has successfully operated its Midwifery Antenatal and Postnatal Service (MAPS) continuity model since 2020. Cooma Maternity Services is due to roll out its customised midwifery model in the coming months, with Bega and Goulburn to follow.

Women across Southern NSW are encouraged to connect with their local Maternity Service, as early in pregnancy as possible to understand the choices available for maternity care. Contact details and booking forms for each Maternity Service are available online.

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Olive Constable - Remarkable Journalist and Editor of the Moruya Examiner

International Women's Day 8 March is a time to celebrate women's achievements and pay tribute to some women who have played an exceptional role in our community. Among these trailblazers was Olive Constable, whose legacy as a pioneering journalist and editor of the Moruya Examiner from 1913 to 1939 remains an inspiration.

Women entered the world of Australian journalism in the mid nineteenth century, tackling all manner of issues as foreign correspondents and commentators on domestic social policy, reform and politics. The expansion of department stores and markets for consumer goods opened new avenues for advertising revenue, particularly in the realm of "women's pages." This shift created an opportunity for women journalists, seeking emancipation from their traditional roles.

But by the close of the nineteenth century most women journalists were confined to the women's and social pages with a few outstanding exceptions. Media proprietors and editors were largely male dominated positions - and remain so to this day although in the regional areas families often ran the local newspapers and women sometimes took on managerial roles.

In 1913, Olive Constable stepped into the role of editor at the Moruya Examiner, succeeding her father, the redoubtable and outspoken Robert Harvison. Over the ensuing 25 years—spanning tumultuous events such as World War I, the 1919 influenza pandemic, and the economic boom of the 1920s followed by the Great Depression — she demonstrated considerable editorial skill and business acumen.

Her exceptional contribution was recognised by her peers on her unexpected passing at age 65: "a distinct loss to country journalism and her passing is keenly felt by the newspaper fraternity. As Editoress of the Examiner she set a high standard in her publications, displaying at all times a kindly feeling towards her fellow creatures."



Connecting Hearts and Brushes: Eurobodalla's Intergenerational Art Project Flourishes



In the wake of the 2019-20 bushfires, the Australian Breastfeeding Association (ABA) launched the Community Protection for Infants and Young Children in Bushfire Emergencies Project (Bushfire Project). Dr. Michelle Hamrosi, the Bushfire Project's Community Engagement Officer (also a local GP and Volunteer ABA Eurobodalla Group Leader), teamed up with local Counsellor and Art Therapist Ness Shannon from Active Art to orchestrate a series of transformative Intergenerational Art workshops. Funded by a generous Fire to Flourish grant, the workshops provide a secure and inclusive space for participants of all ages and abilities to engage in artistic expression. Child-friendly stations ensure a safe and engaging environment for parents, emphasising inclusivity.

Driven by Ness Shannon's passion, the workshops are designed to be holistic, sensory, and fun-filled mornings. "These sessions aim to help participants learn, imagine, create, and explore," says Ness, who guides the group through various mediums. From pastels to collage, each week offers a new adventure, with future sessions open to group suggestions.

The first workshop commenced this week at the CWA hall in Moruya, where Dr. Michelle Hamrosi expressed her delight, saying, "Our approach must shift from isolated individual problems and solutions to a collective one from 'me' to 'us'. Fostering community connections, like this project aims to do, is essential for vibrant, resilient societies.'

Participants at this week's inaugural event shared overwhelmingly positive feedback, describing the morning as "very nourishing". Once participant expressed their love for art and the joy of witnessing others create, while another captured a poignant moment through drawing - a bittersweet memory reflecting on life's unpredictable iournev."

As the project unfolds throughout March to May across three Eurobodalla locations, its mission extends beyond self-discovery to the creation of connections between younger and older women, fostering a space for mutual learning. The transformative power of art, evident in the feedback, highlights the exploration of creativity, mental health, and overall well-being.

Oyster Mushroom Growing Workshops

In the lead-up to the Fungi Feastival, Annette Kennewell will facilitate oyster mushroom growing workshops at her small farm near Central Tilba. These workshops are for anyone interested in learning how to grow oyster mushrooms at home. Annette grows a variety of fresh oyster mushrooms for the SCPA table at the Tilba Market in autumn and winter.

Oyster mushrooms or Pleurotus ostreatus are also called pearl oysters or tree oysters. They have broad fan shaped caps, short stems and come in a variety of colours; white, blue, silver, tan and black pearl. Oyster mushrooms are delicious to cook and eat with a sweet, succulent, subtle flavour. They can be pan-fried or sauteed, added to soup, risotto, pasta and pizza.

The oyster mushroom workshops will include a demonstration of how to grow oyster mushrooms in bags on sugar cane mulch inoculated with grain spawn. Followed by a demonstration of how to grow oyster mushrooms in buckets on MushGrow wood pellets inoculated with grain spawn. Then a tour of an oyster mushroom fruiting room plus a review of books and other resources on how to cultivate edible mushrooms.

The Oyster Mushroom Growing Workshops are all on Sunday mornings from 10.30am to 12noon. The dates are 31st March, 21st April or 26th May. More mushroom growing workshops will be scheduled during the Fungi Feastival from 21 June to 21 July. To book a workshop visit http://www.fungifeastival.com.au/s cience

\$10b needed to double NSW social housing supply **Homelessness NSW** is urging the state government to spend \$1 billion each year for a decade to double the supply of social housing by 2050.

Homelessness NSW CEO Dominique Rowe said the state must build 5,000 dwellings annually to lift NSW's share of social housing from one in 20 to one in 10 homes.

"NSW has failed to invest in social housing for decades. Last year, just one-fifth of people seeking help from homelessness services could find long-term accommodation," she said. "Our ability to give NSW's most vulnerable communities a roof over their heads is falling while housing stress and homelessness soar.

"Right now, many of the 57,000 households on the social housing waitlist are forced to wait up to a decade for a safe and stable place to call home.

"Investing in social housing will not only save lives but pay dividends by easing pressure on health, community and justice services in the long run."

In its budget submission, Homelessness NSW warns frontline services risked staff cuts and closure without a 20% funding boost.

"Underfunded frontline providers are being flooded with calls for help and forced to turn away one in every two people who need accommodation. Services will be unable to keep staff on or their doors open without more funding," Ms Rowe said.

"Even for people who get through the door, help is limited. Half of those who need temporary or crisis accommodation cannot access it. That means women and children are forced to return to violent partners, seek shelter in a vehicle, on a couch or the street." Homelessness NSW is calling for \$30 million over three years to provide more temporary accommodation and ensure one-fifth was reserved for women and children experiencing domestic violence. It also urged the government to develop a dedicated approach to ending homelessness among Aboriginal communities.

"It is unacceptable that we have failed to reduce the rate of homelessness among Aboriginal people who account for a third of those receiving help from frontline services in NSW," Ms Rowe said. "The solutions must be led by Aboriginal people and investment is needed in Aboriginal organisations and across the whole sector to support this work."

Homelessness NSW is calling for:

- 1. \$1 billion annually for the next decade to build 5,000 social houses per year, allocating 30% of stock to Aboriginal people;
- 2. A 20% funding boost for specialist homelessness services, or \$64 million a year for two years;
- 3. Funding for homelessness provider contracts to be indexed at 6.2% to keep pace with the cost of service delivery;
- 4. \$30 million over three years to secure additional temporary accommodation, including 20% reserved for women and children experiencing domestic violence;
- 5. \$62 million over three years to extend the state's Together Home program;
- 6. The development of an Aboriginal-led approach to ending homelessness, including ensuring providers are culturally competent;
- 7. \$1.2 million for non-residents experiencing homelessness;8. \$1.8 million in housing support for people aged 55 or older;
- 9. Adequate funding for a dedicated youth homelessness plan.

Paying super on parental leave slashes the gender gap and boosts women's financial security

The Australian Government's decision to pay super on its parental leave scheme is "a major stride forward on gender equity" that will boost a mother of two's retirement savings by about \$14,500.

Paying super on the government parental leave scheme will benefit about 180,000 Australian mothers each year and narrow the gender super gap, which new analysis shows is now \$65,000 for those nearing retirement.

Super Members Council CEO Misha Schubert said the Australian Government's announcement signals a clear intent to further improve the quality of life for all women at retirement.

"The Super Members Council (SMC) congratulates the Government for this historic decision to pay super on Commonwealth Parental Leave Pay," Ms Schubert said. "This watershed reform will make a powerful difference to the lives and retirement incomes of generations of Australian women in the decades ahead - and narrow the gender gap at retirement."

"It will powerfully propel Australia closer towards the goal of ending the financial 'motherhood penalty' in the early years of having children – which has a compounding effect across women's working lives."


Despite Australian women living on average longer than men and retiring sooner, they have about a third less super than men as they approach retirement.

New Super Members Council analysis shows the gender super gap has narrowed for all age groups – but women in their 30s have gone backwards – mostly due to not being paid super on parental leave.

Paying super on parental leave is a highly effective gender equity measure and could reduce the gender gap at retirement by around a quarter. SMC estimates about 94% of the benefits accrue to women, and about 180,000 women received Commonwealth Parental Leave Pay in 2022-23. Parental leave is one of the only types of paid leave that does not attract super – now that the Australian Government will pay super on its scheme, it sets an example for more employers to follow.

SMC also advocates a boost to the Low-Income Super Tax Offset – a super tax refund that mostly benefits lower income women but has not increased in line with the tax brackets.

The Super Members Council will continue to advocate to address structural drivers of the gender super gap like lower workforce participation rates, the prohibitive cost of childcare, lower pay for feminised industries and the value placed on unpaid caring.

"I'm so proud of the volunteers at SHASA, our list of achievements over the last 5 years proves that we don't just talk the talk, we deliver projects that make a real difference. To name a few, we have helped four local businesses install EV chargers, opened six Heatwave and Bushfire Smoke havens, facilitated 1500kW of rooftop solar, run a weekly food program in Moruya and Batemans Bay and run the Repair Cafe at the Red Door Hall in Moruya," said Kathryn Maxwell, SHASA president.

SHASA holds itself to a very high standard and can boast that 100% of all donations goes towards project delivery. It is currently involved in implementing 12 grant-funded projects in the local area. Another great project with partner Repurposing for Resilience Eurobodalla (RFR Eurobodalla) involves cleaning solar panels for more affordable re-use by residents.

SHASA is inviting residents to join SHASA's 35 active volunteers in various roles or head up a project and maybe earn a bit of pocket money! Everyone knows volunteers lead happier, healthier lives and it doesn't have to take up hours of your week.

"My family comes first, but helping SHASA improve the health and safety of our community comes a very close second" says volunteer Andrea Charlton, "they welcome everyone - whether you can drop in for 30 minutes to help make lunch for the repairers at the café, do a few hours at the EV expos or write an article on the best way to save money while living green."

Now is the time to secure bargains at **Emmott's Beehive Store**, a discount of 3/- in the £ being allowed on all cash sales, except groceries and produce.

Some 75,000 bricks have been burnt for the new cheese factory to be erected for the **ABC Dairy Co., Central Tilba,** on the site of the old building.

Through his horse shying and capsizing the cart last Saturday, Mr. C. Johnson sustained a lacerated hand and a general shaking, in consequence of which householders missed Christy's hearty greeting with the delivery of the daily newspapers for a few mornings.

The erection of a telephone line between Northangera and Nelligen will be commenced about the end of June next.

Master Bobby Bull, who recently gained a scholarship, left yesterday for Goulburn, where he will attend the Boy's High School.

Eurobodalla sparkles after clean ups

Volunteers rolled up their sleeves in search of litter and rubbish over the weekend.

More than 250 volunteers took part in Clean Up Australia Day across 50 Eurobodalla community and school sites. Project officer Maree Cadman said students and teachers of 11

On Sunday, volunteers continued to collected rubbish at beaches, roadsides, creek lines, cycleways, and estuaries. "Groups reported less rubbish this year, with common items being cigarette butts and recyclables," Ms Cadman said. Council's waste team will pick up 116 bags of rubbish from cleanup sites plus an additional 30 cubic metres of bulky items. "It's always rewarding to hear how much rubbish was rescued from our waterways and bushlands, leaving our public areas sparkling once again," Ms Cadman said.

Together we can make a difference every day – not just Clean Up Australia Day – to pick up stray pieces of litter whenever you

spot it."

For anyone coordinating a cleanup separate to Clean Up Australia Day, Ms Cadman said Council has tools to help. "We have plenty of bags and gloves and staff run cleanups with volunteer groups regularly too. Get in touch with our waste team," Ms Cadman said.

Ms Cadman urged the community to report illegal dumping sites to Council.

"If you come across alarming amounts of rubbish or green waste in the bush, at public parks, along roadsides or waterways, please report it so Council can investigate," Ms Cadman said.

South East Arts Micro Grant Success 2024

South East Arts has awarded 22 Micro Grants to artists, providing \$22,000 directly to the arts in the region. The funding will support a diverse range of proposals aimed at helping artists connect with audiences, both live and online. Over 40 applications were received, covering a diverse range of creative practice in the region and highlighting the importance of helping artists build audiences for their work. "Our public fund has made the microgrants possible and the South East Arts Board recognised that in this post-Covid period, rebuilding audiences has been a challenge", explained Andrew Gray, Executive Director of SEA. "We welcome any tax-deductible donations to our public fund that would enable us to keep providing initiatives like this to support our arts sector".

The successful Micro Grant proposals ranged from helping musicians tour to festivals and regional venues, to visual artists creating exhibitions or better representing their work online. Seven of the successful grant recipients were First Nations artists working in music, visual arts and crafts, dance and digital arts.

"All the applications highlighted the considerable level of creative activity in the region" explained Andrew Gray. "While the grants of up to \$1000 are only a small amount in the scheme of things, you can see from the applications that artists will use this to value add. The quick response of the grant allowed a number of applicants to get support for activities in March".

"Because of the large number of applications, there were many excellent proposals that we were not able to support", said Andrew Gray "but there continues to be a range of arts funding opportunities and South East Arts is ready to assist and advise people interested in applying".

South East Arts last offered micro grants in 2020 in response to the bushfires and Covid pandemic. In that round 33 artists and arts organisations received support to help purchase lost or damaged equipment, improve online connection and support creative development during lockdown. South East Arts will run the annual Country Arts Support Program (CASP) funding round in Oct/Nov this year for projects in 2025 and encourages arts organisations and artists in the region to consider applying. 



Milestone reached in doubling Landcare funding

Agriculture Minister Tara Moriarty said "This funding to Landcare NSW will support host organisations, coordinators and support roles that will enable this program to achieve essential environmental and agricultural productivity outcomes over the next four years

"Landcarers, primary producers and the environment will all benefit from this funding to Landcare NSW, as coordinators and Landcare groups will have more capacity to support the delivery of on-ground projects. "A key part of the funding will allow Landcare NSW to increase its self-sustenance and reduce reliance on direct NSW Government funding over the medium to longer term. "I am very passionate about Landcare and the important role they play in protecting the environment, and supporting agricultural productivity in our communities so it gives me great pleasure to announce this funding."

Landcare NSW CEO Turlough Guerin said: "We welcome this announcement of funding from the NSW Government and thank Minister Tara Moriarty for her ongoing support and commitment to Landcare.

"This funding will allow the local and regional coordinators and support staff to receive the support they need to excel in their roles and deliver for the communities they are working in.

Regional Migration at its Highest Level in over 12 Months

There seems to be organisations for everything these days. One that we weren't aware of is the "Regional Australia Institute" who create a quarterly "Regional Movers Index". In their latest report (Dec 2023), they identified that there were fewer property movements for the last quarter which is in line with year on year trends for the last quarter of the year. However, their report stated: "While internal migration cooled in the December quarter, regional living continued to hold sway, with 24.9 per cent more people moving from the city to the regions than back in the other direction." Those moving from the cities to the regions now account for an 11.3 per cent share of all relocations (up by 0.3 per cent on the September 2023 quarter). The report said "Sydney-siders continued to lead the exodus out into the regions, accounting for 65 per cent of all capital city outflows to the regions in the 12 months to December 2023." 





Fishing report from Tackle World Moruya Moruya River.

The warm waters continue to keep the fishing activity firing at the moment, with the whole systems benefiting from the warm currents.

The lower sections are holding some very nice bream, flathead and whiting this week, and with the abundance of bait that is around, the odd mulloway has been encountered around quarry wharf.

The town bridge with its sand flats and channels, has been holding some nice fish on both a rising and dropping tide. My choice of baits is most defiantly live nippers that can be pumped from the Garlandtown flats and the sand flats directly under the bridge itself.

Soft plastics will also work well along the flats here, and sight casting to cruising flathead from the bridge itself is one of my favourite things to do.

Further upstream, the hospital area has some nice ground to fish, and an even more convenient area from which to do it. You can virtually drive and park, right up to the fishing spot and are sheltered from the sun and wind under some good trees.

Up in the fresh, the bass anglers are still getting some good fish, and there are many many kilometres of fish ale river to try. The further you go up the Araluen valley, the less activity the river sees. So theoretically, the more fish you could encounter.

Tuross river.

With the Tuross River fishing comp on this weekend and the Canberra day long weekend, you can expect that Tuross will be a hive of activity on the fishing front. It's a good thing that the Tuross system is guite substantial, and offers plenty of options for all levels of anglers.

There have been plenty of bream, whiting, flathead and the odd salmon hitting bait schools this week. The salmon have been more towards the lower sections of the river, as have the whiting over the warmer sand flats. The entire system has fished really well this week, and will offer good options for those that want to explore.

Rock and beach.

The warms currents have bought the bonito on last week, with bait fish activity very high from the various rocky headlands and ledges all along the coastline. There have been a few reports of rat sized kingfish from around the Broulee headland area along with some good captures of squid. Sending a tasty cephalopod back out alive under a float or ballon, is a good way to find a king or other pelagic that might be hanging around.

The beaches continue to produce some good flathead, bream and whiting on worms, nippers and pips, while the deeper gutters are also holding some good sized salmon.

The whole coastline is currently firing, so get out there and have some fun.


Offshore.

Snapper, flathead, Marlin and kingfish have all been on offer this week, for those that are willing to get offshore and chase their chosen species.

The store is looking relatively well stocked at the moment, with a few holes that will hopefully be filled shortly. The Tweed bait freezer is in a constant state of being semi stoked as supply issues continue to affect what bait we can get from them. Our alternate freezer of both whole and filleted baits is still nicely stocked, and offers something different to the standard baits on offer from tweed.



Bandi's Boy's owner John Woods had tragically passed away last month, and an employee of the stable had also died. The first and second horses qualified for the \$1 million final at Royal Randwick on 6th April. The Country Championships was launched in 2015.

The <u>Country Championships</u> was created to support and promote NSW racing in country areas, ensuring that horses from across the state are part of The Championships in Sydney in the autumn.
