#### Federal budget 2024, health funding and the far south coast - A total failure for equity for the far south coast By Dr Arn Sprogis

Before the last Federal election Labor party election material said why we should "Vote for Albo for PM" with the answer being, "I have a vision for Australia: No one held back. No one left behind. Labor is on your side".

Well, he mustn't have meant the Far South Coast because in health funding terms we remain "left behind" and "held back" with no reduction of the 40-year gap in per person health funding in our region compared to a similar capital city population. It's worth a reminder of just how big the gap is in Commonwealth funding, the rural/regional state and commonwealth funding shortfall in FY 2021, compared to city populations was \$6.55 Billion or \$850 per person of which the commonwealth share was around \$5-600 per person. The amount would be significantly greater in 2024.

With the funding equity gap not closing or even increasing our far south coast community must yet again wear a greater share of the burden of poor health outcomes, despite already having lower incomes and poorer access to healthcare at all levels.

The one glimmer of hope after many years of no action is that at least Mark Butler, Minister for Health has finally acknowledged the problem of years of neglect in rural areas and is the first Commonwealth Health Minister to state that both sides of politics when in government have been to blame and that Labor has an opportunity to restore the equity balance. The Minister has initiated two major reviews (which I will comment on in detail in another opinion piece) with one of those reviews having the potential to be a historic game changer for rural communities with perhaps even greater potential than Medicare to finally get equity of access to healthcare in our region for our community.

Reviews are not the same as delivering access to healthcare and providing equity of funding but as the reviews report in October the

recommendations will be part of consideration for translation into election policy.

One way or the other we will know by late 2024 or early 2025 whether the Albo promise will be kept as far as access to quality health care is concerned.

# Record crowd for Batemans Bay Sorry Day Bridge Walk

More than 1500 people joined the Sorry Day Bridge walk over the Bhunduu (Clyde River, Batemans Bay) this morning. Bus loads of schoolchildren representing all the schools in the Eurobodalla Shire gathered with hundreds of locals on the northern bank of the Bhunduu for a smoking ceremony led by Walbunga man, Jordon Nye, Chief Executive Officer of Muladha Gamara (wise woman, wise man).

Muladha Gamara supports and runs culture youth programs, organises cultural tourism and conducts traditional ceremonies and is based in Mogo.

The special smoking ceremony focused on cleansing country for people supporting Sorry Day as well as promoting healing. Jordon then then led the Sorry Day March across the bridge with traditional song sticks and singing.

Community member and Walbunga woman, Melissa Ellis, from Moruya, took over and emceed proceedings.

Local police diverted traffic to ensure the smooth running of the march.

Walbunga Elder, Aunty Meryl Crole gave an emotional Welcome to Country and a very moving reading of Prime Minister Kevin Rudd's Apology to Australia's Indigenous Peoples, particularly the Stolen Generations, delivered to the Australian Parliament in 2008.



Traditional dancing and singing followed led by Jordon Nye and well supported by a talented group of young first nation women. The large crowd joined in the final ceremonial dance in a spirit of reconciliation.

Melissa Ellis then invited Mayor of Eurobodalla, Matt Hatcher, Fiona Phillips, federal MP for Gilmore and Dr Michael Holland, state MP for Bega to speak.

Melissa Ellis concluded the formalities by asking the crowd to reflect on the National Reconciliation Week theme for 2024 'Now More than Ever'. Melissa stressed the importance of 'doing sorry' as opposed to just saying 'sorry'.

First Nation Elders were then invited to cut a cake with the words 'Now More Than Ever' prominent on the icing.

Walbanja man, Joe Brierley, Community Engagement Officer with The Family Place in Moruya was pleased with the large turnout.

Joe said "At the first march 5 years ago we had a crowd of about 300 people in Moruya. It is getting bigger each year and today's turnout of upwards of 1500 people is fantastic. It is a great 'all of community' event and we are supported by businesses, a range of community groups, government and non government organisations. Everyone has pitched in to provide a barbeque lunch and drinks. It is a great lead in to National Reconciliation Week."

## New Level 4 Eurobodalla Regional Hospital Moruya Meeting Q & A



### A Community Viewpoint By Dr. Arn Sprogis (retd.)

I have been following the New Moruya Hospital process closely ever since I moved to the Eurobodalla nearly 5 years ago, mostly out of selfinterest as I am at an age when hospitals become important but also because I spent much of my working life not only as a GP but also heavily involved in large scale health systems development in a large regional area including GP/Hospital integration. So, as a community member, on Thursday, 23 May, I attended the ABC-style "Q&A" Panel Discussion at the Moruya Golf Club organised by ONE New L4 Eurobodalla Regional Hospital Advocates in partnership with RSL Moruya to which the local community was invited to put their questions. Over 100 people attended the meeting.

My expectations of learning anything new were low as over the 5 years I have lived here, I watched with disbelief the hospital development process which looked like an evolving train wreck with three community petitions (Level 4 Hospital; Radiotherapy at Moruya and Save Batemans Bay ED), coupled with a serious lack of open and transparent exchange of information with the community, no visible work started on a new hospital and the completion date sometime in 2027 maybe. I was wrong, the meeting was full of useful and interesting information although a bit light on data to support the vision. The audience questions were to the point and covered most of the important issues, the panel Mayor Mat Hatcher, Dr Michael Holland MP, Dr Stuart Stapleton Director of Emergency Care Services for Eurobodalla Hospitals, Brad Scotcher General Manager Coastal Network and Bunja Smith as moderator, were very open in their responses and 25 questions were covered in 90 minutes.

#### A SUMMARY OF TOPICS AND ANSWERS 1. The Building

Q. When will it start being built, what is the build time?

A. Very soon the approval is nearly done, and the contractor not yet signed up. Once the contractor signed build time can be quite fast but no timeline available and no completion date can be provided yet.

Q. Helipad Issues

A. Helipad DA needs to be reviewed particularly to improve amenity for nearby residents so will have a separate DA. The hospital build will proceed while helipad issue is resolved. Hospital will open with a functioning helipad.

Q. Is funding still sufficient?

A. Funding to be reviewed for the 2024 budget process.

**2. Level 4 Hospital** (this was the most interesting bit whenever it came up and made clear why it's so important)

Q. What is a Level 4 Hospital?

A. The heart of a level 4 hospital is the combination of an ICU and an upgraded Emergency Department. The concentration of diagnostic equipment, higher levels of trained staff and the ability to ventilate and support circulation for critically ill patients is a major step forward in saving lives and getting improved hospital outcomes including improving transport to other centres. There is no question that north or south of the Moruya River survival outcomes will improve for all patients treated at the new level 4 hospital. Q. Are there plans for local physicians to care for medical patients rather than just relying on fly in fly out locums.

A. This triggered one of the best bits of the evening with a long and detailed listing of the many improvements in care possible once there is an ICU and Level 4 status, including increasing the number of medical specialists able to manage patients, increasing the number of supporting specialised GPs, establishing a dementia unit and geriatric care, significantly increased teaching in all areas, more medical students etc etc. Q. Currently many patients requiring transfers experiencing delays how will it be improved now and in future.

A. Working on it by improving arrangements with other hospitals.

#### 3. Planning and Data

Q. There were several data questions, including when the community can see a copy of the updated clinical services plan and is there a critical path analysis for the hospital build.

A. Question taken on notice, even though the request has been made before to the SNSWLHD.

#### 4. Radiotherapy at Moruya

Q. There were several questions all around why we don't have a radiotherapy unit in Moruya considering the population size and age range.

A. There won't be a radiotherapy unit in Moruya at hospital opening. Q. When can the community see a copy of the Mick Reid report on radiotherapy commissioned by NSW Health?

A. The report has gone from NSW Health to the Commonwealth Dept. of Health and it's not known when or even if the community will see it. 5 Staffing

#### 5. Staffing

Q. What are the plans for nurse recruitment

A. The good news is that at present the overwhelming majority of nurses are permanently employed and staffing is looking in good shape heading to hospital opening. Q. How many extra employees are required for the new hospital. A. About 165

#### 6. Transportation

Q. Will there be an upgrade to Moruya Bridge A. No.

Q. Patient discharged at 1.30 am from Batemans Bay Hospital no way to get home how will this be improved?

A. No improvements discussed for the current situation. In future using the carer accommodation at the new hospital will help solve this, and there will be short stay beds in emergency.

### Southern Phone pays \$244,000 penalty for inadequate complaints handling

Southern Phone Company Limited (Southern Phone), which is wholly owned by AGL Energy, has paid a \$244,140 penalty for failing to adequately deal with customer complaints.

#### An **Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA)** <u>investigation</u> found Southern Phone breached

telecommunications complaint handling rules on 77 occasions between April and June 2023.

Under the Consumer Complaints Handling Standard, telcos are required to meet minimum standards and timeframes when managing complaints. If the telco does not believe it can meet the complaint resolution timeframes, it must notify the customer. On 38 occasions Southern Phone failed to notify the customer of an expected delay or implement a resolution within the required ten working days for non-urgent complaints. The ACMA also found Southern Phone failed to keep adequate complaints handling records on 39 occasions.

ACMA member and consumer lead Samantha Yorke said telco customers have a right to expect their complaints will be actioned in a timely manner and be advised if there are delays.

"Efficient handling of customer complaints needs to be treated as a high priority for telcos. Southern Phone lacked the proper processes to manage these complaints and it needs to do better," Ms Yorke said.

"Experiencing issues with your phone and internet can be frustrating, but to then have a complaint mismanaged by your service provider just exacerbates the problem.

"Telcos report receiving more than 2,500 complaints each day. While we have seen some recent improvement, this is still too high considering how fundamentally important these services are to consumers. "Telcos need make a concerted effort to address the unacceptable level of complaints and the way they are being handled," Ms Yorke said.

In addition to the financial penalty, Southern Phone has entered into a court-enforceable undertaking committing to an independent review of its compliance with complaints handling rules and to make improvements where needed.

The ACMA initiated its investigation following a review of Southern Phone's complaints-handling performance. Telcos that supply more than 30,000 services must report to the ACMA on their complaint handling on a quarterly basis. 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### Moruya Mail Council reviews Mogo Trails and Coastal Headland Walking Trail

COUNCIL REPORT: "The purpose of this report is to present the Mid-point review – Mogo Trails and Coastal Headlands Walking Trail - Final report.

With the Mogo Trails and Coastal Headlands Walking Trails projects due for completion in December 2024, it was timely to undertake a review of the implications and impacts of both projects, both now and looking forward to the operation and maintenance of these assets.

In December 2023 Council staff engaged Morrison Low to undertake a mid-point review of both the Mogo Trails and Coastal Headlands Walking Trails projects. The scope of the review included:

 undertake a comprehensive review of all aspects of these projects, the risks and liabilities posed to Council

 provide recommendations for a preferred management model for the Mogo Trails, including options for potential transition away from Council management (trust, committee, commercial, etc) and review of the draft management plan assess the suitability of Council's existing project

management approach and underlying systems and processes for both projects

· identify lessons and improvements for Council in the delivery of program and project management.

This is the second external review (Bay Pavilions review, KPMG, August 2023) to recommend Council establish a project management office function. This recommendation is under active consideration among the raft of other organisational changes underway, including the Finance and Grants strategies.

#### **RECOMMENDATION** THAT:

1. Council receive and note the attached Mid-point review -Mogo Trails and Coastal Headlands Walking Trail - Final report. The General Manager investigate options to transfer Mogo Trails management and operations to a trust or similar, or a commercial operator."

#### ABE Presentation on GMR24/004 Mid-Point Review -Mogo Trails and Coastal Headlands Walking Trail.

Good afternoon. Thank you for the opportunity to address Council regarding GMR24/004 Mid-Point Review - Mogo Trails and Coastal Headlands Walking Trail

I am presenting as Co-Convenor of A Better Eurobodalla (ABE), a community forum dedicated to having open and inclusive government in our region. ABE expects that before governments, at any level, make decisions that will impact their communities, they will undertake broad and meaningful consultation, listen to and share expert advice, and proceed using a transparent decision-making process so that the community understands who makes decisions, when and why. ABE has taken a sustained interest in Council's governance and management of major grants projects, reflected in multiple written enquiries and presentations to Council, including a presentation in August 2023 on the Review of the Bay Pavilions. ABE also made a submission to the NSW Government Public Accountability Committee examining public grant processes. After inspecting the mid-term review, ABE offers the following observations :

1) The external review is a welcome step in providing the community with insights regarding the current status of these two projects. It has identified significant financial risks arising for Council and the Eurobodalla community as both projects move into operational mode, and offers options to address or reduce these problems.

2) The review's suggestion for the creation of dedicated project management skills and resources within Council is a worthwhile initiative, and echoes similar recommendations made in the Bay Pavilions Review in August 2023. ABE supports this recommendation

3) While the review has provided useful suggestions on how to minimise the emerging financial and related risks arising from these 2 grant projects, it provides no substantive insight into how Council and Eurobodalla ratepayers came to be in our current predicament.

The review exhibits a puzzling lack of curiosity in how these 2 major financial dilemmas developed, and lacks any comprehensive documentation regarding information sources and stakeholders contributing to the review. In this respect, this review is lamentably similar to the Bay Pavilions review. For those who say that past events should be ignored as we look to the future, I offer the enduring advice : "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."

4) The lack of documentation regarding the Review's sources and stakeholders is a critical weakness, as it makes it impossible to evaluate what community input (if any) has gone into this review, and what degree of community transparency has been applied in the development of these projects. It is the lived experience of ABE and other interested community members that it has been difficult, if not impossible at times, to get accurate and up to date information regarding either of these projects. For example, the reduction of the Coastal Walking Trail length from 33km to 14.5 km was never formally announced - it just mysteriously occurred without any explanation being provided. Given this track record, it is paradoxical that most of the potential solutions suggested by the Review involve much greater community involvement, in order to reduce the impacts on Council resources and staffing. If Council is serious about enlisting greater community involvement in these projects, it is essential that it communicates the current circumstances of each project frankly and fully to the community.

5) The Review's dismissal of Council's lack of understanding of the whole of life cost of the Mogo Adventure Trails as an "unfortunate oversight" strains the reader's credibility. Whole of life costing is "Project Management 101", and is fundamental to the development of any sort of business case. It is particularly puzzling in the case of Mogo Adventure Trails, as the initial \$3 million Growing Local Economies grant stipulated requirements for submission of both a business case as well as "information on how the project will be operated and/or maintained upon completion".

6) There is an elementary but non-trivial mathematical error concerning the maintenance cost of Mystic Ranges on page 15 of the Review. The review indicates the cost per kilometre as \$1,400, when it should in fact be \$14,220 per kilometre (i.e. an error factor of 10). This translates to a cost per metre of \$14.22, in comparison with the \$1.50/metre cost initially guoted by Dirt Art, the Mogo track designers. If the Mystic Range figure were applied to the Mogo complex, it would generate an annual maintenance cost of \$2.133 million. The escalating estimated maintenance costs per metre are a significant risk factor for the 155 km of Mogo trails, having gone from \$1.50 (Dirt Art), \$2.15 (draft Mogo Trails Adventure Plan) to \$4.00/metre in the current review.

7) The Mid-Point Review corroborates ABE's submission to the Public Accountability Committee that the Coastal Headland Walking Trail project was not in a "shovel" ready" state when granted \$5.25 million of BLER (Bushfire Local Economic Recovery) grant funding in 2021, despite this being one of the key requirements stipulated for this program. This unsatisfactory state of affairs reflects poorly on both the grant provider and the grant applicant.

It is of great concern to ABE and many other community members that three large Public Funding grants (totalling more than \$84 million) have become current or imminent ongoing financial and/or resources black holes for Council and its ratepayers. The forces that facilitated these financially "poison pill" grants are still with us, and the community needs to be vigilant to ensure that history does not repeat itself. The recommendations outlined in the Mid-Point review, if fully and rigorously implemented, can make a significant contribution to avoiding such errors in the future. The long term negative financial implications from the Mogo Adventure Trails and Coastal Headlands Walking Trail projects, on top of the already disclosed financial burden arising from the Bay Pavilions Aquatic Centre, underscore the critical need to pursue the good governance and transparency objectives that ABE has consistently been putting forward to Council for over 3 years. ## Twenty-five community groups in Gilmore to receive funding boost during National Volunteer Week

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# Incentives to boost rollout of household batteries in NSW

The NSW Government will launch a new incentive to make household batteries more accessible and affordable for NSW residents.

Households and businesses with solar panels on their roofs will be able to buy a cheaper, subsidised battery to store solar energy generated when the sun is shining.

This will help get the most out of their solar, by allowing them to use it around the clock. It will also reduce their energy bills and boost the reliability of the state-wide electricity grid. **The new incentive is part of the Peak Demand** 

### Reduction Scheme and includes:

 $\cdot\,$  Between \$1600 and \$2400 off the up-front installation cost of a household battery for homes and business with existing solar.

• For homes and businesses wanting to install solar, the incentive will be considered in the quote for a new solar and battery system installation.

• A \$250 to \$400 incentive for connecting a battery to a Virtual Power Plant. It can be claimed a second time, three years on.

By connecting batteries in Virtual Power Plants, households and businesses can collectively share capacity across the energy grid.

The incentives will be available from 1 November 2024 and will be accessed through approved suppliers, which will become accredited over the coming months.

The expansion of the scheme follows extensive consultation with companies who specialise in the orchestration of household batteries, like Reposit Power in the Blacktown electorate.

Minister for Climate Change and Energy Penny Sharpe said "More than one million NSW households have solar panels on their roofs and adding a battery will see them benefit around the clock, not just when the sun is shining. We are bringing down the upfront cost of batteries for households and businesses to make them more accessible.

"This is a targeted action to support those with solar to take the next step to lowering their bills by using renewable energy. It also supports the state's transition to renewable energy."

"Homeowners can maximise the benefit they get from a battery system at their home by shopping around for deals that offer guaranteed bill reductions for at least five years."

### What is a Virtual Power Plant?

• Virtual Power Plants group the power produced by rooftop solar and stored in batteries, so it can be released into the grid where and when it's needed.

• Energy from Virtual Power Plants is released into the grid to address frequency and voltage imbalances, local disruptions or disturbances and keep the network stable. More information can be found online <u>https://arena.gov.au/blog/what-are-virtual-power-plants-and-why-do-they-matter/</u>.

#### What is peak demand?

Peak demand is when electricity usage is at its highest, such as in the middle of summer when millions of households turn on their air conditioners.

If the level of peak demand can be lowered, we can reduce the amount of renewable energy infrastructure that needs to be built to keep the lights on.

Building only the infrastructure we need saves NSW money.

Election staff perform a range of tasks on election day, including: • providing information and assistance to voters



While cranking up his car on Tuesday afternoon **Mr. H. W. Luck**, of Yarragee, broke a small bone in his wrist.

The very many friends of Mrs. John Emmott and her daughter, Mrs. Gregg, are having the pleasure of again welcoming them back to Moruya. These ladies, who arrived from Wollongong on Wednesday, are the guests of Mr. and Mrs. E. Hawdon, of "Beverley," and intend wintering here. Capt. Andrew Lang, the famous aviator, and holder of the world's altitude record of 30,500 feet, who visited Moruya in Mr. Lebbeus Hordern's flying boat, Seagull, was killed instantly in a motor smash at Melbourne on Wednesday while engaged in an endurance test on behalf of a motor firm. It is with deep regret that we are this week called upon to chronicle the death of John Joseph, younger son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Russell, of Kyla Park Estate, at the age of 16 years. Young Jack, as he was familiarly called, was a pupil at St. Joseph's College, Hunter's Hill, and was making rapid progress with his studies. About three weeks ago he complained of feeling unwell, the cause of which was traced to an injury to one of his knees, received, we understand, while playing a game of football. His illness was diagnosed as blood poisoning and he was admitted to St. Vincent's Hospital. ... An operation was deemed necessary, and was successfully performed, after which the poor sufferer seemed to rally, and gave hopes to the anxious of his recovery. He passed peacefully away on Saturday morning, 17th May, surrounded by his heartbroken father, mother, brother and sister.

### More emergency aircraft to keep South Coast safer

The NSW South Coast has experienced devastating bushfires and flooding over the past few years, and the Albanese Government will ensure the region is better prepared for future natural disasters by funding more aircraft to respond to fires, floods and other severe weather events across Australia.

Through the 2024-25 Budget, the Government will provide an additional \$35 million over the next two years to the National Aerial Firefighting Centre (NAFC), which supports the delivery of national, state and territory aircraft for use by fire and emergency services.

This investment will deliver a broader range of aerial assets, moving from specific firefighting aircraft to a mix of fixed-wing and rotary multi-use assets, significantly strengthening protection for communities in Gilmore as they continue to face a more natural disasters into the future.

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips said, since the 2019-20 Black Summer Bushfires that devastated South Coast, there have been calls for the government to do more.

"Our community has been calling for a greater capability to respond to disasters since the region was impacted so badly by fires, and again by flooding, so it's really good to see the Government continuing its commitment to keeping us safe," Mrs Phillips said.

"These assets will be invaluable in protecting lives and property, halting the spread of fires, allowing for rescues during floods and supporting efforts on the ground, especially in difficult-to-access areas of Gilmore.

"This is a fantastic step forward to ensure we are prepared for whatever comes our way in the future, and will be welcome news to disaster-prone communities across the region."

Mrs Phillips said funding announced in the 2024 budget was in addition to the considerable support the Albanese Government had invested in disaster recovery. "This funding brings the Albanese Government's contribution to national aerial capability to about \$48 million a year," she said.

"We are committed to ensuring communities are better prepared for and recover faster from natural disasters - so we can all be safer at home.

"This is yet another step we have taken to ensure our disaster response capabilities are strong."

Mrs Phillips said ensuring access to a fleet of aircraft that could be used for firefighting, emergency rescue and evacuation in times of natural disaster, more steps towards putting downward pressure on insurance premiums and maintaining a stockpile of emergency supplies were just some of the important investments the Albanese Government was making to help keep Australians safe.

"The overall increase in capability means that we can better service all communities, including the South Coast when disaster strikes," she added.

As at 31 March 2024 the fleet delivered in a long-established partnership between states and territories comprises of 162 aircraft, including six large, fixed wing air tankers, 15 large rotary wing aircraft, 70 medium and small rotary wing aircraft, 56 fixed wing firebombers and 15 light fixed wing aircraft.

This fleet is supplemented by additional state owned and state contracted aircraft hired to meet peak demand across Australia. In total more than 500 aircraft, provided by over 150 operators, are available for firefighting across Australia.

### The Budget and Housing

Some of the key features from last week's budget include \$11.3 billion to address the acute housing shortages facing Australians. Under a package called the Homes for Australia plan an additional \$6.2 billon has been added to the previous \$9.3 billion for repairing social housing and providing crisis support. The Homes for Australia plan includes \$1 billon for crisis and transitional accommodation for women and children escaping domestic violence, and for youth. For renters, the Commonwealth Rent Assistance program has been increased by 10% and for the construction sector \$90.6 million has been earmarked to boost the construction workforce with funds providing 15,000 fee-free TAFE and pre-apprenticeship programs. A further \$1.8 million is devoted to simplifying skill assessments for around 1,900 potential migrants from countries with comparable qualifications who want to work in Australia's construction and housing sector UNTIL NEXT WEEK ... Dr Jim Chalmers' Budget speech was a damned disgrace.

His opening words set the tone. 'On this Ngunnawal land we acknowledge all the First Nations people of this country and the custodians, customs and cultures which guide and inspire us.'

Oh really? He not only deliberately abandoned the traditional 'respect to Elders past and present', the sentence itself makes no sense at all. Canberra might be 'Ngunnawal land', but in no way does the 'custodians, customs and cultures guide and inspire' the current government anymore that it did previous Whitefella administrators.

The proof was in the speech itself. The Aboriginal people barely rated a mention. Since the previous Budget, we have had the tragic rejection of a totally mismanaged referendum. Yet in the half-hour that followed the mangled syntax of the opening, the referendum was ignored, and our First Nations were dismissed in three spare sentences.

In case you missed them, here they are in full: 'We will also make new investments in health, housing, education and jobs for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. As well as more remote housing, we're creating the new Remote Jobs and Economic Development Program. With 3000 new jobs in remote Australia to build new skills and new confidence within communities.'

That's 3000 jobs (at best) among our 983,700 Aboriginal and Torres Straits people, a large percentage of whom live in remote Australia. How could he?

And to suggest that the government has been 'guided and inspired by the customs cultures and of the First Nations people' is a barefaced lie. Where, for example, was any awareness of the custodianship of country? Of the obscene fish kills in the once heathy river systems; of the Great Barrier Reef bleached yet again by the heated waters of climate change; of the raging flood waters that killed our native flora and fauna; of the steadily rising temperatures across the northern lands; the fearsome cyclones that batter the communities as never before; and the sacred sites defaced and vandalised by the mining companies?

Three vague sentences and not a single specific figure of proposed expenditure. Not a single figure of new money for education, for decent housing, for the revival of languages trembling on the brink of extinction. No mention of a figure for health facilities; a mere 3000 jobs where 30,000 would barely scratch the surface of need.

Could it be that as a Queenslander, Dr Chalmers has turned a blind eye like so many of his fellow State 'No' voters who see the referendum defeat as the end of the story. One had only to glance at the Aboriginal Minister, Linda Burney to see disappointment writ large throughout the speech. She was almost as glum as Bill Shorten whose who could barely bring himself to look across to the Despatch Box.

And what of his leader, the man who so proudly boasted on his night of victory, that, 'on behalf of the Australian Labor Party I commit to the Uluru Statement from the heart in full'. That was when it was a little more fashionable to see our continental forebears as a valued element of the community, the genuine custodians of the magnificent island that we are all now privileged to occupy. Now, it seems, they are back where they used to be – down the back of town near the cemetery and the rubbish dump, in the junk and galvanised iron camp we call (with unconscious irony), 'Closing the Gap'. Shame, Doctor Chalmers, shame!

A gentle sea breeze overpowered the remnants of warmth from the weak autumn sun as Bazza buttoned up his cardigan and took up position on the headland.

With precision timing, the wrinkled sea released waves and each, in turn, captured more of the beach with the rising tide.

Bazza marvelled at the way the incoming tide consumed the idiosyncrasies of the beach and transformed them into a single seascape.

He chuckled to himself as his mind sought clarity from the hyped budget analysis and commentary dominating the past week. A media frenzy of 'surplus', 'forward estimates', 'net debt', 'productivity' and 'commodity prices' from the commentariat through to the tabloids' simple 'winners' and 'losers'.

It was an annual circus, usually reduced to the government trying to out manoeuvre the press, pacify the loud interest groups and wedge the opposition. The whole charade delivered by an always smiling treasurer with promises of better times to come. These better times forever hidden in the forward estimates.

Treasurer Jim Chalmers must see himself as an incoming tide, swirling amounts of money in proportion to influence to various parts of the economy. Any exposed beach received some white water in the form of \$300 energy bill rebate from lst July.

The \$22.7 billion allocated to Future Made in Australia over the next decade compared to a series of king tides. Decades of governments not picking winners in the economy was being upended and could well end in tears. Perhaps righting essentials such as health, education, homelessness, poverty and infrastructure would ensure there is a future made in Australia.

# Knitting Nannas invite MP's to a Kitchen Table Cabinet

Knitting Nannas and friends host a Kitchen Table Cabinet with MPs and speakers.

Canberra next week to host a "kitchen table cabinet" on the lawns of Parliament House. "We're inviting politicians of all parties and persuasions to join us for a nice cup of tea and a serious chat about what climate change is doing to our country".

Nannas from regional NSW have first-hand experience. Nanna Judi from Eltham, near Lismore, had water through both houses on her property and was evacuated during the February 2022 floods. She is still feeling the trauma of that day.

"Prime Minister Albanese came to Lismore during the floods and told us that because of climate change, we're getting more weather events and they're more intense" says Nanna Judi "but his government is still approving new coal and gas projects".

"We're inviting him to come on down for a cuppa and listen to Australians like us who are directly affected by climate change. We want him to do what the IPCC, the International Energy Agency and our scientists are saying, and put a stop to new coal and gas."

Climate change is already a kitchen table conversation for Nannas like Judi. The Kitchen Cabinet believes it must become one for all Australians. "We need a public education campaign just like the successful campaigns on smoking and HIV/AIDS" says Nanna Eury from Sydney. "Climate change is a public health issue. Our own Federal Department of Health and Aged Care says so. So why not tell the Australians the truth and build public support for what needs to be done?" Canberra is looking its best in autumn colours, and the Nannas will be out in force around town in their signature yellow and black. On Thursday 30th May they'll pitch a marquee on Parliament House lawns, brew up, and get out the knitting needles and the Nanna songbook.

"Our performance of These Boots are Made for Walking outside Santos' Sydney headquarters was sensational," says Nanna Marie. "We've adapted several popular songs for the climate era and we know some of our politicians like the sound of their own voices. Perhaps they'd like to join us for a number or two?"

Knitting Nannas believe the kitchen cabinet model can make an important contribution to democratic debate by encouraging dialogue and engagement on important issues. The Nannas aim to "pull the wool from the eyes of MPs who've been blinded by fossil fuel interests." They'll encourage them to listen and share their concerns and plans across party lines, and with the public, so that we are all "yarning together".

"You don't have to read the tea leaves to know There Is NO More Time. We must act. And we will. We hope you will join us."

### Empowering women to run for council

With voters heading to the polls for local government elections in September, the NSW Government is providing support to encourage more women to consider running for their local council. The Office of Local Government and Women NSW have jointly committed \$160,000 in funding for two women's organisations to host a series of candidate information workshops targeted at

underrepresented groups of women. The Australian Local Government Women's Association (ALGWA) NSW Branch and Women for Election will deliver workshops covering leadership skills, how to run a successful campaign as well as the roles and responsibilities of elected councillors.

Aimed at empowering women with the knowledge to run as candidates, these workshops will be delivered by women with lived experience as political candidates, as well as facilitators who have served or worked in local government.

They will be held at multiple locations in Sydney and in regional and rural areas to ensure women around NSW have access to these valuable training opportunities.

These will include dedicated workshops run by First Nations trainers to support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women to run for local government.

Providing funding for these organisations is part of a wider campaign by the Office of Local Government to encourage greater diversity in candidate representation at the upcoming elections.

The most recent Candidate and Councillor Diversity Report shows the number of female councillors rose from 31.2 per cent to 39 per cent at the 2021 Local Government elections.

The report also shows 3.9 per cent of councillors were Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander, 10.1 per cent of councillors were linguistically diverse and 4.2 per cent of councillors were aged 18-29.





### 'Dynamic Balance' now available online

A book by south coast resident Martin Tye is now available free online.

Broulee resident, Martin Tye is the Australian Regional Communities divisional director for the USA based, Center for the Advancement of the Steady State Economy (CASSE). He also handles social Media and promotions for the Australian organisation Sustainable Population Australia (SPA).

Martin says "Around seven years ago I wrote the book Dynamic Balance highlighting the need for economic system change. The concept for the book was that it be a short. 30 minute introduction to the idea that a system based on endless expansion on a finite land contains the seeds of its own destruction and that the signs of looming system collapse are growing stronger by the year. This is the focus of Part one.

The second part, in accordance with my belief that it's no good being a critic if you can't propose a better alternative, describes the advantages of a steady state economy. A steady state economy is focussed on a dynamic state of balance (hence the title "Dynamic Balance") operating at a truly sustainable scale- that is, at a scale where our land, our planet, can provide the necessary inputs and manage the wastes without degradation. This part draws on my work with CASSE to provide the credible academic backing for the alternative.

This short book is not designed to be a comprehensive technical manual for economic system change. Its purpose is merely to introduce people to a new way of looking at things such that they begin to think about the need for system change and to contemplate the idea that this is most definitely achievable, more than that, absolutely essential.

The reason I re-released this book now is that upon rereading I found it to be even more relevant today than when it was originally written. Many of the things predicted in the book are now happening. For example, this quote from the book-

"Growing numbers of homeless people suffering on the streets... lives evaporating as we sit in traffic congestion breathing each other's fumes. Human beings crammed into trains, shopping malls, handout queues, high rise, & endlessly sprawling suburbs".

Add in climate change and broader ecological collapse, the housing crisis, hospital waiting queues, cost of living increases, growing inequality, etc and it is now more obvious than ever that the current GDP growth focussed economic ideology has run its course. I hope this book will inspire people to learn more about the new way forward." ### Engine and Emerging Industries Loan Pilot

The NSW Rural Assistance Authority is administering the Engine and Emerging Industries Loan pilot program on behalf of the NSW Government. The pilot program is designed **to support regionally** 

**based businesses in food and beverage manufacturing industries** to adopt advanced manufacturing capabilities. Low interest loans of between \$100,000 and \$1 million are now available to eligible regional enterprises to fund activities that support investment in new technologies and equipment that will increase efficiency and productivity.

Program funding is limited – applications will be accepted until allocated funds have been exhausted.

The Engine and Emerging Industries Loan is available to eligible sole traders, partnerships, trusts or private companies who operate in the food product manufacturing or beverage manufacturing industries in regional NSW.

To be eligible, enterprises must be able to demonstrate long-term viability and a capacity to repay the loan. They must have less than 200 employees, be classified under one of the eligible ANZSIC codes, have a suitable Business and Project Delivery Plan and should not have had turnover greater than \$250 million. Low interest loans of between \$100,000 and \$1 million are available per eligible enterprise.

Loans can be used to fund activities that support the enterprise to implement its Business and Project Delivery Plan and invest in new technologies and equipment that will increase efficiency and productivity.

Applicants can apply for funding for activities that commenced on or after 1 April 2024.

The loan can be used to fund investments that will result in:

- implementation of advanced manufacturing techniques and technology
- expansion of existing advanced manufacturing capabilities
- access to external expertise that is directly related to delivery of the project
- purchase and/or installation of specialist equipment and/or infrastructure necessary to progress the project including mobile equipment
- intellectual property protection or advice
- increased capabilities/efficiencies of pre or post-production phases, for example, implementation of pre-market and/or after-market service activities.

## Narooma's Distinguished Gentlemen's Ride exceeds expectations

Narooma's first ever Distinguished Gentleman's Ride (DGR) for Prostate Cancer Research and Men's Mental Health, a Narooma Rotary initiative, was a great success on Sunday.

"The response exceeded our expectations with an amazing 73 riders, 'dressed dapper', and we raised \$10,867," said Rotarian DGR coordinator Françoise Cleret. "That's awesome."

"Some riders came from as far as Merimbula and Batemans Bay, many riding classic or vintage styled motorbikes. What's more, they enjoyed the day so much they want to come again next year."

Ms Cleret said the Narooma DGR is one of almost a thousand DGRs across 105 countries on 19th May. They bring people together to celebrate these bikes and the 'gentlefolk' who ride them, at the same time raising awareness and funds for prostate cancer and men's mental health.

"We showed today that coming together, dressing dapper and the ride does create awareness and raise funds by having fun in style," she said. All funds raised by the DGR will be invested by the official charity partner Movember in both local and global prostate cancer research and men's mental health programs.

The 21km leisurely ride went past the golf course and the Plaza, down Forsters Bay Road, Bettini Lane and Riverside Drive, over the bridge, Dalmeny Drive, Ocean Parade, Noble Parade, swung around the caravan park, Mort Ave to the Highway, and back to NATA Oval.

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### Carbon work must continue

Farmers have urged the federal government to continue its efforts to better understand the net emissions of the agricultural industry as new funding is released to improve greenhouse gas accounting this week.

Yesterday the federal government announced \$28.7 million in funding would be provided to improve greenhouse gas accounting systems within the agricultural sector as part of a \$63.8 million dollar Agriculture and Land Sectoral Plan to drive emissions reduction in agriculture.

NSW Farmers Agricultural Science Committee Chair Alan Brown said with global sustainability targets drawing ever closer, further work to understand agriculture's contribution to greenhouse gases was essential before plans to transition to a net-zero economy could be progressed.

"Before we put any restrictions and targets on the agricultural industry to reduce emissions, it is critical that we understand the emissions measured and carbon sequestered on our farms in the first place," Mr Brown said.

"Currently, we don't have a complete or accurate understanding of industry's net emissions, or how the agricultural sector contributes to global climate change more broadly– so it's essential we stop and understand this before we move on any formal measures or targets to reduce them. "Simply imposing measures without the correct information or consultation could well mean we don't achieve our sustainability goals – or we achieve them, at a huge, unnecessary cost."

With funding for the Plan to be rolled out over the next four years, Mr Brown said it was vital governments continued to work in partnership with industry to ensure the transition to net zero could be achieved without any impact on the nation's food security.

"Working hand in hand with industry on initiatives like this is essential if governments want to achieve a net-zero economy, while still ensuring farmers can produce the food and fibre that feeds our nation and export industries," Mr Brown said.

"Sustainability does not need to come at the cost of productivity in the agricultural sector – and working with farmers on measuring emissions is the first step towards understanding the role we can play in reducing emissions within the industry, while still ensuring food security for the nation."

# Moruya Mail CSIRO releases 2023-24 GenCost report

Shaped by the highest volume of feedback since its inception in 2018, the 2023-24 annual GenCost report has been released today.

GenCost is a leading economic report by CSIRO, Australia's national science agency, in collaboration with the Australian Energy Market Operator (AEMO) on the cost of building future electricity generation, storage and hydrogen production in Australia.

The latest report introduces a range of changes in response to stakeholder feedback, most significantly, the inclusion of large-scale nuclear for the first time.

This decision was prompted by increased stakeholder interest in nuclear following updated costings for small modular reactors (SMRs) in the 2023-24 consultation draft.

GenCost assessed submissions regarding the suitability of large-scale nuclear power generation in Australia's electricity system and found that, while generation units of that scale are unprecedented in Australia, there are no known technical barriers.

It also determined that nuclear power was more expensive than renewables and would take at least 15 years to develop, including construction. This reflects the absence of a development pipeline, the additional legal, safety and security steps required, and weighing the evidence provided by stakeholders.

Wind power is recovering the slowest from global inflationary pressures and cost projections for both onshore and offshore wind have been revised upwards in the next decade.

Despite this, updated modelling found that renewables - including costs associated with additional storage and transmission - remain the lowest cost, new build technology.

This competitive position reflects the decade of cost reductions experienced by wind, solar photovoltaics (PV) and batteries prior to the pandemic, while costs of their more mature competitors have remained flat.

CSIRO's Director of Energy, Dr Dietmar Tourbier, said GenCost was committed to robust stakeholder engagement, with the latest consultation attracting more than 40 written submissions and more than 200 industry webinar participants.

"The feedback provided by the energy community each year is invaluable, given that cost forecasts of future electricity generation, storage and hydrogen production can fluctuate significantly and no single technology can achieve our transition to net zero," Dr Tourbier said.

"Whether the input GenCost receives is highly specialised or simply advocating for a particular pathway, our considerations are policy and technology neutral."

AEMO's Executive General Manager – System Design, Ms Merryn York, said that GenCost was one of several key reports that help inform the continuous design of a sustainable electricity system for Australia. "The annual collaboration with industry to assess electricity generation costs is critical to strategic planning and policy analysis, including our Integrated System Plan," Ms York said.

CSIRO's Chief Energy Economist and GenCost lead author, Paul Graham, welcomed the stakeholder feedback that informed the latest report. "GenCost is flexible to adjusting assumptions, scope and methodology in response to constructive feedback received during the formal consultation period and throughout the year," Mr Graham said. "For example, our approach to the inclusion of large-scale nuclear technology provides a logical, transparent and policy-neutral method of

costing a potential deployment scenario in Australia. GenCost based its large-scale nuclear cost estimations on South Korea's successful nuclear program and adjusted for differences by studying the ratio of the costs of new coal generation in each country.

The costs estimated in the report can only be achieved if Australia commits to a continuous nuclear building program, requiring an initial investment in a higher cost unit. Similar 'first-of-a-kind' costs in Australia also apply to other technologies such as offshore wind, solar thermal and carbon capture and storage (CCS) but have not been reflected in the final GenCost report due to their project specific nature.

The report revised its approach to estimating solar thermal power generation costs to align with other bulk supply technologies. The new cost data indicates solar thermal is competitive with nuclear and other non-renewables that combine CCS technologies. The updated analyses also found that:

Inflationary pressures have considerably eased, but the impact is inconsistent across technologies ·Onshore wind costs increased by 8%, while largescale solar photovoltaic (PV) fell by the same proportion

·Gas turbine costs increased by up to 14% ·Capital costs of other technologies were relatively steady

In response to increased feedback, the 2023-24 GenCost report includes a frequently asked questions section (in Appendix D) providing stakeholders with answers to common questions raised during current and past consultations.





### **Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report** Moruva River.

We haven't had any rain this week, and as a result the river is slowly starting to clear up. While it's not running chocolate brown, there is still plenty of clean fresh coming down the system. This does contribute a lot to reduced water temps, and doesn't help any with fish activity levels.

We have however seen a bit of cold water action around the lower sections of the river, with some nice salmon and tailor being taken around the spur wall and Preddy's wharf this last week. There has also been a few nice trevally mixed in. The salmon and tailor have been taking both pilchards on gang hooks, metal lures and bigger 4" paddle tail soft plastics. Low light periods, dawn and dusk, are the best times to target tailor in particular with the salmon net really phased by the time of day.

Flathead and bream have been fairly quiet in comparison, with anglers having to work a fair bit harder to get these species to bite. Try the deeper holes with oily baits or vibe style lures to try and elicit a bite. Tuross River.

Like Moruya, water conditions are slowly starting to clear up, while there is still a large amount of fresh water still coming down the system. The deeper holes are your best chance of finding a few fish.

Expect to see a few salmon and tailor hanging around the lower reaches of the river, with the mouth, boat ramp and the boat sheds areas to prospect a few fish. The boat shed hole always has the chance of coming across a mulloway as well.

I haven't had any reports from further upstream this week, but am guessing that from four ways up will probably be hard fishing at the moment. Rock and Beach.

This is where the majority of the action has been this week. Good numbers of big salmon and tailor have been reported all along the coast. The salmon have been pushing the 65-70cm mark, those are solid fish, and have made landing them from rocky ledges or the Moruya breakwall a challenge. Longer 12' beach rods in the 6-12kg weight range help when trying to swing a solid fish up onto your fishing position. Don't risk a swim or injury to try land a fish by climbing down to water level if you are using shorter rods. Offshore.

Conditions offshore have been pretty dirty this last week, and as such I haven't had any reports of fish being taken. There does seem to be a pretty big eddy of relatively warmer water sitting off the coast at the moment, hopefully there are a few fish on it.

As the winter progresses the snapper fishing will really start to fire up. Good fish will follow the cuttlefish spawn that happens this time of year, and big reds can be found in very close to shore. Fingers crossed we get a good run this winter.

The bait freezer is pretty well stocked at the moment, with the only no show being Hawksbury Prawns and Whitebait at the moment. We have everything else in stock for the Canberra Day long weekend this weekend. We are well stock with everything else you need to take advantage of what looks to be a reasonable weekend, weather wise, and get onto a fish or two.

Stay safe everyone and remember, "Every days a good day for fishing..."


