## ESC Draft Housing Strategy - major flaws

Increased density does not translate to more affordable housing – no evidence provided that apartments and town houses are cheaper. This draft strategy is relying on developers to drive affordable housing by lifting height limits in the CBDs of Batemans Bay, Moruya and Narooma and adjacent residential areas (not defined). Surely the evidence from Batemans Bay is that greater housing density – developer-driven high rise apartments – does not result in more affordable housing. These are mostly high end apartments for well-off retirees.

#### **Community housing**

Council states it cannot fund community housing projects – why not? A number of other Councils have done this to ensure there is more affordable housing. Examples?

#### Fails to deal with the problem of short term rentals

Byron Shire has shown that a key way to reduce rents is to restrict short term rentals to 90 days a year. The draft strategy notes that 27% of houses in the Eurobodalla are absentee landowners. This would address the concerns raised on page 6.Not all constructed dwellings add to the housing stock. Some become secondary housing while others are kept empty or added to the holiday dwellings stock.

Page 8. Council says rising rents is beyond the control of local government. What about Byron Council where restrictions on short term rentals has reduced long term rents.

## Increased density in Moruya, Batemans Bay and Narooma would exacerbate flooding and heatwave problems

Moruya, Batemans Bay and parts of Narooma are low lying and will experience increasingly intense weather events due to global warming. Clearing blocks and covering them with apartments increases hard surfaces and run off. It also results in a reduction in tree cover increasing the heat island effect already experienced in Moruya and Batemans Bay due to the lack of street trees and Council's failure to replace street trees and trees in urban parks and open spaces when they die.

Thanks to the 2019 amendments to the Eurobodalla Local Environment Plan, we have seen more housing being build in high bushfire risk areas. This is despite the statement that Council is managing climate impacts to the 'at risk' of fire or flood status of development (page 6)

## Strategy says higher density developments need more open

The Council has been selling off open space in our urban areas across the Eurobodalla. Is this going to stop with this Housing Strategy?

There is no mention of the need for landscaping and street trees at these higher density developments that Council wants to facilitate.

#### Where is the evidence

Page 10 No evidence is provided that the development industry may be hampered in delivering affordable housing and medium to high density residential living by existing planning regulations etc.

Page 8. No evidence is provided of the unmet demand for high density living.

**Climate Gentrification** (page 23 of draft strategy) If this is about poor people being stuck in areas with high climate risk (extreme weather events), then the Council has assisted this process by amending the LEP in 2019 which allowed more houses to be built in high bushfire and flood prone areas.

#### Population Increase figures used are out of date

The projections for housing need are based on a 1% population increase per annum. This only occurred in 2020 and 2021 during the COVID 19 pandemic. In 2022 the population increased from 40,464 to 40,752, a 0.7% increase. In 2023 the population increased from 40,752 to 40,912, a 0.39% increase or an extra net 160 people.

#### Crime issues with greater density developments

We already have examples of greater density developments that have become ghettos for crime and antisocial behaviour in Batemans Bay and Moruya. This issue is not addressed at all in the draft.

#### In Conclusion

This draft Housing Strategy includes many unsubstantiated assertions and jargon without providing any significant substance about how ratepayers of the Shire will be better off or evidence that more affordable housing will be built. It reads like the Council is indulging developers who plan to maximise their profits by building more high rise.

## Council are still seeking comment on the new housing strategy



#### Extra \$70m for new Eurobodalla Hospital

In a pre-budget announcement, the NSW Government has announced and extra \$70 million will be added to the funding of the new Eurobodalla Hospital at Moruya. The news comes as part of an investment of \$3.4 billion in 2024-25 to upgrade hospitals and health facilities across the State as part of the 2024-25 NSW Budget ensuring patients continue to receive high-quality care in their local community.

Of this, nearly \$1 billion will be allocated towards rural and regional health capital works projects, and over half a billion towards Western Sydney hospitals in 2024-25 alone

The NSW Government will also invest a further \$47.8 million in the upgraded Ryde Hospital, bringing the total investment in the Ryde Hospital redevelopment to \$526.8 million. This investment will deliver expanded and upgraded health services for Ryde and surrounding communities, which will include a new emergency department, inpatient wards and cutting-edge imaging and diagnostic services.

## Key new investments in the 2024-25 NSW Budget include:

- Hundreds of millions of dollars in additional funding to deliver ongoing hospital redevelopments at Eurobodalla, Temora, Liverpool, Integrated Mental Health Complex at Westmead, Moree, Nepean, Cessnock and Shellharbour Hospitals.
- \$265 million for the upgrade of Port Macquarie
  Hospital to provide a greater range of clinical services,
  including emergency and maternity services for the
  communities of the Mid North Coast.
- \$250 million in a critical maintenance program at hospitals and health facilities across NSW.

Health Minister Ryan Park said "Our health system faces significant challenges after 12 years of neglect by the Liberal and National government, but we are making the diligent decision to invest in critical health infrastructure to ensure we have the essential health services the people of NSW rely on."

"By investing in critical health infrastructure, we will deliver on our promise to provide better healthcare in NSW, by expanding health services in these growing communities, so patients can access the best medical treatments close to home."

"These infrastructure projects and the range of health services that will be provided from them, by our committed and caring health staff, will also help attract more healthcare workers to work in these modern and purposebuilt health care facilities across NSW. In addition, the jobs that are generated as a result of the opportunities available to builders, tradies and apprentices during the construction phase of all these major health infrastructure projects, is also a valuable economic driver in many of our local communities across the State."

### Soft plastic recycling is back in Eurobodalla

Eurobodalla residents can start collecting their soft plastics again, ahead of a new recycling program starting later this month.

Soft plastic recycling bins have arrived at Surf Beach, Moruya and Brou waste facilities for a three-month trial, starting Monday 24 June. Residents will be able to take their soft plastics to any Council waste facility for recycling.

Council's waste services manager Nathan Ladmore said the community can have confidence knowing their plastics will be recycled – especially after REDcycle was suspended in 2022.

"After everyone's recycling efforts, it was a huge letdown when the news broke of REDcycle secretly stockpiling hundreds of millions of plastics in warehouses instead of recycling them," Mr Ladmore said.

"After months of negotiations, it's great to know that our soft plastics will now be kept out of landfill, thanks to Recycle Smart and APR Plastics." Mr Ladmore said Recycle Smart will collect soft plastics from Council's waste facilities and take them to APR Plastics for recycling in Dandenong, Victoria.

"The waste process involves breaking down the soft plastics in a recycling machine called a pyrolysis plant which converts plastics into oil for use in plastic manufacturing," Mr Ladmore said.

"Another bonus is that the generated gas is distributed back into a hybrid generator and used to power the pyrolysis plant.

"The plant has been running since 2019 to fill the void between the collapse of REDcycle and we have confidence in them doing the job right."

Mr Ladmore said Council's waste facilities are currently the only free soft plastic drop off points in the shire.

"We're fortunate to set up this service for residents while supermarkets aren't taking soft plastics at present."

#### Mayne Motion ventilates council financials

At next Tuesdays Council meeting, Councillor Anthony Mayne has given notice that he will move the following motion.

"THAT Council acknowledge the financial stewardship and challenging work underway to return the organisation to financial sustainability.

Cr Mayne has provided the following backgrounder to his motion -"In 2022-23 Council was forecasting a \$4 million deficit. On closer examination that amount was nearer \$14 million. At that time there was no Finance Director or even a finance directorate at Council. The Bay Pavilions was forecast to cost Council \$384K per year to run, but closer examination shows that will be nearer to \$5 million per year. A KPMG review of the facility confirmed these disappointing figures.

Similarly, the independent report commissioned to look at the Mogo Trails mountain bike park has shown annual costs to Council are at least double those anticipated.

As we move forward, we need a solutions-focused approach. Concentrating on the rear-view mirror will not address our current challenges. However, we do need to learn the lessons to ensure we have in place the necessary financial governance and transparency to manage our trajectory. I acknowledge the work of staff and of my fellow Councillors in addressing the financial legacies that are now being addressed.

We already know the southern dam will run over budget in the millions. Our capital works carry forwards are still too high, not to mention the significant line of credit being used for day-to-day

These matters have been documented, verified, and explained to us councillors and, pleasingly, to the community in a transparent, easy to understand way. I acknowledge and thank Council staff for the community briefing sessions explaining our financial reality to residents.

It is important that we recognise that these budgetary failings are taken seriously and that there is a need to change our ways. I acknowledge the work of the General Manager and the Finance Director, a position that has only existed in the past twelve months, that we now have this information in front of us and a plan to fix it. Council staff have managed to reduce that projected \$14M deficit to \$8M for 2024-25. This is commendable and I congratulate the staff for their diligence, but obviously we can't stop there. As Council is about endorse the draft 2024-25 operational plan and

budget, I believe it important these challenges are openly, honestly and transparently ventilated in the Council Chamber for the benefit of the community.

Council commends the analysis undertaken so far by the Finance Director and General Manager and acknowledges the Financial Strategy. Council also notes further work will be needed to maintain a balance between service to the community and living within our means and that open engagement and communication with our community will be foundational in our approach."

The General Manager's Response to the Motion is "Council's Finance Strategy, adopted in December 2023, aims to support and guide our approach toward financial sustainability.

Successful community briefings, held this year and last, show that ratepayers are engaged with Council's financial challenges and the solutions we are posing. We also know there is little appetite in the community for radical service reductions or massive rate rises. With that in mind, we have been careful to identify savings only where there will be little impact on the services we deliver. To achieve this, we've reprioritised our capital works programs and modified some services, as outlined in our 10 May media release, on the website, and the recent public meetings.

These are all prudent, careful adjustments to our work program that will help save money with minimal impact on services for the community. They will be monitored carefully and reviewed annually. We will also continue to provide timely, honest updates to the community as we work through this enormous challenge."

## Better access to quality healthcare series

HAS ANYTHING CHANGED BY JUNE 2024? **By Dr Arn Sprogis** 

With the change to a Labor NSW Government in 2023 and a recent burst of community meetings in late 2023 and early 2024 focussing on the projected improvements to hospital care in the Eurobodalla when the new hospital opens in 2027, it's a good time to reflect on the past history of the hospitals development so we as the community can make sure the next steps are an improvement on the past, "those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it", and the one thing the Eurobodalla community doesn't need is a repeat of past planning and inaction in our new hospitals development.

#### A BRIEF HISTORY.

A good start is to quote a much-missed hero of mine, the late Lei Parker in the Beagle Dec 13, 2021,

"The following is not news of December 2021. It is in fact an extract from a document commissioned by the Eurobodalla Shire Council in 2006 to undertake a Preliminary Feasibility Study for the proposed new Hospital for Eurobodalla Shire....The Greater Southern Area Health Service recently prepared a Service Plan for the Eurobodalla Health Service Cluster, with specific emphasis on the health needs for the future....The vision to operate one facility at a single location is proposed to be established within a 10-year timeframe." The initial proposed opening date for One New Hospital was 2016.

Time marched on with no progress until pre-election 2018 when the Berejiklian government promised \$150 million for a New Hospital in Moruya with a promise to complete the hospital in the next term of government. From 2019 to 2023 other than a steady stream of politicians holding shovels to turn the first sod or scissors to cut the first ribbon with many photos taken of politicians and senior SNSWLHD executives, not a hole was dug, or concrete poured. The brave staff of Moruya and Batemans Bay Hospital continued to battle on caring for our community in facilities which were recognised as being unsuitable at least 10 years previously.

As the responsibility for adequate funding rests with the government of the day, during the life of the previous government there were two more upgrades to funding from an initial \$150 million to the current \$260 million with an upgrade of the hospital from Level 3 to Level 4 at opening.

The credit for the upgrading goes to the outstanding efforts of Dr. Michael Holland supported by Fitzroy Boulting and Mylene Boulting (ONE New L4 Eurobodalla Regional Hospital Advocates) who battled to hold government and NSW Health accountable for the inadequate planning of the right level of clinical services and inadequate funding. This whole period was characterised by secrecy and poor planning for example the use of incorrect population figures in the key planning document. At no stage was there any evidence of NSW Health or the SNSWLHD taking ownership of making sure there was no delay in the Eurobodalla community getting the level of hospital facility it required.

## 2023 LABOR GOVERNMENT ELECTED.

Another election has come and gone with a new Labor government in place and the major advocate for a Level 4 Hospital, Dr. Michael Holland elected for Bega. It's been over a year since Labor formed government during which it has confirmed the funding and another procession of politicians has done the rounds of our region this time without shovels or scissors. So far, no work has commenced on site although a DA has been approved. It's rumoured that a construction contract will soon be and signed off meaning we may see workmen and trucks sometime, soon, maybe. The completion date has moved out to 2027 and completion is now further away than it was when I first arrived in the region nearly 5 years ago. It could be another election away from opening with all the uncertainty that brings for the community. It is difficult to see what has meaningfully changed under the new government.

## WHO IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE DELAYS?

What is clear is that the Eurobodalla community isn't responsible for the delays as we have had 3 petitions in the space of about 4 years calling for upgraded and improved hospital services.

What is equally clear is that its not the hospital staff who are responsible for the delays as they work tirelessly at the frontline in outdated hospital facilities caring for our community.

The full responsibility for hospital planning, building and clinical services rests solely with NSW HEALTH and the Southern NSW Local Health District. Repeated delays, poor planning, lack of transparency in decision making, lack of community access to key data and endless excuses have pushed back commencement to 2027 or later. With high quality planning and implementation, the Eurobodalla would in 2022, have had an open fully functional Level 4 Hospital saving lives and reducing the burden of illness.

#### SUGGESTIONS FOR THE FUTURE

Looking back is useful only if it provides a guide for the future, the past can't be changed, but the future can.

What is required in future is a much higher level of community centred engagement, openness and transparency in planning and decision making by NSW Health, SNSWLHD and the government of the day. The second and more challenging requirement is that SNSWLHD senior management and board be empowered to take a greater local leadership role in advocating, driving forward and being accountable for high quality service levels for their community. Rather than being a barrier to change they should be leaders for change. This will require a strong commitment of support from NSW Health and the government of the day to a transparent, inclusive, community and patient centred health system.

#### Postscript 12 June 2024:

I have finally had a glimpse of what is different and vastly improved in the new NSW Labor government's approach to the development of the New Eurobodalla Hospital, after listening to the NSW Government Treasurer on the ABC this morning. They have proactively planned ahead like government should and allocated an additional \$70 million to the budget for building the hospital. It didn't need a community petition or endless representations to our local member, they just got on with it. What a positive change. Next step, holes to be dug and concrete to be poured.

#### Pushing for Mental Health Awareness: The Power of Community and Challenges

Every year, my family and I embark on the push-up challenge. It all started a couple of years back when my husband's friends roped him into it. This year, I am pleased to see our local third-year medical students joining the challenge too! Admittedly, some days it's tough, facing the prospect of doing 213 push-ups in a day. Luckily, most days are reasonable. But these seemingly random numbers serve a far greater purpose - raising awareness about mental health in our community and generating much-needed funds to support treatment. Each day, participants are shared facts to align with the number of push-ups. For example, Day 4's target was 120 push-ups, symbolising the 120 minutes per week recommended for good health and wellbeing spent in nature. Research shows that spending time in nature significantly improves our physical and mental health, reducing stress and improving cognitive development for children. This year's challenge includes completing 3,249 push-ups in 24 days, representing the number of lives lost to suicide in Australia in 2022.

The "Push for Better Foundation" spearheads this initiative, directing funds to organisations like Lifeline and Headspace. Mental health support is critically needed in our community, with demand often surpassing availability. In my clinical practice, nearly half of my consultations touch upon mental health concerns, reflecting the pervasive nature of the issue. Our community has weathered numerous crises, from climate-exacerbated disasters to the COVID19 pandemic and the cost-of-living crisis, all taking a toll on mental well-being. Compounded by rising healthcare costs, accessing comprehensive mental health care has become increasingly difficult, especially for our youth.

So, what can we do? Engaging in regular exercise, like the push-up challenge, boosts mood and well-being, especially when combined with time spent in nature. Other strategies could include getting adequate sleep, regularly using a mindfulness app (try Smiling Mind), and confiding in a trusted loved one. If you find yourself in an ongoing struggle with low mood or anxiety, consider booking an appointment with your GP to discuss how you're feeling. On a community level, reaching out to others and genuinely asking how they're doing can be a lifeline to someone in need.

It's inspiring to witness local medical students participating in this cause, especially considering the significant pressures they endure. A study conducted by Beyond Blue surveyed 1,811 Australian medical students, revealing alarming statistics: 20% reported experiencing suicidal thoughts over the previous year, while an additional 40-50% faced emotional exhaustion and exhibited symptoms of depression and/or anxiety. These findings underscore the urgent need for prioritising mental health support among medical students.

By coming together as a community, engaging in challenges, and supporting one another, we can prioritise mental health and ensure that no one suffers in silence. Let's keep pushing for a brighter, healthier future – one push-up at a time.

## The Quest to Find Brush-tailed Phascogales on the Far South Coast

Never heard of them? That's hardly surprising because there are only 21 reports of brush-tailed phascogales from the south coast of NSW. These squirrel-sized carnivorous marsupials were considered extinct - or near enough - here on the south coast. But no-one really knows because they are so difficult to find.

After studying them elsewhere in Australia, Dr Susan Rhind has been trying to track them down in the Eurobodalla for the past 5 years. When reviewing records to update their distribution map in 'The Mammals of Australia' book, she came across recent sightings including a one at Longbeach in 2007 and another at Broulee in 2015. Earlier records are from Duesbury Hill at Dalmeny (2001) and Dunn's Creek Rd, near Malua Bay (1997). The continued presence of the species really needed to be confirmed with extra evidence or a photograph.

In 2019, and again in 2022, in collaberation with the Eurobodalla Shire Council nestbox programme and the help of Local Land Services, phascogale nestboxes plus cameras were put out in areas of sightings. Finally, late last year a phascogale was picked up on camera in the Bingie/Meringo area.

So this species is still here with us. Come and hear the story and learn all about phascogales at a talk being given by Susan at the Eurobodalla Regional Botanic Gardens, this Saturday June 15th 1030am.

Don't Close Batemans Bay Hospital Emergency Department Petition debate By Peter Ryan

"The 18,000 Petition signatures to save Batemans Bay Hospital Emergency Department has been tabled with NSW Parliament and is scheduled for debate Thursday 20th June 2024. Many eyes will be on the debate to keep this vital service. The organisers again confirm they support the new Eurobodalla Level 4 Hospital to be constructed at Moruya but are against the closure of Batemans Bay Hospital. The topic has been heavily debated for the past 5 months with grave concerns from the public and health workers but without support from local member Dr Michael Holland.

"Should they go ahead with the planned closure of Batemans Bay Hospital Emergency Department when the new hospital opens at Moruya than Batemans Bay will be come the largest NSW Regional town without a Hospital Emergency Department despite a population 19,333 and growing rapidly" states Peter Ryan. "Many small towns of around 6,500 people within NSW continue to have a Hospital & emergency Department despite being within 30 minutes or less of a Level 4 or 5 Hospital"

Residents were genuinely surprised when this was first highlighted end of last year and still struggle to understand why there aging and growing population will loose such a vital service. Support for the Petition was gained quickly from not only Batemans Bay residents but a very large number of signatures were also offered from Moruya, Tuross, Dalmeny, Narooma, Bodalla & Tilba. Further support was offered from all the Batemans Bay Medical centres and their staff who provided a large number of signed Petition signatures.

The committee has been active providing statistical information gained from the NSW Health website that confirmed the largest number of current & past emergency department presentations are through the Batemans Bay site. The committee has a bus load of supporters travelling to Macquarie Street, Sydney for the debate scheduled for 4.00pm on Thursday 20th June 2024. Although no agreement is expected on the day the committee believe this will further inform all members of Parliament of the need to keep such a vital service for the town with further debate and agreement to follow."

### Scouting for tadpoles in misty mountains



**NSW NPWS reports**: Staff on the south coast took on a challenging hike in the Budawangs to search for endangered Watson's tree frog tadpoles.

The team summited the incredible Cooyoyo, The Castle peak in Morton National Park alongside colleagues from #SavingOurSpecies, hoping to find tadpoles in the rockpools at the top of the peak.

There were concerns the species may not have survived the 2019-20 bushfires, so we were overjoyed to find many tadpoles throughout the rockpools. #SavingOurSpecies collected several samples which will provide us with vital data about the size of the population and its genetic diversity.

It's fantastic news for this threatened species. The team will be conducting more surveys throughout the area to see if we can track down any other populations. The more we know, the better we can protect this precious frog – it's part of our commitment to #ZeroExtinctions on #NSWParks.

## 100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society

14-06-1924

**Mr. A. H. Preddy** had the misfortune on Wednesday night to break a small bone in his wrist when cranking up the engine at his Picture Show.

Mr. Harry Bettini's little boy, aged 10 years, who has had a severe attack of pneumonia and pleurisy, has been pronounced by Dr. Carter, under whose care he is, out of danger. At a meeting of the Moruya footballers held on Saturday night last it was decided to reform the club. It was agreed that the subscription fee be 15s per annum. The choosing of the club's colours was left till the next meeting to be held in to be held in the Mechanic's Institute on Saturday, 14th instant. Mr. C. Smith promised to put up the goal posts and plough the furrow round the field for boundary lines.

In closing the Licensing Court as formerly constituted, the Police Magistrate, Mr. M. H. Cleeve, paid a tribute to the retiring members, Messrs. T. Flood and R. J. Anderson, Esquires, J.P's., who sometimes at personal inconvenience attended to their public duties without remuneration and with every satisfaction to all concerned. Mr. Shepherd, on behalf of the litigants, and Mr. Lawrence on behalf of police, also expressed regret at the passing of the old regime and emphasized their services to the community. On Thursday of last week Rev. G. A. Sanders kindly brought Mr. and Mrs. Smith, of Nelligen, with their little boy, aged 3 ½ years, who was very ill, into Moruya in his car. The child was admitted to the local hospital, and on examination by Dr. Cutler, the patient was found to be suffering from diphtheria. For a few days his life was despaired of, but with careful attention and good nursing the little sufferer is now out of danger.

**Master Dan Geraghty,** a pupil of Mrs. J. Johnson, Eurobodalla's excellent school teacher, has been successful in passing the examination for admission to the Sydney Teachers' College. To mark the occasion the young student's class mates tendered him an enjoyable social evening at Eurobodalla Hall on Monday night. Master Geraghty left the next morning for Sydney to take up his duties.

**Mr. W. Thomas** has returned to Moruya, and expects shortly to be placed in charge of the preparatory work of forming Tuross Estate into a tourist resort.

For devotion to duty when the casualty clearing station at Fienvilliers was shelled by Germans, **Nurse Corkhill (daughter of Mr. Corkhill, of Tilba)** was awarded the Military Medal at the Victoria Barracks last week.



## History Talk: Noted Australian Colonial Poet Charles Harpur



#### Letters of Charles Harper and his Circle – New Book

Authors Paul Eggert and Chris Vening will discuss their new book The Letter of Charles Harpur and his Circle. Harpur, a renowned Australian colonial poet with ties to the Moruya District, is the focus of this first-ever published collection of his letters. In his later years Harpur lived on his farm 'Euroma' on the Tuross River while serving as a gold commissioner on the Nerrigundah goldfield. His widow Mary Harpur, outlived him by thirty years and continued to farm at Euroma while fighting to publish his poems.



# Gadfly

The rabbits are back...if they ever really left.
When Charles Weston began the task in 1913 of
providing Canberra with the green mantle that adorns
our capital city and surrounds today, the Limestone
Plains were overwhelmed by millions of them. They
were the progeny of thirteen European wild rabbits
imported by Thomas Austin, a British squatter in
Victoria's Winchelsea for his sporting pleasure. By 1880
they had crossed the NSW border and multiplied
exponentially.

One of Weston's first hirings was 27-year-old James Carrington Brackenreg, an experienced rabbiter from Narrabri. He had developed a rabbit-proof fence and under Weston's supervision he and his team sealed off 40 acre sections between Queanbeyan and the early Canberra settlement, then eliminated the voracious hordes separately in each one. It was an extraordinary effort, using explosives to blow up their warrens, poison and guns to kill off the escapees, and finally dogs to clean up the survivors.

It was the first time that white Australians chose to assert their status as the apex predator by eliminating a wild animal. And given its non-indigenous background no one objects, either ethically or logically. However, when the Government of the National Capital choses to 'cull' thousands of kangaroos annually, by shooting them dead, day or night – while at the same time asserting that certain killer birds are 'protected' by its laws – a very different response is engendered.

First, I would argue that the Capital's administration has a duty to set an example to the rest of the country. It is, after all, the home of the Prime Minister and the Governor-General, the repository of our historic legacy and our symbols of nationhood.

Admittedly, the quality of our First Ministers since the Hawke Government imposed self-government upon us has rarely thrown up a personage worthy of the role - Jon Stanhope for one and I'd include Kate Carnell until she imploded the hospital. But the very idea of its administrators ordering the slaughter of one of the unique creatures that grace our Coat of Arms is absurd and obscene.

Indeed, it is doubly so when you consider that kangaroos have an in-built capacity to reduce their own breeding rate during times of sparsity. And if they represent a danger to themselves or our cars, they could be gradually moved to areas such as Namadgi National Park by the creative use of fire and fencing.

Birds raise different issues. Our native parrots and the tiny wrens and finches have been terrorised for decades by the Myna birds as well as the Currawongs and Crows (Ravens if you will) which have invaded our city in the years following the big bushfire.

They don't call the gathering a 'murder' of crows without reason. We are not alone, I'm sure, in witnessing the unequal battle for existence that has practically eliminated the gorgeously clad genus Psittaciformes and the sweet little wrens and finches of yesteryear. They build their tiny nests and seek to raise their babies, before the imposing Mynas and the black horrors descend upon them. The result is an outrage of violent death and bloodied feathers in the birdbath

Why, I ask you, is the Currawong and Crow protected by law when the decorative and charming species are crying out for protection from them?

Charles Weston and J.C. Brackenreg fought the good fight against the invading rabbit during the Great War of 1914-18. Just over a century on, the invader has reappeared, this time with an aerial combat arm no less destructive than the fourfooted armies already in possession of the high ground of City Hill.

Time, I suggest, to rally to the flag once more.

## \$946 million for biosecurity protection in NSW Budget

NSW Budget: The NSW Government is continuing to support regional communities and our state's agricultural industry with a \$945.7 million investment to continue the critical role of prevention and protection against biosecurity threats.

This includes an additional \$13.1 million in the 2024-25 Budget to build on the success of the Feral Pig Program, which has controlled more than 100,000 pigs since it began eight months ago.

Feral pigs cause significant damage to pastoral land and crops, and carry diseases that can impact livestock and native animals. This new funding will ensure there is a concerted and ongoing campaign over the next year to reduce pest populations, benefit farmers and landholders, minimise biosecurity risks to livestock, and lower the risk of environmental and ecological damage.

Since October 2023, the state-wide program has:

- appointed the state's first Feral Pig coordinator
- culled 102,141 pigs 15,141 above the original target of 87,000
- had over 5400 properties participate in aerial and ground control programs
- held 93 information and training sessions
- completed 8465 one-on-one consultations with landholders.

In addition to this, the NSW Government's biosecurity program includes significant investments in responses to major threats to the state's agricultural industry, with:

- \$55.3 million for the eradication of red imported fire ants
- \$36.2 million to increase the resilience and capacity of beekeepers, and other industries manage Varroa mite
- \$25 million to support specialist scientific skills to boost the state's frontline surveillance and preventative capabilities to defend against biosecurity risks
- \$6.2 million to target White Spot disease, supporting prawn fishers, farmers and
- \$5.8 million to continue implementing the Good Neighbour Program to tackle weed and pest infestations between neighbouring public and private lands.

The Minns Labor Government is focused on responsible investments which will support the long-term prosperity of NSW communities, no matter where in the state they are.

Biosecurity vigilance is foundational to protecting the state's environmental assets, agriculture and tourism industries, which is why the 2024-25 Budget will invest:

- \$217.2 for prevention preparation of future biosecurity threats including Weeds Action Plans, the first Biosecurity Commissioner and the Bio Lab Defence – key advancements in laboratory defences for diagnostics, pathology, virology, and entomology activities
- \$250.9 million to invest in major biosecurity programs covering active surveillance, rapid diagnostics, traceability investigations and responses for Varroa Mite, White Spot and Red Imported Fire Ant threats
- \$62.4 million investment to contain pests, weeds, and disease outbreaks to minimise adverse impacts on primary industries and the environment. Including the Sheep and Goat eID program to enable tracking and identification during any outbreaks
- \$415.1 million to address existing plant, animal and invasive biosecurity threats including \$13.1m for Feral Pigs in 2024-25, the Good Neighbour program, the independent Agriculture Commissioner, plus Emergency Management Capability in response to natural disasters.

Minister for Agriculture NSW, Tara Moriarty said "Agriculture and our farming communities are the lifeblood of our state and this \$945 million investment in biosecurity over the coming four years will ensure our primary producers continue to have the support they need to thrive.

"Strong biosecurity protections are not just about keeping pest and weeds out - it is about protecting the state's \$22 billion agriculture industries and ensuring families across the state have access to the worlds best produce at the world's

"We have been busy implementing our comprehensive biosecurity plan, from feral pig management to tackling weeds and pests on public lands and fighting the threat of red fire ants.

"Biosecurity is an ongoing challenge, but we are a government who are committed to prioritising the wellbeing of our farmers, regional communities and environments.

"The success of the feral pig program speaks for itself, but there's still more to do, which this essential funding will enable."

#### Next stage of repairs to start on Brown Mountain

The Federal and State governments continue to progress critical repair works on Brown Mountain, with \$1.9 million released to kickstart the next stage of landslip repairs on the Snowy Mountains Highway.

Jointly funded through the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements, Transport for NSW is expected to commence work on the next of nine landslip sites on Monday June 17.

Set to improve safety and travel times when complete, the work will see a damaged section of road fully restored and built back to better withstand the threat of future

Once work is completed, motorists will be able to use both lanes in each direction as the single lane limit put in place in March 2022 will be removed at this location, which is located about 1.5 kilometres east of the Fred Piper Memorial Lookout. The work will include: installing almost 1100 linear metres of soil nails, applying 180 square metres of shotcrete, and repairing damaged road surface and reinstating

Since 2022, extensive repairs have been carried out at three of the landslip sites along the Snowy Mountains Highway. Work currently being carried out at the largest of these sites is expected to be completed by mid-August, with a procurement process under way to book in repairs for three of the four remaining sites. Work is also continuing on a design solution for the ninth landslip site which was damaged during a severe weather event in November last year.

The work will be carried out within the existing temporary barriers for the single lane operations with traffic lights operating 24-hours until work is completed. This means there will be no additional impact on traffic during the work.

This \$1.9 million is part of the \$6 million being invested in the repairs to date.



#### New Strata Reforms Now in Place

In previous editions of Franzen Tips we have written about the various Strata reforms that were introduced in December 2023. Several of them had specific transitional arrangements which needed to be in place in March this year. One specifically related to original owners and the first annual AGM so we won't dwell on that. The other two were: (1) a landlord's agent must give a copy of the by-laws and any strata management statement to the tenant within 14 days of the tenant signing the rental contract unless notice has already been given under the Residential Tenancies Act 2010, and (2) a landlord's agent must provide notice of a tenancy to the owner's corporation. If you live in, or own a property in a strata complex, it is important to stay up to date with the many changes that come into effect from time to time. ### Understanding Palestine

The news from the conflict between Israel and Gaza is distressing for most of us. We may feel confused and powerless in the face of these awful events. On Saturday 15th June there will be a talk by Dr George Browning that may help explain the historical precedents to this present situation. Retired Bishop George Browning PhD was President of the Australian Palestinian Advocacy Network 2013-2022. He is now their patron.

"On the 7 October 2023 Hamas engaged in activity, which was abhorrent, no matter the context. The treatment of Palestinians by Israel had been increasingly brutal, without any hope of their rights being honoured, while the long hoped for and promised Palestinian State has been denied in perpetuity. The people have faced an enduring blockade from which no respite was likely soon, perhaps ever. Despite all this Palestinian suffering, the killing of innocent Jewish civilians must be condemned.

A just outcome for Palestinians does not mean diminishment for Jewish residents. It means sharing the richness of diversity without walls and with reciprocity of rights for all."

## Students light up darkest day of the year

After learning coping mechanisms for her own mental health, St Peter's student Zahlia Kelly observed others who were also struggling but shied away from seeking help.

Dealing with your own mental battles is tough, says Zahlia, and it can get tougher hearing about friends or families struggling too.

"Mental health issues are something myself and my family has experienced," Zahlia said. "To learn how to cope yourself and how to cope with others can help you and your loved ones."

Zahlia is a member of the Eurobodalla Council Youth Committee and Headspace Youth Reference Group. She wanted to see a mental health awareness event in Eurobodalla that was symbolic and meaningful to teenagers. Also, bringing mental health services together to share tips and tricks on how to cope. She raised her idea to the youth committee and Headspace to hold an event in Moruya on Friday 21 June.

"A winter solstice event from my hometown, Albury, inspired the spark in me to do a Eurobodalla youth version," Zahlia said. "They creatively made an event for suicide prevention and mental health on the darkest and shortest day of the year."

Zahlia and the youth committee got planning. They came up with their own event to light up the darkest night of the year, naming it Winter SOULstice.


They're inviting young people aged 12 - 24 to put the 'soul' in solstice with free activities, live music and food, as well as inspiring talks by local mental health advocates.

"We also had a collaborative idea to make and light lanterns on the night; something we can all do together - light up the darkness as a symbol of hope and strength," Zahlia said. Zahlia said mental health is a touchy subject for teens, often hitting close to home with experiences from their own lives or among their friends.

"I would love to see more events on mental health in our area, raising the topic of conversation about how you are feeling," Zahlia said.

"Having events to promote mental health services is also very helpful, because there's a lot more support out there than people think. "There are professionals actively trying to make things better for you – they're non-judgmental and super friendly."

## Fungi Feastival events ...

Its only two weeks till the Fungi Feastival's opening night at Narooma Kinema on Friday 21st June with the feature length documentary 'Follow the Rain' which includes a Q&A with its internationally renowned filmmakers Stephen Axford & Catherine Marciniak. This fascinating film will also be shown in Moruya at the Red Door on Saturday 22nd and Perry Street Cinemas in Batemans Bay on Friday 28th June. Both screenings will be attended by the filmmakers and food and drink will be available at the Red Door from the Nourished Sovereign's mobile plant tonic bar.

This years' Fungi Feastival has curated a massive 50 events from Batemans Bay to Eden that cover everything from fungi science, agriculture, open gardens, mushroom growing and setting up a mushroom business to films, an art exhibition, pottery, painting and photography workshops, a fungi horror movie, cooking workshops, fantastic fungal dinners, fungi walks and kayaks, truffle hunts and a stimulating talk on the medicinal properties of mushrooms.

Moruya will host a mushroom pottery workshop at Mogendoura Farm, a shiitake growing workshop with The Nourished Sovereign and free fungi activities for primary age children at the library. At Eurobodalla Regional Botanic Gardens, Stephen Axford & Catherine Marciniak will facilitate a master class in fungi photography and internationally recognised fungal ecologist Dr Sapphire McMullan-Fisher will lead two fungi walks. With a predicted warmer and wetter winter, there should be plenty of fascinating fungi to find.

In Batemans Bay ceramic sculptor Tika Robinson, inspired by her life on a truffle farm, will have her fungi wall-art on display at the library. Also at the Bay library there will be free fungi activities for children in the school holidays. At the CWA Hall in Batehaven, Terry Ross of AT Mushrooms will talk about the research supporting the medicinal benefits of mushroom extracts. For the foodies, there will be a special fungi dinner at The Oaks Ranch in Mossy Point with Fiona Kotvojs of Gulaga Gold speaking about truffle farming.

Narooma will host a presentation by Gary Akers of Shoalhaven Mushrooms on how to run a successful mushroom business. Dr Elisabeth Newfield will host an open garden featuring fungi and demonstrate how to build an outdoor mushroom garden bed. With more free fungi childrens' activities at the library in Narooma, save time cooking and pick up a take-home mushroom meal from Mr Bold.

In the Tilbas, The Dromedary Hotel is hosting a special four-course fungi dinner on Wednesday 3rd July. Mushrooms will also be on the menu at Tilba Valley Winery, the newly opened Pam's Store and Tilba Bakery. And don't forget to call in to Tilba Dairy for a truffle cheese tasting. Tilba Market will have fresh locally-grown oyster mushrooms early on Saturday mornings and Mountain View Farm is hosting a mushroom watercolour paint and sip.

There will be a frightful fungi horror movie at the Red Door in Moruya on Saturday 20th July with a trivia quiz and prizes for fungi fashion and on Sunday 21st July, the last day of the Feastival, there will be a mushroom watercolour workshop in Bodalla.







#### Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report Moruya River.

Less than ideal conditions in Moruya this weekend, and it has been so since mid last week. The river has been running pretty dirty this week as a result of some heavy rains. My best piece of advice is to use oily baits such as mullet, mackerel or yakka fillet and fish the deeper holes to try and find a fish or two. On a run in tide, there have still been a few salmon tailor and the occasional flathead down around Preddy's wharf, with the run out tide having too much fresh and flood debris to make fishing a productive venture. The spur wall on the airport side could also be a place to prospect on the run in tide also.

It's going to be a tough week or so until the river starts to clean up some. Not much we can do but wait it out.

#### **Tuross River.**

The same can be said for Tuross this week, with large amounts of dirty fresh water making its way down the system from up in the mountains. Your best bet, will be to again fish deep during the run in tide, down towards the river mouth.

There is the chance at finding a flathead, salmon, tailor or even a mulloway down around the boat shed holes this weekend. Oily baits or even a live poddy mullet May tempts one of the above mentioned species to bite.

Time will be our friend, while we wait for the river to clear up.

#### Rock and beach.

These areas will be your best chance of finding a fish this weekend, with some XOS salmon patrolling the beaches this time of year. Metals cast and retrieved or a paternoster rig baited with a whole pilchard if you prefer a more sedate option. There have also been a few nice tailor along the beaches and headlands this week. If the rocks are your jam, please keep an eye on the swells, as they are forecast to build as the weekend progresses.

There will be some nice drummer available along the rock ledges this weekend, as their numbers build during their winter season. A loaf of white bread minced up as burley, cunjevoi or prawns as bait and you could be onto some nice drummer.

#### Offshore.

With 2m swells on Saturday increasing to 5m by Sunday night, offshore fishing may be a bit of a blow out this weekend. Having said that, we all know that the weather bureau have a habit of getting forecast wrong. Check before you head out this weekend if that is what you have planned.

Snapper and flathead are still on the cards for those that have been getting out, with some nice reds being found in as little as 10-15m of water.

I haven't had any news from the game boat crews, so I am unaware if the winter run of tuna have arrived yet.

Bait freezer is full, hawksbury prawns are back in stock which is great. Whitebait is still a no show, and I doubt we will see them again for a while. Our camping section upstairs is pretty well stoked, so if you are looking for something to make your winter camping and 4wd trips more comfortable, come in and check out the range. Stay safe everyone and remember, "Every day's a good for fishing..."
