Letter to the Editor

A letter to the Bay Post from Mr Malcolm Mason's (letter dated 28 June 2024), claims that the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital, now being built in Moruya, is in the wrong place. My response is as follows - Years ago, it was generally made known, and accepted, that major hospitals should be no further apart than two driving hours – it follows that the optimal location in this region for another hospital should be located at about half that driving time from others.

Moruya to Bega is 119kms or about 1hr30 min, Moruya to Nowra is 125kms or about 1hr54min and Moruya to Woden is 175km or 2hr24min. Halfway between Moruya and Bega is around Tilba, halfway between Moruya and Nowra is just south of Ulladulla and half way between Moruya and Woden is Braidwood.

These real numbers illustrate that the chosen site in Moruya is geographically, and if Mr Mason or other critics want to check, I'm reasonably confident, the population numbers would agree. Remember please that it will be a Regional Hospital servicing an area even larger than the Eurobodalla Shire.

How can we house families and essential workers like nurses and teachers in the current housing crisis? How can local government make a contribution to ensuring secure housing for all in our community, now and into the future?

The Eurobodalla Greens are holding an open forum online next week to discuss this critical issue and support residents to make a submission before the public exhibition period ends on 10th July. Current Councillor and Deputy Mayor Alison Worthington will host the forum, outlining Council's strategy and its implications for the types of housing that will be available in the Eurobodalla in years to come.

Colleen Turner, lead candidate for The Greens says "It's clear a purely market based approach isn't working. It's time for a different approach. We're hoping ideas will emerge in this forum.

The Greens believe secure housing for all is a basic human right and that Council can leverage its planning tools to get the housing mix right. If you want to understand the problems we're facing and contribute please join us next Wednesday evening."

"We'll be asking:

-Should council require that a proportion of all new medium density housing be allocated as affordable housing?

·How can we get the settings right so that higher density housing is done well, that it is disability accessible, and that it builds communities that encourage interaction and support among residents and businesses?

·Will the strategy set an expectation that all new dwellings are constructed in accordance with ecologically sustainable development principles and be climate positive and climate ready?

This is a critical issue and our local council has an important role to play."

A FREE life-saving test will soon be available to people aged 45 to 49.

Bowel cancer is Australia's second biggest cancer killer and around 15,500 Aussies are diagnosed with the disease every year. From 1 July 2024, 1.6 million Australians aged 45 to 49 will be able to join the Australian Government's National Bowel Cancer Screening Program.

People aged 50 to 74 will continue to receive a free bowel screening kit in the mail every two years.

Bowel cancer can develop without a family history of the disease and often without signs and symptoms. This free test can find traces of blood in your poo that may indicate the presence of cancer or pre-cancerous polyps. Catching it early is key. So do the test when you receive it in the mail or order one for free. And if you are aged 45 to 49, join the program by requesting your first kit from July 1 – it might just save your life.

From 1 July, People aged 45 to 49 can request their first bowel screening kit at www.ncsr.gov.au/boweltest, by calling 1800 627 701, or by talking to their doctor.



for emergency care

The community is being urged to contact Healthdirect for advice if they are experiencing non-life-threatening medical issues as influenza. COVID and RSV cases continue to rise placing significant pressure on NSW public hospital emergency departments (EDs) and NSW

Minister for Health, Ryan Park, said people who are unsure of where to get the help they need can call Healthdirect on 1800 022 222 to speak with a registered nurse about their condition or injury. When phoning Healthdirect, patients are triaged by a nurse who can then refer them to a GP, virtual or urgent care; a pharmacist or allied health professional; or provide guidance on how to care for their condition from home.

Healthdirect is available 24/7 and consultations are free for Medicare card holders.

Almost 180,000 people are expected to be able to avoid a trip to busy EDs each year with the \$171.4 million expansion of the services accessed via Healthdirect through the Single Front Door initiative announced in the 2024-25 NSW State Budget.

Health Minister Ryan Park has also reiterated that the best way to protect ourselves from serious illness and reduce the pressure on frontline healthcare workers this winter is to ensure you are up do date with your vaccinations.

Minister for Health Ryan Park said "Our EDs and NSW Ambulance are facing significant challenges right now due to the very high levels of presentations and calls. I want to acknowledge the exceptional efforts of our dedicated frontline healthcare staff in caring for the community at this extremely busy time for the public health system. "We can all play our part in supporting them by contacting Healthdirect if you need help but are not experiencing a life-threatening medical issue. We want the Healthdirect number to be as second nature as Triple 0 in NSW.

"The NSW Health Single Front Door, delivered by Healthdirect, is a critical initiative providing alternatives to emergency care. It is part of a broader range of measures the NSW Government is undertaking to connect people with the right care quickly and ease pressure on EDs.

"Our Urgent Care Services, which can be accessed through Healthdirect, provide an excellent alternative for people with health issues that are urgent, but not life threatening, to avoid attending a busy ED.

"I strongly encourage everyone, but particularly those at higher risk of severe disease, to get their influenza vaccination now. It is not too late to get vaccinated and by getting vaccinated you also help protect those around you."

People who are at higher risk of severe illness from influenza who are eligible for free vaccination include:

- people aged 65 years and over
- children aged six months to under five years
- Aboriginal people from six months of age
- pregnant women
- people with serious health conditions such as diabetes, cancer, immune disorders, severe asthma, kidney, heart, and lung disease.

Eurobodalla Hospital needs a big car park solar array

Hospitals are very big users of energy. Keeping energy costs down leaves more taxpayer funds for essential health services.

The best way to reduce the hospital's energy bill is to install a big solar array on site. Solar is the cheapest energy. The more power the hospital can capture itself, and the sooner it starts saving the better. More taxpayers money will be saved.

Another major benefit of solar would be increased resilience, through improving the performance of the emergency power supply and reducing diesel generator fuel use during power outages.

A number of new regional hospitals in NSW have installed large solar systems as part of new builds. This includes Maitland, Port Macquarie, and Wagga Wagga. The current plans for Moruya hospital include a 100kW solar array on the hospital building, which would only provide a percentage of daytime energy needs. The plans for the new regional hospital show generous parking areas which would be ideal for installing solar shade structures that would produce up to 1.5mW of power and have the added benefit of improving the comfort and security of staff and visitors to the hospital in hot or wet weather. Putting solar over the car park will not require modifications to the hospital buildings. The most cost effective time to install solar would be during the construction of the hospital. Retro fitting solar later would be considerably more expensive and disruptive to the operation of the hospital.

SHASA knows that the budget for the hospital construction is very tight. We are lobbying Southern Health to build a solar shaded car park during the construction period funded separately by either Federal, State Government, private investors or philanthropists and that we have identified a widely used privately funded model that can be used SHASA is working on a concept design and preliminary costing for a car park solar array.



Mayor proud of 'safe hands' budget

Mayor Mathew Hatcher says he's proud of the success of steps to address Eurobodalla Council's budget deficit, as councillors welcomed an improving financial outlook while approving the 2024-25 budget at June's Council meeting.

"By finding more efficiencies and taking a measured approach to service provision, we've managed to avoid those large Special Rate Variations we're seeing in neighbouring shires," Mayor Hatcher said.

"We've worked very hard to communicate our financial position and current and future work plans in different forums across the shire. This has been well received. People have been interested and understanding - it's very much about transparency and accountability. It feels good to be ending this Council term with a focus on financial stewardship while still delivering the services the community expects."

Mayor Hatcher said advocacy by Council had also played a role in recent State Government support for the shire - including a slice of both the \$200 million package for health-worker accommodation, assisting with an increased workforce to both build and staff the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital, and the \$253.7 million boost to the state's planning

"Advocacy works. Good relations with state and federal representatives are pivotal to a prosperous, liveable Eurobodalla," the Mayor said. "We've long been advocating around on-site nursing accommodation at the new hospital. Until now, there's been some pushback, so it's great to see our efforts have had an effect. Certainly any investment in housing and in streamlining the state's planning portal to reduce costs and timelags is very welcome."

The Mayor added that cancelling the water and sewer dividend to Council's general fund starting next year was further signal that councillors are doing all they can to get best value for the shire's ratepayers.

The Council budget was adopted alongside the 2024-25 Operational Plan, the Long Term Financial Plan 2024-34, Fees and Charges 2024-25, and rates information. Council's general manager Warwick Winn said there were reductions in some services but these were generally modest and a better reflection of the work Council could actually achieve. "We still have a strong focus on roads and footpaths, spending \$17.4M for 24-25, but by pushing out one urban road renewal and reducing annual urban road resealing from 35km to 30km, we save more than a quarter of a million dollars. By grading unsealed roads every nine months, rather than six, we save \$365,000. Often we only grade every 12 months in reality, and we will carefully monitor conditions.

"Similarly, sports fields and popular parks aside, we'll reduce mowing from a three-week to a four-week cycle, saving \$178,000. These figures better reflect the work staff can actually get done. It's the practical, prioritised approach we've taken across the entire organisation.

"The Mayor and councillors have shown strong guidance and leadership on the financial front, saving Eurobodalla ratepayers from the large rate increases facing our neighbours. They've made tough decisions and embraced a financial stewardship model that will see our Council living within its means and on a path to financial sustainability.'





Telstra upgrading coverage and connectivity at Beashel Hill

In March this year Telstra carried out an upgrade to its mobile base station at Beashel Hill by modernising the infrastructure to bring better 4G services to the community. The work also prepared the network for 5G coverage to be provided once the 3G network closes as planned in August 2024. Some further minor works are required on the network to complete the upgrade.

The Beashel Hill base station provides mobile coverage along the Princes Highway and surrounding area between Moruya and Bodalla. The works will require a series of temporary outages or reduction in mobile coverage.

These improvements will temporarily impact Telstra mobile coverage at various times from Monday 1 July to Wednesday 3 July 2024. Some customers may still receive overlapping coverage from other nearby mobile base stations.

Disruptions to the network of up to 8 hours per day will be experienced between 7am and 5pm on Monday 1 July and Tuesday 2 July 2024. A short disruption of up to 1 hour will also be experienced on Wednesday 3 July while commissioning works are undertaken.

If all goes according to plan and weather permitting the mobile upgrade will be completed on 3 July 2024.

Telstra mobile customers will receive text messages advising of the upcoming work.

Landline services, NBN internet services and mobile coverage from other providers will not be impacted. Any calls to Triple Zero from a Telstra mobile when the site is off air will automatically be diverted to any working mobile network for connection to emergency services.

Telstra Regional General Manager Chris Taylor said while our crews need to work during daylight for safety, we'll only be switching off the site when we need to and have it back on as quickly as possible.

"There's never a good time to undertake this sort of work but once it is completed, it will mean better mobile services for local residents," Mr Taylor said.

"As a company, we heavily invest in improving regional connectivity and this site is another example of our commitment. Over the past seven years to the end of FY23, Telstra invested \$11 billion in our mobile network nationally, with \$4 billion of this invested in our regional mobile network."

Tips for improving connectivity while works are underway

For mobile coverage in the interim, if residents have access to a Wi-Fi signal at home or at work, Telstra encourages residents to activate Wi-Fi calling. This is a free setting on most popular mobile phones and allows your mobile to use a Wi-Fi network to make and receive mobile calls. To find out more they can google <u>Telstra WiFi calling</u> or just search in your settings icon on your phone.

We know many businesses use the Telstra network for their EFTPOS terminals. However, Telstra does not operate the EFTPOS network; it is operated by financial institutions. Many EFTPOS terminals can also be connected using fixed line or Wi-Fi/nbn internet connections. Retailers should contact their bank for more information and details on how to switch between these methods to ensure continuous service.

Long term benefits of the site upgrade

The roll out of 5G connectivity for the first time in the area means customers with Telstra 5G mobile devices will be able to enjoy a better mobile experience. The upgrade also brings added benefits for customers on the Telstra 4G network with more capacity, providing better network connectivity and less congestion in peak times.

"We're continuing to expand our 5G network across location and nationally we're adding new sites to the network every week. Upgrades such as these continue to demonstrate Telstra's ongoing commitment to regional Australia," Chris said.

Once completed, the Beashel Hill base station will join more than 4,900 Telstra 5G sites on-air within selected areas of more than four hundred cities and towns across Australia. 85 per cent of all Australians now having the ability to access to the Telstra 5G network where they live.

For customers wishing to access 5G on the Telstra network, they will need a 5G capable device so for some people, that may mean upgrading their current device.

Australians urged to test mobile phone capability ahead of 3G switchover

Australians can now use a new free online tool to check if their mobile handset will be impacted by the upcoming 3G network switchover. The Australian Mobile Telecommunications Association (AMTA) tool allows consumers to enter their device's unique IMEI number to see if their handset will no longer have access Triple Zero after both Telstra and Optus plan to switchover to 4G and 5G from 1 September 2024.

The IMEI is a 15-digit serial number for mobile handsets. The new tool, and instruction on how to locate the IMEI, are available at www.3gclosure.com.au.

Customers will not be required to enter any personal information when using the tool. The Government is concerned about a sub-set of 4G enabled handsets that will continue to operate normally for voice, SMS and data after the switchover, but will default to 3G for Triple Zero calls because of manufacturer configuration. This may include older devices and devices purchased overseas. Industry estimates provided to the Government earlier this year suggested the number of

earlier this year suggested the number of impacted devices was around 740,000. Through the Working Group established by the Government, industry now estimates 283,000 devices will be impacted.

<u>Telstra</u> and <u>Optus</u> customers can already access an SMS tool to check if their mobile handset may be affected. Customers can text '3' to '3498' and the service will automatically respond with advice on whether or not their device is affected.

Telstra's 3G switch off has been delayed until 31 August 2024. Optus is planning to switch off its 3G network from 1 September 2024. TPG Telecom/Vodafone has already switched off its 3G network. Customers may still be relying on Telstra and Optus' 3G networks for Triple Zero and should not assume their device is unaffected.

Minister for Communications, the Hon Michelle Rowland MP said "The Albanese Government supports the 3G switchover, but it needs to be done in a safer way.

"All Australians should be aware that some 4G phones are configured by their manufacturer to default to 3G for Triple Zero calls. That means these devices will appear to work normally after the switchover, until Australians can least afford to realise there is an issue.

"This new industry tool is another useful way Australians can check to see if their device may be impacted.

"If you have been contacted by your mobile phone provider alerting you of impact to your service, it is important you respond and take action."

The judge Rob Evans commented "The open division was a difficult task with a large number of very good images. The top 21 images were then reviewed for a 'wow' factor from 1-5 based on envy that I hadn't taken them myself! The winner and runner up are the strongest images in a very, very strong field and combine excellent technique with an interesting and artistically presented image." Round two Youth division winner is Gemma Saarinen, with a fungi pic taken in Wyndham. Rob Evans the judge commented "Gemma's image has a clever composition based on focus, bokeh and depth that leads the viewer into the fungal world."

Refugee Action Collective Eurobodalla Trivia Night

We are an independent group but work co-operatively with other similar local groups around the country to focus on particular refugee issues. We are associated with Rural Australians for Refugees (RAR) and the Australian Refugee There has been terrific support from local businesses for our Trivia Night event:

The successful tenderers for the lease of **Mrs. Collett's Mungerarie farms** for three years were: - Mr. T. Berriman, "Home Farm"; Mr. R. Spinks, "Midlands"; Mr. J. Millikin, "Arranmore"; Mr. D. H. Lavis, "Oakover." The leasees take possession on 1st August next.

A very pretty wedding took place in the Sacred Heart Church on Monday when Miss Lillian Josephine, fifth daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. Ball, of Mullenderree, was married to Allen, third son of Mr. D. Innes, of Mullenderree. The bride was given away by her father, and was attended by her sister, Miss Lyla Ball. Mr. T. Ball acted as best man. ...

Coldest day on record yesterday, bleak winds from the snowy region prevailing.

The engagement is announced of Linda, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. Willcocks, of "Nettlewood," Narooma, to Dr. Leslie T. Jobbins, of Royal Prince Alfred Hospital, Camperdown, and son of Mr. and

Mrs. T. Jobbins, of Marrar. Another link connecting old Moruya with the present was severed on Tuesday, 24th inst., when one of the grand old pioneers, in the person of Mrs. Maria Russell, passed peacefully away at her residence at Wamban, surrounded by her devoted family. Mrs. Russell was born at Ballynahinch, County Galway, Ireland, on 13th May, 1833, thus she had attained the grand old age of 91 years. She was the daughter of Mr. Robert Wilson, of the Irish Constabulary, and of Mrs. Wilson (nee Elizabeth St. John.) In the year 1840, when seven years of age, she came to Australia with her parents, who settled at Broulee, Mr. Wilson having been appointed manager of the late Capt. Oldrey's estate.

Mr. Wilson and his son left Broulee in an open boat on their periodical trip to Moruya, but neither occupants nor boat was ever seen again, it being surmised that the boat foundered and those on board drowned.

After her marriage with Mr. Richard Russell (who predeceased her many years ago) the young couple went to live at the Burra, where Mr. Russell followed farming pursuits. Of the union there were seven children; four of whom predeceased the mother. After the death of her husband, Mrs. Russell moved to Kiora where she reared her large and highly respected family. ...She was a woman of magnificent physique, always enjoying excellent health, a remarkable feature of her life being that she never required medical attention until she was 81 years of age.

She leaves two sons, Messrs. Frank and Arthur, and one daughter, Miss Laura Russell who are left to mourn the loss of a devoted mother. She is survived by 22 grandchildren and 38 great-grandchildren. The remains were interred in the Methodist portion of the Kiora cemetery on Thursday.

Free Shane Warne Legacy heart checks in Gilmore

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips has a very personal reason for supporting the Shane Warne Legacy Heart Screen Programme which kicked off in Gilmore on Tuesday 25 June. Free heart screening is on offer for 20 days at locations in Nowra, Ulladulla and Batemans Bay.

Mrs Fiona Phillips said the program was close to her heart after her father, a Nowra dairy farmer, died of heart disease when she was just 21 years old.

"My dad was 54 when he died - the same age I am now. He never saw me marry, and his grandchildren didn't get to meet him," she said

Mrs Phillips said every sunrise and every sunset was "a reminder to be thankful for being alive".

"It's why I'm out early each day walking with my dogs, riding my bike and enjoying our great outdoors," she said.

"And, it's why I love our fresh local produce made with heart and soul from the South Coast community.

"I made a promise to myself long ago, to do everything possible to be around to see my children marry, and one day meet their kids too." Mrs Phillips said her dad's death was the reason she became the Co-Chair of the Parliamentary Friends of Rural and Regional Health, to help improve health outcomes for people in the Gilmore electorate and communities across rural and regional Australia.

"It's so important for Shane Warne Legacy Heart Screen program to reach into regional Australia, so people can get their heart health checked, and to spark that conversation with their health practitioner," she said.





Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips joined with MPs and stakeholders to launch the Novartis Cardiovascular Impact Model at Parliament House in February.

"Tragically, one Australian dies every 12 minutes from cardiovascular disease. We can change that.

"It might be too late for my dad, but if we can help save more lives across rural and regional Australia, then that is definitely worth it."

The Free Heart Screenings include a finger prick blood test measuring full cholesterol (Lipid Panel), a four-minute SiSU Health Check and a results discussion with a clinician including any follow-up actions or advice.

The consultation is quick and convenient with results immediately available including blood pressure, heart rate, body mass index (BMI), body fat percentage, cholesterol, lifestyle advice and diabetes risk.

Shane Warne Legacy CEO Helen Nolan said Shane would be "so proud of the awareness we are bringing to communities".

"Out of such a tragic event, we have discovered a silver lining. Through raising awareness of his passing, we are making a positive difference in people's lives," she said.

"The impact is astonishing and deeply moving for the team at the Legacy and his family. With 24% of people not having their blood pressure checked in over 12 months, it's crazy. 



As President of the St Cecilia Youth Music Scholarship committee, Jess Farrell is acutely aware of the need for this program to continue.

Farmers reminded to check wage changes

NSW Farmers is reminding employers that minimum award pay and superannuation rates will change from Monday, July 1. Employers with award-reliant employees were encouraged to review their staff pay rates to ensure they met the applicable minimum rates and conditions and had the relevant documentation in place for pay arrangements that deviate from the award terms.

As part of its Workplace Relations service to members, NSW Farmers publishes Rural Wage Guides for agriculture-related awards every year, so farmers can stay up-to-date on pay rates and impending changes in employment matters.

"Running a farm is no different to running any other business, it's important to stay up to date with these changes," NSW Farmers Workplace Relations spokesman Chris Stillard said.

"Our professional workplace relations team is available to support and guide members with any employment-related matters they have including pay-related matters.

"No matter what industry you're in, whether you've got one worker or 50, make sure you're prepared." The 2024 NSW Farmers Rural Wage Guides are now available for members, outlining the superannuation increase to 11.5 per cent and increases to minimum wage standards, among a range of other guidance.

Farm census an opportunity to keep NSW safe and protect livestock

170,000 farmers are being encouraged to report their livestock numbers and land use information to keep NSW safe and help the state respond to emergencies such as bushfires and biosecurity outbreaks. Local Land Services Acting CEO Rob Kelly said the 2024 Annual Land and Stock Return would build a statewide picture of agricultural land use and livestock across NSW.

"This information helps us in many ways, such as supporting land managers during disasters and if there was a biosecurity outbreak," Mr Kelly said.

"This ensures the NSW Government can quickly and accurately respond to priority incidents to keep this state safe while supporting farmers, their businesses and animals through challenging times. "It also helps us understand what land managers are using their properties for, with this information playing a role in shaping the services we deliver to support NSW farmers." The returns also help to:

- · protect the state's 'clean and green' reputation and environment against pests and diseases
- · monitor flocks and herds for emergency animal diseases
- · keep domestic and international markets open.

Mr Kelly said landholders without stock still needed to complete their returns to avoid unnecessary fees.

"It is important all land managers complete their form regardless of whether they carry livestock on their properties or not," he said. "The Animal Health and Meat Industry Levy is automatically applied to their next rates notice if they fail to complete their return.

"That is why we encourage all rural landholders to make time to complete their Annual Land and Stock Return."

Streamlining the process over recent years has made submitting Annual Land and Stock Returns even easier.

Submit returns online via

www.lls.nsw.gov.au/aslr or via the paper form, which can be returned via mail or to your nearest Local Land Services office.
The 2024 Annual Land and Stock Return portal opens 30 June 2024 and closes 31

Non-residential enrolment for local government elections

If you have the right to vote in federal or state elections, you also have the right to be enrolled as an elector at a local government election in the ward or council area you live in. When you enrol to vote, you will automatically be included on the residential roll for the ward or council area you live in. You must vote in local government elections in the ward or council area you live in.

You are eligible to vote as a non-resident in a ward or council area if you are:

- an owner of rateable land in the ward or council area
- ·an occupier or rate-paying lessee of rateable land in the ward or council area.

Non-residential rolls are prepared and certified by each council's general manager, and the NSW Electoral Commissioner must confirm that the voters listed are eligible for enrolment on the non-residential roll. However, you are responsible for checking that you are eligible for inclusion in the non-residential roll for a council or ward when you make an application. We recommend you get independent advice if you are unsure about whether you are eligible to apply or not.

You can apply to be included on the non-residential roll of another ward or council area by contacting the local council office or visiting their website.

You can only vote once within a council area, regardless of whether you are enrolled on the residential or non-residential roll. For example: you can only be enrolled to vote in one ward within a council area, even if you or your company own, occupy or lease rateable lands in more than one ward within that area you can only have one vote within a council area, even if you or your company own, occupy or lease multiple rateable lands within that area.

You can enrol in any number of council areas if you meet the criteria for inclusion on their non-residential roll.

Eligible corporations can enrol to vote on the non-residential roll for a ward or council area. A corporation is entitled to nominate a person to appear on the roll on behalf of the corporation.

Fee-Free Training to deliver almost 40,000 new apprentices and trainees

The Minns Labor Government will invest \$16.3 million to continue fee-free training for apprentices and trainees across the State, which will fund more than 20,000 new apprentices and 19,000 trainees. The investment covers student fees of up to \$2,000 for apprentices and up to \$1,000 for trainees, removing any up-front costs for those taking up apprenticeship and traineeship opportunities. This ensures that anyone who wants to access vocational training and education can afford to do so.

The program is critical to build a future workforce in areas such as carpentry, plumbing and electrical – all critical skills to the delivery of the NSW Government's housing supply strategy.

The most popular traineeships are also in highdemand areas such as early childhood education and care, aged care, disability care and other sectors of the economy such as retail, hospitality and administration.

Importantly, the program reduces administrative red tape and business costs for employers, and addresses cost of living pressures on our emerging skilled workforce, who are predominantly young people. The places will be available to all new apprentices and trainees starting their courses during the next financial year.

Additionally, the Minns Labor Government will invest \$190.2 million to undertake urgent repairs at TAFE NSW campuses across the State.

This will help to address chronic underfunding by the former government which resulted in dilapidated buildings, outdated digital devices, and unreliable Wi-Fi.

The new funding builds on a record \$300 million capital investment in last year's budget, which has gone towards building repairs and updating Wi-Fi systems at 28 of our regional campuses.
This investment sits alongside the joint Commonwealth and NSW Government Fee-Free TAFE initiative which has delivered over 156,000 enrolments in vocational education since April 2023. This announcement is part of the Minns Labor Government's commitment to addressing skills shortages in critical sectors, delivering apprentices and trainees across housing, construction, manufacturing, childcare, disability, and aged care. This is part of the Minns Labor Government's plan to build a better NSW.

Survey reveals what Sea Country means to Aboriginal Peoples

Working together to care for Sea Country
The recent <u>Connection to Sea Country – Aboriginal Peoples of Coastal NSW survey</u> has confirmed the crucial significance of Sea Country to cultural connections, and the social and emotional wellbeing of Aboriginal Peoples.

Aboriginal communities in 11 locations along the NSW coast were invited to complete a survey. This survey was co-designed with DPI and the Ipsos Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Research Unit and delivered by local Aboriginal people. Over 560 people were engaged across these locations to understand how important the coast, or Sea Country, is to them.

The answers highlighted that Aboriginal Peoples hold a deep sense of cultural and personal duty of care for Sea Country, expressing concerns about current and future environmental threats and impacts.

One community member revealed, "To be out on Country is very important to my quality of life. I have grown up on Sea Country my whole life, it is a part of who I am, it helps my health, mental health and wellbeing to stay culturally connected to mother earth and passing on knowledge to my kids through being able to take them out on Country."

The survey found factors impacting Aboriginal Peoples' cultural connections to Sea Country include habitat damage or loss, illegal activities, restricted access to culturally significant sites due to management practices, and climate change.

As one participant put it, "Climate change is ruining the environment for the next generations. This impacts on how we can teach the young ones about the environment".

Natalie Gollan, Senior Manager of Marine Estate - Monitoring and Evaluation-Community Wellbeing is part of the survey team. "This is the first time we have conducted a survey of this type. It was commissioned to better understand what connections to Sea Country means for Aboriginal Peoples of Coastal NSW and what we need to do to have a healthy, thriving Sea Country now, and for future generations," she said.

"We greatly appreciated the volume and depth of feedback we have received from the survey. This is just the start. We want to share the report findings and continue to work together, as we implement projects to protect Aboriginal cultural values as part of the Marine Estate Management Strategy."

Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

Moruya River.

With clear sky's and long cold night, little to no rain, the rivers are again running clean and clear. The clear waters of a cold winter, do make the fish super vigilant, as it is easier to be spotted in super clear water. Longer than normal leaders in lighter weights will be required to get the bite now. Reels with good quality drags are required when fishing lighter line classes to help protect those lighter setups. Scale your soft plastic or hard body lure presentation down in size, and slow your roll. The fish are not going to be active, so casting in the same spot repeatedly, before moving areas may be required to get a reactive bite.

Back of the hole in the wall, and the airport flats will all be good areas to try this time of year, be sure to work those drop off areas, as they provide an escape route to deeper water, particularly if there good weed beds for cover close by. Be warned though, going light does have its down sides also, especially if there are salmon in the area, which is highly likely this time of year. Patience and a good drag, are required to land bigger fish on lighter setups, but it can be done.

Tuross River.

The lower reaches of Tuross this time of year tend to the better areas to look at. There are some nice deep areas that are easily accessed from both land and by boat around the boat sheds area. These deeper hole provide good cover for any fish that are holding in these areas. You can expect to find flathead, bream, mulloway and the seasonal salmon and tailor. Vibes style lures are a seasonal favourite, as they are able to get to depth quickly, and do not require a lot of action to work. Small slow hops tend to work better this time of year. We have both the metal vibes and soft vibes for a more subtle option available. Come and check them out.

Rock and beach.

The beaches are where it is at this time of year. There are plenty of big salmon working up and own the coast this time of year. Once you happen to find a school, the action can be thick and fast, with a fish a cast fairly common. Pilchards on paternoster rigs and gang hooks is the preferred method when waiting for a school to move past your location. Metals cast and retrieved once the school is located is a great engaging way to fish for them also. You will find yourself at time chasing schools along the beach to keep them in casting range at times, so a 9' graphite rod and 4000-5000 size reel makes moving along the beach a much more comfortable experience.

There are also good numbers of drummer o along the rocky ledges this time of year. They are a cold water species, and now is the right time of year tackle a few pigs. A burley trail of mushed up bread and prawn shells, with a half peeled prawn or cunjvoie bait are a great starting point. Just be sure to hold on and get this fish turned guickly, or you will be donating lots of terminal tackle.

Offshore.

There have been 1 or 2 reports of southern blue fin tuna around. Look for the areas of colder water along a temperature break to try and find these fish.

The bread and butter snapper and flathead have also been available, now that the seas have calmed down after a turbid few weeks. The snapper will be be available from around the 10-15m mark with the flathead mixed in amongst them.




