Letter to the Editor

WELL PAINT ME GREEN AND CALL ME A PICKLE!

After 20 working days, ESC's Infrastructure Director has finally responded to a 'simple question' (MM Letter, 19 July):

That question being:

"Due to the release of the 2024 Roads to Recovery funding, with ESC allocated \$9,145,801 (a 43% increase), will council now reconsider the planned reduction in road maintenance for our shire?"

And ESC's response(21 July):

"The increase in funding is less than the amount removed from Council's future budgets to ensure Council is financially sustainable and our work programs achievable".

Mmmmmm, not so simple. I've poked that answer with a stick and flung it round the room a bit, but still can't make head nor tail of it.

The answer appears to be in the negative but the reason is baffling to say the least. Why such obfuscation? Clarification will be sought.

If Snowy Monaro Council did an 'about face' on their intention to reduce road maintenance, when they learnt of their 43% increase in funding, why has it had no impact on ESC's road maintenance program? After all, \$9,145,801 is no trifling amount, yet no mention of it has been made by ESC, and as predicted, no councillor has responded to a direct appeal to them for information.

The Federal Government's Road to Recovery funding is conditional, in that it can be, "spent only on projects which are identified in the works schedule submitted by the funding recipient," to the government.

Yet in answer to my query, "on which roads does council intend to spend this funding," the Infrastructure Director's response was,

"A list of these projects is not generally displayed on our website as the scheduling is subject to change due to weather and other factors."

Well, I didn't ask for a schedule, I just asked for a list of roads that would benefit from this increase in funding.

As this list has been submitted to Government, it would be a simple process to upload it to council's website or provide it to a ratepayer upon request.

After all, Mayor Hatcher and our General Manager Warwick Winn, continue to applaud council's performance as being open, transparent and accountable - a questionable assertion applicable only to selective issues, it seems.

It most certainly does not apply to the following request that has been made a number of times since 16th Feb. It has been deliberately ignored in all correspondence from council. The request being:

- * an explanation as to why Council does not comply with its Customer Service Charter which promises a response within 10 working days.
- * an explanation as to why advice supplied by the General Manager's office on 16th Feb is not being complied with. This advice being:

"The Executive Leadership team have had a conversation about overdue correspondence and ensuring our timeframes are met. Directors have also instructed their teams to advise community members if there will be delays to the response." (16th Feb, '24) "Staff are also now aware that anticipated delays require a timely acknowledgement with a revised timeframe for response."(26th Feb, '24).

For council to ignore its own Customer Service Charter, and for Management to issue assurances that it had no intention honouring, is a betrayal of trust impacting on the credibility and integrity of council.

Perhaps the Office of Local Government could provide answers that our General Manager and Councillors will not.

Country lifeline Rex goes into voluntary administration



To the concern of many regional communities, Regional Express Holdings (Rex Airlines) and a number of its subsidiaries have entered voluntary administration with hundreds of employees being terminated. Rex is the only commercial airline flying to the South Coast.

The company said "Regional Saab 340 flights are currently unaffected by the administration and will continue to operate. Prepaid ticket holders will continue to have their tickets honoured by the Rex Group on regional routes. The Rex Group has a long and proud history of servicing regional and remote communities across Australia. Domestic 737 services grounded with Virgin Australia offering impacted Rex passengers free of charge rebooking Flights between major airports have been cancelled, with the Rex Group's domestic fleet of Boeing 737 aircraft all grounded. Affected customers are being contacted directly by Rex. Virgin Australia has made an offer for Rex customers with an existing ticket on a flight cancelled due to the Administration process the opportunity to transfer their

Catherine King MP Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government said on Tuesday: "Rex is an important airline for regional and remote communities and Rex's continuation is in the best interests of regional Australians, the travelling public, its workers and the aviation sector.

ticket free of charge to the 13 overlapping Virgin Australia

services listed below."

The Government will work closely with the administrator to determine a path forward that ensures regional aviation has a strong future in this country.

In the short term, we have engaged with a number of airports to seek their continued support for Rex and I encourage all stakeholders, customers, and commercial partners to remain supportive as Rex works through this process.

This will obviously be a distressing time for employees of Rex and it is important the administrators provide timely advice to staff who have been affected.

Both Virgin and Qantas have said they will look into opportunities to support Rex workers affected by today's announcement" she said.

Premier Chris Minns was asked on Wednesday if taxpayers intervene to save Rex and should the Government consider and equity stake? The Premier said "The Government should consider it. Now we're happy to work with the Commonwealth Government in relation to this. The reason is really straightforward, and that is we've got regional communities that are dependent on Rex for hospital visits into Sydney to see family and friends in other states and territories and if it closes down and goes tomorrow then major regional economies like Dubbo and Orange and Wagga, communities that are actually thriving at the moment could have to suffer real damage.

So, we've seen federal government in particular intervene where there's been threats to QANTAS and other major carriers. This is a big threat. Now I'm hopeful that financing can come in particularly for the regional routes, and we're working closely with the Commonwealth Government to see what the next steps are but I don't think anything could be ruled out because the stakes are massive for regional New South Wales."

The United Servies Union General Secretary Graeme Kelly OAM said on Wednesday "The Albanese government must step in and cover the staff entitlements of Rex workers who have been told not only they will lose their jobs but that they will miss out on their legal entitlements, says the union which covers front line customer service staff, the United Services Union (USU).

Rex workers have been told they will miss out on legal entitlements by administrators despite the airline continuing to trade.

It's outrageous workers at the airline will miss out on even one dollar of their entitlements".

Eurobodalla Council said "The Moruya flight schedule remains unchanged.

Moruya Airport's passenger numbers are back at their highest since the pandemic. It's more important than ever we support the Moruya service so any review and restructure show the route remains a profitable one. Rex has previously indicated its desire to increase services to Moruya, showing a confidence in the route and its profitability.

The service is vital to our community for business, family connections and medical services, and we will keep advocating for and supporting it."

The airline advised: "Eligible Rex customers who wish to take up Virgin Australia's rebooking offer, must contact the Virgin Australia Guest Contact Centre on 13 67 89 or visit www.virginaustralia.com by Wednesday 14 August 2024.

Eligible customers will be re-accommodated on Virgin Australia flights as close as practicable to their original time of travel. Holders of affected tickets should not come to the airport until they have rebooked their flights. Rex and Virgin Australia are also exploring opportunities to support regional customers, which include Virgin Australia selling Rex's regional services through codeshare or interline arrangements, and making Velocity Frequent Flyer benefits available to Rex's regional customers

Better Business Practices for Eurobodalla Shire Council

Implementing sustainable business practices by Councils saves money for ratepayers. Our Council has been basically treading water in this area for the last four years and we have missed out on significant savings. We call on all candidates to commit to the following policies.

- 1. Include climate risk assessments (much like financial risk assessments) in the decision-making process of major investment and infrastructure decisions.
- 2. Follow the footsteps of Waverly Council, Lane Cove Council, City of Newcastle, City of Parramatta and more to alter your Development Control Plan (DCP) to require new developments (homes and businesses) to be all-electric with no gas and no wood fired heating.[4]
- 3. Encourage active transport by developing active transport plans including building and maintaining more and higher quality footpaths, bike paths, bike routes, walking routes, signage and connectivity.
- 4. Install electric vehicle chargers at public council facilities eg. libraries, swimming pools
- 5.Stop any new developments in high-risk areas affected by sea level rise, flood risk, or bushfire risk.
- 6. Plan to move critical infrastructure out of high-risk areas and improve resilience for infrastructure that can't be moved.
- 7. Transition all council vehicles, including garbage trucks, to electric.
- 8. Reduce long term Waste Management costs by:
- · implementing a Food and Garden Organics waste program (FOGO) to reduce landfill and methane before it becomes mandatory in 2030;
- · upgrading Council recycling shops at all locations so each one caters for the full range of customer's needs, including building materials; and
- · supporting the above initiatives with an ongoing program of ratepayer consultation and education.

Council candidates meeting Monday 29 July

Last Monday I attended the Eurobodalla Council's information session for prospective Councillor candidates. It consisted of a half hour powerpoint presentation by three senior staff members, with the final one being a large format overhead of Rudyard Kipling's militaristic, patriotic 1895 British Empire poem, "If". It consists of a list of attributes for a "son" of Empire including this curious sentiment:

'If you can make one heap of all your winnings And risk it on one turn of pitch and toss, And lose, and start again at your beginnings And never breathe a word about your loss' and concludes with:

'If you can fill the unforgiving minute
With sixty seconds worth of distance run,
Yours is the Earth and everything that's in it,
And—which is more—you'll be a Man, my son.'

The poem was highly recommended as a summary of attributes for a Councillor - and left on for the entire Q&A session by General Manager Warwick Winn. This was despite him being questioned as to its appropriateness due to its pompous assumptions of male leadership and the British ruling the Earth.

Some of us were surprised by his support of this poem as a recommended reading for Councillors. Anyone can see it is clearly out of date having been written as a response to the Boer War in the late 19th century. While it was particularly popular in Grammar schools in the good old days of the British Empire, they and the rest of the world have moved on. Perhaps it is time for Mr Winn to reconsider and find something more appropriate for today's prospective Councillors?

NSW EPA Investigating Allegations of Falsified Sample Results

The NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) is investigating environmental consultant Noel Child of N G Child & Associates, in relation to allegations of falsified sampling results in a number of environmental reports across NSW.

The EPA understands that part of Mr Child's role was to test potential development sites and then make environmental assessments for clients as part of development applications to local councils, including Eurobodalla.

"We seized more than 10,000 pieces of data and have finished reviewing 2,460 files and are investigating alleged falsified samples." Following a review of all available data, the EPA confirms that there are no immediate risks to public health and safety. The analysis revealed no history of contamination or exposure pathways that could affect people's health.

From this review, we have identified 135 different sites that have been the subject of alleged falsified reports. These include:

- ·24 early childhood education and care services
- ·18 residential properties
- ·8 industrial/ commercial sites
- ·1 school
- ·84 sites yet to be developed

Eurobodalla Council was informed by the EPA on Friday they are investigating the alleged falsifying of sampling results associated with environmental reports across NSW.

A spokesperson for ESC said "The EPA has asked Council to review records associated with these sites and associated development applications, and to satisfy itself of the likelihood of contamination risks. Council will review documentation around the development applications and discuss its findings with the EPA.

The EPA is very clear that from its preliminary investigation no immediate risk to public health and safety has been identified. The sites identified in Eurobodalla are not childcare centres." As a priority, the EPA has begun visiting the 24 childcare centres today to discuss the issues with the operators.

We are notifying all councils that may have relied on reports produced by Mr Child in approving development applications, and will continue to provide advice and support as they review their records for these sites.

Anyone who has engaged N G Child & Associates to undertake environmental assessments as part of a development application is encouraged to contact the EPA or their relevant local council for advice.

This incident is not related to the asbestos in mulch investigation.

We will endeavour to update our website with information at 10.30am and 5pm each day.

New public toilets popping up across the shire

ESC - Councillors received an update on the progress of the Public Toilet Strategy at July's Council meeting. The news of new toilets planned for Mogo was welcomed.

So far, Eurobodalla Council has assessed the condition and functionality of the shire's public toilets – 67 in total – and rated them in categories. Category one is considered 'excellent' through to category five being 'poor'. More than 60 percent were rated category four or five.

Toilet upgrades at North Broulee, NATA Oval Narooma and Malua Bay have been completed with South Broulee and South Head Moruya set to be finished soon.

New modular toilet block kits are rolling out; the first was installed at Brierleys Boat Ramp and Mosquito Bay and Lilli Pilli will follow.

Designs are being prepared and permits sought for new toilets at the John Street Reserve in Mogo CBD as well as Mogo Oval.

Eurobodalla Mayor Mathew Hatcher said Council will be building the John Street toilets this financial year, replacing the public toilets at the Tomakin Road, Princes Highway intersection.

"This is something the Mogo community has called for a long time; it will be great for locals and visitors to have better access to modern facilities in the centre of town."

"It's also exciting to hear Mogo Oval's toilets will complement the Mogo Trails main hub. New features like a mountain bike wash area, bubblers, an outdoor shower and larger toilets that can be used as changerooms will be excellent for mountain bikers and travellers."

Also included in Council's toilet strategy was the recruitment of a public amenities team. Over the past six months the team has actioned 81 callout requests from the community and fixed 169 defects in the shire's public toilets.

Mayor Hatcher said the community was already noticing a difference.

"It has been fantastic having a team who can prioritise urgent requests as they come in as well as address a backlog of issues like leaky taps and cisterns," Mayor Hatcher said.

"With a team on call around the clock, they're able to get to urgent jobs within an hour."

Recently, the team was called out to multiple acts of vandalism at Corrigans Beach and Clyde Street toilets.

"One toilet was blown to bits and another drenched in oil – an extreme act of pollution," Mayor Hatcher said.

"Unfortunately, toilet blocks seem to be commonly targeted by vandals; hopefully by beautifying them, they'll become more respected and appreciated."

Breastfeeding research collaboration launched

A new research collaboration between Southern NSW Local Health District (SNSWLHD) and the University of Wollongong exploring local breastfeeding outcomes has been launched to coincide with World Breastfeeding Week (1-7 August 2024).

SNSWLHD District Midwifery Manager Rebekah Bowman said the study will follow up with women who give birth at the District's five maternity units, when their baby is six months old to find out more about their breastfeeding journey.

"Currently, breastfeeding data is collected when the mother and baby are discharged from our service after birth," Ms Bowman said.

"By following the journeys of up to 1,200 women over the first six months of their baby's life, we will be able to better understand how to improve breastfeeding outcomes in our community.

"This valuable information will help us to enhance our support services and tailor them to meet the needs of women in our communities."

University of Wollongong Professor of Public Health and Deputy Director of Early Start, Lisa Smithers, said the University is a proud contributor to the study, which is funded by the Prevention Research Support Program (PRSP) at NSW

"Breastfeeding is one of the best investments in the early stages of a child's life. For some women, breastfeeding is challenging," Prof. Smithers said. "It takes time and practice for most mothers and babies to learn the skills needed. It's vital that our communities have support networks that empower mothers to breastfeed successfully."

"This study will provide valuable insights to improve local breastfeeding support and outcomes in southern NSW." The PRSP is a competitive funding program that invests in research infrastructure and innovation to support NSW organisations conducting prevention and early intervention research.

FCNSW fined \$360k for breaking bushfire harvesting rules

NSW ENVIRONMENT PROTECTION AUTHORITY

Forestry Corporation of NSW (FCNSW) has been fined \$360,000 for breaching conditions imposed by the NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) to help the recovery of the Yambulla State Forest, near Eden, after the Black Summer fires.

FCNSW plead guilty to two offences in the Land and Environment Court today after it failed to identify two environmentally significant areas on its operational map, resulting in 53 eucalypt trees being cut down in one of those areas.

These illegal harvesting activities were in breach of the Coastal Integrated Forestry Operations Approval and the Site-Specific Operating Conditions issued by the EPA after bushland on the South Coast of NSW was ravaged by the 2019/20 bushfires.

EPA Executive Director of Operations, Jason Gordon said breaching these conditions was totally unacceptable and welcomed the Court's conviction.

"These special conditions were introduced to protect parts of the forest that weren't as damaged by fire, giving wildlife and biodiversity an opportunity to recover.

"FCNSW contractors cut down a total of 53 eucalypt trees in an "unburned" environmentally significant area that was home to important shelters and food resources for local wildlife or native plants.

"FCNSW and its contractors have a responsibility to comply with the rules, and in this case, there was a failure to mark the area off-limits in the operational map used for harvesting operations," Mr Gordon said.

The Court found the harvesting operation caused substantial environmental harm and impacted the refuge of various native flora and fauna species. The Court also found the offending conduct potentially harmed the Dusky Woodswallow, Scarlet Robin and the Varied Sitella, being threatened bird species known to inhabit the area. FCNSW was ordered to pay the EPA's legal costs and publish details of the convictions in the Sydney Morning Herald, the Daily Telegraph and Merimbula News Weekly.



This team continually reviews, improve and automate processes to ensure better compliance. FCNSW employs highly skilled and professional staff. including ecologists and forest scientists, who are dedicated to the health and sustainability of our forests. 

received £400 insurance on the cheese and crates wrecked on the s.s. Bodalla and £380 on that wrecked on the s.s. Benandra.

Mr. J. A. Perkins, M.L.A., has been notified by the Dept. of Local Government that the sum of £1,250 has been made available from the State Main Roads Loan Vote, to the Eurobodalla Shire Council for the construction of a low level bridge across the Tuross River at Silo Hill Farm near Bodalla.

The Shire Council has commenced the work of re-forming the road near the Moruya Park on the Prince's Highway. Instead of breaking up the surface with picks, the road was ploughed from end to end, the operation being successfully carried out with the Shire's large plough and Messrs. W. Crapp's and J. Gibbon's team of fine draught horses. The ground was afterwards rolled. The metal and binding are now being brought in by the Shire's gang of men.

The dredge Antleon left on Wednesday for Narooma, where she is expected to remain for three weeks.

Although good work has been done in the Moruya River and at the crossing, the services of the dredge are required for many weeks yet to complete the work commenced, and we hope that now the vessel is in this vicinity the Shire and Progress Association will use their best endeavors to keep her in these parts for some time longer.





In this year of the international test of Democracy versus autocracy, something unexpected is happening – the good side has taken the lead.

At the beginning, prospects looked dreadful. Russia's murderous Vladimir Putin cleared the field of candidates by jailing the small fry and killing Alexei Navalny by unknown means in a far-off gulag. And Pretend Emperor Xi Jinping eliminated his opponents by charges of corruption as a legal system bent to his will.

"I am not saying they were faster swimmers back in the sixties and seventies,... I just reckon we held our own better. Take a look at the Olympic medal tallies. The likes of Dawn Fraser, Murray Rose and Shane Gould still dominate the top spots."

We had one called the 'Nutcracker' which is too painful to describe and another called the 'Jesus' where, after a massive run up, you tried to run across the pool. Now... my favourite was the 'Horsey'... you jumped face down with bent knees, a curled back and palms facing the water. On impact you straightened out the body to create the splash. If you got the timing wrong it could be pretty painful... in fact, more painful than the 'Nutcracker'."**

Know All Ron screwed his eyes.

"I'm confused, Bazza. How does bombing at the local pool translate to Australia winning so many swimming gold medals at the Olympics back in the sixties and seventies."

\$252 million boost set to deliver 1,300 new apprentices and trainees

The NSW Government is investing \$252.2 million to employ an additional 1,300 apprentices and trainees in the local government sector across the state, the largest state government investment in directly hiring new apprentices in recent memory. This investment will train up the next generation of skilled labour while keeping jobs within local councils, reversing the trend of councils outsourcing jobs to contractors.

The direct investment will go towards hiring new roles created by councils above their current workforce numbers with the new roles to focus on in-demand trades including electricians, plumbers, engineers, civil construction workers, mechanics, planning cadets and many more.

The investment will target trainees, apprentices and cadets making up 15 per cent of local council workforces and follows a number of studies undertaken by the Australian Local Government Association that identified the critical need to boost these workforce numbers.

Local government currently employs more than 50,000 people across the state's 128 councils and many trainees and apprentices who start their career at councils also go on to work in local industry.

With a shortage of skilled labour acting as a significant hand break on the development of new housing and infrastructure across NSW, this will play a key role in training up new apprentices and trainees that will build better communities. Councils are also currently experiencing declining workforce numbers with serious skill gaps and a large portion of experienced professionals who have worked in the sector for decades are also likely to retire within the next five years. Guidelines are being developed for councils with

Guidelines are being developed for councils with the first batch of apprentices and trainees to start their new careers early next year.

Sheriffs walk off the job over staffing crisis and poor pay

PSA - Sheriffs stopped work for two hours and protested outside Wollongong courthouse yesterday over a staffing crisis and poor pay. This action affected 18 courthouses across the Illawarra, Shoalhaven and adjacent districts including Port Kembla, Kiama, Albion Park, Nowra, Milton, Bateman's Bay, Moruya, Narooma, Bega, Eden, Bombala, Queanbeyan, Braidwood, Cooma, Yass, Crookwell, Goulburn and Moss Vale.

The strike action also affected 6 courthouses in Southern and South West Sydney including Campbelltown, Camden, Picton, Sutherland and Kogarah. The Office of the Sheriff has difficulty recruiting and retaining Sheriffs due to the poor pay.

While Sheriffs' duties have ballooned over the last decade their pay has failed to keep pace.

Sheriffs, (formally 'Sworn uniformed Sheriff's Officers'), both enforce the law and provide court security.

Sheriffs are a crucial part of law enforcement. They enforce orders issued by NSW Local, District and Supreme Courts, the High Court, the Federal Court and Family Court.

Sheriffs enforce writs, serve warrants and Property Seizure Orders issued under the Fines Act 1996.

Their security duties involve maintaining the security of court complexes, many of which have airport-style perimeter security and scanning to ensure the safety of judges, magistrates, lawyers and the public.

There are over 300 Sheriffs across the state attached to over 170 courthouses. Only 24 courthouses will be affected by today's action. Sheriffs have tried to play by the rules, said Stewart Little, General Secretary of the Public Service Association which represents Sheriffs, but they have just been ignored for over two years.

"In mid 2022 there was an agency restructure and the senior leadership of the Office of the Sheriff got a significant pay bump," said Mr Little.

"In 2023 there was a review of Sheriffs' pay but the report was never released under 'cabinet in confidence'.

'Sheriffs waited patiently, and were told the matter would be resolved in the 2024 budget, but when it was delivered in mid June nothing happened, and now they've been fobbed off again with some other made up bureaucratic process, so Sheriff's have just had enough.

"Sheriffs are highly trained in what is risky and stressful work.

"Sheriffs need a solid pay bump to reflect the dangerous work they do, when enforcing court orders they'll be entering people's properties wearing stab proof vests, carrying capsicum spray, batons and handcuffs. It's difficult work. "Sheriffs put their lives on the line in courthouses to make sure judges, lawyers and members of the public are safe from crooks and criminals, yet they are paid the same as people with desk jobs and administration roles at the courthouse, it's just not on," said Mr Little.

\$2 million recreational fishing program announced

The NSW Government has today announced a new \$2 million recreational fishing small infrastructure grants program, as well as the largest ever survey of NSW recreational fishing licence holders.

The grants program is part of the Government's plan to ensure more of the licence fees collected from recreational fishers is invested back into the small infrastructure that makes fishing accessible, safe and convenient.

In addition, the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) will undertake a statewide survey of recreational fishers to enable them to provide direct feedback on potential future investment from the Recreational Fishing Trusts who hold the licence fee income.

The NSW Government will provide greater support to the recreational fishing community by:

- · Making the grant applications processes clearer and simpler, so fishers and fishing clubs have the best opportunity to receive funding.
- · Demonstrating through the Recreational Fishing Trust's Annual Reports that the DPIRD and the Trust have reinvested license fees back into practical fishing initiatives.
- · Strengthening communications with all fishers and clubs so that they know when and how to apply for grants to improve their local areas.

\$2 million recreational fishing small infrastructure grants program

The new \$2 million recreational fishing small infrastructure grant program will make it easier for fishing clubs, community groups and other organisations to apply for funding for projects such as fishing platforms, fish cleaning tables and other fishing facilities. Eligibility criteria and funding guidelines for the new program will be developed over the coming months and will be included as part of the next Recreational Fishing Trust grants and funding round.

Applications for grants of up to \$200,000 will be open

Major survey of NSW recreational fishing licence holders

The Department survey will provide recreational fishers with greater input on the way fishing fees are spent while at the same time reinforcing the Government's commitment to the transparent and accountable management of public funds.

The survey will seek input from fishers on new initiatives for potential future investment, including current

- · Fish stocking and fish breeding
- · Fishing platforms and fish aggregation devices
- · Artificial reefs and habitat improvements
- · Education programs to teach young fishers about safe and responsible fishing.
- · Fishing regulation awareness

Minister for Agriculture Tara Moriarty said "I want to revamp the process to make it easier for grass roots fishers and fishing clubs to be able to fund the infrastructure they would like to see in their local area.

"The fees that fishers pay each year must continue to be used effectively to improve fishing for everyone.

"The fishing infrastructure grant fund will ensure more money gets to grassroots recreational fishing groups.

"I understand that many of the small fishing groups and clubs might struggle to provide all the information needed to successfully get money from the Trust. I want to make it easier for grant applications to be successful.

"The survey is an important way for the Government to understand how recreational fishers would like to see licence fees spent."

Local Labor Member for Bega, Dr Michael Holland said:

"I commend the Minister for Agriculture and the Minns Labor Government for their commitment to the recreational fishing sector.

"I look forward to the \$2 million small fishing infrastructure grant program and the Government's interest in our recreational fishing licence holders' opinions on current programs and future investments.

"Recreational fishing is an important part of our local culture and attracts thousands of visitors to this beautiful electorate.

"It contributes significantly to the health and economy of the Bega electorate."

New boating program to support safer and more accessible waterways

Much-needed boating infrastructure and dredging works will be delivered across NSW, with a \$44 million funding boost from the NSW Government to improve safety and accessibility for all water users.

The new Boating Infrastructure and Dredging Scheme was announced today by NSW Transport Minister Jo Haylen at the Sydney International Boat Show. The program will allocate \$28 million towards public boating amenities over four years and \$16 million for dredging at key locations along the NSW coast.

The scheme consists of infrastructure and dredging sub-programs:

- · Boating Infrastructure for Communities this grants program will target improved access for older boaters and boaters with a disability.
- · Boating Infrastructure Maintenance a grants program providing funding for minor repair and maintenance works on boating infrastructure owned by councils and community groups across NSW.
- · Boating Infrastructure Emergency Repair Scheme funding support to repair and replace assets impacted by natural disasters and severe weather
- · Dredging Program funding to deliver new dredging projects at priority sites critical to boating and safe waterway navigation, as well as continuing committed dredging projects at Swansea, Myall River, Ettalong and Coffs Harbour.

Registrations of interest for the grants programs will be open later this year, with successful applicants to be announced in 2025.

The funding boost improves upon the previous Boating Now program, following an independent review completed in September 2023, which heard from the boating community on a wide range of matters.

Transport for NSW Maritime, in partnership with Marine Rescue, NSW Police and the Boating Industry Association, have committed to working towards a target of zero deaths and serious injuries on NSW Waterways by 2056. Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report Moruya River.

Not a lot has changed this week. The fishing continues to be slow throughout the Moruya system. The lower reaches of the river will be your best chance at finding either a flathead over the warming flats, or the salmon that have made them selves at home this winter.

The wall along the front of the hole in the wall, should also be holding a bream, trevally or Luderick for those either in a boat or willing to walk out along that section of wall.

The rest of the river is fishing hard at the moment, just waiting for some warm waters to start pushing in.

Tuross river.

Big seas this week, 4.5m at their peak, have seen some new water push into Coila lake over the sand bar at the entrance. This will help spark fish activity in the lake, as there is nothing like some clean salt water coming into a land locked lake.

There should be a few nice black bream and flathead around the entrance area this weekend.

The Tuross system itself, is much the same this week, with slow winter conditions being the predominant factor. As started last week, the muddy bottomed lakes that Tuross has in areas are still holding a few nice preseason flathead. While the rest of the system is still pretty quiet.

Rock and beach.

With the aforementioned big seas finally starting to drop, the salmon activity on the beaches and rock ledges should increase this weekend. It really will be a case of finding out on which beaches they are holding. Get out and explore the local area to try and find the fish.

Offshore.

This past weeks big seas have kept most people's oat on trailers this week, and as such I don't have much to report. The snapper do like a big swell to stir things up, so we should expect to see some good fish landed this

The bait freezer is ok at the moment. I am out of salted pilchards at this time. Fingers crossed a tweed have more when they come through next week.

We have the brand new release on the Shimano Vanford 2500 & C3000 in stock as of today, with the rest of the range to be released over the next few months. As a result, we are clearing out the old models at 30% off RRP. Come in and check them both out as stock is limited on both old and new models.

We also have some limited release Shimano Sophia Squid jigs that are surplus JDM only issue colours. These won't last long and are very nice.



Beginner kayaking for over 50's with RegionX

A kayak school on the pristine NSW Eurobodalla Coast proves age is just a number when it comes to enjoying an adventurous life.

Region X, based at Mossy Point, is running a kayak school that is specifically designed for grandmas, grandpas and those of a more, shall we say, mature persuasion. And it's anything but run of the mill. They're taking beginners onto the water and out of their comfort zones. Zipping them into life vests and showing them what their bodies and minds are capable of. And ultimately challenging the perceptions around what growing older should look like.

Mossy Point's Tomaga River, literally lapping at the doorstep of the Region X headquarters is where lesson 1 kicks off, the program then visits lesser known waterways for the following 5 sessions. Mossy Point is beautiful, locals sit around in BYO camping chairs, drinking coffee, and chatting. Huge, steel-grey smooth rays patrol the water's edge, unworried by the local dogs bouncing around them, waiting for the scraps as the fisherman clean their haul.

An unexpected lesson

When I arrive, David Decorte, in his wide brim hat and sunglasses looking every bit the guide that he is, asks, "Have you got 10 minutes to actually go through a little program? We'll put you in a lifejacket and out on the water?" It seemed an innocent enough question and so I nodded, pretending that I was game for anything when I was most certainly not game for anything. Around me, a dozen or so people milled about smiling and chatting, their faces flushed, their eyes sparkling. They'd all just completed their first two-hour lesson and not only seemed to have survived but were buzzing from the experience.

I scanned his face for a reaction as I sheepishly asked, "Which end of the kayak is the front? Is it the pointy end?" If he was having second thoughts, he didn't show it. And so, I sat with a thump and a wobble on the sit-on-top kayak, all the while practicing some deep-breathing so I wouldn't drop everything and run in the opposite direction. I kept one eye on those who had just finished their lesson, as they grabbed coffees and each other's details.

Honestly, they just didn't look like the kind of people I had expected to find at a program aimed at seniors. They appeared fearless or at least happy to face their fears head on. They clearly were keen to try new things. They did not look 'old'. At least, not in the way I had thought older people looked. There was some grey hair, sure. One or two wrinkles. But there were no hobbled bodies. No walkers or canes tucked off to the side. No one was hunched over, clutching at their backs. In fact, they all looked a hell of a lot healthier than I did. Turns out, I had a bit of perception problem. Not only of what I thought aging looked like, but also how it feels and how it affects the things you can do.

Programmed for success

The Young at Heart program was the brainchild of guide and Operations Manager, Garran Carnall, he does love an outdoor activity, and aside from guiding with Region X, he's been both a scuba and mountain bike instructor. Based in the Eurobodalla, he spends much of his time soaking in the local flora and fauna and learning about the history of the region. But he noticed that there was a whole segment of the local population who just weren't taking advantage of the area or their time. He says, "I was sitting around in a cafe with my mum and dad and I was watching all of these senior, retired people and I was going, 'They're not doing anything. They need to get out."

And by 'get out', Garran means, go all out. This is a course entailing six two-to-three-hour lessons, that takes folks in their 50s, 60s and older, most of them kayak novices, and teaches them not just the basics so that they can go on a leisurely paddle and explore the local region, but that has them creating makeshift sails from tarps, performing rescue drills and managing some seriously challenging weather. No cancelled classes for choppy weather here. What really stands out for 67-year-old Sherryn Bellis, is the rescue drills. "We learnt how to save others in distress, how to get back into our kayak if we fell out. This involved being tipped out in the middle of the river" she says. "It also made us realise we are stronger than we think we are and can do things we all thought were beyond us." "Everybody needed to know what it is like to have to rescue themselves or rescue others," Garran explains. "The rescue day was a huge day, and it wasn't easy for everyone, but everyone was happy that they got to do it and learn some valuable skills. As to why he'd create such an intensive course, it makes sense when you learn a bit more about the people who raised him. His dad

you learn a bit more about the people who raised him. His dad already paddles a kayak, and Garran says his mum was part of the inspiration for the program. "I taught my mum to scuba dive at the age of 60 and she's a left leg amputee. And she's been to places where she's gone through shipwrecks, caves and she just paddles through. She's done some amazing trips and that's what gave me the idea to say, you can do this, doesn't matter what age you are. You can get out there and do some really cool stuff."

Age shall not weary them

While the idea of doing cool stuff sounds good, bodies, even very healthy bodies, do slow down with age. There's the expected aches and pains and injuries acquired over the years. Garran says the low impact nature of the sport and the ability to choose your location makes it a sport for everybody, literally. "Doesn't matter if you've got a disability or not, you can paddle. Or you can go out and be with someone who can paddle. It's inclusive for everybody."
