Government strengthens aviation competition at Sydney Airport

Following Rex Airlines going into voluntary administration, the Federal Government will strengthen competitive settings through an open approach to market for the Sydney Airport Slot Manager, as part of overarching reforms to the slot system at Sydney Airport.

The competitive tender to be released on Monday 5 August will require prospective slot managers to demonstrate how they will deliver on the Government reforms announced earlier this year, following recommendations from the Harris Review and the ACCC. The competitive process will also require prospective tenderers to demonstrate how they manage and mitigate conflicts of interest in a transparent way. Once appointed, they will need to comply with a statement of expectations including governance and transparency requirements. This is part of a suite of reforms to the Sydney Airport slot system which were announced in February. The Government has already implemented a number of these commitments including an independent audit of slot usage, with results to be released once completed; and has re-established the Compliance Committee for Sydney Airport that manages compliance with the slot regime.

Supporting South Coast Bus Travellers

Following advocacy by Member for the South Coast, Liza Butler, bus concession fares for regional coach services on the state's north and south coasts will continue as the NSW Government investigates long-term transport options for the community.

Eligible concession holders will continue to access \$2.50 Regional Excursion Daily fares on the Nowra Coaches Eden to Bomaderry and Lismore to Tweed Heads routes. At the same time, Transport for NSW will undertake longer term planning work to ensure affordable and accessible transport options continue to be available on the far north and south coast region of NSW well into the future. The NSW Government inherited a complex web of bespoke regional bus contracts from the former Liberal National Government. In mid-2021 Nowra Coaches signed a three-year extension on the concession arrangement: however, the former Government provided no option for extension or plan for the future of this scheme.

Consequently, fares could have ballooned from \$2.50 to over \$65.

Once this issue was brought to her attention Liza Butler stepped in on behalf of her community and requested an urgent meeting with the Minister for Regional Transport and Roads, Jenny Aitchison to secure a solution.

The Member for the South Coast, wrote to and had multiple meetings with the Minister, as well as raising the issue on the floor of parliament. The Minister, who shares Liza's commitment to accessible and affordable transport in regional communities then directed Transport for NSW to find a solution.

Member for the South Coast, Liza Butler said "I'm thrilled we have been able to deliver a solution and thank the Minister for her support in ensuring the South Coast community is not short changed.

The short film LOST, co-written and co-directed by Jane Gordon (Tanja) and Warren Foster Snr (Wallaga Lake) had its first cast, crew and community screening on Thursday 8 August with a full house at the Narooma Kinema.

Produced, cast ,shot and post-produced in 2023 on Djiringanj land on Yuin country on the Far South Coast of NSW Jane (Tanja) and Warren (Wallaga Lake) have been working on LOST as part of a slate of projects that brings together indigenous and nonindigenous Far South Coast creatives and community to tell stories of the region.

Set on a regional location on the Far South Coast of NSW, the film tells the story of two families, one indigenous and the other non-indigenous, whose two boys go missing on an adventure. LOST was preceded by one of Warren's previous short films, a documentary called "Bunaan" and with "Home Stretch-Walawaani" and "Our Way", two music videos from Yuin choir Djinama Yilaga.

The films were followed by a Q&A with the Writer-Directors and Cast.

Co-Writer/Director Jane Gordon said "I couldn't have been more pleased with last night's screening. It was the final birthing of a collaborative, shared vision by Warren and I to make a film that spoke of Listening and Learning from each other to move forward as one into the future."

"It was incredible to experience the excitement of this film coming to fruition and feel the energy of support from the community. "

"Having been in a fairly isolated position working through the post-production it was just extraordinary to share this moment with a full house in the cinema" said Jane.

"We can't thank the community and the Narooma Kinema enough for supporting us last night. It was so amazing for us to hear and feel the response of the audience and know that our message came across loud and clear with cries from the audience that this film needs to be screened in schools throughout Australia, to promote healing and unity." Warren Foster Snr said "The reason why we came up with this film concept is to help people's awareness and to bring two cultures that wouldn't normally mingle together. The film brings two families and two cultures together.

I think it's important to direct this film because it's important getting our stories out and connecting with people in that way. We can tell our own stories and write them but it's important to actually direct and make the film with our stories in it - then we can control the story that ends up being told."

LOST is the first of Jane and Warren's ideas to be realised for the screen - A second short film, BUSKER, will be going into development/preproduction this year with many of the locations set in the Bega Valley.

Don't wait to nominate

Candidate nominations open for 2024 NSW Local Government elections

Prospective candidates should start lodging their nominations for the upcoming 2024 NSW Local Government elections now.

Nomination is the process by which candidates have their name included on ballot papers. Nominations can be lodged from today with the NSW Electoral Commission and must be lodged by 12 noon on Wednesday, 14 August.

Successfully nominated candidates will be published progressively on the NSW Electoral Commission website from Thursday, 8 August. A final list of candidates, in ballot paper order will not be available until after the ballot paper draws on Thursday, 15 August.

Acting NSW Electoral Commissioner Dr Matthew Phillips said late nominations and amendments are not permitted under legislation.

"This means no changes to nominations or new lodgements can be accepted after 12 noon on Wednesday 14 August."

"Candidates should lodge their nomination early so there's time for our team to check whether their paperwork is in order. By lodging well before the deadline, there's time for candidates to correct any errors identified and still meet the nomination requirements."

"Support is available to prospective candidates through webinars, drop-in sessions, online resources and FAQs on our website," he said

Dr Phillips emphasised nominations are a separate process from registering as a candidate for electoral funding purposes. "Registration for electoral funding does not get a candidate's name on the ballot paper – only a valid nomination by 12 noon on Wednesday 14 August 2024 does that."

"But candidates must still be registered with the NSW Electoral Commission before accepting political donations or making payments for Electoral expenditure."

"After candidates are nominated on 15 August, all nominated candidates who have not already registered will be deemed registered to accept donations and pay for their campaigns." "I encourage anyone with questions about the process of nominating as a candidate in the upcoming elections to visit our website."


Help Save Big Spotty - Campaign to save 500 year old tree

Big Spotty is a giant spotted gum - Dharraani (in Dhurga) 72 m tall, approx 12 m round at base, estimated 500 years old - located in State Forest near Termeil on the NSW South Coast. At any time, the compartment can be subject to native forest logging. Big Spotty lives in the Brooman State Forest and has done so for over 500 years.

Andrew Kaineder is asking for support to make a film which will answer all the questions about state forest logging practices and to show the damage that is being done to not only the beautiful forests of the South Coast, but the rest of NSW and Australia and why it's important to stop logging right now!

"We live on the doorstep of Big Spotty, Brooman Forest and other forests that are at risk of logging" he said. "Basically in the next 6-18 months, 80% of the forest around the tree will be harvested by NSW forestry for mostly woodchips to make throw away products like paper and cardboard. Old Blotchy had a similar fate, until the local community campaigned to save it in 2005 and the area was transitioned to Murramarang National Park, protected the tree and its friends forever. Big Spotty, a global icon, needs the same protection."

Communities and businesses to benefit from better regional development legislation

The State Government has introduced legislation into Parliament to enact a new and better approach to delivering sustainable and impactful investment in regional NSW.

Amendments to the Regional Development Act 2004, will modernise the legislation to broaden the type of investments that can be made to ensure regional communities' needs are met and local businesses and organisations gain the benefits.

The NSW Government's regional investments will be made where they are needed most and in projects that make the biggest difference to our regional communities.

These measures will help restore public confidence in regional investment, which was eroded by the former Government's pork barrelling, haphazard actions and floundering projects.

The amendments to the Act follow on from the Government's establishment of the \$400 million Regional Development Trust and the recent renewal of the old Department of Regional NSW to the more focused and dynamic Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.

Over the past year the Premier and Minister for Regional NSW conducted a series of roundtables across NSW including in Broken Hill, Bega, Casino and Wagga Wagga to hear first-hand from more than 200 industry, community, Aboriginal and local government representatives about their needs.

The Bill tabled by the Government before the House addresses that feedback in four key ways:

updating the objects of the Act to reflect the needs and expectations of contemporary regional NSW

•broadening the types of financial assistance available under the Act •inserting new governance and reporting provisions to strengthen accountability and transparency, and

-mandating that a Regional Development Advisory Council must be in place to provide independent advice to Government and the Minister on regional economic development. Over the past 20 years rural and regional communities have changed - with families and young people moving from metro to regional centres, the diversification of regional and primary industries, and the transition to renewable energy. The focus areas for investment under the Regional Development Trust are:

·sustainable regional industries

•community connection and capacity building •improving regional service delivery

Aboriginal economic development and enterprise The NSW Government has started investing through the Regional Development Trust with \$35 million dollars announced for rural and remote airstrip upgrades, low interest loans for emerging food and beverage businesses, childcare in western NSW and Aboriginal economic development. NSW Minister for Regional New South Wales Tara Moriarty said "Our Government has heard directly from the residents of regional NSW and turned their ideas and needs into tangible investment outcomes for communities."

"Consultation feedback demonstrated that the ageing Act's narrow focus did not align with our communities' expectations around regional development today.

"Under this new approach, regional investment will be made where it is needed most and in projects that make the biggest difference to our regional communities.

"The Government's Regional Development Trust is a funding source for initiatives that align with the amended legislative framework, and this Bill is critical to ensuring it is effectively administered as we progress our efforts."

State's women urged to have their say as part of inaugural survey launched by CWA of NSW

The Country Women's Association (CWA) of NSW wants to gauge the opinions of women across the state on everything from health and childcare to telecommunications and crime, launching a wideranging survey that it intends on conducting annually.

The CWA of NSW Annual Women's Survey was launched last week, and is open to women in communities across the state, not only Association members.

"As the peak women's organisation in the state, we take our advocacy role and responsibilities very seriously so we're always striving to know what women think on certain issues impacting rural and regional communities, and where their specific concerns lie," said CWA of NSW President Joy Beames.

"This is the first time we've gone out with a survey of this scale, and aimed at all women across the state, whether they're association members or not. We want to hear from women everywhere, in an effort to ensure we're capturing the opinions of women of all ages, from all parts of the state, from different cultural and socio-economic backgrounds."

Joy said the survey was designed to provide valuable insights to help guide the association's future initiatives, actions and advocacy, with a focus on collecting demographic data to better understand respondents; insights into member preferences and needs related to association services and activities; understanding local challenges, opportunities, and priorities for women as perceived by both member and non-member respondents; and encouraging suggestions of actions and initiatives the association could undertake to address women's needs.

09-08-1924

Mr. and Mrs. Harold Harper were driving towards Tilba in a sulky on Monday, when the horse shied and took the vehicle down a steep bank. One of Mrs. Harper's arms was badly broken, and she was taken to Narooma, where the Doctor recommended her removal to Sydney.

Postmaster Higgs expects "joy" to reign supreme whilst alterations are being made to the local Post Office. The continuity of the telephone services will no doubt be broken for a short time, as the switch board will have to be removed from one part of the building to another.

The "Flower Afternoon" on Thursday, organised by Mrs. E. Hawdon, jnr., on behalf of the Refreshment Stall at the forthcoming C.E. Carnival, was a most successful and pleasant one. The spacious rooms at "Beverley" were tastefully adorned with Flora's choicest blooms, and the happy gathering spent an interesting time in guessing the many floral representations as worn by each guest. The prize- a box of chocolates- was eventually won by Mrs. Starr. The hostess presided over tables laden with recherche refreshments.

The secretaries have asked us to remind the ladies to take along refreshments to the hospital ball euchre party on Tuesday night next. **Mr. P. Lennard,** of the Bodalla Arms Hotel, is suffering from a nervous breakdown, but latest reports state that the patient is now a little better.

Mr. Fred Ryan was removing girders near the wharf on Thursday, when he had the misfortune to have one of his fingers crushed off near the first joint, through getting it jammed.

Beverley was on cnr Evans Murray St Moruya

Bateman's Bay. (From our Correspondent) The Bay footballers suffered their first defeat in the competition when Bodalla beat them by 7 to 5 on Saturday on the Bodalla ground. The match was one of the most interesting in the whole competition."Snowy" Ison received a nasty kick on the back of his leg and was "hobbling" about for a few days, but is now much improved. A meeting was held on Monday night to decide what form the annual effort in aid of Moruya Hospital should take. It was decided to send out lists.

In the political game, as in most others, timing is everything. Sadly, Anthony Albanese is out of tune with the times. He is a nice guy when nice guys come last, and though it pains me to say it, he also appears to lack the courage of his own convictions. I would be very surprised if he survived as Prime Minister long enough to lead Labor to the 2025 election.

He reminds me of Harold Holt with whom I was on brief chatting terms as a journo in The Age bureau and then as press secretary to John 'Black Jack' McEwen. Holt was also a good bloke and a kindly Prime Minister, but by the time he took that fateful swim Gough Whitlam had his measure in the House and Billy McMahon was undermining his leadership with a rapscallion bunch including his successor, John Gorton.

Holt had postponed his own leadership ambitions allowing Menzies to rule the roost for far too long, both for the country and the great man himself. Harold copped it sweet, just as Albanese tamely accepted the Caucus factional vote for Bill Shorten that overruled the 60/40 vote in Albo's favour by the Party membership. Holt was bluffed by Liberal tradition, Albanese as a Leftie bowed to the hammering he'd copped throughout his political life from the NSW Right led by Paul Keating and Graham Richardson.

His tendency to duck, weave and wait rather than to counterattack the opposition extends to the man Malcolm Turnbull labelled a 'Thug'. Amazingly, against all the odds, this has allowed Peter Dutton to raise his public profile to the point where the electorate sees him as a viable candidate for The Lodge.

The recent reshuffle of the Ministry only highlighted the 'good guy' weakness of the current occupant. The pattern began with his instant acceptance of Scott Morrison's lunatic AUKUS idea with the British half-wit, Boris Johnson and doddering Joe Biden who couldn't remember Morrison's name at its inauguration. The idea that three nuclear-powered submarines arriving sometime beyond 2040 somehow makes Australia safe from those fearsome 'Yellow Hordes' of yesteryear is simply laughable. And they come at a price that could have provided universal free health care – and early education - for all Australians

It not only robs the taxpayer, it undermines Albanese's own China policy to engage and cooperate, 'agreeing where we can, disagreeing where we must and managing our differences wisely'. Instead, he is promoting the bellicose Defence Minister Richard Marles who demands to be addressed as 'Deputy Prime Minister' and would guite like to drop the 'Deputy' bit.

The reshuffle further underlined his weakness by sacrificing the vigorous and effective Clare O'Neill and leaving the hapless Andrew Giles to cop the slings and arrows that should have been redirected at Dutton himself. Moreover, by dumping the Republic Ministry and then abandoning his commitment to a major Aboriginal advancement, he abandoned the precious field of Labor reforms and double-crossed his most energetic supporters.

As we approach the final sittings of Parliament – the notorious 'killing season' of political leaders - the Labor factions, I'm told, are already abuzz with leadership chatter.

The saddest aspect of the imbroglio is that Albanese brought it upon himself. He is a good man, but they are self-inflicted political wounds. He cannot change the past; and it's probably too risky for him to call an early election. Timing in politics is remorseless; and it's a mighty tough game.

A Beer with Bazz # 161 With John Longhurst

Bazza wended his way through a packed front bar with patrons swapping Olympic Games expertise quicker than stockbrokers making trades on the floor in a bull market.

One group focused on the athletics and technical language punctuated the conversation with 'bell laps', 'false starts', 'splits', 'staggered starts' and 'throwing circles'. One patron's clumsy reenactment, with self commentary, of Matthew Denny's discus throw to claim a bronze medal, left Bazza smiling.

Gathered beneath endless replays of the Olympic swimming finals on the television, another group paid homage to 'dolphin kicks', 'drag suits', 'gravity waves', negative splits', 'latex suits' and 'warm down pools'.

Other patrons had watery eyes as they experienced a Cathy Freeman Moment (CFM) on replays of Jessica Fox not only winning two gold medals in the kayak but also jumping in the water to celebrate her younger sister, Neomie's win in the Women's Slalom KX-1.

Moruya Mail Blue Plaque honours Sydney Harbour Bridge's 'Godmother'



One of Sydney's unsung forces Kathleen Muriel Butler (1891–1972), has been honoured today, with the unveiling of a prestigious Heritage NSW Blue Plaque at the Chief Secretary's Building on Macquarie Street, where she spent much of her working life with the Department of Public Works.

While her official job title was Confidential Secretary to Chief Engineer John JC Bradfield, Ms Butler, known as the 'Godmother of the Sydney Harbour Bridge', was respected for her great aptitude for organisation, mathematics, stenography and contract management.

Ahead of her time, Butler forged a path for women in engineering and STEM, leaving an enduring legacy as the Sydney Harbour Bridge's de facto project manager, tender manager, negotiator and publicist.

Heritage NSW Executive Director Sam Kidman said the plaque was a fitting honour for Kathleen Butler's extraordinary life.

'Kathleen Butler's achievements are remarkable and unveiling this plaque in her honour is a wonderful moment for her descendants, some of whom attended this occasion in person today,' Mr Kidman said.

The Chief Secretary's Building is part of the Macquarie Street East precinct, which forms the crossroads of Sydney's cultural and civic spine and contains a collection of some of Australia's most significant institutions and heritage buildings.

'The installation of each Blue Plaque brings interest to the heritage of an area, educating people about the history of our communities. We are delighted to work with Heritage NSW to unveil this new Blue Plaque in honour of Kathleen Butler, a trailblazing engineering icon who left a stunning impact on our cityscape,' said Vy Nguyen, Executive Director, Property and Development NSW.

Engineers Australia Acting Chief Engineer Bernadette Foley said Kathleen Butler was a pioneer for women in engineering.

'Engineering isn't just about maths and hard hats – it's about societal impact,' Ms Foley said.

'We thank the Engineering Heritage Sydney committee for their years of advocacy, and we hope Kathleen Butler's story encourages more girls and women to see engineering as a profession that can help them shape a more diverse and impactful future.'

Kathleen Butler is one of 14 Blue Plaques announced by the Minister for Heritage Penny Sharpe in November last year. The recipients of this round were chosen to highlight the rich and diverse perspectives that make the history of New South Wales so colourful.

Today's Blue Plague is the second unveiling in the Macquarie Street East precinct, joining the Blue Plaque for architect Walter Liberty Vernon which was placed on the <u>Registrar General's Building</u> in 2023.





- 2. Click on the DA number (application ID).
- 3. Read the 'Making a submission fact sheet' at the bottom of the page.
- 4. Click on the 'Lodge submission' button.
- 5. Complete the submission, upload any documents and click on the Submit' button.

The assessing officer will review any submissions received and may ask the applicant to respond to the issues raised. This will occur before the assessing officer determines the application.



Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report Moruya River.

There, unfortunately, isn't going to be much different to report from last week sorry.

The river is cold and quiet at the moment, as is the norm for August. The lower areas of Moruya, closer to the mouth, are the ones that have held any consistency, fish activity wise. The spur wall on the north side, and the area around Preddy's wharf are going to be your best bet this weekend. After last weeks big seas, we have seen much lower swell figures, which has allowed the salmon to move back in. You should also be able to find the odd bream, trevally or flathead in these areas.

Tuross River.

Give Coila lake a bit of a look this weekend, and see if last weeks big swells have triggered any activity, around the mouth area. Fingers crossed there will be a few bream and flathead having a bit of a look around. The Tuross system itself, is much the same as Moruya at the moment, slow! Your best bet will be to have a look around the muddy substrate lakes I have mentioned in previous reports. They will be a degree warmer than the rest of the system, and already holding a few extra flathead. Try Borang or Bumbo lakes to find a flathead or two. On a run out tide, you may even find a few bream at the entrances of these lakes taking advantage of the warmer waters running back into the system.

Rock and Beach.

After the swells last week, the salmon have once again staked their claim along the coastline. Look for nice deep gutters along the all of the local beaches to try and find where the schools will be. A dark patch in the water that is constantly moving is a dead give away. Or sit and wait for a school to swim past where you have set up.

Don't forget the Drummer from the rocks, they very much enjoy a post swell stir up, and will taking advantage of any dislodged food sources. Burley up with some white bread, throw on a prawn or bit of cunivoie, and hold on.

Offshore.

With minimal swells forecast for his weekend, I would expect there to be a few boats headed out to catch a few snapper and flathead over the inshore reefs this weekend. Start looking in as little as 10-15m of water, and work your way out to 50m.

The tuna reports have dried up a bit, no doubt as result of last weeks big swells, but I am assuming they are still out there to be found.

We have had a big drop of gear from Shimano this week, so all our combos, line, soft plastics and a few other bits and bobs are looking good. The bait freezer was restocked this week, with 1kg salted pilchards the only no show again. Fingers crossed we should see them again in a few weeks.

We also have stock of the new Shimano Vanford 2500 and 3000 sized reels, and as a result, have the old models at 30% off at the moment.

As I am away for most of next week with the store owners in QLD for the annual trade show, I don't know if there will be a report next week. You can always come into the shop and ask Dave, who will covering my absence, while I get to play with all the new stock that will be available later this year into next year.

Stay safe everyone and remember, "Every day's a good for fishina..."
