Eurobodalla kicks climate can along for incoming Council

On Tuesday Eurobodalla Shire Council voted not to commit to or resolve any action on a Net Zero Action Plan in a Motion brought By Cr Alison Worthington.

The MOTION was

"THAT Council:

- 1.Acknowledges the NSW legislation, Climate Change (Net Zero Future) Act 2023, which legislates State emissions reduction targets to achieve net zero emissions by 2050, and the obligations of council to meet the regulations relating to that Act.
- 2. Note the work of the Canberra Region Joint Organisation (CRJO) Net Zero Accelerator Program (NZAP), which aims to assist member councils accelerate emissions reduction and set milestones to achieve net zero emissions.
- 3. Note that councillors are aware of the content of the CRJO Net Zero Accelerator Program presentation given in February 2024, and the recording shared with councillors.
- 4. Commits to implementing the actions in the Net Zero Council Guide and the 31 Net Zero Milestones prepared by the NZAP to assist council to improve its emissions data capture and account for their emissions data and actions in emissions reduction.
- 5. Resolve to develop a Net Zero Action Plan that provides a roadmap to achieve net zero emissions by 2050. "

Several Councillors sought to defer the motion for the next Council (after the elections) as it could incur costs and that they didn't have all the information.

Cr Worthington responded: "sorry Councillors, but you have been briefed on this and there has been a huge amount of work done...and it has all been provided to Councillors.

"While I hear you about the costs, I'm more concerned about the costs of not acting."

After considerable debate the Motion was to defer the motion until the November meeting.

Earlier in Public Forum, South Coast Health and Sustainability Alliance (SHASA) President Kathryn Maxwell addressed Council on the matter saying:

"While the Council has set itself non-binding emissions reduction targets, SHASA strongly supports the NSW Government's Climate Change Net Zero Futures legislation as it is a binding target to achieve State emission reduction targets to achieve net zero emissions by 2050. Most importantly it obligates that all Councils including the Eurobodalla Shire Council meet the regulations relating to that Act."

The same day the NSW Government announced the "Latest climate change data helps NSW withstand the heat", illustrating "the need for further action to reduce emissions and for informed planning to improve the resilience of households, communities and businesses to the impacts of climate change, such as extreme weather patterns."

Man reported missing from Moruya located

A man reported missing from the State's South Coast has been found safe and well.

The 26-year-old was last seen at a hospital in River Street Moruya about 8pm on Tuesday (20 August 2024).

When he could not be located or contacted, officers attached to South Coast Police District were notified and commenced inquiries into his whereabouts. Following a search, involving officers attached to South Coast Police District, SES, Police Dog Squad, Youth Police Command, Traffic and Highway Patrol, Surf Life Saving and Westpac Life Saver Helicopter, the man was located about 9.30am today (Friday 23 August 2024), in remote bushland safe and well, approximately 15 kilometres from where he was last seen.

NSW SES Teams from Moruya, Batemans Bay, Bermagui and Ulladulla Units banded together to assist in the search for missing South Coast man.

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Council to advocate for local radiotherapy services at new Hospital

By Alex Rea - In a Motion to Eurobodalla Council on Tuesday, Council unanimously agreed to advocate for Radiotherapy Services at the new Eurobodalla Hospital. Councillor Anthony Mayne moved the motion, "THAT Council urgently seeks clarification on the proposed local radiotherapy service for the L4 Eurobodalla Hospital. That Council joins the community in supporting the inclusion and prioritisation of local radiotherapy services, noting the 5 year interval between the widely subscribed 2022 community Local Access to Radiotherapy Petition lodgement in Parliament and NSW Health's extended delivery date for the new Eurobodalla Hospital in late 2027."

The local health district has repeated refused to include radiotherapy services in the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital on the basis of cost and lack of need. In several public forums this year the figure of \$100m for the local radiotherapy service had been quoted by the Southern NSW Local Health District. This figure was questioned by the three passionate speakers presenting to Public Forum on the matter.

Peter Cormick said, "the figures put about were bullshit." "\$100m is 1/3 the cost of the whole hospital." "A Linac (alone) would cost no more than \$8 million and that a bunker, costed at the rate of \$14,000 per sq metre, would result in a total cost of Linac and bunker, of around \$15 million"

Peter added "with further space and equipment provided, the total cost should be no more than \$30 million." Advocate for the service, Lou Dampney said it was a "no brainer." She said it was "a hell of a journey (to Canberra or Nowra) if you are feeling crook."

She added that radiotherapy was also used for palliative pain management.

Long time campaigner Mylene Boulting said "we can't do anything more ourselves – we need council to stand up with us."

Mrs Boulting said "The Independent Review has still not been released (after almost a year of repeated requests including 2 FOIs), but we have been reliably advised it has indeed confirmed what our community already knew: that a radiotherapy centre IS needed and viable and should be included in the new hospital.

NSW Health have publicly mentioned starting on a radiotherapy centre after the regional hospital is up and running . But we have been told that it would take 2 years to design and build such a centre. This leads us to 2029/2030.

We cannot afford to wait all this time: the community has loudly asked for a centre for the last 4 years, we cannot afford for the process to stall, we need Council to get behind the community's plea, we urge Council to strongly express its support for the inclusion of the radiotherapy centre in the hospital plans NOW, in order to get the development process started in 2025 at the latest and have the centre ready by end 2027."

She also noted that it would be accessed from patients from Bega who had even further to travel.

The speakers all referred to figures from the August 2023 minutes of the Southern NSW Local Health District Board meeting in which Professor Mick Reid provided an overview of the findings of the review into the feasibility of establishing a radiation therapy service within the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital (ERH). The minutes reported: "CI (Cancer Institute) NSW data for projected cancer cases for the south coast supports up to 1.3 Linear Accelerators (Linac). The review has considered whether people would change their current treatment location, the likely uptake, the consequences for the Canberra and Nowra services, whether the service can be provided safely and sustainability as well as cost implications for ERH.

The review found that people will access a local service. Evidence shows a likely Increase in the rate of Radiation Therapy (RT) treatment if a service is provided locally. Discussion followed about the provision of one Linac, or two bunkers and one Linac as for other areas in NSW to future proof.

Networking arrangements are important to ensure continuity of care. There are significant vacancies in the medical oncology field, with a workforce meeting in Nowra with Canberra service providers planned.

A range of options were considered in the review and while it was included in the review, a separate private service is not a model for recommendation. A further option is a contracted provider such as ICON, or Genesis to provide the service in ERH. The third option considered is a public service, networked with Nowra.

Reversal of flow for NSW residents currently travelling to Canberra was discussed with ACT Health who have indicated no issue as their waiting lists are long. Nowra are managing well, but workforce is a challenge. Professor Reid noted that the MSC are supportive for a service at ERH but not at the cost of other services.

A Board member asked about Commonwealth RT grants for regional services. ERH has been identified as an area to support. The Commonwealth's \$8M offer is inadequate to fund the capital cost of the service which is estimated to be around \$30M. Recurrent costs are estimated at \$3.5M/annum.

The CE noted the issue of the cost of doing business in Southern, and the concern that the cost of funding an RT service would further add to this. The CE also noted the range of capital risks the District is currently carrying, as well as the imperative for the operational costs of a radiation therapy service to be fully covered, in the event of the service being established. The review found that the service can be provided in a safe manner, and is a

needed service. The population justifies the provision of a single Linac. A Board member questioned whether the major limiting factor to safe operation would be to staffing of the service, acknowledging the proposed networking with Nowra/Canberra. The review will flag the issue of retention of staff to support the service.

A draft of the Radiation Therapy report will be provided to the Health District when it is provided to Ministry."

In closing Cr Mayne asked "who hasn't had a family member or friend who hasn't been affected (by cancer).

Cr Pollock added "for too long we have kept the door too narrow. We shouldn't let the Federal Government off the hook. We should expand out efforts."

Dr Michael Holland Member for Bega said "I congratulate Councillor Anthony Mayne and the advocates for local radiotherapy services for bringing this issue to the attention of the Eurobodalla Shire Council. The Council has supported the Notice of Motion unanimously. I acknowledge the overview of Professor Mick Reid's review of South Coast radiation Therapy services which indicates the support and sustainability for at least 1 Linear Accelerator for the Bega Electorate. It has been defined as a needed service which can be provided in a safe manner.

This review has been provided to the NSW Ministry of Health which is engaging with the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing on the future provision of radiotherapy services in the Bega Electorate. It vindicates my consistent advocacy for provision of radiation oncology services for our community.

It also confirms the Minns NSW Labor Government's responsible and transparent process of planning for health infrastructure and services. The Eurobodalla Regional Hospital Campus Master Plan includes zoning for expansion or inclusion of a radiation oncology unit.

Work has now commenced on the construction of the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital which when opened in 2027 with Level 4 services can then support radiotherapy therapy for the residents of the Far South Coast."

Logging of endangered Greater Glider hotspot in Mogo State Forest

Parts of Mogo State Forest could soon be logged despite ten endangered greater gliders being found by infrared drone in this forest earlier this year.

On Sunday 18 August locals joined NSW Senator David Shoebridge and Eurobodalla Greens Council candidates to demand this forest be protected.

The spotted gum forest between Maulbrooks Road, Mogendoura and North Moruya is on the chopping block. The logging operation encompasses compartments 197-200 of Mogo State Forest.

Infrared drone surveys this year found a greater glider hotspot with over 10 gliders in unburnt tall forest on the corner of Larrys Mountain Road and Maulbrooks Road. A map provided by Forestry Corporation NSW to neighbouring residents shows two of these greater glider sightings are in forest to be logged. An accompanying letter stated logging would start in July 2024. Featuring permanent water, locals have sited platypus prior to the fires and an incredible 62m tall spotted gum with a seven metre circumference grows in this greater glider hotspot. Forest conservationist and Eurobodalla Greens Council candidate Joslyn van der Moolen has already found another greater glider emerging from a hollow, requiring a 100 metre circle of protection around this tree.

"This greater glider den tree, is in Mogo State forest and is mapped to be logged. It is essential for this forest, be kept standing to protect wildlife that survived the fires. Instead these big old trees, will be cut down mainly for low value export woodchips, firewood and pallets made at the Narooma mill" said Joslyn van der Moolen.

"Residents will face increased fire risk from logging debris as the entire treetop (> 60%) is left as waste. Logging machinery caterpillar treads, will churn up vegetation over hundreds of hectares, snigging tracks will be bulldozed throughout the forest and multiple logging dumps totally cleared. I have observed much of the logging in southern NSW is done by Forestry NSW contracted Victorian harvesters, sniggers and truck drivers" said Joslyn...

"We celebrate the opening of 70 kilometres of the Mogo Mountain Trails Network by announcing we will work within the key stakeholder, the Council, to protect this forest from logging" Colleen Turner, lead Greens Eurobodalla Councillor said. "When elected I will ask council staff to map the 4,000 hectares of state forest around the Mogo Mountain Bike Trails Network and Narooma trails. Then I will move a motion for the Council to vote on, to write to Michael Holland to insist these 4,000 hectares to be protected from logging, by being designated as a Forest Preserved Area by Forestry Corporation NSW." Colleen Turner said

Nature based tourism is our main economic driver with mountain biking in state forests a successful emerging industry. Since the fires local mountain bike trails located in state forests have had \$8 million invested in Mogo and \$8 million near Narooma. This investment has already attracted the prestigious international Sea Otter event to be held in Mogo State Forest in October 2025 for the first time in the southern hemisphere. Despite this infrastructure investment and event planning the state forest mountain bike trails are not protected from logging. We need to protect these state forests to safeguard this investment and provide certainty to the industry so these mountain bike trails are not logged in the future. Without protection these forests will be closed for months and months for logging and tracks damaged. "This permanent protection of the state forests, the Eurobodalla Mountain Bike Trails are in, is on top of the Greens priority list. We are working at local government, state and federal levels to protect forests by ending native forest logging. We call on the industry to focus 100% on plantations on marginal cleared land that already provides over 90% of construction timber, thousands of sawmilling jobs and generates a profit." said Joslyn van der Moolen, For more information visit Council's Mogo Trails webpage. The Mogo Trails project has relied heavily on collaboration with Forestry Corporation NSW and was made possible thanks to \$5 million from the Australian and NSW Governments' Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund and \$3 million from the NSW

Government's Growing Local Economies Fund.

WHO TO BELIEVE ON PLANNING FOR LOCAL RADIOTHERAPY SERVICES EXPERT REVIEWER OR SOUTHERN NSW LOCAL HEALTH DISTRICT?

Better Access To Health Services Series - Dr. Arn Sprogis

Local Radiotherapy Services are a key addition to a Level 4 Hospital in the Eurobodalla and would help service the critical needs of communities all along the far south coast. People in our region who need radiotherapy require long periods of treatment, travel long distances, stay away from home for 6-8 weeks at a time and for many this isn't possible. In Sydney or Canberra people can have the 15-minute daily treatment and go home to continue their lives as normal. The community communication process over the past 4 years around planning for a Local Radiotherapy Service at the Eurobodalla Regional Hospital has been one of the worst I have ever seen in any health district in 40 years, with its lack of transparency and which doesn't match public scrutiny of the available data and evidence.

This was brought to a head last year when Prof. Michael Reid (ex-Director General of NSW Health) was brought in by NSW Health to 'Assess the Feasibility of Establishing a Local Radiotherapy Service at the Eurobodalla Regional Hospital'. He handed over his report late last year to NSW Health and despite multiple requests by community members the report has not been publicly released.

Part of the latest recent statements by Senior SNSWLHD Executives including Margaret Bennet CEO and Brad Scotcher General Manager Coastal Network at public forums were that the Local Radiotherapy Service would cost \$100 million to build, is unaffordable, has no timeframe for a future build and that it won't be part of the Eurobodalla Regional Hospital at opening.

Imagine my surprise when last week I was sent a copy of the Southern NSW Local Health District 2023 August Board Meeting and in it was the summary of the main conclusions in Prof. Reids Review, presented by Prof. Reid himself which were that there should be a Local Radiotherapy Service as part of the Eurobodalla Regional Hospital with an estimated capital cost of around \$30 million.

For over a year key details of the Local Radiotherapy Services Review have been known and not shared with the community despite multiple requests. Prof. Reid's conclusion about the capital costs of \$30 million have been turned into \$100 million by Southern NSW Local Health District Senior Executives without any details or explanation provided to the community, despite questions on the issue at multiple hospital forums in Narooma, Moruya and Batemans Bay.

The process around planning for the Local Radiotherapy Services and the obvious major difference between the conclusions of Prof. Reid's review and recent statements by the Southern NSW Local Health District Senior Executive without any explanation to our community of the reason for the difference together with a lack of transparency in decision making has led me for the first time in 40 years of dealing with various NSW Health Managements at multiple senior levels, to a complete loss of trust in any statement by Southern NSW Local Health District about the Eurobodalla Regional Hospital and Local Radiotherapy Services.

Lack of transparency and no publicly available data on planning has been the pattern for the last 5 years at Southern NSW Local Health District and has succeeded in taking me from always giving them the benefit of any doubt to now always starting with doubt. It will now take a long time and significant efforts for the Southern NSW Local Health District Senior Executive to regain the community's trust.

So, who do you believe on planning for local radiotherapy services? The expert reviewer or Southern NSW Local Health District senior managers?

ESC has let us down on climate action and it has cost ratepayers dearly

Council has pretty much been treading water since 2020 on sustainability measures that would save ratepayers and reduction greenhouse gas emissions.

Before the Sustainability Coordinator left, he informed SHASA (South Coast Health and Sustainability Alliance), that **transport** was the fastest growing source of emissions. Sadly, they still only have one electric vehicle. When SHASA representatives met with the Mayor and General Manager in May to offer to develop a detailed business case on the benefits (economic and environmental) of switching suitable vehicles to electric, the General Manager said it was not a priority. Funding is available from the Federal and State Governments to assist with switching to electric – sadly this Council has not yet taken up these opportunities.

Let's look at **electricity.** The last thing the Sustainability Coordinator did before leaving the Council was to organise a power purchase agreement to lock in a good price for electricity from renewable sources. He wanted it to cover 100%. In their wisdom this was reduced to 80%. With the Bay Pavilions becoming operational this dropped to 58%. The result is more emissions and more financial cost to Council. When representatives of SHASA met with the Mayor and General Manager, we raised the idea of a solar car park at the Pavilion and that one option was community financing if they did not want to fund the capital costs up front. Again, the General Manager said this was not a priority.

It has been brought to SHASA's attention, through the recently prepared GHD Report, that the Council spends nearly \$1m a year on electricity bills for the Bay Pavilions. Why has it taken till now for the Council to start focusing on sustainability features at the building. Why wasn't a much bigger solar array installed when it was built? Why weren't timers put on lighting and appliances when it was built? We can tell you why, because this Council does not prioritise emissions reduction. Thereby incurring a greater cost to the ratepayers of the Eurobodalla.

Waste. A major source of Council emissions is methane from the rotting or organic matter. Unlike a number of other regional Councils, Eurobodalla Shire Council has delayed bringing in food organics, gardening organics or FOGO for short. As a result, we still have food waste rotting away at the tips and releasing methane – a greenhouse gas 20 times more potent than CO2.

While ESC has a **Eurobodalla Climate Action Plan**, and strong targets. The plan does not have a budget. The draft Climate Action Plan was significantly watered down with extensive use of vague terms like advocate, investigate, consider. Council's Sustainability Team staffing resources are totally inadequate, only 1.6 FTE. Council's strong emissions targets are only as good as the policies that underpin them and require resourcing, i.e. money to develop the policies and to embed procedural items supporting them across the Council's operations.

As the NSW government has identified, the Council needs to do including:

1. An emissions inventory – it's vital to track progress with emissions. We currently have no way of knowing if progress is being made in achieving the emissions reduction targets.

2. Embedding emission reduction targets into all Council strategic documents, processes and programs.

3. Adopting a Fleet Transition Plan with Targets.

Sadly, this Council has been basically kicking the can down the road re emissions reduction/climate action. It continues to this day as reflected in the Councils 2024/25 Operational Plan where under Strategy 1.3. Activity 1.3.1 Reduce Council's contribution to the effects of man-made climate change through the Implementation of the Climate Plan there are two actions.

1.3.1.1 Design and implement programs for planting, and or, artificial shading of strategic urban landscapes, council car parks and playgrounds

1,3,1,2 Facilitate a Climate Change Advisory Group Once again, minimal actions to reduce emissions.

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
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
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100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society

Strahan; dessert spoons and forks (donated by public) Mr. Tom Honan; pipe (presented by Mr. J. Jordon) Mr. Jim Honan; knife (presented by Mr. Lex Johnson) Mrs. A. Ison; bottle perfume (presented by Mrs. A. F. Emmott) Miss. M. Morris; prize value 5/6 (presented by Mrs. J. R. Milne) Miss Turner. A jazz band of local artists supplied sweet harmony for the dancing. ... The takings amounted to £12, which is indeed gratifying and which reflects great credit on the promoters, Mesdames P. The sad intelligence reached here on Monday that Moruya girl

The sad intelligence reached here on Monday that Moruya girl Miss Jessie Boyd, aged 18, a knitter of Callan Street, Five Dock, had been knocked down by a motor lorry in Central Square that morning. She was on her way to work, and was crossing the street when the lorry struck her. The Civil Ambulance took her to Sydney Hospital, where she was pronounced extinct by Dr. Standish. Her neck had been broken. The deceased was a daughter of Mr. Boyd, formerly of Mogo and Moruya, and the grand-daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. Hellams, of Mogo.

The following cable appeared in Monday's "Sun": - LONDON, Monday Night. "Midshipman A. E. Good and J. W. Bull, of the Australian Navy, with Midshipman Jones, an Englishman, all students of the Naval Engineering College at Devonport, were sailing in a five-ton yacht in the Channel when it founded in a heavy squall. A tug dashed out and, after a good half an hour's search found Bull and Good swimming, supported by an oar. They were rescued and taken to hospital. Jones was drowned." Midshipman Bull, who is a son of Dentist and Mrs. R. N. Bull, of Moruya, was, with his comrades, about to take a trip to Calais in the yacht. We are pleased to state that Mr. and Mrs. Bull received re-assuring news from the Naval Department on Thursday that their son is recovering from the shock and immersion.

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No plan to stem huge losses at Bay Pavilions

Since the Batemans Bay Pavilions opened just over two years ago ratepayers have spent nearly \$11 million just to keep the doors open - and a new report says it's not going to stop.Last year, ratepayers lost \$17.56 every time a patron walked through the door

By 2034 ratepayers will, in total since opening, have put over \$70 million, including depreciation, into subsiding operations of the theatre, gym and pool. The cash subsidy will be around \$35 million.

At last Tuesday's Eurobodalla Shire Council meeting the staff tabled a Sustainability Plan that claimed to "to optimise business outcomes for the facility, while maintaining positive community benefit".

In bad news for ratepayers the document offers plenty of strategic themes and actions but no indication the losses will reduce, with the council aiming to continue to take around \$3 million in cash every year from the General Fund to subsidise the losses at the Pavilions for at least the next 10 years.

The council has already slashed the road maintenance budget to keep the Pavilions open and this hit to community safety and amenity looks likely to continue.

The councillors meekly accepted the plan, with only Cr Mayne dissenting. More than half of them are heading for the exits before the coming election and they were happy to kick the problem down the road to the next council. Those standing for re-election, including the mayor, will no doubt hope their lack of action does not affect their chances.

As revealed in the Moruya Mail, the plan confirms no action to cut the cash losses has been completed, with extended delays in executing the recommendations from KPMG, GHD and InConsult that outlined a savings path over a year ago.

The council data shows the new theatre is a white elephant that sat empty for over 300 days last year with just 62 shows, having to compete with the Soldiers Club, the Bay Theatre Players and the cinema for patrons and demonstrating how oversupplied Batemans Bay is with performance and entertainment spaces.

The council did not share data on gym usage. The gym competes with two private enterprise gyms less than 500 metres away.

A review of ways to cut costs by closing parts of the Pavilions that are underutilised or compete with local businesses is not included in the Sustainability Plan

In a puzzling move, reducing the cost to ratepayers by finding new revenue sources has been made a "medium priority" in the Sustainability Plan, to be done some time in the future.

It underlines how the council sees no urgency in reducing costs. It's easier to keep reaching into ratepayers pockets to pay for losses – as long as ratepayers are prepared to accept cuts to road maintenance and other services.

Finding new revenue streams and making decisions on the viability of the Pavilions seems to be in the "too hard" basket.

Ideas suggested around the community for new revenue streams include reopening part of the site to a mini golf operation similar to the one that successfully operated for many years.

Another suggestion is to approach a fast food company like Hungry Jacks to see how the site can be reconfigured to house an outlet, as travellers heading north find it very difficult to access the outlets now available on the eastern side of the highway.

Another option heard mentioned is for council to strata title the property, keep the pool as a vital community service and sell the rest of the building.

However, the Sustainability Plan does not put forward any options – just the easiest one - to keep funding the losses with ratepayers money, a decision that will lead to either more service cuts or increased rates.

Gadfly

I have never met an Aboriginal of any age and either sex whom I didn't like...immediately and thereafter.

The first bloke I met was a boundary rider on a far northwest Queensland sheep station where I was a rouseabout in the property's shearing team. My mate, the team's wool presser, Alan Blunt and I were hunting plain turkeys in his VW when we crossed paths on the boundary line.

We stopped and after a while he climbed down from his old mare, and we boiled the billy. Turned out he'd had a small part in Jedda the movie and we had a good old yarn. I met his family later and his father showed me how to throw a killing boomerang, the kind that flies flat, doesn't come back, but can break a kangaroo's neck at 70 paces.

After that I met the poet Kath Walker who became Oodgeroo Noonuccal when she expanded her artistic and political range beyond her poetry that at the time was only fair to middling. No, I tell a lie; it was awful. But she was a lovely person, and I was a Cadet journo on The Courier-Mail. I wrote a piece that helped get her started on her activist path.

Since then, as private secretary to a Minister for Aboriginal Affairs, Ralph Hunt I've met and talked with very many of our Continent's forebears; other times as a documentary video maker; then as a Canberra Times columnist initiating our own reconciliation walk across Commonwealth Bridge; and finally while researching my last two books. I've never been disappointed once.

I'm not suggesting they were all paragons of virtue. When the men get a taste for the whitefella booze that offers an escape from the reality of their place at the bottom of the Australian totem pole, they can lash out at the nearest person to them – usually a wife and mother of their children – just like the wife beaters in our own community.

No one's perfect, but I've constantly felt a unique gentility and an instant generous connection that is all their own. Then four years ago, I began work on the biography of a whitefella who gave his life to the Aboriginal cause, a man of immense courage and deep sensibility, named Donald Thomson. Our first homegrown anthropologist, Donald spent most of his adult life with them and his experience was similar to mine. The book was a joy to write because he felt exactly the same about them.

He was also a writer and newspaper columnist for much of his life. I used a lot of his work in the book and though he died in 1970 it often felt as though we were sitting side by side, writing together. It was an absolutely joyous experience. But here's the thing we can't understand – and I invite you to answer the question: Why do our white compatriots so easily forgive the British for not just stealing the Aboriginals' homeland but then trying to wipe them out?

And now that the land and its treasures have made us rich, why are they so reluctant to welcome them into the great councils of government? Why do they select just the 'stolen generations' to offer an apology, rather than a treaty and some decent recompense to the survivors of the holocaust our kind visited upon them?

How do they suppress a bitterly ironic laughter when our Prime Ministers and Foreign Ministers from both sides of the political aisle, berate other nations for their human rights' shortcomings while standing up for 'our Australian values'?

I can think of a few answers but none that really makes sense. The Aboriginal people are our own patriotic forebears in the great south land. They are good people.

17 year old Broulee resident and Year 11 student at St Peter's Anglican College, Zahlia Kelly, has been awarded the prestigious 2024 NSW Youth Parliamentarian of the Year.

Youth Parliament is the Y NSW's flagship youth leadership and engagement program and has been operating for over 20 years in NSW. With a focus on leadership and advocacy, the program enables high school students in years 10 to 12 to build confidence, develop leadership skills, engage with civic leadership, policy development, and democratic parliamentary debate. Each year's cohort receives training over a six month period that includes in-person camps and online workshops. Participants

Each year's cohort receives training over a six month period that includes in-person camps and online workshops. Participants create Youth Bills with recommendations on issues for change. These are debated during a mock sitting week in NSW Parliament House with Members of Parliament invited to chair. It's an opportunity for young people to advocate, grow skills and make life-long connections.*

Zahlia applied for the program in February.

Zahlia said "I enjoy advocacy and wanted to do something outside of the school environment. I was accepted into the program in April and took on the title, The Honourable Zahlia Kelly (Member for Bega)."

Since April, Zahlia joined 70 participants from around the state have worked on 'youth legislation' from the portfolios of Education, Women's Affairs, Aboriginal Affairs, Arts Music and Culture, Rural and Regional Affairs and Housing and Homelessness. Zahlia said "I joined the committee from the Housing and Homelessness Portfolio and we were tasked with presenting a bill to "Provide a just transition from Out-Of-Home Care into stable and affordable housing". I would spend up to six hours per week on committee work."

The NSW Youth Parliamentarians then converged on NSW Parliament house in Sydney for their 'Parliament Sitting Week' during the July school holidays to present and debate their bills to be introduced into 'youth legislation' across the portfolios. Zahlia said 'Our bill was passed following robust debate and without amendments."

The Honourable Rose Jackson (NSW Minister for Housing and Homelessness, and Minister for Water, Mental-Health and Youth) was very impressed with the bill and debate and highlighted the possibility of incorporating parts of it into real legislation.

Zahlia's efforts earned her NSW Youth Parliamentarian of the Year. Out of 70 other participants from around the state this award is presented to the candidate who 'displays the most outstanding qualities of leadership, citizenship and engagement during their time as a Youth Parliament participant'.

Zahlia is now using her advocacy skills at the local level and was also the driving force in organising the Winter Soulstice Youth Event. She collaborated with Eurobodalla Council and Headspace and gained the support of Mayor Hatcher and Dr Michael Holland who spoke at the event.

Last weekend Zahlia represented St Peter's Anglican College (funded by Bateman's Bay Rotary) at the Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA) held in Old Parliament House, Canberra. Her team of 3 students was the 'Solomon Islands' and they were successful in winning the Totenhofer Peace Prize awarded to the delegation who contributed to world peace most consistently during the MUNA sessions.

Bega Valley and Eurobodalla experienced strong surges in population growth

Australia has entered a new era of internal migration according to the newly released Regional Movers Index (RMI), with data indicating the nation's love of regional living is becoming a

sustained population trend. **Regional Australia Institute** (RAI) CEO Liz Ritchie said data shows that, during the June 2024 quarter, 27 per cent more people moved from cities to regions than in the opposite direction, building on the pattern seen in previous RMI releases. "Regional Australia has become the nation's new frontier. This analysis is clearly showing the population movement we're seeing is a sustained new trend, that is higher than pre-Covid migration patterns. The regional Australia we have now, is quite different to the regional Australia of five years ago," Ms Ritchie

"The emergence of this new era signifies how important the regions are to the future of our nation. The regions will be at the heart of Australia's net zero transition, and it is vital the infrastructure and services our growing regions require are met to ensure long-term prosperity and sustainability of our country." The data shows despite a seasonal dip in overall movement across the country in the June quarter, the Australian population remains highly mobile, with city-to-regional relocations tracking 16 per cent above the pre-Covid average, and regional-toregional relocations 10 per cent above.

The RMI is a partnership between the Commonwealth Bank of Australia (CBA) and the Regional Australia Institute (RAI), which analyses quarterly and annual trends in people moving to and

from Australia's regional areas.
The latest report also shows the emergence of new regional hotspots, with Lake Macquarie, north of the NSW Central Coast, one of Australia's most popular destinations for movers, securing an almost 5 per cent share of net internal migration over the past year. When it came to growth hotspots, the neighbouring NSW South Coast Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Bega Valley and Eurobodalla both experienced strong annual and quarterly surges in movement.

Mr Fowler said: "The coastal appeal of regional hubs like Lake Macquarie, Bega Valley and Eurobodalla offer an attractive lifestyle with convenient access to quality healthcare and education services, as well as employment opportunities, further bolstered by major industry investments like the Snowy Hydro 2.0 project in Southern NSW."

New analysis this quarter also provides valuable insights on movement on a state-by-state basis, with the top five LGAs by share and growth in net internal migration revealed across

the country.

The picturesque far south coast LGA Bega Valley emerged as the fastest growing regional LGA this quarter, with a four-fold increase on the back of its popularity amongst city movers. While quarterly growth was up by 63.2 per cent to record the third highest quarterly growth rate of the Top Five.

The adjoining LGA of Eurobodalla also experienced rapid growth. Unlike its south coast neighbour, regional movers were the key contributors to this growth, which also increased on a quarterly basis (87.1 per cent).

Ms Ritchie said around three-quarters of city dwellers who made the move to the regions in the past three months had settled in either regional New South Wales or Victoria, reflective of capital city net migration data which shows Sydney, and to a lesser extent Melbourne, continue to shed the largest number of people.

"With so many people settling in our southern states, it's critical governments, industry, business and community work together on ensuring regional cities and towns are supported during this phase of expansion. The regions provide so much: affordability, a sense of community, fulfilling career options and green space. Let's ensure this new era of regionality is met with vision and leadership to drive a more decentralised Australia," Ms Ritchie said.

Cultural burning at Wimbie Beach

ESC Media - Cultural burning will take place at Wimbie Beach reserve this Friday to help remove an invasive weed, reduce the fuel load, and protect the cultural significance of the area. The burn began on Friday 23 August. Batemans Bay Local Aboriginal Lands Council (LALC) is jointly managing the burn alongside Eurobodalla Council.

Andrew White of Batemans Bay LALC said Walbunja Rangers have run test burns and prepared the area to manage the on-

ground component.

"This Walbunja land is very significant to the mob," he said. Council's invasive species and biosecurity supervisor Paul Martin said the burn will clear the area and make access to the invasive weed, boneseed, much easier.

Under NSW's Biosecurity Act, Council's Invasive Species team has been controlling boneseed by hand since 2011.

"We inspect every property in the Wimbie Beach area and hand pull all bonéseed we find," Mr Martin said.

"It's a highly invasive plant that will completely take over the bush if allowed. It could potentially destroy habitat and food sources for native birds, animals and invertebrates."

Mr Martin said fire will encourage boneseed germination which will be easier for his team to pull out post-burn. The burn area will be approximately 15-hectares and slopes

steeply from east to west.

"Fire travels slowly downhill; this is an ideal location to conduct

this activity," Mr Martin said.
"Walbunja Rangers have been hard at it, establishing containment lines and clearing around bases of rough-bark trees to prevent fire from climbing the trunks.

Mr Martin reassured residents who may feel nervous at the sight of smoke.

"The fire will not be a wall of flame, rather it trickles along the ground and is personally tended to by the Rangers," he said. "RFS have been notified, and we do not expect to use water, but it's there if required.

Cultural burning is also known as cool burning, where the burned area becomes cool to touch after the fire has trickled

"Animals and birds are able to move to unburnt areas as the fire moves along and repopulate the burned area once the fire

has moved through," Mr Martin said.

Mr Martin said it was the first time Council has undertaken the Aboriginal cultural burning practice at Wimbie Beach. Also this month, Council and Walbunja Rangers successfully conducted cultural burns at Dalmeny-Kianga headland.

"We have been provided with the opportunity to listen to and learn from the Walbunja people using cultural practices that have been established for over 60,000 years," Mr Martin said. "It is ultimately going to help reduce the soil seedbank of a control-order weed, enhance the vegetative condition of the reserve, reduce fuel loads and re-introduce Aboriginal cultural burning practices to a hugely significant area for the Walbunja people - it's a win-win for everybody.

Mr Martin said fire can only be used to manage Council's bushland reserves at specific times of year and on certain soil

"Our reserves are highly diverse with different vegetation; we must be careful and take everything in balance," Mr Martin

"If burns take place at the wrong time of year or in the wrong conditions, it can result in an increase in fire-favouring plant species, which can potentially make areas more susceptible to bushfires in the future.'

Mr Martin said the weather forecast was ideal for burning with light winds, cool nights and mild days ahead.

"There will be some white smoke, but it shouldn't be significant," he said.

"The team will keep an eye on the weather over the weekend to determine the go ahead on Monday.'

The Newth Place car park and access to the reserve will be closed during the burn which is expected to take up to two days. Nearby residents have been notified about the cultural burn by letter from Council.

Council has also established taped lines, known as transect lines, throughout the reserve to monitor vegetation changes

over time.



\$4m Aboriginal Languages boost as new grant round opens

The NSW Government is delivering on its ongoing commitment to revitalise Aboriginal Languages, with the announcement of more than \$4 million in grants to fund 74 Aboriginal Language projects across the state.

This new funding builds on the \$3.9 million delivered in 2023, double the Coalition Government's spend in 2022.

The Minister for Aboriginal Affairs and Treaty David Harris announced the funding while visiting one of the grant recipients, First Linguists, in the town of Brewarrina on Thursday.

First Linguists, supported by Brewarrina Local Aboriginal Land Council, will receive a \$15,000 grant to develop workshops to revitalise and preserve the Ngemba, Ualarai, Murrawarri and Kimilaroi Languages.

The NSW Government investment, via the Aboriginal Languages Trust (ALT), will empower Aboriginal people and organisations across the state deliver events, initiatives and projects tailored to the needs of their communities.

Aboriginal languages are central to Aboriginal culture and vital to sustaining traditional knowledge.

The growth and strengthening of Aboriginal Languages and Culture is also a key outcome for Closing the Gap, a national commitment to improve outcomes for Aboriginal people. NSW remains the only jurisdiction in Australia to enact legislation that recognises the importance of Aboriginal Languages and establishes mechanisms for a focused investment in their revitalisation.

In 2023/24 the Aboriginal Languages Trust offered six grant programs, including a new Educational Scholarship Program, which aims to contribute to the growth of Aboriginal Languages by supporting individuals to pursue languages training and education.

Among the many projects the grants will support, include:

- Warren Performing Arts and Language Place Incorporated will record four original songs in the Wayilwan Language and deliver Community Language workshops at Warren in central-west NSW
- Walhallow Local Aboriginal Land Council near Tamworth will create an animation to tell the Dreamtime story of Yurrandaali, the main totem for Aboriginal people of the Liverpool Plains
- Elders will deliver on country language workshops for Aboriginal young people on Bundjalung Land in northern NSW
- Leeton and District Local Aboriginal Land Council will create four 360-degree interactive videos filmed on country and digitally animated to explore a world using Wiradyuri/Wiradjuri Language in 3D
- Newara Aboriginal Corporation will employ an Anaiwan Language Project Officer and Facilitator, a role vital to supporting Newara as the primary Language organisation and hub for the Anaiwan community in Armidale
- Winangakirri Aboriginal Corporation will employ two Language support workers, a contract Linguist and Archivist, to develop Language learning materials for Community use
- Blake Cusack will be one of six recipients of the Aboriginal Languages Education Scholarship Program. Blake currently works full time as a Gumbaynggirr language teacher at Gumbaynggirr Giigana Freedom School in Coffs Harbour.

Aboriginal organisations and groups in NSW are now invited to apply for grants to hold events and activities celebrating NSW Aboriginal Languages Week 2024 from 20 to 27 October. Grants of between \$1,000 and \$5,000 are available for initiatives to celebrate Aboriginal Languages across NSW, including community events, exhibitions, language classes and language workshops.

In its second year, NSW Aboriginal Languages Week aims to celebrate and promote languages with a broad range of stakeholders and audiences through a series of events, programs and promotional activities.

NSW Aboriginal Languages week also recognises the passing of the Aboriginal Languages legislation, which came into law on 24 October 2017.

Tackle World Moruya

Moruya River.

With the AFTA trade show done and dusted for another year, I can get back to my regularly scheduled fishing report. The show was an eye opener, and there will be a few new brands showing up in the shop, I won't say who till we have confirmation, and there is some nice new stuff from the regular suppliers that has been ordered for stock. So stay tuned, and I'll let you know as it arrives.

The Moruya river continues along its cold slow lazy way this week, with reports from the estuary itself being pretty sparse. The ocean temps are still fairly low at the moment, and the only real source of warmer water, will be that of the shallow sand flats, that are benefiting from longer and warmer days. I would be targeting a few lazy flathead or bream around these areas with small soft plastics or slowly worked crank bait style hardbody lures. Bait as always, will work for you also. Live nippers are a prime option when the fishing is slow, you just need to be able to tolerate getting wet feet this time of year to get some.

The lower sections of the river, the spur wall and Preddy's wharf area, are all good options at the moment.

Tuross River.

The back areas of this system with dark muddy substrate, will be the best areas to look for a flathead or two. The likes of Borang and Bumbo lakes both fit this bill nicely, and are already starting to produce some fish. With the forecast this weekend, Sunday is looking a little better than Saturday with less wet stuff predicted. It that there is a lot of rain forecast for Saturday though.

Tuross has plenty of shallow side channels that are prime spots for both bait, and predators. The four ways area is a great one to look at this time of year, with lots of snarky spots to get into if you have the means. Kayaks are a great option this time of year.

I haven't heard any reports from Coila lake this week, so I'm not really sure what is happening in there at the moment. Feel free to make a comment here if you guys have any good oil on what's happening. Pics are always encouraged also.

Rock and Beach.

Congo creek I'm told is running clean and clear after the big seas last week, and has some nice gutters running along the beaches also.

Salmon continue to be the mainstay along the coast this time of year, and their range is extensive. With no particular spot better than any other spot, you will just need to get out and find where the fish are. Looking at the Moruya Bar Cam, there is absolutely no swell running at the moment, making the Breakwall and local rock ledges a safe proposition to fish.

After last fortnight's tragic events up Kiama way, always err on the side of caution!! No matter how far you have travelled or how short your fishing window is, risking your life in bad conditions is a really dumb thing to do. If you don't intimately know the ledge you plan to fish, and it's wet, FORGET IT! Find somewhere safe to fish. PLEASE.

Offshore.

With good looking conditions, there should be a few boats heading out to either try and find a tuna or snapper this

The snapper have been happily playing ball this week from all reports, with fish being found in and around the 20m mark out to 50m, so there are options depending on how close to shore you fish to stay. The flathead have also been readily available over the sand between drifts. I am unsure as to what is happening further out wide for the game crews, but hopefully if you are planning on getting out this weekend, you are successful.

The bait freezer is stocked with everything other than 1kg Salted Pilchards, but I am told they should be available next run.

Keep an eye on our socials, for any news on new accounts and stock arriving in store. Until then,

Another key project I initiated with Council is the first NSW trial of virtual fencing on Cullendulla Drive, Long Beach following with a second stretch on Dunns Creek Road. The installation of these warning devices activated by car headlights has markedly cut wildlife fatalities.

To celebrate the opening of 70 kilometres of the Mogo Mountain Biking

To celebrate the opening of 70 kilometres of the Mogo Mountain Biking Trails Network, we will work with council, to call for the immediate protection of 4,000 hectares of state forest around the Mogo Trails

Network and Narooma Trails. Protecting this forest from logging is essential to safeguard the \$16 million invested.

When logging of Eurobodalla's native forests ceases (as already requested by our Council), 246,000 tonnes of CO2 emissions will be avoided annually. This is equivalent to 56% of annual shire emissions

from electricity, transport, waste and agriculture (https://zerose.space/by-lga-2). Having lived in the fire prone Adelaide Hills for 23 years I support asset protection and rapid response aerial firefighting capability.
