Our four-time Oyster Shucking Champion, Gerard "Doody" Dennis, is heading back to Ireland to represent Australia at the World Oyster Opening Competition!

The fun begins on the evening of Saturday, September 28, from 10pm AEST, live streamed from the Galway International Oyster Festival in Ireland, and you can watch from home!

In 2023, Doody finished an impressive 11th from 16th - quite a feat when his first experience of the Galway Flat Oyster came just days before the competition. In 2024, he will face the current World Champion, United Kingdom's Frederico Fiorillo, along with eager champion shuckers representing Canada, the United States, Estonia, Sweden, Denmark, Norway, and France and of course Ireland, who host their own Nationals on September 27.

Doody has honed his technique alongside some of Australia's best shuckers, and his skills have already earned him four gold and two silver medals at Australia's Oyster Shucking Championships, which are held at our festival each year and supported by Australia's Oyster

Have your say on Eurobodalla's waste Eurobodalla Council is seeking feedback from the community to help set a 10-year vision

for waste and resource recovery. Council is developing a new waste strategy that will lead initiatives to improve waste reduction and landfill diversion, with an emphasis on reuse and recycling.

The Eurobodalla Waste and Resource Recovery Strategy 2025-2035 will help guide Council's plans for the future of waste. Council's acting waste manager Mel Norman said community input is crucial to the strategy.

'To develop a strategy and practical initiatives, we need to understand our community's concerns, priorities, and aspirations."

Council created three surveys to capture feedback from residents and businesses regarding general waste, food waste, and construction waste from builders and developers. "Collecting the community's insights and experiences will ensure the strategy is relevant, effective, and reflects the needs of those it serves, ultimately leading to a more sustainable future for waste and resource management," Ms Norman said.

The strategy will also aim to meet NSW Government targets, such as reducing total waste per person by 10 percent by 2030.

"We would love to hear feedback on things like waste infrastructure, climate change resilience, manage plastic waste, tackle litter and illegal dumping, waste education, and service to the community," Ms Norman said. "The surveys will only take a few minutes, or maybe more if you have some great ideas to share."

Safe Driving Tip for new drivers:

To familiarise yourself with car behaviour under severe braking, when on a quiet back under severe braking, when on a quiet back road with no traffic, apply the brakes quickly and firmly as in an emergency stop. Make sure there are no cars behind. The car should stop quickly in a straight line if your car has ABS brakes (Antilock Braking System) because the wheels will not lock or

All newer cars have ABS (you will see an ABS logo light up on dashboard when ignition turned on), some older cars without ABS will skid because the front wheels lock up and there may be no steering control under emergency braking. ABS is a safer braking system allowing more control in emergency

Toragy Point Cemetery restoration project by NPWS and Rotary

Toragy Point Cemetery at Moruya South Head, Eurobodalla National Park has received some much-needed attention with ironbark fencing installed around the cemetery and some restoration to original wooden fencing and gravesites. Chris Manahan from Moruya Rotary has helped drive the project over several years.

Rotary Moruya approached the NPWS to help restore areas within the Cemetery.

Early in 2024 Rotary were ready for work with the final Conservation Risk Assessment document completed. "Over two days we lifted vandalized headstones and placed them respectfully in their rightful location and we repaired woodwork that should last another hundred years. Generous contributions from both Mitre 10 and Cameron's hardware provided the necessary replacement timber" said Chris. The Heritage side of National Parks were very specific in what degree of restoration we were hoping to carry out. And rightly so as the site had to be made safe for the public use and equally important respect was required for the occupants of the gravesites we wished to restore.

Rotary assisted NPWS with relocating headstones to their correct plinths on top of their truthful grave sites. Assisted with re-erecting some internal timber fencing and railing and replacing rotten/missing rails with new ones.

More recently, Service Staff (NPWS) replaced the perimeter fence which was upgraded to a new hardwood post and rail fence surrounding the graveyard. The old fence was made from pine wood and did not coincide with the original fencing, which would have been different in design and made from hardwood timber.

The new fence is made from hardwood timber and complements the natural setting, materiality of the cemetery, and enhance the heritage value and safety of the site.

Chris said "I don't think we realized the paper work that was necessary before any work could commence. National Parks collaborated with us and took the lead in completing an Environmental Assessment as well as a Project Plan and the relevant Heritage Impact documents."



Fauna crossings installed over Princes Highway near Glenella Rd



Last month Transport for NSW installed special overhead fauna crossings over the Princes Highway between the Glenella Road and Batemans Bay, for gliders and other arboreal species.

A Transport for NSW Spokesperson said "As part of the South Batemans Bay Link Road project, Transport for NSW has committed to implementing management measures to mitigate impacts to and allow connectivity for yellow-bellied glider populations between the Hanging Rock Creek catchment and Mogo State Forest. "The majority of threatened species likely to be present within the road corridor are mobile and generally feed high in the canopy of vegetation."


A connectivity strategy has been developed to enable the movement of yellow-bellied gliders and other species of arboreal mammals across South Batemans Bay Link Road and the Princes Highway. The location of the fauna poles and rope bridges was investigated and determined by an industry expert in consultation with Transport. Reasoning behind the locations included constructability, trafficked areas and connectivity with existing forest.

"Fauna crossings and glide poles have been installed on a number of Transport projects across the state including across the Pacific Highway upgrade. Monitoring of these structures has shown regular use by target species." A few weeks ago the Brisbane Times revealed that a similar wildlife bridge was installed in 2022 by Brisbane City Council, following community pressure, after 20 koalas were hit by cars and trucks.

More than 100 koala and possum movements have been recorded over that bridge.

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Signing out: 5-kilometre rule for Clubs entry scrapped

The antiquated rule that prevents people living within five kilometres of a Club from signing in without first becoming a member is being torn up as part of the State Government's ongoing crusade against pointless red tape strangling our nightlife.

The 5km rule has been responsible for countless headscratching moments and unexpected paperwork over the years for people just wanting to enter their local Club or RSL for a meal or beverage.

Removing the rule is expected to encourage more locals to enjoy their nearby Clubs before choosing whether or not to become a member.

Consigning the 5km rule to history is part of the next tranche of commonsense Vibrancy Reforms to be introduced to Parliament next month. This includes the removal of the outdated restrictions that prevented patrons from standing while drinking outside a licenced premises.

The first round of Vibrancy Reforms:

- · Permanently relaxed the rules for outdoor dining, allowing venues to make the most of their outdoor space
- · Ended single noise complaints from shutting down pubs and other licensed venues
- · Made it easier to activate streets for festivals and events (Open Streets program) and a regulatory model that allows streamlined approvals for repeat events (Permit, Plug, Play)
- Expanded Special Entertainment Precincts that empower local councils to change the rules around noise and opening hours in a designated area to support live entertainment and nightlife
- · Increased incentives for live music and live performance, with two hours extended trading and an 80% reduction in liquor licence fees for licensed venues offering live music and performance
- · Created easier pathways for extended trading hours for major events like the Olympics and World Cups.

Under current legislation, residents living within 5kms of their local club must sign up as a member and typically pay a membership fee, demonstrate membership of a similar club elsewhere, or attend as the guest of an existing member. The current restrictions reduce the likelihood of people regularly attending their local Club, or even trying it out for the first time - while those living beyond 5kms can freely sign in as visitors.

Clubs will still be able to attract new members with memberonly incentives and access to their many facilities such as gyms and swimming pools.

Minister for Music and the Night-Time Economy John Graham said "Red tape that gets in the way of people in NSW enjoying themselves for no discernible benefit will continue to go into the shredder under the Minns Labor Government. "It has been an unwanted rite of passage for so many to be stuck in bureaucratic limbo over membership at the entry to a Club when all you want to do is go inside for a drink and a meal.

"Scrapping the 5km rule is just the start of our next round of reforms to reboot the nightlife and vibrancy of the state which are all about boosting the night-time economy, treating adults like adults and stripping back redundant red tape."

ClubsNSW CEO Rebecca Riant said "We have long advocated for this change, so this is a fantastic outcome for our industry.

"It's about providing clubs with the choice, and for many clubs — particularly golf and sailing clubs who have social membership caps — this will make a huge difference. "We thank Minister Graham and Minister Harris for their support, and we look forward to working with the NSW Government on future vibrancy reforms."

Massive thermal coal mine approvals a slap in the face for bushfire survivors

BUSHFIRE SURVIVORS FOR CLIMATE ACTION (BSCA) has spoken out in response to the news that Environment Minister Tanya Plibersek has approved three new large coal mining projects in NSW: Whitehaven Coal's Narrabri thermal coal project to 2066, MACH Energy's Mount Pleasant thermal coal project to 2058, and Yancoal's Ashton coal project to 2064.

The Albanese Government's three new coal mine expansions will emit 1.4 billion tonnes of carbon pollution, more than three times Australia's total annual emissions. The Government refused to consider the climate impacts of these massive coal projects, and is refusing to fix Australia's environment laws to consider climate

change and protect nature.

Just two months ago Bushfire Survivors for Climate Action delivered a joint BSCA-Climate Council petition to the Environment Minister with over 11,000 signatures asking the government to fix these laws and to pause approvals of coal and gas projects until they adequately considered climate impacts. And in 2023 the tiny charity, founded and led by bushfire survivors, challenged Whitehaven's Narrabri project in court by challenging the decision of the NSW Independent Planning Commission on the grounds that in the face of the climate impacts already being experienced by the people, environment and economy of NSW, the approval was legally unreasonable. The group lost the case.

"We've done everything we can to protect our homes - even to the extent of taking on a massive coal company in the courts." said Serena Joyner, Chief Executive Officer of Bushfire Survivors

for Climate Action.

"We can't do anything more, and yet the Government keeps raising the risk level. This is a cowardly decision by the Albanese Government that is actively failing to take real climate action to protect our communities from worsening fires, floods, and extreme weather. If this government won't stand up to the coal billionaires and polluters, then who will? Who will say no to these projects?"

Speaking from her new home on the mid-north coast of NSW Fiona Lee has said she is devastated. "Nearly 5 years ago I lost my home to the climate-fueled bushfires of 2019-20. Now Tanya Plibersek has the audacity to greenlight three more coal mines. Approving coal while we brace for even worse fires? That's not

leadership—it's betrayal."

Jo Dodds, President of Bushfire Survivors for Climate Action has spoken about the impact on locals of the Narrabri mine expansion. "BSCA visited the Narrabri community during preparation for our legal action to stop the expansion of the Whitehaven coal mine. We talked to locals, business owners, First Nations people, farmers and politicians. Not one person we talked to was happy about the mine.

"They feared the impacts on water, the damage to the land, the pollution to the very air they breathe. They feared more frequent, more destructive bushfires. With the Government's approval of these three mines, the fears of this community have been

realised.

"Even as we mark the 5 year anniversaries of so many who lost everything in the Black Summer fires, bushfire survivors are having to face the fact that the Australian Government is failing to take genuine meaningful action to protect them from climate-fuelled fires and wondering who will? It's a huge slap in the face. It's hard not to take it personally - in fact we do."

Supermarket oligopoly on notice

Australia's supermarket giants are using their dominance to extract huge profits from farmers and families, a report from Australia's competition watchdog has found.

Today the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) released its interim report into the nation's major supermarkets, uncovering a worsening pattern of "excessive" prices and market power misuse in the sector.

NSW Farmers Principal Economist Samuel Miller said the findings had come as no surprise, with farmers and families having long suffered at the hands of the nation's supermarket duopoly.

"Prices are rock bottom at the farm gate, and sky high at the checkout – it's clear these supermarket superpowers are pushing up profits and leaving farmers and families to foot the bill," Mr Miller said.

"For years, farmers and families have suffered as our supermarket profits have soared, and there has been a total lack of accountability or penalties for any unconscionable behaviour impacting the supply chain to date.

"Farmers have been unable to speak out for fear of retribution, and families have been left with no choice but to hand over their hard-earned money to this monopoly – and that must stop."

Mr Miller said farmers had a short window to get perishable agricultural goods – such as fruits and vegetables – to consumers, and supermarkets had often used this fact to pressure farmers into either taking lower prices or leaving food to rot.

As the ACCC continued its investigations, and with legal action underway on a 'fake discount' scandal, Mr Miller said tough penalties and expanded powers for the competition watchdog were vital to bring Australia's grocery giants to account.

"A mandatory, enforceable Food and Grocery Code is a positive step, and will go some of the way to address this culture of unconscionable behaviour we're seeing within Australian supermarkets, but it's not the end of the road for competition reform," Mr Miller said.

"These superpowers are not only reaping huge profits, but they are doing so at farmers and

families' expense.

"We need solutions to increase price transparency, an economy-wide prohibition on unfair trading practices and new divestiture powers to bust apart duopolies in cases of extreme bad behaviour, if we want to sort these superpowers for once and for all.

"We know exactly how our supermarkets have been treating us, and we can't let them keep pushing us up against the wall – or else more and more Aussie families simply won't be able to afford to put fresh food on the table every day."

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New Nowra TAFE course to launch careers in avionics industry





Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips and Defence Industry Minister Pat Conroy announced a \$124 million upgrade to HMAS Albatross last year. It's hoped the new Nowra TAFE course will help fill the shortage of aircraft maintenance engineers.

South Coast students will have an opportunity to launch a career in the defence industry, with a new avionics course on offer at Nowra TAFE for the first time.

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips said the new Certificate II Aeroskills course would open up learning pathways for local students looking to work in the avionics industry.

"It's fantastic that local students are now able to access this course at Nowra TAFE where they can gain the entry-level skills needed in aviation maintenance workshops," Mrs Phillips said.

"We're a Navy town, home to HMAS Albatross, HMAS Creswell and the Royal Australian Naval College, so it's really important that we have defence-related TAFE courses on offer here to give local students an entry into the industry.

"Defence and defence industry are our biggest employers, and this Aeroskills course will provide local students with an opportunity fill in-demand roles, such as aircraft maintenance engineers and aircraft line maintenance workers."

The new course will give students an insight from industry-experienced teachers to ensure planes fly smoothly and safely through a mixture of theory and practical units. Students will gain practical experience and develop specialist skills to give them an advantage in the job market, including working on real aircraft components on a variety of aircraft and working safely and sustainably in the industry.

The course provides students with credits towards higher level qualifications including a Diploma of Aeroskills (Avionics).

Mrs Phillips said the six-month course would equip students with job-ready skills in welding and fabrication, including repairing and overhauling aircraft electrical, hydraulic, pneumatic, electro-hydraulic, and electro-pneumatic components.

"We already have industry-leading businesses like Sikorsky Australia, QinetiQ and Global Defence Solutions employing and training young people in the Shoalhaven, and this is another opportunity for local students to take up exciting defence-related careers without having to leave home," she added. "People may not know that, in Nowra, we have more than 200 highly-skilled workers keeping the MH-60R Seahawk Romeo helicopter fleet in the sky, and demand for these skills will grow as the Australian Government expands the fleet from the current 23 to 36 aircraft.

"Last year, locals might be surprised to learn that the first-ever deep-level maintenance of a United States Navy MH-60R Seahawk Romeo helicopter was completed by Sikorsky Australia right here in the Shoalhaven."

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100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society



Truck on Narooma Punt

27-09-1924

The foreman, Mr. Piggott, who will have a gang of ten workmen, has arrived and will commence the renovations to the local Post Office next Tuesday. In the meantime the telephone mechanics are busy removing the switch board.

Three more subscribers' names have been added to the local telephone exchange, viz., Nurse Heffernan, Messrs. V. Ryan (Mynora), and W. Dennis (Turlinjah). When renovations have been made to the Post Office the list will be further increased by four.

The shearing of 700 sheep on Mr. L. Hawdon's property "Kyla Park," has just been finished, and the result of the wool clip is excellent. Mr. Hawdon also expects 80 per cent of lambs this season. Mr. C. Stockman, of Tuross, has also had a very satisfactory shearing of about the same number of sheep. It is the opinion of those well versed in the golden fleece industry that in no time much of our coastal land, particularly from Bergalia, will carry sheep instead of cattle, as it did in years gone by.

The old historic Bodalla Cheese Factories have now been merged into a Co-operative Company, which proposes operating two factories under separate Committees of Management with one Board representative of both governing the whole. At a meeting held last week, with the object of finalizing arrangements for taking over the factories from the proprietors of the Bodalla Estate, the following Directorate was elected: - Messrs. D. Hutchinson, H. J. Bate, H. Bridges, A. F. Emmott, and J. Crapp. The Company will retain the "Bodalla" brand, which has become a household word.

At Narooma last week a heavy lorry went on to the ferry punt, followed by Mr. Knight's lorry. On arrival at the northern side, the heavy lorry left the punt, causing the stern of the punt to dip. ... The result was the remaining lorry took a run backwards. The back wheels went over the end of the punt into the water. The punt was brought back to shallow water on the southern bank, where the lorry was eventually landed after much difficulty. Traffic was held up for an hour

Mr. George Bellette, of Mogo, had a narrow escape from death through a limb of a tree falling on him and injuring his skull. On examination Dr. Cutler found it necessary to insert ten stitches in the wound, and the patient is now progressing favorably.

The Shire Council's stone breaking plant has been transferred from Yarragee quarry to the Black Hill, and has been set up there to break stone for re-metalling Coila Flat, which work, it is expected, will be completed within three or four weeks. The plant will then be shifted to Bodalla, when re-metalling Tuross and Trunkitabella flats will commence.

New initiatives to invest in First Nations art and Commissioners appointed to lead culture shaped by community voices

Creative Australia has launched the first round of First Nations First industry development initiatives, informed by extensive community consultation on the sector's priorities and needs.

The new programs include a range of opportunities for young people. There is also investment in creative business development, music and a suite of new awards to recognise and celebrate First Nations artists and

The programs have been developed in response to community consultation on pillar one of the National Cultural Policy, Revive, First Nations First.

Executive Director First Nations Arts and Culture Franchesca Cubillo said "The initiatives directly respond to the priorities shared by our communities and the sector during our extensive conversations with artists, elders and cultural leaders across the country. We heard the calls for opportunities that strengthen business capabilities, create pathways for our young people and ensure the transfer of intergenerational knowledge.

By enhancing our current programs and introducing new ones, we continue to build on the proud 50-year legacy of First Nations leadership and investment at Creative Australia.

Thew new initiatives include:

Young People: First Nations Arts and Culture Project Fund – Grants from \$10,000 to \$20,000 available to build the capacity of First Nations young people's skills development, career pathways, marketing and audience development to maintain and elevate their practice and engagement in the arts and cultural sectors.

<u>Creative Business: First Nations Development Fund</u> – providing grants from \$10,000 to \$50,000 to build sustainable business practices and support economic and social development opportunities.

<u>Space to Create First Nations Music Residency</u> – building on the success of the existing program, it will be expanded to a two-week residency. The residency opportunity is open to emerging through to established First Nations musicians, artists, songwriters, audio engineers, producers and those employed in the music industry

First Nations Arts and Culture Awards

There will more opportunities to recognise and celebrate the contribution of First Nations artists and leaders, with updates to the First Nations Arts and Culture Awards, delivered every year on 27 May, the anniversary of the 1967 referendum

In 2025, the prestigious <u>Red Ochre Award for Lifetime Achievement</u> will be expanded to recognise senior artists for their achievement in advocacy and leadership, including:

Red Ochre Award for Lifetime Achievement in Artistic Excellence Two awarded at \$60,000 for outstanding lifetime achievement in artistic practice.

Red Ochre Award for Lifetime Achievement in Cultural Advocacy and Leadership

Two awarded at \$60,000 for outstanding lifetime achievement in cultural advocacy and leadership for a senior Australian First Nations arts leader or arts and cultural worker.

Other new awards being offered for the first time in 2025 include:

- Established Artist of the Year for Outstanding Achievement in the Arts \$25,000)
- Youth Award for Achievement in the Arts (18-35 years of Age) (\$25,000)
- First Nations Arts and Culture Business Innovation Award (\$25,000)

consultation with Aboriginal people on agreement making

The NSW Government is delivering on its election commitment to consult with Aboriginal people about their desire for a treaty process, with the appointment of three commissioners to lead a process with Aboriginal people and communities across NSW.

The commissioners will lead a 12-month consultation to hear from Aboriginal people. This will include asking whether Aboriginal communities want an agreement-making process with government, and if so, what form that process could take. NSW is home to the largest Aboriginal population in Australia. The commissioners will engage with Aboriginal communities across metropolitan, rural, regional and remote parts of NSW, before delivering a report on their findings to the Government.

The appointees bring with them experience, expertise and connections to Aboriginal people and communities. The Government has appointed former senator Aden Ridgeway, academic Todd Fernando and Koori Mail newspaper editor Naomi Moran to the roles. The commissioners have been appointed for a fixed term of two years following an open, competitive process led by an independent Aboriginal advisory panel.

Consultation about agreement making aligns directly with NSW's bipartisan commitment to the 2020 Closing the Gap National Agreement signed by then prime minister Scott Morrison and then premier Gladys Berejiklian.

The Closing the Gap Agreement includes a commitment to formal partnerships and shared decision-making with Aboriginal people to help close the gap faster in areas such as life expectancy, health and education.

Over coming months, the commissioners will develop a detailed consultation plan, with consultations to commence in 2025. Interstate treaty and agreement-making processes have not been simple nor fast.

Tackle World Moruya

Moruya River.

I didn't think winter was going to let us go soo easily, but I think it time it visited the northern hemisphere for about 6 months, wouldn't you agree? That southerly change has really only affected us, and our desires to get out into the cold blustery conditions.

Moruya river has been providing a bit of action this last week for those that have found a favourable weather window to get out and fish. The Preddy's wharf area has been providing plenty of light tackle action, with a good population of salmon still holding up in the river. Small metals have been the go to suit the lighter setups commonly used in the river. 5-10 gram seems to be the size choice, and salmon on light gear is a lot of fun. Especially with the school holidays starting this weekend. Expect Preddy's to get busy again for a few weeks. The back of the hole in the wall still has some active flathead, with bream also becoming more prevalent. Expect a few Luderick to also be holding in the deeper holes and the oyster racks this area has. The hole in front of Malabar creek, outside the sanctuary zone in the Moruya river is worth a look, as reports of good fish lurking down deep have come to light. Either from the bank, or from the water this hole can be accessed, with the water based option being the better

The deeper sections of the river are still a bit on the cooler side, slowly worked lures, of the vibe or soft plastic style will tempt both bream and flathead to bite.

Up in the fresh, the bass are making their move further upstream, and I managed several nice fish last Sunday to 45cm all on spinnerbaits. The fish are there, but are not super active, and sometimes required several lure colour changes to find the right one before getting one to commit. I am waiting for the weather to warm and the cicadas to start chirping before going to surface lures.

Tuross River.

Flathead are on top of the reports this last week, with good fish most active in the shallow back bays that warming quickly and have minimal tidal current. Small grub or paddle style soft plastics have been working well in these areas.

Our good mate Mal got into some cracking nice Luderick this morning, with the best fish pushing 45cm. Pics will be below. Finding a spot out of this wind will be challenging this weekend, with more 40kph wind forecast for both Saturday and Sunday.

Tuross is a great system for less than favourable weather condition though, as there are plenty of nooks that can be found to get respite from the weather. Get out there and explore this weekend.

Rock and beach.

The salmon continue to play hide and seek with anglers this week. But for those that managed to find them, it was a fish a cast on some schools. The wind sock is always a good first place to look, followed by the Moruya break-wall, then down the coast towards Bingie. We are spoiled with sooo many option to fish, which at times can be both a blessing and a curse.

Offshore.

Winds will be strong this weekend, with NW forecast to 40kph on Sunday. If you are planning on heading out front, make sure you and your boat are well prepared to be out there. I know Maritime were on the radio this morning about boat maintenance, with over 70% of call outs responded to being either battery or fuel related.

Preventative maintenance helps every one out.

With that said, there have been consistent reports of both snapper and flathead this week, with plenty of depth options available. Stay close in or head wide, the fish are around and the water temps are continuing to climb slowly.

The bait freezer isn't too bad at the moment with the only gap being hawksbury prawns, as supply is an issue at the moment. We have plenty of salted pilchards at the moment, along with most other baits to cover your for the holidays. I also have posted on our Facebook page, a flyer from Tweed Bait, explaining why we have been getting different looking prawns for a while now. Have a read it

Darrell said "From self-improvement both mentally & physically to representing Australia in the world championships the members of this club have gone on to many endeavours in their lives that they previously would not have thought possible.

The self-discipline & confidence that the martial arts system teaches has a way of weaving itself into the personality of the serious practitioner, this we believe influences everyday decisions in a more positive way. Karate is like many other things in life, the more dedicated you are, the harder you work, the more you achieve.

- Colon King, who had the dedication to travel from Vincentia to Batemans Bay to train each week, Colon obtained his black belt in 2007.
- Tim O'Neill, who was the backbone of the Batemans Bay Club for many years with his dedication and teaching abilities, Tim got his black belt in 2018.

Among other senior grade members present were:

- Marcus Lyons who obtained his brown belt in the Braidwood Club which we started in 1985.
- Joselyn Humphries a current training member of the Batemans Bay Club who has been steadily climbing up through the ranks. Now a Brown belt and only two grades under her black belt grading. Joselyn also assists with teaching and had her 18th birthday this week, congratulations Joselyn.
