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Fire and Rescue NSW Crews attend skydiving mishap - Moruya

Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) crews have helped save a skydiver, who landed in a tree on Tuesday at Moruya.

FRNSW personnel joined NSW Police, NSW Ambulance, State Emergency Service and NSW Rural Fire Service crews to reach the man.

The skydiver found himself hanging upside down, stuck in the tree, around 40-metres off the ground near the Moruya Airport.

The man manoeuvred himself into a fork of the tree where he then turned himself upright. An arborist from the skydiving company accessed the parachutist by climbing above him and attaching ropes that allowed FRNSW crews to lower him to the ground.

The rescue took approximately two and a half hours, and the man was uninjured. Photos FRNSW

Health District Board minutes edited

In August, proponents of radiotherapy services for the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital, were surprised to happen upon the 22 August 2023 Southern NSW Local Health District Board Minutes, showing slabs of relevant text highlighted. This text regarding the Prof Mick Reid report into the feasibility of local Radiotherapy Services, supported the need for the service and estimated the cost of \$30m for the build.

Keen followers of local health services have now discovered that those minutes were replaced in early October, with a version without the highlighted sections.

While the cat is now out of the bag, with the information available from the release of the complete Reid Report (under Freedom of Information), the question is, which version of the minutes was officially accepted by the board at the September 2023 meeting?

Was the wrong set of minutes (before redactions and approval,) erroneously uploaded to the website? And if so, why wasn't the public allowed to know fairly basic statistical information on the local health district? Are all the minutes as heavily redacted before approval?

Moruya Public School teacher awarded by Together for Humanity

Moruya Public School teacher Eliza Cannon has been recognised at the inaugural Together for Humanity (TFH) National Awards for Intercultural Excellence, have been held via an online ceremony. Attending were representatives from 16 Australian schools, guest speaker Giridharan Sivaraman, Australian Human Rights Commission Race Discrimination Commissioner, and Peter Khalil MP, Special Envoy for Social Cohesion. TFH's mission is to create a more cohesive, inclusive society free of racism and prejudice, where all young people feel they belong. The awards were launched by the educational not-for-profit to recognise high school student champions, as well as teachers, teams, or schools who demonstrate leadership, passion and influence in intercultural and/or interfaith issues. Recipients were awarded across four categories.

'Individual Teacher' and 'School Team' awards recognised teachers or school teams who facilitated curriculum enhancement, interschool initiatives, community engagement and whole-school approaches. 'Individual Student' and 'Student Team' awards recognised high school students or student teams promoting, encouraging or advocating for intercultural or interfaith understanding in areas including diversity and inclusion, anti-racism, human rights and reconciliation.

Awards were presented to one individual student, four student teams. two individual teachers and nine school teams from Government, Independent and Catholic schools located in NSW, Victoria and South

It's inspiring to see students, teachers and schools championing inclusion and promoting intercultural initiatives in their communities," said Rabbi Zalman Kastel AM, Dean and Founder of Together For Humanity. Eliza Cannon's National Award for Intercultural Excellence, in the Individual Teacher Award Recipients category was for implementing coordinated initiatives to close gaps between Indigenous and non-Indigenous students.



Our Country in Healing Hands: new disaster resilience projects in Eurobodalla

Fire to Flourish Eurobodalla and the Australian Communities Foundation are delighted to announce the successful applicants for the Our Country in Healing Hands community funding round. This round saw Eurobodalla community members take the lead in funding decision making, allocating funding to 12 local projects that prioritise caring for land, health and wellbeing:

- 1. Fireboy: This documentary film is the story of a Yuin boy's journey across the Country in search of ancestral fire lore and knowledge, to protect his community and regenerate traditional lands.
- 2.Connect 2 Flourish: This event series at Little Paddocks is a set of community gatherings and wellness workshops, including ceramics, playback theatre, chakra dance, mindfulness tasters, pit-fired pottery, a bushfire readiness expo, exhibition and mini festival.
- 3. Yarning on Country: An immersive Men's Healing program combining Traditional yarning circles and Cultural workshops to promote community resilience.
- 4. Umbarra's Healing: This project creates community cultural awareness, promotes Indigenous land management, strengthens community disaster resilience and environmental connectedness.
- 5. Colours of Resilience: This project heals communities through colour therapy, fostering connection, creativity, and strength with Aboriginal artists and Safe Space for You.
- 6. Embers to Essence: The Ember to Essence festival is a threeday music event commemorating the 5th Anniversary of the Black Summer Bushfires.
- 7. Bangguri Gadhu Food Trailer: This project aims to serve as a dependable source of food for communities during times of crisis, while providing employment for young people.
- 8. Dark South Wellbeing Program: This program offers limited scholarship spots for a boxing camp focused on building physical fitness, mental resilience and personal growth, tailored for all skill levels in a supportive environment.
- 9. Traditional Aboriginal Healing: This project cultivates cultural and social work practices to improve social and emotional wellbeing and strengthen disaster resilience.
- 10. Salt Dust Connection: Gwiyaala Aboriginal Art free art workshops where you can come and paint as you share your stories.
- 11. Dive & Draw: This program will give young people the immersive experience of live 'dry dives' using underwater drones, followed by guided art sessions to share their inspiration, connecting them with local sea country and encouraging creative expression.
- 12. Back to Home: The Back to Home project will host skill building workshops collectively resulting in a transportable housing prototype suited to community-led responses.



Each project supports Eurobodalla community organisations and locals through empowerment, self-efficacy and self- determination – part of Fire to Flourish's ongoing trials of innovative, flexible, accessible disaster funding for communities affected by the 2019/20 bushfires.

"What we have seen to be the most rewarding aspect of this journey is the ongoing commitment that communities demonstrate to supporting one another," said Barb Rix, Indigenous Facilitator with Fire to Flourish Eurobodalla.

"We have seen amazing grassroots concepts from people and have been privileged to see them grow and develop into real tangible outcomes. It's a proud moment for all, an exciting showcase of our community's strengths." The Eurobodalla team began the process for this round with a First Nations Leadership in Disaster Resilience Gathering in March 2024, These priorities then formed a foundation for proposals and scoping of Our Country in Healing Hands projects, with community project mentors providing ongoing support to locals as they developed their ideas.

Eurobodalla's new Councillors took their Oath or Affirmation of Office on Monday morning which was followed up with two days of training.

Council reported that "Next week will be their first round of briefings on a range of current issues and projects ahead of the first Council Meeting of the term on Tuesday 29 October. With four staying on from the previous Council, one returning and four new Councillors there will be much to familiarise themselves with.

A series of training sessions for almost 1,300 newly elected councillors in NSW will provide essential information for councillors to effectively serve their communities over the next four years.

The Office of Local Government will be hosting 'Hit the Ground Running' webinars for several weeks to help new and returning councillors understand their duties and responsibilities.

The webinars will cover a wide range of important topics including financial management, appropriate conduct and ethical decision making, roles and responsibilities, corruption risks and prevention, meeting practices and strategic planning.

The state's 128 councils employ more than 50,000 people, invest more than \$15 billion each year in the delivery of services and around \$7 billion on new and existing infrastructure.

Overseeing this work is a critical responsibility and these training sessions will ensure councillors can commence the new term of council with a strong understanding of the job ahead of them.

The webinars will also assist councils with satisfying the requirement to deliver training for new and returning councillors within six months of their election. Councillors will receive a certificate of attendance for each webinar they participate in to help councils comply with their reporting obligations regarding councillor training.

Making insurers pay the bills

The NSW Government is taking steps to ensure the nation's big four insurers pay their bills when they use public hospitals.

The Government will bring back legislation passed by thentreasurer Mike Baird in 2013 when the same insurers refused to pay the correct single room rate.

The decision follows four months of negotiations that have not yet produced a result.

The cost of caring for a patient in a NSW public hospital is \$1075 per day.

In the last financial year, the single room rate was gazetted at \$892.

- HCF is only paying \$463. This costs NSW Health \$40.5 million per annum.
- NIB is only paying \$491. This costs NSW Health \$17.6 million per annum.
- Bupa is only paying \$501. This costs NSW Health \$35.8 million per annum.
- Medibank is only paying \$515. This costs NSW Health \$33.4 million per annum.

The refusal of some private insurers to pay the correct rate is estimated to cost the public system close to \$140 million a year overall.

Over the past five years, it has cost SNSWHD hospitals \$18.9 million.

This is money that could be used to expand and improve essential health services in the Bega electorate.

Meanwhile, since insurance companies stopped paying the correct rates, their profits have doubled. In 2022-23 alone the industry recorded a \$2.2 billion profit, a rise of 110 per cent from the previous year.

At the same time the proportion of premiums they return to their customers has fallen from 88.03 per cent in 2019-2020 to 82.61 per cent in 2022-23.

44 of 53 private health insurers are either already paying the correct rate or have now agreed to resume paying after discussions with the NSW Government. This includes Teachers Health, Nurses and Midwives Health and Emergency Service Health.

The Government commends those funds who continue to pay the gazetted single room rate and will continue to work with them

Twenty-one percent of patients who are admitted to our local hospitals are admitted as private patients.

They receive excellent care and they want to use their health insurance to support their local hospitals.

When I worked as a specialist in the Eurobodalla, private patients were not charged more than the rebate provided by their private health fund as an agreement with NSW Health and private health insurers.

Also, the hospitals in the Bega electorate continue to waive any excess for patients with health insurance.

What these nine health funds are doing is simply not fair.

The money that should be paid to New South Wales would fund more staff, more equipment, more upgrades, and more procedures in our local hospitals.

If you are a member of one of the health funds which is not doing the right thing, consider that before you renew your policy.

Nature Negative: How NSW is destroying the homes of our most iconic endangered animals

Nature Negative: How governments are pushing greater gliders towards extinction, reveals that current regulations for logging operations amount to a "licence to kill" endangered species. The report by **Forest Alliance NSW** (FANSW) profiles four state forests where community surveys were done before logging operations: Tallaganda, Styx River, Bulga and Tuggalo. The report found that community surveys in those forests were able to identify up to 10 times the number of endangered greater glider den trees, than Forestry Corporation NSW (FCNSW) surveys. The report estimates that less than 1% of den trees for endangered greater gliders are identified by FCNSW in their pre-logging surveys, calling into question whether the regulations are intending to protect endangered species or protect native hardwood supply.

"Something is clearly wrong with how Forestry Corporation is operating if the community can find five to ten times the number of gliders that Forestry Corporation can," said FANSW spokesperson Justin Field.

Justin Field Forest Alliance NSW spokesperson says "There is no doubt that a large proportion of the 825 greater gliders that the community has identified in these forests will be killed as a result of Forestry Corporation's hopelessly inadequate procedures." "It's time for the Minns' Government to step up to save these species from an industry that has proven it cannot operate in our native forests without sending species towards extinction.

"The State Government is knowingly complicit in this destruction whilst it refuses to halt logging in these areas."

"The community shouldn't have to step up to do the work our State agencies are failing to do.

"Time after time, the Forestry Corporation has been found guilty of breaking the law. It's time for the Minns' Government to step up to save these species from oblivion."

Susie Russell, Save Bulga Forest spokesperson says "The message is falling on deaf ears. This Government is wiping out thriving communities of Greater Gliders while suggesting they have a 'Nature Positive' agenda."

"Noone knows what they mean by Nature Positive if it doesn't include protecting the known homes of our most iconic and endangered fauna.

"The Greater Glider just won a competition for Marsupial of the Year. The public are getting to know and love this special and unique animal, but there are several Greater Glider hotspots currently being logged and most of the Greater Gliders get zero protection from NSW and Commonwealth environment laws." Ms Russell has been in one of the surveyed forests, Bulga State Forest. Locals from the Bulga Plateau have been trying to convince the NSW Government that if they actually want to save Greater Gliders and Koalas from extinction, they need to stop destroying their homes. Logging has begun and there have been 16 arrests to date of people attempting to defend the glider trees.

"We know these endangered animals are in this part of the forest, we know that many of them will die if logging continues." Dr Kita Ashman, WWF-Australia ecologist says "This report shows that Forestry Corporation's surveys are laughably inadequate. Survey methods must be updated to ensure greater gliders and their den trees are identified and strongholds are formally protected.

"Places like Tallaganda, Styx River, Bulga and Tuggalo are essential to the persistence of greater gliders in NSW. They generally stay cool and wet and protect gliders from the extremes of climate change. If we continue to knock down these forests, we're locking in extinction for this species.

"Greater glider numbers have crashed in the past 20 years. We don't have time to keep getting this wrong."

Andrew Wong, Wilderness Australia's Operations Manager said "Community survey efforts for greater gliders have far exceeded those of FCNSW. This shows that FCNSW make little effort when it comes to finding greater gliders, a fact that the current logging rules enable."

Key findings of the report include:

- Community survey data indicates that greater gliders are only persisting in certain locations mostly cool, wet areas of refugia and declining rapidly elsewhere.
- A major driver of this decline is the destruction of habitat by the native forest logging industry. Other drivers are loss of suitable den trees from bushfires, and increasing overnight maximum temperatures.
- Within the four State Forests assessed, community groups have identified 170 greater glider den trees, over ten times more than the 15 that were found by Forestry Corporation NSW (FCNSW).
- Over 91% of den trees within the report's survey area were identified as a result of community efforts.
- We estimate less than 1% of den trees are found using the requirements of the Site Specific Biodiversity Condition (SSBC) under current logging protocols in high density areas.
- Current NSW logging rules require logging exclusion zones to be applied to FCNSW's sightings of greater gliders. Yet the 825 greater gliders found by community groups will receive no protection under this same rule.

The Nature Conservation Council has called for urgent interim action as NSW clears 570 football fields of habitat each day.

The NCĆ said "The latest vegetation clearing data shows that clearing continues to devastate large swathes of habitat every year. In NSW, an equivalent of 300 times the Sydney CBD is cleared annually, or 570 football fields

The annual Statewide Land and Tree Study (SLATS) data released last month shows, yet again, a shocking amount of habitat was cleared across the state, taking the average to 84,000 hectares of native vegetation (defined as trees, shrubs or woody vines, or understory and groundcover plants that have been relatively undisturbed since 1990[1]) being cleared every year for the past five years.

Habitat clearing is, alongside climate change, the most significant threat to species in NSW[2], the <u>worst ranked state</u> in the country for protecting and restoring trees."

18-10-1924

What might have resulted in a very serious accident befell Mrs. W. Lyons, of Mt. Oldrey, on Tuesday. The lady was going from town when a swarm of bees settled on the horse she was driving. Eurobodalla and Bega Valley to benefit following visitor economy review

Millions of extra airline seats, tens of thousands of hotel rooms and a focus on experience-led tourism will transform the state's visitor economy into a \$91 billion powerhouse as set out in a government review of the NSW Visitor Economy Strategy.

The **NSW Government** will adopt a more ambitious goal of \$91 billion in annual visitor economy expenditure by 2035 – a 40% increase on the previous goal. The accelerated growth is expected to provide a big economic windfall for regional communities, with \$44 billion (48%) of the \$91 billion expected to be spent in regional NSW.

The visitor economy is already the lifeblood of much of regional NSW, from Byron Bay to Broken Hill and Parkes to Perisher Valley, it attracted more than 65.4 million visitors in the year ending June 2024 with visitors spending a record \$26.1 billion.

This ambitious growth trajectory will further cement tourism as a critical pillar of future growth in the NSW economy, driving up to 150,000 additional jobs by 2035.

Regional NSW currently accounts for over 55 per cent of direct tourism jobs and is the regional destination of choice in share of total visitors and nights. Regional NSW offers unrivalled diversity of experiences including the first view of sunrise on mainland Australia, the country's highest peak and the oldest wine region.

The next decade of growth in the visitor economy will be underpinned by a potential increase of 8.5 million airline seats due to the new Newcastle Airport international terminal opening in 2025, the opening of the Western Sydney International Airport in 2026, increased capacity at Sydney Airport and growth in cross-border arrivals through Canberra Airport and Gold Coast Airport.

Member for Bega Dr Michael Holland said the recommendations were welcome news for the region.

"The Bega Electorate has so many incredible experiences to offer visitors and I am thrilled to see the review of the visitor economy strategy will have an experience-led focus for the sector," Dr Michael Holland said.

"The visitor economy makes a vital social and economic contribution to Eurobodalla and Bega Valley, supporting local businesses and providing career pathways for the region. We are committed to growing the sector in line with the recommendations set out in the review of the statewide strategy."

To meet the \$91 billion stretch goal, the review highlights key challenges including:

- The need for 40,000 extra hotel rooms, a 41% increase on what's currently available
- Significant worker and skills shortages in roles such as tour guides and chefs
- Need for increased business event facilities in Sydney, Western Sydney and priority regional areas.

The review sets out a series of recommendations for achieving the stretch goal including:

- Prioritise the NSW Visitor Economy Strategy as a government-wide economic focus.
- Anchor the Visitor Economy Strategy around 'experience tourism'
- Celebrate First Nations culture and businesses through authentic visitor experiences.
- Increase accommodation quality across regional NSW and quantity in Greater Sydney.
- Boost aviation capacity in key domestic and international markets.
- Leverage leisure events to grow season al visitation and showcase NSW's strengths.
- · Dominate Australia's business events sector.
- Capitalise on NSW's status as being number one for international students.
- Foster a diverse, skilled visitor economy workforce.

The NSW visitor economy is the biggest in Australia, achieving a record \$53 billion in expenditure in FY24 and employing almost 300,000 workers. The NSW Visitor Economy Strategy 2030 had a target of \$65 billion. The review of the 2030 strategy will inform the new NSW Visitor Economy Strategy 2035, which will be released in the coming months.

A summary of the review of the NSW Visitor Economy Strategy 2030 is available here. Premier of New South Wales Chris Minns said:

"From pristine beaches to lush national parks, NSW is an unbeatable hotspot for tourists across the globe.

"Our visitor economy is already at a record high, but this review shows there are opportunities to grow it even more, partially due to more airports opening and more flight routes being secured.

"We are ready to put our shoulder to the wheel and attract even more travellers to NSW, boosting local business and creating thousands of jobs."

Minister for the Arts, Minister for Music and the Night-time Economy, and Minister for Jobs and Tourism John Graham said:

"This is a very exciting moment for the NSW visitor economy. We're taking a sector that is already very strong and raising our ambitions even higher.

"This review dares us to dream big, but it also outlines the hard work needed to meet the opportunity.

"To reach this ambitious new target we need to build more hotel rooms, attract and train more workers and create and market the experiences that connect visitors with the culture, nature and people of NSW.

"NSW has the nature, the culture and incredible experiences. We just need to match it with hard work and planning."

Gadfly

I had a call from Longreach last night. It was my old mate Alan Blunt from the shearing sheds of my youth. He's a bush poet, a former middleweight champion of Julia Creek, and a lifelong Labor man.

He stunned me when he said, 'I reckon Trump'll win, and a good thing too.' It was a long phone call and he even had me half convinced that a President Trump would be better for Australia than the Democrats' Kamala Harris.

He's no male chauvinist. On the contrary, his best friend is Heather, a lovely Longreach lady and the nurses who call by his place regularly these days dote on him. Instead, it's about the big picture, the difference between the mainstream Democrats like Biden/Harris and (in my view) a Republican liar, cheat and bully, a Narcissus with scary authoritarian tendencies.

Alan more or less agrees with me. But in his view, it's these very Trumpian qualities that commend him to Australia. Sure, he says, the man admires dictators like Putin and the murderous Saudi Crown Prince; he gets 'beautiful letters' from Kim Jong Un and Xi Jinping. Even the execrable Netanyahu is hanging out for a Trump return to the Oval Office.

How the hell does that help Australia?

Well, here's the thing, he says. He's worried that Kamala Harris would follow her White House predecessor by pouring more and more deadly arms and ammunition into the Ukraine and Israel until the 'tactical nuclear response' becomes inevitable from one side or the other.

The same thought has occurred to me. We also fear that Kamala would follow her patron Nancy Pelosi with a foolish gesture to visit Taipei, despite the 'One China' policy that they and we adhere to formally if not whole-heartedly…and Dutton's Liberals not at all.

War with China is idiocy in spades, and as Alan sees it, there's absolutely no way that Trump would let the US military loose in a war over Taiwan. 'All bullies are cowards,' he says and the idea of putting his troops in harm's way is abhorrent. Instead, he'll use tariffs and the other old instruments of trade protection like quotas and government subsidies.


'It's all about "the art of the deal" mate,' he says, 'and you can be damn sure [or words to that effect] he will not go to war with China, even if his mate Xi mounts a full-scale invasion. And that's great for Australia.'

Alan, like many old Labor men, is no great fan of the Americans. Not surprising, I guess, when they seem determined to rule the roost at the barrel of a gun. We both also agree that if US voters re-elect Trump, America's international standing would take a disastrous dive. That doesn't trouble Alan at all, but it fills me with pain. In so many ways the US is the engine room of progress.

Just recall the speed with which their scientists created a vaccine that saved millions of lives from COVID-19. Think of Jonas Salk who lifted the curse of polio from the children of the world. Remember their coming to Australia's rescue from Japanese invasion in WWII. Revel in the gift of John Steinbeck, the courage and wisdom of Franklin Roosevelt, the songs of Frank Sinatra and Barbra Streisand, Judy Garland and Louis Armstrong, the genius of Stephen Spielberg, the humour of George Burns and Walter Matthau.

Well yes, there is another side: the mad religiosity, the gun loving stupidity and pathetic notions of exceptionalism. But even though Trump turns them to his favour at the ballot box, they really don't deserve a return to the chaos he represents. And neither do we.







Government must support local and independent news in lieu of Royal Commission or media inquiry

The Environment and Communications Legislation Committee on Thursday released recommendations that the proposed Murdoch Media Inquiry Bill 2023 not be passed.

The Committee found that the establishment of a Commission of Inquiry "was not the most appropriate mechanism for addressing the challenges facing Australia's media landscape, especially since a significant range of measures to address the issues have already been initiated".

This is despite acknowledging that submitters to the inquiry were "overwhelmingly in favour of an inquiry into the current state of media diversity, the conduct of media outlets in Australia and their impact on our democracy, with a particular focus on the Murdoch media".

The report made several references to the Local and Independent News Association's (LINA) 2023 submission to the Committee, such as LINA's discussion of many of the current challenges to the sustainability of local and independent news media. These include media concentration, audience moves to digital consumption and the weakening of business models sustained by advertising and user-fees on a global scale.

LINA's recommendation that an inquiry should not slow down the implementation of measures to support local news media was quoted in the report:

"LINA shares the Commonwealth's objectives to reduce news deserts and strengthen public interest news services for communities across Australia. From that perspective, LINA supports the rationale behind the Murdoch Media Inquiry Bill, but notes that it should not delay already overdue actions to curb the closure of local newsrooms and the reduction of journalism skills in regions. This work is urgent and the proposed Inquiry should inform further steps and not slow down work already underway."

LINA Executive Director Claire Stuchbery said LINA maintains this position as another turbulent year for news media draws to a close.

"Since the Murdoch Media Inquiry Bill was first introduced in 2023, the challenges for local and independent news media have only increased due to new developments such as Meta's deprioritisation of news on social media," she said.

"We encourage the government to direct any funding that may have been spent on conducting a Royal Commission or inquiry straight into newsrooms that are producing public interest journalism."

The Committee acknowledged that "a healthy democracy and inclusive society in Australia depends on the free and open exchange of ideas and information, and informed decision making". The report shared details about other methods, used currently or in development, to support the diversity of the Australian news media, including the News Media and Digital Platforms Mandatory Bargaining Code and the anticipated News Media Assistance Program.

Similarly, other potential solutions to improved media diversity in Australia were acknowledged. This includes LINA's recommendation for an increased government spending on advertising within news media, including legislated government advertising spend ratios to support a 'viable and diverse public interest journalism sector'. Australia has one of the most concentrated media markets in the world, second only to Brazil in the 15 countries studied in a September report from the Global Media and Internet Concentration program.

While this is of significant concern to our democracy and demands immediate intervention, LINA acknowledges actions in progress and urges expediency in the rollout of support programs for newsmakers. Meanwhile, LINA continues its own work to directly tackle media concentration through supporting grassroots journalism with practical capacity and revenue-building support for local and independent newsrooms."

NSW government continues support for regional and community papers

This Minns Labor Government is continuing work to safeguard the production of local stories across the state with \$3 million in grants to be made available to regional and rural newspapers.

Minister for Regional NSW Tara Moriarty announced today the delivery of the Government's top up of \$3 million to make the Regional Media Fund a \$6 million commitment since its election, at the 2024 Country Press NSW Conference and Awards of Excellence in Dubbo. Regional media plays a vital role in keeping their communities informed and reporting on matters of importance, as well as informing, celebrating and connecting people. The first round of the Regional Media Fund, which closed in April 2023, delivered grants to 47 regional outlets to support diversification and expansion into digital content. Following consultation with regional media stakeholders, including the Country Press NSW and Australian Community Media, the second round of this program will be improved to better reflect industry needs and ease accessibility for support.

This new funding will be made available to help support media organisations to meet the production, operational and content gathering costs associated with running a regional and rural media outlet. This is part of the Minns Labor Government's ongoing work to deliver solutions which will support regional NSW communities to thrive.

You Should Have Been Here Yesterday

Following the success of his first surfing film 'Searching for Michael Peterson', Director Jolyon Hoff is travelling down the East coast with his acclaimed new surf epic 'You Should Have Been Here Yesterday.'

Hoff will present it with a Q & A at 4pm on Sunday 3 November at the Perry Street Cinema, Bateman's Bay.

As this will be the Eurobodalla's only screening, it would be best to book your tickets on the cinema's website to be sure to get in.

You Should Have Been Here Yesterday is a poetic homage to Australia's early surf-culture with unearthed footage set to an original soundtrack. It is drawn from hundreds of hours of lovingly restored 16mm footage and set to a downright killer music score by salty legends Headland. This totally radical documentary tells the story of a wild community who took off up the coast and discovered a whole new way to live. Come on a cinematic trip down the Aussie coast of years gone by. Director Jolyon Hoff said "My childhood impression of surfing was that it was almost an entirely new way of living. It seemed to be wrapped around a collection of progressive and, at the time, alternative ideas; connecting to nature, engaging with eastern philosophies, practising healthy living, eating different foods, not working 9-5 and more. My hero was my uncle, who had moved to Lennox Head to surf, building his own shack out of wood salvaged from falling-down farmhouses. Surfing was beautiful, exhilarating and dangerous and felt 'real' when compared to my suburban Sydney upbringing.

As I grew older, I watched as surfing became more commercial, aggressive and competitive. The beautiful ideas I had related to surfing were sidelined as it was packaged and sold all around the world. One day I was standing on an underground train station in Washington DC, 6 hours drive from any ocean, and was surrounded by Billabong and Rip Curl t-shirts.

One of surfing's original gurus, Alby Falzon, says "First they owned the companies, and then the companies owned them". Those original beautiful ideas seemed to be lost. I still saw them in the surf and on the beaches, but the perception of surfing had become something very different. For a long time, I've imagined making a film about the 'true' culture of surfing, about those beautiful dreamy progressive ideas which had first attracted me.

In 2008 I was in Dick Hoole's garage looking for footage of famously reclusive schizophrenic surfing legend Michael Peterson for a film Searching for Michael Peterson. I found some beautiful shots of 'MP', but there were piles of other film reels. I wondered - what gold must be hiding in those other film cans? And what about the other filmmakers, what happened to their footage?

During the pandemic these two ideas came together and I decided to use this 'lost' film footage to make a film about the side of surfing which didn't fit the commercial mould. I think surfing culture can be seen as an analogy for the wider Australian colonial culture and, as Australia moves forward, grows up and becomes more multicultural and globally connected, we need to decide what we want to leave behind and what we want to keep.


You Should Have Been Here Yesterday will start conversations. What mistakes did we make? And what beautiful new ideas did we help usher into mainstream Australia? There is a conversation taking place, and it has only just begun.

Mrs Phillips said the visit highlighted the importance of apprentices in building the skills and talent in the Australian workforce to meet current and future skills gaps and realise economic opportunities.

"It's so important to ensure we have a strong apprenticeship system that encourages apprentices to get skilled and work ready, while also supporting employers to help offset the training costs associated with engaging an apprentice."

Mrs Phillips said it was great see the family-owned business employing women in male-dominated trades.

"Najara is working in a priority cohort – Women in male dominated trade - and will have improved access to flexible, safe and inclusive training and work opportunities," Mrs Phillips said.

"Mechanics has had a historically low rates of female participation, so apprentices are provided with increased comprehensive wraparound support through their Australian Apprenticeship Support Network provider, which includes personalised advice, pastoral care, career and industry mentoring and access to professional networks.

"Additionally, \$55.6 million was announced in the 2024-25 Budget for the Building Women's Careers program, to expand support for women training in clean energy and other key industries.

The siblings travel to Nowra TAFE once a week and work in a workshop equipped with up-to-date scanning, diagnostic and programming tools for all modern vehicles. Since 2015, the business has employed five apprentices. Employers that engage an Australian Apprentice in a priority occupation from 1 July 2024 may now be eligible to claim up to \$5,000 to help subsidise costs associated with employing an apprentice.

Apprentices undertaking training in priority areas will be eligible for an additional \$2,000 (\$5,000 in total) to assist with cost-of-living pressures and incentivise them to finish their training.

Enrolments in Fee-Free TAFE have been strong across priority sectors. Over half a million people have enrolled in courses of high skills demand since 1 January last year. Fee-Free TAFE is especially critical to women who make up the majority (approximately 63 per cent) of enrolments. "In a male-dominated sector, it is vital that we support women's ambitions," Mrs Phillips added.



Poppy-making materials will be provided but customers are asked to bring along their own needle, black thread and fabric scissors.



Tackle World Moruya

Moruya River.

What a cracking good week we have had with the weather, warm days and some good fish being caught. Now the weekend forecast is as it always is after a good week, less than ideal! The rain today, I'm not going to complain about, as we are in desperate need for some spring rains to fill tanks, dams and get the paddocks looking green again for those who have live stock. The lower areas of the Moruya system have been fishing well, with flathead over the flats and salmon still kicking around the Preddy's wharf area to keep anglers entertained. The whiting I referred to last week, were taken on both nippers and surface lures, so that is super encouraging.

The flats under the town bridge also have some nice flathead, bream and whiting kicking about.

Up in the fresh reaches, with reasonable flows, the bass continue to move further up the system, making further exploration key to finding those 45cm+ fish we are after. Night session with surface lures have been working for those that are able to get out around sunset.

Tuross River.

I have been getting reports on some nice sized mulloway from this system over the last week, with the odd 1m+ fish being reported. These fish have to be worked for, with quality baits and time spent in the right spots required to intercept on these great ghosts.

The flats around the potato point side and the shallow back bays, have seen the majority of the flathead action this week, with the warmer flares areas being prime position still. These warmer flats, as they drain on a falling tide will also spark the bream and Trevally that are holding in the deeper section to feed with the warmer waters funnelling back into the main channels. I would expect to start seeing a few whiting starting to turn up on the flats close to the entrance pretty soon, so get your nippers pumped and put on a surface lure on your other rod, and get into them. If you don't have enough rods to cover multiple setups, come in and we can fix you up! Despite what anyone says, you can Never have too many rods!

Rock and Beach.

Reports from the Moruya breakwall have been great on certain days, with salmon captures in the the multiple tens of fish sessions. Some of the fish have pushed 70cms+ at times. The beaches are also starting to regularly produce some bream on worms, nippers and Pipies. I couple of beaches down south, have also seen some regular mulloway captures. These fish take time and dedication to get regularly, well done to anyone who can get into them.

Offshore.

Snapper numbers are starting to drop off slightly in close, as they start to move into deeper water this time of year. They are still readily available, they just require a bit more travelling to get to them. The flathead activity however, will ramp up as the waters warm with the coming summer season.

After a pretty poor week bait wise, the freezer has been restocked, with the only absentee being hawksbury prawns. We probably won't see them till early December, as they take time to repopulate and grow to a size that is worth netting.

There are a few holes on the lure walls at the moment, orders are in, and stock will most likely be arriving early next week. Don't forget, we are currently running a competition for the rest of October till the end of November in conjunction with Tackle Tactics and Zman, with every purchase of any of their products, you have the chance to win a tinny and trailer package valued at \$35k!! check instore for details, and be in it to win it! \$18 million funding for recreational fishing programs a win for fishers

The Minns Labor Government has announced more than \$18 million of funding for world-class programs to boost recreational fishing across the State.

The Government's commitment to making recreational fishing more accessible to everyone and ensuring its continues to contribute to the local economies of communities around NSW is being realised with today's announcement.

This investment in recreational fishing includes:

- •\$5 million for recreational fishing enhancement and improving access
- \$3 million for Fishcare Volunteers, schools education, fishing workshops and communication with recreational fishers
- ·\$3 million for research and monitoring programs
- ·\$3 million for detecting and preventing illegal fishing and protecting fisheries resources
- \$2 million to restore and improve fish habitat
- •\$2 million for a digital and over-the-counter licence payment system.

In 2023/24, more than 400,000 recreational fishing licences were issued, with revenue from these sales flowing into the Recreational Fishing Trusts and then back to fund programs and projects that support and grow recreational fishing activity and the environment for vibrant fish habitats. Some of the key programs for NSW approved for funding in 2024/25 include:

- \cdot Deployment of additional Fish Aggregating Devices along the coast
- · Two new Offshore Artificial Reefs to be constructed and deployed in 2025
- Fish stocking, to boost stocks of native fish, salmonids and marine species
- · Fishing workshops and Try Fishing Sessions for the community delivered by DPIRD
- · Fishcare Volunteer Program so volunteers can help run or participate in fishing workshops, surveys, school incursions and community fishing events
- · Habitat Action Grants and Flagship Habitat Grants to improve fish habitats

Funding for these programs is reviewed by the Trust Expenditure Committees and the Recreational Fishing NSW Advisory Council, before going to the Minister for approval. In addition, last month the NSW Government announced that 24 projects that applied for grants from the Recreational Fishing Trusts in 2024/25 have received funding of \$1.8 million.






