The banning of UNWRA

The United Nations Relief Agency UNWRA has been in operation since the early 1950's and has thousands of employees. Palestinian refugees across the Middle East, but especially in Gaza have been totally reliant upon it for their welfare. A few days ago Israel passed legislation to ban UNWRA claiming it supports terrorism. Israel has supplied no evidence to support this claim.

Let us be abundantly clear. What Israel is intending is against its obligations under international law. What Israel is intending is against its moral obligations as fellow citizens of the human race.

That in any organisation this large, there might be some who do not comply with the organisation's charter is both possible and probable. No different to any large organisation, charitable or commercial, anywhere in the world. However, Israel accuses the organisation of large-scale corruption and malpractice, even supporting terrorism. It has provided no evidence. You may remember Israel gaoled the previous head of World Vision in Gaza under accusations of corruption, and directing funds to Hamas, without providing a skerrick of evidence. Mohammed EL Halabi has subsequently been in an Israeli gaol since 2016. A thorough audit has shown the accusation was simply not plausible. He could have been released had he confessed to something he has not done. He has refused

Similarly, following an audit, the Australian government has satisfied itself that it is safe to continue channelling Australian charitable aid through its large-scale distribution network to the millions of Palestinians in need, believing the Israeli accusation to be false.

To imagine that another network, trusted by Palestinians, can suddenly emerge to distribute the level of aid required is worse than naïve. It takes years to develop both the infrastructure and trust required.

To imagine that Israel's defence force will itself meet this need quickly, generously, and thoroughly is bizarre. Apart from anything else where would trust be found amongst Palestinians to believe and cooperate with the very people who have demolished schools, hospitals, distribution outlets, and blocked safe aid transition for over 12 months. It simply does not work to expect aid from the one who is the cause of your devastation.


If the resolution of the Knesset to ban UNRWA is not rescinded, Israel must be immediately subject to isolation and boycott. The response of so many Australian politicians to the actions of Israel is that Israel has the right to defend itself. This has absolutely nothing to do with defending itself. It has everything to do with an intention to remove by any means possible a whole race of people from their land. The very fact of passing a law with effect in Gaza and the West Bank suggests that the Knesset that assumes it already possesses sovereignty over these occupied lands. It does not have sovereignty. But this is clearly the intention. If it did have legitimate sovereignty, all Palestinians should have full rights as citizens. The West Bank and Gaza are clearly intended to become part of greater Israel – but without a Palestinian population. The situation could not be grimmer, or graver.

We hardly need to be reminded by Dr Martin Luther King or Archbishop Desmond Tutu that those of us who are not affronted by evil become part of it.

Please do all in your power to lift voices in condemnation of a decision, which, if left to stand, could have apocalyptic consequences for the people of Gaza and severe distress for the people of the West Bank.

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Eurobodalla emergency precinct will house a range of services

An emergency services hub in the Eurobodalla region is one step closer with a new State Emergency Service (SES) headquarters the first building planned for the site at 2876 Princes Highway, Moruya (near TAFE). The Eurobodalla Regional Co-located Emergency Services Precinct will bring a range of agencies together under one roof to ensure the community is better prepared and protected from future natural disasters. Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips said choosing a suitable site, working with stakeholders and coordinating the complex requirements of numerous agencies took time, and meant the precinct would provide the best outcome for the community. Liberal candidate for Gilmore, Andrew Constance accused "the Federal Member for Gilmore and the Prime Minister of comprehensively failing to deliver on their January 2022 commitment to build a critical Operations Centre and in not doing so, also putting lives and communities at risk in future natural disasters." "It is deeply disappointing that several years on since Federal Labor's announcement nothing has happened to build this critical facility for emergency services. It was

first announced with fanfare in January 2022," Andrew Constance said. "This Centre is critical because during Black Summer

"This Centre is critical because during Black Summer agencies such as the NSW Police and local Council were based in Moruya's RSL Memorial Hall 700 metres down the road from Fire Command. I saw how bad this situation was firsthand, with emergency services and key agencies separated and dealing with extraordinary coordination and communication challenges" said Mr Constance.

However, Mrs Phillips said "The NSW State Government, Eurobodalla Shire Council, RFS, SES and Marine Rescue have been working together to progress the Eurobodalla Regional Co-located Emergency Services Precinct, with the site secured and planning well underway." She said claims the precinct had not progressed were "misleading for a community that was still recovering from the Black Summer Bushfires".

"I know first-hand just how important this facility is for Eurobodalla residents," Mrs Phillips said. "Which is why I lobbied for a \$5 million federal election commitment which was delivered in Labor's 2022 Federal Budget, unlike the previous government that made no federal funding commitment."

"When Andrew Constance was the State Member he made no commitment to this facility and, if it was up to him, it would not even be on the agenda." Mrs Phillips said, following negotiations between the parties on how best to progress the Eurobodalla Regional Co-located Services Precinct, the \$5 million federal funding agreement for the project was executed on 13 August 2024 enabling it to proceed on the highway site purchased by Eurobodalla Shire Council in 2023.

"The first stage is for the construction of a new standalone SES on the Eurobodalla Regional Co-located Emergency Services Precinct site which will allow the move of the SES from the existing facility to the new colocated precinct, as well as providing ground work for other elements including an Emergency Operations Centre and training facilities," she added.

The co-located facility with appropriate technologies, facilities and support systems, is best practice and aligns with recommendations from the Commonwealth Royal Commission, and the NSW Bushfire Inquiry. The brand-new purpose-built precinct would house multiple services including the RFS, NSW Ambulance, NSW Fire and Rescue, Marine Rescue and SES.

"Having emergency services in one place means better communication, bolstered resilience and coordinated response in times of emergencies, including fires, floods and storms," Mrs Phillips said.

"I understand how important it is to have our emergency services connected, which is why I have delivered federal funding and continue to work in a productive way with all stakeholders to ensure the delivery of this much needed precinct" said Mrs Phillips.

Consultation on Access to Maloneys Beach

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Heat Haven opens at Moruya Heads

The Moruya Surf Life Saving Club Bushfire and Heatwave Haven was officially on Thursday morning by Sharon Winslade, on behalf of MP for Bega, Michael Holland,

Kathryn Maxwell, President, SHASA said "This is the 8th Haven opened in the Eurobodalla as part of a network established by the Southcoast Health and Sustainability Alliance (SHASA) in partnership with community owned facilities.

SHASA developed a Heatwave and Bushfire Haven Strategic Plan for the Eurobodalla Shire in 2022. The plan included detailed business cases to upgrade a number of community facilities to operate as Bushfire and Heatwave havens during extreme weather events" During the 2019/2020 Black Summer bushfires the Moruya Surf Club members offered assistance to the community and in particular to the many visitors that were in town to participate in the George Bass Surf boat Marathon.

In 2023 SHASA, in collaboration with the Moruya Surf Life Saving Club, applied for and secured \$72,590 in funding from Club Grants Category 3.

The upgrade to the Clubhouse includes air conditioning and hepa filters for temperature and air quality control, LED lighting, 10kwH battery and 20 kva emergency power generator to enabler the facility to continue to have electricity when the grid goes down.

Micro Energy Systems (MESA) from Bodalla installed the LED lighting, battery and emergency power generator while Climate Control installed the air conditioning and hepa filters.

SHASA has developed a map which illustrates how people from Moruya Heads, Congo, Meringo and Bingi can access this facility during a bushfire.

Just this week an **'Independent review of Commonwealth disaster funding**' commissioned by the National Emergency Management Agency.

The Colvin Review by Deloitte, was commissioned to improve disaster funding arrangements. The review examined how the Australian Government spends money on disasters so that we: reduce risks, are ready for disasters, better respond when they happen, help people recover and make communities stronger.

There are well entrenched and understood principles that have served Australia well – principally that emergency management remains the core responsibility of state and territory governments. There has, however, been an evolution in two primary ways:

firstly, that the Commonwealth has been more visible and active in the emergency management phases of natural disasters;

secondly, that the community expects a far greater emphasis on risk reduction and resilience from all leaders within the disaster management community

- 1. Commonwealth role and coordination
- 2.A National Natural Disaster Outcomes Policy
- 3. An evidence-informed, risk-based approach
- 4. Program reforms

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Mid-air collision south-west Sydney claims life of loved pilot

Former south coast resident and Qantas pilot Gary Criddle, 72 was mong three to lose their lives in a mid-air crash outside Sydney last Sunday. Mr Criddle and a 29-year-old man were flying from Wollongong from Cessnock in a Cessna 182 when it was involved in the collision with a Jabiru light aircraft piloted by Khadervali Gagguturu, 60. Gary Criddle was well known in the Moruya district. Gary and wife Sue were married at Tuross Head and owned a tranquil property at Coila in the 2010's.

Gary owned hangars at Moruya Airport and flew his Cessna in and out often.

Gary was an extremely experienced pilot with 20 years in the Navy and Airforce - where he was a member of The Roulettes Display Team.

"As one of Qantas' most respected pilots he was recently awarded his 35-year service badge. He was a mentor to many aspiring pilots and an avid adventurer with plans to sail the world" said Sue. "Gaz was so loved and I've been overwhelmed by the outpouring of grief at this sudden and tragic loss. Gaz was full of fun, laughter and generosity. His loss is immeasurable and he will be deeply missed."

"We have beautiful memories of our time in Moruya" Sue said. "I cannot put into words to how devastated I am to lose the love of my life Gary."



NSW Government reaches pay agreement for 50,000 health workers

The NSW Government has reached an agreement with the Health Services Union (HSU) to increase wages and deliver benefits from salary packaging for more than 50,000 health workers across the state. The agreement covers a range of professions including allied health roles, hospital cleaners, scientists, security officers, patient transport officers and more.

Under the Government's new Fair Pay and Bargaining Policy, the NSW Government and the HSU have agreed to a one year pay increase of 3.5 per cent plus 0.5 per cent in superannuation.

The agreement will also provide 100 per cent salary packaging, delivering a key election commitment. This will increase the share of salary packaging benefits for eligible workers from 70 per cent to 100 per cent with effect from 1 July 2024. Under current salary packaging arrangements, the resulting tax savings are split between health workers and NSW Health.

Cost of living protection has also been agreed with a \$1,000, one-off cost of living payment if the 12-month annual average Sydney Consumer Price Index rate exceeds 4.0 per cent in the year to the March quarter of 2025.

The agreement also includes award reform that commits all parties to working together to create modern, fit for purpose awards. This includes a memorandum of understanding (MOU) that commits to working cooperatively to achieve a 3-year wage agreement on the expiry of the 1-year award.

This deal forms part of the Government's comprehensive plan to deliver the long-term repair of healthcare across NSW. It follows a 4.5 per cent pay rise delivered last year, which was the highest in more than a decade.



<u>Moruya</u> Mail 17th Annual Narooma Boats Afloat launches this month

The 17th Narooma Boats Afloat Festival is on weekend of 8-10 November 2024.

On Saturday 9th November, from around noon, the boats and crews will be having their lunch at Narooma Marina in Forsters Bay. The public is welcome to come and have a stickybeak at the boats on the Marina & Boatsheds. Montague Arts and Craft Society will be holding an art exhibition in one of the boat sheds for most of the day in Forsters Bay as well.

President Graham Peachey says around 35 - 40 boats will be participating and 80 sailors.

The boats are mostly very old – one being 100 years old. They have been lovingly cared for and there's lots of sparkling Huon Pine to see

One boat is called the 'Huon Islander,' used to be the ferry to Bruny Island, was sunk and then restored back to life.

The main prize is the Malcolm McKay Best Boat Award. Peachey says "He passed away, but was on the architect of the festival and highly regarded around boatbuilders."

There is a gala dinner for participants on Saturday night and auction supported by local sponsors, including a seaplane ride with South Coast Seaplanes over the inlet and Montague Island, a charter boat ride to island, a kayak and other prizes.

On Sunday 10th November from around 10am the boats will cruise to the Mill Bay Boardwalk for the Grand Parade of Boats, and return to Forsters Bay where there will be a further chance for stickybeaking.

Cruise ships to ride a wave of momentum into NSW ports this summer

The NSW Cruise season is off and sailing with a record-breaking \$4.41 billion 2023-24 season, up 60.4% from the previous financial year.

Data released last week by Cruise Lines International Association (CLIA) and the Australian Cruise Association (ACA) reveals the 2023-24 cruise season saw the largest economic return to NSW that has ever been recorded - smashing even pre-COVID figures. This growth is expected to continue over the coming summer with 1.2 million passengers and crew from 312 cruise ship visits set to sail into NSW ports.

It's not just Sydney ports set to benefit from the cruising boom. The Sapphire Coast is set to benefit as 25 cruise ship visits bring 43,000 passengers and 20,000 crew to the Port of Eden, injecting a potential \$12 million into the local economy. Newcastle will see an increase in international visitors with 12 cruise ship visits, bringing 12,500 passengers and 6500 crew who can take advantage of the diverse array of shore excursions to explore the best of the Hunter region and nearby coastal towns. The report also showed a 50% jump in jobs with the industry supporting employment for 13,714 full time jobs in NSW over 2023/24.

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Sandbags and seawalls

Eurobodalla Shire Council

"Our current coastal protection work centres around the protection of Council-managed community assets around Batemans Bay.

We've been using sandbags at Long Beach to temporarily protect Bay Road from coastal erosion. Our early efforts had many hands grasping big needles to sew shut the sand-filled sacks. We got smarter, more recently buying bags with built-in Velcro closures, saving us time and money, and some blisters too. Now we've compared all the options based on social, environmental and economic factors, finding a rock revetment to be Long Beach's best long-term solution. It's cost effective, long lasting, and looks so much better than a concrete wall (or sandbags!). It also allows for the existing Norfolk pines along the shoreline. McLeods Beach, a low-lying area at the western end of Surfside, is at risk of swamping in coastal storms. We're designing a raised embankment that protects infrastructure and improves access, with scope to add more height and length in the future. Meanwhile the north end of Surfside Beach needs more sand -Transport for NSW is responsible for that but we're advocating it be done as quickly as possible. The sea is also encroaching on Wharf Road at North Batemans Bay, particularly at that sharp bend in the road. Here, a sea wall will reduce wave damage during storms and big seas. It will continue along the beach to join the seawall at Easts Riverside Holiday Park, giving us scope to raise the road in the future. Looking further south still, we're planning to rebuild bigger and better at Batehaven's Caseys Beach, where waves are

breaking over the current seawall and damaging Beach Road."

Three-year award agreement accepted by NSW teachers

On Monday, public school teachers across New South Wales voted to accept the Minns Labor Government's three-year award agreement, formally completing last year's four-year pay deal.

This agreement will mean the state's 95,000 public school teacher workforce will continue to have highly competitive salaries, receiving a three per cent pay increase annually for the next three years.

Further, this agreement offers improved workplace flexibility to improve attraction and retention in the profession. This will include opportunities for job-sharing, part-time employment as well as full-time and part-time leave without pay where requested.

To maximise teaching time, regular after-school meetings will be capped at one hour a week and after-school events will need to be planned in consultation with teachers, with reasonable notice given.

Teachers will also be provided with additional school development days for the duration of the three-year agreement to assist with rolling out the new curriculum with a focus on explicit teaching, while the Department continues to address ongoing staffing challenges.

Today's agreement follows the once-in-a-generation pay rise given to teachers last year which saw starting salaries lift from \$75,791 to \$85,000 and top of the scale teacher salaries increase from \$113.042 to \$122,100. The Minns Labor Government was elected with a mandate to scrap the

former Liberal National government's wages cap and reinvest in the state's essential workers. The agreement reached today has been funded through the 2024-25 NSW Budget.

The Minns Labor Government's work to support public school teachers and address the teacher shortage crisis presided over by the former Liberal National Government has also included:

Converting more than 16,000 temporary teachers and school support staff to permanent roles.

Banning mobile phones in public schools to improve student behaviour and focus in the classroom.

Expanding the School Administration Reduction Program trial, to streamline the non-classroom work required of teachers.

These efforts have helped reduce teacher vacancies to a three-year-low of just more than 1,600, with NSW public schools reporting 24 per cent fewer vacancies at the start of Term 3, 2024 than at the same time last year.





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Time share dog beach regulations start 1st November

Timeshare arrangements for dogs on selected beaches in Eurobodalla are back in effect this Friday 1 November. The 18 Eurobodalla beaches with timeshare arrangements allow dogs before 9am and after 5pm.

Dogs are prohibited on timeshare beaches between 9am and 5pm, until Saturday 30 April.

Eurobodalla Council encourages the community to practice 'dog walking manners' and promote responsible pet ownership.

Most dog-related incidents occur during the warmer months, particularly on beaches. While Rangers do their best to monitor and prevent incidents, it's ultimately up to the community to ensure the safety of both dogs and people, senior Ranger Rory Hogan says.

"As the weather warms up, more people are walking their dogs and Ranger patrols increase. We're out educating and encouraging dog owners to do the right thing," Mr Hogan said.

Over the past year, Mr Hogan said Rangers responded to 406 incidents involving irresponsible dog ownership, where dogs were not under effective control. "If your dog is being a menace in a designated off-leash area, like a beach, you risk on the spot fines.

"Your dog should reliably come back when called. If they don't respond consistently, you should keep them under control on a leash. Both dogs and people should feel safe when out and about."


Mr Hogan wants to help build the community's understanding of responsible dog ownership, and the importance of keeping dogs under effective control. Council created a webpage sharing dog walking do's and don'ts.

Mr Hogan asks the community to help spread the word and practice 'dog walking manners', which is to:

Never let your dog run up to another dog. Check first to see whether your dog can say hello. Just because your dog is friendly doesn't mean other dogs are - some may be anxious and react aggressively.

Observe your dog's behaviour and keep it in sight. Owners often mistake dominant behaviours for play. Actions like mounting and excessive barking are unacceptable and are known to be common behaviours on our beaches. If your dog becomes a nuisance or aggressive, put it on a leash.

Respect others' space and always keep your dog on a leash in public places.



Keep early morning and evening noise to a minimum when walking your dog near houses. Take a bag and pick up your dog's poo. Avoid taking your dog to crowded areas and keep it away from children and people fishing. See a map of dog-friendly beaches on Council's website.

More Indigenous Rangers for Batemans Bay and Jerrinja as national program expands

Two South Coast Local Aboriginal Lands Councils (LALC) will share in almost \$7 million funding to employ more local First Nations rangers, as part of the Albanese Labor Government's national expansion of the Indigenous Rangers Program. The Batemans Bay LALC will receive \$3,178,994, while further north, the Jerrinja LALC (located in Jervis Bay & Shoalhaven – Wandi Wandian Country) will receive \$3,743,409 in federal funds to allow their existing ranger programs to grow and evolve.

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips has welcomed the funding for two organisations in her electorate.

"I'm so pleased this funding has been directed to two wonderful organisations that are encouraging young indigenous men and women to get involved and care for their environment," she said.

"And I'm proud that the Albanese Government continues to support Traditional Owners to manage and protect land and sea Country for future generations."

Batemans Bay LALC CEO Roslyn Carriage said the funding would allow the ranger group to expand.

"This funding means we can employ more rangers and start training up some more young people," she said.

"Our rangers work in estuaries as well as on the land, and carry out weeding, soil erosion projects, traditional burning and surveys for endangered flora and fauna.

"We're trying to encourage more young people to get involved and get back on Country and to help bring the land back to the way it should be."

Jerrinja LALC CEO Alfred Wellington said the funding boost would allow the established ranger team to continue operating with confidence over the next four years.

"We are attempting to close the gender gap a little bit too, so we hope to recruit another three to four female rangers," he said.

"This is very welcome news and means we can build on what we've already achieved."

Mr Wellington said the Jerrinja Rangers have adopted an holistic environmental management plan to care for natural and cultural areas across the local land, lake and river systems.

They already operate a successful native flower nursery and plan to create a mangrove nursery.

The new local recruits will be among more than 1,000 new Indigenous ranger jobs that will be created across the country, with the Albanese Government investing \$355 million over four years to expand the Indigenous Rangers Program.

First Nations women will make up the vast majority of the new full-time, part-time and casual roles, with up to 770 Indigenous ranger positions.

The Albanese Government is investing a total of \$1.3 billion to 2028 in the Indigenous Rangers Program with aims to double the number of Indigenous rangers by the end of the decade.

Women Indigenous rangers play an important role in ensuring the protection of sacred women's sites and the preservation of important cultural knowledge and practices.

For more than 65,000 years, First Nations people have been caretakers of Australia's land, rivers, seas, flora and fauna. Indigenous rangers continue this legacy today, managing Country according to Traditional Owners' objectives combined with modern conservation training.

They use traditional knowledge and cultural practices, and Western science, to manage land, river and sea Country and deliver environmental, cultural, social and economic development outcomes for First Nations communities.

Federal Minister for Indigenous Australians, Senator Malarndirri McCarthy said expanding the Indigenous Rangers Program would provide more opportunities for First Nations people to share their knowledge and benefit from the social and economic outcomes that come from meaningful employment.

"This expansion delivers on the government's commitment to increase the Indigenous Rangers Program's footprint and bolster activity in existing locations, with new opportunities for women Indigenous rangers who play a unique role in caring for Country," she said.

"I acknowledge the work of all rangers and the care and strength they demonstrate in looking after Country. I also want to show appreciation for all people, Indigenous and non-Indigenous, who cross paths with and learn from them."

Minister for Environment and Water, Tanya Plibersek said by expanding both the Indigenous Rangers Program and the successful Indigenous Protected Area program, the Federal Government continues to support Traditional Owners to manage and protect land and sea Country.

"We are so lucky in this country to have the world's most successful environmentalists to learn from," she said. "First Nations people have actively managed Country for 65,000 years and provide skilled environmental and cultural expertise that benefits all of Australia."

Master Leith Stubbs, of the Dwyer's Creek Public School, scored three prizes in the competitions carried out by the N.S.W. Gould League of Bird Lovers, Sydney.

Mrs. Flanagan, snr., of Mullenderree, whose erectness and agility for her age is remarkable, having passed the fourth score, has been suffering from the prevailing epidemic – influenza. For the first time in many years this active lady had to seek medical attention.

Bodalla. (From our Correspondent) The Bodalla cricket club suffered a defeat at the hands of the Nerrigundah club last Saturday, the scores being 125 to 54. It was played in a very friendly spirit. The old concrete wicket on the racecourse has been uncovered in readiness for today's match with Moruya. From all accounts Moruya would be doing the wise thing in playing on the single wicket in the village, but they have the choice. The men are hard at work on Trunkety flats putting metal on the roads. The motorists would be glad if they would put some blinding on after, say, a section of 100 yds was metalled.

The school concert which took place on the 24th was a great success financially and otherwise. Mrs. Vandenburgh and Brown had charge of the doors and took £11 15s. The hall was crowded and all the items were enthusiastically applauded and many were encored. Roars of laughter greeted Roy Nichelsen as swaggie, Mary Marshall and four little boys in baggy breeches, Bill Lipscombe and Les Templeman as cannibals, and the seven Chinese ladies in 'Allee Samee."

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State of the Climate 2024: Increased Fire Weather, Marine Heatwaves and Sea Levels



The State of the Climate Report 2024 has found Australia's weather and climate has continued to change, with an increase in extreme heat events, longer fire seasons, more intense heavy rainfall, and sea level rise.

The report, prepared every two years, was released today by Australia's national science agency, CSIRO, and the Bureau of Meteorology.

It draws on the latest national and international climate research, monitoring, and projection information to describe changes and long-term trends in Australia's climate.

Scientists found the oceans around Australia are continuing to warm, with increases in carbon dioxide in the atmosphere leading to more acidic oceans, particularly south of Australia. CSIRO Research Manager, Dr Jaci Brown, said warming of the ocean has contributed to longer and more frequent marine heatwaves, with the highest average sea surface temperature on record occurring in 2022.

"Increases in temperature have contributed to significant impacts on marine habitats, species and ecosystem health, such as the most recent mass coral bleaching event on the Great Barrier Reef this year," Dr Brown said.

"Rising sea levels around Australia are increasing the risk of inundation and damage to coastal infrastructure and communities.

"Global mean sea level is increasing, having risen by around 22 centimetres since 1900. Half of this rise has occurred since 1970.

"The rates of sea level rise vary across the Australian region, with the largest increases in the north and south-east of the Australian continent."

The amount of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere continues to increase, contributing to climate change, with 2023 the warmest year on record globally.

Dr Karl Braganza, Climate Services Manager at the Bureau of Meteorology, said Australia is continuing to warm, with eight of the nine warmest years on record occurring since 2013. "This warming has led to an increase in extreme fire weather, and longer fire seasons across large parts of the country," Dr Braganza said.

The report describes the shift toward drier conditions between April to October across the southwest and southeast, and reduced rainfall in southwest Australia now seems to be a permanent feature of the climate.

"The lower rainfall in the cooler months is leading to lower average streamflow in those regions, which can impact soil moisture and water storage levels and increase the risk of drought. Droughts this century have been significantly hotter than those in the past," Dr Braganza said.

"However, when heavy rainfall events occur, they are becoming more intense, with an increase of around 10 per cent or more in some regions.

"The largest increases are in the north of the country, with 7 of the 10 wettest wet seasons since 1998 occurring in northern Australia."

Although Australian emissions have declined since 2005, Australia is projected to see continued warming over the coming decades, with more extremely hot days and fewer extremely cool days.

The rate of emissions decline will need to accelerate from now to meet Australia's 2030 emissions targets.

State of the Climate 2024 is the eighth report in a series published every two years by CSIRO and the Bureau of Meteorology. The findings highlight the importance of ongoing monitoring and help to inform and manage climate risk.

Last week I joined an assembly line whose efficiency would have Henry Ford weeping tears of joy. No, I wasn't one of the mechanics doing his bit before it passed down the line, I was a metaphorical Model-T on the line itself!

I was having my headlights adjusted and, but for one big bump at the start, the whole experience was smooth as silk.

Older Canberrans will have cracked the analogy already. Hundreds and hundreds of them have already joined me on the line to hospitals around the city where eye surgeons are removing cataracts from our cloudy retinas.

Nurse Nardia at my hospital said, 'It's amazing. They just keep coming; and when I think there can't possibly be any more suddenly there's another rush.' The War Babies and the Boomers have coalesced in this gold rush for the Ophthalmology industry and my journey, I suspect, is typical.

I was alerted to the problem by the annual ACT Access demand for a Driver's Licence eye test. While I passed the test, I had trouble with the left eye which took me back to my optometrist, and a referral to specialist Dr Chich-Hung Kuo.

We've never had health insurance, and until the Barr-Rattenbury Government blew the health budget on that idiotic tram it had worked well. Now it's a mess and people like us are caught between insane premiums and waiting forever for so-called 'elective surgery'. (What a horrible word is 'elective' when my dear wife weeps in pain from the sudden onset of two arthritic hips).

Anyway, my driving to the shops and the chemist with my COPD is vital so Dr Kuo's \$2,400 (less \$649.90 Medicare refund) started the process. Then came \$3,208 (no refund) for the hospital and \$600 for the anaesthetist (less \$169.50) from our hard-pressed savings. Now for the good part. The day before surgery, word arrived that I should report by 11.30am. My eldest son drove up from Sydney and came in with me for an expected four-hour wait (as in the Canberra Hospital). Not so in the new Kent Street Canberra Private. We'd barely arrived before Noah and Wang, recently from Bhutan in their medical scrubs sat with us and checked the details then ushered me into the lift to the third-floor assembly line.

Voila! The blue plastic curtained beds were ranged around the entire floor. Mine awaited, a creased sheet suggesting a former sedan's recent departure. A solicitous Wang brought water and helped me into my gown; I opened my new book on the great Donald Thomson, taking notes for a talk, when Ben, the anaesthetist's assistant (also in scrubs) reminded me what I was there for and wrote an X above my left eye.

In a trice, it seemed, Wang and Noah were back pushing me and my bed into the OT where Ross, the young anaesthetist, inserted a canula into my notoriously uncooperative arm vein and used drops to numb the eyeball. Next the kindly features of Dr Kuo loomed into view; time slowed; soft Huo mutters emanated: 'Good...good...ah, very good.'

All over, I thought.

Not exactly. A big dressing covered the eye and – safety first - had to wait an hour or so in a big comfy recliner on the assembly line floor. And there – I kid you not – they served me delicious fresh sangers with the crusts removed! (The Canberra Hospital version is made from used carpets). And next day I had to visit Dr Huo's rooms in Woden for a regular checkup.

Next morning I removed the dressing and set forth to Kuo's second floor rooms, only to find the lift out of order. Two flights totalling more than 30 high steps stretched skywards. With my COPD it was Everest plus K2. I could have cried. But then a Canberra tradie – fawn boots, in his 30's – stepped from the shadows. "I'm early for my meeting,' he said. 'Lean on me and...'

'l couldn't...'

'No worries, mate. Put your arm round here.'

And I did. We made it.

At the top I was so overwhelmed I didn't get his name. I guess he'd say, 'No worries.' I'll remember his face...with both eyes.



Narooma Arts Centre back on track

Construction of the new Narooma Arts Centre (NAC) goes to tender in late November.

"We're very excited we're now forging ahead with finalising construction plans after what has been a very anxious time for the volunteer Narooma School of Arts committee," said Narooma School of Arts spokesperson Jenni Bourke.

"Our joint Australia and NSW funding of over \$9m was under threat due to cost overruns and time delays. Our Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund grant has now been guaranteed thanks to robust representations made on our behalf by the Member for Eden Monaro Kristy McBain and Member for Bega Dr Michael Holland." Unlike most Arts Centres which are built and run by local councils, the NAC Project is unique in that it is totally a community initiative on community-owned land held by Narooma School of Arts.

The Arts Centre had to be completely redesigned last year because the cost of construction of the original design exceeded grant funds available to Narooma School of Arts. Eurobodalla Shire Council approved the new plans by TAKT Studio for Architecture in late August.

"I know that once the Centre is completed our community will wonder how we ever did without it," Mrs Bourke said. "It will be such a vibrant centre of creativity, learning and gathering that will benefit the whole region, as well as bring economic benefits from cultural tourism, training and job opportunities."

Member for Éden Monaro, Kristy McBain said the revitalisation of the Narooma Arts Centre is a testament to the resilience and determination of the community, and it will play a crucial role in fostering recovery and growth in the region.

"This project demonstrates a major investment in infrastructure and underscores our dedication to helping communities on their path to recovery.

"Three levels of government are working together - with the community - to deliver this project and I commend all involved who are working tirelessly to see it delivered."

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





Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

Moruya river.

Ocean temps along the coat are now pushing up towards 19-20deg, while the temps further offshore are over 20deg. A great sign for the estuary's. The flathead have been the main go to over the flats this past week, with some nice fish taken, particularly around the airport flats and the spur wall area.

The Preddy's wharf area has some nice salmon and Trevally lurking around on a rising tide. With the run out tide offering the opportunity at a flathead or two.

I have been asked multiple times, where the hole in the wall is, so I will include a screen shot from google maps the area in question. The pic does show the area at low tide however, so the pic will need a bit of imagination to show its potential.

Further upstream the quarry wharf has been producing some bream, flathead, trevally and the odd school mulloway. The town bridge area also has been holding some good numbers of flathead, bream and the odd early season whiting. Live nippers fished over the flats here are a gun bait. As the water temp increases, the areas further upstream will also start to kick off. The holes in front of the hospital, and the flats and holes around Yarragee will also start to produce more fish.

Tuross River.

Flathead have been the stand out species this week, with good fish to 80+cm being caught. The silver ghost, or mulloway have also made an appearance for those that are keen enough to put in the time and effort. Fish over the 1m mark have been reported in the various deep holes that are known to hide in.

Coila lake has early season prawns running with last nights dark. This will continue for the next week, until the influence of the fuller moons puts them down. There isn't alot of size to them yet, but they make for the lack of size in their sweetness. We are well stocked with prawn lights and scoop nets, if prawning is something that interests you. I do however need to restock on drag nets.

Keep an eye over the shallow flats for the whiting that are due to turn up any day now. We have plenty of surface lures in stock to tempts a hungry aggressive surface bite.

Rock and beach.

Salmon have been well and truly on the cards this week, with the wind being the only reason making fishing the beaches less than ideal. Sunday is looking pretty good at this stage to get some sand between your toes. There are a few bream also starting to be caught, with worms, nippers or pipis your best bait options.

Moruya breakwall, has been a bit hit and miss this week, with moving schools of salmon not always along the wall.

Offshore.

Snapper are still readily available, with deeper drops starting to become the norm as the warm currents push down the coast. Flathead are also still available over the sandy areas between reefs.

It won't be long before the game crews, start to get into the yellowfin and marlin that the warmer currents herald.

Hawksbury prawns continue to be unavailable, while the bait freezer is fully stocked with everything else, ready for the weekend.

Keep an eye out on our socials, as we have the new Pro Lure Hybrid Shrimp coming. We are only running 6 of the 9 colours available, and 2 of the 5 replacement leg colours. I am looking forward to seeing these in person.

Stay safe every one and remember, "Everyday's a good day for fishing..."

Moruya Mail Sport Batemans Bay Sailing Club report



It was a great day for sailing on Saturday October 26th when Batemans Bay Sailing Club held the third Bay Cup race of the season. The occasion also marked the 50th anniversary of BBSC. Two sprint races each of about an hour's duration took place around a two lap course. The format meant that close results were guaranteed, with an emphasis on slick crew work.

Six yachts headed out to race as well as John and Julianne McCloskey's magnificent Seawind 11.6 catamaran which had a relaxed sail around the Bay. Race officer Terry Paton and his trusty sidekick Andrew Bain aboard the committee vessel "Dave Magill" set a true start line. In the first race "Attitude" (Simon Byrne) grabbed the boat end start. "Accolade" (Lachlan Brown) was just to leeward and soon forced "Attitude" to tack off. "Moonmist" (Tony Sutton) had the legendary Peter Walsh on tactics and a gun combo of Celia Davey and Matty Walsh running the foredeck. She made up a lot of ground on the downwind legs, able to run straight to the mark while the yachts with asymmetrical spinnakers had to gybe back and forth.

Meanwhile, John Drummond and Steve Masterton on "Sail La Vie" and the crew of "Cool Change" (Richard Dunne) were adopting a more cruisey, spinnaker free approach. Peter Patterson had his hands full sailing "Avior" single handed. "Moonmist" was just behind "Accolade" at the last leeward mark and, carrying a more favourable handicap, looked to be in control of the race. However, she lost ground on the final leg after some uncharacteristically loose calls from Walsh, handing the race win to "Accolade".
