It was painted around 1999 with skill and care when Teenzone used the building (possibly painted by Brett Carpenter and Sam May). There were other paintings on the walls of the main room painted

by the Teenzone group, mostly Koori.

in a chance visit to the Hall years ago, Gary Smith saw a work crew painting over the wall murals in the main room as part of hall refurbishment.

The Dot painting in the back room was still there although planned to be covered over.

Gary immediately put a case to council staff to preserve the dot painting, thankfully and wisely they agreed. It remained proudly in the back room for years.

Moruya Community Film Group screened films there for many years from 2005.

The dot painting in the back room was a welcome mural to view at each monthly screening. As an executive committee member of the Film Club, Gary took a photographic record of all the paintings which were part of the 3rd anniversary Film Club presentation dinner at the hall in 2008.

A visit to an art exhibition there in October sadly revealed the dot painting had been covered over. The wall in the back room is now boring blank, very vanilla and clinical, ironic for a venue often used as an art gallery. An unnecessary and thoughtless act, the decision to paint over this work appears devoid of empathy or consideration for the time, effort, artistic skill and creativity of the painters of the dot mural.

No need to hide it, why not just leave it there for historic reasons or just for people to enjoy?

### Council ignore a 910 ratepayer petition on access to Bay foreshore

Ín March 2024 a petition was presented to Eurobodalla Council requesting impediments to the Maloneys Beach foreshore be removed after a barrier had been placed there

Council did nothing as a result of the petition except install three sandstone blocks (not local granite) to further restrict access. Only under election pressure has a Councillor initiated a "limited access survey" and no further action is to be taken. The notice of the survey was only sent to property owner in the Maloneys Beach area. No other ratepayers got any notification directly from Council.

The average person in the street is required to search the ESC web site to fill in a survey form – limited to 1000 characters, to find and respond to this so-called survey. There is nothing on public exhibition and no obvious information except an item in the past Council meeting

Access from the water to the beach and beyond is used extensively by local boaters and visiting vessels from the adjacent sheltered Chain Bay area. This group has never been contacted by Council nor consulted on closing off this very important lifeline to supplies, fuel, water, groceries and spending money in the area.

The boaters come ashore with their tenders and resupply their vessels from the local economy. By restricting vehicular access, the crew now has to carry their equipment and supplies from a distant car park rather than the short distance between the foreshore and water.

A sand boat ramp has been at that location for many, many years and Council has now chosen to restrict access and "decommission" a boater's asset. In their communications to the select group the Director state "...we acknowledge that the community was not fully consulted, and this has led to some concerns.

It appears Council is viewing this as only of concerns to local landholders not the many registered boat-owners who use the waterways around the Bay and seek shelter from the prevailing winds in Chain Bay. There is no other boat ramp east of the Clyde River bar and the bar has not been suitable dredged for even medium draft vessels to traverse. Maloneys Beach area is the only safe access to the local

Boaters say: "Remove the three sandstone blocks and restore access to the informal boat ramp at Chain Bay immediately." Respond by communicating with Council before Tuesday 29 October 2024.

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### Officer charged Southern Region

A police officer has been charged over the alleged assault of a woman and three teens while on duty in the state's south

On Sunday 29 October 2023, police attended an incident at a Batemans Bay shopping centre when an officer – a senior constable attached to the Southern Region - allegedly assaulted three teenage girls - two aged 13 and one aged 17 - and a 49-year-old woman. Following an investigation, yesterday (Thursday 7 November 2024) the 37vear-old officer was issued a court attendance notice for four counts of common assault.

He will appear at Batemans Bay Local Court on Monday 25 November 2024. The officer is currently suspended with pay.

- Georgie Staley Georgie led the construction of the volunteer-run Narooma mountain bike trails. Georgie and a small group spent years chipping out trails creating the first 30 kms. Georgie assisted the group to obtain a grant to complete the another 65km of trails, now loved by all.
- Jake Steedman Jake is a key figure in the local youth community, ensuring a safe environment for the younger generation through programs like Hanging Rock Skatepark Red Frog

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# Healthy update on new hospital development

The Southern NSW Local Health District held a Eurobodalla Planning Update meeting at the Moruya Gold Club last night. About 45 people attended the meeting to hear from CEO Margaret Bennett, Dr Michael Holland, Member for Bega, Brad Scotcher SNSWLHD General Manager Coastal Network and Project Manager Matthew Malone from Health Infrastructure. Questions from the Public had been submitted earlier, however there were also questions from the floor.

Straight up Mrs Bennett was asked if the New Eurobodalla Regional Hospital (NERH) would open as a Level 4 hospital, to which she replies "Absolutely yes."

"It's all about the workforce, and I am feeling much more positive than last year" said Mrs Bennett.

Asked about the provision of radiotherapy services she said "The Ministry is linking with us now to develop an Expressions of Interest to test the market for someone to provide radiotherapy." "It's progress that is important. There's been lots of debate about the cost of radiotherapy and we will find out by doing a market test. The EOI will be out early in the new year."

Asked at what point is it too late to add the radiotherapy to the build, Mrs Bennett said "It's never too late. There has been an incredible dramatic increase in health infrastructure cost, so we will wait to see what come out of the EOI."

Brad Scotcher, SNSWLHD General Manager Coastal Network explained the difference between a 'Close Observation Unit' and an 'Intensive Care Unit' which would bring the whole hospital up a level.

He outlined some of the successes in the district such as by the Midwifery Group Practice team at Moruya, who had been recognised at the National Rural Health Awards the previous evening.

Dr Holland was questioned about the loss of the Batemans Bay Accident and Emergency and clearly explained what step up to level four would mean for the Eurobodalla.

He said there would be more beds in the new hospital than the current Moruya and Batemans Bay hospital combined.

Dr Holland acknowledged the concerns of the Batemans Bay people attending but said that "lives are being risked by not having a level 4 hospital."

Dr Holland revealed that they were looking at increasing the house of the Urgent Care Clinic in Batemans Bay. From December it would be 12 hours per day 8am – 8pm. And an expansion is being considered. It was also pointed out that the plans for the NERH were 'non partisans plans.'

Dr Holland said that he had been speaking with the Minister for Health in Sydney the previous day about the addition of radiotherapy for the new hospital.

Matthew Malone, Project Manager with Health Infrastructure talked about the build of the new hospital which has a floor space more than twice the size of Moruya and Batemans Bay Hospitals combined. Other topics discussed were training partnerships with Universities, accommodation for staff, the fate of the older sites and the need for more ambulances.

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# Life Changing Trip for Moruya High School Students

On 27th September 2024, twenty-five intrepid travellers from the Eurobodalla were filled with a mixture of anxiety and excitement as they prepared to embark on a great adventure. This group was comprised of twenty-one students and four teachers from Moruya High School; for many of these students it was their first time on a plane, as well as their first jaunt to a foreign country.

After nine hours in the air (and a somewhat nerve-wracking flight for some) we landed in Tokyo and went straight to our accommodation to try and get a solid night's rest before a few action-packed days in Tokyo. During our time in one of the world's most bustling metropolises we explored Akihabara and Harajuku, then braved the glorious chaos of the famous Shibuya Scramble. We found peace and respite in the tranquillity of the Meiji Jingu Shrine, catching glimpses of a traditional wedding ceremony and enjoying a delicious and authentic lunch amidst the beauty of the shrine's grounds. The following day, we channelled our inner children and were swept up in the joy and nostalgia of visiting one of the happiest places on Earth at Tokyo Disneyland.

Our journey then took us to Osaka via Japan's famous bullet train (shinkansen) which was our base for the remainder of the trip. We began our acquaintance with this beautiful city by visiting the historic Osaka Castle, then plunging ourselves into the joyous, neon mayhem that characterises the famous Dotonbori area. More excitement and 'shenanigans' followed with a day at Universal Studios Japan where we immersed ourselves in the magical worlds of Harry Potter and Super Nintendo. The days that followed were a welcome change of pace that included day trips to Kyoto, Hiroshima and Miyajima where students were exposed to culturally and historically significant sites and experiences that gave them a small but valuable glimpse into Japan's spiritual heart.

But possibly the most memorable and enjoyable day for many of the students and staff happened to be the day where we went to school! During our trip we had the immense privilege to visit two elementary schools on the outskirts of Osaka. The staff and students warmly welcomed us into their classrooms and showed us what school life in Japan was like. And whilst there is no doubt that all the amazing sights and sounds of the adventure have made a lasting impression on all of us, our visits to these schools epitomise what this incredible journey was about: expanding our knowledge and understanding of the world as only experiences of travel can do.

When our group of weary travellers finally found their way home it was clear that we were not the same people that we had been when we left. We were exhausted and grateful to return to our own beds, but we were even more grateful that we brought with us the types of gifts and souvenirs that cannot be bought: the memories, experience and bonds that we created and that will last for the rest of our lives.

Thank you to the F2F Eurobodalla community and team for welcoming us all so warmly, sharing so generously and showing us what community-led disaster resilience looks like in practice.


### **Oyster Thefts in Narooma**


His talk will present you with some interesting concepts to ponder, and will allow plenty of time for Q &A.

Eurobodalla Council advises that "Seven applicants have been invited to join the new Visitor Economy Working Group that will collaborate with Council to develop a new approach to managing tourism in Eurobodalla.

The new approach will see the tourism sector have greater autonomy over how their industry is supported and promoted. Successful applicants were selected following expressions of interest from motivated individuals with relevant experience – including marketing, hospitality, events, accommodation, tours and product and experiences development – to join a visitor economy working group tasked with finalising a new tourism delivery model for the shire.

A new tourism-delivery model was a priority action from the Eurobodalla Destination Action Plan 2023-28. "This new approach will be a two-year pilot project, with robust governance, measurement and evaluation frameworks wrapped around it, which the working group will help refine," Council's General Manager Warwick Winn said.

The quality of responses to the EOI was high and the level of competition for the limited places available meant that well qualified candidates missed out on the opportunity to join the new Visitor Economy Working Group.

Ultimately, the final selection was based on establishing a balanced visitor economy working group, that had a broad range of 'hands-on' tourism experience, along with key specialist skills. And was, of course, representative of the whole shire.

The first task for the new Visitor Economy Working Group will be to work with Council's tourism staff to refine the terms of reference and present a proposed operating model to the new Council."

### First year of Medicare data shows increase to bulk billing in Gilmore

People living in Gilmore have saved more than \$8 million on cheaper scripts over the past 12 months and there have been an additional 61,000 bulk billed GP visits in the electorate during that time.

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips said on November 1, 2023, the Albanese Government made the largest investment in bulk billing in Medicare history, targeted to families with children under 16, pensioners and concession card holders. "Our investments in bulk billing mean more Gilmore residents are getting bulk billed visits at the GP than they were last year," she said.

"It's great that families with children under 16, pensioners and concession cardholders have seen the greatest increase in bulk billing."

Gilmore patients have accessed 875,957 cheaper scripts and 93,997 60-day scripts in the last year saving \$8,120,196. Bulk billed GP visits have increased by 61,898.

Across the country, the federal government's record investment to strengthen Medicare has created an additional 5.4 million additional bulk billed visits since November last year, or 103,000 extra bulk billed visits every week on average.

Australians have saved \$1 billion on the cost of their medicines thanks to our government cutting the cost of medicines, lowering the Safety Net threshold and introducing 60-day scripts. The Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) called the investment a "game changer" and for the past 12 months, doctors said it has given them the confidence and support they need to bulk bill more often, after a decade of cuts and neglect to Medicare.

A survey of thousands of doctors released by the RACGP last month reported that more doctors say they are bulk billing more of their patients, more of the time.

Families with children under 16, pensioners and concession card holders are now bulk billed much more often: 90.0 per cent of GP visits with children under 16 were bulk billed in the past year.

These 11 million Australians are the patients that see their GP most often: they make up 40 per cent of the population and account for 60 per cent of GP visits, on average.

The historic investment in bulk billing builds on other ways the Albanese Government is strengthening Medicare to make health care more affordable and available:

- Made the largest boost to Medicare rebates in decades, increasing rebates by more in two years than the former government did in nine years.
- Funding and opening 87 Medicare Urgent Care Clinics, so Australians can walk in and get bulk billed urgent care, seven days a week, open early to late, without waiting hours in a busy hospital emergency department.
- Added more than 17,000 new doctors to the health system in two years, delivering the most new doctors in more than a decade.
- Boosted the number of doctors training to become GPs by almost 25%, with the Government fully funding the training of 4,800 new GPs between 2023 and 2025.
- Made medicines cheaper, saving Australians \$1 billion by cutting the cost of medicines, lowering the Safety Net threshold and 60-day prescriptions.

Mrs Phillips said the Batemans Bay Medicare Urgent Care Clinic (UCC) continued to provide free, close-to-home urgent care that is bulk billed under Medicare.

"The most common presentations recorded at the Batemans Bay Medicare UCC have been for conditions such as upper respiratory tract infection, ear infection and urinary tract infections," she said. "More than half the presentations to the Batemans Bay Hospital were for semi-urgent or non-urgent conditions, so the UCC is now taking a lot of pressure off the hospital and local GPs," she said. Mrs Phillips said the free South-Eastern NSW Endometriosis and Pelvic Pain Clinic at the Milton Medical Centre was also providing women from Helensburgh to the Victorian Border with expert, multidisciplinary care.

### Minimum age for social media access to protect kids

The Federal Government will legislate 16 as the minimum age for access to social media, following endorsement by National Cabinet today. The decision follows extensive consultation with young people, parents and carers, academics and child development experts, community, industry and civil organisations, First Nations youth, and state and territory governments. The Albanese Government will introduce legislation in the next Parliamentary sitting fortnight.

The Bill puts the onus on social media platforms, not parents or young people, to take reasonable steps to ensure fundamental protections are in place.

The Government will continue to work closely with stakeholders in the lead up to the commencement of the law, with a lead time of at least 12 months following the Bill's passage to give industry, governments and the eSafety Commissioner time to implement systems and processes.

We will also use this time to develop guidance for parents, carers and children ahead of the change.

The Bill builds upon the Australian Government's work to address online harms for young people, including the \$6.5 million age assurance trial, establishing an online dating apps code, legislating new criminal penalties for non-consensual sexual deepfakes, and quadrupling base funding for the eSafety Commissioner.

The Government will ensure young Australians retain access to services that primarily provide education and health services, and work constructively with stakeholders to ensure that only services which meet the strict criteria under eSafety's powers are able to be accessed by children under 16.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said "Social media is doing social harm to our kids. I'm calling time on it. We need to do everything we can to keep our kids safe, and wherever I go in Australia, I know one of the biggest issues worrying mums and dads is the impact social media is having on their children's well being.

"I want to thank the Premiers and Chief Ministers for their engagement and support on this issue. This is a national challenge that requires national leadership. That's what our Government is stepping up to deliver."

Minister for Communications Michelle Rowland MP said "Introducing a minimum age for social media access is about protecting young people – not punishing or isolating them – and letting parents know that we are in their corner when it comes to supporting their children's health and well being.

"Our decision to set the minimum age at 16 years is based on extensive consultation with experts, parents and young people. It strikes a balance between minimising harms experienced by young people during a critical period of development."

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### 100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society

### 08-11-1924

**Mr. A. H. Preddey** received information on Monday from Dorman, Long and Co., requesting him to have his cottage at "Tuffwood" placed in readiness for their manager, who, with his wife and nine children, was leaving by the Bateman's Bay steamer on Thursday.

**Unless good general rains soon fall**, the rural position in the Far South Coast and southern Monaro will be serious. Herbage is rapidly drying off, and crops are making very poor growth. House-hold water supplies are exhausted in many places.

The Captain of the steamer Narani says that he never remembers a year like this has been for strong winds. We have now definite information that the "Advance Guard" of Messrs. Dorman, Long and Co's employees will arrive in Moruya early next week. Mr. J. A. Gilmore, quarry manager, with his wife and nine children, Mr. Morrison, assistant, with wife and three children, and Mr. Davidson, assistant, will be at Bateman's Bay from 7th to the 11th inst., when they will come on to Moruya. Mr. Martin, the Company's manager in Sydney, Mr. Blake, chief civil engineer, and Mr. Ferguson, chief Mechanical Engineer, will be here on Tuesday, the 11th inst., on a flying trip of general inspection, and to make arrangements for starting work at the granite quarry. Mr. A. Martin writes, under date 3rd November: "Now that we are practically ready for commencing operations down at Moruya, we sincerely trust that a move will be made by builders to erect accommodation."

Mr. A. H. Preddey and his gracious wife appear to have a particular penchant for giving pleasure to children, as they simply revel in the enjoyment of the little ones. On Friday of last week these good citizens celebrated the 13th birthday of their only daughter, Marie, by inviting the children of the district to a social afternoon and evening in the Amusu Theatre. ... A large and elaborately iced cake, made by Mrs. L. T. Jenner in honor of the event, graced the centre of the gaily decorated table. After a few hours of dancing and games, Mr. Preddey entertained the little ones, their parents and friends, with some beautiful and interesting pictures, the films unreeled being specially obtained for the auspicious occasion. The young hostess, who is a particularly favorite with her school-mates, was the recipient of a lovely assortment of presents.

**Kirton and Earnshaw's sawmill** at Ryan's Creek, which is managed by Mr. Eric Davis, was burnt to the ground on Saturday night between the hours of 11 p.m. and 3 a.m. Sunday morning. No doubt this will mean a great loss to the owners and contractors connected, but much greater to the men employed at the same.

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### UOW announces staff and course cuts

The **University of Wollongong** (UOW) has commenced the next stage of consultation with potentially affected staff after announcing a Draft Workplace Change Proposal on Monday.

Following a process to assess the viability of teaching areas, and a Preliminary Phase of Consultation, the University has identified 25 disciplines across its four faculties that will be in scope for the next round of consultation.

Not all disciplines in scope will be disestablished – some may be downsized or consolidated into other teaching areas. The anticipated outcome is a reduction in roughly 90 FTE positions and an estimated recurrent saving of around \$15-20M.

A range of financial and non-financial factors were taken into consideration, and not all unviable teaching activities are in scope. Many will be retained for non-financial reasons.

Interim Vice-Chancellor and President Professor John Dewar AO said the draft proposal would significantly reduce recurrent expenditure by addressing unviable teaching areas.

"No decisions have been made about the future of the disciplines identified. We are committed to a genuine consultation process with potentially affected staff, to determine whether a discipline is disestablished, downsized, or consolidated into other teaching areas," Professor Dewar said.

"The feedback we receive through this consultation process will inform any revisions we make to the proposal. We will be working closely with potentially affected staff so that they have every opportunity to have their say.

"There are some areas of the University with low student enrolment where we can no longer justify maintaining our current levels of staffing. This proposal aims to address that.

"While we have taken some important steps to stabilise this year's budget, these are not long-term solutions. To transform our university, achieve financial sustainability and lay the foundation for our future success by building on our strengths, we must address teaching and research activities that are unviable and significantly reduce our ongoing expenditure overall.

"The decision to initiate this process has not been an easy one. But we must make tough choices now to set the University up for a brighter future"

The consultation process is being conducted in alignment with the requirements of the University's enterprise agreements. For disciplines that are in scope, voluntary redundancies will be considered. It follows the University suffering a \$35M drop in revenue this year, caused by a significant reduction in international onshore student enrolments.

Affected staff are being provided with personalised, professional, and confidential support through the University's Employee Assistance Program provider, TELUS Health.



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### Masses of Seabird washing up



Adrift Lab says "Seabirds are starting to wash-up in large numbers on beaches, particularly in VIC & southern NSW. Just like last year, we're asking folks to send us data. Importantly, we do NOT want anyone to touch the birds: please just take photos and count how many you see.

Instructions, our email address, and important information on #HPAI (avian flu) are here <a href="https://adriftlab.org/.../reporting-seabird-mortalities.../">https://adriftlab.org/.../reporting-seabird-mortalities.../</a>

Ideally, we'd like one photo per bird.

Why? In some parts of Australia, you might encounter two different species of shearwater that look similar. Both have all-black feathers, but one has a small black beak & the other has a larger white beak with a distinctive black tip - example photos to highlight the difference.

AdriftLab says "The Bureau of Meteorology has just released the "2024 State of the Climate" report - the oceans section can help us understand some of the reasons why we're seeing so many Beached Birds in SE Australia at the moment.

It states "The greatest ocean warming has occurred off southeast Australia and Tasmania where more rapid warming trends have occurred over the past 4 decades. The East Australian Current now extends further south, creating an area of more rapid warming in the Tasman Sea, where the warming rate is now twice the global average".

This same region is where the shearwaters we are seeing beach-washed are trying to locate food to eat: rapidly warming waters forces their prey to move elsewhere which means it is out of reach of the birds (they can only fly so far, or dive so deep).

- Adrift Lab is a dedicated group of researchers studying all things adrift in the ocean, including plastic, chemicals, and wildlife. Our diverse and supportive lab includes graduate students and post-docs from all over the globe, who offer specialist skills in ecotoxicology, statistical analysis, and marine ecology.





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### Fee-free TAFE is here to stay

As a former TAFE teacher for more than a decade, Federal **Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips** has welcomed Prime Minister Anthony Albanese's weekend announcement that, under the Albanese Government, fee-free TAFE would be here to stay.

"I can honestly say I am thrilled that fee-free TAFE will be locked-in and made permanent across the country," Mrs Phillips said.

"We will legislate to guarantee 100,000 fee free TAFE places each and every year and I know first-hand, having taught in Outreach at TAFE for over ten years, that this will absolutely change lives.

"I taught people that had never worked outside of their home before and it was TAFE that started them on a pathway into courses such as aged care and community services.

"We know that fee-free TAFE is working, and has exceeded all expectations, which is why it will be here to stay.

"Since fee-free TAFE started in January 2023 to 30 June 2024, we've seen more than 508,000 enrolments in courses in priority areas, including disability and aged care, digital and tech, construction and early childhood education and care."

Mrs Phillips said fee-free TAFE was helping people from priority cohorts, with 170,000 young Australians, 124,000 job seekers and 30,000 First Nations Australians enrolling in the program. "It's also really great to see six in 10 places have been taken up by women, and one in three have been in regional and remote Australia, including Gilmore," she said.

Mrs Phillips said the proposal would restore TAFE New South Wales back to its former glory, before it was "decimated" by the former Liberal State Government.

"I was proud to work for TAFE and see how lives were being changed for the better, but after a while, I'll tell you what I saw at TAFE - a Liberal Government that Andrew Constance was a part of, that gutted TAFE," she said.

"Under the Libs, the TAFE Nowra Campus was looking more like a morque.

"Under the Libs, campuses were closed, courses were slashed, enrolments dropped and more than 5000 teachers were cut from TAFE.

"So, it should come as no surprise that the Liberals labelled our fee-free TAFE 'wasteful spending'

"That is shameful. Shameful because we need tradies to build the housing for our future. We need people to care for our youngest and oldest Australians."

Mrs Phillips said fee-free TAFE was helping fill gaps in industries with high need.

"Since coming to government, I have witnessed how our feefree TAFE is making a real difference locally - at Nowra, Moruya and Ulladulla TAFE campuses.

"Trade courses such as carpentry and electrical are booming in Gilmore.

"My husband is a carpenter and small business owner who did his training at Nowra TAFE. And I have two sons that are apprentice carpenters. And I can say they are all hugely busy. "Our fee-free TAFE builds for the future, so we have the tradies to build and upgrade houses, workers to care for people and apprentices to help grow our small businesses.

"Our fee-free TAFE benefits everyone in Australia."

The Albanese Labor Government will introduce legislation to establish Fee-Free TAFE as an enduring feature of the national vocational education and training system, funding 100,000 Fee-Free TAFE places a year from 2027.

This builds on the Albanese Government partnership with states and territories to deliver 180,000 Fee-Free TAFE places in 2023; 300,000 places over three years from 2024; and agreements being finalised for a further 20,000 construction and housing Fee-Free places.





### Media democratisation vs local news: surprising rivals in the battle for healthy democracies

As all eyes turned to the US this week, we reflect on the relationship between news and democracy in this era heavily influenced by social media and big tech.

With the development and rapid improvement of technology — such as phones, the internet and digital platforms including social media — the cost, skill-sets required and other barriers of entry for citizen reporting and the publication of news has decreased.

Initially celebrated for improving the accessibility with which individuals and smaller businesses can create and share news content, this change may have influenced improvements in the platforming of diverse voices and experiences over recent years.

However, this 'democratisation' of the media has not been quite the positive development for communities, governments, and indeed democracies, as anticipated.

Media is no longer viewed as gatekeepers of information. Instead, the digital space has been flooded with unverified, harmful, sensationalised or simply just unnecessary and distracting information, becoming not so much a competition of the most considered or reputable findings, as the loudest and sometimes richest voices.

The resulting increase in mis and disinformation has deepened the polarisation of views, to the point of triggering civil unrest, spreading damaging public health information during the pandemic, and exacerbating threats of propaganda and censorship.

Governments themselves, whose very existence is threatened by these anti-democratic outcomes, have added to these murky floodwaters, seen in recent years in baseless accusations of fake news levelled at reputable media outlets, and slyly disguised PR campaigns (troubling media reports detailed accounts of political parties distributing fake newspapers promoting their candidates in the 2024 UK general election).

Unsurprisingly, audience perceptions of the media have been affected over time. Unfortunately this has led not so much to greater media literacy and healthy scepticism, but rather a deep distrust in the media (not to mention governments and other authorities), often not synonymous with the editorial quality of the publication and their fact verification processes.

This democratisation process has provided fertile ground for major tech companies — think Meta, X (formerly Twitter), etc — to further monopolise the market by building reliance on third-party digital platforms, and the fragmentation of smaller media organisations has resulted in Australia becoming one of the most consolidated media markets in the world. It's a fairly dismal picture of the current state of the 'fourth estate'....

Enter local news publications. Embedded within the communities they report, journalists at these publications are uniquely positioned to counter mis and disinformation and explain voting processes in local regions.

With strong reciprocal trust generated by their personal connections and commitment to their communities, they can quickly identify disinformation, contextualise misinformation or 'half-truths', and improve media literacy so individuals also have the toolkit to perform these roles independently. Local, independent news publications represent the diverse views, voices and experiences of their communities, while ensuring these still pass independent scrutiny and fact-checking processes to filter for harmful, untrue or misleading information.

While some local governments may feel uncomfortable by the extra scrutiny provided by local news, they also benefit from this work. Local, independent news provides a mechanism for governments to receive community feedback, encourages political and democratic participation, and strengthens engagement with local decisionmaking processes. Not only this but these publications also support emergency preparedness and resilience and builds social cohesion and connection.

Findings from the Digital News Report: Australia 2024 demonstrate that compared with other news topics, "local news has the widest gap between interest and availability", with 64% of Australians most interested in local news but only half of them saying they are getting enough.

While innovation and change is extremely important, perhaps in this instance it's time to return our support to more traditional journalism. This does not mean discrediting journalists or publications that do not conform to "professional" expectations of pay, education level or income. On the contrary, much of the most valuable reporting around the country is being performed by people who have stepped up within their communities to act as journalists, often without pay or formal training. Support from audiences, advertisers, and policy makers, however, needs to be directed to publications that maintain a 'pre-media democratisation' standard of independence and content and editorial guidelines.

With Australia set to follow the US to the polls within the next six months, supporting independent news media has never been more important for our democracy.







### Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

Moruya River

The river has been fishing well this past week, with good reports coming from all along the river. The lower reaches, that are warmer than the upper reaches, have been producing the better fish. Preddy's wharf and the hole in the wall area have been holding some good numbers of salmon and Trevally, with a few nice flathead coming from this area also. Now that the water temps are pushing 20 deg along the coast, and even warmer out wider, the river temps are going to start climbing quickly. Expect the fishing to really ramp up overhead next few weeks. Bring on the whiting over the flats please!

The town bridge flats also have been holding some nice flathead, bream and the odd whiting. All of these can been seen working the flats in the middle of the river, from the height advantage given to you when viewing the flats from the bridge itself. Live nippers dropped in front of an unsuspecting bream, whiting or flathead can result in a few nice fish for the table.

After a long drive last weekend up the Araluen valley, the Deua river and the valley itself are in need of some good rainfall. The river is looking low in places and the valley could do with some precipitation.

### Tuross river.

Reports from Tuross have been good this week, with flathead, bream and mulloway all being reported as the river temps continue to improve the further you move upstream. The shallow back bays, and sand flats towards the front of the system, have been the most active areas for anglers chasing flathead, while the extensive systems of oyster racks this waterway is known for, have been producing some nice bream. I personally like throwing lures at fish working the racks on a rising tide. The bream can been seen chasing crabs and the oysters themselves on top of the racks as the rising tides gives them access to this food rich environment. Surface lures or very shallow running hard body lures as well as lightly weighted soft plastics all work a treat in these areas. Be prepared to do battle with a fish, that already has the advantage of a sharp oyster encrusted home to get away from. Tighter than normal drags and heavier handed techniques can be required to stop a good bream from getting back into cover. Expect to loose some lures if you choose to fish the racks.

The top, fresh sections of the Tuross system, are also very low at the moment, with rainfall required to get things flowing again. This can concentrate the bass into the deeper holes, which in turn increases the pressure on them. Remember your size restrictions and bag limits if you are going to take a feed. I personally prefer to put bass back, as I enjoy being able to catch them again next time I go out.

### Rock and Beach.

The salmon continue to be the main stay along the beaches and break walls at the moment, with the only dampening factor being the incessant wind, that won't ease up of late. The weekend doesn't appear to be offering any let up of the wind, with it forecast to be southerly one day, NE the next the southerly the day after that! This makes planning a trip onto the beaches more challenging. For those happy to get out there, salmon, tailor and the odd bream have all been reported along the local beaches, with the fish being where you find them.

### Offshore

The winds have made getting offshore more difficult this last week, with those getting out early having the best success. Snapper and flathead have all been on the cards, with the snapper starting to move into slightly deeper water as the temps start to climb. Start looking in the 30-40m mark or deeper for the reds.

Looking at the sea surface temp charts, a good amount of warm current from up north has moved in, so we can expect the game crews to start turning up a few game fish any time now. Lets me know how you go, if this is your kind of fishing.

The bait freezer is well stoked if everything except hawksbury prawns. Like you a lot of you, I am also waiting on the, to become available again. I'll be sure to let you know when they are back in the freezer.

Come in and check out the new Pro Lure Hybrid Shrimp lures, these will be excellent on the bream along the local breakwalls, bridge pylons, snag structure and even over the flats. I have grabbed a couple for myself and will be trying them out as soon as I get some spare time over the weekend.

The shop continues to get stock for the rapidly approaching silly season, with more on the way. We have a good sized delivery from Kings late last week, so we are well stoked for the summer season. Stay safe everyone and remember, "Every day's a good day for fishing..."



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# Faster response times for lifesavers in Durras

ESC - Drownings on remote beaches north of Eurobodalla have prompted lifesavers, Council, and the community to come together in search of a solution

In the past five years Batemans Bay Surf Lifesaving Club has responded to 61 rescues outside of general patrol duties. For callouts to Durras, that means a 30-minute trip, hauling gear from the surf club at Malua Bay. Branch duty officer Anthony Bellette said Bondi Surf Lifesaving Club donated an inflatable rescue boat (IRB) which was a good start toward getting necessary gear closer to the action, sooner.

"We have been passionate about increasing lifesaving coverage across the northern part of our branch," Mr Bellette said.

"Durras is a beautiful area of national parks and remote camping, but no patrolled beaches and there have been fatalities. We've had several callouts to Pebbly Beach over the years, and a recent drowning prompted us to find a better solution.

"The IRB has already proven its worth being tasked to help two people out of a rip last weekend. But it's parked at the house of one of our members – that isn't ideal."

Mr Bellette contacted Eurobodalla Council and the Durras Community Association, looking for a suitable facility to store rescue equipment. Council's recreation development coordinator Tina Smith said the vacant sportsground facility was a perfect fit.

"This building has sat dormant for about 20 years - since the last time it was used by the local soccer club," Ms Smith said.

"We've replaced the roof and will give it a tidy up - remove the graffiti and upgrade the toilets. We are also negotiating with a local playgroup to see them use the other half of the building."

Ms Smith said Council fast-tracked the license so the surf club could begin improvements to the building in time for Summer.


"It's exciting to get the building back in use and we'll help make it fit for purpose," Ms Smith said.

The Durras Community Association put \$5,000 towards lifesaving gear, Reflex roller doors donated a garage door and Camerons Hardware donated construction materials. Mr Bellette said volunteer tradies were already lined up to do the work.

Quick access to the IRB and emergency resuscitation equipment will be great for surf rescues, but also for bushfire evacuations.

"With one way in and out of Durras, we can help people evacuate by water if the road gets blocked like it did during the 2019-20 bushfires," he said.

Ahead of Summer, Mr Bellette was keen to recruit more people to join the Durras call-out team, which will respond to incidents as far as north as Dolphin Point. Any interested Durras locals can contact <a href="mailto:Anthony.Bellette@slsnsw.org">Anthony.Bellette@slsnsw.org</a>



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
