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The children of Gaza

As you are probably aware, the children of Gaza are suffering unimaginable losses as a result of war; the loss of parents, siblings, grandparents, playmates, pets, their homes, their schools, their childhoods.

The Back to Learning program which started on August 1 this year is aimed at over 650,000 Gazan children who have not been able to attend school since the beginning of the war. In addition to missing out on learning, these children are severely traumatised surrounded as they are by death, the terror of air strikes, snipers, continual displacement and of feeling permanently unsafe.

The first phase of Back to Learning is a psychosocial program involving teachers and counsellors and includes mental health enhancing activities as well as safety lessons and food support. Included in the program are the arts, music, sports, as well as literacy and numeracy. The safety lessons focus on the risks from explosive ordinance.

As Mais, a 15 year old displaced from her home in Beit Hanoun said: "I miss my school friends and my normal life. These learning activities bring me joy, helping to fill the void this war has

In the last few weeks Israel has introduced a new law stopping all activities of UNRWA in Gaza, which runs this program as well as providing the majority of humanitarian aid to Palestinians in Gaza and throughout the Middle East. It will come into effect in January.

There has been widespread objection to this move across the world including

from Australia.

In the meantime, the children of Gaza continue to suffer and their suffering will only worsen.

Council approves plan to increase town density

By Phil Herrick A plan to make it easier to build a second house on an existing block of residential land has was approved by the Eurobodalla Shire Council on Tuesday. Council will now amend the Eurobodalla Local Environmental Plan 2012 to allow Torrens Title subdivision of existing or proposed dual occupancy development in the R2 Low Density Residential Zone. It means many property owners in the R2 zone, which covers most of the shire's urban areas, will be able to more easily split their block of land for a dual occupancy development, increasing the density of houses in towns and villages in the shire. The key change is to allow the new lot to be created with a Torrens Title. Until now, the only way residential lots could be split for dual occupancy was by creating a strata subdivision. Strata title means that there are multiple owners of properties on one piece of land and all owners are responsible for the common areas. Torrens title, also known as freehold, means there is just one owner of the land and building. It is the standard title in NSW for residential land.

The change in the rules will only apply to lots with a minimum size of 550 square metres in the R2 Low Density Residential Zone. It will allow a subdivision down to 300 square metres with one dwelling allowed on each lot. The council hopes the changes will encourage residential development in urban areas with existing services and utilities, minimise the demand for new land releases and help increase housing affordability and variety in the shire.

Governor of New South Wales to visit Far South Coast

In Bega, the Governor and Mr Wilson will meet staff from local Youth Justice Community Offices, see Tulgeen Disability Services supported employment programs in action, and tour the Women's Resource Centre and Sapphire Community Pantry, where they will hear about the Southern Women's Group advocacy and community programs.

They will also visit the site of the planned National Circularity Centre to see presentations on the Bega Circular Valley program, before attending a reception hosted by the Bega Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

In Bermagui, the Vice Regal Couple will meet members of local CWA branches at the Bermagui CWA Cottage, and tour Australia Oyster Coast's onshore facilities and oyster leases.

They will visit the Tilba Winery and Ale House in Corunna, meet students and teachers at Cobargo Public School, hear from community members involved in bushfire recovery efforts at the Cobargo RSL Memorial Hall, and attend a BBQ with Cobargo RFS members at the Cobargo Rural Fire Brigade Station.

After exploring the beauty of Barunguba-Montague Island with NSW NPWS staff and rangers, the Governor and Mr Wilson will meet Narooma High School students and teachers, hear from Eurobodalla Shire Council members about Council plans, challenges, and initiatives, and meet Elders and members of the Mogo Local Aboriginal Land Council to learn about the Fire to Flourish and other programs. 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Historic Moruya Quarry celebrates Centenery

Descendants of the Moruya Quarry Foreman John Gilmore, along with Rotarians, the Moruya Business Chamber and members of the public celebrated the 100th anniversary of work beginning at the historic quarry on Monday evening.

After an eagle eyed Facebooker posted that November 18 was the centenary, the Business Chamber acted quickly to arrange a small ribbon cutting and cake.

Grand daughter of Gilmore Christine Greig spoke about the importance of the work carried out there and amazing feat of producing 170,000 granite blocks for the harbour bridge all cut to size, and not one was incorrect.

The youngest descendent of John Gilmore, Isaac Paull was invited to blow out the candles.

Granite Town: A Legacy Carved in Stone



Moruya, NSW A century ago, on Monday, November 18th, master stonemason and guarry-master John Gilmore turned the first sod at Granite Town. Gilmore had arrived in Moruya with his wife Mary and nine children from Scotland only a week earlier. Granite Town was to become the epicentre of massive operation to supply granite for the Sydney Harbour

At its peak, the quarry employed 250 workers, providing rare job stability in rural Australia during a difficult economic era. Granite Town flourished as a well-equipped settlement, boasting 72 cottages, accommodations for bachelors, a school, a community hall, a co-op store, a post office, and even a swimming pool.

To address a shortage of skilled labour, the company brought in expert stonemasons from Scotland. Meanwhile, several Italian stonemasons also joined the workforce; however, most were already residing in Australia, as the Stonemasons Society strongly opposed the importation of

Over seven years, a monumental 173,000 granite blocks and 152,910 cubic meters of crushed stone were produced. By 1931, the work was finished, and Granite Town faded almost as quickly as it had emerged. Most of the small cottages were sold and relocated, with only one remaining on the original site. While many workers returned to their homes, some, including John Gilmore and his family, chose to stay and build new lives in the area.

Granite Town's story endures through personal accounts and the efforts of dedicated historians, including Christine Greig, the great-granddaughter of quarry-master John Gilmore., John Gilmore's great grand-daughter. The site was memorialised as Quarry Park, established by by Moruya Rotary and Skillshare. Granite Town and its quarry remain a unique and captivating chapter in Moruya's rich history.

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Shire Housing Strategy deferred by Council

By Phil Herrick A strategy presented on Tuesday to the Eurobodalla Shire Council for future housing development in the shire was rejected and sent back to the staff for more work.

The councillor's decision came after a number of people spoke in the public forum session, all criticising the draft strategy that had been tabled. Adoption of a housing strategy by the council is a requirement of the NSW government. Like camel buyers at an Arabian market, the public speakers picked out every flea on the strategy, along with their view that an eye was missing, an ear had been chewed off and the darn thing had only three

Most criticism was directed at the section on affordable housing, a topic that has been dominating the national conversation this year.

Despite the flaws, the document has some interesting data, including the estimation that up to 310 new dwellings need to be built each year in the shire to cater for the expected population growth. It also notes that in the last four years house prices in the shire have doubled. When it came to a vote, the majority of councillors rejected the recommendation from Gary Bruce, the director of planning and environment, to adopt the strategy and instead voted to send it back to him, presumably marked "could do better, needs more work".

Motion Carried -

That Council defer its decision on the Housing Strategy to allow further detailed discussion with a view to further develop strategies and mechanisms to facilitate and deliver affordable housing, including Social and Community housing and housing that is affordable for the local workforce to buy or rent.

ABE Presentation on the Draft Housing Strategy.

Good afternoon. Thank you for the opportunity to address Council regarding PSR24/018 Draft Housing Strategy, and congratulations to new and returning Councillors.

I am presenting as Co-Convenor of A Better Eurobodalla (ABE), a community forum dedicated to having open and inclusive government in our region. ABE has applied our principles of good governance to the draft Housing Strategy, and urges Councillors to reject the recommendation to endorse the draft document at today's meeting.

The draft Eurobodalla Housing Strategy (EHS) is intended to fulfil Council's obligations under the 2018 NSW Local Housing Strategy Guidelines, which assist councils in developing their Local Housing Strategies, and provide a detailed outline and template of how to undertake this process. Unfortunately, the draft EHS has largely ignored these guidelines, with many key elements either missing or briefly glossed over.

For example, the NSW Local Housing Guidelines specifically state that the strategic purpose of a housing strategy is "to present council's response for how the housing components of District and Regional Plans will be delivered locally. Where housing targets (including affordable housing targets) are part of Regional or District Plans, these should be addressed in the Local Housing Strategy" This strategic purpose is missing from the draft EHS, which also fails to properly address 3 key housing objectives included in the draft South East & Regional Tablelands Plan. These are : Objective 17 - Plan for a supply of housing in appropriate locations;

Objective 18 - Plan for more affordable, low-cost and social housing; and

Objective 19 - Improve the quality, resilience and sustainability of housing.

In terms of these objectives, the draft EHS provides a partial response to Objective 17, avoids or pays lip service to Objective 18, and totally ignores Objective 19. It therefore fails to fulfil its key strategic purpose.

The omission of Objective 19 is particularly notable, given that ESC's own Local Strategic Planning Statement (LSPS) includes the strategic priority to "Promote sustainable living" (with specific mention of sustainable building principles), and the draft EHS also fails to mention Council's Climate Change Action Plan, which includes multiple recommendations and initiatives directly relevant to this objective. Sustainable building design and construction are key elements of an integrated approach to housing in general, and affordable housing in particular, as they dramatically reduce the recurrent running costs of housing.

Other notable disparities from the NSW Local Housing Guidelines include:

- failure to include an implementation and delivery plan as required in the Guidelines, which state: The LHS should include an implementation and delivery plan that will identify when and how housing will be delivered over the life of the LHS, what type of housing will be delivered, where it will be located and the mechanism for delivering it.
- lack of a specific monitoring and reporting process which can be used to evaluate the effectiveness of the strategy, thereby failing to fulfil Step 4 of the Guidelines.
- the EHS objectives fail to include the amount and type of housing required to address particular needs, including affordable housing, adaptable housing, seniors and people with a disability, local workers and students, even though these categories are specifically required by the Guidelines.

It is striking that people with a disability, seniors, local workers and students are not mentioned at all in the EHS – they have been totally ignored. Furthermore, in terms of affordability, it is noteworthy that all 3 LGAs adjoining Eurobodalla already have Affordable Housing Strategies, with Bega Valley Shire commissioning an Affordable Housing Implementation Group (including community members) which has met regularly since 2022. In contrast, Eurobodalla Shire cannot bring itself to use the word 'affordable" as an adjective describing its own housing strategy, which essentially proposes that Council cannot do anything to improve housing affordability. Why this disparity? What unique characteristic sets Eurobodalla Shire apart from its neighbours when it comes to affordable housing strategies? No clear explanation is given in the draft EHS. The draft EHS also reflects a flawed approach to the 2 information sources used in its compilation, which are a Local Housing Strategy Background Report by Judith Stubbs & Associates and a Eurobodalla Housing Supply Audit by Gyde Consulting

The Local Housing Background Report is of excellent quality, with plenty of useful information and ideas for policies and actions (e.g. the appointment of a dedicated Housing Officer to Council), yet most of these suggestions have been ignored or downplayed in the draft EHS without any concrete reasoning or explanation. This omission constitutes a major deficiency in the draft EHS.

In contrast, the Eurobodalla Housing Supply Audit exhibits significant deficiencies which are reflected in the draft EHS. The Audit is a GISdriven desktop assessment containing contradictory information on the number of dwellings approved per year (28/year in the Executive Summary compared to 310/year in Section 2.3), and is also contradictory in its application of conservation criteria. For example, Table 3 on Page 12 states that E2/C2 conservation areas are "non-mitigable" (and hence cannot be developed), yet Table 8 on page 42 indicates that part of the Broulee site listed for development includes land zoned C2, and is scheduled to be available for development from 2029. The Audit Report also implicitly assumes that

significant environmental constraints (including bushfire and flooding hazards) can somehow be "mitigated" with the passage of 5 or more years of time (see table 3 on page 12). This is an unsustainable assumption, which flies in the face of lived experience in the recent Lismore and western Sydney floods, as well as the catastrophic 2019-20 Black Summer Bushfires.

In summary, the draft EHS fails to provide a coherent and logically structured plan to respond to pressing current needs. It relies extensively on a housing audit with unrealistic/unsustainable assumptions embedded in its core methodology, while ignoring many practical suggestions in an excellent Background Report. In addition, it fails to meet key requirements of the NSW Housing Strategy Guidelines, ignores people with a disability, seniors, local workers and students, and does not provide monitoring and review tools to allow evaluation of the strategy's effectiveness. In its present state, the draft EHS cannot be considered an adequate basis for planning future housing activities in the Eurobodalla. It needs to be deferred so it can be significantly reworked to bring it up to standard, and then put on exhibition for genuine community consideration and feedback.

Plans for New Animal Pound at North Moruya

Lost dogs and cats will have a more comfortable time at the shire's animal pound if plans put to the Tuesday meeting of the Eurobodalla Shire Council bear fruit.

The current animal pound at the north Moruya industrial area is 33 years old and is judged as being unfit for purpose under today's standards.

Building a new animal pound depends on council getting a grant to fund the work, but General Manager Warwick Winn sounded optimistic that funds were available and that up to \$3 million would be sought.

The intention is to build the new facility on the same block of land at the intersection of Pollwombra Road and Shelly Road. The site also houses the old sale yards.

Cr Rob Pollock agreed the location for new building was suitable, but was also keen on having a review of the layout of buildings and yards on the block, citing the limited availability of industrial land in the shire.

The council voted to develop the plans and also chase grant funds to take the project to the next stage.



Pattern book designs released

The Minns NSW Government has revealed six outstanding designs that have been selected as the winners of the NSW Pattern Book Design Competition, helping deliver more well-built homes, faster.

This competition was established to speed up the delivery of homes after the NSW Government inherited a housing supply crisis that has led to Sydney losing twice as many young people as it is gaining, putting us at risk of becoming a city with no grandchildren.

These designs will also deliver homes faster by providing anyone who uses the endorsed pattern book designs with an accelerated approval pathway – meaning builders can get on site faster, and people can move into new homes sooner. Winning designs, comprising three terraces and three mid-rise apartments, will help shape the future face of housing across New South Wales.

The winning designs were picked because of their accessibility, adaptability to changing lifestyle needs, affordability and environmental sustainability. They respond to the unique Australian climate, including a focus on indoor and outdoor living and how to incorporate shade and ventilation.

These designs will also be brought to life and built on a selection of five NSW Government-owned sites from Homes NSW, Landcom and Sydney Olympic Park Authority, so that the public can walk through and experience them first-hand. The NSW Pattern Book Design Competition was overseen by a five-person jury of international design professionals, chaired by NSW Government Architect Abbie Galvin and endorsed by the Australian Institute of Architects.

The NSW Government will launch the NSW Housing Pattern Book of housing designs in mid-2025, and anyone who uses one of the designs will have access to the fast-tracked planning pathway.

Local Government Conference condemns Minns Government's new planning body

Delegates to the peak local government conference this week have condemned the recent announcement by the Minns Government of a new planning body that will bypass local councils and communities on large housing developments.

The unanimous move was one of the first items of business at the Local Government NSW Annual Conference taking place in Tamworth.

The sector has voiced widespread concern at the Premier's announcement on Friday, which will see a three-person planning authority given responsibility for housing developments over \$60 million in the Sydney region and over \$30 million in rural and regional areas.

Statements in support of the motion referred to the need for communities to retain their voice in such developments via their democratically elected councils.

"The housing crisis is multifaceted and requires all three spheres of government working together," said LGNSW President Cr Darriea Turley AM.

"The local government sector is already doing our part and delegates to our conference are keen to work with State Government for further reform. What we don't need though is for councils and communities to be pushed aside and excluded from the process in a move that will only lead to inappropriate overdevelopment and increased profits for developers," Cr Turley said.

"The announcement adds more uncertainty to the planning system and will further delay actual construction of housing on already approved sites. Why would developers build under the many approvals that already exist, when the NSW Government is effectively encouraging them to lodge new applications that exceed local planning controls, and where they can make windfall profits from spot rezoning?

"We call on the Minns government to abandon plans for this undemocratic body and to work with us and with our communities."

The motion passed at the LGNSW Annual Conference: Motion #4: Addressing the housing crisis – Greater collaboration on planning reforms

That Local Government NSW and councils across the state: 1.reaffirm their support for actions to address the housing crisis and acknowledge the need for new and more diverse housing in well-located areas across NSW.

2. call on the NSW Government to commit to a more collaborative approach in codesigning and implementing planning reforms with councils to ensure:

1.Reforms are responsive to different planning contexts and deliver high quality, liveable and sustainable housing, neighbourhoods and communities.

- 2. Plans and provisions are made for the funding and timely delivery of both state and local infrastructure needed to support increased density.
- 3. Changes aimed at increasing development density uplift include the provision of affordable housing in-perpetuity.
- 4. There is robust, transparent and regular monitoring by the NSW Government of the outcomes of planning reforms with a holistic approach to the roles of all players in the planning and development process.
- 3. call on the NSW Government to investigate the number of vacant dwellings in NSW and how these can be quickly made available for housing.
- 4. condemn the NSW Government's 15 November 2024 announcement that it will bypass councils and communities with a new spot-rezoning and state approval pathway, which will deliver windfall gains for developers while removing safeguards that protect communities from inappropriate overdevelopment.

Consumers ripped off on fresh fruit and vegetables, charged more for loose produce than plastic wrapped equivalent: new report

Australian supermarkets are not doing nearly enough to address the plastic pollution crisis, according to the second review of supermarkets' plastic use released today by the Australian Marine Conservation Society and the Boomerang Alliance, which represents 55 conservation groups. The report, Unwrapped 2024: Plastic use in Australian Supermarkets, found that there are perverse incentives for consumers to take home more plastic by charging more for loose fruit and vegetables compared with plastic-wrapped produce 73% of the time. For example, loose potatoes were 53% more expensive than bagged potatoes per kilogram. Buying unwrapped produce is costing the average family \$155 more a year – almost the cost of an average shop.

Woolworths ranked first in the 2024 audit with an overall score of 38%, a marked improvement from its 2023 score of 10%. Metcash has also improved significantly, taking second spot with 23% after receiving 3% last year. Coles was third with 20% (15% in 2023), while Aldi plummeted from top spot in 2023 (with 20%) to last place in 2024 due to a lack of data and delayed reporting. Transparency is a critical area assessed in the audit.

AMCS Plastics Campaign Manager Cip Hamilton said: "Plastic pollution is an environmental crisis, polluting our oceans and waterways, killing marine life and even impacting human health. Recent research shows that as plastic production increases, so does plastic pollution. Recycling just can't keep up with the amount of plastic waste we produce. We need to cut our plastic use, but the supermarkets are not giving us a fair option to do that.

"Supermarkets are a big contributor to the plastic problem, but they are not doing enough to cut plastic packaging and achieve the national packaging reductions targets they have supported.

Boomerang spokesperson Jeff Angel said: "We are launching the audit at

Manly Cove in Sydney Harbour because it is one of Australia's worst hotspots for microplastics caused by our excessive and irresponsible use of disposable plastics. This is a crisis confronting us right now. Our organisations have urged the Commonwealth to step in and introduce a stewardship scheme for packaging. This should include mandated targets to reduce, reuse, recycle and increase recycled content of packaging."

Ms Hamilton said: "The audit found that overall supermarket performance has improved since our first audit in 2023, but transparency is still a major issue. None of the supermarkets audited disclose how much plastic packaging they use in total, even in their own-brand products, but they do highlight minor efforts to reduce plastic packaging on items, such as the replacement of plastic bread tags with cardboard. This makes it impossible to determine if these efforts to cut plastic on items are reducing their overall plastic packaging footprint.

"What is really disappointing is that Woolworths, Coles and Aldi are charging more for loose fruit and vegetables than plastic-wrapped produce more than 70% of the time, and sometimes the price difference is startling. Loose potatoes cost on average 53% more than bagged potatoes per kilogram.

"In the midst of a cost-of-living crisis, shoppers should not be penalised for buying in smaller quantities and avoiding plastic and trying to reduce food waste, which is a major problem in Australia. It's costing the average family \$155 more a year just to buy loose potatoes, onions and apples – that's almost the cost of a weekly shop."

In Australia we waste 7.6 million tonnes of food each year – or 312kg per person – and 70% of this food is edible. OzHarverst, Woolworths' food rescue charity, encourages consumers to buy loose fruit and vegetables to avoid food waste, while supermarkets' pricing discourages it. Plastic packaging does not improve shelf life either, with a UK report by charity Waste and Resources Action Programme (WRAP) found that plastic wrapping had "no or little meaningful effect on extending the life of fresh produce"

Plastic accounted for more than 80% of the litter collected by Clean Up Australia volunteers in 2023. Much of which was plastic packaging from products found on supermarket shelves. Australia's \$131.7 billion supermarket industry is dominated by four main players, which are well placed to make substantial reductions to Australia's plastic packaging footprint.

The packaging industry acknowledges the problem and has set voluntary targets to cut plastic use, but we are not even remotely close to hitting the 2025 targets. Supermarkets have supported the 2025 National Packaging Targets, which include recovering 70% of plastic packaging by 2025 for recycling or composting, yet we were only recovering 20% by 2022.

Mr Angel said: "We are addressing the plastic crisis completely in the wrong way. Instead of concentrating on cutting plastic use, there is a focus on increasing recycling and composting capabilities, which are just not keeping up with the mountains of plastic waste we produce. "There has been such a shocking lack of action by businesses that the Australian Government has begun listening to the community to regulate packaging and make businesses accountable for their plastic packaging. The results of the 2024 audit should hasten promised action to regulate plastic producers at the Australian environment ministers' meeting in December leading to real reductions in plastic packaging, more recycled content and reuse options. Next week governments from across the globe will meet in South Korea to try to negotiate a global treaty to limit plastic production, but face stiff opposition from big oil and plastic producing nations."

Merger reforms a solid start

Farmers have welcomed new merger reforms amid supermarket pricing scandals and the cost of living crisis, but warn more work must be done to fix entrenched competition problems impacting families. On Thursday the House of Representatives passed new merger and acquisition laws in a move to improve competition and productivity across the Australian economy.

NSW Farmers Business, Economics and Trade Committee chair John Lowe said the reforms would mark a positive step forward in addressing the nation's competition problems, but there was still more to be done to protect consumers in the marketplace.

"These laws will be a big step forward for Australia's competition reform, and it's our hope they can be put in force to stop big businesses from entrenching their market power by stealth and forming harmful oligopolies in the future," Mr Lowe said.

"However, farmers and families have already paid the

"However, farmers and families have already paid the price of extreme market concentration within our supermarket sector – not to mention our dairy and meat processing sectors – and broader reforms are needed to address the market power problems that already exist."

Opening markets up to competition by addressing unfair trading practices, expanding the right to repair to agricultural equipment, and introducing divestiture powers were among the measures Mr Lowe said would complement merger and acquisition reforms and aid a more effective crackdown on anticompetitive behaviour.

"More sweeping reforms would go a long way towards undoing the damage of mergers past, and building a fairer economy for the future," Mr Lowe said.

"There is no silver bullet solution to our market power woes, and we need to be able to draw on a range of tools to regulate businesses in a way that's fair for everyone in the supply chain.

"These laws are certainly the start of positive change on competition, but they won't be the end to all our problems."



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Harsher penalties for vape suppliers as NSW Government seizes 300,000 products The NSW Government has seized over

The NSW Government has seized over 300,000 vapes over the past year, as it introduces harsher penalties for suppliers in the NSW Parliament.

Maximum penalties for illegal vape supply are set to soar from \$1,650 to approximately \$1.54 million, with prison sentences increasing from six months to seven years.

The NSW Government has introduced the legislation in the NSW Parliament as it moves to align vaping offences with the Commonwealth's.

Offences will also be added for possession of commercial quantity of vaping products and for retailer possession of vaping products. As with the Commonwealth vaping reforms, the intent of these offences is to target suppliers over individual users of vaping products. The introduction of new illegal vape penalties comes as the Government has seized over 300,000 vaping products over the past year.

Between 1 July 2024 to 30 September 2024, 42,000 products were seized from 362

inspections.

This is compared to the same period the previous year when 153,000 products were seized from 290 inspections.

The lower number of products seized in the most recent quarter may be the result of the disruption in product availability in the market following the introduction of new Commonwealth vaping laws.

The NSW Government announced in October it would recruit an additional 14 enforcement officers to strengthen compliance efforts for vaping and tobacco products across the state.

NSW Health recognises the importance of supporting pharmacists, prescribers, and wholesalers in complying with laws regarding the supply and sale of therapeutic vaping products and has introduced an eCigarette Compliance Program to assist with this. The program's initial focus is on providing support to pharmacists, with a team of specialised compliance officers visiting pharmacies across the state to offer on-site education and guidance.

NSW Health partners with the Commonwealth, NSW Police, the Therapeutic Goods Administration, and Australian Border Force on enforcement related to illegal vape and tobacco sales, sharing intelligence, and working on joint operations.

Construction begins on NSW's first 3D-printed social housing project

The Minns Labor Government continues to use innovative methods to solve the housing crisis with construction now underway on the state's first 3D-printed social housing properties in Dubbo.

The development will transform a vacant block of land into two modern two-bedroom duplexes for Aboriginal social housing tenants. This innovative method of construction will reduce costs and cut construction time in half, delivering more homes sooner for those who need them.

The success of the project will help determine whether this modern method of construction can deliver much needed social and affordable homes across the state more quickly and sustainably.

Indigenous company Aboriginal Sustainable Homes is developing the site in partnership with Contour3D and the 3D-printed houses will soon provide Aboriginal Housing Office (AHO) tenants a safe and secure place to call home.

The printed concrete structures for the modern duplexes are due to be completed within 16 days using approximately 70 tonnes of bespoke Contourcrete, a proprietary 3D printable concrete pioneered by Contour3D.

Once the 3D-printed structure is complete, the roof structure will be installed and the internal fit out commences, with the homes expected to be ready for tenants to move in by February 2025.

3D-printing produces significantly less waste, and the concrete mix uses eco-friendly recycled materials to produce a robust and energy efficient home with substantially reduced lifecycle maintenance costs.

The total construction time for this project is 16 weeks, while using conventional methods for a similar build could take up to 40 weeks.

With prior experience of working with the AHO, Aboriginal Sustainable Homes (ASH) was contracted to deliver the new, fast and cost-effective development in partnership with Contour3D.

The project is supported by Dubbo Regional Council, who approved the Development Application (DA) in July 2024.

Did you know you can recycle polystyrene?



The Council waste team at Surf Beach, Moruya and Brou waste facilities have been at it for years, saving space in landfill. In a new video Eurobodalla Council's waste operations coordinator Evan Brooks talks through the recycling process of polystyrene and styrofoam at Surf Beach waste facility. There is a designated section for these bulky, awkward chunks of plastic foam ... they're melted down and sent off to be turned into something else.

Polystyrene is a widely used plastic found in products like packaging, disposable cups, and containers. Styrofoam, a brand name for expanded polystyrene (EPS), is often used for insulation and packaging. While both materials are lightweight and convenient, they can harm the environment if not disposed of properly.

New vessels launched to protect against water pollution

The NSW Government is investing in a fleet of new hazardous materials (HAZMAT) vessels to help limit oil, diesel and other pollutant spills in the state's waterways, with 19 new vessels being rolled out to Fire and Rescue NSW units across the state.

The new locally made vessels replace a 15-year-old fleet and offer larger and more stable platforms for crews to operate from.

The \$1.58 million fleet is part of the NSW Government's \$18.6 million investment in FRNSW's Fleet Replacement Program 2024-25.

Each vessel can tow and deploy absorbent and containment booms to limit hazardous spills. They also carry specialised equipment designed to contain and recover contaminants, reducing environmental harm during an incident.

An initial three vessels have been delivered to locations in Bathurst, Newcastle and Shellharbour, while additional units will be delivered to locations including Batemans Bay, Berkeley Vale, Broken Hill, Coffs Harbour, Dubbo, Eden, Goonellabah, Leeton, Lithgow, Port Macquarie, Tamworth, Tweed Heads and Wagga Wagga over coming months. The new vessels are strategically located and can be deployed at any time, with response times of under two hours. They are also fitted with advanced emissions technology using the most efficient controls available to help limit their environmental impact.

Operators of the HAZMAT vessels undergo rigorous training, ensuring crews are prepared for complex incidents. Training is planned for teams in Berkeley Vale by the end of the year with the remaining boats to be rolled out by June 2025.

100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society





22-11-1924

Mr. W. McIntosh, jnr., who deserves luck for his enterprise, has invested in a second lorry for his Moruya-Araluen service. The latest purchase is a 2½ ton Vulcan, and is one of the largest lorries in this district.

A motor cycle reliability trial took place on Sunday. The course was from Goulburn via Araluen, Moruya, Bateman's Bay, Nelligen and return. Over 20 cyclists started. Less than a dozen returned. What happened to the rest has so far not been recorded. At the usual monthly meeting of the Moruya District Hospital the House Committee reported every thing satisfactory. The small verandah room has been constructed and requires a ceiling and painting. The footpath in front of the building needs chipping, and about ½ a load of gravel. Two loads of gravel are needed for the back yard. The lawn requires mowing. They recommend that a man be engaged for one day a month to do odd jobs about the place, including splitting up the wood. These matters were left in the Treasurer and Secretary's hands to deal with.

Moruya Progress Association. Monthly meeting – Mr. Hansen agreed to see other men of the committee and have the weather shed at the Heads painted as early as possible; It was also agreed that an endeavor be made to get a public oyster lease granted 500 yards east of the town wharf on both sides of the river; Resolved that the Shire Council be written to asking that an area of about 6 acres at Myrtle Corner along the Kiora road be dedicated as a public recreation reserve. Also that the sign post at Wamban turn at Kiora be repainted; It was also resolved that the Council be asked to have the bad turn, over the other side of Polwamera going to Bateman's Bay, widened.

Whether it's the big screen or the latest TV series, the opening scene is identical. The male star returns home, opens the fridge, pulls out a beer, flips the lid and starts drinking. The female star is even more single-minded. She instantly pours a glass of wine red or white - and takes that first lovingly restorative gulp.

Depend on it. Every single time. 'Ahh...' you can almost feel that lovely sense of relaxation as her cares of the day surrender to the wonders of the booze.

In an earlier era, they also lit cigarettes. Thank goodness that's much less frequent these days. But somehow the alcohol industry - wine in particular has its claws firmly round the throat of the moving picture world for the best possible placement of their product.

'So what?' I hear you cry. 'That American beer is hardly alcoholic at all. And the wine...well, that's not really booze, it's the nectar of the gods, the mark of true civilization, a glorious libation with a socioreligious history from time immemorial...

Sure. But how well, I wonder, would it have survived without the very addictive addition of CH 3 CH 2 OH (ethanol-alcohol). Ask yourself, 'What percentage of wine sales are of the 'alcohol free' brand?'

I rest my case.

This is not the first time I have explored the issue. Like most journalists-cum-authors, I have had my own bout with the booze, particularly during my 30s and 40s. Fortunately, the combination of a resilient and beloved wife and my dedication to the storyteller's art pulled me through.

I once began research for a book on the chequered history of Alcoholics Anonymous with its 100 per cent recidivism. It was helpful to two of my friends, though I decried its demand to surrender to a 'higher power'. I even pretended to be a member and attended an AA meeting. I was surprised to see who else was there and though I declined to speak, half the attendees asked to be my 'sponsor'. I fled, never to return. My publisher wouldn't give me a sufficient advance to travel to the US where AA found fertile ground among the Godbotherers, so I wrote my Australian history books instead. But the fascination remained.

Alcohol is a desperately destructive force in our community. According to the ABS, more than five million Australians are today drinking harmful amounts of booze. Our little village at Waramanga has two stores - one an IGA, the other an Australia Post Office - both packed to the gunwales with wine. So-called 'fine-dining' restaurants make their profit not from tucker but by overcharging for the wine. And when China raises the wine tariff it's a national tragedy. Yet the drugs like cocaine get all the publicity though their communal effect aside from corrupting the police force - is minimal.

But Australia is small beer (as it were) in the wine stakes.. Recently we've been watching an international Swedish TV series, The Sandham Murders, a pretty classy production set in the Stockholm archipelago with (mostly) good scripts and a very attractive cast.

And here's the clincher. While hardly a scene goes by without their drinking wine, recently there's been a change. Suddenly, instead of white or red, everyone is drinking pink rosé. Men, women, morning, evening, anytime. So I checked with Google. And there, an industry spokesperson boasted, 'As of spring, we are starting to see sort of a bounce-back in rosé consumption in the U.S. as well as around the world.' QED.

Fiona Phillips leads petition for expanded Medicare Urgent Care Clinic at Batemans Bay

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips has launched a petition calling for extended operating hours and an increased level of care at the Batemans Bay Medicare Urgent Care Clinic. Mrs Phillips is encouraging Eurobodalla residents to sign the petition on her website which calls on the state and federal governments to upgrade the clinic that has provided walk-in care seven days a week since December 2023.

"The Batemans Bay community has embraced the fully bulk-billed service at the Medicare Urgent Care Clinic, but there is a definite need for an expansion of the service," Mrs Phillips said. "Around 7,500 patients have received treatment for urgent, not life-threatening care at the clinic since it opened almost one year ago, which has taken some pressure off local GPs and our local hospital.

"I have been lobbying for extended hours and a higher level of care, but I've decided to take the next step by launching a petition to give the public a chance to have their say as well." Mrs Phillips said the clinic currently operates seven days a week from 8am until 6pm.

"It would be great to see those hours extended closer to 24/7," she said.

"Once the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital opens at Moruya, the only practical way to have a higher level service in Batemans Bay is to support an expansion of the Batemans Bay Medicare Urgent Care Clinic. "If people want to see that happen, I encourage them to sign my petition which is on my website at www.fionaphillips.com.au"

Mrs Phillips said the Albanese Labor Government was making it easier for people in the Eurobodalla to access medical care when they need it.

"If Peter Dutton had his way, he'd close Medicare Urgent Care Clinics - like the one at Batemans Bay - as part of his \$315 billion cuts in spending," she said.

"Last time he was Health Minister he cut \$50 billion from hospitals."

Mrs Phillips said she was also pleased to see that an Expression of Interest was going out for a radiation therapy service for the Eurobodalla.

"I have championed for this services, so it's great to see that moving forward too," she said.

"I'm proud to have secured the Batemans Bay Urgent Care Clinic, the South Eastern Endometriosis and Pelvic Pain Clinic and the walk-in Medicare Mental Health Centre at Moruya, and I will continue to fight for improved local health services right across the Gilmore electorate." Community Building Partnership grants available soon to boost local community infrastructure projects

Friday, 22 November 2024
Local infrastructure projects across NSW
are set for a boost with the next round of
the NSW Government's Community
Building Partnership (CBP) grant
program to open early next year.
Incorporated not-for-profit community
organisations and local councils will be
eligible to apply for grants of between
\$10,000 and \$100,000.

Grants can be for building, refurbishing or repairing community infrastructure, or for buying freestanding equipment or vehicles.

Each state electorate receives a maximum of \$450,000 in funding and applications are assessed against other proposed projects within the same electorate

A total of \$41,850,000 in grants will be available for local infrastructure projects through the CBP program.

Since 2009, the program has awarded more than \$464 million to over 20,900 projects across the state.

Program Guidelines will be available soon at www.nsw.gov.au/cbp.

Applications will be accepted online from Tuesday 28 January 2025 and will close at 5pm AEDT, Friday 21 February 2025. Successful organisations will be announced later in 2025.

Kids Helpline gets \$17.1 million funding boost from NSW Government

The Minns Labor Government is improving access to essential mental health support for young people through a \$17.1 million investment in Kids Helpline, providing greater access to free counselling services for children and young people facing emotional distress or mental health challenges. Community organisation yourtown who runs Kids Helpline will use the funding to recruit up to 28 additional full time equivalent (FTE) counsellors based in NSW, providing greater access to the service in response to increasing demand.

The funding will upskill counsellors with additional practical skills to help them provide better support and strengthen the integration of Kids Helpline with local, area and state-wide services across mental health, child protection, education, employment and other social systems.

Kids Helpline (1800 55 1800) operates 24/7 and provides age-appropriate online and phone counselling and support for young people aged 5 to 25. Last year, the national service took more than 40,000 calls, mostly from teenagers aged 15-18.

Government expands support for families who lose loved ones to road crimes

The NSW Government last night has passed legislation to deliver on a key election commitment to expand support for families who have lost loved ones in road crimes. The Victims Rights and Support Amendment (Victims Support Counselling) Bill 2024 will make counselling available through the Victims Support Scheme to family members of a person killed in a motor vehicle crash where someone is charged in relation to the crash.

Under the changes, family members will also be eligible for counselling support if charges cannot be laid because the offender has died or cannot be located if there is sufficient evidence to establish that an offence has apparently occurred. An eligible family member will be able to access 22 hours of approved counselling, with further hours available if approved by the Commissioner of Victims Rights. Currently, most incidents involving motor vehicles are excluded from being 'acts of violence' under the Victims Rights and Support Act.

Family victims of road crime experience the same trauma as any other family who has lost a loved one because of a criminal act. This legislation will ensure they receive counselling as they navigate their loss.

Grants awarded to groundbreaking electrification projects

The NSW Government is awarding more than \$1 million in grants to support groundbreaking projects focused on reducing carbon emissions through electrification.

The Electrification & Energy Systems Network Seed Grant Scheme provides funding as part of the NSW Government's Decarbonisation Innovation Hub. The Hub supports researchers, industry and government stakeholders in critical sectors to increase the uptake of new technologies in decarbonising NSW.

Funding is being awarded to exciting early-stage projects that are working to resolve the technical, economic, social and environmental challenges of electrification technology.

Grants ranging from \$50,000 to \$200,000 will enable collaborative projects between universities and industry.

The evaluation process, conducted independently by an Industry Advisory Board, has rigorously assessed and identified a selection of high-quality, impactful projects deserving of grants.

The awardees are:

- University of Wollongong Identifying and Removing Barriers for Electricity System Planning.
- University of New South Wales Develop device electrification functionality for the APVI's SunSPOT solar and battery calculator.
- University of Technology Sydney Cost effective wireless energy harvesting from high voltage transmission lines.
 Macquarie University Powering F-Shuttles with Optimized Routes and
- Macquarie University Powering E-Shuttles with Optimized Routes and Magnetised Cement Charging.
- University of Sydney Recycling of Lithium from Discarded Battery Materials.
- Macquarie University Al-driven energy management platform.
- University of New South Wales Open Platform for Real-time Renewable Energy Bidding and Trading.

This initiative is funded by the NSW Environmental Trust and Network Partners: University of Newcastle, University of New South Wales, University of Wollongong, University of Technology Sydney.

Improving access to critical Road Safety Data

The Albanese Government is increasing the road safety data collected in order to better inform responses to road trauma and the concerning increase in road deaths. The new Road Safety Data Hub website which is live from today will have data available and will be a valuable resource not only for governments, but all interested in road safety.

With the finalisation of a new Funding Agreement between States, Territories and the Commonwealth, all jurisdictions have committed to share critical data that will be used to better inform policy decisions and funding allocations under the Road Safety Program. The new funding agreement represents a positive step in cooperation to boost road safety and I thank the States and Territories for the shared commitment to addressing road trauma.

After detailed negotiations, a range of road data, including information about fatalities, hospitalisations, police enforcement and analysis of crash risk will be available. A clear picture, underpinned by data, about where best to target road safety funding will save lives and ensure we are investing in the projects that will make the biggest difference. Through the Hub, this data will be provided in a searchable catalogue on data.gov.au. The Hub website also integrates links to a number of other road safety government websites and includes a submission form for public feedback.

Mogo Land Council home rises from the ashes



A vibrant new community space giving young Aboriginal people on the South Coast the tools to succeed as part of the Mogo Local Aboriginal Land Council's (LALC) new home, is now officially open.

Mogo LALC was awarded more than \$2.9 million through the Australian and NSW Government's Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund, after their offices were destroyed by fires that swept through Mogo in December 2019.

The new two-storey building boasts cultural and functional spaces with an exhibition area, café and commercial kitchen bringing the community together on the ground floor. Upstairs meeting rooms on the mezzanine level will be available for hire, offering a fresh space for the community to gather, learn and celebrate.

The 2019 bushfires were devastating for the Mogo LALC, destroying not just their building but also equipment, data from important bush regeneration work and irreplaceable artefacts.

This new structure marks another milestone in Mogo's ongoing social and economic recovery, offering the community new opportunities and an improved economic future.

Mogo Local Aboriginal Land Council CEO Linda Carson: "It has been such a difficult time since the fires, but this building brings new hope and energy for all of the community.

"This building gives the Mogo Aboriginal community a home, a place where we can meet, paint, sculpt and support each other.

"With its commercial kitchen and café space, meeting rooms and exhibition space it also provides the bedrock for the Land Council's economic future.

"It is the young people of our community that are our future, and this building says to them that we have a bright and meaningful future, it is more than just bricks and mortar." Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips said "I'm pleased that I could help restore this vital community building, which will not only help Mogo's ongoing recovery efforts but provides a space for community and cultural connection.

Araluen Road slope stabilisation

November 2024 to June 2025

The work will impact vehicle access, with long delays and road closures unavoidable over several months. Traffic information is • available on Live Traffic NSW.

With the major landslides on Araluen Road taken care of, we are now focusing on seven additional sites where slope damage poses a risk of road collapse. We are also planning to repair two sites on Larrys Mountain Road.

Council are working to:

- install soil nails to reinforce the ground beneath the road
- remove unstable sections of road
- build retaining walls to support the road
- reinstate the road

The work will be completed in two main stages: reinforcement and construction, each essential to securing long-term safety and stability.

Previous slope stabilisation work on Araluen Road highlights the narrow space available, demonstrating why these works will significantly impact travel along the road. November update

Tree contractors started removing vegetation in preparation for the slope stabilisation work.

Specialised contractors arrived on site to begin reinforcing the slopes. This work will impact traffic over the next few months, particularly where space is limited by the width of the road. Batemans Bay Princes Highway between Glenella Road and **Deep Creek Dam Road**

Mill Bay pathway closure

Eurobodalla Council will be upgrading the path between the Narooma bridge and Mill Bay to replace the damaged bitumen with concrete. Pedestrians and cyclists will be unable to use the path between 7am on Monday 25 November to 4pm Thursday 28 November.

Broulee Road roundabout

Construction of a roundabout at the George Bass Drive and Broulee Road intersection.

Timeframe: September 2023 to June 2025

Cost and funding: \$2.6 million

- \$2 million from the Australian Government Black Spot Program
- \$600,000 Council contribution.

ESC water crew have been on-site for a few weeks moving underground pipes to make way for the new roundabout. All going well, we'll start building the roundabout in February 2025, at the start of the school year.

We are working to:

- design and build a four-leg roundabout at the intersection of George Bass Drive and Broulee Road
- include islands and paths within the roundabout to assist pedestrians and cyclists crossing the roads
- replace a water main and relocate other underground services such as Telstra
- upgrade lighting of the intersection.

Project updates 2024

- preparing the site by moving services including Telstra cables and water pipes.
- design team worked on the detailed design for the intersection.
- conducted initial checks at the site to assess environmental and Aboriginal factors.

Funding flowing for local road safety projects

Additional funding is set to support new road safety projects across Eden-Monaro, under the Australian Government's Road Safety Program. Both the Australian and NSW governments are providing significant contributions of \$218.6 million, for a joint investment of \$437.3 million.

This funding boost for road safety upgrades in Eden-Monaro will ensure greater levels of safety at each of project locations, reducing the risk of crashes that cause fatal or serious injuries. Among the projects are pedestrian infrastructure upgrades including wombat crossings to busy areas near various primary schools, as well as:

- · \$3,501,981 for upgrades along the Snowy Mountains Highway (between Cooma and Princes Highway intersection, Bega)
- \$1,780,613 for traffic signals at Princes Highway and Field Street, Narooma
- · \$1,072,948 for upgrades along the Princes Highway at Acacia Ponds, near Pambula

The program will also upgrade 174 signalised intersections across NSW to enhance pedestrian safety.

These upgrades will include improving pedestrian crossings, installing additional signals, and adjusting left and right-turn signal phasing to provide greater protection for pedestrians while crossing.

Hemp House at the Heads

A block of land classified as seriously vulnerable to attack from fire (BAL FZ), a budget tighter than a python's hug, and a missionary zeal to be as gentle on the natural environment as possible, have all led Kirsty and Dom to taking on the building of their small Moruya home themselves. With minimal building experience (Dom once built a tree-house for the kids) they are finding the learning curve to be ... well... perpendicular! 'But' says Dom, 'even if I won a million dollars tomorrow, I'd still want to do it'.

They are both loving the challenges of learning on the job, and their research (aka googling and visits to the amazingly well-stocked Moruya library) has uncovered a bunch of interesting materials that measure up pretty well when it comes to environmental cost.

Kirsty, in particular, is proud of the small amount of construction waste generated: 'As my work has been in the world of waste and resource recovery, I know the building sector sends about 20 MILLION tonnes of waste to landfill every year – I'm chuffed that so far our build has generated less than half a cubic metre' This is because materials have been made to measure before arriving on site.

They tried to avoid using concrete (the cement industry is one of the two biggest producers of carbon dioxide) but needed a bit to hold up the footings, so they chose 'greencrete' which replaces the raw materials in concrete with recycled glass and fly-ash.

What about the walls, which will go up shortly? 'We loved the look and feel of hemp, but knew we wouldn't have the time to learn the skills needed to make a traditional hemp house.'

Instead, they are building with ready-made HempBlocks, an interlocking system that does not require mortar.

Hemp is fire, mould and termite resistant. It has low thermal conductivity, making it an excellent insulator (which means less energy used for heating and cooling) and it continues to absorb carbon dioxide from the environment for its whole life, making it a carbon negative material!

Kirsty and Dom are really excited to get going with the walls, and the supplier is running an on-site training course at the beginning of December for anyone interested in this ancient (and also very contemporary!) technique (see below for details).

Kirsty has been documenting the journey, and both she and Dom love talking to people who are looking for alternatives to traditional, energyintensive building.

Big Spotty walk

Shoalhaven Shire has its own World Champion in "Big Spotty", the tallest of the Spotted Gums. At 72 metres tall it's estimated that Big Spotty is over 500 years old and would have been a mere sapling when Leonardo da Vinci painted the Mona Lisa

A group of around 25 people from around our region visited Big Spotty on the weekend and looked on in awe while on an excursion supporting the Australian Conservation Foundation's 'Save our Big Backyard' campaign. The group experienced the irreplaceable magic of the forest gully immediately surrounding Big Spotty high up in North Brooman State Forest behind Termeil. The group expressed how privileged they felt to be in the presence of Big Spotty but were also concerned that planned logging close to the giant tree would destroy its surrounding environment, compromising Big Spotty's continuing survival and trashing the awe inspiring landscape.

Not only that, Big Spotty is becoming wildly popular, and to allow other people to enjoy the unique experience for generations to come, there is an urgent need for a decent forest preserve to be declared and visitor infrastructure such as boardwalks to be created so Big Spotty being doesn't end up being 'loved to death'. The tourism potential of having a world champion growing in an undisturbed local South Coast forest was highlighted to the group with the massive New Zealand Kauri Pine held up as an example of the lucrative nature-based tourism market.

Attendees on the weekend were keen to know who to lobby and where to donate to the campaign. They were urged to contact their state member Liza Butler MP who happens to live nearby on the coast and who can play a pivotal role in setting aside the forest compartment in which Big Spotty grows.



- Activities which could be considered part of the curriculum for schools or tertiary institutions

Category Guidelines:

Projects

Grants of up to \$3,000 are available to support activities or projects that engage and benefit a section of the community in the South East Arts Region.

To be eligible for this grant you must:


- Be based in the South East Arts region

- Your request must be arts related

Further boost for South Coast NFPs

Thirteen South Coast not-for-profit organisations (NFPs) are sharing more than \$166,000 in funding for projects aimed at strengthening their capacity to support their local communities.

The substantial investment has been announced through FRRR's Investing in Rural Community Futures (IRCF) program, in partnership with Snow Foundation and Bendigo Bank's Community Enterprise Foundation.

Toolbox grants are available at any time throughout the program and the most recent grants will be some of the final awarded as part of IRCF, which has been operating across the region since 2020. Earlier this year, each community came together at "roadmapping" workshops, reflected on what had been achieved to date and then identified their shared priorities for this remaining funding. This process has guided FRRR and its partners on how to prioritise and direct investment throughout the program. Carolyn Ardler, FRRR's Program Manager for the IRCF South Coast program, said that the funding will support collaborative community-led projects, as the program enters the culmination phase. "The IRCF program has fostered tangible outcomes in the community

"The IRCF program has fostered tangible outcomes in the community sector and we are so thrilled with the way organisations have engaged with these opportunities to develop their skills and share resources.

"Our community facilitators have worked closely with participating groups in each locality to provide time for collaboration, discussion and submission. It's wonderful to see initiatives put forward that will benefit the whole community," Ms Ardler said.

"Through the program, local not-for-profits have formed connections with other groups and access to additional resources, which means they can face challenges together with a solutions-led approach, which has been empowering for community," Ms Ardler said. Georgina Byron AM, CEO of the Snow Foundation, reflects on her father's enduring legacy, Terry Snow AM, the Foundation's cofounder, and his deep connection to the South Coast. She describes the latest funding initiative as a meaningful tribute to his commitment to supporting local communities in the region. "My father loved the South Coast and was very proud to be able to support so many wonderful community-led organisations through the IRCF program. It's wonderful to know that this funding will strengthen local groups even further, so they can continue to make the South Coast a vibrant place to live, work and play," Ms. Byron said.

Ulladulla projects

In the Ulladulla area, six projects are sharing \$93,082 thanks to Snow Foundation. These projects are focussed largely on networking, storytelling and strengthening youth and cultural initiatives.

Batemans Bay projects

Four projects in Batemans Bay area will share \$53,402, also with the support of Snow Foundation. The projects funded have a focus on skills development which will improve volunteer capacity, cultural awareness and succession planning. Additionally, engagement of a coordinator will provide direct support for existing networks to continue to flourish as they build capacity, social cohesion and resilience for the future.

Bay & Basin projects

In the Bay & Basin area, three projects are sharing \$19,986, thanks to the support of Bendigo Bank's Community Enterprise Foundation. These projects have a focus on increasing cultural capacity, youth leadership skills and improving platforms for community collaboration.

David Impey, CEO of the Community Enterprise Foundation, said supporting projects that the groups had identified as they continued their ongoing recovery from the Black Summer bushfires were going to be of real benefit to the broader community.

"As the program has progressed, the confidence of local organisations to lead projects in a sustainable way has clearly grown." "The Foundation is glad to back initiatives that will see effective collaboration in the community and continued engagement of young people," Mr Impey said.

Government delivers world-leading legislation to protect children online

Today the Federal Government has introduced world-leading legislation to enforce a minimum age of 16 years for social media.

The Online Safety Amendment (Social Media Minimum Age) Bill 2024 will deliver greater protections for young Australians during critical stages of their development. It will require social media platforms to take reasonable steps to prevent under 16s from having accounts.

The law places the onus on social media platforms – not parents or young people – to take reasonable steps to ensure these protections are in place.

The Bill and the associated rules will ensure young Australians have continued access to messaging and online gaming, as well as access to services which are health and education related, like Headspace, Kids Helpline, and Google Classroom, and YouTube.

The Government will introduce stronger penalties for online safety breaches, which will see digital platforms face fines of up to \$49.5 million for systemic breaches.

The Bill creates a new definition of 'age-restricted social media platforms. This will include Snapchat, TikTok, Instagram, and X, amongst others.

It will contain robust privacy provisions, including requiring platforms to ringfence and destroy any information collected to safeguard the personal information of all Australians.

The law is designed to be responsive to changes in technology and services.

The Bill has been designed following extensive feedback from young Australians, parents, experts, industry, community organisations and state and territory governments.

It builds on broader efforts by the Australian Government to hold platforms accountable for ensuring the safety of their users.

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Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report Moruya River.

There hasn't been a lot of change from last week in Moruya to report, with the water temp still climbing, the fish activity climbs with it. The airport flats and spur wall have still been fishing well for flathead and Trevally, while the area around the hole in the wall, has been holding some Luderick, bream, flathead and the odd whiting. The quarry wharf area has been holding the odd mulloway, bream, trevally and flathead. Under the town bridge, whiting have been spotted following the small rays that reside over the flats there, flathead and bream have also been spotted working the flats on a high tide. Live nippers or soft plastics sight cast to working or cruising fish from the bridge is a great way to get into some action. Up in the fresh, the river levels continue to drop, locking fish into any holes they happen to be in. This is a double edged sword however, once you find them, you were they are and are easier to target. Once they've been caught a few times, the will get lure shy however, making them harder to catch, or if they get taken out of the system, they are no longer there to catch at all.

Personally, with low flows, I like to limit my session's on the bass to give them a bit of a reprieve and concentrate more on the salt, but that's just what I like to do.

Flathead continue to be plentiful in the Tuross system this past week, along with some very nice mulloway. Several of our local juniors have scored on the mulloway front, with some nice 90+cm models coming to the bank. A bit of time and effort goes into getting these fish, as bait presentation and quality does make a difference in success rates.

The oyster leases have been fishing well for bream this week, and with the cicadas doing their thing this time of year, surface presentations are a great way to get a bite on the bream. Yes bream will take cicadas off the surface also. One of my regular customers from Canberra has managed several nice 50+cm bass over the last few weeks, as water levels drop and these fish get more pressure, capture rates will more than likely also drop.

Rock and beach.

There continue to be good salmon along all the local beaches this week, with their location depending on where they have swum to. They will be where you find them. Sundays is looking the better of the days wind wise, with Saturdays forecast wind a bit stronger. Expect to see the whiting starting to make a presence along the beaches any time now as the join the bream in gutters in close along the coastline. Live nippers, worms or Pipies will be the gun baits for some light tackle surf action

The Moruya breakwall hasn't been fishing too bad, with capture rates depending of the travel patterns of both the salmon and tailor. Bream, flathead and Trevally are all potential catches from the wall also.

Good numbers of snapper in about 40m of water have been reported by those that have been able to get out, flathead are also on the cards as well. I haven't had any reports from the game crews as yet, but the yellowfin should be starting to get around as the water temps climb.

The shop is starting to look like Xmas is just around the corner. I have a shipment of dive gear arriving next week, to fill the wall back up. We also have our Black Friday sale on next weekend, starting Friday 29th November and continuing through to Monday 2nd December. There will be store wide 20% off RRP with some better deals to be had on select Shimano rods with a 2 for 1 deal going There will be a bonus \$50 gift card for the first 20 customers that spend \$199 on Shimano product over the 4 days. This gift card has to spent on the day it is given however

There is also a much bigger prize pack coming for the month of December, but that can wait till after the Black Friday weekend sale. Stay tuned for more details. The bait freezer was restocked last week, and is still nicely stocked with everything except hawksbury prawns and blue bait. It should be too much longer before we see stocks of hawksbury prawns back in stock.

\$5 million in latest round of recreational fishing grants now

open

The NSW Government has opened the next round of Recreational Fishing Trust Grants, with \$5 million available for fishing clubs, community groups and other organisations to run projects which improve and promote recreational fishing in their local area. For the first time, applicants in this round will be able to access the \$2 million recreational fishing small infrastructure grants program announced by the NSW Government in August.

This program will make it easier for local fishing clubs. community groups and other organisations to apply for funding for projects such as fishing platforms, fish cleaning tables, fishing access tracks, kayak launching

platforms and other fishing facilities.

Applicants are encouraged to contact dedicated Department staff to discuss their ideas and for assistance in applying your small infrastructure grants. As well as small infrastructure, funding is also available to promote participation in the sport and the mental health and well-being benefits of fishing, such as for free fishing events, fishing workshops, come and try fishing days, fishing for therapy initiatives, and the development of educational material to promote sustainable and responsible fishing practices. Grants are available for both large projects valued at more than \$10,000 in funding and small projects involving less than \$10,000.

Applications will be open for the next six weeks, until 18 December 2024.

Following the recent review of the Recreational Fishing Trust, the NSW Government will continue to provide greater support to the NSW recreational fishing community by:

· Strengthening communications with all fishers and organisations to encourage them to apply for grants to improve fishing in their local areas.

· Providing more support for applicants to discuss ideas for projects and assist with developing their applications through the dedicated Recreational Fishing Trust grants assistance phoneline.

· Making the grant application process clearer and simpler, so groups have the best opportunity to receive funding, including streamlining the application form.

This round of funding follows the recent announcements of some \$20 million in grants and program funding from the Recreational Fishing Trust to enhance recreational fishing across the State. Funding guidelines and the new online application form are available here at -
