Moruya Mail Letter

Response to Tuross Head Progress Association

The claims made by the Tuross Head Progress Association are disappointingly inaccurate. The Batemans Bay Medicare Urgent Care Clinic is an additional federally funded bulk-billed service that I have delivered for the benefit of the region. It is the only Medicare Urgent Care Clinic between Wollongong and the Victorian border, and I have ensured this service is available locally for the benefit of locals. There are many communities that would like to have an Urgent Care Clinic such as the one at Batemans Bay. The Batemans Bay Medicare Urgent Care Clinic has alréady seen more than 7,500 patients, all fully bulk-billed, also providing cost of living relief and helping take pressure off GP wait times. It provides a service for 'urgent' but not life-threatening conditions. It is designed to complement and help

alleviate some pressure off our wonderful local GPs and the Emergency Department, and that is exactly what it has been doing and is a great service for our community. The feedback received from patients has been overwhelmingly positive with strong calls for an expansion of the bulk billed

I have delivered on federal funding to enhance our health services across our region which we all should be proud of. The region now has a headspace at Batemans Bay that also provides outreach, the Batemans Bay Medicare Urgent Care Clinic, the new Medicare Mental Health Centre at Moruya which is a walk-in centre for adults, a South Eastern Endometriosis Pelvic Pain Clinic, as well as delivered funding towards a radiation therapy service for the Eurobodalla with Expressions of Interest for that service underway. In addition, the state government is constructing a new higher Level 4 Eurobodalla Regional Hospital at Moruya. We know the difficulty that many face getting in to see a doctor and since coming to Government we have been doing everything we can to strengthen Medicare and to attract, train and retain more doctors.

Because of the Albanese Government's changes, our health system has more doctors joining in the last two years than at any time in the past decade.

The Royal Australian College of General Practitioners now expects to fill every one of the placements it has available, for the first time in years, noting that Australian GP training is fully funded by the Australian Government. This is a big vote of confidence from doctors, and it shows that our reforms to strengthen Medicare are working, after a decade of Coalition cuts and neglect.' I am also personally pleased with the Albanese Government funding rural end-to-end medical training places at the University of Wollongong Shoalhaven Campus with medical placements across our region. We know that if more people train locally, they are more likely to stay." (see Media release: Entire medical training for future doctors in Nowra)

The Government funds more than \$1.9 billion a year for programs that develop the workforce and support more equitable distribution of health professionals to areas of need including regional areas like ours. There is \$17.4 million in federal funding in 2024-25 to support health services at risk of closing and extending the General Practice Incentive Fund. It is worth noting that the federal government through the Royal Australian College of General Practice, during 2024 and 2025 is providing additional incentives to attract GPs in training in the Batemans Bay area.'

We know there's more to do but we will continue to strengthen Medicare and do everything we can to attract, train and retain more doctors.

A life of such promise left unfinished. Thank you for your service."

The male driver of the other vehicle, a truck, aged 57, was not injured in the incident and was taken to Batemans Bay Hospital for mandatory testing.

Watt a winner, Lexie's landscape lands \$25,000 art prize

Art lovers flocked to the opening of the Basil Sellers Art Prize where Lexie Watt was announced as the winner of the \$25,000 acquisitive prize for her pencil and watercolour 'Windblown trees Bombo Headland'.

Widely recognised as a career-defining moment, the award was presented to Ms Watt by patron Basil Sellers AM in front of a crowd of hundreds, saying she was humbled by the award.

"This painting took me 18 months to complete – on and off, on and off," Ms Watt says. Ms Watt works across a large range of media – graphite watercolour, porcelain, ink, prints and bookmaking – and has illustrated six published children's books, writing one of them. Her art is grounded in the Australian Landscape.

"Particularly trees that have something to say ... the more weathered and bent the better ... I am fascinated by how the wind determines growth by twisting and entanglement," Ms Watt says.

Natalie Bateman takes out the \$5,000 Eurobodalla Award for her acrylic 'Ochre Puddles'. This award spotlights the exceptional artistic talent to be found in Eurobodalla and surrounds. Ms Bateman is a self-taught Walbanja-Yuin artist who says family and culture are her life and the biggest influence on what she paints.

Senior curator of Australian Art at the Art Gallery of NSW Denise Mimmocchi judged the Prize, commending the winning works for their impact and craftmanship.

"I am so aware of the number of artists who participated and really acknowledge the amount of energy, angst and – I hope – enjoyment that goes into it," says Ms Mimmocchi. Founded in 2004 as a local competition, the biennial prize has grown into a prestigious national award under the patronage of Basil Sellers. This year's competition attracted a record 485 entries, with the exceptional quality of submissions reflected in the curated selection of finalists on display.



Four shades of grey: Painting blitz on Sydney Harbour Bridge ahead of 100th anniversary

A third of the surface of the Sydney Harbour Bridge will be repainted and areas of rust treated as part of a focused, eight-year maintenance program to bring the iconic arch up to scratch in time for the 100th anniversary of its opening. About 150,000 square metres of steel will be repainted by the centenary in 2032, with 12 new full-time painters to be recruited in coming weeks to help the push.

The new recruits will boost the dedicated Sydney Harbour Bridge team to more than 130 painters, riggers, electricians, fitters and engineers.

The Bridge, which weighs 52,800 tonnes and is the widest and tallest arch bridge in the world, takes thirty years to paint and involves four coats of paint, each a slightly different shade. The final coat is the heritage-listed Sydney Harbour Bridge Grey. The bolstered workforce will allow painting targets to be raised by 30 per cent over the next eight years. Some of the hardest sections to access, including lateral pieces of steel high in the arch, have not been painted in three decades.

Rust patches have become increasingly visible to the public, with the target for rust treatment going unmet in recent years. Transport for NSW is assessing a longer-term maintenance plan which includes the delayed use of an arch maintenance unit that was procured under the former Liberal National government.

The NSW Government has asked Transport to present a plan for its implementation.

The uplift in work will be scheduled to minimise impacts on BridgeClimb visitors.

Minister for Roads John Graham said "Sydneysiders could not be prouder of the Harbour Bridge and it is critical that it is looking its best for the centenary of its opening in 2032, but also in the best condition to serve the city for the next 100 years.

"I was not satisfied that the current maintenance plan would deliver that in time for 2032 and beyond and today we outline a much more intensive program for the treatment of rust and painting. This is tough, intricate and time-consuming work. The 12 new permanent full-time workers join one of the best, most-experienced maintenance teams in the country.

"The Bridge remains the city's most critical road and rail corridor, but it is also a priceless tourism asset which makes this work that much more critical."

'Moruya' Granite to be incorporated in new Sydney Harbour Bridge Cycleway

Moruya Granite will once again play a part in Sydney infrastructure in the construction of a new Harbour Bridge cycleway. Work is ramping up on the new \$38.9 million Sydney Harbour Bridge Cycleway project with major work set to kick off before Christmas. In March, Western Sydney construction company Arenco (NSW) Pty Ltd was awarded the contract to build the cycleway. Around 700 workers will be involved in delivering the project, with materials being sourced and manufactured across Australia.

being sourced and manufactured across Australia. When complete, the 170 metre-long and 3 metre-wide ramp will link the Sydney Harbour Bridge to Milsons Point, sparing cyclists the hike up 55 stairs and making one of Australia's most iconic bike routes easily accessible for riders of all ages and abilities.

New renders showcase the final design from Redfern design firm ASPECT Studios, paying careful attention to the historical significance of the site and honouring the heritage of the Harbour Bridge

Granite for sections of the paving is coming from Moruya on the NSW South Coast; the same granite used for the original Harbour Bridge pylons, tying together the old and the new.

The balustrades are being cast by Evermil in Unanderra NSW, structural steel bridge sections are being fabricated by Alfabs in Kurri Kurri NSW, and stone for the artwork paving is being sourced from NSW. Queensland and South Australia

from NSW, Queensland and South Australia.

The pavement will form an Aboriginal artwork design, developed by Aboriginal artists Maddison Gibbs and Jason Wing, drawing on the imagery and themes of Gadigal and Cammeraygal land and waters. The new ramp will connect riders from the bridge to the bike network in Milsons Point. From Bradfield Park, riders can then join a new 150 metre-long and 2.5 metre-wide two-way dedicated cycle path and new shared zones in Milsons Point.

Transport is also contributing to improvements in Bradfield Park, with a \$2.5 million funding grant to North Sydney Council. Pedestrians will benefit from safer connections, with new footpaths and a new pedestrian crossing on Alfred Street South. A new paved plaza area will be created to connect the new cycle path and ramp into Bradfield Park. The plaza will be a welcoming community space with seating, a bike repair station and water fountain, for visitors or commuters heading to Milsons Point station and beyond.

Minister for Transport Jo Haylen said "Around 2,000 trips are taken across the cycleway each weekday, making it not just our only cross-harbour bike link, but one of Sydney's most heavily used – and we're expecting those numbers to rise once the ramp is complete."

"The Harbour Bridge cycleway project has created hundreds of jobs for our state – and what an incredible legacy each of those workers will leave behind.

We're so proud to be bringing our beautiful 92-year-old bridge into the modern age, making it more attractive for cyclists all over the world."

"Great cities are always evolving, and our Harbour Bridge is no exception. This cycleway will be a modern addition, while honouring its rich history – from the First Nations artwork to the Moruya granite paving: said Minister Haylen. Major work will kick off in late 2024 including ground

Major work will kick off in late 2024 including ground preparations for the new ramp and eight new columns in Bradfield Park, with preparation works now underway. Construction has been carefully planned to reduce impacts to the local community as much as possible. Work is expected to be completed by 2026.

UPDATE: A Transport for NSW Spokesperson told the **Moruya Mail that**; "Transport for NSW is committed to honouring the heritage of the Sydney Harbour Bridge throughout the Cycleway Ramp Project.

This includes the granite paving, for which sections will be transported from Moruya on the NSW South Coast; the same granite used for the original Harbour Bridge pylons, tying together the old and the new.

The original quarry where granite was mined for the Harbour Bridge pylons in the 1930s is not being reopened. While not from the exact same quarry, geologically identical granite is being sourced from a local quarry owner, which produces aggregate from the granite band that spans the far South Coast region."

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Seaweed sector growth could boost economy by \$2.3 billion

As part of the State Government plan to develop regional economies in NSW, the **Minister for Regional NSW Tara Moriarty** has launched the NSW Government's Seaweed Prospectus, which forecasts a potential \$2.3 billion boost to the NSW economy through the growth of seaweed related industries.

The prospectus outlines the opportunities available for investors in NSW to tap into the fast-growing seaweed industry.

With the State's ready access to seawater, saline groundwater, abundant land, and skilled labour, economic modelling has shown NSW has the capacity to produce two million tonnes of seaweed each year by 2030, adding an estimated \$2.3 billion to the NSW economy.

This production capacity could help meet growing demand in the global market for seaweed-derived products such as pet food, nutraceuticals, bioplastics, and methane-reducing supplements.

It is estimated the global market for seaweed-derived products could be worth an additional \$16 billion by 2030, with NSW in a position to claim up to 14 percent of the market.

Of the 1,500 native Australian seaweed species, 230 grow in NSW. This includes key species Ulva spp, Ecklonia radiata, and Asparagopsis. Despite Australia boasting 15 percent of global seaweed species, we currently import some A\$40 million of seaweed products.

The prospectus highlights the key opportunities for investment in the sector including:

- · Cultivation of seaweed, including co-location with existing aquaculture systems and using nutrient-rich waste streams from food processing and wastewater treatment facilities.
- · Processing and manufacturing value-added seaweed products such as cosmetics, pharmaceuticals, biofertilizer.
- · Leveraging the State's research and development capacity with partnerships with leading universities and research institutions developing new and emerging seaweed applications and cultivation practices.

Minister Moriarty launched the prospectus in Huskisson at PhycoHealth, a South Coast business that specialises in sustainable seaweed products, during a three-day NSW Government-led trade mission beginning in the region today. Consuls-General from 13 countries are exploring the region's progressive aquaculture, food and beverage, manufacturing, tourism and clean tech industries as part of the NSW Government's Regional Investment Activation Program, which aims to drive growth, create jobs, and promote investment in regional NSW.

Minister for Regional NSW, Tara Moriarty said "The South Coast trade mission has been a great opportunity to roll out the welcome mat to global markets and launch the NSW Government's Seaweed Prospectus in a region that is already leading the way with its thriving aquaculture industry.

Testing falls short as drug driving climbs to second leading factor

A report by the NRMA has revealed one-in-10 NSW drivers tested positive for illicit drugs in 2023 as roadside drug testing continues to fall short of its target.

The <u>NRMA's Driving High report</u> has called on the NSW Government to increase roadside drug testing to meet the target of 200,000 tests per year set in 2018 as fatalities on NSW roads rise. Last year the state fell 40,000 tests short of this target.

Drug driving is now the second leading cause of fatalities in NSW, surpassing fatigue, drink driving and non-seatbelt use.

The Driving High report comes as fatalities on NSW roads continue to rise with 79 people losing their lives in drug related crashes in 2023, 24 more than the previous year. It calls for:

·200,000 roadside drug tests to be conducted by 2026

Resourcing for Police to ensure high visibility policing, especially on country roads

·Publicly release roadside drug and alcohol testing enforcement data sooner ·More public education on the effects of drug driving, including medication

A review of warning labels on medication that could impair driving In nearly 70 per cent of drug driving related crashes, the drug in the driver's system was cannabis, followed by methylamphetamine (43%) and cocaine (7%).

The overwhelming majority of drivers involved in fatal crashes who had drugs in their system were males (85%) and drivers or motorcycle riders aged 20-29 years old (31%) were the largest cohort. Also, nearly 50 per cent of drivers who tested positive were in age cohorts 30-49.

NRMA spokesperson Peter Khoury said drivers who combined illicit drugs with alcohol with were 23 times more likely to be involved in a fatal crash. "It is extremely alarming that one-in-10 drivers pulled over for a random drug test on the side of the road tested positive at the same time that we are seeing a huge spike in deaths – jumping 44 per cent in one year," Mr Khoury said.

Driving High also calls for a review of warning labels on medication and further research into the effects of medicinal cannabis on driver impairment. Read the full Driving High report here.



Digging for Answers on the Bay Pavilions Catastrophe

Picture this Scenario

A new business launched by an ASX listed company is in financial trouble, so they call in KPMG and a specialised risk consultant to tell them how to get back on track. The consultant's report, and some risks in the new business have been identified as extreme, with catastrophic financial consequences to the company if they are not fixed.

The Board adopts the consultant's recommendations and staff are tasked with implementing them.

Over a year passes and losses of the new business, originally forecast at \$563,000 a year will now pass \$6 million for the year and the CEO tells the Board total losses will pass \$50 million over the next 10 years. This leads shareholders to question if the CEO has completed the tasks meant to cut the losses. What would you expect the Board to do the next time it meets?

Sound Familiar?

Swap the company for our local council and you could be describing the rolling financial disaster that is the Bay Pavilions.

In October last year InConsult delivered a risk assessment to council.

An extreme risk was the unsustainable business / service delivery model. The consequence of this risk was catastrophic.

Council is planning a loss of \$6.2 million this year at the Pav, but the most recent quarterly performance report showed income is 30% below the annualised target, so losses will balloon further. The predicted catastrophe has arrived.

Seeking Answers

The Moruya Mail has been following the story because of the impact the Bay Pavilions losses have on the broader community as council cuts road maintenance and other services to pay for it. The Pav is now on track to consume 10% of the General Fund rates.

Two weeks ago, we asked council for assistance to provide an update to readers on progress being made to improve the financial performance of the Bay Pavilions.

In particular, we asked about some actions recommended by InConsult last year to mitigate risks that were extreme and financial consequences catastrophic.

We hoped the actions were completed and it would be easy for council to respond. We have yet to get a response.

The Questions We Asked

InConsult advised: In the absence of Bay Pavilions being able to achieve a positive cashflow and net surplus, Council must set a loss tolerance level and manage the asset accordingly.

The Mail asked: InConsult were very firm on this point, using the word "must" Has the loss tolerance level been determined? What is it?

InConsult advised: Conduct a 'lessons learned' workshop where Council and Aligned Leisure can discuss strengths and weaknesses in the current arrangement with an objective of minimising the financial exposure to Council

The Mail asked: Risk 19 on Reputation also recommended a workshop. Was the workshop conducted? Are there any outcomes that have been delivered? Note: Aligned Leisure (AL) are the company council has contracted to operate the Pavilions.

InConsult advised: Currently all expenses are borne by Council and a set management fee is paid to AL. There is no 'skin in the game' for AL, no penalties for poor performance and no rewards for improving performance. Council should re-assess the value proposition and in particular how AL can enhance revenue.

The Mail asked: Has the value reassessment been completed? Have enhanced revenue opportunities been put in place? Have poor performance penalties or rewards for improved performance been set?

InConsult advised: Investigate the possibility of more flexibility to fees and charges to allow AL to promote the BP more effectively.

The Mail asked: Has any greater flexibility been given to AL? Can AL's promotion of the Bay Pavilions be measured as being more effective as a result?

InConsult advised: Investigate opportunities for AL to work closer with Council's tourism team to align the Bay Pavilions strategic plan and business plan to Councils and regions tourism strategy.

The Mail asked: Have Tourism and AL started to work together? Any outcomes to date?

InConsult advised: Review the Marketing Plan and Business Plan drafted by AL and provided to Council at the start of the Contract to establish realistic marketing and financial targets. At the heart of any future strategy should be key strategies to increase patronage/more users.

The Mail asked: Has council accepted revised Marketing and Business Plans from AL?

And finally, we asked about an action plan listed in council's Sustainability Plan for the Pav:

Action: Review and consider renegotiation of current contract with Aligned Leisure.

The Mail asked: Has a renegotiated contract been agreed?

We'll get a Response

We're confident council will respond in time, but the delay, in itself, raises questions. We hope the recommended actions have all been completed, as well over a year has passed since the councillors passed the consultants recommendations to staff for action.

Billions of people to benefit from technology breakthrough that ensures freshwater for the world

A novel approach to make seawater evaporate faster than freshwater has been hailed as a significant breakthrough in desalination technology that will benefit billions of people worldwide. Up to 36% of the world's eight billion people currently suffer from severe freshwater shortages for at least four months of the year, and this could potentially increase to 75% by 2050, threatening the survival

Seawater desalination is one of the most effective strategies to alleviate the impending scarcity, but existing processes consume massive amounts of energy, leaving a large carbon footprint. Researchers from the University of South Australia (UniSA) have already demonstrated the potential of interfacial solar-powered evaporation as an energy-efficient, sustainable alternative to current desalination methods, but they are still limited by a lower evaporation rate for seawater compared to pure water due to the negative effect of salt ions on water evaporation.

UniSA materials science researcher Professor Haolan Xu has now collaborated with researchers from China on a project to develop a simple yet effective strategy to reverse this limitation.

By introducing inexpensive and common clay minerals into a floating photothermal hydrogel evaporator, the team achieved seawater evaporation rates that were 18.8% higher than pure water. This is a significant breakthrough since previous studies all found seawater evaporation rates were around 8% lower than pure water.

"The key to this breakthrough lies in the ion exchange process at the

air-water interface," Prof Xu says.
"The minerals selectively enrich magnesium and calcium ions from seawater to the evaporation surfaces, which boosts the evaporation rate of seawater. This ion exchange process occurs spontaneously during solar evaporation, making it highly convenient and costeffective."

Considering the global desalination market – which numbers around 17,000 operational plants worldwide even small declines in desalination performance can result in the loss of tens of millions of tons of clean water.

"This new strategy, which could be easily integrated into existing evaporation-based desalination systems, will provide additional access to massive amounts of clean water, benefitting billions of people worldwide," Prof Xu

The researchers say the hydrogel evaporator maintained its performance even after months of immersion in seawater.

The next steps will involve exploring more strategies that can make seawater evaporation faster pure water evaporation and apply them into practical seawater desalination.

The <u>findings</u> have been published in the journal Advanced Materials.

"Once again, a fair assumption. I guess the boss is mindful of his staff wasting time or even skipping off early."


The suited patron clicked his tongue.

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Heatwaves and hot summer, struggling coal highlights the urgent need for renewables

A VERY HOT SUMMER ahead will test the limits of our ageing and unreliable coal-fired power stations. Climate Council CEO Amanda McKenzie said: "The Bureau of Meteorology is predicting a very hot summer ahead, which will put enormous pressure on Australia's ageing coal-fired power stations. You wouldn't expect a 40-year-old car to keep running smoothly, and we can't rely on these ageing stations to deliver during extreme heat. Coal outages this week forced our grid operator to take action to keep the lights on. The Climate Change Authority's (CCA) latest annual progress report, tabled in parliament today, confirms

that progress is being made, but delivering existing policies is key to cutting climate pollution and ensuring a stable, clean energy supply.

Climate Councillor Greg Bourne said: "Big renewables backed by batteries are delivering about 40% of Australia's power and are resilient in hot conditions. All Australia's coal-fire power stations are slated to close in the next 15 years, so we must ramp up renewables to ensure reliable energy for all Australian households." Climate Council CEO Amanda McKenzie said: "The Authority's Report highlights the significant progress on renewable projects and policies. But, Australia needs to double the pace of the renewable rollout to meet growing energy needs and prevent power blackouts as ageing and unreliable coal stations shut down. With climate impacts like harsher droughts to rising costs of living escalating, urgent action is needed to protect communities and limit damage." The annual progress report's recommendations

identify key opportunities to make further cuts to

climate pollution this decade. The report recommends

supporting more Australians to upgrade their home's efficiency, speeding up the connection of essential renewables and storage to the grid, and ensuring that big polluters have a plan to cut their climate pollution. Climate Council CEO Amanda McKenzie said: "Retrofitting homes and buildings for energy efficiency is a no-brainer—it cuts energy bills and keeps families comfortable year-round. At the same time, ensuring big polluters have clear, transparent plans to cut climate pollution is crucial. Every sector of the economy has an important role to play in limiting the worst impacts of climate change and building a safer future for our kids." Tracking progress is essential to staying on course. The Climate Council's recently launched Momentum Monitor is mapping Australia's transformation, tracking advances in energy, transport, and manufacturing

solutions. Regular updates will ensure Australians can

see how renewables and climate solutions are

Australia hits 100k EV sales milestone

\$50 million investment boost for regional communities

The Minns Labor Government is continuing work to ensure regional communities thrive, with \$50 million in grants becoming available for initiatives that promote regional economic development and support employment creation and retention.

This funding follows the NSW Government recently passing an update to the Regional Development Act, to ensure it reflects the needs of modern rural and regional NSW, expanding investment opportunities and enshrining integrity in the system. Minister for Agriculture and Regional NSW, Tara Moriarty said: "This latest initiative under the Regional Development Trust makes more funding available for regional and rural communities and will build on the Minns Labor Government's positive track record in providing strategic investment for local projects that deliver real change in a timely manner. "I have listened to people and businesses from around regional

NSW, and so we are responding accordingly with a funding program that enables applicants to apply for investment for projects that are ready to go.

"I encourage businesses, consortiums and organisations to apply for this funding if you have a good idea on how to expand economic activity in a community or region.

Financial Sustainability win for Local Government Sector

The State's peak body for local government has welcomed the release of a NSW Parliamentary Inquiry report into the ability of councils to fund infrastructure and services. The Legislative Council's Standing Committee on state development has been holding an inquiry into the financial sustainability of councils, receiving over 130 submissions and holding 10 public hearings.

Local Government NSW President Cr Darriea Turley AM said she was delighted to see that the recommendations of the inquiry closely aligned with <u>submissions from LGNSW</u> and from local councils right across the state.

"This is a wonderful outcome for councils and their communities. LGNSW has long advocated for more support from both the state and federal governments to ensure the financial sustainability of local councils is secured," Cr Turley said.

"The <u>recommendations contained in the report</u> demonstrate that the inquiry heard our call.

"They reflect recognition that the financial sustainability of councils is being persistently eroded and that, without improvements, all communities will suffer.

"We're hopeful that this recognition will pave the way for much-needed improvements.

"We thank the NSW Government for holding this inquiry and now call on them to act on these recommendations, in close partnership with councils, to achieve better sustainability, resilience and productivity outcomes for all NSW communities," Cr Turley said.

Key recommendations include:

- Reviewing rate exemptions and concessions to achieve a better balance between local council financial sustainability, community benefits and principles of equity.
- Redesigning the rating system to provide councils with greater flexibility in setting rates, while keeping rates affordable for the community.
- · Streamlining the special variation process.
- Advocating to the Australian Government to increase Financial Assistance Grants to councils from 0.5% to 1% of Commonwealth taxation revenue.
- Grant models that are more secure, sustainable and predictable.
- Changes to the developer contributions framework to better support councils to fund the ongoing costs of new infrastructure, and support development including of community facilities.
- More timely disaster recovery assistance to councils.
- Dedicated and ongoing funding streams for disaster mitigation and preparedness.
- Incorporation of betterment into disaster recovery funding programs.
- Appropriately recognising that Rural Fire Service assets are vested in the NSW Government, and not councils.

Reducing cost shifting onto councils and consideration of how the Waste Levy can better support infrastructure and services that support the transition to the circular economy.



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Stopping Logging will negate over half of Eurobodalla's Carbon Emissions



ESC Public Access Statement Tues 3 December 2024

At the Public Access Session of Eurobodalla Shore Council on Tuesday **Joslyn Van der Moolen** was one of several residents to address the Council, on two matters:

1. Friends of the Forest (Mogo) Emergency Forest Embassies on the corner of Larrys Mountain Road and the Princes Highway since 26 November to protest against the logging 10 minutes nw of Moruya in November 2024. The public have been enthusiastically responding with honks and many many waves and thumbs up of support. Stopping Logging will negate over half of Eurobodalla's Carbon Emissions

2. Securing Mountain Bike Trail Tenure in State Forests "Welcome Mayor, Deputy Mayor and returning Councillors, staff and the public. Some of you will know I was the second Greens Candidate in the recent election and I congratulate Colleen Turner for being elected to continue the Greens legacy of previous Greens Councillors including outgoing Deputy Mayor Alison Worthington. I am speaking to you in my role on the Coastwatchers Forest Working Group and Community Liaison for Friends of the Forest (Mogo).

Mogo State forest to the north of the Moruya river between Mogendoura and North Moruya started being logged two weeks ago. This beautiful tall spotted gum forest is going to be logged east of Maulbrooks Rd up to RHA Fire Trail at the top of the mountain range across to the Eurobodalla Archery Range. This Mogo State Forest operation of 534 hectares is part of 110,000 hectares of public state forest that covers 31% of the Eurobodalla. There are two critical areas that logging impacts on the Eurobodalla Shire Council. The first is logging emissions in relation to the council's Eurobodalla Climate Action Plan 2022 - 2032. The second is the need to secure tenure for the mountain bike trails that council has invested in, so these mountain bike trails are not closed for months or damaged by industrial logging machinery.

The Climate Action Plan shows the total carbon emissions for the Eurobodalla shire (page 11) from Electricity, Transport, Waste, Agriculture and Gas in 2019/2020 (the same year as the Black Summer fires) was 396,000 tonnes. This plan also states that these figures exclude emissions from land use change and forestry.

So let's see what happens if we include carbon emissions from logging our forests that are in the Zero SE State Forest and Climate Action in Eurobodalla fact sheets. These fact sheets use the same Snapshot emission figures as the council Climate Action Plan.

The Frontier Economic Report Comparing the value of alternative uses of native forests in Southern NSW, calculated the annual emissions from logging in southern NSW was 950,000 tonnes.

The Eurobodalla Shire has 106,462 hectares of state forest. 106,462 hectares is 26% of the total 411,651 hectares in southern NSW (the Eden and Southern, Regional Forest Agreement areas).

So, since the Eurobodalla has a 26% of the forest being logged in southern NSW the Eurobodalla is generating a quarter of the 950,000 tonnes of carbon emissions from logging each year. Twenty-six per cent of the total emissions of 950,000 tonnes for southern NSW is 245,691 tonnes pa. So, in 2018-2019 the Eurobodalla was generating 438,000 tonnes of annual emissions from Electricity, Transport, Waste, Agriculture and Gas. So, if we stop logging, we will no longer generate 245,691 tonnes of carbon emissions per annum. This carbon emissions saving of 245,691 tonnes will negate over half of the Eurobodalla's emissions from Electricity, Transport, Waste, Agriculture and Gas. This incredible result is also reflected in the Bega shire that has even more state forest and logging.

The need to secure tenure for mountain bike trails in our state forests

Nature based tourism is our main economic driver with at least \$16 million invested in Eurobodalla mountain bike trails in Mogo and Narooma. The Council's Mogo Trails webpage shows the Mogo Trails project was made possible due to \$5 million from the Australian and NSW Governments' Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund and \$3 million from the NSW Government's Growing Local Economies Fund. This has attracted the prestigious international Sea Otter event in Mogo State Forest in October 2025.

Despite this infrastructure investment and event planning the state forest mountain bike trails are not protected from being damaged by logging. We need to protect these state forests to safeguard this investment and provide certainty to the industry, so these mountain bike trails are not logged in the future. Without protection, these forests will be closed for months and months for logging and tracks damaged.

In state forests, protected areas are called Preserved Forest Areas as has been allocated, around the convict built Old Coach Road in Termeil leading to Big Spotty.

When Mogo State Forest at Dunns Creek was logged in 2018, Forestry put signs up saying the track was closed for nine months. The informal Joan of Arc trail and Vietnam trail maintained by volunteers, were driven over by heavy industrial logging machinery. When the tracks opened the tracks along the creek had grown over for over a kilometre.

Managers of the mountain bike trails are key stakeholders and have the power to negotiate protection of forests that have mountain bike infrastructure. The council need to demand that this investment be matched by Forestry Corporation NSW (a NSW Government entity) and mountain biking forests be protected as a Forest Preserved area. Our forests must be kept standing for biodiversity, as carbon storage and for eco-tourism our main industry. The forestry industry must focus 100% on plantations that are profitable, that already provide over 80% of construction timber and many skilled jobs and use less land. AKD softwoods in Tumut own 12,000 hectares on plantations that pay rates to local shires in Tumut and Oberon.

Dalmeny Matters presentation to Council Public Access & Petition

Presentation by Sally Christiansen

"I am here on behalf of Dalmeny Matters community association to present a petition to Council, regarding the development proposed for the Dalmeny bushland with over 1000 signatures.

This petition makes reference to the Master Plan which Council previously presented to the community, but which now sits with the owners to finalise. This petition aims to show the high level of concern regarding this development proposal and asks for additional consultation opportunities. I would like to give a brief overview of our concerns regarding the proposed development and ask for your help in ensuring there is meaningful community consultation during the planning stages of this project.

The community deserves clear information and the chance to have a say in the future planning for our area.

We would like to raise specific concerns with the owners, now that they have been given the lead in the planning process. We would like to hear their vision for the area, to understand how risks will be mitigated and whether there are plans to preserve areas for wildlife and recreation.

We hope to understand what consultation is taking place with RFS in planning for bushfire protection. We deserve clear answers about how Mummaga lake will be protected and the capacity of local sewage pumping stations and the treatment facility to cope with the development. We would like a clear timeline so that residents know what to expect.

It seems only fair that locals be considered stakeholders in this process. We have many suggestions for possible compromises that could help to protect people's privacy, quiet enjoyment of their homes and valued public space for recreation and wildlife.

The potential for over 400 additional houses is a really significant increase for a village like Dalmeny. To put that into perspective: it's the equivalent of twice the numbers Dalmeny has during peak holiday periods, year round.

I would like to reiterate that in general, our members have no objection to growth and development in Dalmeny. The report tabled at the November Council meeting

The report tabled at the November Council meeting regarding housing supply indicates that the Eurobodalla region does not have a lack of single dwelling houses but more a lack of diversity of housing and lack of affordable housing, which we believe this development at Dalmeny will not address, being zoned R2. Many members of the community were very disappointed, and felt misled, when Council confirmed the area as being unsuitable for affordable housing provision.

There is a lot of potential for infill development in Dalmeny, as well as the large site next to the Dalmeny IGA which will be developed as townhouses.

Our concerns and objections are specifically about the suitability of the Dalmeny bushland for housing development for several reasons. We are asking for the opportunity to go into more detail about these issues with Council and the landowners prior to the formal public exhibition period.

- We have serious concerns about the ability of the Master Plan to meet the RFS Planning for Bushfire Protection guide recommendations while also protecting the waterways onsite and retaining habitat for the threatened species present.
- To explain- there are 3 lots within the development area with 3 different owners; this spreads the development across the site, rather than making a small perimeter to defend from the fire hazard.
- There are several creeks running through the areaprotection of these riparian zones will essentially mean that corridors of vegetation will run through the site.
 There are sloped areas which will be too steep to develop so the development will likely be on the ridge lines, which brings a higher fire risk.



- Last time the community met with Council staff, consultation with RFS for this project was yet to happen. We would like to raise this issue again now that the developers have been given the lead planning for area.
- In this regard, the threatened species in the area are the Yellow-bellied Glider and the Glossy Black Cockatoo. These species have large ranges, they need large corridors between habitat areas, hollow nesting trees and reliable water sources. If habitat areas for these species are preserved within the development area they will need to be managed into the future. We have been told that would likely mean a hazard reduction burn every 2-5 years. However, this fire frequency is not compatible with the fire thresholds for these species and therefore even if areas are put aside for them, it is unlikely they would survive in the area long term unless the footprint of the development could be somehow consolidated.
- If the 3 owners would be open to discussion about how to consolidate the footprint of the development, many of the serious challenges of this development could be improved.
- Further on bushfire management: Council sold their portion of this site in 2021, the fire break behind existing houses in Dalmeny is not being maintained by the new owner. Residents have written to Council but this is an ongoing problem.
- Areas of Dalmeny are already impacted by localised flooding.
 Locals have made complaints to Council about silt traps in
 drainage reserves not being cleared and sewage overflow is
 affecting properties and Mummaga Lake in storm events. Concerns
 about stormwater runoff impacting Mummaga Lake and Dalmeny
 beach has been the number 1 concern raised by locals to Council
 since planning for this project began. These residents deserve a
 response as to how this large development may affect their
 properties into the future.
- Lastly, in regards to traffic management, we are requesting the
 opportunity to be consulted about access roads to the
 development area. Locals have useful knowledge about traffic
 volume, dangerous areas, requirements for footpaths and bike path
 connectivity and the routes that kids take to the school bus stops.
 There are also issues with traffic and parking in the Dalmeny
 business area.

I will finish by saying that consultation is always most useful when it is done early in the process and in good faith. The formal process, whereby residents write detailed submissions to a plan on Public Exhibition, only to receive a one line response that 'no changes to the plan are anticipated' does not acknowledge community as a genuine stakeholder in the process.

If you could please help to facilitate our requests, in your role as Councillors, it would be much appreciated.

\$20.3 million for alcohol and drug services in Southern NSW

People at risk of harm from alcohol and drug use in Southern NSW will have greater access to support and treatment, with a \$20.3 million funding boost from the NSW Government to enhance services over four years.

The investment includes funding for Southern NSW Local Health District and local non-government organisations services, including:

- \$2.6 million over four years for the establishment of a day rehabilitation and case management for people with dependent children, delivered by Karralika Programs.
- \$4.2 million over four years for day rehabilitation and counselling for young people aged 12-17 years and young adults aged 18-24 years, delivered by Directions Health.
- \$2 million for counselling for community-based withdrawal management, case management and counselling for people with co-occurring mental health and alcohol and other drug issues, delivered by Directions Health.
- \$2 million over four years for new post-custodial support services, delivered by Directions Health, which also covers Murrumbidgee region (and previously announced for Griffith).
 \$9.5 million over four years has been allocated to Southern NSW Local Health District to increase access to specialist

alcohol and other drug treatment services.

Day rehabilitation and case management for people with dependent children

The new program offers treatment and support for an individual's substance use as well as focussing on enhancing the parents/care givers relationships with their children. The program will include structured alcohol and other drug support groups run over 16 weeks, supported by individual counselling, including with family members, which will be delivered alongside a parenting program.

The program is designed to be flexible to ensure it is accessible for parents. People will be able to access ongoing support for up to six months. Up to 34 people and their families will receive support at any one time.

Day rehabilitation and counselling for young people Young people accessing the new day rehabilitation and counselling service will be offered early intervention, structured day rehabilitation, counselling, group education and family support for up to six months. Services will be offered in person and through telehealth, with outreach offered to some rural communities. Around 240 young people and their families will receive treatment and support each year.

Community based withdrawal management, case management and counselling

Community based withdrawal management and counselling support services will be offered in person and through virtual care. Holistic case management and support will be offered for up to six months, with up to 30 people being supported at any one time. This service also supports people in the Illawarra region.

Southern NSW Local Health District Services

The district will be able to offer increased access to specialist treatment and clinical expertise through the expansion of critical services such as Substance Use in Pregnancy and Parenting Services (SUPPS), the Assertive Community Management program, offering intensive case management support to people with complex needs; the Magistrates Early Referral into Treatment (MERIT) program; and improved access to hospital consultation liaison services.

Drug Summit

The NSW Government held a multiday regional Drug Summit in Griffith and Lismore in November, bringing together health experts, police, people with lived and living experiences, drug user organisations, families and other stakeholders to provide a range of perspectives.

The Summit also included a Sydney forum held on Wednesday 4 and Thursday 5 December,

Government to introduce new digital competition powers

The Federal government is proposing a new digital competition regime for big tech to protect consumers, and bolster innovation and competition.

A handful of global tech giants dominate how we pay for things, what we download, and how our data is used. Existing competition rules are no longer effective in addressing their control over key services like search engines, app stores, and social media.

The Albanese government is proposing a new regime that would impose upfront rules on large digital platforms to address issues encountered by Australian consumers and businesses when using digital platforms.

The laws would give the minister the power to designate platforms or services and impose service-specific obligations, with penalties of up to \$50 million, or 30 per cent of turnover, for failure to comply.

The government is proposing the first two services to be investigated for designation under the regime to be app stores and ad tech, and is seeking views on whether social media should also be prioritised.

Currently, app store platforms owned by Google and Apple can preference their own apps in search results making it difficult for consumers to compare products. They can also require businesses to use their payment systems, increasing prices for businesses and consumers.

Similarly, the vast majority of digital ad tech services in Australia are facilitated by Google, driving up prices for advertisers, and reducing profits for publishers who display ads

The paper seeks stakeholder views on the proposed approach and key elements of the regime, including:

- the general framework and scope of covered services
- the priority services for designation
- the designation process to ensure the regime is appropriately targeted
- potential obligations that would apply to designated platforms, and
- proposed enforcement and compliance mechanisms.

The proposed regime follows the introduction of similar regimes in the European Union, United Kingdom and Japan. The European Commission estimates the EU laws will deliver AUD \$21.4 billion in annual benefits for consumers.

The proposed regime forms part of the government's broader reforms to keep pace with innovations in the digital space. It complements the new scams prevention framework, implementation of privacy reforms, the passing of digital ID laws, and ongoing work related to artificial intelligence. Stakeholders are requested to provide their feedback by 14 February 2025. Further information regarding the consultation process is available on the **Treasury website**.

The release of the proposal paper delivers a key part of the <u>Government's response</u> to the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission's recommendations in its September 2022 Digital Platform Services Inquiry interim report.



eID for Sheep and Goats in NSW: Key changes coming 1 January 2025

The NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (NSW DPIRD) is reminding livestock producers and industry stakeholders that mandatory electronic identification (eID) is set to take effect from 1 January 2025.

As part of the state's ongoing efforts to enhance livestock traceability, biosecurity, and disease management, the following key requirements will be starting 1 January 2025:

- -- Mandatory use of eID devices such as tags for all sheep and goats born from 1 January 2025, prior to leaving the property of birth
- · For property-to-property movements, any sheep or goats with an eID device must be scanned, and the entire movement uploaded to the NLIS database
- -- Saleyards and goat depots need to scan eIDs and record individual livestock sheep and goat movements on the NLIS database.

 NSW DPIRD Director of Sheep and Goat Traceability, Kiowa Fenner, highlighted the importance of the new requirements in strengthening the integrity of the state's livestock traceability system.

"If you move or sell lambs or kids born next year, they will need an eID device before departure."

The implementation is on track, with processors already having commenced scanning eIDs and uploading eID data to the NLIS database from 30 June 2024.

"Producers are encouraged to begin preparing for the shift to eID and for many this will be as simple as simply purchasing eID devices rather than visual tags for their lambs and kids next year.

"When you purchase white 2025 NLIS-accredited devices from your preferred retailer, you will receive a \$0.76 discount under the NSW Tag Discount Program until 31 October 2025 or until funds are exhausted. Return and Earn celebrates seven years of making recycling easy in NSW

NSW's popular drink container recycling scheme, Return and Earn, is today celebrating seven years of success. And to mark its birthday, the scheme has released its latest Local Government Volumes Report listing the number of containers returned by the community by council. Since its launch in December 2017, Return and Earn has seen over 12.5 billion drink containers returned for recycling through its return point network across the state thanks to the 84 per cent of NSW adults who have participated.

Eurobodalla has returned over \$86 million items through the scheme!

NSW Labor invests millions into fixing regional waste

Friday, 6 December 2024

The Minns Labor Government has made a further \$6 million in funding available for regional councils to help them transform, modernise or close old landfills that no longer accept waste.

Councils can apply for the grants under round five of the Landfill Consolidation and Environmental Improvement Program, which has already awarded \$12 million across four previous funding rounds. Better management of high-risk landfill sites will reduce potential health risks for the community and lower the risk of contamination and illegal dumping incidents.

Financial support is available across three targeted streams: Up to \$300,000 for consolidating landfills and closing landfills, and building transfer stations

Up to \$250,000 for site upgrades

Up to \$25,000 for professional services such as feasibility studies, closure plans, engineering designs and education courses

Previously this program has supported the closure of 57 landfills, the environmental improvement of 89 landfills and the establishment of 37 transfer stations.

Applications to improve landfills in regional levy-paying and non-levy areas are open until 21 March 2025, and a panel of industry experts will assess eligible proposals.

Report shows focus on vegetation management lowers bushfire risk

Essential Energy has made significant inroads into managing vegetation that may cause a bushfire around its network of more than 1.4 million power poles, according to the latest electricity network safety report. Following delays caused by continued wet weather in several regional communities, Essential Energy and its contracted service providers performed more than 120,000 trimming tasks and removed 14,767 hazardous trees during the 2023-24 reporting period.

The report says Essential Energy's focus on vegetation management backlogs following the impact of wet weather, particularly during major floods in 2022, made marked improvements in the safety of the network and the prevention of bushfires.

Funding to support community-led response to men's mental health crisis

The NSW Government is continuing work to support the wellbeing of the people across New South Wales, with \$400,000 in grants now available to provide targeted support to improve men's mental health and drive down rates of male suicide.

Targeted at community-based mental healthcare providers, the new program offers grants of up to \$50,000 for local and grassroots organisations who are working on the ground to support men's mental health.

New South Wales accounts for the most male deaths by suicide in Australia. In 2023 alone, there were 934 suspected deaths by suicide in the state, with men accounting for 730, or 78 per cent of these tragedies. The launch of the new grants program follows the recent release of the NSW Men's Mental Health: A focus on suicide prevention report which was informed by the landmark Men's Mental Health Forum held in August. suicide prevention.

Battery incentives are now available.

To take advantage of these incentives you will need to work with a local installer that is partnered with an accredited supplier.

You can access a discount on installing a battery in your home or small business with an existing solar system, or have the discount priced into a quote for a combined solar system and battery installation. Installing a battery can help you:

- store and use more solar energy to reduce your electricity costs
- keep power on during outages
- reduce your environmental footprint by using more renewable energy.

This incentive will help reduce electricity demand during peak periods, and the risk of power outages in NSW. Installing more batteries across NSW will help make the grid more reliable and stable, while also reducing our reliance on fossil fuels during periods of peak demand. This will help reduce NSW's emissions by 70% by 2035 and achieve net zero by 2050. If you already have a battery installed, you are not eligible to receive this incentive. Existing batteries may be eligible to receive an incentive for connecting to a Virtual Power Plant (VPP). A VPP allows you to sell some of the excess stored energy in your battery when other people on the grid need it most.

Bare Hooves and Open Hearts: Tales From Nelipot Cottage

Bare Hooves and Open Hearts: Tales From Nelipot Cottage is a book for every horse lover - from casual weekend rider to top-level equestrian – and, indeed, all animal lovers. Author Fran McNicol fearlessly chronicles both her triumphs and her struggles as she probes, then puts in place, alternative approaches to horse care and training.

With warmth and humour, McNicol weaves personal anecdotes into broader musings, resulting in a book that celebrates a more ethical approach to horse riding and management. Central to the book are themes of barefoot hoof care and classical dressage. McNicol delves into the philosophy and science of barefoot trimming – alongside the wins she candidly shares the setbacks as she transitions her horses to this more natural hoof-care system. It's both relatable and inspiring.

For McNicol, classical dressage has nothing to do with those - often unhappy - horses competing in the Olympic Games. Instead, she draws on the long history of classical exercises used to develop a more gymnastic horse that is better able to carry its rider with grace and ease. Rather than imposing rigid expectations from on top, McNicol emphasises working with the horse, finding exercises and patterns that can make any horse – every horse – more magnificent.

In her professional life McNicol is a surgeon, her mantra is 'first do no harm'. But, as she says, "the intention to harm need not be present for harm to occur". She doesn't shy away from pointing out mental and physical issues caused by conventional horsekeeping, but does so with warmth and humility. McNicol's thoughtful insights make for a book that will inspire readers to face their own horse challenges with renewed insight and vigour.





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

Tuross Bowlers at Regional Playoffs

Tuross Head bowlers travelled to Merimbula to play in the first two days of the South East Region playoffs for the 2024/25 State Championships on the weekend of November 30 and December 1. The south region stretches from Berry in the north to Eden in the south and west to Adaminaby and Jindabyne. Being such a large Region the preliminary rounds are played in four geographic areas with the winners then progressing to the Regional Finals. As it turned out Merimbula was a good venue for the finals as it is the only Club in the Region with undercover areens!

The State Championships are played in the four main disciplines of bowls - singles, pairs, triples and fours - with separate men and women divisions. Within this there are State Championships and Senior Championships entrants need to be 60 or older to enter this division. As well as these two levels of Championships there is a third category that caters for bowlers who play in Pennant grade 5 or lower. This is an 'Open' Championship where teams can be any mix of Men and Women.

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Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

Moruva River.

Sorry for the lateness of this report, the shop is busy enough with customers and Xmas stock arriving, that every time I get a minute to start the report, something always comes up. But that's ok.

The river has been fishing really well this past week, with good numbers of flathead, bream, trevally, salmon and the odd just under size mulloway coming from the lower section on the river. The airport flats are a great place to start looking for a flathead and even a whiting over the shallow sand flats. While Preddy's wharf has been a good first stop to try for a fish or two also.

Quarry wharf always seems to hold some nice bream and Trevally, with the occasional mulloway and tailor also in the

Under the town bridge, flathead, bream and whiting can all be found working the sand flats in the middle of the river, while the southern bank weed beds always seem to hold some nice estuary perch.

Last weekends rains have seen the bass guys rejoicing as the Deua rose about 2-3' allowing for trapped fish to move upstream, and for the whole system to get a freshen up. The river has had a week to settle down, and the bass will no doubt be on the chew this weekend. I guess you know what I'll be chasing this weekend.

Tuross River.

This amazing system deserves its reputation as our premier piece of water, with good numbers of flathead, bream whiting and several nice mullowy all be taken here over the last week. Flathead are concentrating over the warm shallow sand and mud flats the sit adjacent to a channel they can set up an ambush position in, while the oyster racks are holding some nice aggressive bream at the moment.

Much the same as the Deua river, the upper Tuross river has had a much needed increase to flows with last weekend rains, allowing the bass to continue moving upstream and freshening the whole system up.

Coila lake has a really good run of prawns this dark, they will still be available for another week, and then will start to tail off. Be ready for the next dark which will 31st December, for an even better run, as they will have had time to grow.

Rock and beach.

Salmon, tailor, bream and whiting are all available for those that enjoy the sane between their toes. There are no spots better than any other, with all our pristine beaches capable of holding good fish. They are where you find them. Offshore.

Yellowfin tuna are on the game crews lips at the moment, with fish to 70kg being reported and bigger models having been sounded up below these schools. A 70kg fish is guaranteed to give you a work out and provide plenty of flesh if you are looking for a feed.

Closer to shore, there are plenty of flathead in the 20-30m marks while the snapper are mostly a bit deeper in the 50+m mark.

Was a good, fun night, I was presented with a pretty cool trophy for coming 1st in the Semi Pro Class!"


