Emergency Department Staff thanked the Auxiliary for the Ultrasound System which will deliver point of care Ultrasound to patients attending the Emergency Department at the Hospital. The Mindray System will provide increased functions, especially cardiac ultrasound. The Ultrasound System is used in all resuscitations, trauma admissions, cardiac arrests, gastroenterology admissions and cannulations. The unplanned outage in Batemans Bay

An Essential Energy spokesperson says "Wednesday morning at approximately 08:20am, a significant network event occurred in Batemans Bay, affecting 1625 customers. The cause of the outage was initially unknown but was later identified as a suspected highvoltage underground cable fault feeding a substation.

Our dedicated teams worked diligently to address the issue. We were able to successfully reduce the number of affected customers to 141 by 13:11pm and by approximately 6:30pm all affected customers had power restored.

Remembering friendship from 1796



Remembering friendships from 1796 A delegation from the Bangadeshi High Commission visited Moruya on Tuesday to lay a wreath at the plaque commemorating the friendship between shipwrecked Bengali sailors and the local indigenous people in 1796.

A delegation from the Bangladeshi High Commission in Canberra came to Moruya on Tuesday to visit the site of the plaque remembering 'Our Friends' from 228 years ago. The plaque by the river commemorates relationship between the local Aboriginal Community who helped the Lascar Bengali sailors from the Sydney Cove, who had been shipwrecked in February 1796 at Preservation Island in Bass Strait.

The Sydney Cover had been a Bengali vessel but was renamed for its trip to Sydney.

The 30 survivors made their way to Sydney on foot. Along the way the indigenous peoples helped them along their journey. Nine of the Bengali sailors were left at Moruya, and it is suspected that they died from eating the Burrawang seeds (without the indigenous knowledge to leech the toxins from them.)

In May 1797, just three survivors made it back to Sydney - William Clark, sailor John Bennet and one lascar.

The story is told by historian Mark McKenna in his book 'Walking the Edge.'

Hosted by the Moruya Chamber of Commerce, a short ceremony was held including a Welcome to Country from Kerry Boyenga, speeches by Rob Pollock from the Chamber, Mayor Mat Hatcher and the Acting High Commissioner Dr Shahricor Firoz Dewan. A Muslim prayer was read by a member of the delegation.

A wreath was laid at the plaque to honour the friendships.

Our friends

mudjingaal-njin Āmādēra bandhurā

'Our friends' translated in dhurga and Bangla (Bamla) languages

Commemorating an historic meeting between First Nations people and shipwreck survivors in Moruya 225 years ago – a remarkable story of survival and goodwill.

On 8 February 1797, the cargo ship Sydney Cove was wrecked at Preservation Island in Bass Strait, after travelling from Calcutta.

Five British and twelve Bengali sailors (known as Lascar sailors), led by Chief Mate Hugh Thompson, left behind Captain Guy Hamilton and many other crew members on the island on 27 February to seek rescue in Port Jackson, Sydney.

They sailed a modified long boat (sail and oars) to 90-mile beach on the coast of Victoria, 40-45kms south of Lakes Entrance, where they were marooned again on 2 March after a southerly gale. All 17 made it to shore safely but with barely any provisions. They decided to walk to Sydney, some 700 kms away. On 14 March 1797, they set off, traversing rivers, rocks, bluffs and beaches.

None would have survived without Aboriginal people showing them how to find food and water, guiding them along paths, taking them across rivers in their canoes and welcoming them to their camps.

One of those camps was here at Moruya. The brindja Yuin and djirringgandj Yuin people assisted the party to cross three rivers – Narooma on 13 April, Tuross on 15 April, and Moruya on 16 April.

After these crossings, nine Lascar sailors fell ill and remained with the local Aboriginals, who William Clark, one of the survivors, describes in his journal as "Our Friends". It is not known what happened to those sailors, but the rest of the party moved on.

On April 17th, Thompson nearly drowned at Mossy Point, walbandja Yuin land, which slowed their progress. After two months, three men completed the trek: William Clark, John Bennet and an unnamed Bengali sailor. On 17 May 1797 they were found at Wattamolla Beach, just south of Sydney. In early June, a rescue was launched by the vessels *Eliza* and *Francis*, which reached the stranded crew at Preservation Island on 10 June.

2022 marks 225 years since this historic event.

Ball-Shaped debris found on South Coast Beaches

NSW Environment Protection Authority

The NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) has been notified by the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) of the discovery of ball-shaped debris on 1080 Beach and Pooles Beach at Mystery Bay near Narooma on the South Coast.

The balls are reported to be spread across 200 metres of the beach and vary in size and shape. Staff from NPWS attended the site on 11 December and inspected nearby beaches. Around 20 debris balls were also found at Pooles Beach however, there were none observed on any other nearby beaches.

Both 1080 Beach and Pooles Beach have been closed while NPWS staff undertake clean-up. Signs have been put in place to advise visitors of the contamination. Officers from the EPA also attended the beaches today and collected samples for analysis. Over the coming days, NPWS will continue to monitor beaches in the Mystery Bay area.

The EPA has finalised testing on ball-shaped debris that washed up on beaches in Sydney's Eastern suburbs in October, confirming earlier results that indicate their origin is likely a source that releases mixed waste.

Experts could not determine where the balls originated from as no source samples were available for comparison. The EPA is awaiting results of testing on debris balls which washed up in Kiama in November and Silver Beach at Kurnell earlier this month.

Telstra delivers disaster support in the South East NSW region

Telstra is ready to support communities in South East NSW this summer with 25 upgraded payphones, recovery equipment on standby and extra mobile data for customers.

Telstra Regional General Manager for Southern NSW Chris Taylor said with extreme weather events becoming more common and harder to predict, Telstra spends months inspecting thousands of sites around the country to ensure its network is as resilient as possible.

"We know how critical it is for Australians to remain connected during a natural disaster and while we can't predict what mother nature will throw at us, we're as ready as we can be," Mr Taylor said.

"We have a long history of responding to extreme weather events and the Telstra Response Team are often first on the ground after emergency services to assess and help restore

our network.
"While our network and other infrastructure like electricity can be affected during a natural disaster, we continually work to find better, faster ways to reconnect affected communities

Upgrading 1000 payphones in disaster-prone areas

Payphones in the region are among 1,000 across the nation being upgraded with free Telstra Wi-Fi, USB charging ports and back-up power to help keep communities connected during a natural disaster.

Almost 800 payphones, 40 of which are in remote Indigenous communities, have already been upgraded including 25 in the South East NSW region such as Batemans Bay, Bega, Moruya and Merimbula.

"If your mobile phone isn't charged, or you've had to evacuate, a payphone might be the only way to contact family and friends to let them know you are ok," Mr Taylor said. "Knowing where your nearest payphone can be a huge help in case the power goes out and you need to make a call, get online, or to charge your phone.'

More ways to get people back online

Last disaster season, Telstra deployed 110 new trailer-mounted, highpowered generators across Australia and have done so again this year. 'In preparation for this disaster season, we have proactively deployed 27 high-powered generators to at-risk areas across NSW with three of them located in the South East NSW area.

This year, Telstra expanded the use of portable satellite technology with 27 Starlink satellite kits stationed across NSW which can be assembled in under 10 minutes and help provide basic connectivity for our teams.

Improving mobile coverage for NSW

Over the seven years to end of FY24, Telstra invested \$11.8bn in its mobile network nationally with \$4.3B of this invested in its regional mobile network. This includes new technology that can help boost network resilience such as satellite-based backhaul for remote mobile sites. The roll out of LEO enabled backhaul, for example, can help improve reliability in areas where the terrestrial network is susceptible to natural disasters and communities might otherwise find themselves in isolation.

Across NSW, 18 remote base stations are currently using satellite backhaul with plans to connect more than 300 sites around the country with Eutelsat OneWeb's LEO solution by mid next year.

Supporting customers and communities

Last disaster season, Telstra provided short-term assistance through extra data to customers in 122 locations across Australia, with over 400,000 instances of support.

Eurobodalla's new \$330 million hospital on track to transform local healthcare

Work on the new \$330 million Eurobodalla Regional Hospital is progressing and is on track to deliver expanded and enhanced health services to communities throughout the region, from north of Batemans Bay to south of Narooma

Member for Bega Dr Michael Holland toured the site today to inspect progress for the new hospital, which will significantly improve access to high-quality healthcare for the local community.

The new hospital will include new services such as the region's first paediatrics unit, a new eight bed intensive care unit and a new MRI service. It will also feature a new emergency department with larger capacity than the current combined emergency services of Moruya and Batemans Bay. There will be the addition of mental health beds for short term care to deliver high-quality, contemporary and accessible health care closer to home. Since construction started in June this year, the new access road and future

Since construction started in June this year, the new access road and future hospital car parking area have been built, bulk site excavation is nearing completion, the foundations for the main hospital building have been dug and concrete pouring for the footings is underway.

Construction activity is set to increase in the new year with dozens of skilled workers joining the team, including concreters, form workers, crane operators, electricians, plumbers and other skilled trades.

The project is expected to support around 550 direct jobs with the potential to support many hundreds of indirect jobs over the life of the project. The Eurobodalla Regional Hospital is expected to be completed in 2027. Minister for Regional Health Ryan Park said "Delivering high-quality health infrastructure and technology plays a foundational role in bridging the healthcare gaps in our regional areas."

"As Health Minister, improving access to health services is an absolute priority to me and this new \$330 million Eurobodalla Regional Hospital will be transformative to health outcomes of the region.

"The development of this hospital represents a significant investment in the health and wellbeing of the South Coast community, it's exciting to see such substantial progress in such a short amount of time."

Member for Bega, Dr Michael Holland said "It's terrific to see the extent of the progress on the new hospital, which will be larger than both Moruya and Batemans Bay hospitals combined. "New services like paediatrics, intensive care, and an MRI will be provided at the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital, strengthening our local healthcare system supporting more health services for families, the elderly, and everyone in our community."

Council may skip chance to cut Bay Pavilions losses

The contract with Aligned Leisure to operate the Bay Pavilions expires in six months and despite expected losses over \$6 million this year, council staff are proposing to pass the opportunity for a major reset to ease the financial impact on the local community.

Instead they will ask councillors at the next council meeting on Tuesday for approval to simply extend the existing management contract, with some minor modifications, for another year.

The report on the contract renewal from council staff to councillors makes no mention of the millions being lost every year on the Bay Pavilions, or the impact this has on the broader community, with community services and road maintenance cut to pay for it.

Community, arts and recreation services director Kathy Arthur says, "A one year extension of the contract will enable future focused actions from the Sustainability Plan to be addressed in a considered manner, with findings from this analysis incorporated into a further report, providing evidence-based options for Council consideration in relation to future directions, management and service delivery components for the Bay Pavilions." The need for even more time to consider "future focused actions" comes 18 months after a report from KPMG predicted the coming financial disaster and made a number of specific recommendations that were accepted by councillors, few of which seem to have been implemented by general manager Warwick Winn or his staff.

InConsult told council 18 months ago the contract with Aligned Leisure should be renegotiated to include penalties for non-performance as well as rewards for exceeding requirements.

InConsult also identified extreme risks that would have catastrophic financial consequences if not addressed and made specific recommendations for action.

Ms Arthur will recommend a contract extension to council that includes no penalties for non-performance, just rewards.

The \$284,323 a year contract with Aligned Leisure includes management of the Moruya and Narooma Pools, along with the Bay Pavilions. Operating costs of all the facilities are paid by council.

Council responds to Questions on Bay Pavilions performance

Three weeks ago, the Moruya Mail asked council for assistance to update our readers on progress being made to improve the financial performance of the Bay Pavilions.

We asked seven specific questions that followed up on extreme risks identified by InConsult, the firm who reported to council 18 months ago on ways to improve the financial performance of the business. The most extreme risk was the "unsustainable business / service delivery model" and the consequence of this risk was identified as catastrophic. InConsult laid out recommendations to address those risks.

The Questions We Asked

InConsult advised: In the absence of Bay Pavilions being able to achieve a positive cashflow and net surplus, Council must set a loss tolerance level and manage the asset accordingly.

The Mail asked: InConsult were very firm on this point, using the word "must" Has the loss tolerance level been determined? What is it?

InConsult advised: Conduct a 'lessons learned' workshop where Council and Aligned Leisure can discuss strengths and weaknesses in the current arrangement with an objective of minimising the financial exposure to Council.

The Mail asked: Risk 19 on Reputation also recommended a workshop. Was the workshop conducted? Are there any outcomes that have been delivered?

Note: Aligned Leisure (AL) are the company council has contracted to operate the Pavilions.

InConsult advised: Currently all expenses are borne by Council and a set management fee is paid to AL. There is no 'skin in the game' for AL, no penalties for poor performance and no rewards for improving performance. Council should re-assess the value proposition and in particular how AL can enhance revenue.

The Mail asked: Has the value reassessment been completed? Have enhanced revenue opportunities been put in place? Have poor performance penalties or rewards for improved performance been set?

InConsult advised: Investigate the possibility of more flexibility to fees and charges to allow AL to promote the BP more effectively. The Mail asked: Has any greater flexibility been given to AL? Can AL's promotion of the Bay Pavilions be measured as being more effective as a result?

InConsult advised: Investigate opportunities for AL to work closer with Council's tourism team to align the Bay Pavilions strategic plan and business plan to Councils and regions tourism strategy.

The Mail asked: Have Tourism and AL started to work together? Any outcomes to date?

InConsult advised: Review the Marketing Plan and Business Plan drafted by AL and provided to Council at the start of the Contract to establish realistic marketing and financial targets. At the heart of any future strategy should be key strategies to increase patronage/more users.

The Mail asked: Has council accepted revised Marketing and Business Plans from AL?

And finally, we asked about an action plan listed in council's Sustainability Plan for the Pav:

Action: Review and consider renegotiation of current contract with Aligned Leisure.

The Mail asked: Has a renegotiated contract been agreed?

The Response from Council

Today, the Moruya Mail received this response to our questions from a council spokesperson.

Council has endorsed the Bay Pavilions Sustainability Plan. The BPSP takes into consideration all recommendations from various reviews and is the basis for the action plan going forward. It is an action in the Finance Strategy, and associated budgets are adopted by Council.

Council has determined its tolerance level by endorsing operational budgets in the Long-Term Financial Plan and manages the Bay Pavilions in accordance with these budgets. Council doesn't set a figure (eg a 10% tolerance), but reports quarterly, with a detailed explanation on variances greater than \$50k. We also have opportunities to pivot within the recreation budget or other service areas. These budgets are reviewed quarterly, and long-term estimates are revised annually with any variations to the budgets considered as part of Council's entire recreation service delivery.

A detailed report has been prepared for the December Council Meeting that recommends:

THAT

- 1. Council endorse a one year extension of the current contract with Aligned Leisure, from 1 July 2025 to 30 June 2026, for the management of the Bay Pavilions, Moruya and Narooma pools, with a total management fee set at \$284,323 for the year.
- 2. Council delegate authority to the General Manager to finalise the contract extension and associated documentation, including agreed additional performance indicators and profit share agreement for the 2025-2026 year.
- 3. A report be prepared for Council regarding future management and service delivery options at the facility If endorsed, a report will be prepared in 2025 regarding future service delivery and management of the Bay Pavilions.

Yes, We're Disappointed

A constant theme from Mayor Mathew Hatcher is that council will be open and transparent. The questions we put to council are in the public interest, given the impact the unforeseen multi-million dollar losses at the Bay Pavilions are having in the wider community, including the thousands of locals who read the Moruya Mail every week.

So, yes, we are disappointed council didn't give direct answers to our questions.

Producing a Sustainability Plan is not action. Planned losses this year at the Pavilions are \$6.2 million, but revenue for the first quarter is 30% under the annualised target, so losses could skyrocket.

What's actually going on?

What real action has general manager Warwick Winn and his staff actually taken on the expert advice accepted by councillors 18 months ago on the extreme risks existing at the Bay Pavilions?

Batemans Bay Urgent Care Clinic celebrates first birthday and 10,200 visits

The Batemans Bay Medicare Urgent Care Clinic has celebrated its first birthday with the news that 10,200 people have visited the facility since the doors opened. Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips said the number of bulk-billed visits for urgent, but non-life-threatening care, reflected the ongoing need for the clinic that she lobbied for and delivered.

"It's fantastic to see how the people of Batemans Bay and surrounds have embraced this free service which is available seven days a week," she said.

"As we celebrate 12 months since the doors opened, I really want to thank the wonderful staff at the Urgent Care Clinic who treat everything from broken arms to tummy aches, when people need it.

"They're providing essential care and taking the pressure off our hospital and local doctors."

Mrs Phillips said she was pleased the clinic would be open from 8am until 8pm over the summer holidays.

"With the influx of visitors to our region, it's really great that, from 16 December to mid-February, the clinic will be open extended hours to cater for those non-life-threatening holiday incidents," she said.

"As a mum I know how difficult it can be waiting for treatment at the hospital ED with an injured child after they've fallen off their bike or skateboard.

"We've heard from so many parents how great the care at the clinic has been, especially on weekends."

Mrs Phillips said she would like to see the hours extended further, and made permanent, and for care levels to be increased at the Medicare Urgent Care Clinic.

She has launched a petition and has encouraged people to jump onto her website and sign it.

"I've had a fantastic response to my petition, and my call for longer hours and a higher level of care is something the community is really getting behind," Mrs Phillips said.

Milton-Ulladulla bypass reaches crucial design milestone

The \$940 million Milton-Ulladulla Bypass project has reached another milestone, with the contracts signed for specialists to carry out the concept design and environmental assessments. Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips said she was thrilled to see the wheels turning on the long-awaited bypass that the community has campaigned for over the last 30 years.

"This is a significant point in the bypass project that has been made possible thanks to the \$752 million that I have delivered from the Australian Government," Mrs Phillips said.

"I know how important this bypass is for the community, which is why specialists have been engaged to ensure we get it right. I want to ensure this project is delivered on time and on budget. "I drive through Milton and Ulladulla during holiday times, when

traffic volumes are at their peak, and I understand how frustrating it is for local residents that this has taken so long.

"I am proud to have delivered funding for the Milton-Ulladulla bypass and, together with \$188 million from the state Labor government, it is finally moving forward."

As part of the continued planning for the Milton-Ulladulla Bypass, a contract has been awarded to Aurecon Australasia Pty Ltd for the development of the concept design and the environmental assessment, including an Environmental Impact Statement. The concept design will include confirmation of the design features, such as the lane configuration and intersections connecting to the existing highway. It will also provide more certainty on the project's footprint and boundaries, including local road access during the construction and operation of the bypass. Mrs Phillips has also secured \$400 million in Federal funding for the Princes Highway upgrade between Jervis Bay and Hawken roads, \$100 million for the Jervis Bay flyover and \$97 million for the Nowra bypass planning.

"I'm pleased that I was recently also able to officially open the \$35 million federally funded Far North Collector Road, which was only able to open after I secured additional federal funding," she said. "This also comes on top of over \$100 million in federal-state disaster recovery funding provided to local councils to help fix land slips and local roads impacted by natural disasters. "There's more to do, but as a true local, I'm getting on with providing federal funding to fix our roads and making sure our major roads are fit for the future."

Batemans Bay High School upgrades to increase opportunities for high potential students

The NSW Government is continuing work to expand high potential and gifted education opportunities across NSW public schools, with 13 targeted schools set to receive a share in \$50 million for specialist school facilities.

Batemans Bay High is one of 13 schools to be funded for upgrades and improvements to facilities such as science and technology laboratories, libraries, creative arts spaces, sporting facilities and design workshops, enabling the schools to deliver talent development and extension opportunities across a range of subject areas.

This investment is part of the Minns Labor Government's commitment to deliver high potential and gifted education opportunities in all NSW public schools.

Work with these partner schools is the first step in the NSW Government's expansion of access to High Potential and Gifted Education (HPGE) opportunities across NSW public schools. Staff at these targeted schools will work with HPGE experts to deliver more opportunities that challenge and extend students to reach their potential.

These opportunities include activities such as class-level acceleration programs, inter-school competitions and tournaments, and statewide opportunities such as the Duke of Edinburgh's International Award program, the Premier's Spelling Bee, the Gamechanger Challenge in design thinking, the Schools Spectacular and inter-school debating championships. Priority schools have been chosen across metropolitan and regional NSW based on identified student needs, population growth, and schools' capacity to accommodate increased enrolments.

The investment will help broaden educational opportunities at the school through access to state-of-the-art learning resources such as STEM provisions and dedicated creative arts, performance and sports facilities.

New overtaking lane now open on the Kings Highway

Member for Monaro Steve Whan has announced a new 760metre eastbound overtaking lane on the Kings Highway at Mulloon is now open to traffic.

Made possible thanks to a \$4 million investment from the Minns Labor Government, the overtaking lane between Mulloon Creek and Goulburn Road is the second to be opened under the extensive program of upgrades on the Kings Highway.

These upgrades will provide a safer road and improve traffic efficiency between Batemans Bay and the NSW/ACT border. From 2015 to 2019 there were 17 crashes along the highway at Mulloon, with one resulting in a fatality.

The new overtaking lane, along with additional safety treatments delivered in the area, are designed to help to reduce the likelihood of fatal and serious injury crashes on the highway.

Safety upgrades in the area will enhance the resilience of the road to incidents and natural hazards, and have included the installation of a widened centreline and shoulders, roadside safety barriers, and audio tactile line-marking. Member for Monaro Steve Whan said "The Minns Labor Government is investing \$20 million to deliver key upgrades such as additional overtaking lanes, wider shoulders, and safety barriers to improve the safety and efficiency of the King Highway for all road users.

"With more than 5000 vehicles travelling on the King's Highway each day, it is a critical route for local, medical, freight and tourist traffic, and these upgrades will support economic and community growth for our region. The Kings Highway Upgrade program is expected to be complete by June 2025, weather permitting.



Animal Liberation says it's time to rope in rodeo cruelty

In NSW, rodeo events can still rely on legal exemptions under the state's animal welfare laws, that allow animal handling practices that would otherwise be prosecuted as cruelty to animals. These exemptions are currently under review along with other animal welfare considerations, in a draft Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Regulations 2025, with the current 2012 Regulations due for repeal on 1 February 2025.

Public submission can be made up to 11:59pm, Thursday 19 December. Animal Liberation, Australia's longest running animal rights organisation has published a flexible submissions guide to help the public have their say.

Animal Liberation is asking the public to "consider how they would view rodeo cruelty, if it were their much-loved family dog in the arena being chased, roped or wrestled to the dirt floor, while a paying crowd called for more of the same."

According to Lisa Ryan, Animal Liberation's Regional Campaigns Manager, "the NSW Code of Practice for animals used in rodeo events is nearly 37 years old, has never been reviewed, and has never been fit for purpose. The current responsible Minister, Tara Moriarty appears completely immune to animal suffering and government sanctioned animal abuse."

Ms Ryan went on to say, "these spectacles are brutal and violent, designed solely for human entertainment, are terrifying for animals, many of which suffer repeated performances week in and week out as they are loaded, unloaded and trucked around the state."

"These rodeo animals are tormented and forced to perform unnatural behaviours for the price of a ticket, with the aid of goading, deliberate provocation, being separated from their herd, and equipment like flank straps, spurs and electric jiggers. We're asking people to choose not to fund animal suffering."

"What the public see at these events is akin to the senseless, wilful bullying of frightened animals who are trying to flee an environment of extreme fear, discomfort and pain. Most attendees witness the spectacle, not the animal's instinctive reaction and response of terror."

"A study undertaken by Oxford University confirmed many people don't recognise animal cruelty or suffering when it's dressed up as fun or entertainment, even when it's directly in front of them. Certainly, many on the land raising animals are critical of the way animals are handled and treated in rodeo events."

"Even the Australian Veterinary Association has called for an end to calf roping, steer wrestling, mandatory attendance by a vet and unification of consistent national animal welfare laws. We listen to our vets when it comes to our own animal's welfare and wellbeing because they are experts in their field so why isn't the Minister and the rodeo operators listening to veterinary science?"

The Australian Veterinary Association's (AVA) 2023 policy on the Welfare of animals used in rodeos clearly confirms their position about rodeo practices and the need to reform the corresponding animal welfare laws, including:

- At least one veterinarian must be engaged and in attendance at all rodeos and rodeo schools.
- The AVA does not support calf rope-and-tie events.
- The AVA does not support steer wrestling events.
- The AVA only supports the use of electric prodders as a last resort where human or animal safety is at risk, and only under the direction of the attending veterinarian. Electric prodders must not be used on calves of any age.
- The AVA supports implementation of nationallyconsistent legislation for the regulation of rodeos across Australia; there must be adequate monitoring to ensure compliance with this legislation.

Dr. Robert Bay from Colorado autopsied roping calves and found haemorrhages, torn muscles, torn ligaments, damage to the trachea, damage to the throat and damage to the thyroid. These calves never get a chance to heal before they are used again. Calves in practice pens suffer even more damage. Dr. Robert Fetzner, a meat inspector processing rodeo animals found broken bones, ruptured internal organs, massive amounts of blood in the abdomen from ruptured blood vessels and damage to the ligamentum nuchae that holds the neck to the rest of the spinal column.

A more recent study co-authored by RSPCA Australia's senior scientific officer and co-author of the study, Dr Di Evans, and published in the leading international journal for animal welfare, reached similar conclusions about calf roping being a terrifying and distressing event for the animals involved throughout all stages of this cruel rodeo event. As highlighted by Ms Evans, "An animal's behavioural and emotional state is a crucial part of good animal welfare, and so it's vital to consider this as well as their physical state."

"So, if you think the brutality witnessed in rodeo events doesn't cause serious physical harm and injuries, think again. Anyone who believes this violence only occurs in the US would be naive in the extreme. It's time to end these violent and cruel spectacles permanently. Animal cruelty is a criminal matter and it's way past time that we outlawed this exempted legalised abuse against sentient beings."

ASIC sues Rex and four directors for serious governance failures

ASIC has commenced legal proceedings in the Supreme Court of NSW seeking leave to allege Regional Express Holdings Limited (administrators appointed) (Rex) engaged in misleading and deceptive conduct and contraventions of continuous disclosure obligations.

ASIC will also allege former executive chair Lim Kim Hai (Mr Lim) was involved in Rex's continuous disclosure breach and that Mr Lim, along with The Hon John Sharp AM, Lincoln Pan and Siddharth Khotkar, contravened their directors' duties. ASIC will allege Rex released a misleading ASX announcement on 28 February 2023 stating Rex was 'optimistic the Group will have positive operating profits for the full FY23 barring any further external shocks'. ASIC will

'optimistic the Group will have positive operating profits for the full FY23 barring any further external shocks'. ASIC will allege that Rex did not have a reasonable basis for that claim for a number of reasons, including because it had incurred operating losses in the financial year to date, and it did not prepare a financial forecast for FY23 before issuing the announcement.

ASIC will contend Rex breached its continuous disclosure obligations by failing to disclose a material downgrade, despite being aware when it issued the February ASX announcement that the company was unlikely to achieve an operating profit. Rex subsequently announced a downgrade on 20 June 2023 forecasting a \$35 million operating loss for the financial year ending 30 June 2023.

ASIC Chair Joe Longo said, 'Our case will allege serious governance failures at Rex. Rex's directors had a responsibility to take reasonable steps to ensure the company complied with the law and we will seek to hold them to account.

'We will allege four of Rex's directors breached their duties because they failed to take steps to ensure the market had accurate information about the company's financial performance.'

ASIC will allege Mr Lim contravened his directors' duties between 28 February 2023 and 20 June 2023 by drafting and approving the 28 February 2023 announcement and failing to take steps to prevent Rex from breaching continuous disclosure rules.

ASIC will also allege the other three directors became privy to financial information from 14 April 2023 which should have led them to take steps to ensure Rex updated the market in accordance with its continuous disclosure obligations prior to 20 June 2023.

'Continuous disclosure of market-sensitive information is fundamental to upholding the integrity of our public markets and supporting a fair and efficient financial system,' Mr Longo said.

'Directors of listed entities play a critical role in ensuring companies comply with their continuous disclosure obligations. Failing to take reasonable steps to ensure a company is compliant is not acceptable.'

ASIC seeks leave to commence the proceedings against Rex as it is in administration. While ASIC will seek a declaration of contravention against Rex, it will not seek pecuniary penalties against the company.

ASIC will seek declarations, pecuniary penalties and disqualification orders against Mr Lim, The Hon Sharp AM, Mr Pan and Mr Khotkar.

Telstra pays \$3 million penalty for Triple Zero outage

Telstra Limited (Telstra) has paid a penalty of more than \$3 million for failing to comply with emergency call rules during a technical disruption at its Triple Zero emergency call centre.

An Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) investigation found 473 breaches of the rules relating to an incident on 1 March 2024, during which Telstra's Triple Zero call centre was hampered in transferring calls to emergency services for 90 minutes. The investigation found Telstra initiated a contingency process to transfer calls received during the disruption, using a list of backup phone numbers. However, several of the phone numbers in the list were incorrect, resulting in 127 calls not being transferred to emergency services. Telstra managed those calls by providing the callers' details to the relevant emergency service organisations via email messages and phone calls.

Multi-agency operation to clamp down on illegal seafood sales this festive season

As the 2024 festive season approaches, authorities are intensifying efforts to tackle illegal seafood sales across NSW. The NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) and NSW Police have again joined forces for Operation Trident, a statewide initiative aimed at protecting consumers and ensuring the safety and sustainability of seafood.

NSW DPIRD Deputy Secretary Fisheries and Forestry, Sean Sloan, said fisheries officers will be conducting a targeted crackdown on the illegal sale of seafood, particularly during the peak holiday period. "The joint operation involves both covert and overt patrols, in order to disrupt the black-market trade, prevent oyster theft, and protect consumers from potentially unsafe or illegal produce.

"The penalties for involvement in the black-market seafood trade are severe, with fines of up to \$275,000 and possible imprisonment for both sellers and buyers."

"Oyster theft is a serious crime that NSW Police and the Rural Crime Preventation team take very seriously. We encourage the community to report any suspected thefts or illegal activity so that we can investigate and take action swiftly."

Creative workshops to benefit wellbeing for local Aboriginal youth in South Eastern NSW

Some Aboriginal high school students in South Eastern NSW have an opportunity to participate in a series of creative workshops to explore wellbeing, mental health and cultural identity.

COORDINARE - South Eastern NSW PHN has worked in collaboration with proud Yuin and Thunghutti rapper Nooky to organise the two day workshops which have been designed to help put a focus on preventative health. Nowra-born Nooky hosts Triple J's Blak Out and is behind the Indigenous social enterprise We Are Warriors. Nooky, along with 3% members, recently won two 2024 ARIA awards. Nooky acknowledges the important role that mentors, including family have played in his life and work.

COORDINARE's Aboriginal Health Consultant Taneka Longbottom said, "The creative process utilised in the workshops will aim to engage, support and empower youth to identify tools and resources that can better their health and wellbeing.

"Nooky will guide participants in creating songs to express their experiences and cultural identity through music," said Ms Longbottom.

"They'll get to record some songs and develop skills in songwriting. beatmaking, and music recording. It's all about young people feeling empowered, with greater awareness of support services and strategies for selfcare and mental health," she added.


Nooky recalls learning about Indigenous dance and culture at his primary school from two Yuin men.

"Cecil McLeod and Richard Scott-Moore taught all the Koori boys at my school how to dance and about our traditions. It instilled pride in us and gave us confidence. I felt angry about racism and injustice experienced by our People. I wanted to be a freedom fighter and realised hip hop is how I'll do that. Those mentors gave me a sense of leadership that helped me look after some of the younger kids," Nooky said.

Nooky explained how he does mentoring and workshops with 'We Are Warriors' all over the state. He makes a point of sharing with kids his experience of how teachers told him he wouldn't amount to anything, but how he has got past that and achieved so much in his life.

COORDINARE - South Eastern NSW PHN works with Aboriginal communities to address inequalities and improve health and wellbeing for communities in the South Eastern NSW region.

Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

Moruya River.

Where has the year gone, no seriously can someone tell me! It almost the middle of December, and business is starting to pick up as the festive season stream rolls up to us.

The river this week has been fishing very nicely as the water temps continue to push down the coast and into the river itself. The airport flats have been producing some nice flathead, bream and whiting, while the hole in the wall area has had the same.

Preddy's wharf will be the focus of a lot of angling pressure over the next few months, with boat boat traffic coming and going, and visiting anglers utilising the grassy banks and wharfs that are available. If you are going to be using both the wharves, please be sure to give way to incoming and outgoing boating traffic, as they do have the right to use these wharves, and have the right of way over anglers.

The quarry wharf has also been fishing well this past week, with bream trevally, flathead, tailor and the occasional mulloway being found from both the wharf itself and the the boulders just upstream of the wharf.

As tempting as it may be, please don't fish the Malabar weir, it a designated sanctuary zone and we can expect to see more compliance officers over the holiday period.

The town bridge area is a popular area for those chasing bream, flathead, trevally, whiting and estuary perch, all of which can be found around this area.

Further upstream the bass fishing continues to exceed last year, with good numbers of fat healthy fish being encountered. I had my butt handed to me last Sunday with some epic bust offs on surface frogs. I have since upgraded my braid from 8lb to 12lb as I don't like leaving lures in the fishes mouths and it can get expensive to loose hard body surface lures or spinnerbaits. **Tuross river.**

Last dark moon phase saw good numbers of prawns taken from Coila lake. With an upcoming full moon the prawning will be very average, but will start to fire back up about a week from the next dark, which is due the 31st December. New years prawns anyone? We have all your prawning requirements covered, with scoop nets, lights and drag nets all in stock.

The lake itself has been fishing incredibly well this past week, with several 1.2m + mulloway being taken on both soft plastics and baits. The flathead are also well in the mood for nearly all offerings this past week, and with a good forecast for the weekend, I expect to continue.

More whiting have shown up towards the front of the system this week, with the flats around the main boat ramp and the potato point area being prime locations to find them. Live nippers fished around the drop offs and surface lures worked quickly over the flats will account for some good fish.

Tuross has an extensive snag fishery, with the kilometres of river banks holding lots of snag where bream, and estuary perch like to call home, and not to forget the oyster rack this system is famous for!

Up in the fresh the bass fishing has picked up with increased river flows, and a reinvigorated system. Surface lures has to be your first go to, with the cicadas in full voice at the moment. Frogs, cicada or any surface lure will get a bite at the moment.

Rock and beach.

Bream, whiting, salmon and tailor are all very real options this weekend as the water temps steadily climb over the 20 deg mark. Pic a nice looking gutter, and present your chosen technique for a chance to stretch some string in the suds. The winds for the weekend look to favourable to get some sand between your toes.

Öffshore.

With the warm currents continuing to push hard down along the coast the tuna fishing should continue to fire. Snapper and flathead for those that don't want to make to journey out wide are coming over the side readily for those getting out. The reds are holding around the 50cm mark while the flathead can be found inshore around the 20m mark.

The shop continues to fill, the bait freezer has all the baits that are available to us at present, and will be restocked weekly now for the xmas period.

Musings of an ex Eurobodalla 1974 Shire President re the George Bass Marathon

It's days like today I realise how the memories of Events over 50 years ago are a wee bit hazy.

I do recall the 1st 'official' meeting in early '74 with Curly Annabelle and Peter Caruth in my Office at the old Shire Council complex where Curly put forward the idea to Peter Abbotsmith & myself. We had had a number of earlier discussions over the phone. He had already received support/ acceptance from the Far South Coast Branch of SLS and all clubs involved. They advised us the only possible time to stage such a major event was the after Christmas/ early new year when lifesaversworldwide, were most likely to be available. Curly gave us the dates, leg information, event structure and local support contacts. They were pretty advanced in their planning and seeking Shire Support both in cash and kind...which was forthcoming.

I think all involved realised the massive potential such an imaginative event would have both on world surf lifesaving and the George Bass Strip. Council adopted the request unanimously and even named our 'new' major coastal link road George Bass Drive in honour of both the feats of man himself and the forthcoming race. Shire support was based on the fact that the 'benefits' would flow right through the Shire. The start and the official briefing in Batemans Bay, beach finishes and starts at Moruya, Tuross and Narooma, official presentations nights and social events in Moruya, Tuross and Narooma plus the major camps set up in the Moruya School grounds. The spend just on fuel, food and beverages would benefit the whole Shire. Not to mention the spectacle it provided our many visitors at this peak holiday period from one end of the Shire to the other. Winners all round.

I invited the Premier of NSW Tom Lewis, to Officially start the race at Corrigan Beach- he accepted realising the ongoing potential of such a challenge.

We soon knew we had a winner when nominations came in from all around Australia and, then, international teams.

The 1st official meeting of all the team captains and officials was held in the private bar at the back of our motel in Batehaven. I can, because some cad opened the most expensive bottle I had on display.....a unique magnum of beer presented to Helen and I in Sale, Victoria years before and valued, then, at over \$1000. If anything, we underestimated the media interest and I vividly recall choppers in the sky and a massive flotilla of power boats, Yachts and paddlers as Premier Lewis fired the shotgun....and every headland, beach and vantage point from Corrigan's out to Tollgate Islands then out to sea and down the coast to Moruya Beach and SLSC were packed with interested spectators.

We instantly knew we were on a winner. I Remember the eyes of most crews rolling at the sight of Cronulla's & Point Lonsdale's sliding seats...and the ridicule. That soon stopped as the blisters on bums became bigger and bigger on those who didn't have 'em. Next race they all had them.

I remember we were all gobsmacked at the speed of the race and the energy put in - it was relentless from start to finish....and that never stopped the whole way. The early leg times were well under our expectations...and southerlies became the enemy.

I also remember the National and International news coverage of the helicopter footage taken that day above the crew changes at sea, off Mossy Point, showing the team rubber duckies dropping the fresh rowers in the briny in front of the race then the rowers about to be relieved falling out of the surfboats as they glided forward pulling the new rowers inand the pictures of the huge shark under them all. WOW...did that get us some international coverage ON DAY 1! ...and it improved the guick times of the crew changes immediately. And I recall the team physios working late nights on the sore backs and legs as we went further south with the 1st aiders and medicos coping with the blisters, cuts, bumps and bruises on those tired bodies.

The many presentation nights at Moruya, Tuross, Narooma, Bermagui, Tathra and Merimbula/ Pambula we're wonderful...and who will forget the Portsea team turning up at the Tathra Country Club in their magnificent event uniforms only to be knocked back by an overzealous doorman 'No Collar - No Entry.' And they retuned in women's clothes and he had to let them in..... brilliant thinking. I still have clear pictures in my mind standing on the Point at Eden watching the Bulli crew row into the rocks in a fairly big swell, attempting to gain a short cut advantage through to the finish. Heart in mouth stuff. And, yes, I do recall the bare bum at the Top of the very high Pine tree at Boyd Town as the crews celebrate an almighty achievement.

But- most of all, I remember the pride and sense of achievement experienced by EVERY rower and sweep at the thought of what they had just accomplished....and that never changed over the years. It made many valuable adults out of keen kids.

As the years went on the media interest grew, the Navy were sending ships to join us travelling south - even the tall ships, the Kiwis took us to task...as did teams from as far away as Holland and the UK. The ladies and Veterans crews joined in as did the paddlers. Many stories became legends. The media interest grew and we witnessed some amazing feats along the way...none more heart stopping than the day Bert Hunt jumped into the ocean off the referees boat off Coila Beach, swam to the unmanned Surfboat in those huge seas and singlehandedly guided that Surfboat through the rocks and safely onto the beach as the whole crew were being successful rescued by the safety boats on hand. That still brings tears to my eyes.

What most people didn't know was the unbelievable effort put in behind the scenes by all the offsiders and race officials for many months leading up to each race plus all the work put in by the individual SLS clubs and councils along the race strip itself. Just the ongoing task of special George Bass race rules and regulations was a mammoth task in itself.

BUT... It was all worth it. I was privileged to meet, over the years, some of the most amazing and impressive human beings that walk the earth. The Likes Of Curly Annabel and his family, Nick Dixon a key cog in gaining SLSA approval, early race medico Kerry McKee who handed over to Dr Chris Fenn and nurse wife Joy, the Navy contingent led by Commander Rod Harris, our many great sponsors and media teams, Al Armstrong and more recently Gary Cairns plus all those who donated their boats, skills and time plus...of course, the real heroesthe teams themselves- sweeps, rowers and support crew and your long serving officials....many of whom are no longer with us, and so many who gave so much. Let's hope this 50-anniversary event will see the key people whose crazy idea this was like Curly Annabel, Nick Dixon, Al Armstrong and others properly remembered as this is their amazing part of history.
