Response to Mr Ryan's Letter

Member for Bega Dr Michael Holland has responded to a letter from Peter Ryan from the 'Don't Close the Batemans Bay ED' printed in the recent edition of the Moruya Mail (20.12.24).

Dear Mr Ryan

Thank you for your correspondence regarding the Don't Close Batemans Bay Hospital Emergency Department petition.

The petition was presented to the Clerk of the NSW Legislative Assembly by Mr Mark Speakman on 9th May 2024.

A written response was provided to the Clerk of the NSW Legislative Assembly by the Honourable Ryan Park MP, Minister for Health, and Minister for Regional Health on 12th June 2024.

I attach a copy of the Minister's response. SEE <https://moruyamail.com.au/response-to-dont-close-the-batemans-bay-ed/>

The petition was debated in the NSW Legislative Assembly on 20th June 2024 and the petition was noted.

The Minister's response clearly explains the current situation with the development of the new level 4 Eurobodalla Regional Hospital, the provision of the \$20 million Eurobodalla Community Health Centre, and the Batemans Bay Urgent Care Clinic.

You will be pleased to know that bulk site excavations and concrete footings have been completed on the site of the new \$330 million level 4 Eurobodalla Regional Hospital in preparation for laying of the first concrete slab. This indicates excellent progress towards the opening of the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital in 2027.

Equally, the Batemans Bay Urgent Care Clinic has seen over 10,000 patients in the 12 months since opening. The Clinic will be operating extended hours over the 2024-2025 holiday period.

Fiona Phillips MP, Member for Gilmore, has also commenced a petition to the Federal Government for continued extended hours of operation and an increased level of service capability at the Batemans Bay Urgent Care Clinic.

I am sorry that you have not received a copy of the petition response, however, as you elected to present the petition to Mr Speakman, I believe that he carried the responsibility to follow this through on your behalf.

Finally, as they are not Parliamentary bills, petitions are not provided to the NSW Legislative Council for consideration.

I encourage you to consult the Parliament of NSW website at <https://www.parliament.nsw.gov.au> for further information regarding Parliamentary processes.

I have attended several community health service consultation sessions with representatives of SNSWLHD. These will continue at further locations in the New Year. I look forward to continuing to engage with the constituents of the Eurobodalla, including the Batemans Bay residents, regarding further health developments in the Eurobodalla."

Clarification Regarding Mitre 10 Stores in Narooma

Our family company, Tancred & Constable Pty Ltd, has proudly operated as a franchisee of the Mitre10 banner in Narooma since 1998, trading as Mitre10 Narooma. Over the years, we have consistently supported and promoted the Mitre10 brand with pride, always striving to deliver excellent service to our local community. We are deeply grateful for the ongoing support of our valued customers.

Two years ago, our franchisor, Metcash Limited (which acquired the Mitre10 and True Value franchises in 2016), purchased the Narooma Home Timber & Hardware business located on Glasshouse Rocks Road in Narooma from another local family. This business is now a corporately owned and operated store by the Metcash Hardware Division.

The Independent Hardware Group (IHG) is the subsidiary of Metcash that administers the franchises for the Mitre10 brand in Australia.

Recently, IHG rebranded their Glasshouse Rocks Road store under the Mitre10 name. This change has understandably caused some confusion within the local community, as it now means there are two Mitre10 stores in a town of only 4,000 residents.

To address any misunderstandings, we want to clarify that Tancred & Constable Pty Ltd (trading as Mitre10 Narooma) has no ownership or affiliation with the corporately owned store on Glasshouse Rocks Road. We remain an independent franchisee, and our business operates separately under the Mitre10 brand from that of the corporate store.

This situation has added to the challenges we face as we continue to trade from temporary premises, over four and a half years after our original Main Street Store was damaged by fire.

It's worth noting that Metcash Hardware Division also owns and operates corporate Mitre10 bannered stores in other locations, including Bega, Merimbula, Pambula, and Eden to the south.

We hope this clears up any confusion, and we sincerely thank the Narooma community for their continued support.

National parks welcomes back visitors to Pigeon House Mountain

The much-loved Pigeon House Mountain Didthul walking track in Morton National Park has reopened to the public following a four-month closure, allowing visitors to once again experience this culturally and environmentally significant landscape.

The walking track had suffered extensive damage due to heavy rainfall, requiring restoration work to stabilise the degraded trail surface and surrounding infrastructure near the summit of the walk. Works consisted of the construction and replacement of 946 hardwood stairs and drainage bars, constructed with imported crushed stone, as well as rehabilitation of disturbed areas adjacent to the track with brush matting and timber debris.

Due to the remote location of the site, 200 individual helicopter lifts were used to transport materials in and out of the work site.

Repair works were undertaken by local Aboriginal owned construction company South Coast Contracting and Hire Pty Ltd, in collaboration with the Ulladulla Local Aboriginal Land Council.

Local NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) staff will continue to implement a quarterly maintenance program, to make sure the track remains safe.

These works were funded by the NSW Government Flood Recovery Program.

Shoalhaven Area Manager Michael Phelan said "NPWS is excited to welcome the community back to the incredible Pigeon House Mountain Didthul walking track and would like to thank everyone for their patience over the past four months while these essential works were done.

"These works have lifted the bar on an already impressive walk and would not be possible without the commitment of all workers involved, who had to complete the 5km return walk every day to get this work done.

"The improvements are the perfect balance between preserving the site's environmental and cultural integrity, while ensuring safe access for visitors to enjoy for years to come."

New bridges improve bushfire response on the South Coast

Minister for Agriculture and Regional NSW Tara Moriarty has officially opened a new bridge, north-west of Batemans Bay that will serve as an important piece of infrastructure for bushfire response and containment on the South Coast. The Lyons Road Bridge in Currowan State Forest has recently been completed by Forestry Corporation replacing an old timber structure that was damaged by flooding. The \$835,000 Lyons Road Bridge spans 24 metres and crosses Currowan Creek near Nelligen.

The bridge replacement has been funded by the NSW Government under the \$60-million Forest Infrastructure Repair Program (FIRP), which has upgraded 160 weather damaged bridges, roads, culverts and water crossings in NSW State forests.

The upgrade to the Lyons Road Bridge is part the largest infrastructure program rolled out across NSW State forests, which has seen 35 major bridges replaced, 20 landslips repaired, 2,376km of State Forest roads fixed, 12 quarries expanded and 97 water crossings repaired.

The \$1.3 million Western Distributor Road Bridge, spanning 39-metres over the Bimberamala River, has also been completed in Yadboro State Forest.

A new bridge has also been installed by Forestry Corporation over Native Dog Creek on Clyde Ridge Road and repairs have been carried out on a bridge crossing Carters Creek. Collectively, the four bridge projects and road upgrades in the Clyde River catchment will significantly improve the response times of fire crews responding to bushfires to the west and north of Batemans Bay.

Forestry Corporation maintains a 60,000-kilometre road and fire trail network that complements the public road network and provides access for community use, forest management and fire protection.

After years of significant weather damage, a statewide audit found more than half of the State forest road network was located in areas that were heavily impacted by flooding.

These weather events damaged between 10,000 and 50,000 kilometres of forest roads and this prompted the NSW Government to provide \$60 million in funding spread over three years to restore vehicle access for the wider community and forestry crews."

Minister for Agriculture and Minister for Regional NSW Tara Moriarty said "Fixing these bridges, roads and fire trails through State Forests is a major priority for the Government.

"Making sure vehicles can get in and out of State Forests isn't just about moving timber, it's about ensuring emergency services can get to fires, it's about providing the community with access to some of the state's best swimming and camping spots and it's about protecting one of the state's most valuable resources.

"The Forestry Corporation infrastructure projects across the state have generated vital investment and employment in regional communities with an emphasis placed on contracting local companies, suppliers and workers to complete these projects." Forestry Corporation Regional Manager Southern Trent Froud said "From a bushfire management perspective, Lyons Road and the Western Distributor Road are critical strategic fire access points between the National Parks and State forests to the north of Batemans Bay."

"Under FIRP, Forestry Corporation has prioritised repairs to roads and fire trails, which are crucial to bushfire management and control.

"Western Distributor Road will become a major containment line for fires burning from the west running all the way through from Ulladulla to Batemans Bay."

"The bridge and road upgrades recently completed on the South Coast will cut the response times of our fire crews as they respond to fires in the forest estate and work to protect local communities from bushfire."

Indexation fails to meet needs amid escalating crisis

The Federal Government must urgently lift income support payments as cost of living pressures are expected to take centre stage in the next budget and 2025 federal election.

Today's routine indexation of income support payments is grossly inadequate, leaving millions unable to afford basic essentials. Youth Allowance for a single person living away from home is only going up by \$1.70 a day. This lifts Youth Allowance and Austudy to a mere \$47 a day, which is 36% of the minimum wage.

Some income support payments including Youth Allowance and Austudy are adjusted for inflation on January 1 each year.

"Indexation alone is not enough. An extra \$1.70 a day wouldn't even cover a loaf of bread. People on income support are being left further behind while costs of rent, food and essentials are spiralling out of control and driving people on income support payments deeper into poverty," said ACOSS CEO Dr Cassandra Goldie.

"Parents are skipping meals to ensure their children can eat, people are forgoing essential medications, and many are losing hope. In a wealthy country like ours, this is a national shame.

"These indexation adjustments barely scratch the surface and the current rates are completely out of step with basic living costs."

ACOSS is also calling for Youth Allowance and Austudy to be indexed every six months, like JobSeeker and pensions.

"Young people are forced to wait 12 months before seeing an indexation increase in their payments - by the time it comes they may no longer be eligible for student payments and miss out on income that should have helped keep their heads above water during their studies," Dr Goldie said.

"A system that leaves students living in poverty is setting them up to fail before they even start."

Dr Goldie said the rate of income support must be lifted to at least \$82 a day, in line with the Age Pension.

"The way to end poverty is simple: raise the rate. Anything less is a choice to keep people hungry, sick and struggling," she said.

\$900,000 to upgrade health facilities in Southern NSW

Southern NSW communities will benefit from a \$900,000 funding boost from the NSW Government to upgrade hospitals and health facilities in the region.

The investment is part of the Minns Labor Government's \$12 million Regional Health Minor Works Program which includes 61 projects across the state.

Projects in Southern NSW Local Health District include:

- \$345,000 to upgrade the Anaesthesia Delivery Systems at Queanbeyan District Hospital to assist clinicians in compiling coordinated information on patient health.
- \$245,000 for a new Laparoscopic Stack, a critical tool for laparoscopic surgeries, at Moruya Hospital
- \$120,000 for five new Slit Lamp Ophthalmoscopes for eye examinations in Batemans Bay, Braidwood, Cooma, Queanbeyan and Moruya District Hospitals.
- \$190,000 for 12 new Bladder Scanners for diagnosing, managing and treating urinary outflow dysfunction.

Minister for Regional Health, Ryan Park said "The Minns Labor Government is committed to investing in upgrading health facilities to support better health outcomes for rural and regional communities.

"The Rural Minor Works Program will allow Southern NSW Local Health District to upgrade equipment and health facilities to enhance the working environment for health staff and improve patient experiences.

"The Program is one of a number of investments the Minns Labor Government is making to strengthen rural and regional health services, so people have access to the best possible care close to home."

Member for Bega, Dr Michael Holland said: "This new equipment will directly benefit thousands of patients across Southern NSW, ensuring local community members have access to the best care and facilities. By providing this new and upgraded equipment, the health professionals in the Bega electorate will be enabled to provide the highest standard of medical and nursing care. Equity of rural and regional communities is being supported by this investment in our health facilities"

Upgrade for largest firefighting helicopter



The NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) has been preparing for summer with upgrades to Australia's largest firefighting helicopter, including increased water-holding capacity and new night-time capabilities.

The CH-47 Chinook helicopter can now hold 11,000 litres of water in an internal tank, making it an even better asset in firefighting efforts.

With the tank upgrade, the helicopter can fill faster, deploy more effectively, and conduct night-time operations when fire intensity is typically lower. Previously, the Chinook had a bucket that made it too dangerous to be used at night-time or over densely populated areas.

Added to the RFS aerial fleet last year, the Chinook has been instrumental in firefighting efforts in NSW and is one of only a few Chinook helicopters in use for firefighting activity globally, with the heavy transport helicopter mostly used by defence forces.

NSW has the most aerial firefighting aircraft of any state and territory in Australia. In addition to the Chinook, the fleet this season includes the Boeing 737 Large Air Tanker 'Marie Bashir', two Cessna Citations, one King Air fixed-wing aircraft and six Bell 412 helicopters.

The new tank was fitted out locally and is a permanent solution that replaces a temporary 10,000-litre bucket. It allows the Chinook to carry the largest water payload of any firefighting helicopter in Australia and second only to the 'Marie Bashir' in the RFS fleet.

This expanded capability builds on the RFS's strategic partnership with the Royal Australian Air Force, with the aircraft operating out of RAAF Base Richmond.

Operating from bases across the state, including Richmond, Dubbo, Coffs Harbour and Cooma, the RFS fleet is further supported by more than 200 additional aircraft available on an as-needed basis through the National Aerial Firefighting Centre (NAFC) and other agreements.

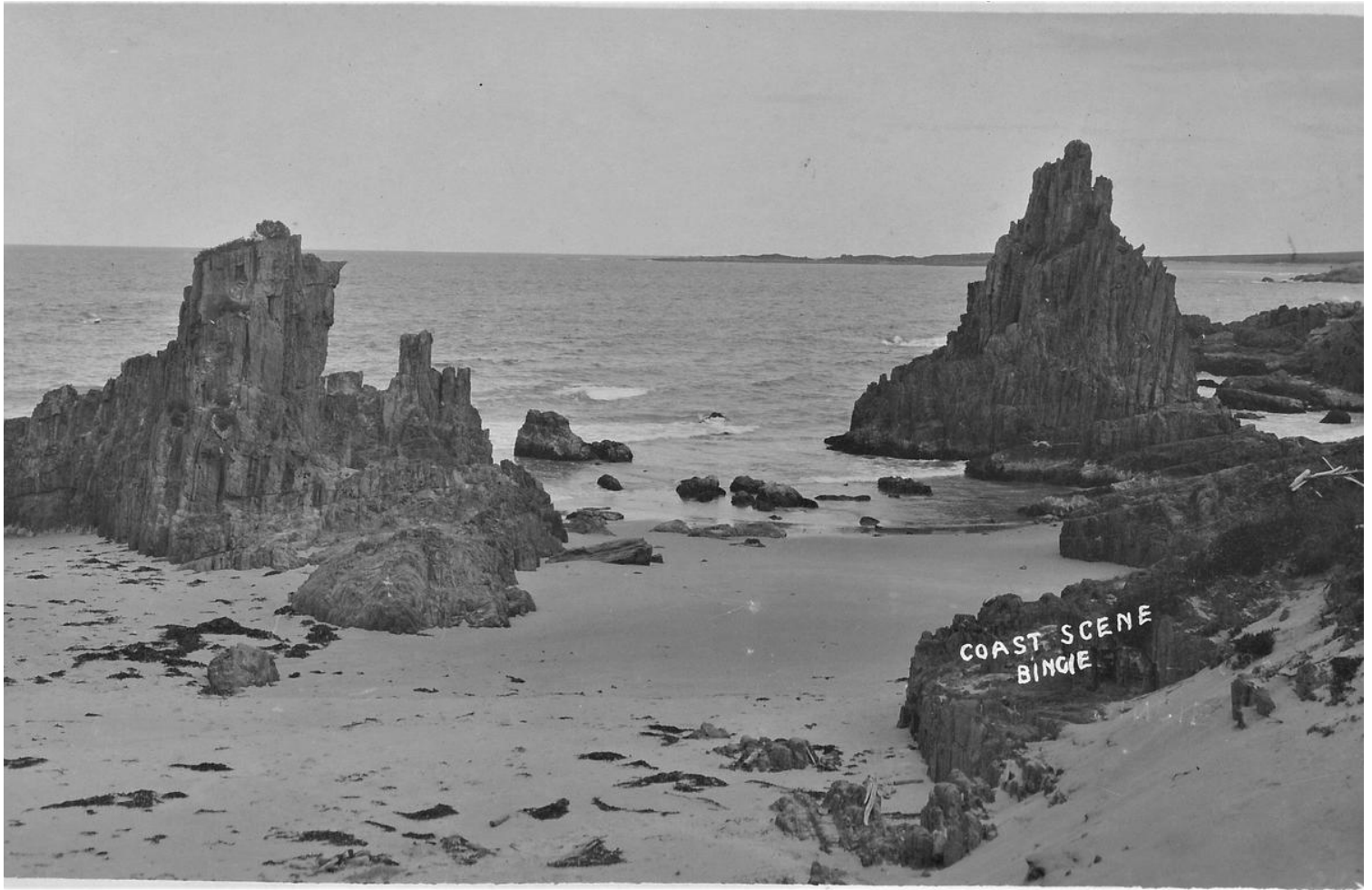

100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society



Bingie Postcard

03-01-1925

Through the recent heavy rains, the **Congo Creek** mouth has opened.

An old age pensioner named **Thomas Newman** dropped dead at Nelligen yesterday (Friday) morning. **Moruya** distinguished herself last week-end by recording the heaviest fall of rain for the State – 264 points.

The pupils of Dwyer's Creek Public School presented their popular teacher with a wallet prior to the Xmas vacation.

On Tuesday evening six visitors from Goulburn made a splendid catch on Cowrie Beach, Moruya Heads, by landing 120 lovely bream.

Many of our visitors express astonishment at the neglected state of our foot-paths, fences and the general appearance of a town with the potentialities that Moruya possesses.

The services of Mr. A. H. Preddey have been retained to assist in erecting the machinery for Belimbla Gold Mine. Mr. Preddey expects the work will take about three weeks to complete.

Through a cow, which was being chased by a dog, rushing out of a yard in Queen St. on Wednesday, young **Sylvie Rootsey** was knocked off his bike and injured. The boy's arm was pierced by the cow's horn and he was otherwise much bruised about the body.

Last week a party, while walking along Bingie Beach,

If found kind friend please report, as we will be looking out for news. Steamer, Loch Rannock, under full sail off Port Phillip Head. Goodbye."

Bodalla Picnic Race Club's race meeting took place on Boxing Day. The weather was doubtful until afternoon, when a drizzling rain set in and made matters unpleasant. The attendance was a record for Bodalla, the gate takings amounting to just on £80. ... Acceptances were very good, no fewer than three races having to be decided in divisions. The track, owing to the growth of young grass, and clover, and the rain on the hard ground underneath, was very slippery, and three horses came down, fortunately without serious injury. The usual ball was held in the Bodalla Hall at night and, considering the weather, was well attended.

STORMS, FLOOD RESCUES KEEP NSW SES VOLUNTEERS BUSY IN 2024

NSW State Emergency Service (SES) members answered the call for help more than 31,000 times across the state this year, and completed 430 flood rescues during severe weather events.

NSW SES Commissioner, Mike Wassing AFSM said the busiest month for NSW SES members in 2024 was April, when more than 11,000 incidents were recorded as severe weather and flooding impacted much of the east coast.

“In one day alone on April 6, our members responded to 2,348 incidents and completed 176 successful flood rescues,” Commissioner Wassing said.

“That’s an astounding effort, and I thank each and every NSW SES member who answers the call for help alongside their community.”

The busiest unit in the state was the NSW SES Wyong Unit, where members responded 1100 jobs. Meanwhile, the NSW SES Hawkesbury Unit completed 163 rescues, including 58 road crash rescues.

Outside their core business of flood and storm response, SES members also assisted in more than 280 searches and supported partner emergency service agencies 1200 times during bushfires and at crime scenes.

Minister for Emergency Services, Jihad Dib thanked NSW SES volunteers for their continuous efforts throughout severe weather and flooding in 2024.

“NSW SES volunteers continue to go above and beyond for their communities, and I thank them for the work they’ve done throughout the year during floods and storms,” Minister Dib said.

“While the warmer months typically bring sunshine and clear skies, we are in Storm Season which brings an increased chance of severe thunderstorms which can cause significant storm damage and flash flooding.

“I encourage the people of NSW, and visitors to our state, to stay across the latest warnings and information on the Hazards Near Me app and know their risk these holidays.”

Commissioner Wassing said 2024 had been a year of growth for the SES, with more than 11,200 active volunteers continuing to upskill in a range of capabilities, including flood rescue.

“Not only have NSW SES members been busy responding to unfolding emergency incidents, more than 520 have undertaken specialist flood rescue training,” he said.

“SES trainers have considerable experience in boat operations and flood rescue, and they’ve also trained over 200 personnel from emergency services outside of the Service.”

While NSW SES members are responding to calls for assistance daily, many have also dedicated time and effort to helping the community understand their risk and prepare before storms and floods.

Commissioner Wassing said over 1200 community events were coordinated by NSW SES members this year, educating the community and engaging with the people of NSW to inform them of their risks and how they can help themselves and their families before, during and after natural disasters.

“SES volunteers have attended the Royal Easter Show to spread safety messaging, coordinated community Playdates on the South Coast to help children and families engage with emergency service personnel after the bushfires, and undertaken World Tsunami Day awareness,” he said.

“They are part of their communities, helping day-in-day-out to ensure the best outcome in an emergency.”

Warning as counterfeit cash circulating on the South Coast

Police are warning members of the public to be on alert after counterfeit cash has been reported being handed to businesses on the South Coast.

Officers attached to South Coast Police District were alerted after counterfeit \$50 dollar notes were handed to businesses at Merimbula and Eden Wednesday night (1 January 2025).

Officers have taken the notes and inquiries are now underway. Police advise that these particular notes were identified as being counterfeit as the transparent panel was faulty.

Tips from NSW Police to spot a counterfeit note include,

- Feel the note – a genuine note is printed on special plastic polymer and is difficult to tear
- Hold the note to the light and look for the Australian Coat of Arms. This is generally located to the left of the clear window, or denomination numeral when looking at the front of the note.
- Feel for slightly raised printing on the main design of the note
- Look for the seven pointed star inside a circle
- Compare the background printing - look for any distortions or less clearly defined patterns.
- Check that the note has a clear window and that it has a clear printed image: \$50 has the Southern Cross and the \$100 has the lyrebird.
- If possible, look under a UV light to locate the serial numbers

Their propaganda machine, Hollywood, churns out endless repeats of a modernised Christian fantasy, a messianic cast of Superman and his Marvel compatriots fighting 'evil' in the entire universe.

Thus the continued existence of a Roman Catholic Church when thousands upon thousands of its priests in nations around the world raped and degraded the children in their care. And no one rose up to demand its demise.

Planning changes to speed up 'Meanwhile Use' accommodation

More crisis and temporary accommodation will be accessible under the **NSW Government** with recent changes to planning controls introduced on 16 December 2024.

Exempt and complying development pathways will be made available to organisations, providers and Government agencies that manage social and affordable housing to permit the use of certain homes as temporary accommodation.

Current planning controls often require a Development Application (DA) to allow the change of one existing land use to another, which means that vacant residential properties that could be utilised for crisis and temporary housing before they are repurposed or redeveloped, often sit empty for years.

Without the need for a DA, vacant buildings could be repurposed for temporary or crisis accommodation for those in need more quickly.

The need for emergency housing has grown in recent years and can include housing for women and children trying to leave a violent home but not having a safer option to go to, a sudden or unexpected change in a person's circumstances or members of the community facing homelessness.

Temporary accommodation can offer people a safe home while they receive the support they need before finding a more permanent home.

These planning changes follow the Minns Labor Government's historic \$5.1 billion investment in public housing in the recent budget and extensive planning reforms to deliver more homes and improve housing affordability.

Dr Michael Holland, Member for Bega said: "In the Bega Electorate, there is a pressing need for more crisis accommodation and temporary accommodation to support those in urgent need."

"The changes introduced by the Minns Labor Government will make it easier for organisations, service providers, and government agencies involved in social and affordable housing to use certain vacant residential properties as temporary or crisis accommodation."

MOU with South East Arts endorsed by Councils

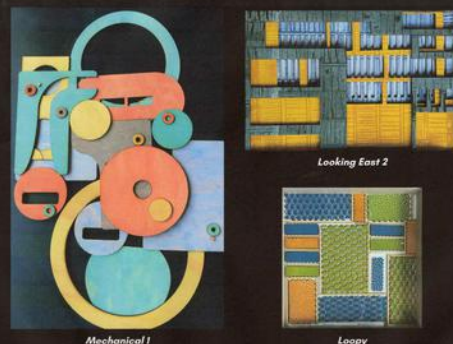

New Year, New Standard: turning point for cleaner, cheaper driving

Electric Vehicle Council

The New Year heralds a significant step forward in Australia’s transition to cleaner, cheaper-to-run cars with the introduction of the New Vehicle Efficiency Standard (NVES), according to the Electric Vehicle Council.

Starting from 1 January 2025, the NVES will bring a wider range of EVs and fuel-efficient petrol, diesel and hybrid vehicles to Australian roads, as manufacturers are incentivised to offer their most efficient cars.

Electric Vehicle Council, Head of Legal, Policy and Advocacy, Aman Gaur said: “The New Year ushers in new standards for new cars in Australia. From today, Australia officially moves away from being the world’s dumping ground for outdated, high-emissions vehicles, and demands a greater range of cleaner, cheaper-to-run cars, vans and utes that are offered in the US and Europe.

“The New Vehicle Efficiency Standard means Australia has a chance to finally catch up to other countries in the adoption of cleaner, more efficient cars including EVs. The NVES will lower our fuel bills, offer a wider choice of the latest, most fuel-efficient cars, and improve the air we breathe by reducing emissions.

“The NVES is expected to accelerate Australia’s growing interest in electric vehicles. 2024 was a record-breaking year for EVs in Australia with more than 100,000 new battery electric and plug-in hybrid electric vehicles sold, while car manufacturers brought in and announced plans for more low and zero-emissions models. With more choice and competitive pricing, EV uptake is set to grow further in Australia.

“The first six months of the NVES is a period where the industry can adapt to the new standards and systems before the credit and penalty scheme is enforced from mid-year. It gives manufacturers more time to refine their strategies to bring in more low and zero-emissions vehicles and meet rising consumer demand. It’s also a period for the government and regulator to further educate the sector and test their systems. “The New Vehicle Efficiency Standard is a crucial reform that will help Australians lower their driving costs and car emissions, as fuel prices rise and awareness of the health and environmental impacts of vehicle emissions grows.” More information about the NVES can be found [here](#).

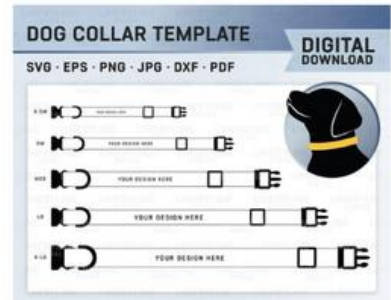

Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

Moruya River.

Happy New Year to all our loyal and regular readers and customers, we hope you all had an awesome and safe Xmas and new years period.

We had a great response to the Mega Giveaway competition, with 267 of you entering into the draw. Thank you to all of who took the time to enter. We have had word from head office that the competition will be drawn at 11:30am Monday 6th January at head office and the results will be posted for you all to see by 12pm on Tuesday 7th of January. This will allow time, for all proper conditions to be met that are required of a draw of this magnitude. I know a lot of you are keen to to hear who has won, so are we. Stay tuned, you have a 1 in 267 chance of winning. Now, back to our regular report.

The river continues to fish very well, with a multitude of species being caught all up and down the system this week. Along the lower section of the river, the airport flats has had good numbers of bream, whiting and flathead this week, with the spur wall being quite popular both for anglers and fish alike.

The Preddy's wharf area also continues to hold good numbers of fish for visiting anglers, with the wharf area and the back of the hole in wall area all fishing well.

Quarry wharf and upstream to the town bridge have all been holding the usual suspects, with bream, flathead, Luderick tailor trevally, whiting and mulloway all being available to catch.

Don't overlook the boulders that sit in front of the hospital, as these hold many fish at all stages of the tide.

Up in the fresh, the bass anglers continue to do well, with most surface presentations seeing interest from hungry bass. The river level will be starting to drop again, as we haven't seen any significant rains, so a bit of travelling may well be required to find in pressured fish.

Tuross River.

Coila lake continues to produce very good numbers of prawns for local and visiting fishos chasing a tasty feed of south coast prawns. The southerly change 2 days ago did slow the run down with the water conditions stirred up enough to make seeing prawns all but impossible. With the winds easing now, and a forecast warm weekend, we can expect both the anglers and the prawns to be running hot again. Please, DO NOT light fires on the lake foreshore to cook up you catch!! The local fire brigade are getting tired of putting them out. Not to mention the fines associated for doing so, if you are caught.

The Tuross lake system itself continues to produce all the usual summer species it is famous for. With bream, flathead, whiting, Luderick, Trevally, estuary perch and mulloway all being reported this past week. Tuross is a big system, and there is a lot of real estate to fish, from the flats to the main river channel, all of the side arms, and the myriad of oyster racks, the system is an anglers paradise.

You just need to get out and explore it to find what interests you.

Rock and Beach.

Salmon, bream, whiting and flathead have all been regularly reported from those fishing the extensive pristine coastline we have on offer. Store Junior Sam, yet again managed a few nice fish last night, with his first popper caught whiting being landed quickly followed up by a popper caught flathead.

The Moruya Breakwall is an ever popular bit of coastal structure the attracts both fish and fishermen alike. Please take your rubbish out with you, if you fish any of these areas, we as local get tired of cleaning up after dirty anglers that think it's ok to leave trash laying around.

Offshore.

The winds and sea state have kept plenty of boaters on dry land to date, but with a warm to hot weekend forecast, we can expect the boat ramps to be busy. Take the time to read the post I put up on ramp etiquette, it will make yours and everyone else days a bit easier.

Snapper have mostly been sitting in the 50-60m mark, with the flathead in closer around the 20-30m marks.

With the warm currents now pushing all the way down past Eden, the tuna and Marlin bite should be in full swing for those wanting to get onto a fish of a lifetime.

The bait freezer has been restocked, with an emergency top done yesterday by Tweed Bait, another top up will be done early Tuesday morning again, as we are expecting to sell plenty of bait this weekend.

The shop is looking a little worse for wear, stock wise, with some rod combo already out of stock, after a great xmas trade period. It will be a week before we can put any orders in for any of our suppliers, as they are still closed till next week. But a restock will be coming.

Thank you again from myself, Graham and Gaye, for all of you have chosen to pick a small locally owned store to shop at, we appreciate your support. We look forward to a good year of trade with you all as well.

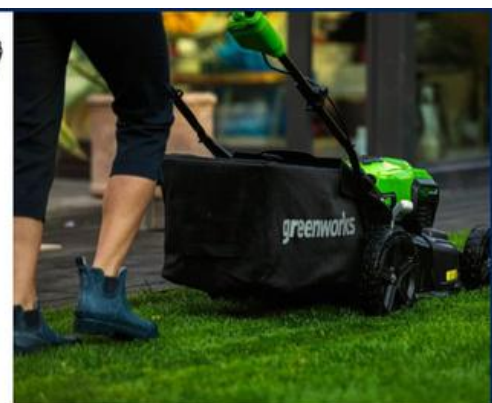
