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Two charged following break and enter on the South Coast - Operation Regional Mongoose

Police have charged a woman and teenager following an alleged break and enter on the South Coast, as part of Operation Regional Mongoose.

Operation Regional Mongoose is a high-visibility police operation to tackle serious property-related crime, committed predominately by young offenders.

About 1am on Wednesday 8 January 2025, police were called to a home on Martin Close, Broulee, following reports of a break and enter.

Officers attached to South Coast Police District were told two people allegedly entered the home and stole a handbag containing car keys, before entering the garage and driving away in a vehicle.

While attempting to exit the garage, the vehicle allegedly crashed into a cement pillar and another car parked nearby.

The occupants of the home heard the disturbance and called tripled zero.

About 2am the same day, police were patrolling the Princes Highway, at North Batemans Bay, when they spotted the allegedly stolen vehicle travelling northbound.

A short time later, the vehicle was located Lincoln Crescent, where the driver allegedly ran from the vehicle. The passenger, a 44-year-old woman, was arrested and taken to Batemans Bay, where she was charged with be carried in conveyance taken without consent of owner, possess housebreaking implements, good in personal custody suspected being stolen.

She was granted conditional bail to appear in Batemans Bay Local Court on Monday 20 January 2025.

Following extensive inquiries, about 2.20pm on Friday 10 January 2025, police executed as search warrant at a home in Moruya.

During the search, police allegedly located and seized mobile phone devices, a replica pistol, and cannabis. A 17-year-old man was arrested and taken to Batemans Bay Police Station, where he was charged with aggravated break and enter & commit serious indictable offencepeople there, take & drive conveyance without consent of owner, receive/dispose stolen property- minor indictable offence less than or equal to \$5000 and unlicensed for Class, Class C, R, LR or MR. The teen appeared before a children's court on Saturday (11 January 2025) and was granted conditional bail to reappear at a children's court on Friday 17 January 2025.

Expressions of Interest for the Volunteer Grants program 2024-25 are now open

Volunteer Grants recognise the valuable role volunteers play in building more resilient and cohesive communities. Grants of between \$1000 and \$5000 are available to help community organisations to support their volunteers.

This year, changes have been made to the Volunteer Grants program to better respond to the environment volunteer organisations are now faced with and our government's commitment to children and young people.

There are now two categories for Volunteer Grants which reflect areas of high demand for volunteer organisations:

- Category 1: for communications and IT items (such as laptops, phones, payment devices and software) or insurance items that will benefit any of a community organisation's volunteers.
- Category 2: for items and services that support the development and well-being of children and young people under 18.

These changes mean Volunteer Grant funding will be more targeted to where it is needed most. The 2024–25 Volunteer Grants Opportunity is open for expressions of interest through Federal Members of Parliament (MP). Interested organisations should read the Grant Opportunity Guidelines and contact their local Federal MP for details on how to submit an expression of interest. Council careers start here

It's no overseas gap-year adventure but may well be the next best thing. **Eurobodalla Council** are offering a range of on-the-job opportunities for young locals through its youth employment training scheme. This year's offering is four two-year traineeships for people under 21, with two different rotations to choose from: public relations and property services, or finance and information technology. Both rotations focus on strong business and administration skills including customer service, record maintenance, data analysis, project management, and computer skills.

Working for Council is a great way for school leavers to gain valuable workplace experience, earning between \$1,300 and \$1790 each fortnight, while studying for a Certificate III Business in the first year and Certificate IV Business in the second. All without needing to leave the shire.

Trainees develop valuable skills, setting themselves up for future employment, either with Council or in other government or business sectors. The traineeships also work as an alternative ticket into university, with ATAR equivalency.

Applications open on Monday 20 January and close on Monday 3 February 2025. To help people with their applications the Job Shop are offering two information sessions. The first is an <u>in-person event at Moruya on</u> <u>Tuesday 21 January from 3-4pm</u>. The second is an <u>online event on Thursday 23 January from 5.30-6.30pm</u>. 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Milton Ulladulla Bypass progresses to next stage

Work on the Milton Ulladulla bypass continues to progress through the planning stages with important Secretary Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs) being issued to Transport for NSW.

The \$940 million project is being jointly funded with \$752 million committed from the Albanese Labor Government and \$188 million from the Minns Labor Government.

The SEARs are a pivotal part of the planning process, providing Transport with specific instructions on what issues need to be addressed in the project's Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) which forms a key part of the development application process. Transport for NSW has recently awarded a contract to Aurecon Australasia Pty Ltd to carry out the concept design and environmental assessment for the bypass.

Now the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure (DPHI) has issued SEARs, this work will include preparing the EIS.

After years of delays from the previous Liberal-National Government, the project is now progressing under the Albanese and Minns Labor governments meaning the local Shoalhaven and wider south coast community is a step closer to seeing the project come to life.

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips said "The Milton Ulladulla bypass will transform our region and I'm pleased we're getting on with the job of delivering it.

"This planning work is a vital part of ensuring we get construction-ready and I look forward to seeing the completed EIS and concept design."Member for South Coast Liza Butler said "I am thrilled that the Milton Ulladulla bypass has hit another planning progression milestone; it is wonderful news for the community.

"This ensures the project will receive the prioritisation it deserves from both the State and Federal governments, reinforcing its importance to the South Coast region.

"I know how important this project is to the Milton, Ulladulla and surrounding communities, and I will continue to work to ensure that the Milton Ulladulla bypass remains a priority."

The project will cut congestion and reduce travel times while improving road safety and freight access. Transport for NSW will keep the community informed as planning progresses further.

Libs backflip on Batemans Bay ED future

With a Federal election on the horizon, Natalie Ward, Deputy Leader Liberal Party NSW, Shadow Minister for Roads & Transport, Infrastructure, Illawarra & South Coast, was in the Gilmore this week to support Andrew Constance in his campaign for the Federal seat.

Although health is a State issue, Mr Constance and Ms Ward announced on social media that a Liberal State Government would keep the Batemans Bay ED open.

It had previously been a Liberal decision to close the facility with the new Eurobodalla Hospital opening in Moruya.

Ms Ward said "We are committed to keeping the Batemans Bay Emergency Department open. The coalition will fight to do that."

Responding to Ms Wards post, local nurse Georgie Rowley said: "A 24/7 service is being requested, there's a petition from current Federal MP that's requesting an amendment to the hours of the UCC to enhance the service. Being graded as a Level 2 hospital it is considered to be an 'Emergency Care Centre.' The Australasian College of Emergency Medicine guidelines are below. <u>https://acem.org.au/.../S12-Statement-Role-Delineation-EDs</u>. Ms Ward replied, "Using tricky definitions from bureaucratic websites to fudge the issue is just arrogance."

"Facts..... not spin and "definitions" of emergency care" she said. Ms Rowley replied "And those that write hospital position statements, the 'Australasian College of Emergency Medicine' are the GOLD standard. Are you questioning their expertise? Tricky definitions from bureaucratic website, hmmm, I think you are saying the experts are incorrect. Emergency Care Centres can & do treat critical presentations."

Ms Ward's office responded to the Mail this afternoon saying: "We do not have a committed costing for the project yet, as the Parliamentary Budget Office does not open in NSW politics until September 2026 for the 2027."

\$5 Million for Nowra Riverfront Precinct

"The people of Eurobodalla spoke and we listened," says shire Mayor Mathew Hatcher after councillors voted to put Eurobodalla's draft Community Strategic Plan up for public comment.

"The CSP presents an inspiring roadmap up to 2042, and informs Council's decision making and agenda setting for long-term planning of our projects, infrastructure and services."

Early last year, Council staff collected feedback from residents, businesses and community groups in-person and online, with 2,700 people (6.7 percent of the population) sharing their thoughts. "Participation was impressive, with a broad range of backgrounds and life experiences. This means Council has high confidence the draft CSP really reflects the community's hopes for the future and understands the challenges that concern them most," Mayor Hatcher says. The draft CSP identifies the natural environment, relaxed lifestyle, peace and quiet, clement weather, and supportive community as the strengths that make Eurobodalla a great place to live. The highest-ranking challenges are housing affordability and availability, improvements to infrastructure, better health services, and balancing development with the needs of people and

the environment. Also up for public comment are the draft Community Engagement Strategy and the

draft Community Participation Plan 2025-29.

"The draft Engagement Strategy shows how Council should connect with community to shape big decisions while the draft Participation Plan is a framework for meaningful participation in planning decisions. The three documents work together to empower the community through Council's decision-making processes," says Mayor Hatcher.

Common sense approach to bushfire preparedness

The NSW Government is reducing red tape which has in practice stifled farmers' ability to fight fires on their own property.

During a fire emergency, a landholder can now take water from surface water and groundwater sources on their land without needing to have a water licence and water use approval. This includes streams, creeks and rivers abutting the boundary. This commonsense exemption has been made via amendments to the Water Management (General) Regulation 2018.

The water can be used by landholders on their property and adjacent land to fight fires. It can also be used for training and controlled burning when it is carried out by or under the authority of a firefighting agency such as the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS), and for the testing and maintenance of firefighting equipment.

Landholders who wish to prepare for the threat of bushfires can now also lawfully take water and store it in a tank or dam for future firefighting purposes. The maximum volume for each property is 100,000 litres (0.1 ML) per year.

The NSW Government will carry out targeted periodic surveys of landholders to understand how the exemption is being used and to identify the extent and scale of water use.

While landholders are not required to submit reports, they are encouraged to log the volume of water they take under the exemption, for their own records.

Ground-breaking moment as Andrew Radford joins The Disability Trust Board

The Disability Trust has become the first major not-for-profit organisation in Australia to appoint a person with an intellectual disability to its Board with Andrew Radford from Batemans Bay becoming a Director. Andrew has been a participant with The Disability Trust for more than 23 years and he has also been an advocate for people with disability, a small business owner and a member of The Assembly documentary series which aired on the ABC recently.

He was among the group of people with autism who were chosen to complete a journalism course under the guidance of Leigh Sales which included interviewing high-profile Australians, including Prime Minister Anthony Albanese.

Andrew works at his local library in Batemans Bay and also runs his own car-washing business. His elevation to The Disability Trust's Board has been ratified by the current Directors and he will formally begin his tenure in February.

The Disability Trust Chief Executive Officer Carol Berry said Andrew exemplified the organisation's vision of creating an inclusive world built on trust, respect and equality, where people with a disability live the life they choose.

"We went through a process at TDT where we spoke to our members about wanting to create a role on our board which was specifically for a person with intellectual disability," Carol explained. "Our members supported that proposal and then we had some deep thinking about who would be a really fantastic person to join our Board and Andrew was really the first person that came into our minds. Andrew is someone who has a really fantastic track record in the advocacy space. We really wanted someone who understands advocacy from an individual perspective but also someone who understands how to advocate on behalf of other people with disability so Andrew absolutely fulfilled that criteria. "He's also someone who has been a client of The Disability Trust and we really want that strong client voice. Andrew has had some amazing life experiences – he's someone who has had exposure in terms of speaking at conferences and he's shown that he's willing to be in the public spotlight. I think there will be some attention in this role so we wanted someone who is comfortable in that space.

"But also, Andrew is someone who absolutely upholds the values of The Disability Trust. His whole way of being in the world really does stand for what we stand for so we saw him as a really good cultural fit."

On receiving their grant each student gave a short speech outlining their tertiary education plans, their accommodation plans and how the grant would be used to support their transition to tertiary study. Each student story was unique in many aspects. Four of the students had commenced their career choice at high school following a pathway that has allowed them to complete a Certificate III course as part of their HSC. They have enrolled in Certificate IV courses to become highly qualified and skilled employees.

Two Excellence Prizes named after the late Chairman Alex Taylor OAM, and the retired Chairman Peter Wood OAM were also presented. Each prize of \$1,000 is paid for excellent scholastic performance in the first year of university, restricted to Grantees of the previous year.

The prizes were awarded to Tane Simons, studying for a Bachelor of Design at the University of Canberra, who achieved 5 high distinctions, 3 distinctions in his first year. Marc Pavesa also received an Excellence Prize for his achievement of 2 high distinctions and 4 distinctions studying Liberal Arts and Science at Sydney University. Marc has been offered a prestigious Dalyell scholar as he continues his study in Politics, Philosophy and Economics.

Zach Holmes entertained the gathering with an address about his experiences during her year at the Australian National University studying Advanced Science.

The BBYF was established in 1994 for the purpose of providing financial assistance to students leaving high school to pursue personal development and advancement in an unlimited range of worthwhile fields of endeavour. It is supported by a partnership between Batemans Bay Rotary, RSL and Soldiers Club.

Since 1994 the Foundation has given Grants to 262 students, worth a total value of \$860, 000. Every cent was locally raised, privately donated, or as part of a bequest.

The BBYF selection panel had the daunting task of determining the 14 grantees from a field of 37 applicants. This was completed through December with interviews held in January. For those receiving a grant, it is a vote of confidence by the Batemans Bay community. The foundation wishes all applicants every success for the future.



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Rural Women Need Childcare

The **Country Women's Association of NSW** (CWA of NSW) joins calls for Government provision of universal access to early learning and care, as research suggests that being unable to work due to lack of childcare services is a challenge that regional, rural and remote mothers disproportionately grapple with.

Historic advocates for women's rights in regional, rural and remote NSW, The Country Women's Association of NSW (CWA of NSW), are the latest rural force calling on all parties to fix the early learning crisis crippling families and economies in regional, rural and remote Australia.

They join the National Farmers' Federation, the National Rural Health Alliance, the Australian Education Union and 66 others as members of The Parenthood's Access for Every Child Rural Coalition.

In a 2024 CWA of NSW member survey, when asked what measures respondents thought could help improve economic opportunities for women in regional, rural or remote NSW/ACT, 40.46% identified investing in affordable childcare.

The survey results build on similar research from Essential in late 2024 which suggested that being unable to work due to lack of childcare is worse (at 26%) for parents in regional, rural and remote Australia than in the cities (at 14%).

CEO of CWA of NSW, Danica Leys said they are pleased to join The Parenthood's coalition, with early learning and care access a key issue for the women they represent.

"Our members regularly tell us that finding care and learning opportunities for their young children is extremely difficult, so we know the extent of this crisis," said Ms Leys.

"Many women are forced to stay out of the workforce simply because there is no access to childcare. It's one of the most significant barriers to social and economic participation and empowerment for women in rural, regional, and remote areas. This is not just a personal issue; it's an economic one that affects families, communities, and the future of regional Australia."

Coalition convenor, Maddy Butler, said that having the Country Women's Association of NSW support their call for universal access to early learning speaks to the particular need for early childhood education and care for mothers of young children in country Australia. "As leaders for social progress for women in regional, rural and remote Australia, we're very excited to have the CWA of NSW's insight and influence behind our cause," said Ms Butler.

"Early learning and care is far less available outside of the cities, leaving many mothers unable to work and therefore many families forced to get by on a single income, exacerbating already high financial pressures. "In December, the Federal Government committed to invest \$1billion into building and expanding new centres in areas with high need if re-

elected at the upcoming Election. We hope to see commitments from all parties which address Australia's regional, rural and remote early learning shortage."

Almost one in four Australians live in a "childcare desert", where three or more children compete for one childcare place.

"By joining The Parenthood's Access for Every Child Rural Coalition, we are standing alongside other key rural organisations to call for a universal early learning and care system that will support the health, wellbeing, and economic prosperity of rural families. It's time for the Federal Government to step up and make early childhood education and care accessible for every child, no matter where they live," said Ms Leys.

Additional \$20 million for ag-tech connectivity

The Federal Government is continuing to support Aussie farmers with cost of living relief and enhanced productivity, with an additional \$20 million investment in a new round of the hugely successful On Farm Connectivity Program (OFCP).

The flagship ag-tech grants program was informed by the 2021 Regional Telecommunications Review that found connectivity gaps were impacting the uptake of technology solutions by primary producers. Previous OFCP rounds have provided rebates of up to 50 per cent for eligible equipment and technology – worth up to \$30,000 – for farmers to implement smarter, better connected, more sustainable farming solutions.

OFCP Round 3 brings total investment by the Albanese Government in the program to \$53 million, equating to more than \$100 million worth of ag-tech related equipment purchases across Australia. For more information on the OFCP, visit:

Moruya Mail Alternative wines and honey shine at North Durras

Even though up to 10,000 grape varieties are grown in the world today, 94 percent of the grapes crushed in Australia come from only 20 varieties and according to Wine Australia one third of that figure is either Shiraz or Cabernet Sauvignon. Over the past twelve years, North Durras vintner, Adrian Farrant, has moved away from the mainstream and is producing alternative wines.

On a block measuring a little over 0.3 of a hectare and with only 30 well-tended vines, Adrian is producing up to 150 litres of alternative wine annually.

It is very much a one person operation with Adrian tending the vines, the winemaking, cellaring and the sales.

The varieties include Petit Verdot, originally from France, Matro from Spain and Chambourcin a disease resistant requiring no spray also originally from France.

Adrian's passion started as a hobby in retirement and complements his Masters in Winemaking from Sturt University. Adrian's said "I had a career as a microbiologist so winemaking is almost a natural extension. I had great success with my first vintage. I sourced grapes from Canberra and made an absolutely beautiful Shiraz. I was hooked and now strive to make consistently good wine."

The making of alternative wines has provided an extra challenge.

Adrian said "They are every bit as good as the mainstream wines with the added benefit of not needing to be cellared. All the wines I sell have already been cellared so there is no waiting for years to savour the taste. Consequently, the wines suit people in holiday mood on the south coast and pair nicely with casual foods such as pizza and pasta. My label is Durras North Wines."

Most of Adrian's clientele are return customers.

Adrian said "Due to licensing restrictions cellar door sales are not allowed. Customers are welcome to phone 0411471273 and I will arrange delivery."


There are no sales restrictions on Adrian's other sideline as a producer of fine honey and patrons can sample it and enjoy the ocean outlook of Wasp Island and Mill Point from his front garden at 1 Farrant Place, North Durras.

Adrian said "I have been producing Durras North Honey for almost forty years. The nectar is sourced from the nearby pristine Murramarang National Park. There are different floral sources which I sell separately. For example, Grey Ironbarks flower in spring and the other varieties such as Stringybark and Spotted Gum at other times in the year and not always annually. The subtle differences in tastes ensures all my honey is sold."

Any visitors to 1 Farrant Place, Durras North, are welcome to hit Adrian up for a chat about the history of the area. His lineage goes all the way back to the 1940's when his grandparents made the move from Sydney to set up a caravan park.

It is not surprising his last name matches the address.

100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society



17-01-1925

Mr. P. Mills, C.P.S., has kindly supplied us with the following vital statistics for the quarter ended 31st Dec., 1924: - Births – males 14, females 18, total 32; deaths – males 4, females 3, total 7; marriages 1.

The Shire Council has been notified by the L.G. Dept. that the embargo placed upon the growing of opium poppy does not extend to such varieties of poppy as Iceland poppy, Shirley poppy etc., commonly grown in house gardens.


From a parcel sent us by Mr. S. Louttit during the week, we sampled some excellent potatoes, the flavour of which was particularly good. The tubers, many of which were 2lbs weight, were grown on virgin soil on the donor's property at Braemar.

Shire President Flood is to be complemented on the improvements that have been made in Page Street. The Shire Hall has been re-painted and a neat fence erected on each side of the building, the work of which does credit to the contractor, Mr. P. Lynch.

Mr. H. R. McWilliam is endeavoring to have direct telephone connection between Tuross and Moruya. Quite a gloom was cast over the district on Saturday night when it became known that **Mrs.Caroline Shottin**, widow of the late Mr. John Shottin, had died suddenly at her week-end residence at Gundary. Only that afternoon Mrs. Shottin was driven into town by her daughter, Mrs. A. Russell, with whom she lived at "Bonnie Doon," Kiora. After doing some shopping Mrs. Shottin returned to Gundary, where she was to remain until next morning in order to go to church. In the evening, Miss Smith, a neighbour, went across to visit Mr. Shottin, but on entering the house was shocked to find her lying in a pool of blood. Drs. Quilter and Cutler were immediately sent for, but on examination pronounced that life had been extinct for about an hour.

Braemar Homestead

The unfortunate lady had evidently fallen, striking her head in the action (which accounted for the blood). Heart failure was the cause of death. Mrs. Shottin, who was the daughter of the late Mr. Jacob Luck, was a native of the district, and had lived hereabouts all her life, where she was held in great respect for her many sterling qualities of heart and mind. ... She was in her younger days an excellent horsewoman, and rarely entered a show ring without securing the coveted blue ribbon. Mrs. Shottin was 78 years of age. Her husband pre-deceased her over 30 years ago, and her only son Jacob about 8 years. Deceased leaves only one daughter, Mrs. A. Russell, to whom sympathy has been extended from all quarters in the irreparable loss of a loving and devoted mother.

In the so-called 'silly season' of December-January there's not much happening in politics, so columnists the world over tend to reach back to their childhoods for inspiration.

If you're lucky, the result is sometimes gently humorous and might even underline a current trend or a prospect for the New Year. In fact, I just read a corker by my mate Rob Drewe in the West Australian on the ubiquitous 'quicksand' that gave the bad guys that sinking feeling in the old Saturday Matinee movies of our youth. It was right on the money.

I've been trying to write my new one but every morning lately I've been driven nuts by millions of tiny black ants who have invaded the kitchen and destroyed every morsel of exposed food. But today I put a dollop of Buderim ginger cordial in half a glass of water and they made a mad beeline for it.

Gotcha!

Anyway New York Times readers – me included - were not as lucky as the West Australian's when our deeply serious conservative columnist, David Brooks decided to relate his spiritual saga from woe to go.

He began, he says, as an agnostic. 'I grew up in a Jewish home where we experienced peoplehood more than faith...I lived through decades of Jewish adulthood, but all that proximity still didn't make me a believer.

'Some people are spiritual but not religious; you could say I was religious but not spiritual. When faith finally tiptoed into my life, it didn't come through information or persuasion but, at least at first, through numinous experiences.'

These occurred, perhaps not surprisingly, 'at the foot of a mountain in New England at dawn; Chartres Cathedral in France; looking at images of the distant universe; or of a baby in the womb.' Just whose baby David doesn't say, however, it seems, 'faith' tiptoed out again, even though the experiences 'opened up vaster mysteries.' These were accompanied by 'wonder and awe' as well as a desire to be 'opened up still further.' That climaxed, he tells us, in April 2013.

'I was in a crowded subway car underneath 33rd Street and Eighth Avenue in New York, truly one of the ugliest spots of this good green earth. I looked around the car and I had this shimmering awareness that all the people in it had souls. Each of them had some piece of themselves that had no size, colour, weight or shape but that gave them infinite value. The souls around me that day seemed not inert but yearning – some soaring, some suffering or sleeping; some were downtrodden and crying out.

'In that subway car it occurred to me that if people had souls maybe there was a soul giver. Once you accept there's a spiritual element in each person it is a short leap to the idea that there is a spiritual element in the universe as a whole.' Now, he says, 'I'm enchanted by both Judaism and Christianity. I assent to the whole shebang.'

Golly. By chance I have travelled on that same subway, though I missed out on David's numinous insight. One Black guy was talking very loudly and his lady friend was telling him to 'Shut your mouth!' But here's the rub: that short leap doesn't suggest to David that the other creatures of 'this good green earth' have souls. Not the wondrous birds of the sky, the mighty whales of the deep, not the living rainbow of the Great Barrier Reef, and (thank goodness) not a mention of the ant population that outnumbers us humans by millions to one.

I can understand David's overlooking the other living things in favour of the 'yearning' subway travellers. I was yearning myself, for the Black guy to take his lady friend's advice and shut his mouth...and until today the same for those little black ants. Heh, heh, heh.

Meet Ann McKenna! - "I am very pleased to have been authorised to act in an official capacity to protect the welfare of our animals in the region.

My zone will encompass up to Batemans Bay, out past Cooma in the Snowy Monaro to Thredbo and of course down to the border including Delegate way. My main aim is to keep animals in their own homes, not to seize or get surrenders. I am hoping to make education a big part of this job and will help out anyone that may need it. Obviously, when required, I will seize and prosecute but hopefully this will be a last resort.

The process will be that to attend a job I will need the complainant to contact the Animal Welfare League NSW head office at Kemps Creek and make a report. It can't be from a third party (such as a volunteer that has been told about an issue) it must be from someone who has actual knowledge of what has/is occurring.

If it is an emergency, I can be contacted through the Animal Welfare League NSW Far South Coast General Enquiry number on 0400 372 609 and will contact Kemps Creek to obtain the details. But there must be a report before I can attend (but extreme emergencies will be acted on asap – I will make every effort to get the ball rolling quickly).

- I can déal with:
- Obvious abuse/neglect/cruelty cases.
- Tethered/confined animals.
- Abandoned animals.
- Insufficient food/water/shelter etc.

• Any issues that may just need some advice but don't necessarily warrant enforcement.

I can't deal with stray dogs unless they have significant injuries. Slight scrapes etc. wouldn't count."





Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

Moruya River.

With the heavy, intermittent rains we have been experiencing, the river is looking less than ideal at the moment. Add that to a stiff southerly wind and big seas this weekend, conditions are less than ideal.

The river will be difficult to fish, with water clarity and conditions pretty poor at the moment. With close to 300ml of rain falling since last Friday, the fresh has pushed a lot of fish either out of the system, or down into the deeper holes.

The best advice I can offer, is to fish oily baits like mullet or tuna fillet, add some burley to your set up, and hope that a fish can find your presentation. Soft plastics or hard body lures with noise or vibration will be the go to options this weekend. Don't forget to defiantly add some form of scent to aid fish finding your lures.

Tuross River.

The same options as Moruya will apply for Tuross this weekend. The lower sections of the river on a rising tide, will be the better chance of finding a fish or two. Fish oily baits of tuna or mullet fillet, or noisey lure options to hopefully find a fish or two.

The fish still need to feed during dirty or fresh flush outs, they just tend to find the cleanest saltiest water to do it in. Find these locations, and you have a better chance of finding the fish.

Rock and Beach.

This will be your best chance of finding a feed of fish this weekend. A lot of flathead bream and whiting have been pushed out of the system onto the local beaches over the past week, and there have been plenty of reports of said fish on the beaches close to river outflows. Look at wind sock as a good starting point, as it is far enough north of Moruya river to be less affected by the dirty water currently pushing out.

The beaches in between Moruya and Tuross will also be good options this weekend.

The one major factor will be the swell and wind conditions, with 4m of swell currently working the coast and strong southerly winds, finding somewhere sheltered and calm is going to be the hardest part of the puzzle. Visiting anglers Harry and Maddie Schofield managed a few fish this week

on soft plastics and bait around the airport area. Nice work guys and congrats on your catches.

Offshore.

There have been good numbers of snapper found earlier this week the water break between dirty water and clean in the 15-20m mark, with the snapper taking advantage of all of the small bait fish that have been displaced from the local rivers.

The water temp is high at the moment meaning there should be good numbers of pelagics around. The sea state will need to be carefully watched, as we have 4m seas at the moment, these will drop as the weekend continues. If you are planning on heading out, check in with the local authorities and check the weather reports. If you are not confident, try fishing the river.

The bait freezer has been restocked, with everything that is currently available. The shop has a few holes in our range at the moment, and we are trying to get these filled, but suppliers also have a few holes in their warehouses at the moment, so we will have to wait till we can supply missing items.

Stay safe everyone and remember, "Every day's a good day for fishing..." Team Tackle World Moruya.

Marine Rescue NSW completes another demanding year returning more than 10,500 people safely to shore in 2024



Greater Sydney and the Illawarra experienced a record demand for Marine Rescue services in 2024 with more than 10,500 people safely returned to shore after getting into trouble on the state's waterways. The hard-working volunteers at Lake Macquarie in the Hunter were the busiest unit in the state completing 652 search and rescue missions and safely returning 1,261 people to shore.

In 2024, Marine Rescue NSW volunteers dealt with everything from capsized vessels to groundings.

Many of the callouts could have been prevented with better boat maintenance with engine, battery, and fuel issues accounting for 60 per cent of incidents attended by Marine Rescue NSW.

Across NSW crews performed a total of 4,735 search and rescue missions, including 1,364 emergency responses, safely returning 10,539 people to shore.

Demand on the service in 2024 was just below the record 4,786 search and rescue missions conducted in 2023.

Marine Rescue NSW radio operators had a busy 2024 managing 242, 586 radio calls – with a large number managed by the 24/7 Marine Rescue NSW State Communications Centre at Belrose.

Boaters are urged to follow these steps to stay safe on the state's waterways:

Log On and Off with Marine Rescue via VHF Channel 16 or use the free Marine Rescue NSW app available for iOS and Android devices. Make sure everyone on board is wearing a lifejacket.

Make sure your vessel's engine and battery are working.

Make sure you have enough fuel and some in reserve.

Always check conditions and safety equipment.

Marine Rescue NSW is a volunteer based not-for-profit professional organisation dedicated to keeping boaters safe on the water and supporting local communities.

Marine Rescue NSW Commissioner, Alex Barrell said:

"Whether heading out on enclosed or open waters, it's vitally important for boaters to carry the correct safety equipment, always wear a lifejacket, ensure their vessel is in good working order, carry enough fuel, and continually monitor the weather. A sudden change in conditions can lead to life-threatening incidents.

"Engine and battery failure and running out of fuel are preventable issues, and boaters need to ensure their vessel is in good working order before heading out.

"Marine Rescue NSW radio operators are the link between the land and the sea. They are often the first voice heard by a boater in distress. They play a crucial role in search and rescue responses, and boaters should feel assured that Marine Rescue NSW volunteers are available around the clock."

Other key stats:

Marine Rescue NSW radio operators managed 242,586 calls including 99 MAYDAYs and 61 PAN PANs and kept watch over almost 285,000 people on board more than 76,000 logged on vessels.

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Breakdown of rescues across southern regions:

Illawarra **NEW REGION CALENDER YEAR RECORD, SURPASSING 481 IN 2023**

495 search and rescue missions including 230 emergency responses with 1,125 people safely returned to shore across all 7 Illawarra units – Port Kembla, Shellharbour, Shoalhaven, Jervis Bay, Sussex Inlet, Ulladulla & Kioloa.

Locations of highest demand were Port Kembla 162, Jervis Bay 131 and Shoalhaven 79.

Of note: Marine Rescue Jervis Bay set a new unit calendar year record with 131 search and rescue missions surpassing 111 set in 2023. Marine Rescue Sussex Inlet equalled its busiest calendar year of 60 missions set in 2023.

Monaro – 277 search and rescue missions including 178 emergency responses with 618 people safely returned to shore across all 8 Monaro units – Batemans Bay, Tuross Moruya, Narooma, Bermagui, Merimbula, Eden, Alpine Lakes & Moama. Locations of highest demand were Batemans Bay 125, Eden 42 and Bermagui 32.

Of note: Marine Rescue Eden set a new unit calendar year record with 42 search and rescue missions surpassing 32 set in 2022. Marine Rescue Bermagui equalled its busiest calendar year of 32 missions set in 2022.

Batemans Bay Sailing club Report - January 11th

"Nearly every day is a great day for sailing, but January 11th was not one of them. Nonetheless, 3 yachts went out for Batemans Bay Sailing Club's annual Broulee Race despite an excess of precipitation and a lack of wind. They were not accompanied by the committee boat "Dave Magill", which had engine problems. The resourceful race management team of Terry Paton and Andrew Bain grabbed a handheld VHF radio and ran the start sequence from the shore at Caseys Beach. The rain ceased and a 5 knot south easterly came in by midday which was just enough to get the race underway. After an even start the fleet had a slow starboard tack fetch out to the Marine Park middle mark. The Adams 10.6 "Accolade" (Lachlan Brown) held a narrow lead but like a lot of boats designed by the late great Joe Adams she is not a renowned light air performer and was soon overhauled by the Farr 1020 "Moonmist" (Tony Sutton). Bruce Farr is arguably the world's most successful yacht designer having never designed a bad boat. The 1020 was drawn back in 1982 as an all rounder and is still one of Farr's favourite designs. "Moonmist" held a handy lead by Burrewarra Head but gave some of it back by overstanding the headland as the breeze gradually backed to the north east. On the square run to the mark laid off South Broulee "Moonmist" was only able to fly a storm spinnaker off the jib halyard owing to previous damage to the spinnaker halyard sheave, allowing "Accolade" to retake the lead at the North Broulee rounding mark. The breeze built up to 12 knots for a while but then it disappointingly dropped back to 5 knots. "Moonmist" sailed back into the lead and kept gaining on the long slow work to Black Rock.

Meanwhile John Drummond and his crew were having an even slower time of it aboard "Sail La Vie". One compensation was the cruisey nature of this Hanse yacht.

Drummond realised they were never going to be able to complete the course before nightfall so took the decision to retire. "Accolade" was off McKenzie's Beach by 5pm with at least two hours sailing left, assuming the wind held. Brown decided to retire and motor back as well. The "Moonmist" crew patiently stuck it out and were rewarded when the light breeze held in for them. They finished with an elapsed time of 6 hours and 7 minutes, nearly twice as long as usual for this race.

Thanks must go to race officer Terry Paton, his trusty sidekick Andrew Bain and to Simon Lowth for putting in the North Broulee turning mark. The next BBSC keelboat race is a coastal race on 8th February." Lachlan Brown
