Dear Community,

I want to extend an invitation to you to come get excited about food by attending the SAGE weekly food shares. I have been attending the food share for at least 6-7 years.

As a new backyard gardener living in Malua Bay, I happily drove to Moruya once a month to attend the food share. It was a great way to learn all things gardening by asking questions and observing produce brought to the sharing table. I met new people, have formed friendships with them, and have collected new things to grow which have been brought to our gatherings. People bring seedlings, seeds, gardening and cookbooks, preserves, eggs and tools. I always left the food share feeling rich, not just because my basket was full of goodies from others, but emotionally enriched as well.

Our house burned down in the Black Summer Fire and we chose to sell our land in Malua Bay. We thought as we had a clean slate to start with, we could move anywhere in Australia. Research into farmer's markets around the country led me back to Moruya. We have an amazing local growing community and foodie system here. My husband calls me TOS (The Organic Snob), but I'd rather be called The Organic Warrior. Our region is a paradise for excellent chemical free, nutrient dense food and I couldn't leave that behind. So, I put down my roots and took on helping out with the SAGE food share, upping the gatherings from once a month to 4 times a month thinking surely backyard veggie growers would be hot to share their excess more than once a month. Sadly this has not been the case since Covid. I hope this letter lights the fire under our growing community to start showing up and boost our community's resilience and health by sharing their excess. You are missing out on all sorts of good fun! Now let me be clear, you DO NOT have to grow food to attend a food share. We backyarders already have a lot of food, food we are proud to share and chat about. We welcome anyone who wants to come and share the bounty. What a great way to teach your kids where food comes from, and hear about all the different ways to cook and eat it. Food is love. Families and friendships bloom at the tables where food is prepared and served. When you say to yourself you are too busy to come to the food share, think back on your own home cooked favourite foodie experience, surely you can budget one hour or less to collect free food and create new memories with those you cherish.

You might even surprise yourself and catch the gardening bug. In a world where our devices are constantly stealing our focus, I have declared my garden a phone free zone. It's great being distracted by little frogs and insects! The best part of veggie gardening to me is naming where all the different foods on my plate came from. The fewer that are from the supermarket, the more I feel like the organic warrior! My favourite food share day is the first Sunday of the month alongside The Nourished Sovereign coffee, tonics, and food van at Riverside Park at 10 am. It's a great location to start a Sunday. Coffee and free food. A win, win! The playground is usually full of kids and their parents having a good time. Police are appealing for information as they investigate a home invasion on the South Coast last year.

Police were called to a home in Hawdon Street, Moruya, about 1.50am, on Wednesday 25 December 2024, following reports of a break and enter. Management plans for Bay reserves on public exhibition


Eurobodalla Council is calling for comment on its draft plan of management for reserves at Hanging Rock, Corrigans Beach and Observation Point.



Listen up - New Koala populations found in Eurobodalla

Koalas have been detected at 18 new locations in southern Eurobodalla using acoustic recorders. Half of the sites were burnt during the Black Summer Bushfires and there is hope that the species is now recovering in some places.

These new detections are in three groups, the southern Bodalla State Forest, the eastern edge of the Moruya State Forest and in Deua National Park just west of Moruya township. The acoustic survey reveals the connection between the Bodalla Koalas and their more southern cousins in Gulaga and Kooraban National Parks.

The acoustic survey builds on earlier survey work of the Eurobodalla Koala Recovery Project which used a drone with a thermal camera to find 3 Koalas in the south. The drone also found threatened species such as Greater Gliders and Glossy Black-Cockatoos. The drone was only able to survey 31 sites but the small recording devices called Song Meters were set up at 88 locations to record the bellows of male Koalas over a two week period. The 12,000 hours of nocturnal sound recordings were analysed by computer software that recognises koala bellows using sonogram spectral images. An additional Song Meter survey at 32 locations within Bodalla State Forest by Forestry Corporation, awaits analysis and will complement these findings.


The <u>Eurobodalla Koala Project</u> is run by dedicated community volunteers for the past 12 years and their spokesperson, Candace Wirth, said "This is the culmination of much field work to show that Koala populations do survive in the Eurobodalla and can now be included in the NSW Koala Management Plan."

"The Recovery Project also involved Community Tree planting of key food trees for the Koala to create corridors to link these smaller populations. Sharlene Cohen engaged with local landholders at 7 locations to plant out 4,000 tree seedlings propagated at the Eurobodalla Botanic Gardens." The next steps for the Eurobodalla Koala Project will be to have the NSW Koala Strategy revised to include Eurobodalla as an Area of Regional Koala Significance (ARKS) and have the Eurobodalla Shire Council undertake a Koala Management Plan for the Shire that protects habitat and the remaining Koala populations.

The ongoing monitoring of Koalas in Eurobodalla will continue with NSW Forestry Corporation conducting broadscale Song Meter surveys each Spring and Autumn within State Forests and DCCEEW undertaking biannual surveys on key regional populations.

The Eurobodalla Koala Recovery Project was funded by the Commonwealth Government and partnerships were formed with Batemans Bay Local Aboriginal Lands Council Rangers, Eurobodalla Shire Council, Forestry Corporation NSW Southern Region, National Parks and Wildlife Service South Coast Branch and South East Local Land Services. Generous support for the acoustic recorder survey came from the NSW Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water.

Country Mayors seek restoration of Commonwealth Funding

Chairman of the NSW Country Mayors Association (CMA) Mayor Rick Firman OAM has called for the Australian Government and Opposition to commit to the restoration of Commonwealth funding for Local Government.

"Federal Governments of all persuasions have slowly but surely eroded the funding that is provided to Local Government. It is alarming that the annual Financial Assistance Grants (FAGs) provided to Local Government by the Federal Government have decreased from 1% of Commonwealth taxation revenue in 1996 to just 0.5% today."

Mayor Firman raised concerns that this falling revenue was a major contributing factor to the financial sustainability challenges that many Councils in rural and regional NSW currently face. "Declining Commonwealth contributions, coupled with rate pegging in NSW and increasing operating costs are making it very difficult for Councils, and particularly country Councils, to continue to deliver services and infrastructure at the levels our communities need he said"

CMA Deputy Chairman Mayor Russell Fitzpatrick said insufficient funding from the Australian Government hits country communities in the hip pocket. "The inadequate FAGs situation creates large rate rises across rural and regional NSW Local Government Areas during a cost-of-living crisis, as Councils struggle to remain financially sustainable. While country Councils know their communities are doing it tough, their operating costs have also risen much faster than their revenue over consecutive years. Special Rate Variations harm the relationship we have with our ratepayers but they have become a necessity in NSW," he said. "Grants are over 70 per cent of the revenue of some rural NSW Councils. Their rate base is stagnant. So, even rate hikes cannot help them much."

The CMA has written to the Prime Minister, The Hon Anthony Albanese, and both the Leader of the Opposition, Hon Peter Dutton MP and to the Leader of the National Party, the Hon David Littleproud MP requesting one on one meetings to discuss the issue. The Leaders have also been invited to address the 28 March meeting of CMA, which has a theme of Financial sustainability.

Country-based Councils in NSW face unique cost pressures, with many Local Government Areas being the size of small European countries and being responsible for close to 1,500kms of roads. Mayor Firman explained that Councils are required to deliver public services like administration, recreational facilities, pools, libraries and waste facilities in multiple locations in order to ensure equity of access, which increases the cost of Council operations.

"In many of our 87 Member Council LGAs there is little or no public transport; therefore it is almost impossible to consolidate service delivery in centralised locations to cut costs. Our Board and our Members are committed to ensuring that those who choose to live and work in country NSW have the services and infrastructure available that validates that choice. It's all about equity," Mayor Firman said.

"We are asking that the Commonwealth and Opposition to please - step up to the plate, to support our Members in providing the services and infrastructure that our communities need and deserve. A commitment to return FAGs funding to 1996 levels would substantially improve financial sustainability not just for NSW councils but for Local Government across Australia," concluded Mayor Firman.

Parliamentary report highlights funding emergencv

The interim report from Federal Parliament's inquiry into local government sustainability highlights the urgent need for increased funding to Australia's 537 local governments.

ALGA President Mayor Matt Burnett said the report confirmed councils are at a breaking point, after years of being asked to do more with less.

"Services and infrastructure that were once the responsibility of state and federal governments are now increasingly being delivered by local government," Mayor Burnett said.

"We are also stepping up to provide vital local services - including healthcare, childcare and aged care - where it's not commercially viable for the private sector.

"Building infrastructure for new housing, adapting to a changing climate and mitigating against natural disasters are national priorities being held back by a lack of funding and support for councils. Mayor Burnett said the current funding model for local government is broken and needs to be fixed.

"We look forward to the final report and recommendations, and it's absolutely crucial the inquiry recommends more support for Australian councils - not just re-cutting the limited and insufficient funding that's currently provided.

"Competitive grant funding programs disadvantage smaller regional, rural and remote councils, so heading into this year's election we are calling for new formula-based funding programs that would support all councils to deliver local solutions to national priorities.

This would include:

- \$1.1 billion per year for enabling infrastructure to unlock housing supply,

- \$500 million per year for community infrastructure, \$600 million per year for safer local roads, \$900 million per year for increased local government emergency management capability and capacity, and
- \$400 million per year for climate adaptation.

"A strong, sustainable local government sector is critical not just for our local communities, but also for the health and productivity of our nation.'

SCULPTURE FOR CLYDE 2025 EVENT CANCELLED

In a public statement released this week, it was announced that the "popular public art event, Sculpture For Clyde, will not proceed in 2025.

Unfortunately, the event committee has been unable to secure critical grant funding in a timely manner from either Destination NSW or Eurobodalla Shire Council, even though the event has strong support from Council, State

Government and Federal Government."

The decision comes just a year since the Event upped the main prize money to \$100,000, making it the second largest sculpture prize in the country.

The Committee then requested an extra \$20,000 from Eurobodalla Shire Council for 'marketing', which was granted. The exhibition was proposed to be held from Saturday May 31 to Sunday June 8, 2025, along the Batemans Bay foreshore. The statement said "After the huge success of the 2024 event, this is very disappointing for all involved, but we look forward to the event returning in 2026. All applications and sponsorship received to date will be refunded in full within the coming week.

The committee extends a huge thank you to those artists and local businesses who continue to support the event year on year. "

"The winning sculpture from the 2024 event 'The Past Is Just Behind' by sculptor Ingrid Morley, is expected to be unveiled in Batemans Bay in the coming weeks. Footings have already been installed, and the committee would like to thank Eurobodalla Council for their work and support in this regard."

"The Batemans Bay Sculpture Walk, along the Clyde River foreshore, is the legacy of the Sculpture for Clyde Event. Each year, the sculpture winning the acquisitive award is permanently positioned for the community and visitors to enjoy."



Jan Frikken finalist in NSW Women of The Year Award 2025

Established in 2012, the NSW Women of the Year Awards have been a powerful platform to recognise and celebrate incredible women and girls whose determination, courage, talent, and passion continue to inspire their communities and beyond.



Jan Frikken owns JJJ Oriental Supermarket in Batemans Bay which doubles up as a neighbourhood centre for people from all abilities, cultures, races and religions.

From these humble beginnings the Eurobodalla Multicultural Group was formed by Jan, Maricel Ceniza, May Smith and Merty Chen in 2017.

It is an unfunded community group run by volunteers providing referrals to relevant service providers as well as personalised and community support.

The Eurobodalla Multicultural Group prides itself on promoting access and equity, integration and cultural diversity. The Group's activities include organising Harmony Day, International Women's Day, Annual Diversity Night, Batemans Bay Cooking Group as well as English classes for people who are not eligible for government funded classes.

The Group provides non judgmental assistance including accessing Centrelink or Medicare, applying for citizenship, acquiring a driver's license, legal assistance, form filling, family relationships through to basic life skills.

Jan said "It is just a case of asking and I am sure our network can point you in the right direction or hopefully solve the problem with you. We invite the vulnerable in our community to reach out."

The Group has also widened its role by throwing out a socialising mat to all members of the community with the Batemans Bay Dinner Group meeting each Wednesday evening, the Batemans Bay Coffee morning each Thursday and the Pot Luck Dinner Group catch up each month.

These groups have the added bonus of supporting local businesses.

The establishment of 'Caring Corner' at JJJ Supermarket has been a lifesaver for individuals and families doing it tough. Jan Frikken said 'Caring Corner is a space for people to donate non-perishable food items and it is targeted at people who are homeless, living in cars, tents or temporary accommodation who have limited cooking facilities.

Jan Frikken has been a driving force behind all of these initiatives and her community work extends beyond the Eurobodalla Shire and into the neighbouring shire with the establishment of the Shoalhaven Multicultural Hub last year. Since 2023 Jan has been a member of the Regional Community Networks (RCNs) for Illawarra and Southeast NSW. The members are appointed by the NSW Minister for Multiculturalism to provide advice and guidance to Multicultural NSW and help make connections with communities in their regions. With over two decades of active community work in Singapore, Malaysia as well as the south coast of NSW, Jan Frikken is a worthy finalist in the 2025 Women of the Year Awards. The winners will be announced on the 6th March, 2025 as part of NSW Women's Week which runs from Sunday 2nd March through to the 8th March, 2025.

A Respectful Nod to the Internal Combustion Engine : A very brief history

The December 6 edition of Moruya Mail noted that Electric Vehicle sales in 2024 in Australia hit the 100k milestone (98400 in 2023). As the electric vehicle (EV) market increases, lets pause a moment in honour of the faithful workhorse that has powered our cars for more than a century, often taken for granted as that machine under the hood, the Internal Combustion Engine (I.C.E.). As a member of the Classic Motor Club of Eurobodalla and manager of Teensafe, I have a historic respect for cars. By the way, the External Combustion Engine, which came first, was a steam engine in which the combustion occurred outside the engine, eg burning coal to boil water in a 'boiler' so steam pressure entered a cylinder to force a piston down to drive the machine to run a factory, a tractor or the Titanic. Steam engines powered the Industrial Revolution. For locals, you can see the remains of a rusted boiler from a wrecked steamship on the headland reef at Bingi. James Watt, a Scottish engineer, perfected the 'modern' steam engine and coined the term "horsepower" around the time Captain Cook sailed along our undeveloped coast and past Bingi Point. But I digress.

The first successful 4 stroke I.C.E was designed in the 1860's in Germany by Nicolaus Otto working with Gottlieb Daimler. The brilliance was to use the same piston system as the steam engine but provide the combustion internally above the piston using liquid fuel and a spark plug to cause an explosion to drive the piston. The exhaust noise, of course, is the sound of each explosion muffled by an exhaust muffler although you would have heard a far louder explosive sound from some revving motor bikes. Vehicle connoisseurs actually like the distinctive tone and resonance from a V8 engine (eight cylinders & pistons in a V formation) considered music to some. Speaking of music, the creative and prolific German composer, Beethoven, was making music around the time Watt was making steam engines. What a great era for human advancement !

The first commercially available I.C.E powered car was created by another German, Karl Benz, in 1885. His name would continue on every Mercedes Benz car since. Ironically, the first electric vehicle was likely to have been put on the road in 1888 by yet another German, Andreas Flocken, with a 100kg battery and a speed of 15 km/hr. In 1892, yes another German, Rudolf Diesel, changed the standard I.C.E to develop, you guessed it....the diesel engine. No spark plugs, no carburettors and high torque power for big machines like trucks, trains and ships with endurance. At this point even Basil Fawlty would be impressed and probably mention the Germans.

Moving right along, Henry Ford, the American industrialist, developed the Mass Production Line and churned out huge numbers of Model T Fords with a reliable petrol I.C.E in the early 20th Century. The average person could now afford a Ford and the EV faded away. So, for over a century, we have relied on and enjoyed cars with the I.C.E. engine. Baby Boomers were the first really mobile generation with a car, in wealthier countries, and drove everywhere with new found I admire 'The Engine' because it is independence. not unusual for a car to travel 300,000 km while the basic engine keeps going(other smaller parts may fail around it and be replaced). A quick calculation reveals that in a car travelling 300,000 km , the engine has clocked up 450 million revolutions (based on an average speed of 80 km/hr at 2000 rpm - a fastidious person may want to check my maths). Some cars will do far more, some less. The pistons go up and down, very fast, turning a crankshaft which drives the wheels. It is amazing that an average engine can do 450000000 revs, generally without fail, for years. Much more in big engine trucks, trains and ships. Worthy of respect.

By comparison, another fantastic machine, the human heart, will beat 2.5 Billion times in an average lifetime, say 75 years, without fail (ref "The Body" by Bill Bryson). The oldest person ever recorded lived for 122 years, Jeanne Louise Calment of Provence, France. That's a lot of heart beats.

Jeanne enjoyedcomfortable family wealth, smoked most of her life and gave up smoking two cigarettes per day at age 117.She was aged 10 when the first commercial I.C.E appeared on the market. Maybe the French diet is as important as a regular oil change in an engine for longevity. I sometimes wonder why a car or a human lasts longer than others. I once discussed this with my doctor, about longevity in people. I suggested longevity is due to 25% diet, 25% exercise, 25% general wellbeing and 25% genes. The doctor reckoned it is 25% genes So, thank you to all the hard and 75% good luck. working internal combustion engines that have been a vital part of our lives, our travels and our independence, although it is pity about some of your bad habits, especially the exhaust carbon emissions, an inconvenient truth. But wait, the growth of the ICE required huge quantities of oil and the expansion of petroleum industries saved the whale from extinction because expensive whale oil for lighting fuel and fine lubricants was replaced by petroleum, just in time ...but don't tell the oil industry ! I will no doubt end up with an EV but also have a real car to play with, a piece of pampered automotive history on Classic Car Club plates, just for fun.

Open Letter to Candidates

Subject: Request for Candidate Positions on Local Radiotherapy Services

Dear Candidates,

The Eurobodalla and Bega Valley Shires, within the federal constituencies mentioned above, have a very significant medical demographic of seniors (60+) and First Nations communities. In the Eurobodalla alone, the overall population growth projected by NSW Health to be reached by 2031 in the 2021-31 Clinical Services Plan had, according to ABS, already passed that mark by mid-2020. Despite other rural districts with similar or smaller populations having access to Local Radiotherapy Services (LRS), the entire Far South Coast region—from the Victorian border up to just before Nowra (approximately 300 km)—continues to lack these vital services. Given these compelling demographic realities, it seems both anomalous and inequitable that a combined community population of nearly 78,000 (and growing) in 2025 still cannot access life-saving or palliative radiotherapy treatment locally. Our region is a treatment desert. As it stands, patients must travel to Canberra, Nowra or beyond for radiation treatments, often for sessions as short as 15 minutes, up to 8 weeks at a time, and incur additional accommodation costs. The added financial and emotional burden has led some patients to decline treatment altogether. Shockingly, one local GP estimated that 30% of just prostate cancer patients eligible for radiotherapy opt out because of these barriers.

This existing model of care is clearly flawed and unsustainable. The focus should be centered around delivering the optimum care to the patient: this is clearly missing in these arrangements.

On behalf of the many local residents facing these challenges, including their families and loved ones, 'ONE' has advocated for the establishment of local radiotherapy services for the past four years. Our efforts include two widely subscribed petitions in 2021 and 2022 calling for a locally available service. The recently commenced construction of the new Level 4 Eurobodalla Regional Hospital, slated for completion in late 2027, presents an ideal opportunity to include this desperately needed service.

In August 2024, the Eurobodalla Shire Council unanimously "joined the community in supporting the inclusion and prioritisation of local radiotherapy services". We now ask each Federal Parliament candidate to share their position on this issue so that our community can clearly understand where they stand.

Out of respect for those directly impacted by this issue, and given that this is a non-political matter, we kindly ask that all responses remain on point and focused on the issue of provision of local radiotherapy services locally. In 2023, eminent health expert Professor Michael Reid AM, confirming both the need and feasibility of a local radiotherapy centre, estimated the cost of a single Linacequipped unit at \$35 million (NOT \$100 million)—a modest sum relative to overall health expenditure. The impact of this facility on our community regionally would be profound.

We acknowledge the longstanding efforts of Fiona Phillips MP, who has secured \$8 million in federal funding towards the cost of a radiotherapy centre, and Kristy McBain MP, whose vigorous advocacy for regional radiotherapy provision has also been crucial. With Minister for Regional Development Kristy McBain's support, we now look to her Cabinet colleague, Health Minister Hon. Mark Butler MP, for a timely response to our recent written representations, which underscore the urgent and dire need for this service in our region.

Finally, we extend our heartfelt thanks to the magnificent oncology teams at Moruya District Hospital and Bega Regional Hospital for their dedicated care under increasing demand pressure. We know their hard work is deeply valued by their patients. Providing local access to LRS would be a meaningful acknowledgment of their tireless efforts.

We look forward to receiving your response at your earliest convenience. Please note, we are not seeking generic city inspired party statements but rather a direct and honest response to this urgent regional health issue. We will share these responses on the widely followed ONE New Hospital Facebook page to keep the community across the two shires informed.

A lack of reply, though within your prerogative, will be noted and shared as well. By giving no advantage to silence as a tactical ploy, we believe we are delivering a level playing field for all candidates. Most sincerely,

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Federal Government Healthcare Announcements EQUITY AND FAIRNESS MISSING FOR THE FAR SOUTH COAST

For 40 years healthcare funding for Far South Coast (FSC) communities has been reactive and piecemeal rather than being based on fairness and equity. Access to GPs and other primary care services is the highest priority healthcare issue identified by individuals and organisations who have already signed up to the Tuross Head Progress Association's (THPAs) healthcare campaign. Dr Arn Sprogis, Chair of the THPA's Health Subcommittee, said it shows that our communities believe in and support fairness of access and funding for healthcare for all the community, a principle that has been missing from the healthcare debate from all major political parties.

"For example, the THPA strongly supports the latest women's health package announced by the ALP which is a great initiative and long overdue. However, women across the FSC have seriously delayed or occasionally no access to GPs and so will have delayed or no access to the government program, this is unfair and unacceptable," Dr Sprogis said.

"This delay is a direct result of inequitable healthcare funding by successive governments over four decades. In a fair system patients should be able to see a GP on the same day for urgent care and with two days for routine care.

"Recent analysis by the Grattan Institute has reinforced what those of us living on the FSC already know, there are too few GPs to ensure everyone can get the care they need when they need it." As reported in The Conversation on 27 January 2025, the Grattan Institute analysed data from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare and assessed half a million Australians primarily in rural communities are living in "GP deserts."

This was highlighted in the National Rural Health Alliance NOUS REPORT that identified underfunding for all rural communities (THPA 2025 estimate of \$1,000 per person per year adjusted for inflation and population). This equates to an \$80 million per year funding deficit for the FSC, leading to higher death rates, prolonged periods of illness and increased suffering.

"We are yet to see any major healthcare announcements from the Liberal Party or Greens but we are demanding that all political parties in the 2025 Federal Election listen to the concerns of the community and address the funding shortfall. The FSC is not asking for more funding per person, we are asking for the same funding as city populations. With equal funding, we can have the best access and quality of GP and other primary care in Australia, not the worst." Dr Sprogis said.

The THPA is now actively forming alliances with communities from Bateman's Bay to Eden to expand the reach and impact of the healthcare campaign.

"We've had a great response so far, but we need more support to show candidates in Gilmore and Eden Monaro that we are past breaking point and demand fair access and funding for healthcare," Dr Sprogis said.

Another lifeline to REX from Federal Government



Prime Minister Albanese was in Merimbula last week to announce that regional Australia will continue to receive critical aviation services into the future. The Federal Government will work with the Administrators of Regional Express Holdings (Rex), as part of an upcoming competitive sale process, to ensure crucial regional aviation services continue beyond 30 June 2025. "We will work with shortlisted bidders on what support the

"We will work with shortlisted bidders on what support the Albanese Government may be able to provide to maximise the prospect of a successful sale.

Terms of Commonwealth support will be subject to negotiation, but will be conditional on commitments by bidders to provide an ongoing, reasonable level of service to regional and remote communities, the need to provide value for money to taxpayers and good governance."

"The Government is not a bidder in the upcoming sale process and would like to see a successful market-led outcome. However, in the event there is no sale, the Albanese Government will undertake necessary work, in consultation with relevant state governments, on contingency options, including preparations necessary for potential Commonwealth acquisition."

With Rex currently operating out of the Moruya and Merimbula airports, Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips said, "this was great news for South Coast residents." The Albanese Government is also providing further support through a waiver of the "use it or lose it" test for Rex regional flight slots at Sydney Airport, which will ensure its access to those slots until 24 October 2026.

"This comes on top of the Albanese Government providing a loan of up to \$80 million to keep Rex's vital regional routes operating until 30 June 2025, and acquiring \$50 million of debt from Rex's largest creditor, PAGAC Regulus Holdings Limited, earlier this year to ensure the airline could continue to operate.

These actions make clear the Government's ongoing commitment to maintaining access to aviation services for regional and remote communities, and recognises the critical role of the Rex network to local economies."

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Milton-Ulladulla Bypass drop-in sessions from next week

The community and landowners can have their say on the \$940 million Milton-Ulladulla Bypass project between February 26 and April 20.

Transport for NSW will hold drop-in sessions at the Milton Show from March 7 to 9, the Burrill Lake FAB Farmers' Market on April 4 and at the Blessing of the Fleet Festival on Easter Sunday, April 20. Other community sessions will be held at Mollymook and Ulladulla on a date to be announced, and private meetings will be held with landowners.

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips is pleased to see community consultation moving ahead following the signing of contracts for specialists to carry out the concept design and environmental assessments in December.

"I'm thrilled the wheels are finally turning on the long-awaited bypass that the community has campaigned for over the last 30 years," she said.

"This is a significant project that has been made possible thanks to the \$752 million that I have delivered from the Albanese Labor Government, following decades of inaction from previous State and Federal representatives.

"I know how important this bypass is for the community, which is why specialists have been engaged to ensure we get it right. I want to ensure this project is delivered on time and on budget." Transport for NSW has identified seven key locations for these invitation-only local access discussions at Little Forest Road, Slaughterhouse Road, Pirralea Road, Wilfords Lane, Canberra Crescent, Bishop Drive and Kings Point village as well as with farm operators.

The Little Forest Road and Kings Point Drive local access discussions are scheduled for February 26, with the remainder of these group discussions to be scheduled in March.

The discussions are designed as a listening exercise to understand current and future access requirements, any potential safety issues, frequency, duration and type of trips, property usage etc.

Mrs Phillips said, it was crucial for the Milton-Ulladulla community to provide feedback on the bypass design as each milestone is reached.

A contract was awarded to Aurecon Australasia Pty Ltd for the development of the concept design and the environmental assessment, including an Environmental Impact Statement in December. The concept design will include confirmation of the design features, such as the lane configuration and intersections connecting to the existing highway. It will also provide more certainty on the project's footprint and boundaries, including local road access during the construction and operation of the bypass.

Princes Highway and Field Street Narooma intersection upgrade

Transport for NSW is upgrading the Princes Highway and Field Street intersection in Narooma later this year to improve safety and efficiency for all road users.

The \$3.5 million project is jointly funded by the Australian and NSW governments under the Road Safety Program and includes proposed installation of traffic lights with pedestrian crossings on all four arms, new footpaths and kerb ramps, repaving of the road surface and line marking improvements.

The Road Safety Program aims to improve safety on NSW roads by minimising the occurrence of severe injuries and fatalities, with a focus on vulnerable road users like pedestrians and cyclists.

Background

Transport has been investigating pedestrian and cyclist improvements in Narooma, with the intersection of the Princes Highway and Field Street identified as a key pedestrian crossing point.

During the early investigations and planning phase, a review of options was completed which showed that traffic lights provide the best immediate and long-term improvements for pedestrians and road users at this intersection.

In 2024, we carried out consultation to inform the feasibility study for the <u>Narooma Bridge and Transport Improvements project</u>. As part of this consultation, we received feedback on the need to upgrade the Princes Highway and Field Street intersection.

Common themes heard from the community about the intersection included:

- road users find it difficult and unsafe to turn in and out of Field Street due to poor visibility and traffic congestion
- pedestrians find it difficult to safely cross the Princes Highway, particularly those with mobility issues
- amenity of the town would be improved with better connections for pedestrians.


Transport welcomes the Road Safety Program funding provided by the Australian and NSW governments to deliver the intersection upgrade and improve safety, and active transport connectivity and network efficiency in Narooma.

Benefits

The intersection upgrade will provide the following benefits:

- improved connectivity and safety for pedestrians and active transport users
- improved road safety and a reduction in serious injuries and deaths on our roads
- increased traffic efficiency through prioritised and adaptive traffic light phasing.



Countdown to Clean Up starts now

Clean Up Australia Day is the country's biggest community-based environmental event, and "it's just as well" says **Eurobodalla's Clean Up coordinator Lisa Thomas.**

"It's surprising, but Aussies are the second highest producers of waste, per person, in the world. For example, each year we litter around 50 million plastic bags and a whopping 7 billion cigarette butts," says Lisa.

Clean Up Australia Day is held on the first Sunday in March every year, with communities across the nation banding together to clear trash from their local patch. "Eurobodalla is one of 251 Councils participating this year. We've been running Clean Up events in the shire for 23 years now. It's been a terrific effort, and we already have 35 sites registered for Sunday 2 March with plenty of scope for more," Lisa says.

"It takes five minutes to join an existing site, or you can round up the kids or a group of mates and register a new site of your own."

Lisa says many people are feeling pushed for time, so this year there are some additional incentives.

"We keep hearing that community is vital for mental health and regulars know this is a fun catchup that's good for the planet and good for the soul. This year we want to do a bit more to recognise the effort put in by wonderful volunteers with an array of vouchers – for meals, coffees, groceries, fruit and veg, and fun activities – to win." Clean-up bags will also be available for pick up at Batehaven's Corrigans Reserve on the day, where radio station 2EC's Kimmi Saker is broadcasting live between 9am and noon. Eurobodalla Mayor Mathew Hatcher will also be pulling on rubber gloves, picking up trash along the Moruya River with Year 5 and 6 students.



Secretary and Librarian for his work during the year. It was also decided to present a fine book case that had for years been in the Library to the Bodalla Public School, and to erect shelves in its stead. ...

MORUYA A. & P. SOCIETY'S SUCCESSFUL JUBILEE SHOW. - ... As on former occasions the President, Mr. D. Hutchison, was most active and proved himself a tower of strength to the society, and with a capable, hard-working Committee, the energetic Secretary, Mr. H. P. Jeffery, carried out his duties in his usual courteous manner. The ring events were heavily contested, some of the competitors in the hunting events doing remarkably well. As usual the spectators were treated to some fine acrobatic "turns," the rider taking the hurdle while his mount remained stationary. Of the local horsemen, Mr. W. Turnbull was easily the most successful. The fair equestriennes were prominent in many events, Miss. Alma Milne's mount frequently catching the judge's eye. This young lady rides with a fine easy style and knows how to handle her mount to the best advantage.

Some good pigs were on exhibition, Messrs. A. Louttit and H. P. Jeffery sharing the prize in this particular class.

Mr. H. Bate, of Tilba, and the Government have devised a new style of moulding for the construction of silos. The moulds will be the property of the Government and will be lent to farmers. One of them will be on exhibition and a demonstration given on Durham Farm, Bodalla, during the week.

What might have been a very serious accident occurred on the Prince's Highway the other night. Mr. Morchell, of the Public Works Department, was returning from Bergalia alone in his Chevrolet car, and when turning the corner near Mr. John Jeffery's collided with a horse on the road. The radiator, bonnet, mud-guard and lamps on the car were badly damaged. Mr. Morchell returned to town and took out the police, who found the horse (which was a valuable draught horse belonging to Mr. D. A. McIntosh), so seriously injured, his leg being broken, that it had to be destroyed.

By the death of Mr. Robert Henry Harvison, at his home at Moruya on Saturday morning last, this district and the Far South Coast has lost one of the oldest and most respected residents, as well as one its most outstanding personalities. The late Mr. Harvison was born at "Bonona," Kiama, ... in 1848, and was thus in his 77th year. His father, James Harvison, was a landed proprietor at Kiama. Mr. Harvison came to Moruya over 50 years ago, and had thus been associated with all its progress and social activities for over half a century. He married Henrietta Pomphrey, of the Mynora Estate, who predeceased him by many years. He had owned and conducted the Moruya "Examiner" since 1878, and made it one of the most readable and popular of country newspapers. He also engaged in auctioneering, and had wielded the hammer in Moruya for over 40 years. He was a prime mover in 1890 in the petition for the formation of Moruya into a Municipality, and was the Returning Officer for the first Municipal elections in the following year. He donated free of charge the house and land until the Cottage Hospital (as it was called) was established, and for some time he held a seat on the Hospital committee. For years he advocated the establishment of a cheese factory at Moruya, and in 1892 he presented a block of land for a factory at Gundary. That year saw the establishment of the factory, which has been the mainstay of the district's prosperity. He was chairman of the Park Trust, and the last of the original trustees. He was a life member of the Moruya Agricultural Society and Race Club. Mr. Harvison left one son, Mr. Alwyn (Bob) Harvison, of Sydney, and three daughters, Mrs. A. W. Constable, "Examiner" Office, Moruya, Mrs. W. H. Face, of Jerilderie, and Mrs. A. Keating, of Hong Kong.

New designs on the way for the NSW Pattern Book

Thirteen highly skilled design practices have been commissioned by the Minns Labor Government to contribute additional low and mid rise designs to the NSW Pattern Book.

This is the second tranche of designs to be added to the NSW Pattern Book to make the delivery of homes in NSW faster, providing more homes for those who need them.

Six designs for terraces, semi-detached dual occupancy and manor houses or low-rise apartment buildings will be produced alongside six designs for midrise residential flat buildings.

Additionally, one landscape design practice has been commissioned to develop design guidance for the low-rise and mid-rise patterns, for both private and shared open spaces.

Once complete, these designs will become part of the NSW Pattern Book alongside the five winners from the professional category of the NSW Housing Pattern Book Design Competition that were announced in November last year.

The NSW Pattern Book will provide families, builders and developers with a collection of pre-approved, architecturally designed and cost-effective patterns to choose from. Those that use the designs will have access to a fasttracked planning pathway.

Restoring choice and diversity is at the centre of the Minns Government's housing reforms. This means building more homes that offer people at different stages of life more options.

The Pattern Book builds on the Minns Government recent reforms to the planning system to speed up the delivery of more homes, including:

Establishment of the Housing Delivery Authority to allow for major housing projects to be prioritised by being assessed directly by the NSW Government.

The largest rezoning in NSW history around transport hubs.

The largest ever investment in the delivery of social and affordable housing in NSW.

\$200 million in financial incentives for councils that meet the new expectations for development applications, planning proposals and strategic planning.

\$450 million to build new apartments for essential workers including nurses, paramedics, teachers, allied health care workers, police officers and fire fighters.

Minister for Planning and Public Spaces Paul Scully said: "Sydney is currently the second most expensive city in the world and has less housing diversity than it did a century ago. This means less optionality and less opportunity for our families, young people, workers and downsizers to live in NSW.

"As we see the average household change and evolve, we want to make sure there are homes to suit everyone, and this means more than just single dwellings and high-rise apartments.

"We're not sacrificing quality for quantity as we deliver more homes, the NSW Pattern Book will have the stamp of approval from the NSW Government Architect.

"We want new homes to be built faster, but the Pattern Book will mean those homes are good quality, sustainable and cost-effective."

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Work begins on Waminda Birthing on Country hub set to open mid-2026



Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips and Federal Member for Barton Linda Burney joined the Waminda team for the Turning of the Soil Ceremony at Nowra's Birthing on Country site.

A Turning of the Soil Ceremony has marked the commencement of work on Waminda's \$22.5 million Birthing on Country Centre of Excellence, Australia's first purpose-built culturally safe and empowering space for Aboriginal women and their families. Waminda team members were joined by **Federal Member for**

Gilmore Fiona Phillips and Federal Member for Barton Linda Burney for the ceremony at the greenfield site in Hillcrest Avenue, Nowra on Tuesday February 18.

Mrs Phillips said the Gudjaga Gunyahlamai Birth Centre and Community Hub would be the country's first Aboriginal-owned and midwifery-led free standing birth centre.

She said Birthing on Country supported Aboriginal women and babies by providing culturally safe continuity of midwifery care including antenatal, birthing and postnatal support.

"The Waminda team has been working towards the facility for almost a decade and I'm so pleased to see the development application approved and the soil turned, signalling the start of the project," Mrs Phillips said.

"I am proud to have secured \$22.5 million from the Albanese Labor Government for the construction of the dedicated centre, and to support Waminda's vision to improve outcomes for local indigenous women and children," she said.

"As a mum of four, I understand that holistic health care and support is critical from pregnancy right through to the early days of welcoming a new, tiny person into your family.

"Waminda is a dynamic organisation deeply embedded in our community and they are dedicated to ensuring that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women and families get the best possible maternity care for generations to come."

The facility is expected to be completed, open and ready to welcome its first baby in mid-2026.

Special guest Ms Burney said "It was special to join Waminda to break ground on the Birthing on Country Centre of Excellence, a commitment the Albanese Labor Government made at the last election".

"If we're going to close the gap in maternal and childhood health for Indigenous Australians, culturally safe services led by First Nations people are essential," she said.

"When we listen to voices on the ground about what works, we make better policies for our communities." Minister for Indigenous Australians, Senator Malarndirri McCarthy said the Albanese Government's commitment to Birthing on Country was a "cornerstone in our efforts to Close the Gap in maternal health care".

"Birthing on Country leads to significantly better health outcomes for First Nations mothers and babies, and is critical to maintaining the gains in improving the proportion of First Nations babies born healthy and strong," Minister McCarthy said.

"Today's ceremony also marks another important step for Waminda in achieving its vision for First Nations women and their families to be leading and living self-determined futures"

Birthing on Country models have been shown to improve maternal and perinatal outcomes, including women attending more antenatal visits, being less likely to have a premature birth and being more likely to exclusively breastfeed on discharge from hospital.

Illawarra Shoalhaven Local Health District (ISLHD) has worked closely with the South Coast Women's Health and Wellbeing Aboriginal Corporation (Waminda) to support the implementation of its Birthing on Country initiative. Waminda launched the Minga Gudjaga Midwifery Practice with the support of ISLHD in May 2024. This is the first phase of Waminda's Birthing on Country initiative where Waminda's privately practising endorsed midwives provide labour and birth care to women at Shoalhaven Memorial District Hospital.

The State Minns Labor Government has committed \$45.5 million over seven years for the hub which will support culturally safe holistic maternity care for Aboriginal women and their families in the South Coast region. 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TALK2MEBro Reaches out in Batemans Bay

Talk2MeBro attracted over 60 people from all walks of life at its second Community Catch Up event, which involved Breathwork, Connection and Ice Baths and was conducted over two hours at Surf Beach last Saturday.

Talk2MeBro aims to provide people with a safe space to open up and share their struggles without judgement. It was formed in 2018 following the loss to suicide of loved ones.

The not for profit charity has a dedicated team of custodians, trained facilitators and crew, who bring compassion and knowledge to program delivery, and currently have hubs in Wollongong, Newcastle, Central Coast, South West Sydney, Forbes and now in Batemans Bay.

Talk2MeBro Custodian and South Coast Coordinator Jay Prothero organised the community event.

Jay said "I worked as a policeman in Queensland for 20 years and was medically retired last April with post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). I relocated to Batemans Bay in 2023 and have had my own personal mental health issues, and lost loved ones to suicide Fortunately, I found Talk2MeBro. It has really helped me deal with my mental health and now I am committed to giving back on the South Coast and being a part of this amazing organisation."

The charity offers tailored mental health programs to meet the unique needs of each individual audience such as workshops, keynote sessions, immersive experiences and team-building activities. The programs focus on resilience-building, communication, and self-care strategies that participants can integrate into their everyday lives.

Talk2MeBro reaches out to both men and women.

Jay said "At Surf Beach last Saturday we set up ice baths. Research shows that cold water immersion (CWI) may improve mental health by increasing endorphin and norepinephrine levels. CWI may also improve resilience to stress by decreasing cortisol levels. It also jolts participants out of their comfort zones and sparks discussion."

The Ice Baths were followed with a Breathwork session and connection activities.

Jay said "The breath-work assists participants with dealing with anxiety, stored emotions and traumas. I am a level one breathwork instructor and am constantly amazed at the positive impact these sessions can have on participants."

Talk2MeBro has already established close relations with Soul Tribe in Batemans Bay and Catalina Country Club but is keen to extend these alliances to other organisations and businesses to ensure the charity has an ongoing role in the prevention of suicides on the South Coast of NSW.

You can tell a lot about a person by the way they boil an egg for breakfast. I've made a study of it. The conservatives wait till the water's boiling before they put the egg in and hit the 3-minute timer.

I'm at the other end of the spectrum. My egg goes into the saucepan's cold water of while I do the other stuff – slice the banana into the cereal, add the prunes, drop raison bread into the toaster, and boil the jug for coffee. I just 'know' when it's perfectly done – firm outside, runny in the middle.

Occasionally I get it exactly right...June. 15, 2024 was a good one.

This morning, however, was a total disaster and it triggered a train of thought that has left me pale and sad. There was a slight resistance when the knife struck the shell to lift the lid. But when I dipped the tiny spoon into the white, the yolk rose to cover it with some firmer stuff clinging. I was suddenly overwhelmed by the thought that I was eating an unfertilised potential baby chicken.

Thereafter, every spoonful was a struggle, even though I knew I was being absurdly precious. After all, we Australians consume 18.9 million eggs a day. I looked it up, that's about 266 eggs for each Australian every year...and we barely give it a thought. But once you start that train it's very hard to stop it.

It struck me that we are the apex predator in the animal kingdom. But aside from the few species we have bred to become dependents – mainly dogs – every other creature on earth fears us. I reckon if we took the time to understand their language, they actually hate us. And who could blame them. We either eat them, cage them, or kill them. And if you doubt it, ask any Koala or kangaroo whose relatives have been ethnically cleansed or 'culled'. Birds fly away from us. Whales try to pretend we don't exist. It's deeply unnerving. Who wants to belong to the most hated and feared species on the planet?

It doesn't stop there. We even do the same things to ourselves. It seems we have this race memory that the other branches of the hominid tree were our competitors for the relatively scarce food, water and caves to shelter in. We're still at it; our tribes even invent angry gods who they say rule the entire multiverse...for eternity! We like to think we've come a long way towards understanding the world and the forces that coalesce to make it operate. We're living much longer and more comfortably than we did 100,000 years ago. We can fly guite safely in the air and in space. We can see further back than ever before. But we're only at the fringes of quantum mechanics; dark energy and dark matter confounds us, as does an accepted theory that combines gravity with the other forces at play. We're entranced by the concept of 'first cause'. But just because each one of us had a beginning – along with all the plants and creatures around us - it doesn't mean that the multiverse had one. The visible universe maybe - in what we call the Big Bang - but there's no more reason to posit a beginning to the larger entity than to accept that it always was.

That leaves us with a much more interesting challenge: how do we conduct ourselves to give a fair go to our Homo sapiens compatriots and our fellow sentient creatures? We have yet to find a formula that governs our behaviour towards each other. Just ask a battered wife, a brave Ukrainian or anyone in



The Scotland Letters – Dreams, Hopes, and Struggles – Author Talk:

Beverley Irving and Christine Greig will talk about their new book **Dear Uncle and Aunt: The Scotland Letters.**

This book presents a collection of 45 letters written between 1859 and 1872 by family members in Scotland to John and Elizabeth Waddell. These heartfelt letters, transcribed by Beverley Irving and Christine Greig, provide a unique window into the lives of those left behind, their hopes, dreams, and everyday struggles.

Beverley and Christine are both direct descendants of John and Elizabeth Waddell and their children who migrated from Scotland in 1838, and moved to Glenduart north of Moruya. Ultimately they settled in the Priory at Bingie.

When Ken Greig, John Waddell's great grandson, was asked by his sister to dispose of an old suitcase full of documents found at the family home, he decided to look at them before taking them to the tip. He sorted the letters and they were then passed onto his daughters Beverley and Barbara.

Beverley had always wanted to document them and asked Christine, another family member actively recording Greig/Waddell family history, to explore what might be done. Together they transcribed and edited the letters into this book which gives the reader a unique insight into what life was like when their forbears first came to Moruya in the mid 19th century and the concern that their relatives back home felt for them.

2026 Venice Biennale picks cancelled

The last issue of the MM included an article about Creative Australia announcing award-winning multidisciplinary artist Khaled Sabsabi and esteemed curator Michael Dagostino as the artistic team to represent Australia at the 61st International Art Exhibition – La Biennale di Venezia. Within days, The Board of Creative Australia "has made the unanimous decision not to proceed with the artistic team chosen for the Venice Biennale 2026. Creative Australia is an advocate for freedom of artistic expression and is not an adjudicator on the interpretation of art. However, the Board believes a prolonged and divisive debate about the 2026 selection outcome poses an unacceptable risk to public support for Australia's artistic community and

could undermine our goal of bringing Australians together through art and creativity. Creative Australia will be reviewing the selection

process for the Venice Biennale 2026." The National Association for the Visual Arts (NAVA) and its Board said they "are deeply alarmed by Creative Australia's decision to withdraw support for the selected Venice Biennale team of artist Khaled Sabsabi and curator Michael Dagostino. This intervention driven by political pressure and misrepresentation undermines the integrity of independent arms-length arts funding and threatens the essential role of artists in shaping critical dialogue and public discourse." The MEAA (Media Entertainment and Arts Alliance) said "Artistic and creative organisations across Australia must reaffirm their commitment to freedom of expression following a series of interventions over the past 12 months which have resulted in artists being silenced or sidelined.

The latest case of the cancellation of Lebanese-Australian artist Khaled Sabsabi as Australia's representative at the 2026 Venice Biennale continues a disturbing trend of political interference in the arts. The Media, Entertainment & Arts Alliance stands in solidarity with all Australians calling for the respectful treatment of all artists and the creative workforce and condemns political and industrial interference with rightful free speech and expression. "The arts and freedom of expression are closely

"The arts and freedom of expression are closely intertwined, and that relationship is essential to the creation of art in all its forms," said MEAA Chief Executive Erin Madeley.

Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

Moruya River.

Why is it that as soon as the weekend rolls around, the less than ideal weather decides to turn up, and I have to re-evaluate my fishing plans for the next few days! But let's see how accurate the weatherman is this weekend.

The river has been fishing well, with good numbers of flathead bream trevally and the odd whiting all being encountered this week.

The airport flats, back of the hole in the wall, quarry wharf and the bridge flats have been holding good numbers of fish. Soft plastics have been working well on the flats along with surface style lures for those chasing flathead, bream or whiting. While baits of nippers, prawns, whitebait or poddy mullet have been working the same species as well.

A rising tide has been the best time to chase the whiting and bream on the flats, with the run out tide a great time to try and ambush an ambush predator the humble flathead. Look for drop offs and drains that a flatty can hide in or even weed bed edges, they can lay alongside waiting for an unsuspecting prey source to come out of.

The upper part of the river has also seen some good action, with the hospital having some nice deep holes that will hold a myriad of species at times. Yarragee bend has a great mixture of deep holes, drop offs and flats sections that hold a good number of species. It is also a great place to burly up some poddy mullet for live baits, with good weed beds that hold a good population of them.

Tuross River.

Enough praise cannot be said for this estuarine system, being the only recreational haven along this price of coast, Tuross has benefited from this fact allowing it to become what it is today. Flathead, bream, whiting, Luderick, mulloway, trevally, salon and at time tailor all call this pristine bit of water home, allowing many anglers both young and old to enjoy our favourite pastime. The system is alive with activity at the moment, as we and the fish take full advantage of the warm ocean currents that are pushing down the coast. We still have a month or two before these currents retreat back up north and the water temp starts to plummet. Let's enjoy it while it lasts.

The lower sections of the system around potato point and the main boat ramp, to up past fourways have been producing all the usual suspects. Bream, whiting, flathead, mulloway and Luderick have all been reported this week.

The middle to upper sections have also been producing good numbers of fish as the warm waters push all the way up the back of the system.

Rock and beach.

Salmon, bream and whiting are still all being reported along the coastline from our beaches, with the odd bonito being taken from the local rock ledges as well. Moruya breakwall has been fishing ok, with salmon schools being encountered when the happen to swim past.

The weekend is looking a little less than ideal, with southerly winds always making beach or rock fishing sessions a little difficult. North facing headlands can make these conditions a bit more bearable how ever. **Offshore.**

As the warm currents continue to strongly push south, marlin should still be available along the temperature breaks that tend to hold the bait for the game crews. Snapper have been holding out deep, with the 50-60m marks a good place to start looking. Flathead are ever present in close, with 20-30m of water a good place to start looking.

The artificial reef in 40m of water between the breakwall and Broulee headland isn't a bad place to a have quick look also. Both the stock up on bait, and to see if there is a kingfish or snapper maybe lurking around.

The bait freezer has been restocked, with mullet fillet currently not available. We did receive a shipment of Hawksbury prawns this week finally, so come in and get yours before they sellout.

We did receive a big shipment from Shimano this week, so the shelves walls and reel cabinets, for the most part, are resupplied.

Stay safe everyone and remember, "Every day's a good day for fishing..."

Moruya Mail Batemans Bay Sailing Club Report Feb 8th

"It was a great morning to go sailing Saturday 8th, although later in the day conditions turned to ordinary and then scary. A good fleet of 6 boats went out. The five Division 1 boats were doing the annual Bengello Property Services Two Bays Race to South Broulee and North Broulee. In Division 2, Jack Egan's restored David Payne 5.5m trailerable yacht "Windswept" was sailing a course around Batemans Bay.

Race officer Terry Paton and his trusty sidekick Andrew Bain set a pin end favoured start line aboard the committee boat "Dave Magill". This novelty item had most of the skippers confused, leaving "Accolade" (Lachlan Brown) the only boat actually near the start line when the race started. The fleet then worked out of the bay into a moderate southerly breeze. Some boats were carrying small headsails. "Attitude" (Simon Byrne) had gone so far as to reef the mainsail. Soon all boats changed to their largest upwind sails as the breeze faded. "Wishful Thinking" (Simon Byrne) started off towards Broulee without leaving the Marine Park Middle Mark to starboard as per the Sailing Instructions but eventually realised something was amiss and did the required detour.

The breeze dropped out to less than 5 knots as the fleet approached Broulee Island. Beachgoers had plenty of time to see the boats slowly approach the South Broulee turning mark and head back around Broulee Island. "Moonmist" (Tony Sutton) overtook "Accolade" and led by around 3 minutes at South Broulee. The gap was only about 100m because the boats were moving at 1 knot. "Accolade" was able to drift closer then cut inside "Moonmist" at Pink Rocks to regain the lead while keeping a close eye on the depth sounder.

With the elapsed time ticking over 4 hours, the skippers all agreed to shorten the race to a finish at the North Broulee mark. "Accolade" took line honours by a narrow margin. "Moonmist" scored a comfortable victory on AMS. On PHS calculations "Sail La Vie" (John Drummond), which had caught right up to the other boats as the wind dropped, was the convincing winner. The fleet had a long motor back to Batemans Bay while thunderclouds were gathering. Approaching the Clyde River entrance there was pouring rain and lightning all around, something of a concern when piloting a vessel with a tall alloy mast.
