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### Moruya's free mental health service part of the plan to strengthen Medicare

Adults experiencing moderate to severe psychological distress, suicidal thoughts or mental health crisis can now access a range of support services at the new Moruya Medicare Mental Health Centre.

The centre was officially opened by Fiona Phillips (Member for Gilmore) and COORDINARE – South Eastern NSW PHN.

Fiona Phillips, Member for Gilmore said: "The new Moruya Medicare Mental Health Centre offers locals access to free, walk-in mental health care and support, close to home.

"Mental health is as important as physical health, and we are committed to all Australians getting the mental health support they need, wherever they live. Our Government is delivering whole of life mental health care and support with Kids Hubs (0 to 12 years), headspace (12 to 25 years), and adult Medicare Mental Health Centres (18 years plus)."

"I know how important having a free, safe mental health service is going to be for people in the Eurobodalla. Our Government is investing in Medicare Mental Health Centres, because having accessible and safe places to address mental health needs is essential to having a strong and healthy community.

"I want people to be able to access local health services free of charge, and I'm pleased that Moruya is joining the network of Medicare Mental Health Centres we're opening across the country."

Prudence Buist, CEO of CÓORDINARE, said: "Mental ill-health affects people from all walks of life. Many people in our region will experience a time when they need to reach out for support for themselves, a loved one or a friend. This service is free, and no appointment or referral is needed."

"This service is provided by a consortium, led by Grand Pacific Health in collaboration with consortium members: Directions Health, Katungul and The Family Place. Each organisation provides unique expertise that ensures this centre is resourced to welcome and support the whole community," said Ms Buist. People can access Medicare Mental Health Centres by calling the Head to Health line on 1800 595 212 and asking for support, or by visiting a centre – whichever you feel most comfortable with. The service will operate from Monday to Friday between 8.30am and 5pm (excluding public holidays).

"Sometimes finding the support you need can seem overwhelming. Rather than jumping straight into a service that may not suit you, it can be helpful to talk to someone who can guide you to the right service, based on your individual needs and goals – and that's what the mental health centre is designed to do," said Ms Buist

Adam Phillips, CEO of Grand Pacific Health said: "Moruya Medicare Mental Health Centre's multidisciplinary care team will work with you to find the right support for your needs. They will use their knowledge of the range of services available in your region to identify what support is best for you.

This could be via direct support available through Medicare Mental Health Centre Moruya, connecting with counselling, peer support, drug and alcohol counselling, or care navigation. If there is an external service that will better meet your needs, we will link you with them."

"Directions Health CEO Bronwyn Hendry said: "This centre is a welcome addition to the range of free, integrated services and programs we offer to individuals, family members and friends impacted by alcohol, tobacco and other drug use, mental health and other complex health issues."

Having a collaborative, skilled and community focussed mental health support service in Moruya will be an important step, providing the community with much needed clinical and non-clinical pathways and supports." 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### Batemans Bay Community Picnic connecting the community

Batemans Bay Community Picnic celebrated its second anniversary last Sunday in the park beside the Clyde River Bridge.

The free picnic has been running on the last Sunday of each month since February 2023 and is the brainchild of local woman, Ms Sofia Keady, who is a local Nutritionist working at Go Vita, Batemans Bay, as well as seeing clients privately.

Sofia said "Following the Covid lockdowns, I sensed a real need for an initiative that allowed people to connect and at the same time help the disadvantaged."

From very humble beginnings two years ago with about 40 people in attendance, the picnic now regularly attracts more than a hundred people from all walks of life and all ages.

Sofia said "People can bring a plate if they wish, but I can assure you no one leaves hungry and more often than not with an expansion to their friendship group. It's a totally non-judgemental gathering of people."

The initiative tackles head on the issue of loneliness in communities. Evidence points to the fact loneliness is as harmful or even more harmful than many traditional risk factors for poor health, including sedentary living, obesity, poor air quality, binge drinking and smoking.\*

It was only a few decades ago that large-scale social gatherings such as religious services on weekends, community barbecues or even date nights promoted social interaction.

In many ways, the advent of technology has exacerbated the issue of loneliness and has replaced the need to directly connect.

The Batemans Bay Community Picnic fits neatly into the well-researched

community guidelines to promote social connection, namely; 1. Promote awareness of the importance of social connection

- 2. Foster healthy social and emotional development
- 3. Make social connection a priority in policies and practices
- 4. Design environments for connection and invest in social events, activities, and programs
- 5. Improve accessibility and inclusion for all people
- 6. Measure and make progress towards improving social well-being\*

Volunteer Trish Evans helped out at the first picnic two years ago and now manages the kitchen. Her day starts at 7.00 am on the last Sunday of the month, cutting fruit and onions and preparing all foods for serving. She is very busy throughout, including the clean up at around 3.00pm.

Trish said 'It is a long day but a lovely day. I look forward to it, and it is great to catch up with the attendees from all walks of life as well as our tireless volunteers."

Joy Dillon lives across the road at Cooinda Retirement

Village and has been to all the picnics.

Joy said "It is a wonderful way to meet new people in the area as well as enjoy a great variety of food." Eurobodalla Shire Mayor, Mathew Hatcher and Councillors, Rob Pollock and Sharon Winslade were in attendance to mark the second anniversary. Mathew said "Initiatives like this are fantastic for bringing community together. It is great to see it going from strength to strength and celebrating this milestone." Batemans Bay Community Picnic founder and organiser Sofia Keady gave a moving tribute to all involved in the initiative and said "A huge shoutout to individuals, businesses, local groups, and organisations who support our cause. ## New Water Storage Dam cost blows out to \$150 Million

The new Southern Water Storage Dam being built by the Eurobodalla Shire Council just west of Bodalla has seen a major cost blow out, with the total price now heading to \$150 million.

The bad news was presented at yesterday's council meeting by infrastructure director Graham Attenborough, along with a request for council approval to get a new loan of \$40 million to cover the blow out.

The dam has been planned since 2003 with the aim of drought proofing the shire by storing water from the Tuross River. The first estimate, made in 2006, was \$36.3 million to build the dam, a number that has grown steadily as plans were drawn and new regulations were imposed by the NSW Government.

The cost was put at \$131.8 million when the construction contract was let in 2022, with around \$75 million coming from state and federal grants, and rest to be covered by water rates and loans.

With the extra \$40 million loan and today's \$150 million estimated total cost, water fund ratepayers will be on the hook for around \$75 million.

Cr Amber Schutz was at pains to point out that the loan funds are to be paid back over at least 30 years, spreading the load across generations.

Mr Attenborough said there are two main reasons behind the cost blow out – information provided by consultants in the planning stage that did not accurately determine the ground conditions and the imposition of new biodiversity offsets by the state government.

The contractor relied on the consultant's ground conditions advice and priced accordingly, but after construction commenced it became clear conditions were worse than described and much more work was required to build good foundations for the dam wall.

Biodiversity offset payments were originally quoted by the state government at \$3.4 million, but new regulations pushed that cost out to over \$31 million. Mr Attenborough said negotiations with the government have resulted in that cost being reduced, with talks to continue to seek greater savings. He also said other water supply capital works projects will be shelved to ease the burden on ratepayers.

Approval of the new \$40 million loan was recommended in an associated report as part of the council's quarterly financial review. It was not immediately adopted as council deferred the financial report to be dealt with at the March meeting.

## \$330 million Eurobodalla Regional Hospital begins to go up

A large mobile crane has arrived on site to support the construction of the new \$330 million Eurobodalla Regional Hospital.

The crane's arrival marks an important step in delivering a sustainable, modern and purpose-built hospital to support the needs of the Eurobodalla Shire community from Narooma to Batemans Bay.

With a maximum height of just over 70 metres, the crawler crane can lift up to 110 tonnes and will be used to carry a range of heavy building materials required for construction of the new hospital.

Unlike a traditional tower crane, which is fixed in place, a crawler crane moves on tracks, allowing greater flexibility around the building site.

The crawler crane will enable efficient access and movement of materials across the large footprint of the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital site.

Minister for Health, Ryan Park said "This is an exciting milestone for the Eurobodalla Regional Hospital project, bringing us one step closer to delivering a world-class hospital which will provide high-quality healthcare for generations to come.

"The Eurobodalla Regional Hospital project is a prime example of how the Minns Labor Government is investing in critical rural and regional health infrastructure to support growing communities.

"This \$300 million investment will deliver modern health infrastructure which will enable more complex clinical services to be delivered locally."

Member for Bega, Dr Michael Holland said "The arrival of the crane will further support the great progress being made on this important and much-needed level 4 hospital for the community.

"It represents our commitment to building modern, accessible healthcare services for the people of the Eurobodalla region.

"The name the crane competition is a great way to connect young people with the new hospital and I encourage all primary schools in the Eurobodalla to have a go at naming our new crawler crane."

Construction for the new hospital is progressing and expected to be completed in 2027.

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## Constance climate backflip alarming for the people of Gilmore

"Liberal candidate Andrew Constance's statement that the Coalition would drop the 2035 Paris climate targets if elected is alarming for Gilmore - an electorate where residents have increasingly made the switch to cleaner and more affordable renewable energy. Independent candidate for Gilmore, Kate Dezarnaulds said Mr Constance - who made the comments in a Sky news candidate's forum that she also participated in at Malua Bay - had previously been a strong supporter of climate action.

In August 2021 when he was NSW Transport Minister he openly criticised his Federal Liberal counterparts for a lack of leadership on climate action accusing some of underestimating the impacts of global warming on future generations and leaving the state to go it alone on reform.

"Back then he was telling us to 'forget the 2050 target we can get on with this now to generate jobs, to generate innovation'[i] now he is supporting nuclear power and suggesting we wind back targets," Dezarnaulds said.

Meanwhile Australia and Gilmore are rapidly moving towards a renewable energy future with households, local businesses and tradies leading the charge—installing solar, batteries, and electrifying homes and businesses.

The Opposition's and Mr Constance's nuclear proposal is just throwing uncertainty into the mix, raising concerns that if they win government, momentum could stall, investment could dry up, and jobs could be put at risk—all while taxpayer dollars are funnelled into a costly, decadeslong nuclear experiment. Household access to their solar energy could be curtailed to pay for nuclear.

Dezarnaulds, said we are already at the tipping point of the renewable energy transition, with 50% of energy generate by enable sources and one in three households already installed solar on their roofs. Cheaper and cleaner energy will provide local jobs in Gilmore into the future as Australia transitions away from fossil fuel powered energy

"Australia's constant backflips on emissions reduction policy have created uncertainty for decades. The energy sector doesn't need more of the same—it needs consistency. The people of Gilmore—our tradies, electricians, and small business owners—are already building the clean energy future, but they need confidence to keep investing, not a waiting game on nuclear. If the Opposition moves ahead with nuclear, billions could be wasted on feasibility studies while small businesses and families face rising power bills. We should be backing proven, immediate solutions like renewables and neighbourhood batteries that keep energy reliable, affordable, and jobs local," Kate

The renewable industry already employs over 30,000 Australians and could grow to 80,000 jobs by 2040 (1). In contrast, nuclear power takes at least 15 to 20 years to build (2), meaning no immediate job opportunities for electricians, installers, or energy workers.

### Who Really Benefits from Nuclear?

Critics argue that nuclear energy isn't about helping local businesses or tradies—it's about funnelling billions into large multinational corporations and limiting choices for households.

"Electrification could bring \$1.7 trillion in savings for Australian households by 2050\* but there is a risk that a focus on nuclear will prevent this cost of living dividend being realised," says Saul Griffith, founder of Rewiring Australia. [3]

Meanwhile, the UK's Hinkley Point C nuclear plant—often cited as an example for Australia—is now 14 years behind schedule and three times over budget (4), serving as a warning for policymakers. Even Australia's largest electricity provider, AGL, has ruled out nuclear, citing cost, regulation, and public opposition (5).

### We Don't Have 20 Years to Waste—Let's Back Available, Smart, Local Solutions

The nuclear debate isn't just about cost—it's about who pays the price and how long we have to wait. If the Opposition wins, nuclear wouldn't generate a single kilowatt of energy until the 2040s—too late to ease the cost-of-living crisis or meet Australia's urgent energy needs (6).to replace failing coal plants.

"This isn't just a delay—it's intergenerational inequity in action," said Dezarnaulds. "Young people will inherit higher energy costs, worsening climate impacts, and the economic burden of nuclear projects, while big corporations profit now."

The CSIRO's GenCost report found that nuclear is 1.5 to 2 times more expensive than renewables (7), meaning taxpayers foot the bill for feasibility studies while future generations pay for the delay. Meanwhile, renewables are already delivering—solar and wind now provide over 40% of Australia's electricity (8), and the industry, which employs 30,000 Australians, is projected to grow to 80,000 jobs by 2040 (1).

For Dezarnaulds, the choice is clear—supporting small businesses, lowering power bills, and backing local jobs should be the priority. "The people of Gilmore deserve an independent voice that fights for them—not for party politics or corporate interests. We need practical energy solutions that deliver cost savings and job security today, not decades into the future," she said. "With cost-of-living pressures rising, renewable jobs growing, and climate change accelerating, the question remains: Why shift focus to nuclear when the solutions are already here?"

### Constance replies on climate targets

Following an ABC report on Gilmore Candidate Andrew Constances' announcement, Mr Constance issued the following statement to the ABC:

"As I have previously said on a number of occasions, we must have a balanced energy transition to reduce emissions. A plan that includes renewables, gas and zero-emissions nuclear will give Australian households, businesses and industry consistent, cheaper and cleaner power. This is the same approach as many countries around the world including the United Kingdom. The Coalition position has been clearly articulated by Peter Dutton, that we will not be making the same mistakes as Labor, whose climate change and energy plan is failing on every metric after plucking an arbitrary political target out of thin air from Opposition. The fact is, no credible expert believes Labor is on track to deliver its 2030 target, and the Labor Government is hiding their 2035 target."



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## More bulk billing won't improve rural health outcomes

More bulk billing will place additional strain on a health workforce that is already stretched beyond breaking point in rural, regional and remote Australia.

The ALP and Liberal Party recently announced an increase to bulk billing but this will not improve rural health outcomes, said Dr Arn Sprogis, Chair of the **Tuross Head Progress Association's (THPA)** Health Subcommittee.

"The major parties are united in funding an increase to bulk billing. The THPA welcome this initiative but it doesn't go far enough or address maldistribution of Australia's healthcare workforce," Dr Sprogis said.

"This is a grab for city votes that comes at the expense of rural communities. It will exacerbate delays many patients already face in accessing GPs, nurses and primary care in the Far South Coast."

"While it is an improvement, it will not deliver on the THPA's demand of 100 per cent no cost for GP and primary care services for everyone in rural areas," Dr Sprogis said. The Australian Government Minister for Health and Aged Care, the Hon Mark Butler, has publicly acknowledged the unique challenges and disparities rural and remote communities face when accessing healthcare, including attracting and retaining health professionals to provide local primary care services.

In his response to the National Rural Health Alliance's petition to the House of Representatives calling for better healthcare for rural Australians, Minister Butler went on to state traditional models of GP service delivery may not work in all communities and that the primary issue for the rural health workforce is one of equitable distribution rather than undersupply.

"The Federal Health Minister has admitted that the bulk of the increase in GP numbers has occurred in major capital cities and metropolitan areas. Expanding bulk billing will only attract more medical professionals to city locations. Neither of the major parties have outlined how and when they will improve the health workforce's capacity, quality and distribution in rural, regional and remote areas," Dr Sprogis said.

"Australians living in rural communities should be able to access urgent care on the same day and routine care within two days. Delays in accessing essential care are putting the lives of people in our region at risk."

### **Tuross Beach Cleanup Gets Council Approval**

After intense lobbying by Tuross residents, the Eurobodalla Shire Council has agreed to remove the driftwood on One Tree Beach, the main swimming beach in the coastal village.

At yesterday's council meeting Mayor Mat Hatcher presented a petition from the community and a Mayoral Report recommending a cleanup.

The mayor told councillors the beach debris occurs naturally when driftwood washes down the Tuross River.

"At the moment, the high tide area of the beach is covered with woody debris and barely usable," he said.

Council's standard response to clean up requests has been "No", because driftwood generally clears naturally. Also, any clearing requires state government environmental approval and permits. But it has cleared One Tree Beach before, most recently in August 2022 at a cost of around \$10,000.

"Within three months of that cleanup, large storms resulted in even more debris on the beach," said the mayor.

Despite that history, council unanimously approved funds for a one-off clean up of Tuross Head main beach and removal of the driftwood debris. Quotes have been received for the work that is expected to take a contractor five days to complete.

To allow the cleanup to take place they will apply for environmental permits from the NSW Government as soon as possible.

And to save this headache in future, council will initiate discussions with state agencies, aiming to allow smaller, community-led cleanups without the need to seek formal permits.

## Appeal for information after steer was injured by arrow at Turlinjah - South Coast Police District

South Coast PD are appealing for information, after a young Holstein Friesian bull was struck in the face by an arrow on a rural property on the Princess Highway, Turlinjah, about 17km south of Moruya.

Police have been told the incident occurred sometime between 3pm Sunday 9 February and 6pm Monday 10 February 2025. This act of cruelty is not only deeply distressing but also completely unacceptable. We are urging anyone with information, no matter how small, to come forward.

South Coast Rural Crime Investigators and Moruya Police are currently investigating the incident and are encouraging other landholders to report any illegal hunting or unlawful trespassing they may be experiencing in the area.

Police are pleased to advise the bull has had the arrow successfully removed and is recovering well.

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### Government moves on mobile black spots

The **Federal Government** has announced a major world first reform to provide basic universal outdoor mobile coverage across Australia.

Labor's Universal Outdoor Mobile Obligation (UOMO) will require mobile carriers to provide access to mobile voice and SMS almost everywhere across Australia.

UOMO will ensure up to 5 million square kilometres of new competitive outdoor mobile coverage across Australia, including over 37,000 kilometres on regional roads.

Whether it's in national parks, hiking trails or out on the farm, outdoor coverage will be accessible almost anywhere where Australians can see the sky.

The Albanese Government's policy objectives are to: ·expand Triple Zero access for Australians across the nation; expand outdoor voice and SMS coverage into existing mobile black spots; and

improve the availability of mobile signals during disasters and power outages.

This reform is only possible due to the transformative global innovations in Low Earth Orbit Satellites (LEOSats), and the arrival of Direct to Device (D2D) technology, which enables signals from space direct to mobile devices.

The Government will consult and introduce legislation in 2025 to expand the universal service framework to incorporate mobile coverage for the first time.

Implementation of outdoor SMS and voice will be expected by late 2027, with many Australians likely to obtain access before then.

Basic mobile data will be considered in the future as technology roadmaps and capacity considerations develop.

The Government will work with stakeholders and industry to get the legislation right, including flexibility where warranted by supply, spectrum and other factors.

The Albanese Government will also engage with industry and examine incentives and removal of barriers to support public interest objectives and competition outcomes.

Only the Albanese Labor Government has a plan to build Australia's future, including delivering \$3 billion to complete the building of the fibre NBN.

With global industry expected to launch D2D messaging this year, the Government is moving to ensure this technology becomes an addition to a modernised and expanded voice Universal Service Obligation, including maintaining free access to Triple Zero.

To ensure consumers are informed about device compatibility and experience, the Government will work with industry and the University of Technology Sydney to expand handset testing.

The policy has been informed by engagement with the LEOSat working group, advice by the Australian Communications and Media Authority on radiocommunications spectrum, the findings of the Regional Telecommunications Review, and extensive feedback from regional and remote stakeholders and consumers about the need for multiple connectivity paths.

The Government remains committed and will continue to evolve its existing co-investment programs like the Mobile Black Spot Program and Mobile Network Hardening Program to expand terrestrial mobile coverage, resilience and capacity. Minister for Communications, the Hon Michelle Rowland MP said "Labor governments have a proven record of expanding universal access to essential services, and the Albanese Government is forging another step forward.

"The Universal Outdoor Mobile Obligation will improve public safety, increase resilience during natural disasters, and provide an extra layer of coverage in areas previously thought too difficult or costly to reach.

"The experience will be different to land mobile networks, but the benefits transformative, particularly for a large continent such as ours.

"Building our mobile future with the latest technology is a vital element of Labor's plan to make Australia the most connected continent by 2030.1

Further reforms to the longstanding universal services framework will be announced as the Government considers recommendations from the 2024 Regional Telecommunications Review.

**NSW Farmers President Xavier Martin** said the state's peak farm body had been calling for the expansion of the Universal Service Obligation to include mobile coverage for some time, as rural communities continued to experience deteriorating connectivity.

"People in the bush shouldn't have to be without mobile coverage when they're working on their farms, or travelling on the roads, and so it's our hope that these plans become reality," Mr Martin said.

If established, a Universal Outdoor Mobile Obligation would provide up to five million square kilometres of new mobile coverage by 2027, extending mobile service to almost 37,000 kilometres of rural roads.

While news of the commitment had been welcome, Mr Martin warned there was still a long road ahead to ensuring rural Australia had the connectivity it needs.

"We know the 3G shutdown has left many people disconnected or suffering with deteriorating coverage, and it will take both new technology, as well as expansion of existing networks, to fix our mobile coverage in rural areas," Mr Martin said.

There was great energy and enthusiasm from the 160 people who came. Carroll College High School band Polaroid played some great Rock and Roll. They supported a great line up of Satin Calli, the Sam Fletcher Band, Archie and Rod Slockee.

Two high school students made inspiring speeches. Hear these young people: "Most of us would have experienced the horrific fires 5 years ago, that took our homes, but also the homes of our precious wildlife. The world is experiencing rising sea levels and the sinking of islands, major changes in weather and seasonal patterns and our news is saturated with regular reports of natural disasters.

Many young people will be able to vote in the upcoming federal election, as well as future local and state elections, and our choices have power. We are the next generation that can make a difference. We have to be choosing people who we know will choose you and us over profit.

We need to engage with the evidence and consider our choices, the time we have left, and the consequences that will be. Let us continue to advocate for our planet and everyone's future." Alex King is from Eurobodalla Shire Council's sustainability team. She said, "the reason why I'm so obsessed with composting, apart from the keeping organic waste out of landfill, is turning discarded waste into a resource, reducing the amount of methane that enters the atmosphere and this makes it one of the most effective ways to reduce climate change."

Jack Egan of 350 Eurobodalla spoke of the coming federal election. He said we have "a choice between a future of worsening bushfires, floods and other climate catastrophes brought to us by the fossil fuel companies. Or a future of climate and nature recovery powered by abundant clean green renewable energies. Climate and environment groups across Gilmore and Eden-Monaro electorates have formed a loose alliance and are ramping up a coordinated campaign for the coming federal election. We are working hard to get climate and environmental facts into the front of voters' minds for when they vote."

Rock On creates a sense of hope for climate action and community connection for our next generation of young activists. Just like the torrential rain during last year's Rock On, crazy weather played a part. With two bands to come, the rain came crashing down, forcing a break while Smokey staff struggled successfully to put up a gazebo in front of the outdoor stage. Rock On thanks Monash Sustainable Development Institute Fire to Flourish Eurobodalla Community Team and the Eurobodalla Shire Council for their support. 

### Fire and Rescue drone sniffs out trouble

In a first for a NSW Government emergency services agency, Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) has launched the latest tool in its technological arsenal, a drone that can 'smell'. The FRNSW Aviation Unit and Hazardous Material teams are constantly looking to innovative ways to utilise the drone fleet, first formed in the aftermath of the Black Summer

Bushfires. The smelling capability of the new drone means crews can now use drones to detect potential threats in the air with firefighters able to maintain a safe distance and protect the

The drone was successfully deployed during last month's response to a major fire and chemical emergency at a waste recycling plant at St Marys in Sydney's west.

One of several drones deployed at the scene by firefighting crews, the smelling drone was able to analyse the smoke from the fire, identifying its chemical make-up and determining any potential risk to the public.

The drone also analysed the atmosphere around burning gas cylinders within the plant to determine potential air quality

This new drone can detect 12 different chemicals in the air including chlorine, carbon dioxide, and a range of flammable gases.

The drone can then provide live data and gas readings to Command Posts, the FRNSW Strategic Operations Centre at Alexandria, or to scientific support staff for analysis. FRNSW continue to find new and innovative ways to keep the

NSW community safe using their drone fleet.

Other drones in the FRNSW fleet can collect water samples for chemical testing, there are smaller drones able to enter buildings through small openings to search for trapped people or identify structural threats, and drones fitted with infra-red cameras which can assist during overnight search and rescue missions.

Drones were used extensively in the aftermath of the 2022 Northern Rivers floods, carrying out damage assessments over vital infrastructure and identifying debris for collection.

Fire and Rescue NSW Commissioner, Jeremy Fewtrell said, "The drone that can smells means we can assess dangerous environments quickly to keep our people and the community safe.

"Our crews are highly trained to deal with hazardous materials emergencies, but this type of drone means we don't have to risk anyone's safety when trying to identify potentially dangerous substances.

"When crews arrive at the scene of a fire, they can quickly get one of these drones airborne to determine the threat we're dealing with, and make crucial decisions based on immediate information.

"This is the latest in an ever-growing list of drone capabilities at Fire and Rescue NSW.'

### 100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society

### 28-02-1925

**There were registered in this State** last year 62,471 cars, 11,970 motor lorries and 20,112 motor cycles. The figures show an increase of 25,000 motor vehicles over the last year.

**The I. & S. C. S. N. Co.,** on Monday, received a cable advising that their new steamer, Bergalia, intended for the South Coast trade, left Suez on Wednesday last, en route from Glasgow to Sydney.

Owing to the abnormally high tides early on Monday morning the wharf presented quite a busy shipping appearance. The Illawarra Company's Narani was discharging her weekly cargo, while the dredges Latona and Antleon were lying alongside.

The old established butchery business in Mogo, recently owned by John O'Brien, has changed hands. Mr. Arthur Annetts is the purchaser. Mr. Annetts has lately gone into partnership with his brother, Mr. A. J. Annetts, general provider. Last week Mr. Harry Duncan, while conveying His Majesty's mails to Cobargo, had the misfortune to collide with another motorist on the Prince's Highway near Narooma. Had it not been for Mr. Duncan's usual carefulness on nearing blind corners, the accident might have been more serious. Mr. T. Mitchell, of the sawmill, very kindly placed his Dodge car at Harry's disposal, and the mails arrived at the scheduled hour. The time has arrived when the Shire must improve the roads at such blind corners.

**Mary Foreman,** of the Dwyer's Creek Public School, has been awarded an entrance into Wollongong High School.

**The local police** made a smart capture on Tuesday last. Two individuals posing as employees at Dorman, Long's quarry walked into a well-known business house in the morning and ordered goods which was supplied to them by an employee. The Latona is also dredging near the wharf so as to allow the boat to swing freely.

He could even remember a time back in the 1970's when the Acting Prime Minister, Doug Anthony, ran the country from a caravan on the North Coast of NSW while Malcolm Fraser took annual Christmas holidays.

These days it was a shuffle of diplomatic missions to Washington to advocate Australia's position on proposed USA tariffs.

He returned the Pearl Mango to the supermarket shelf.

He smiled at the likelihood of next summer's golden orange Kensington Pride Mango being name changed to the Trump Pride Mango.








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## Floating Through Calm Water at The BAS

### Julz Beresford Art exhibition:

Until 29 March

An exhibition of paintings by Julz Beresford is now on show at the Basil Sellers Exhibition Centre. The first regional gallery solo exhibition from

Dyarubbin/Hawkesbury-based contemporary artist, Beresford's paintings are emblematic of her lifelong affinity for the Hawkesbury region of New South Wales. An essential part of Beresford's practice is being present in the landscape, closely observing its natural rhythms and the vagaries of light and shadows through the day. The resulting paintings are awash with moody romanticism, sending the viewer on a voyage across glassy, rippling waterways that snake through a tangle of bush and tumbling sandstone. These shimmering pools are bound by epic escarpments crested with spindly, ethereal wisps of eucalyptus.

As an artist, Julz is drawn to the painterly tradition, focusing on the process of physically painting and where it takes her work. She is energetic and frantic as she works, the finished texture reveals this with her

thickly applied paint.

An essential part of Beresford's process is working 'en plein air', collecting gouache studies on location that inform the departure point of her studio-made paintings. Beresford paints 'alla prima', charging each painting with the same energy present in the landscapes she observes. Beresford's paintings are both an impression of landscapes, and an embodiment of how it feels to be there.

This process however is not only limited to mixing or pushing and the final application of the paint but the bigger' whole practice of being 'Plein air'. For Julz walking into or boating towards the destination all becomes part of the process. Her pre-sketches, drawings chosen subject, living it, breathing it and experiencing it in all weather.

Julz Beresford routinely exhibits across Australia. Her work is collected nationally and internationally. Beresford made her art fair debut at Sydney Contemporary 2024 and will present a major solo exhibition at the Basil Sellers Art Centre in early 2025. She has a Bachelor in Fine Arts from UNSW Bachelor of Art and Design and is represented by Michael Reid Sydney + Berlin.

### Faster internet for Gilmore with completion of \$480 million NBN upgrades

More than 12,000 households and businesses across Gilmore are benefiting from faster internet and increased data with the completion of the Albanese Government's \$480 million upgrades to NBN Co's Fixed Wireless and Satellite services.

Around 12,570 premises from Kiama to Moruya can now access broadband speeds of at least 100/20 Mbps. These increased speeds allow for smoother streaming, faster downloads and uploads, and stronger connections - even with multiple devices online at the same

The fixed wireless upgrades have already delivered increased average end user download speeds for households from around 48Mbps in 2022 to over 100 Mbps today.

Using the latest 4G and 5G wireless technology has also enabled an additional 120,000 premises around Australia to access fixed wireless for the first time.

Around 1640 premises in Gilmore have had their access technology changed from satellite to fixed wireless.

NBN Co has launched two faster speed tiers: around 90 per cent of premises in the fixed wireless footprint can now access speeds of up to 200-250 Mbps download. Around 80 per cent of premises can access speeds of up to 400 Mbps.

These upgraded services are helping to meet Australia's growing demand for data.

The average Australian household is using more than 450GB of data per month and around 22 connected devices. This is forecast to increase to 1 Terabyte and more than 40 devices by the end of the

In addition to fixed wireless upgrades, the program has also improved NBN's Sky Muster satellite service, which provides much-needed connectivity options for more than 200,000 households and businesses in regional and remote Australia.

Thanks to the Albanese Government, customers now have unlimited data through NBN Co's Sky Muster Plus Premium, providing download speeds of up to 100 Mbps.

The \$480 million upgrade complements the Albanese Government's nation-building investment to deliver a world-class NBN fibre network, backed by an additional \$3 billion equity investment.

Minister for Communications, the Hon Michelle Rowland MP said "Fast, reliable, affordable internet is an essential building block of any modern economy, boosting productivity, enabling innovation and creating jobs. "Families and businesses in our regions and suburbs should have equal access to the opportunities the NBN delivers. Labor founded the NBN on this principle.

"Faster, more reliable internet allows smoother streaming, faster downloads and uploads, and stronger connections - even with multiple devices online at the same time.

"It enables access to essential government services, banking and telehealth, and learning and working online.

"The completion of these upgrades demonstrates what can be done with a publicly-owned NBN Co.

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips MP said "All Australians deserve access to fast and reliable connectivity, no matter where they live or work, including people in regional areas like Gilmore," Mrs Phillips said. "These upgrades mean communities across the South Coast won't get left behind and will be able to enjoy the benefits that higher speed broadband brings.

"Stronger, reliable service is so important in our region, and underground infrastructure means the service will also be more resilient during times of future natural disasters.

Parliamentary inquiry finds nuclear is high risk, zero reward

### Climate Council

THE COALITION'S NUCLEAR SCHEME is high risk, zero reward—that's the clear takeaway from the interim findings of the federal inquiry into nuclear power generation in Australia. The committee's interim report confirms that nuclear energy is not a viable option to meet Australia's energy needs or climate commitments. The Climate Council, which appeared at the inquiry, said the inquiry's interim findings confirm what experts have long warned: nuclear reactors are too risky for Australia. Australians need action now to cut climate pollution and secure our energy future, not a nuclear fantasy that locks us into higher costs, worsening unnatural disasters, and decades of delay.

Amanda McKenzie, Climate Council CEO, said: "The climate crisis is here, now. Australians are already facing more unnatural disasters - record-breaking floods, deadly heatwaves and bushfires, and declining rainfall. In the 15 years that we would be waiting for a single watt of nuclear energy to enter the grid, our climate pollution would soar. "Every coal-fired power station in Australia will be closed before a single nuclear reactor could be built. Already, 40% of our national grid is powered by renewables, and experts have shown that we can power our economy 24/7 with renewables backed by storage and peaking generation, and we can do it well before a single nuclear reactor is online.

"Delaying action to slash climate pollution has real consequences. The catastrophic conditions that led to the Black Summer bushfires will become the average without sustained, urgent action.

"Nuclear reactors in the 2040s is a delay tactic. The consequence is 2 billion tonnes more climate pollution endangering our kids' future."

Greg Bourne, Climate Councillor and energy expert, said: "The numbers don't lie. Nuclear reactors are wildly expensive and painfully slow. The UK's flagship nuclear project is 14 years late and facing a \$60 billion cost blowout. Australians can't afford to waste tens of billions of dollars on a major energy project that delivers too little, too late.

"There's an explosion of misinformation and political spin, but here's the simple truth: not a single investor is lining up to build nuclear reactors in Australia. Meanwhile, investment in renewable power is surging ahead. In 2024, investment in batteries soared, with new energy storage commitments nearly matching new generation. A total of 4 gigawatts of storage was committed, equivalent to the output of around 2,000 wind turbines. Globally, ten times as much money is flowing into renewable power as into nuclear reactors."

"Renewable power is already delivering—cutting climate pollution, creating jobs, and keeping the lights on. Australia is at 40% renewables and on track for 82% renewable power in only five years. That will slash pollution and provide the energy security we need."







The river is fishing nicely at present, with good reports of flathead, bream, whiting and Trevally from throughout the length of the system. From the airport flats to all the way up past the Yarragee bend, there have been plenty of fish on offer. Live nippers or squirt worms have been the best live baits when chasing bream and whiting, while flathead will take most offerings of bait that happen to drift past them as they prepare for the cooler months ahead.

The Garlandtown flats are a great place to pump live nippers at the moment, squirt worms can be a bit harder to find however. Surface lures for the whiting, bream and even flathead have all been working well, with diving hard body lures accounting for some good numbers of bream and flathead. The soft plastics throwers are also getting into some nice flathead, bream and the odd estuary perch. For the guys chasing bass, I have heard a few reports that there have been some bigger fish caught low in the system, as the ready themselves for their winter spawn run in the brackish reaches of the river.

### **Tuross River.**

The prawns in Coila lake, while large, are very inconsistent at the moment. Visibility while wading is the major issue in actually seeing them to scoop net them. As we move closer towards the next dark phase, hopefully their activity will increase. By all rights, we should have prawns running all the way up untill Easter. Which should make for some good family fun for the holidays.

The lake proper has been fishing well, with the usual suspects all being encountered this past week.

The flats areas have been producing numbers of whiting, bream and flathead. While the oyster leases have been holding bream, estuary perch, and flathead underneath and around the margins.

The deeper channel sections have been holding Luderick, bream, flathead and the odd mulloway hiding for those willing to put the time and effort to chase the mighty mulloway.

#### Rock and Beach.

I did manage to get out for a session off one of my favourite ledges last Sunday to throw a few metals for an hour or so. I only saw a few small salmon follow my offerings with no hook ups. From all reports the size of the salmon on the beaches has dropped from the XOS 60-70cm models only a month ago, to a much smaller 30-40cm size range.

There are still some good bream and whiting in the corners of the beaches and the close gutters to be found. Live worms, Pipies or live nippers are all ideal baits when chasing these hard pulling surf fish. Light tackle will be required to detect the bites also. Try a 10'6" rod rated to 3-5kg and some light mono or braid on a 3000 sized reel. **Offshore.** 

Reports from offshore have been mixed, with a push of cold water showing up and slowing the bite down for those game crews looking for some action.

Closer in, the cooler current should have bought the snapper in a little closer, with the flathead an ever present option as well.

The bait freezer was restocked yesterday. I did manage to secure some more hawksbury prawns, with mullet fillet was again a no show. Everything else was in stock, and the freezer represent that.

The shop is slowly having a bit of a revamp, with stock finding news places on the walls. You may have to look in new places to find old favourites. Nothing too drastic, I promise.

The 20 knot nor'easter compelled most crews to set a #3 headsail. "Accolade" (Lachlan Brown) and "Attitude" (Simon Byrne) also had a reef in their mainsails. The course was triangle, windward return, triangle.

After an even start, most of the fleet followed the conventional wisdom and headed left on the work to the Chain Bay mark.
