

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# Council GM quits \$400k a year job after 30 months

The general manager at Eurobodalla Shire Council, Warwick Winn, has resigned, leaving his job worth around \$400,000 a year after just 30 months.

No reasons have been given for the resignation. Mr Winn has been on leave for at least the past three weeks. Council unanimously accepted his resignation and resolved on the steps now required to fill the position.

Mr Winn started at Eurobodalla Council in September 2022 after resigning from a \$455,000 position at Penrith Council.

A council spokesperson said Mayor Mathew Hatcher thanked Mr Winn "for his exemplary service to the organisation and the community since joining Council in November 2022."

"Councillors endorsed the appointment of Director of Finance and Corporate Services Stephanie Speedy as acting general manager until an interim general manager is found. The search for a permanent replacement will also start as soon as possible."

Mr Winn joined Eurobodalla Council in November 2022 and has had a long career in local government including general manager at Penrith, North Sydney and Manningham councils."

The news came after a special session of council yesterday (Tuesday 18 March). That session closed the longest ever meeting of the Eurobodalla Shire Council. It lasted three weeks, starting on Tuesday 25 February at 12.30pm. General manager Warwick Winn was not in his usual chair at the meeting, with mayor Mat Hatcher explaining he was absent on annual leave.

A confidential item dealing with a staff matter was the last item of business at the meeting on 25 February, and, for reasons not revealed to the public, the item was kept open and the meeting was adjourned, rather than being finally closed.

Council moved back into session to consider the confidential staff matter, that we now know to be Mr Winn's resignation, at 3pm on Tuesday 18 March, after which the meeting finally closed, three weeks after it began.

## Repurposing for Resilience Solar Reuse Centre reflects on first year



Just short of a year ago, the Repurposing for Resilience Solar Reuse Centre was officially opened at the Moruya Transfer Station. On Friday morning, supporters gathered at the Centre to hear about what the volunteer organisation is up to. This first of its kind initiative has already stopped 2466+ discarded solar panels from an early death in landfill resulting in fiscal savings to the Eurobodalla Shire Council and its constituents of \$24,660 [based on current panel disposal costs]. During this short time, the initiative has changed the way Industry looks at used panels and associated equipment, by assigning them with a real value. Panels are brought to the Centre by Installers and community members and taken through an inspection and testing regime for safety, then performance efficiency benchmarked against original manufacturing specifications. From here they are graded through a reuse or repurposing stream which either makes them available for resale with warranty, or uses them for other practical applications.

As a not-for-profit operation, all sales are invested back into the centre and the free and subsidised services it provides to the community including workshops to upskill.

The Centre has to date assisted over a dozen local households and businesses with solar and storage solutions using this repurposed equipment and over 150 members of the community with free assistance and advice through its volunteer electrical contractors attending on Friday mornings.

"Fridays get together with ESC executives, Councillors, waste and sustainability teams and neighbouring shires, was about more than just a cuppa" said founding member Lisa Cornthwaite. "I think it's a really overdue opportunity to reflect on the strides we've made share our vision for the future and explore ways we can collaborate to amplify and build on our successes."

"From here we want to find funding for a bespoke Industrial Materials Recovery plant which would serve the entire south coast and close the gap with sustainable waste management in our region" said Lisa.

The small team of volunteers have been busy attending events to fundraise this year and will be catering for Councils Earthhour event this coming Saturday at the Regional Botanical Gardens from the Community Access Solar Power trailer they built.

Duelling barbeques treated the crowd to traditional sausage sandwiches all the way through to kebabs, chicken satays, chicken feet and pork skewers.

The Eurobodalla Multicultural Group provided multiple tables of foods with a culinary world tour of the full range of cultures represented in the Shire.

Dance routines from around the world and in traditional costumes kept the crowd entertained along with the soulful songs from the Eurocapella Choir.

#### Why the South Coast (Shoalhaven, Eurobodalla and Bega Valley) needs a Local Energy Hub!

It's clear to me that our community needs a Local Energy Hub on the South Coast – a shopfront and on line website that community members can visit, staffed by local experts who can:

- provide trusted information and advice on helping households to reduce cost of living pressures by upgrading the energy efficiency of their homes, and
- financial and technical support to community energy groups to develop business cases so that they can secure available funding for community batteries and community solar farms.

Local community energy group, SHASA have tried unsuccessfully for nearly a decade, to see community scale renewables set up in the Eurobodalla. The South Coast would really benefit from a Local Energy Hub.

A Local Energy Hub would help our community to:

- Take up opportunities for household electrification & energy upgrades, such as rooftop solar, household batteries, electric vehicles and upgrades for cooking and heating systems - so that everyone can benefit from clean energy and reduce their power bills.
- Maximise opportunities for clean energy in agriculture, reducing onfarm power bills.
- Run our own community energy projects, such as mid-scale solar farms, driven and owned by local people, with local benefits, both employment and cheaper electricity

I urge readers to call on our Federal MPs, Fiona Phillips and Kristy McBain, to support a national network of local energy hubs, including one on the South Coast of NSW, to address these issues and help regional communities like ours to participate in and benefit from the energy transition.

## Make your own arrangements!" says ESC

Yet again, Araluen Road residents are to suffer the consequences of totally inadequate road maintenance by ESC. On Monday 10th March Araluen Road closed, and will remain closed for up to 3 months due to road rebuilding work, financed by nearly \$5m in Disaster Funding. Publicly, council continues to promote the pretence that the integrity of the road was compromised by the bushfires and subsequent floods.

In truth, these events exacerbated road failures that have been developing and worsening over many years, as any longterm resident will testify. The western half receives only one grade per year, regardless of the condition of the road pavement, blocked gutters/drainage pipes and cracked/crumbling/eroded edges. Residents west of the closure sites (25km, 28km & 31km) will be unable to access Moruya for any reason unless they travel via Araluen, Braidwood (via Majors' Ck Rd due to road closure), Batemans Bay, Moruya - a round trip of approximately 300km. Emergency services will have to come from the Braidwood, well over an hour away. Unlike previous closures, there are no fire trails to provide alternative access. I wrote to council asking what consideration would be given to residents having to access Moruya for work, school, appointments etc. Council response, "they will need to make

their own arrangements ....,.'

They can, "walk or cycle through the closure with guidance from contractors ....." I can only imagine my elderly neighbour cycling through a work site.

Perhaps those with work commitments could set up camp in the Council Chambers? I am aware that during previous closures, some residents paid for hotel

And the cherry on the top of council's 'who gives a flying flamingo' cake: Residents, "MAY arrange their own transport from the other side. Residents have made similar arrangements during

past closures." MAY we? Thanks for your permission!

#### Note to ESC:

- road closures in recent years have seen an emergence of theft and vandalism from outsiders taking advantage of our situation with law enforcement being a very distant and reluctant deterrent.
- in the past, there were alternative routes via fire trails. This time there isn't!
- at the 2nd landslide site, landowners bulldozed a detour through their own property (for residents only). They were abused, spat at and threatened by outsiders wanting access. Locks were cut, cameras trashed, a home broken into and trespasses found on a bushfire rebuild site.
- there are no secure parking sites near closures.

So no, residents are not prepared to leave vehicles unattended on either side of the closure, unless of course, council is willing to foot the bill for damaged, stolen or vandalised property?

For me personally, (luckily, I'm retired), I will be doing a weekly shop in Braidwood for supplies etc. To attend a medical appointment in early April I will have to go via Braidwood, Batemans Bay to Moruya and back - the same if I wish/need to visit family/friends/events or other appointments etc.

The question must be asked of ESC, has anyone considered the financial, occupational, emotional, social and psychological well-being of Araluen Road residents with this hard road closure, keeping in mind the cumulative impact of past closures which have cost some residents very dearly?

Of course, we must still continue to pay our rates with no compensation for the financial losses we incur or the road we cannot use.

And finally, the jewel in the crown of council correspondence,

"We appreciate your understanding." What an absurd presumption!

We do not understand why we must suffer the consequences of what can only be described as, ESC's wilful neglect of Araluen Road - council's only arterial road linking inland to the coast.

## International Women's Day celebrations

Brown Mt repairs receive \$1.6 million funding

The Albanese and Minns Labor Governments are investing a further \$1.6 million to support repairs on one of two remaining landslip sites on the Snowy Mountains Highway at Brown

This work follows seven of the nine landslip sites already repaired – with over \$8.6 million in joint disaster funding now committed to Brown Mountain repairs by the federal and state Labor governments since being elected.

This exceeds the \$4.06 million spent by the Liberal NSW state and Liberal federal governments between 2015 and 2022 – because Labor is serious about getting on with these critical repair works, and making this route more reliable for the thousands of motorists that use it every day. Repair work will start at the next landslip site today, and is expected to be completed by the end of June, weather permitting. Transport for NSW has appointed Piling & Concreting Australia (PCA) to carry out the work. PCA worked at two of the sites completed last year.

The work will involve installing soil nails to add strength to the slope before mesh and spray-on concrete are applied to help prevent erosion. A 300-metre section of road will be reduced to a single lane for the duration of the work with temporary barriers and traffic lights in place to manage traffic flow – with a reduced speed limit of 40 km/h to be implemented.

Existing traffic lights at the last landslip site to be repaired will also remain in place – with planning underway for this site, and work expected to begin later this year.

Motorists are advised to drive to the conditions, follow the directions of signs and traffic control, and allow an additional five minutes' travel time.

Member for Eden Monaro, Kristy McBain said: "As someone that drives up and down Brown Mountain several times a week, I know how frustrating the continual landslips, rockfalls and delays are – which is why we're getting on with this important repair work. "It's critical that we improve the reliability of Brown Mountain, and that's what I'm delivering."

Job seekers and employers will get the chance to mingle at a Community Services Jobs Drive in Moruya on Tuesday 25 March.

"Think of it as 'speed hiring'," says Council's employment projects officer, Amy Kovacs.

"Instead of the usual drawn-out application process, job seekers can make an impression with potential employers and apply for positions on the spot." An initiative of Eurobodalla Council's Employment Revolution project, the Jobs Drive will bring together 19 local employers from the health and community services sector who collectively have more than 100 job vacancies in the areas of aged care, hospitality, home care, housekeeping, entry level domestic care assistance and support work.

Ms Kovacs said the event would help demystify the job application process for job seekers.

"Applying for health sector jobs can be daunting. The Jobs Drive will help remove barriers for those who feel unqualified or intimidated."

Ms Kovacs said the Jobs Drive is a big win for local employers too.

"We want to help simplify and speed up the recruitment process. Employers with vacancies get to meet applicants directly and see if they're the right fit."

"Whether you're seeking part-time, casual, full-time, entry-level, or specialised work, come along – qualifications aren't required."

The Jobs Drive will be held at the Moruya Memorial RSL Hall, 11 Page Street, Moruya, on Tuesday 25 March from 10am to 12pm.

# FRRR seeks representatives for three advisory committees FRRR (Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal) is

FRRR (Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal) is currently seeking expressions of interest from suitably qualified people from remote, rural and regional Australia to sit on one of three bodies that advise the FRRR Board.

Two of the three are Program Advisory Committees seeking to refresh their membership and expand representation, while the third is a completely new Outback Advisory Board.

Natalie Egleton, FRRR CEO, said that each of these bodies plays a critical role in the effective governance of the nearly \$20 million that the Foundation, which is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year, awards annually.

"While our staff do very thorough and detailed initial assessments of applications, for the most part it is the Program Advisory Committees that recommend where our scarce funds are allocated. To ensure that we are directing grants where they are needed most, we have Program Advisory Committees comprising people with relevant lived experience sitting alongside FRRR Directors and our donor partners. Their insights and knowledge of the subject matter are critical to our decisions.

"Right now, we are seeking people with experience or interest in mental health and community wellbeing to join our In a Good Place Program Advisory Committee, and people with experience in climate and energy transitions to join our Community Led Climate Solutions advisory committee," Ms Egleton explained.

FRRR is also establishing an Outback Advisory Board, whose remit will be to advise the Board more broadly on issues and opportunities in remote and outback Australia.

"We have supported remote, rural and regional Australia for more than 25 years and it's become apparent that remote, very remote and outback Australia has specific challenges and needs. To ensure that our granting and capacity building support, and our advocacy, fully reflect this uniqueness, the Board has decided to appoint and Outback Advisory Board. Its remit will be to bring a national perspective, as well as local knowledge, to our granting programs, as well as to our advocacy activities, such as submissions to Senate inquiries and the development of policy and issues papers," Ms Egleton explained.

Detailed role descriptions, as well as Expression of Interest Forms are available on the Work With Us page on FRRR's website. EOIs close 5pm AEDT on Friday 11 April 2025.

Note, these roles are voluntary, but FRRR aims to have a diversity in membership, so the Foundation will consider supporting successful applicants to address barriers to participation in these primarily virtual meetings.

## Coalition commits to delivering on-water facility for Narooma Marine Rescue



An elected Dutton Coalition Government has committed to delivering an on-water facility for Narooma Marine Rescue. Liberal Candidate for Eden-Monaro, Jo van der Plaat, said this \$940,000 commitment for an on-water facility will be crucial for ensuring Narooma Marine Rescue's lifesaving and training capabilities.

"Marine Rescue is on-call 24 hours a day, 365 days a year," Mrs van der Plaat said.

"Our boating community can be confident that when they call for help, a professionally trained and equipped crew will be on deck to assist.

"This funding commitment, to be delivered by an elected Dutton Coalition Government, will mean faster response times and an improved rescue service, at Narooma, for mariners in distress.

"These upgrades will provide shelter, changerooms, standby facilities and importantly, space for recuperation and debrief or counselling, following a rescue.

"I want to thank everyone in our community who has helped me deliver this vital commitment for an on-water facility at Narooma Marine Rescue," Mrs van der Plaat concluded.

Senator for New South Wales, Dave Sharma, said that only by investing in Marine Rescue facilities, such as those committed to in Narooma, can we improve safety on our rivers, inlets and seas.

"We know that emergency and rescue services are critical for towns like Narooma and commitments such as today's announcement will lead to improved water safety and community wellbeing outcomes," said Senator Sharma.



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## Free online caravan safety workshop

Caravan owners across NSW can take advantage of a free caravan and towing safety workshop – from the comfort of their home. Transport for NSW will host the Caravan Safety Virtual Workshop as a Microsoft Teams livestream event from **7pm on Wednesday 26 March.** 

A Transport for NSW spokesperson said the workshop would provide useful advice for all caravan owners and finish with a question-and-answer session.

"Driving and towing educators, Tow-Ed, will deliver the content including information on safe towing, weight limits and electronic braking systems," the spokesperson said.

"The virtual workshop is designed to take some of the stress and confusion out of towing, especially for people who are new to caravanning.

"Tow-Ed will explain many of the abbreviations associated with caravanning and towing such as ATM, GVM and GCM, including what they are and how weights are calculated.

"The virtual workshop will focus on caravans but the information being delivered could also apply to towing boats, horse floats and car trailers."

As caravanning grows in popularity, so does the need to ensure caravans are operating safely.

"There have been many recorded crashes involving towed caravans on NSW roads. To lower your risk of being involved in a crash, the virtual workshop will offer advice on how to load and weigh your caravan and drive safely while towing one.

"Non-compliances will most likely affect your caravan insurance cover and if you don't comply with safe loading laws, you risk being fined."

The virtual safety workshop will feature a one-hour presentation followed by a half-hour question-and-answer session.



## It's Back to the Future at The Adelaide

It's back to the future at Moruya's Adelaide Hotel if plans for \$1.2 million extensions are approved by the Eurobodalla Shire Council.

Coming back will be a drive through bottle shop and 14 motel rooms on the top floor.

Many in Moruya will remember the days when publicans Bert Farnsworth and Bob Simpson worked the taps during the '80s and a drive through bottle shop was at the carpark end of the building while the top storey had a generous veranda and a bunch of simple rooms. That all changed when the Connaughton family took over and updated, renovated and modernised the building. The drive through and accommodation all went.

The new plans will see the building extended towards the carpark from the beer garden with the drive through at ground level and new rooms above.


After many years of sitting idle, the top floor restaurant area built by the Connaughtons will go and the whole floor will become motel style accommodation with an ensuite in each room. No more walking down the hall to the communal showers and toilets.

A new gambling area for pokies is also planned. Also likely to change is the exterior paintwork, with plans showing a change from today's cream to a charcoal grey colour.

The pub has seen many changes over the years, even immortalised in song by local lad Josh Cunningham of the Waifs in his song about Moruya, "Since I've Been Around".



Help shape the future of Cuttagee Bridge



Bega Valley Shire Council has engaged the services of GHD, a leading engineering and consulting firm, to partner with Council in delivering the Cuttagee Bridge Renewal project. An essential component of their work will be undertaking and delivering stakeholder engagement and consultation activities. GHD will bring their expertise in community engagement and infrastructure projects to ensure a comprehensive and inclusive consultation process regarding the three design options agreed between Transport for New South Wales and Bega Valley Council.

The Cuttagee Bridge is nearing the end of its practical life and is subject to weight and speed restrictions due to the deteriorating condition of its ageing timbers. Council is committed to ensuring the safety and functionality of this vital infrastructure and is seeking community input to help guide the decision-making process. The community engagement program ensures robust and meaningful consultation with the community and key stakeholders to guide decision making by both designers and Councillors, ensuring a productive working relationship with all interested and affected stakeholders.

Council has listened to concerns about the need to recognise the bridge's history and will work with the community to develop the appropriate design for future needs within the constraints of the funding deed.

The project engagement program includes three phases - Plan, Engage and Refine.

The first 'Plan' phase is a crucial step in the consultation process. It involves a Have Your Say short survey to gather pre-concept design and methodology information. While much of this has already been documented over previous years, this phase is the first step in the latest consultation process and aims to gather broad community feedback on various aspects of the bridge renewal project including design, construction and the effects on users with what will be a major disruption to the road network.

The second 'Engage' phase will consolidate all feedback and insights gathered from the survey and is essential in shaping the development of the concept design options. It will reflect the diverse perspectives of the community and ensure that the concept design options are reflective of the whole community's needs and preferences. The third 'Refine' phase will see three bridge concept designs developed and placed on public exhibition, enabling the wider community to make any further comment. The detailed feedback received through this round of engagement will be used to inform Council as it decides on the preferred option to progress to detailed design and construction.

Mayor Russell Fitzpatrick emphasised the importance of community involvement.

"We are engaging the community to help shape the design options based on their needs and ideas. We aim to raise awareness about the project, explain its purpose and benefits, and discuss any potential impacts through clear communication.

"We want to hear from a wide range of community members to ensure everyone has a voice in the planning process. "Building strong relationships is important, so we will maintain open communication and address community concerns. The feedback we gather will directly influence key design elements.

"This feedback will help Council understand the community's needs and concerns, ensuring the new bridge meets the needs and expectations of residents and road users," Mayor Fitzpatrick said.

"We have heard the community's concerns about recognising and respecting the bridge's heritage and history while meeting modern safety and functionality standards." The Cuttagee Bridge, located on the Tathra Bermagui Road is a crucial road link between Barragga and Bermagui, providing access to the Sapphire Coast.

It serves as an important bitumen-sealed alternative access to the Princes Highway, offering emergency services access to an increasing residential rural population.

"The road also forms an integral part of the tourist facility of this coastal shire, providing access to the popular Mimosa Rocks National Park," Mayor Fitzpatrick said.

Cuttagee Bridge was designed by the NSW Public Works Department in 1892. The bridge has been extended twice in response to shifting sands and suffered major flood damage in 1934 and again in 1974 and has been rebuilt and heavily modified from its original design.

In early 2024, Bega Valley Shire endorsed a plan to secure a long-term future for Cuttagee Bridge by formally accepting a \$15 million grant from the NSW Government's Regional Roads Fund to replace the existing bridge. The grant is intended to provide resilient, safe and high-quality road infrastructure and was gratefully accepted by Council.

Tenders for the lead design consultant recently closed and Council anticipates awarding this contract in April. For information on the Cuttagee Bridge renewal project and to complete the survey, please visit Council's website.










## 100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society



The Eurobodalla Shire has received a special grant of £150 for a new road through Pompey Point. The work will be commenced as soon as the survey has been completed.

The need of a tinsmith in Moruya has been long felt, but the want has now been supplied, through Mr. Squires opening up a business of this kind near Mr. Wallace's office in Vulcan St.

John Ward, the local skin buyer, wishes to bring to the notice of all rabbit trappers that during this hot weather an immense amount of damage is done by keeping dry skins tied in bundles or in bags. Skins thus kept soon go greasy, and lose weight, and greasy skins are of little value at present When the skins are taken off the bow they should be threaded on a wire or a tape so as to allow free passage of air between them.

The I.S.N. Co's steamer Narani is expected in on tomorrow (Saturday) morning's tide with another load of 120 tons of machinery for Dorman, Long's quarry at Pompey Point.

There passed away at her residence "Balmoral Villa," Moruya, on Thursday, a native of County Antrim, Ireland, in the person of Mrs. Mary Davis, wife of Mr. William Davis. ... The deceased came to Australia about 37 years ago and lived for some time in Moruya before taking up her residence in Bega, in which town she lived for some 16 years. When Pompey quarry opened here Mrs. Davis came with her husband, who is a stone mason, and settled at Mullenderree. She was taken suddenly ill on Monday and passed away early on Thursday morning. She is survived by a family of six - Cecil, schoolmaster at Nethercote, Peter at Hawkesbury, Maud and Ethel at Sydney, Muriel and Eric at Moruya.

Mr. Thomas Taylor, of Narooma, and formerly a member of the Eurobodalla Shire Council, who went to Bega to undergo an operation, died in the hospital there on Wednesday aged 77.

At the Dorman, Long quarry the ground is now being prepared for the erection of a steel building 150 feet long. This will be utilised for turning out the finished product. Water is "raced" through 2½ and 3in. pipes from the vicinity of Cameron's swamp to the quarry – about a mile distant, while motor pumps are used to convey the water to various sections on the face. The cranes at present in use are a 7-ton Derrick, with smaller ones of 3½ ton and 30 cwt. Pile-driving for the big wharf is being carried out by the Dredge Anteon, and the diver descends into the depths with his material for preparing the foundation. In all, 95 men are at present employed, and Mr. Gilmore, the manager, stated that in a short time that number would be very much increased.

## Southern NSW Local Health District a top performer in latest

## healthcare quarterly report

**Southern NSW Local Health District** is among the state's top performers for emergency department and planned surgery performance, despite treating a high number of critically unwell patients during the October to December 2024 guarter.

SNSWLHD Chief Executive Margaret Bennett praised the efforts of staff in providing high quality care to patients during the early summer period.

"This latest Bureau of Health Information Healthcare Quarterly report for October to December 2024 shows our District was among the state's top performers for key ED indicators including the percentage of patients starting their treatment on time, leaving the ED within four hours, time to transfer care from ambulance to hospital staff, and planned surgery wait times," Ms Bennett said.

"I want to extend my sincere gratitude to our dedicated staff members, as these impressive results are a testament to their hard work."

The District performed 1,287 planned surgeries during the last quarter of 2024, an increase of 4.3 per cent compared to the same quarter in 2023.

SNSWLHD had one of the best results in the state for the percentage of planned surgeries performed on time, with almost all patients, or 99.8 per cent, receiving their planned surgery on time. This includes 99.5 per cent of urgent planned surgeries, 99.8 per cent of semi-urgent planned surgeries, and 100 per cent of non-urgent surgeries performed on time.

During October to December 2024, there were more than 30,000 presentations to EDs across SNSWLHD. Of these there were 3,980 by patients with an imminently life-threatening condition (emergency or triage category 2), an increase of 5.6 per cent compared to the same quarter in 2023.

There were also 10,778 patients presenting with potentially life-threatening conditions (urgent or triage category 3), an 8.4 per cent increase when compared with the same quarter in 2023.

All patients are seen and triaged on arrival at the ED and, as always, the most seriously unwell patients are treated first. During busy times, people with less urgent conditions will experience longer wait times when there are large numbers of seriously unwell patients being prioritised for emergency care.

Despite the high demand, more than seven in 10 patients (76.5 per cent) started their treatment on time, which is better than the NSW average (65.3 per cent). The majority of patients (72 per cent) also left the ED within four hours of arriving, also better than the NSW average (56.6 per cent).

Almost all patients (95.1 per cent) were transferred from ambulance to ED staff within the 30-minute benchmark time, which is well above the NSW average (83.4 per cent). "Our staff have implemented a range of improvement strategies over the past 12-18 months to achieve these impressive results," Ms Bennett said.

"Strategies include daily huddles across all facilities, ongoing ED education programs to strengthen nursing triage protocols, regular reviews of clerical processes and systems, as well as management of discharges and delays. "The most important outcome of this work is that patients in Southern NSW are given the very best care, as quickly as possible."

SNSWLHD continues to remind everyone to support us by saving emergency departments and ambulances for saving lives. If an illness or injury is not serious or life-threatening, we encourage people to call Healthdirect Australia on 1800 022 222, for 24-hour telephone health advice.

#### **INDIVIDUAL HOSPITAL RESULTS**

At **Batemans Bay District Hospital** there were 3,018 ED attendances between October to December 2024. The majority of patients (81.3 per cent) started treatment on time, which is better than the average for hospitals of a similar size in NSW (76.5 per cent). Almost all patients (97.4 per cent) were transferred from paramedics to ED staff within the 30-minute benchmark. Batemans Bay District Hospital performed 92 planned surgery procedures during the quarter. All planned surgeries (100 per cent) were performed on time.

At **Moruya District Hospital** there were 3,485 ED attendances during the October to December 2024 quarter. More than seven in 10 patients (73 per cent) started their treatment on time, which is in line with the average for hospitals of a similar size in NSW (76.5 per cent). Almost all patients (96.5 per cent) were transferred from paramedics to the ED staff within the 30-minute benchmark. Moruya District Hospital performed 163 planned surgeries during the quarter, and almost all (98.7 per cent) were performed on time.

At **Goulburn Base Hospital** there were 5,824 ED attendances during the quarter. More than nine in 10 patients (90.3 per cent) were transferred from ambulance to ED staff within the 30-minute benchmark time, which is almost in line with the average for hospitals of a similar size in NSW (90.9 per cent). During the October to December 2024 quarter, 358 planned surgeries were performed and all (100 per cent) were performed on time.

At **Cooma Hospital** there were 2,737 ED attendances during the quarter. More than nine in 10 patients (93.5 per cent) started treatment on time, which is well above the average for hospitals of a similar size in NSW (76.5 per cent). Almost all patients (99.7 per cent) were transferred from ambulance to ED staff within the 30-minute benchmark, which is also better than the average for hospitals of a similar size in NSW (95.4 per cent). The majority of patients (82.2 per cent) left the ED within four hours, which is in line with the average for comparable hospitals in NSW (77.7 per cent).

There were 47 planned surgery procedures performed during the October to December 2024 quarter and all (100 per cent) were performed on time.

At **Queanbeyan Hospital** there were 6,832 ED attendances during the October to December 2024 quarter. More than eight in 10 patients (80.6 per cent) started treatment on time, which is better than the average for hospitals of a similar size in NSW (76.5 per cent). More than eight in 10 patients (81.6 per cent) left the ED within four hours of arriving – also better than the average for comparable hospitals in NSW (77.7 per cent). Almost all patients (98.3 per cent) were transferred from ambulance to ED staff within the 30-minute benchmark, also better than the average for hospitals of a similar size in NSW (95.4 per cent). There were 212 planned surgery procedures performed during the October to December 2024 quarter and all (100 per cent) were performed on time.

## Soundcheck for survival: Regional live music venues burnt out by industry struggles

Small live music venue operators across regional Australia face personal and financial strain as they work to keep their doors open and sustain thriving music cultures in their communities. A study by the University of South Australia has found that regional live music venue operators are experiencing stress and burnout as they face challenges with audience access and fairly paying performing artists.

It's estimated that in the four years since the COVID-19 pandemic arrived, Australia has lost more than 1300 live music venues and stages due to a steep increase in public liability costs and rising rent and energy prices.

This is coupled with the current cost-of-living crisis that has severely impacted venues' bottom line and altered the spending habits of audiences, slowing both ticket and bar sales.

While there has been high-profile media attention recently about the closure of several metropolitan venues, less attention is paid to small live music venues in country towns.

Researcher Dr Rosie Roberts, along with Dr Sam Whiting of RMIT University, interviewed almost a dozen venue operators from regional South Australia in 2020-21 as part of a larger research project that informed the State Government's Live Music Support Package. Dr Roberts, a member of UniSA's Creative People, Products and Places Research Centre, says live music venues in regional areas often involve high levels of volunteer labour, investing a lot of time for little financial gain.

"Many venue operators are undertaking a significant amount of the labour that's involved for free, because they're driven by a desire to develop and sustain a music culture in their region," she says. "The people we interviewed often described feelings of burnout and exhaustion and said they were the last to get paid, if paid at all, once they had ensured that the musicians were appropriately compensated.

"This can produce a churning cycle of music events which is difficult to sustain as operators become tired and need to step away. It's very difficult to keep operations going in the medium to long term and this can fracture the development of regional music and produce short-term pockets of activity."

Regional venues face unique challenges due to the smaller resident populations which then limit the size of bands playing, the frequency of shows and the amount that can be paid to musicians. The costs associated with travel and transport are also an issue.

While regulatory issues such as licensing and noise are often the main challenges for city-based live music venues, the issues faced by regional areas are different, Dr Roberts says.

"Regional venues face issues with accessibility and affordability of high-quality acts that attract audiences, as well as encouraging audiences to regularly attend and spend the money required to sustain such gigs, especially in the context of rising cost of living pressures," she says.

The research study found that despite having different needs to metropolitan venues, regional venue operators often experience a lack of a voice in decision making around music policy.

Dr Roberts says solutions could include localised approaches such as continued town or regional art strategies, music feedback forums that connect city-based policy makers with regional stakeholders and the development of a regional live music policy. She also suggests the appointment of regional live music officers, and dedicated funding schemes for small and medium sized venues in regional areas.

"Regional live music venues perform a critical function for their communities because they provide spaces of sociality, belonging, education and skill development, so it's important we provide a healthy and sustainable live music scene for our regional centres and towns." Dr Roberts says.

"Small live music venues are where emerging musicians first engage in music making, yet they also continue their connection with the regions throughout their lives. This makes them vital to an artist's development both creatively and professionally."



## Full house at best selling author talks

It was standing room only at the regular 'Author Talk' sessions at Narooma and Batemans Bay Libraries last Monday to listen to best selling author, Nicole Alexander, promote her latest work 'The Limestone Road'.

Nicole read from her historical fiction and answered questions in a wide ranging and well researched interview by library staff, Janelle Smith and Kathryn McCarthy before taking audience questions.

As a fourth-generation grazier, Nicole draws heavily on her families long tenure with the land (1893-2020) north-west of Moree in her writing.

Her debut novel 'The Bark Cutters' was shortlisted for an Australian Book Industry Award and in 2012 she was named Barton Woman of the Year (NSW Woman of the Year Awards) for services to literature, the promotion of outback Australia and for providing a strong role model for female rural professionals.

Compelling narratives, vivid landscapes and intricate research are the hallmarks of Nicole Alexander's best selling historical novels. Extensive research underpins her writing. She has walked parts of the Strzelecki Desert, roamed Kakadu National Park tracing the steps of the famous frontiersman and buffalo hunter, Carl Warburton.

'Limestone Road' is set in the summer of 1944 with the returning soldiers Canning Christie and his father, Michael arriving in South Australia from the deserts of North Africa. Canning carries the trauma of war and a fractured memory of a terrible event; while Michael resumes his womanising ways, intent on concealing his own secret wound.

The historical fiction novel is a stirring narrative about one soldier's courageous journey 'home'. It is a story of resilience, love, and the enduring power of dreams, expertly interwoven with historical detail and emotional depth. It is a novel that will resonate long after reading.







## Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

#### Moruya River.

As the weeks quickly creep along, and we move closer to the cooler weather starting to set in, summer still has its grips securely on us at the moment. With a string of 30+ deg days and sunny skies, the weekend is looking good. Right up u till the change that is forecast for Sunday, where we drop to 25 deg and some southerlies.

Flathead, bream, whiting and Trevally activity is all high at the moment with the warm 22-23 deg waters that are still pushing down the coast. I managed to get out behind the hole in the wall last Wednesday to throw some of the new Panic Station Mullet, these things are so realistic I had a 5" flathead trying to eat the 4" mullet I was throwing. As Graham has also found out, a stinger hook set up on the back of the lure will help with short strikes that miss the front treble position.

I am going for a bass fish tomorrow, and am going to throw a 4" Panic Station around and see how that goes. I am definitely going to reposition the under slung treble to on top, so as to reduce the snag rate. I'll keep you posted.

#### **Tuross River.**

For those who haven't heard, Baxter one of our weekend sales staff, managed to win last weekends Tuross Bream & Flathead competition with a 44cm Bream and 70cm flathead. We are super proud of his efforts in taking out the major prize against over 200 anglers.

There have been some nice flathead, bream and whiting taken from all over the system this week, as the weather and water temps stay high. Any shallow sand flat will hold whiting, with the lower areas towards the front of the system being better. The flathead are spread throughout the entire system, so there are plenty of areas to explore the same can be said for the local Tuross bream population, with masses of weed beds, sand flats and oyster racks to explore and protect.

#### Rock and Beach.

The NE winds we have this last week, have made fishing the beaches and headlands a bit more difficult. But for those that have persisted, Salmon, bream, whiting have all been on the cards. The Moruya breakwall has calmed down swell wise, and there are some good trevally and salmon liking around to be caught.

#### Offshore.

Given I haven't been in the store to chat with you all, I am unaware of what has been happening on both the inshore or offshore grounds this week. If you have any reports of what you have been catching, leave them below in the comments for everyone to see. If you haven't checked out the Panic Stations Mullet yet, what are you waiting for!!? The 4" & 5" will be perfect for the local estuaries if you want to target flathead and mulloway, with the 6" better suited to Snapper or Kingfish offshore, or XOS flathead in the estuaries. Stay safe everyone and remember, " Every day's a good day for fishing..."
