### Centenary of foundation stones for Sydney Harbour Bridge



### Friends of Moruya Quarry Park reports:

100 years ago a ceremony was held to 'lay' the foundation stone in the southern abutment of the Sydney Harbour Bridge.

The two-and-a-half-ton block of granite measured 6 feet by 3 and a half feet before being shaped, polished and inscribed at the Moruya Quarry and then shipped to Sydney on the Illawarra Company's boat 'Narani'.

The ceremony took place at Dawes Point with the Minister for Works and Railways, Richard Ball, laying the stone - not actually in its final place in the bridge but near where the proposed abutment tower was to stand.

Two stones were prepared – the other was to be laid by Sir Dudley De Chair but due to a shortage of skilled stonemasons in Moruya at the time, the second stone didn't arrive in Sydney until the 10th of August 1925.

Four days later, in a "low-key" affair, another ceremony was held. This stone was placed on top of the other stone and encased in a protective wooden crate until such time they would be set in place which wasn't until June 1927.

Both stones sit in the south-eastern corner of the southern abutment tower – one on top of the other.

# Moruya Mail The 'long walk' - in the footsteps of shipwreck survivors

A Long Walk to Sydney Denis Nagle is on a long walk from Gippsland to Sydney. The 68 years old started at 90 Mile Beach and aims to end the walk at Wattamolla Beach near Sydney, following in the footsteps of 18th century shipwrecked sailors from the Sydney Cove, of which only a few survived.

Denis became aware of the story of the wreck of the 'Sydney Cove' just 18 months ago, after reading a novel based on the story -Preservation by Jock Serong. The Sydney Cove was shipwrecked on Preservation Island in Bass Strait in 1796 and 17 of the crew set out to get help from Port Jackson. They were then shipwrecked a second time somewhere on the Ninety Mile Beach.

Denis, who has a local relatives, brother Bill Nagle and Marie Zuvich, only guite recently learnt of the monument 'Our Friends' that is on the Moruya riverbank near the bridge. The monument commemorates the local indigenous people who assisted the shipwrecked sailors walking to Sydney in 1797.

After a trip to Flinders Island, Denis learnt more about the wreck and the 'Long Walk' at the museum there and at the Launceston Museum, "I also have read Mark

Mckenna's account of the story from his book 'From the Edge" said Denis.

"So, in September last year I set out on the first of my staged walks starting from Woodside on the Ninety Mile Beach and walked to Lakes Entrance then to Cape Conran then Mallacoota, Eden, Tathra and Mystery Bay."




Take each stage separately, Denis passed through the Eurobodalla last week. After visiting the sign in Moruya, Denis crossed the Moruya River with a paddleboard with help from Marie and brother Bill, referencing the help given by the local indigenous people to the original sailors on 'the long walk.'

Setting off from Mossy Point last Sunday Denis was once again helped by brother Bill to cross the Tomaga River to Tomakin by paddleboard. That evening, Denis was ferried across the Clyde by Michael Lawrence Taylor, where he walked on to the Shoalhaven.

As part of the Walk, Denis is raising funds for the Orange Sky campaign 'Walk The Walk 2025' Orange Sky is a non-profit organisation providing free mobile laundry and shower services to people experiencing homelessness.

### Moruya Business Chamber - Presentation in support for Batemans Bay Masterplan Rob Pollock, President Moruya Business Chamber, Local Real Estate agents are frustrated that rural land needs presentation to ESC March 25 Meeting.

The Moruya Business Chamber understands that the Masterplan will be runout firstly for Batemans Bay then other major centres in Moruya and Narooma. We also understand that the LEP/DCP will be worked on to reflect the masterplan.

ESC doesn't have large businesses in this Shire. Moruya will have the two biggest employer groups, Eurobodalla Shire Council and the New Regional Hospital.

90 % of businesses in our region are owner operators with a small workforce of less than 10 employees, so it is vitally important that we look after them and we need investment and growth. Small Businesses are doing it tough and they are very reliant on tourism from our closest major Cities

Canberra/Wollongong/Sydney/Melbourne.

Businesses and the community are happy that the ESC has not had the rate hikes which our neighbours have had. We are happy that there is now a financial officer at ESC and our finances are more transparent and seems to be heading in a better direction. We now need an investment strategy that will work and bring larger investors. A Masterplan is needed to bring clarity to future investment that will help small business and allow existing businesses to remain viable in an area with no Major Businesses at present.

I represent Moruya and was born here at MDH. Our community is growing older and we are attracting many Baby Boomers of my generation. All of our CBDs need investment and allowances for multiple level development. Our town Moruya has just one motel in the CBD area and are in desperate need of more short- term accommodation in the CBD. Moruya is in a crisis for housing at present and urgent housing development needed. A Masterplan for Moruya must be worked on to prepare for the New Regional Hospital opening. There are some people who just don't want development but you can't have a Major health Facility without the housing required for the staff to operate the facility. Can't have you cake and eat it!

Masterplan can't be just aspirational and a wishy washy statement, it needs to seriously attract investors to our CBDs and townships to create accommodation both short and long term. Our aging population need somewhere to live. We have not enough jobs for our youth, this is reflected in the age dependency ratio which puts our Shire at 557th out of the 563 Shire in the entire Nation. This needs addressing and the bold decisions with regard to investment need to be made to have a more balanced demographic.

rezoning to allow more housing within the 2-3 klm radius minimum of the CBD area.

We seriously need to look at increased height levels for our CBDs to make investment possible. No one complains when we have multilevel Hospitals-Centrelink buildings but we will need Multi level buildings in our CBDs to house the population and maintain a strong CBD area in our townships that will help maintain our existing small businesses and the services we all require. We have a fantastic waterway at Moruya that has no river board walk or bicycle track, no separate entry for powered water ski craft along the riverbank .We don't even have signage for the ESC greatest car park heading south for Caravans or RV's.

With a By Pass planned for Moruya a Masterplan for future investors must happen ASAP and we recommend that the Batemans Bay plan be acted on guickly so our other townships can move forward with clarity. Moruya Business Chamber asks that we need the next MASTERPLAN acted on or in conjunction with Narooma, but with the New Hospital is on its way and the By Pass, these two things will change our town, and clarity is desperately needed now.

# Skyscrapers a key part of New Batemans Bay Masterplan

New areas of highrise buildings will change the face of Batemans Bay.

High rise buildings up to 100 metres tall (around 35 floors) and increased commercial activity are the key elements in the draft masterplan for the Batemans Bay CBD about to be put out for public comment by the Eurobodalla Shire Council. The decision to go ahead and exhibit the draft plan was made at the council meeting in Moruya on Tuesday afternoon. The plan looks at the expected development of the Bay up to 2100.

Increasing the height of buildings is the standout item in the plan, with two 100 metre skyscrapers flanking the highway at the southern end of the bridge. A cluster of highrise up to 100 metres tall is slated for the old bowling club site opposite the Bay Pavilions. Another group of highrise, also up to 100 metres, is planned around the Soldiers Club, both on the waterfront and near the Water Gardens.

While councillors all seemed to welcome the move to have a masterplan for the Bay there was debate at the council meeting on the need for buildings that tall. Cr Turner pointed out that a building 100 metres high is bigger than any current

building in Wollongong and is just shy of the tallest building in Canberra. Moruya Business Chamber president Rob Pollock spoke at the public forum and congratulated council on the master plan process and asked plans be immediately

prepared for Moruya and Narooma as well. He told the council the new hospital will bring a growth spurt to Moruya and place

increased stress on housing. He suggested increased building height limits should also be part of Moruya's future to make sure the CBD of Moruya stays focused and is not broken up by a satellite commercial development, as happened 20 years ago in Batemans Bay with the building of the Stocklands shopping mall.

Council will commence a public awareness campaign and ask for public submissions on the draft plan from 14 April.

# Federal Budget 2025 Statement

Our best defence against global pressures is a stronger economy, and that's what we are building in this Budget.

We're building a Future Made in Australia – creating jobs and opportunity for generations of Australians as we continue the work of making our country an indispensable part of the global net zero transformation. We are also backing hardworking local businesses by investing \$20 million to encourage consumers to buy Australian made products through the Buy Australian campaign.

The world has thrown a lot of challenges at Australia over the past few years. It's clear the rules that underpinned global economic engagement for more than 40 years are being rewritten. ### A few reactions to the Budget

**ALGA -** Australia's councils have been let down with no new local government programs announced in tonight's 2025-26 Federal Budget.

ALGA President Mayor Matt Burnett said a recent Parliamentary inquiry <u>report</u> confirmed many councils were at breaking point, after years of delivering more vital services to communities with less funding.

"Increased funding to councils supports the delivery of free and low-cost facilities like local parks, events and libraries - which benefit our communities in this cost-ofliving crisis."

Mayor Burnett said councils are calling on all parties and candidates to put our communities first and provide significantly increased funding to local government.

**National Rural Health Alliance -** The Federal Budget for 2025-26 is a mixed bag for rural, regional and remote Australia in terms of funding for healthcare. While certain aspects of the budget benefit rural populations, there is a lack of a targeted strategy to address the unique health challenges these communities face.

**NSW Farmers -** Farmers must not be left without the funding needed to put Aussie grown food on tables, NSW Farmers has warned as the Albanese Government delivers its latest federal budget.

Poor infrastructure, telecommunications and biosecurity are just some of the challenges farmers will be left to face alone if federal funding is not increased, NSW Farmers President Xavier Martin said.

**The Climate Council -** Australians are footing a <u>\$13.5</u> <u>billion bill</u> for worsening extreme weather fuelled by climate pollution, which underscores why we should be spending more on permanent solutions that better protect Australians, the Climate Council said in response to this evening's Federal Budget. Climate Council CEO, Amanda McKenzie, said: "Australians are concerned about bot<u>h</u> the rising costs of living and escalating costs of unnatural disasters driven by climate pollution from coal, oil and gas.

### ACOSS

ACOSS CEO, Dr Cassandra Goldie said: "We always knew this was going to be an election budget. We're astounded that the centrepiece of tonight's budget is more dollars for everyone except those with the least.

"In the face of a serious cost-of-living crisis and overwhelming evidence to fix JobSeeker, to give \$7b in tax cuts and do nothing to lift people out of poverty is simply shocking."

**Everybody's Home -** National housing campaign Everybody's Home has acknowledged the federal government's housing measures in tonight's budget but warns they fail to tackle the scale of the crisis. With housing stress and homelessness deepening as sky-high rents continue to price Australians out, Everybody's Home is urging all parties to deliver bold, ambitious commitments ahead of the election.

Spokesperson Maiy Azize said: "This federal budget has measures that may make housing more affordable for a small number of people but it doesn't deliver solutions that will make housing more affordable for everybody.

# ClubGrants fund SHASA to create 8th bushfire and heatwave haven in Eurobodalla

\$168,667 is being provided for an upgrade to the Southern Life Church Hall used by the Southcoast Health and Sustainability Alliance (SHASA) to help the hall serve as a heatwave and bushfire haven during extreme weather. This is the 8th heatwave and bushfire haven established by SHASA in the Eurobodalla.

Kathryn Maxwell, President of SHASA said "we are so delighted to receive this grant.

It will have a large solar array. Not only will it be a haven in extreme weather events, it will significantly cut the electricity costs of running the facility."

"This is a large facility which will be open to the community and is well known to vulnerable members of the community because they run a food bank known as "The Pantry" said Kathryn.

The funds will utilise local contractors to complete the project. A total of 37 projects will receive support in this second round of the program for the 2024/25 financial year, building on the \$6.44 million delivered to fund 46 projects in July 2024. The Infrastructure Grants Program is made possible by ClubGrants Category 3, a fund which directs profits from registered clubs' gaming machines into community projects, while clubs receive a tax concession in return.

Since 2013, more than 880 community projects have been awarded \$152 million under the funding program. Dr Michael Holland Member for Bega said "congratulations to SHASA. I look forward to seeing your completed infrastructure works and the impact it has on the community."

### Major overhaul of supermarket sector needed

An investigation by Australia's competition watchdog has found the future of locally-grown fruit and vegetables is under threat unless major changes are made to the nation's supermarket giants.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) released its final report into the nation's major supermarkets, finding they increased their average product margins over the past five financial years and appeared among the most profitable supermarket businesses globally.

The report recommended greater price transparency, a stronger Food and Grocery Code, and more fairness for farmers. NSW Farmers Vice President Bec Reardon said many farmers felt vindicated by the findings after decades of pain from the nation's powerful supermarkets.

"Farmers have seen prices go up at the checkout and come down at the farmgate, and our major supermarkets can no longer hide behind excuses for their disgustingly huge profits," Mrs Reardon said.

"These giants are world-leader on profits, which ultimately come from shoppers' pockets and farmers' incomes. Unfair behaviour is behind these super profits, and it's pushing the people that grow our food out of business at a rate we've never seen before. "With a third of vegetable grouper thinking about leaving the

"With a third of vegetable growers thinking about leaving the industry, who is going to grow the food to feed Aussie families when all our farmers are forced out of business?"

A crackdown on unfair behaviour within the grocery sector was long overdue, Mrs Reardon said, with the Australian Government urged to take swift action.

"Everywhere you look the cost of living is a major issue and I heard this week that food charities are now seeing doubleincome families turn to them for help. Politicians must act on this report, and fast," Mrs Reardon said.

"If we really want to change the culture of our supermarket sector for good, then we need price transparency systems – as well as divestiture powers to break up these giants when they misbehave. "

# FRRR awards grants to more than 80 community groups and NFPs

More than 80 community groups across remote, rural and regional Australia are sharing \$827,253 in grants thanks to FRRR's flagship grants program, <u>Strengthening Rural Communities (SRC)</u>. The funding will be used by grassroots not-for-profit organisations (NFPs) for a wide range of initiatives that celebrate, strengthen and support their rural communities to be more vibrant, resilient, sustainable places to live.

For the Eurobodalla, Relationships Australia Canberra and Region Incorporated's "Gardening & Healthy Living - Youth Mental Health Initiative" has been granted \$8,000 to deliver food education and gardening workshops for young people and a "bush tucker" garden developed with local Indigenous services in Narooma.

Eurobodalla Shire Council has been granted \$10,000 for the "**Our Generation - Fit to Flouris**h" program in Moruya. To connect socially isolated First Nations young people with a ten-week cultural and personal development program.

The full list of grant recipients is available on FRRR's website. Jill Karena, Head of Granting at FRRR, said the SRC team is continually inspired by the strength and resilience of the NFPs dedicated to helping remote, rural and regional communities thrive. "After supporting communities impacted by disasters for the past 25 years, we also know just how important flexible recovery and preparedness funding is, Because communities' needs change over time. By using a medium to long-term recovery lens, we're able to support projects that strengthen the social fabric of a community through preparedness, capacity and resilience-building activities. "Although it's been five years since the 2019/2020 bushfires, the Eurobodalla community in NSW is still healing. Our Prepare & Recover grants allow us to continue supporting places like Eurobodalla, when other funders have moved on. This round, we've granted \$10,000 to help the Shire Council run a 10-week cultural and personal development program to help connect socially isolated First Nations young people within the region."

# Environment heats up at the Batemans Bay Soldiers Club

A packed house heard three election candidates on Friday night, however the Liberal candidate Andrew Constance was missing. Over 120 people attended the event which was hosted by South East Climate Alliance NSW and moderated by the Rev Linda Chapman. People attending clearly want stronger action on climate change and care for our beautiful local environment.

Many put up their hands to show they had already installed solar panels or were driving electric cars.

Current member for Gilmore, Fiona Phillips, defended the Labor government's environmental actions, citing the rapid expansion of wind and solar power. However, she was less convincing on Labor's continuing approvals of new coal and gas projects.

Ms Phillips said, "We absolutely want less gas, less coal but we have to transition to do that. ... Approvals have to be made under our national environmental laws. ... So the way to bring about change is to increase renewables and to update our national environmental laws", without explaining that Labor has refused to put a climate trigger into its current bill to update those laws.

Greens" candidate Debbie Killian told how the Greens pushed Labor to improve environmental policies and could have huge influence if there was a minority government after the elections. "We need a minority government with a strong party like the Greens ready to push, because that's where the courage comes from. The people who ... don't raise money from corporations."

Independent candidate Kate Dézarnaulds said that the party system had failed Australia, especially on climate action.

"The Black Summer bushfires were among the worst in Australian history. Despite the evidence, the major parties continued to take millions of dollars from coal and gas companies [and] approve fossil fuel projects."

Regarding the Liberal absence, forum convenor Jack Egan said, "We are disappointed by the no-show of Liberal candidate Andrew Constance, who attended a Harmony Week dinner, starting later than our forum and just a few hundred metres away. He could have attended both events. Voters in the southern end of Gilmore deserve the chance to hear from Mr Constance and have him answer their questions. He is evading scrutiny over emissions greatly increasing if coal and gas are kept on while Australia waits for nuclear powered electricity. And why are the Liberals trying to slow the roll out of solar and wind power?"

Kate Dezarnaulds dismissed the possibility that a Liberal government would ever get around to building nuclear power stations. "... it is not a genuine policy, if you read the most amazing article, the one that really set me on fire on this issue. It was by (ex-Liberal minister) Christopher Pyne ... saying that the nuclear policy is genius for the Liberal party politically, but it will never be built."

The cost of living, the cost of energy, nature protection and climate action were all in the questions from the floor. The effect of climate change on the cost of insurance was a big concern.

Our electorate of Gilmore is the most marginal in Australia, Fiona Phillips won last time by just 373 votes. This was a chance for people to hear from candidates and decide what order they will choose in our preferential voting system.

# Moruya Mail \_ocal produce shines at Autumnal Equinox

SAGE threw their garden gates open to the whole community with 80 people gathered to celebrate the Autumnal Equinox at The SAGE Garden in Moruya last Sunday night.

SAGE NSW Inc is a Moruya NSW based not-for-profit community group involved in improving food security. The SAGE community is made up of growers, food producers, businesses, food consumers, members, supporters and volunteers.

With the support of around 100 volunteers, SAGE manages the 'SAGE Farmers Market', 'SAGE Garden', and the 'Stepping Stone Farm' commercial market gardening training facility. SAGE runs education programs, grows food for community groups, provides catering, hosts social events and does fundraising.\*

The Autumnal Equinox occurs in the Southern Hemisphere on March 20th or 21st, when the Sun moves north across the celestial equator. With all food grown within 20kms of the SAGE Garden, all ingredients were local, fresh and seasonal.

Unlike out of season produce, which is often picked early so that it can be shipped and distributed from around the world, seasonal produce is picked at its peak, making it fresher, tastier and more nutrient dense. The community was treated to servings of beef goulash, vegetable goulash, slaw, potatoes and pickles, as well as the bread, fresh from the wood fired oven.

The produce was sourced from 'Corner Garden' by Hannah at SAGE, 'Left Field Farm', 'Lillian's Lane', 'Old Mill Road', 'Boobook Hill', 'Evan's Street Garden Farm' and local beef from 'Southlands Butcher'. Sandra Makdessi, SAGE Events and Education Convenor, for the past 15 years and her team of 15 volunteers were able to use the last of the summer produce and some of the new autumn veg to fill 'the hungry gap'.

Sandra said "The 'hungry gap' is the period between March and May. In our case, it is the end of summer produce and the period before produce of the next season is ready for harvesting. It is always a challenge to come up with an interesting menu but our producers and the SAGE catering team have once again come to the fore to showcase our local produce.'

SAGE has been holding similar fundraising events for each of the four annual equinoxes over the past nine years.

Founding member of SAGE, Stuart Whitelaw said "We hold the events to mark the changing of the seasons. It is not only a celebration of local and seasonal produce but an ideal way to celebrate being part of our community."







Matt Perks and Sarah Cunningham (Matt & Co) provided the complimentary cool music vibes for the evening and the region's newest gin makers, 'Foxdog Distillery' from Mogo, were on hand for gin purchases.

Lou Dampney from Moruya is a SAGE member and regular event goer.

Lou said "It was a fun evening in the garden sitting around the fires. It's great to enjoy 'real' food that highlights what is grown locally. Moreover, it is an opportunity to break bread with strangers and leave as new friends." \*https://www.sageproject.org.au/

Tenders for the erection of **Narooma School of Arts Soldier's War Memorial Building** close with the secretary, Mr. C. Knott, on Monday, 27th April. **On Saturday last,** Mr. P. Donnelly's eldest son, Frank, was severely bitten on the leg by a dog. On his return from Braidwood, Mr. R. N. Bull, who owned the dog, had the animal destroyed.

While unloading crushing apparatus at Dormon, Long and Co's. wharf at Pompey on Saturday, the foremast on the I.S.N. Co's. steamer Narani snapped off, carrying away the derricks. A crusher weighing about nine tons, fell into the river.

Hoary old winter made his first visit this year felt in no uncertain manner. Following the extreme heat of Saturday last the temperature dropped about 40 degrees after the rain next morning, and during the week frosts have occurred on the lowlands in this district.

**Anzac Day**, Saturday, 25th April, has been chosen by our Bergalia friends as the day on which the machine gun, which was presented to them as a war trophy, will be erected. Arrangements are being made to conduct a formal ceremony at which speeches suitable to the occasion will be delivered.

Ward at their very door, we quote the following incident which happened in the skin market during the week. John D. paid on an average of 2/9 per lb. on rabbit skins purchased by him last week. A committee composed of Fathers McCormack and Deenihan, Messrs. C. Carter, B. Heffernan, J. Wilton, S. Ryan and P. Flynn left nothing to chance to make the day a huge success.

# Draft Change Proposal for UOW Operations transformation announced

The **University of Wollongong** (UOW) has commenced the next stage of workplace change consultation with staff following the release of the UOW Operations Draft Change Proposal. Like many universities, UOW is facing significant financial challenges, in part due to the Australian Government's changes to visa processing and migration policy and a sharp reduction in international student numbers. As a result, UOW suffered a \$35 million drop in revenue in 2024, with ongoing impacts forecast for 2025.

The University has a clear ongoing need to reduce recurrent costs and to improve the effectiveness of its services and operations more broadly. The University must address its escalating cost base and reduce recurrent expenditure by approximately an additional \$30 million, and this process will contribute to that objective. To do this, the University is proposing to re-design its organisational structure to enable UOW to grow sustainably, amplify our impact and deliver exceptional outcomes for our students, staff and communities.

The Draft Change Proposal includes:

- A reduction from four faculties to three, and reduction from 18 schools to 11, to simplify structures under the Provost, a new proposed role which will be UOW's chief academic officer.
- The creation of a new Growth portfolio to unite domestic and international student recruitment activity, alongside our critical marketing, brand, communications and advancement functions, to provide a more holistic, agile and strategic approach to driving revenue growth.
- Resourcing the Office of the Vice-Chancellor to ensure a fully aligned team to support strategic coordination, effective governance, and high-level operational support.
- The implementation of shared corporate services to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of our common services across the University.
- Academic, student and research support services proposed to be reconfigured as a hub and spoke model within central portfolios to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of academic and research services.

The anticipated outcome of this Draft Change Proposal is a reduction of approximately 155-185 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) positions and a recurrent saving of approximately \$22 – 26 million. Interim Vice-Chancellor and President Senior Professor Eileen McLaughlin said that no final decisions have been made and committed to engaging in genuine consultation with staff throughout the process.

"While there is a strong financial imperative to this change proposal, the outcome must be a platform for driving sustainable growth and impact, with a focus on improving academic and research services, enabled by enhancements in digital systems and technology," Senior Professor McLaughlin said. "We are committed to continuing genuine and meaningful consultation with staff throughout this process and encourage all staff to engage constructively in the weeks and months ahead. "We must continue to make challenging choices now to set the University up for a brighter future. Our priority is to strengthen our foundations and deliver a sustainable future for the University while ensuring that UOW remains competitive and innovative." Staff who are potentially affected by this phase of workplace change have been notified directly and will participate in briefings this week. Staff are also being provided with personalised, professional, and confidential support through the University's Employee Assistance Program provider, TELUS Health. The consultation process is being conducted in alignment with the requirements of the University's enterprise agreements. No final decisions have been made. For areas that are in scope, voluntary redundancies will be considered.

It is anticipated that the Final Change Plan will be released on 23 July.

### When training turns real...



Marine Rescue NSW report: Members from Marine Rescue Batemans Bay were on the water this morning on BM30 training with a visiting crew from Marine Rescue Kioloa. After undertaking several exercises in the Clyde River, the Kioloa crew returned home while BM30 proceeded into Batemans Bay for further on-water familiarization training for two of our radio operators.

Upon further investigation an upturned kayak was found, with the owner in the water struggling to re-board his kayak and waving for assistance. The crew from BM30 immediately pulled up along side the kayaker and brought him onboard, before bringing his kayak on to the vessel's aft deck.

Fortunately due to the swift response by rescue crews, the kayaker was in good spirits and was returned to shore soon after. Upon returning to shore, BM30 crew members assisted with emptying the water from the kayak and drove the owner to get their vehicle from the beach where they launched.

All boaters and kayakers are reminded of the importance of logging on with Marine Rescue NSW, carrying correct safety equipment and checking the conditions are suitable for their vessel.







The current closure at the 31-33km site will continue for another two to three weeks. Once that's finished, work will begin at the 28.6km site, likely around 10 April – we'll confirm the date closer to the time.



### Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report Moruya River.

Sorry for the lateness of this post, I was out throwing some Panic Stations Mullet along the flats for a croc, a big donut for me today. Don't you hate when the bail arm clicks over mid cast and that new colour lures goes further than you have managed to cast one before! I do!

The weather this weekend is looking a little unsettled, but the daytime temps are still up there. After a session on the town bridge 2 days ago, I can confirm there are some big bream and whiting lurking around the bridge pylons and the flats in the middle of the river. One fish I didn't see in any great number was the humble flathead, but I guarantee they are there, just well hidden in an ambush position waiting for and unsuspecting mullet or whiting to get close enough.

A good session up the Duea chasing bass with a mate last weekend, surprised us with the numbers of black bream we saw well up above the tidal limit mark! Honestly we saw more bream than bass up where the bass should have been the dominant species. The water was most definitely fresh, so it goes to show how well the black bream can adapt to differing water conditions.

### Tuross river.

Flathead, bream, whiting and trevally have all been readily available throughout the system this week. Coila lake still has some good sized prawns available. While not in massive numbers the upcoming dark will produce some good catches for those willing to put in the time.

If you are chasing flathead or whiting this time of year, look at the lower sections of the river where the water temps are still high.

There are plenty of bream along the extensive river banks that hold snags and throughout the systems extensive oyster leases. Soft plastics hard body lures and baits are all excellent options.

### Rock and beach.

Salmon, bream and whiting are all prevalent along the all the local beaches at the moment. For the bream and whiting try along the corners of mixed ground where the beach meets a rocky headland. These areas will also have the odd snapper in the right areas.

### Offshore.

With the water temps still high this time of year, the snapper will tend to be a little deeper in and around the 40-50m marks, with the flathead available over the inshore grounds around 15-20m marks. These are only rough guides and the fish will be where you find them.

The shop is looking good at the moment, with plenty of stock on the walls and some rearranging having gone on in my absence. Guess I'm going to learn where things are again. Im back at work on Monday, so see you all next week.

Stay safe everyone and remember, "Every day's a good day for fishing..."

# Batemans Bay Sailing Club report

It was a great day for sailing last Saturday 22/3/25 when Batemans Bay Sailing Club held the final Crew Skipper/Lady Skipper race of the season as well as a Bay Cup race. Five boats went out for the first race. It was a handicap start race with each boat given a start time based on past performances. Theoretically all boats would finish at the same time. "Horizon" skippered by Michelle Grybaitis was first off on the course from Caseys Beach to Chain Bay and back. Next up was Jack Egan's restored trailerable yacht "Windswept", skippered on the day by Bridget Mullaly and Rima Bos. Then followed "Attitude" (Graham Taylor), "Moonmist" (Geoff Perrem) and "Accolade" (Tony Bonouvrie. Light ESE winds at the start didn't do "Horizon" or "Windswept" any favours as they were both overhauled by the faster boats before the first mark. "Moonmist" led narrowly at Chain Bay and then set a spinnaker for the shy reach back to Caseys. This appeared overly ambitious at first but "Moonmist" was able to carry the spinnaker all the way to the finish to win ahead of "Attitude", "Accolade" and "Horizon". "Windswept" never really got going and headed in early.

For the Bay Cup Tony Sutton took back the helm of "Moonmist". Aboard "Accolade", Lachlan Brown was having to do the foredeck duties in the absence of regular bowman Ash Connell so shared the helming with Tony Bonouvrie. "Horizon" went back in for a long lunch. "Avior", being sailed single handed by Peter Paterson, joined the fleet for the second race.

Race officer Terry Paton and his trusty sidekick Peter "Witho" Withington set a dramatically boat end favoured start. Sutton timed his start to perfection right alongside the committee boat. There was no room for "Attitude" or "Accolade" there so both boats had to circle around before starting, handing an early advantage to "Moonmist". The course was a triangle from the start near Square Head to the Yellow Rock mark, out to the Marine Park Middle Mark then to a laid mark near Square Head followed by a work back to Yellow Rock and a run to the finish at Square Head. All boats had to stay south of the outer cardinal mark at Acheron ledge, which in effect became an additional mark on the course.

"Moonmist" was beautifully in phase with the windshifts and extended her lead on the first work. On the second work, Brown and Bonouvrie mistook a fishing boat for the Acheron cardinal mark and ended up overstanding by some distance. A SAFE DRIVING TIP from Teensafe to all drivers kangaroos and wallabies are regular casualties on our regional roads, mainly between dusk and dawn. To avoid serious injury to you, we recommend that if a roo suddenly appears in front of your car, try to avoid the reflex impulse to quickly swerve as you may lose control of the car, hit a tree or oncoming vehicle or roll, not a good outcome. Safer to brake steadily and hold your steering line, you will have more control of the car, especially at highway speeds. You cannot predict which way a roo will run if startled, sometimes at you, sometimes not. It's sad if you hit a roo but better than serious damage to you or your car if you lose control. Rather than a potentially dangerous impulse swerve, by reading this, the memory will store in your brain and is likely to speed up your driver reaction a vital fraction of a second quicker when confronted suddenly with a roo on the road in front of you one dark night. This is one of many safe driver tips to young drivers at a Teensafe course.
