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Federal Election 2025 —A personal message

Desperate need for local radiotherapy

The recent announcements of substantial federal health funding commitments to the communities of Midland WA (\$200 million) and Boothby SA (\$150 million) are, without a doubt, music to the ears of those communities. We celebrate their success and commend their advocacy. Good on them for securing such significant funding, and good on Prime Minister Albanese and Minister Mark Butler for listening and responding—as they should. Health is undeniably one of the most critical issues any government will ever confront, and these communities are rightfully reaping the rewards of their tireless efforts

However, as we applaud these initiatives, we must ask: Why has our own region been left behind?

As a largely rural Local Health District, home to a nationally significant seniors and State-significant First Nations demographic, our region stretches across the vast landscapes of Gilmore and Eden-Monaro. We know all too well the importance of local healthcare access, and the relentless advocacy often required to secure services that urban populations take automatically for granted. One glaring and inexplicable absence is Local Radiotherapy Services (LRS)—a critical treatment that has been missing from our Far South Coast for way too long.

Why, in 2025, are we still without this vital service, which is especially crucial for the very people our government wants to support—those in rural, remote, and disadvantaged communities?

Why is it that, despite providing chemotherapy services locally through our wonderfully dedicated oncology departments in Moruya and Bega, the obvious administrative solution of bringing radiotherapy to the region has not been prioritized? Over the past six years, our community and ONE Advocates have been pushing for a Level 4 Eurobodalla Regional Hospital—with the provision of LRS as a key component. This project, supported by both the Eurobodalla and Bega Valley Shires and the Eurobodalla Shire Council, has seen much determined campaigning. The NSW Government has acted, committing to a new regional hospital and shouldering the whole project's financial burden at a realistic level. Yet, the more modest—and far less costly—matter of Local Radiotherapy remains unresolved. This is where the Federal Government should and must step in.

We sincerely thank Fiona Phillips, Member for Gilmore, and Kristy McBain, Member for Eden-Monaro, for their unwavering support. Fiona Phillips has already secured \$8 million in federal funding towards the estimated \$35 million cost of LRS, based on an expert review in 2023. But this is patently not enough. We need the Federal Government to stop stepping around the desperate need for radiotherapy in our community. If the pleas of ordinary citizens like us carry no weight, at least listen to your own representatives—Fiona and Kristy—who know firsthand the dire need for these services.

Albanese and Butler, you've responded to the Midland and Boothby's communities. Now, will you respond to ours? Is \$35 million for life-saving cancer treatment for a rural community really too much to ask when the government is investing hundreds of millions elsewhere? The provision of LRS could transform patient outcomes across our region. We urge you to act now.

Think about it—this is not just an expenditure; it's a lifeline.

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Masterplan more than click-bait headlines, says Mayor

Eurobodalla Mayor Mathew Hatcher says he's thrilled to see community interest focusing on Council's soon-to-be-released draft Batemans Bay Masterplan.

"Of course, media are running with '100-metre skyscraper' headlines, but there's so much more to this plan," says the Mayor.

Providing a vision of what Batemans Bay might look like in 2100, the draft Masterplan divides the town into four activity-based quarters – tourism, commercial, residential and industrial – investing in key sites at each to grow amenity and development.

"Not much has changed in the Bay during the 22 years I've lived here – it's at a standstill," says Mayor Hatcher.

"This plan is about growing opportunities for housing – in type and number – without expanding recklessly into the bush. It reinforces existing greenbelts, links services, and encourages employment sectors with jobs for young people. All in a functioning economy that extends beyond nine-to-five." The Mayor says he understands the fuss around building heights but cautions people to remain realistic.

"More housing, done right, requires higher-density buildings. We can fill in or build up, depending on location. This plan suggests both for a handful of locations across the Bay." The draft Masterplan proposes height limits at 20 metre increments, allowing buildings up to 80 metres at prescribed locations. Developers can gain additional height using five-metre height 'incentives' if their buildings include affordable housing, green space and/or design excellence. Mayor Hatcher says any changes to housing density require formal amendments to Eurobodalla's Local Environment Plan. "Whether you love these ideas or not, we need to get this right," says the Mayor.

"For six weeks from Monday 14 April, we'll have a walk-in CBD shopfront – in the old 'Rivers' store, on the Beach Road roundabout – with copies of the draft Masterplan and staff to answer your questions. I hope anyone and everyone gets along for factual answers straight from the horse's mouth. The proposal will also be available on Council's website and in hardcopy at the libraries."

The draft Batemans Bay Masterplan will be on public exhibition for 42 days from Monday 14 April. For more information visit Council's <u>Batemans Bay Living Place Masterplan webpage</u>.

Eurobodalla Council interim general manager announced

Eurobodalla councillors have appointed experienced local government leader Mark Ferguson to the Council's interim general manager role. Mr Ferguson commences duties on Monday 7 April. The appointment was made by councillors during a confidential session in the Council Meeting last Tuesday and the contract signed late yesterday.



Mayor Mathew Hatcher said Mr Ferguson is a very well-regarded general manager in the local government sector, with long stints at leading Sydney councils Pittwater and Northern Beaches, as well as Coffs Harbour City Council.

"Mark is well-known in the sector for leading high performing councils focused on robust governance and decision making," Cr Hatcher said.

"Mark's qualifications and expertise in psychology and behavioural science allow him to support trust building, empathy, and collaboration, as well as resilience and innovation."

The Mayor said he's pleased to have a leader of Mr Ferguson's calibre join the Council while recruitment for a permanent general manager takes place.

"This can take up to six months or more," he said, "so we look forward to a period of solid achievement under Mark's leadership." Mr Ferguson's most recent role at Edward River Council was a Ministerial appointment as a temporary advisor focused on effective governance.

Mr Ferguson's appointment follows the resignation of former general manager Warwick Winn last month.



Council to transition out of disability and aged services

Eurobodalla Council has endorsed a proposal to transition out of its disability services, aged care packages, and seniors respite services in 2025.

The proposal is subject to confirmation that other providers can support clients, a staff consultation, and the development of detailed plans prior to a transition starting.

Councillors voted on Tuesday to exit the

Councillors voted on Tuesday to exit the services by October after more than three decades of operation.

Eurobodalla Mayor Mathew Hatcher said staff and clients are being advised of the change, noting that services will continue as they are for now

Cr Hatcher highlighted the very positive impact that all of Council's community care services have had on the community for many years. "This decision reflects the changes that have occurred in the aged care and disability sectors, the challenges facing providers, and in particular non-specialist providers like councils.

"We've seen a number of New South Wales councils exiting these services of late, including our neighbours in Bega," he said.

The decision comes after an independent review of the Council's community care services late last year and will affect around 148 clients and 75 full time, part time and casual staff in Council's NDIS programs, HomeCare packages, and seniors respite service.

Council's community transport and individual and group social support programs are not part of the proposal and will continue to operate. Mayor Hatcher said it's important to know there are no immediate changes to services, and that the exit is carefully planned and sensitively considers those impacted.

"We will continue to deliver services to our clients as normal for now," the Mayor said. "We want the community to be reassured that looking after our clients and staff is the priority. We will have a transition plan in place that ensures our clients will be well supported in making decisions about changing providers, and our staff will be supported to find other work." A further report to Council will occur in May 2025, with updates around the capacity of other providers to take on clients, discussions with government agencies and the results of the staff consultation.

Surfside Beach, Batemans Bay flood warning

The NSW SES advises people in in Surfside to 'STAY INFORMED' about predicted significant surf conditions which may cause flooding on the Surfside Beach.

THE SES is expecting "Coastal inundation due to significant surf conditions on the high tide overnight."

Debris and sand had been washed up onto the shore this morning and some residences had started sandbagging.

Coastal erosion had been happening at this site for many years In mid 2023, \$12 million of funding to Council for new costal protection works was announced. A combined investment through joint Federal and State government co-contributions under Round One of the Albanese Government's new Disaster Ready Fund. Last year council sought feedback for a 'Batemans Bay Urban Creeks Floodplain Risk Management Study and Plan' which is due in late 2025.

See change at 'Sea Change' beach and resort

The seas were lapping at the decks of the unfinished Surfside Resort today.

Development plans were approved in 2014 for the Beachfront 'Eco Resort' at 2a Myamba Parade Surfside.

According to their website at the time of purchase, "The private company Virtical has swooped on a major beachfront land holding in the NSW tourism hotspot of Batemans Bay, and is planning a luxury apartment and hotel complex.

The company is looking to cash in on surging regional tourism and the sea-change market, which has turbo-charged residential property prices.

Virtical has snapped up the prize parcel of 10,300sq m and will develop a residential and eco-tourism project in the northern precinct of the town-ship.

The parcel of land at 2A Myamba Pde at Surfside fronts two beaches and has development approval for Virtical to create a five-star eco-tourism resort, with construction expected to total \$30m." In September Nine Media reported that Virtical "A high-flying pubs and hotels group is under investigation by the Australian Taxation Office over \$100 million in GST refunds after a company linked to the group's former managing director was fined for its own dodgy claims."

Last week Nine reported "The former director of collapsed hospitality empire Virtical was asked about the mysterious purchase of \$5 million of gold bullion as liquidators opened court proceedings in their hunt for tens of millions of dollars linked to fake GST refunds claimed by the group."

Last week a 'Notice of Possession' sign was pasted up to the site.

Dutton's gas twice the price of wind and solar

Peter Dutton claims that increasing the supply of gas in the domestic market would bring down the wholesale price of gas from \$14 to \$10 a gigajoule.

Even at \$10 a gigajoule, gas fired electricity would still be twice the price of wind and solar.

Gas is the most expensive electricity in our East Coast market and is only used as a back up and never as baseload power.

The Australian Energy Regulator reported that the average cost of gas generated electricity in NSW was \$235 per megawatt hour during 2024.

Tristan Edis of Green Energy Markets says that \$10 gigajoule gas would result in electricity prices of \$170 per megawatt hour, twice the CSIRO estimate of wind and solar at \$40 to \$80.

The gas companies may continue to charge Australian customers the world market price for gas and the Liberals were unwilling to support the temporary cap on gas prices brought in at the start of the invasion of Ukraine. Dutton's gas powered electricity won't be cheap, but it will be polluting.

It is irresponsible to increase gas usage and drive up emissions when climate change is already causing havoc in Australia and around the world.

Ex tropical cyclone Alfred dumped so much rain on SE Queensland and Northern NSW because the ocean has warmed due to climate change.

Liberal candidate Andrew Constance has to answer how he can support a higher emissions pathway than continuing the rapid rollout of renewable energy. Constance was very clear that the Black Summer bushfires were so extreme because of climate change. The Liberals energy plan also includes extra costs, emissions and the risk of blackouts by extending the life of old and unreliable coal power stations.

The world has passed them by, no Australian power company will invest in a new coal or nuclear power station.

The huge amount of solar energy fed into the grid from people's rooftops is an opportunity to drive down electricity prices by installing neighbourhood batteries and subsidising home batteries.

350 Eurobodalla supports a rapid transition to renewable energy with wind and solar backed up by batteries and pumped hydro. Gas will be needed for some time, but only as a back up.

At this election we must vote as if our children's future depends on us, because it does.

Additional \$14 million to keep communities and emergency services better connected

The Federal Government continues to prioritise safety and resilience measures for natural-disaster prone communities with an additional \$14 million to extend critical community Wi-Fi services at evacuation centres across Australia.

The Strengthening Telecommunications Against Natural Disasters (STAND) program has already installed NBN Co. Sky Muster satellite connections to 1068 locations Australia-wide, including 18 sites in Gilmore. Interactive map showing existing sites available here. This also includes emergency sites across areas in northern New South Wales and south east Queensland which were impacted during extropical Cyclone Alfred.

The additional \$14 million will add community Wi-Fi capability to a further 500 emergency sites, and extend services at existing sites for an additional four years, beyond 2025.

Minister for Communications, the Hon Michelle Rowland MP said "The safety of Australians is the number one priority of the Albanese Government – particularly during natural disasters which are becoming more frequent and severe.

"Resilient communications and broadcasting networks are vital for keeping communities safe, informed, and connected, during emergencies. It can be the difference between life and death. "Sky Muster satellite internet services can operate off a portable generator even when local ground-based communications networks are down – keeping communities connected when they need it most." Fiona Phillips MP said "Since coming to office, the Albanese Government has made significant investments to improve mobile coverage and the

resilience of communications networks against natural disasters. "We have delivered more than 900 resilience projects just this term, including across Gilmore, with many more to come.

"Our Government will work closely with the NSW government to prioritise disaster-prone areas that do not have emergency connectivity solutions to ensure this investment delivers where it is most needed.

"Unlike the Liberal National Coalition, Labor will not leave Australians to fend for themselves when it comes to public-safety connectivity." The Albanese Government will work closely with states and territories to prioritise disaster-prone areas that do not have emergency connectivity solutions to ensure this investment delivers where it is most needed. Since coming to office, the Government has committed more than \$340 million to improve mobile coverage and the resilience of communications networks against natural disasters.

The NFF's six-point plan to Secure Australia's Farming Future calls for immediate action on:

1.Planning for Food Security – Developing a National Food Security Preparedness Strategy

2.Cutting Farm Costs – Reducing regulatory burdens and maintaining vital support programs

3.Partnering for Sustainability – Investing in practical environmental solutions led by farmers

4.Building a Productive Workforce – Addressing critical labour shortages and enhancing safety

5.Securing Market Access – Strengthening trade relationships and boosting export competitiveness

6.Investing in the Regions – Fixing unsafe rural roads and delivering on regional housing and childcare

Threats to work from home could affect 1 in 3 NSW workers Coalition Leader, Peter Dutton's threat to clamp down on work from home arrangements would likely impact 1 in 3 workers in New South Wales, with a flow-on effect from public to private sector workers. New analysis by the ACTU of ABS data shows that 1 in 3 workers could be impacted from the flow-on effect of the Dutton Coalition's proposed changes to work from home settings.

195,000 New South Wales workers currently work from home to spend less time commuting or to save money. If these workers are forced back onto the roads – it will add to congestion and make life harder for everyone.

A further 100,000 employees are working from home because of their childcare or other caring responsibilities.

In a double blow, 320,000 people report they are working from home to "catch up" on work after hours. Not only will these workers be forced to stay longer at the office to finish their work; they also lose the right to disconnect, which has begun to lower rates of unpaid overtime.

Workers in Parramatta and in Eden Monaro will be among the hardest hit, as the 17 and 18 percent of people who work from home in those electorates do so because of their commute time, compared to the 12 percent average for NSW.

ACTU President, Michele O'Neil:

"Working people in our outer suburbs face some of the longest and most expensive commutes.

"Forcing hundreds of thousands of workers back on the roads will mean less time with kids and more time in traffic.

"Blanket orders summoning people back to the workplace, will leave thousands without access to work from home settings and other flexible work options.

"This would be an instant productivity killer, because flexible work has pushed women's workforce participation to record highs, as one million women joined the workforce in the last four years.

"Less flexible work will also reduce real wages growth. Under a Duttonled Coalition, working women may need to prepare for a pay cut, because their only option to maintain workplace flexibility is likely to be moving into a part time job, and taking a pay cut."



April Falls Month focuses on staying active daily

This April Falls Month older people living in south-east NSW are being encouraged to look after themselves with regular exercise and activity to help maintain independence.

'Falls Prevention is everyone's business' is the theme of this year's April Falls Month, an annual event supported by the NSW Fall Prevention and Healthy Ageing Network to encourage older adults to become more active and reduce falls.

Brodie Palmer, Health Promotion Officer at Southern NSW Local Health District, emphasised the importance of staying active. "Keeping active is one of the best things we can do to maintain our independence as we age. Regular exercise helps improve balance, strength, and confidence, making everyday activities easier and reducing the risk of falls," Ms Palmer said.

"Whether it's joining (or starting!) a Heart Foundation Walking group, taking part in a local exercise class, or using the Active & Healthy directory to find a program that suits you, there are many ways to stay moving. Every little bit of activity counts, so find something you enjoy and make it part of your routine," Ms Palmer added.

Ms Palmer explained that Southern NSW Local Health District's physiotherapy teams work closely with community members to provide targeted support and interventions for those at risk of falls or frailty.

NSW Fall Prevention and Healthy Ageing Network Lead Advisor Professor Cathie Sherrington said staying physically active is the single most important thing we can do to stay independent as we age.

"During ageing, our bodies change, losing muscle strength and coordination so the more active we remain, the better chance we have of maintaining our physical function," Prof Sherrington said. Improving balance and strength in our legs allows us to complete regular daily activities more easily, including getting up and down stairs, in and out of cars, negotiating uneven surfaces and reducing the risk of falling. If older people are feeling unsteady on their feet or are having eyesight changes or pain in their feet seeing specialists such as a physiotherapist for balance and strength testing, an optometrist for vision changes and a podiatrist to reduce foot pain can help to maintain independence.

See your GP for issues that worry you and for referrals to other health practitioners.

"Falls prevention is everyone's business and research has shown that regular exercise can reduce falls in older people by 23 per cent. Importantly, slowly building up high-challenge balance exercises can increase the effects of exercise by up to 40 per cent," Prof Sherrington said.

Community urged to vaccinate against measles before overseas travel

The NSW Government is calling on people planning to travel overseas this April holiday period to ensure they and their family are fully protected against measles, as cases of the disease continue to rise.

While measles is rare in Australia, it is still a common illness in many parts of the world, with large outbreaks currently in many countries including Vietnam and other parts of Southeast Asia. Measles can cause serious illness, particularly in young children. It remains a common cause of death in children under five in some parts of the world.

Already in NSW this year there have been eight people who acquired measles while travelling in Vietnam and were infectious after arriving home. Some of these cases have spread the disease to family members back in Australia. The measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine is free from the pharmacist for people over five years of age, or from a GP for people of all ages. Babies can have their first dose of the MMR vaccine from six months of age if they will be travelling overseas to a country with high risk of measles activity. Anyone arriving in Australia from overseas who develops symptoms should contact their GP right away so that they don't expose others.

 Symptoms of measles include: Fever, Runny nose, Sore eyes and a cough, Red blotchy rash that can spread from the head to the rest of the body that appears a few days after the other symptoms.

\$250,000 to support suicide prevention

The Minns Labor Government has announced \$250,000 in funding to enhance suicide prevention programs for men and women across NSW.

Ban on supermarket price gouging welcome

The ACTU strongly supports new measures outlined today that will make it unlawful for supermarkets to price gouge consumers.

The Albanese Government has committed to banning price gouging by supermarkets, after the competition watchdog this month found Coles and Woolworths have among the highest profit margins in the world.

The ACTU first blew the whistle on corporate price gouging in late 2022, when the big business lobby and Coalition Leader, Peter Dutton were publicly blaming global inflationary cost-of-living pressures on modest workers' wage rises.

The ACTU's Price Gouging Inquiry, led by former ACCC Chair, Professor Allan Fels recommended a law to ban price gouging in 2024.

Despite supermarket profits growing at twice the rate of workers' wages, Peter Dutton sided with the major supermarkets and last year refused to back Labor's Bill that would have put supermarkets on notice to improve their practices.

The supermarket price gouging ban to be implemented by the Albanese Government closes a gap in Australia's competition and consumer laws – that currently do not directly ban corporations from excessive pricing.

Countries in the European Union, throughout most of the US and in the United Kingdom have this consumer protection. The Government's plan to establish an excessive pricing regulatory regime, overseen by the ACCC will give regulators a bigger stick to use against supermarkets. New measures to make supermarket pricing clear, including information on price trends, promotions and loyalty programs is also welcome. ACTU Assistant Secretary, Joseph Mitchell said: "The Albanese Government's ban on price gouging is a serious step forward to crack down on the abuse of market power by Australia's big supermarkets.

"Working people have paid trolley loads of their hard-earned wages to supermarkets that used dodgy tactics to inflate prices, as shown in the Price Gouging Inquiry, chaired by Allan Fels.



The special meeting of the Moruya Co-operative Dairy Co., Ltd. was convened on Monday night in the Shire Hall. ... Mr. R. B. Thomson referred to the Inspectors who visited here a few months ago. On their report the speaker said that he considered it best to build a new factory. Peter Dutton has it within his grasp to win this election with a single policy, one that he announced some time ago. All he needs to do is sign a pledge to repeat the offer he made during the debate on the Voice for our Aboriginal people: 'I think it is right and respectful to recognise Indigenous Australians in the constitution and we will work with the Labor Party to find common ground,' he said. 'I believe very strongly it is the right thing to do,' When asked if he would hold a referendum on the issue in his first term, he replied, "Yes". It would be a nightmare for Anthony Albanese, but one of his own making. Not only did he oversee a disastrous campaign for the Voice, in its wake he didn't even put Aboriginal advancement on the back burner; he took it off the stove altogether.

He passed the portfolio out of the House of Representatives to the Senate into the hands of a Northern Territory political nonentity, Senator Malarndirri McCarthy. She has been utterly invisible since her appointment in July 2024.

Instead of redoubling efforts to rescue our first Australians from the alienation of their compatriots, Albanese turned his back on them. And once raised by Dutton, this betrayal would dog him throughout the campaign.

He accepted the 'No' vote as a signal that the populace as a whole opposed the very notion of Aboriginal advancement. That was never true; the goodwill towards First Nations was, and remains, widespread. The real problem was the campaign. The Voice itself was a jump too far, a creature of the Aboriginal elite, the few like Noel Pearson, Stan Grant, Professors Marcia Langton and Megan Davis who had – with enormous effort – made a great success of their own careers. They rejected the natural course of the debate – first truth-telling, then Constitutional recognition, then representation. Perhaps their pride prevented them from the implied victimhood, but they were equally ill-served by Albanese's Government.

The Prime Minister and his Cabinet should have known that the great Asian migration of the last 20 years introduced a cohort of cultures with no concept of the British inundation of this Continent and the Australian wars that followed. And without that knowledge Aboriginals were just a minority like themselves, so why should they be granted a special place of honour?

They arrived here wrapt in the cultures of their home countries. And succeeding Australian governments gave little time and attention to Australia's history and its cultural strengths and weaknesses to them, or even to be taught in our schools. Earlier generations were taught the British history of Australia. But faced with the exposure of an Australian viewpoint, pioneered by Henry Reynolds on the frontier wars, followed by a wealth of historical biography from both white and indigenous authors, the education authorities appear to have retreated into silence. This goes for both private and public schools.

That leaves the field open for an Opposition Leader to deeply embarrass the Prime Minister with his referendum pledge followed by a media pile on.

But here's the thing: Dutton won't do it. He's the man who walked out of the Parliament during Kevin Rudd's apology. He's the man his former colleague Malcolm Turnbull described as a political 'thug'. Besides which, his Coalition partner, the Nationals, are led by David Littleproud whose Queensland electorate recorded the highest 'No' vote in the Voice referendum. A Banana Split anyone?

With both major parties content to snub our forebears, the custodians of the Continent for 60,000 years, the case for voting Independent looks ever more fetching.

Reminder to avoid mozzie bites following a new case of Buruli ulcer in the Eurobodalla

Southern NSW Local Health District is reminding community members to watch out for the symptoms of the skin condition Buruli ulcer, and to avoid mosquito bites, after a locally acquired case was recently detected in the Eurobodalla region.

Local transmission of Buruli ulcer was confirmed for the first time in Southern NSW in 2023, after three people were diagnosed with the illness between 2021 and 2023. The recent case is the fourth locally acquired case of Buruli ulcer in Southern NSW and the first since 2023.

Buruli ulcer has been reported in parts of Queensland, Northern Territory, and multiple areas in Victoria. The number of cases in Victoria varies from year to year, but numbers have been increasing to between approximately 200-360 cases per year since 2017. Buruli ulcers typically appear as a painless red spot and progress over several weeks into an ulcer. Anyone with a non-healing skin ulcer should see a doctor. Buruli ulcer is a skin infection caused by the bacterium Mycobacterium ulcerans.

Buruli ulcer is curable with appropriate treatment. Early recognition and diagnosis are important to minimise skin damage.

While the precise transmission method for Buruli ulcer is not fully understood, there is increasing evidence that mosquitoes play a role in transmitting the infection.

In many cases, the Buruli ulcer may not appear until four to five months or longer after exposure. As mosquito bites are implicated in transmission, people can reduce their risk of Buruli ulcer by wearing loose, light-coloured clothing with long sleeves and pants and applying mosquito repellent that contains DEET.

Residents can prevent mosquito breeding by removing items around their home that might collect water, such as old tyres or empty pots. Drainage issues should be addressed so that water does not become stagnant. Ensure coverings for windows and doors have insect screens with no holes or gaps in them.

CWA of NSW releases results from inaugural survey of state's women and issues having the greatest impact

Inaugural survey of state's women and issues having the greatest impact

Access to healthcare and housing, threats to safety, and financial challenges were among the issues NSW women have had their say on as part of the Country Women's Association (CWA) of NSW inaugural Annual Women's Survey.

More than 60% of respondents cited limited access to primary and specialised healthcare providers as of most concern when it came to healthcare, and almost 70% said on the housing issue, the high cost of housing and a shortage of housing stock was the most worrying aspect. The survey was launched in August last year and was

open until October, with the results now collated and the top issues identified. There were 1670 responses in all, with 80% of those coming from women outside the state's major cities, and the majority of those respondents 45 years and over.

"This was our first survey, and we weren't sure what kind of response we'd receive, so to have that level of involvement from NSW women was really pleasing. This will now become a regular activity on our annual calendar, so we'd be hoping as more women become aware of the survey, the number of respondents will continue to build," said Jov Beames. President of the CWA of NSW.

"As the biggest women's advocacy group in the state, we developed this survey so we could get a real sense of what NSW women were concerned about and ensure our representations to policy makers reflected the issues they feel most strongly about."

The release of the CWA of NSW's survey findings follows the release earlier this month of the Federal Government's 2025 Status of Women Report Card. The annual Report Card examines the impact of a number of the issues put forward in the survey, such as genderbased violence, economic equality and security and health.

The CWA of NSW's survey found on the issue of safety, 34% of respondents said an insufficient law enforcement presence was of most concern, 30% cited gender-based violence and harassment and 15% said a lack of protective infrastructure like street lighting was of the greatest concern to them when it came to safety.

When it came to the issue of finance and economic challenges for women, 51% of respondents said access to affordable childcare and flexible work arrangements was of most concern, and 26% believed it was pay inequality and lack of opportunities for career advancement. In response to an open-ended question on the most significant issues affecting women, 19% put housing availability, affordability and quality at the top of their list and 15% highlighted personal safety, domestic violence and availability of support services. A total of 11% said transport and digital connectivity (access to, reliability and affordability) were the biggest issues, and another 11% said employment and cost of living issues caused them the

"We're really pleased so many women took the time to participate in the survey and provide this starting point for the database we're hoping to build. As we see more responses coming in each year, that will start to show whether some of these issues are becoming more or less of a concern, and will help fine-tune our advocacy efforts even further," Joy said.

"Thank you to all our members who participated, and other women in the community who saw this as an important way to have their say, and they can be sure we'll be taking their concerns forward."

Delivering more grants to grow Australia's sustainable timber supply

The Federal Government is helping the forestry industry meet growing demand for domestically sourced sustainable timber, with more than \$2.3 million announced last week in the latest batch of plantation grants.

The Albanese Labor Government supports sustainable forestry, and is investing in forest industry innovation, manufacturing and skills. The Government is delivering the most significant forest industry support package in Australia's history, including around \$300 million to help improve the capacity and capability of the sector.

The Support Plantation Establishment program is providing grant funding to help establish up to 36,000 hectares of new long-rotation softwood and hardwood plantation forests across Australia.

The funds will support the establishment of 5 new plantations in New South Wales, Victoria, Western Australia and Tasmania.

The grant recipients will establish a mix of softwood and hardwood plantations totalling over 1,200 hectares.

These 5 new projects are in addition to 41 others worth \$26.2 million. Total funding through the program now exceeds \$28.5 million since the first grants were announced in 2023.

Approximately 15,000 hectares of new plantations have now been approved for establishment across the country.

Round three of the program is open for applications until 5 November 2025 with the government providing up to \$2,000 per hectare of new long-rotation plantation forest established to eligible projects.

Thirty enthusiastic participants and supporters of the local arts community enjoyed a fundraising 'long table' lunch with guest speaker, Stuart Whitelaw, at the Basil Sellers Exhibition Centre (Bas), in Moruya, last Saturday.

Indi Carmichael, Coordinator Creative Arts Services at Eurobodalla Shire Council who organised the event said "Food for Thought' is an initiative to connect local artists with the community and promote conversation while enjoying great food and art."

With plans to host a lunch with a guest speaker each autumn, winter, and spring, these events are fundraisers, providing much needed financial support to the Bas team in delivering their annual creative programs. It was a case of thoughts before food on Saturday, however, as guest speaker Stuart Whitelaw engaged the audience with his talk on 'Growing a Creative Ecosystem' before lunch was served. Carmichael remarked, 'This topic is at the heart of what we do at the Bas and marks the beginning of what we hope will be many more conversations just like it.' Local artist Stuart Whitelaw lives in Bingie with his partner Jan. He practiced architecture for over 40 years but his main interests now are making art, solar energy, volunteering for SAGE and growing food. Stuart was one of the founders of SAGE and was also instrumental in starting the SAGE Farmers Market. He considers himself very lucky to be able to live in the creative community of Moruya.

Stuart highlighted the very large cohort of people who are passionate about creativity in the local community with one of the highest levels of active involvement in the arts of any shire in NSW.

In a thoughtful and at times amusing speech, Stuart went on to address the topic with five key lessons.

Drawing on the anecdote of artist Bryan Carrick transforming a stump outside of the Air Raid Tavern in Moruya, into a column of leaping dolphins over a weekend.

Stuart said "There was no way the community was going to let it be removed on Monday, and it eventually led to a main street populated by more wonderfully sculpted tree trunks. I guess this is lesson one in growing a creative ecosystem - just do it."

The audience was then challenged to think beyond the practice of 'plop and drop' when it came to art in public spaces.

Stuart said "What about making art part of the everyday rather than always having it on a

pedestal as something separate. Council spends a huge amount of money doing stuff in

our public spaces. What about creative paths, fences or curbs and guttering?"

The development and growth of the SAGE NSW Inc project over the past few decades was used to highlight the importance of sharing an understanding of creativity. Stuart summarised "So, I think Lesson 2 is to get people to share and understand what you are trying to do and to demonstrate the tangible benefits of your mission. People understand when they can experience by looking, feeling, tasting."

Lesson three in 'Growing a Creative Ecosystem' was simply about the importance of 'showing up'.

The need for creatives to have somewhere to live, work and somewhere to sell whatever it is that they are creating was lesson four.

Stuart said "It would be lovely if we could emulate some of the small market towns in Europe and have a modest shelter right in town - in a car park with a roof of solar panels perhaps - that could

be used as parking when it's not being used for displays and sales of creative art and

whatever else comes along. Our towns need this kind of life right in their main streets and fabric if they are to remain relevant."

"Be your creative self" was Stuart's final lesson.

Following the talk, SAGE Events and Education Convenor, Sandra Makdessi, introduced the luncheon which was designed based on what local growers have on offer right at this moment.

Over 90% of the ingredients used in the lunch was from our local growers.

Indi Carmichael said "It was wonderful to take such a holistic approach with this event. We felt it was important when talking about sustainable local culture and creative communities we pair that with sustainable locally sourced food."

"We are delighted that people had such a lovely time at the Bas. The gallery looked divine with its long table adorned with eucalyptus and fairy lights all set against the exquisitely serene exhibition Floating Through Calm Waters by Julz Beresford. People were buzzing with conversation; it was certainly an event to remember."

The Bas now looks forward to its next 'Food for Thought' event, featuring local artist and community arts advocate Di Jay, fresh from a studio residency in Italy. From Broulee to Florence: An Artist's Odyssey will be accompanied by an Italian-themed grazing table on Saturday June 21, 12:30 – 2:30pm. Tickets are available at www.thebas.com.au. 



It was very much a case of being transported in a musical confluence of Baroque and Romantic era choral arrangements and centuries-old sacred hymns and carried through time in ancient Aboriginal languages.*

Greater Glider Knit-In - Protesting Moruya Logging between Maulbrooks & Polwombra Rds

Locals and Nannas Rally - From 9-12 noon (photo 10.30am) Friday 4 April, Forestry Corporation steps, Orient Street - Batemans Bay. Knitting Nannas for Native Forests - South Coast loop are holding a snap Knit-In.

South Coast locals, Friends of the Forest (Mogo) and Brooman State Forest Conservation Group are rallying with Knitting Nannas to protest the continued logging of Mogo State forest ten minutes nw of Moruya between Maulbrooks and Polwombra Roads.

This week three sets of logging machines moved up Maulbrooks Road to log below RHA Fire Trail. This location is a beautiful intact forest with native flowering shrubs, wildlflowers and glossy black cockatoo feed trees (allocasuarina littoralis) that are meant to be protected. Bonnet orchids photographed a few months ago will be churned up by heavy earthmoving machinery as the spotted gum trees are cut down for woodchips, firewood and pallets. As well as this logging in Mogo State Forest, over 5,000 hectares is being logged at any one time, on both sides of the Clyde River between Nelligen and Termeil.

Wear yellow and black if you have it with red accents. This Knit-In will also be a Friday's 4 Forests action that occurs, up and down the east coast of NSW.

BACKGROUND

It is essential that this forest be kept standing to protect wildlife that survived the fires, especially endangered greater gliders and glossy black cockatoos. Instead, the trees in this wildlife refugia are being cut down mainly for low value export woodchips (36% of the yield), firewood (29%), steel mill pallets and tomato stakes. This yield is obtained only after most of the trees are left on the forest floor (over 60% which is the entire treetop) adding to fuel load and fire risk for neighboring residents. Many NSW contractors that cut the trees down (teams of two) and log truck drivers are Victorian as logging has been mainly been banned by the Victorian Labor government. WA ended native forest logging in early 2024.

Logging machinery caterpillar treads churn up vegetation damaging 534 hectares in this operation; snigging tracks are bulldozed and multiple logging dumps totally cleared. From the top of the compartment at night you can see the lights of Moruya and some hills are so steep you need a walking pole to traverse them. Removing the trees has washed sediment into Dooga Creek that feeds into Moruya River. There are permanent water pools where locals have sighted platypus prior to the fires and an incredible 62m tall spotted gum with a 7m circumference grows in a tributary to Dooga Creek in this operation. Forestry must focus 100% on profitable pine plantations on marginal land that already provide over 80% of construction timber, many skilled jobs and impact less land as they are grown fast. Tumut's AKD softwoods owns 12,000 hectares of plantations that pay rates to local councils.

Nature based tourism is our main economic driver with \$16 m federal investment in Eurobodalla mountain bike trails attracting the prestigious international Sea Otter event in Mogo State Forest in October 2025. Yet these state forest mountain bike trails, are not protected from logging, so can be closed for months and tracks damaged.

Head over to the Friends of the Forest (Mogo) facebook page to see the videos that has everyone's attention. Logging machinery and log dump footage on Maulbrooks Rd had over 5,000 views in 24 hours and the video of the treetops left behind as waste is heading to 10,000 views.

Our forests are worth more standing for our wildlife, carbon storage and recreation especially mountain biking.

Have your say on Local Land Services board election process

Local Land Services is inviting ratepayers to have their say on the way community representatives are elected to its local boards.

As part of a review of the election process, Local Land Services is conducting a survey to understand how it can improve the experience for voters.

Open to new and long-time voters, the short, five-minute survey closes on 17 April 2025.

Local Land Services CEO Kate Lorimer-Ward said feedback would inform recommendations to make the election process more engaging and accessible. "Local boards play a key role in connecting Local Land Services to landholders and communities across NSW," Ms Lorimer-Ward said.

"The election process allows our customers to vote for who represents them on their local board and is critical to ensuring their voice is heard on matters that affect them, so it's important we make it as simple as possible.

"While there was an increase in the number of voters in last year's election, compared to 2020, we recognise there's room to improve engagement with the election process.

"Whether you're a past voter or have never voted before, we want to hear from you about what's working well and where we can make improvements."

Local board elections are run in accordance with the LLS Regulation 2014. The review Local Land Services is undertaking will inform where regulatory and nonregulatory changes may need to be considered to improve customer experience. In addition to elected board members, each of Local Land Services' 11 local boards has some Ministerially appointed members.

Together they provide oversight of local strategic planning, performance monitoring and local policy, helping to shape the services Local Land Services delivers.

The chair of each local board sits on the statewide Local Land Services Board, which is responsible for overseeing statewide priorities in line with the State Strategic Plan. Those interested can <u>complete the survey online</u>. All responses are anonymous.





Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

Moruva River.

Yet again, the forecast looks less than stellar. With approximately 60-70mm of rain forecast for tomorrow and 4m+ seas for Sunday onwards, Hughy seems to laughing at

On the whole the river has been fishing really well, with flathead, bream, whiting and Trevally all on offer throughout the system. The back of the hole in the wall is one very productive area that fishes well on both the run in and run out tides. I have included a pic below that show the area know as the hole in the wall for those that don't know where it is. I do get asked fairly often. It is best accessed from either a boat or my preferred method kayak. Although it can be access from the fringes in various spot land based. Take a good look at google maps for more info.

There are some good whiting and bream still holding on the sand flats under the town bridge on a high tide. Nippers and squirt worms are your best bait when chasing these, although the bream, trevally and flathead will also take a soft plastic.

Further upstream, the bass will be starting to think about moving down to spawn, so you can expect to see some migration happening as the weather cools.

Tuross River.

Good numbers of flathead, bream, whiting and mulloway have been taken throughout the system this week. The lower areas of the river have been more active for good flathead that have been actively taking drifted baits or cast soft plastics and hard body lures.

The racks continue to hold good numbers of bream, and the flats are holding good numbers of whiting making the most of the warm water temps we are currently experiencing. Surface poppers, or live nippers or squirt worms are the best bait option if you are chasing these tasty hard fighting scrappers.

There are a few well know deep holes that traditionally hold good mulloway. These can be targeted with live baits of mullet, good dead baits also of mullet, squid or with lures. The new panic station mullet would be an awesome option for searching these deeper holes.

Rock and Beach.

The Moruya breakwall has been producing good numbers of salmon, bream, flathead, trevally and a few good sized bonito

The local beaches, are as usual holding good numbers of big salmon, bream and whiting. With the forecast showing 4m seas from Sunday on, fish the beaches Saturday if you don't mind the rain.

Offshore.

With very warm water temps at the moment, showing 27 degrees, there are plenty of warmer water species around. Mahi Mahi, snapper, flathead and marlin are all on the cards. I don't see too much happening for the offshore guys this weekend however.

The bait freezer is still well stoked. Mullet fillet and worms are the only missing items at the moment. We have a few new lures from Jackson on the wall at the moment, not to forget all the others we have on offer.

Stay safe everyone and remember, "Every day's a good day for fishing..."
