Bay Masterplan Needs a Rethink

Congratulations have been sent to the Eurobodalla Shire Council from all directions for taking up the challenge of developing master plans for the shire's three main towns, starting with Batemans Bay. Giving the community an idea of what the future will bring and then developing the planning schemes to make it happen is a great, if challenging, thing to do.

But the draft plan for Batemans Bay that will go out for public comment next week misses the mark and needs a rethink.

It has been written for another Batemans Bay in a parallel universe, one where the sea level isn't rising, the planet isn't getting hotter and we no longer promote our untouched coastline and natural environment to compete for tourism.

A Mini Venice Anyone?

Easily accessible online tools like coastalrisk.com.au show significant parts of Batemans Bay may be flooded by 2100. Push it out to 2150 and, at high tide, nearly all the current business district is likely to be under water.

The draft plan is nearly silent on the threat of sea level rise, with no solutions for protection from flooding.

The experience for residents and visitors in future could be more mini Venice than mini Gold Coast.

Adapting to a hotter climate

There's no mention of shade structures in public places, heat refuges or other ways to adapt daily life to increased temperatures.

While the plan mentions the need for more trees to reduce radiant heat, it's silent on how areas with high pedestrian traffic will adapt to a hotter climate.

Who Wants a High-Rise City?

The draft masterplan completely ignores decades of tourism marketing that positions the Eurobodalla Shire as the nature coast. We advertise a place to escape the pressures of the city, to find the perfect beach or forest to unwind. A place completely unlike the rat race you just left.

Instead, the plan for the shire's gateway will have visitors arriving to just another city of towering apartment blocks. The idea of two 35 story building flanking either side of the bridge is mind boggling. We would no longer be a place that's different.

Batemans Bay and the shire will continue to provide unique holiday experiences for the 50 million Australians who will be around in 2100. At least 10 million of them will live in Sydney and well over one million in Canberra.

Visitors from the metropolis are looking for something different from their daily lives. It doesn't make sense to offer them another high rise city. Our gateway should reflect our nature coast and promise them something different.

The Gold Coast should not be our model, it should be upmarket, low rise Noosa.

The current apartment developments along Beach Road in the Bay show a path to high density living that is more reflective of our coastal lifestyle than 100 metre towers. It would be wiser to expand the area covered by the masterplan and raise height limits in zones past Batehaven that are safe from flooding to allow more of this lower style of high density to cater for population growth.

Get Involved

The draft masterplan for Batemans Bay has already kicked off heated online discussion.

It goes out for comment on 14 April and council has promised to modify the plan based on community feedback.

We should all take a look and offer our opinions to the council.

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
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Cutting the ribbon to open Good F

High Court says conservationists can take Forestry Corporation to Court

In a landmark judgment, the High Court of Australia has today unanimously dismissed an appeal by the State-owned NSW Forestry Corporation, confirming that conservation groups like South East Forest Rescue can bring legal action to enforce compliance with the logging laws and protect threatened wildlife in native forests.

The historic decision of the High Court ends a protracted legal battle over standing that began in early 2024 when SEFR launched proceedings in the NSW Land and Environment Court which alleged that the Corporation had failed to comply with the logging laws and therefore, failed to properly protect endangered gliders, including the Greater Glider, during native forest logging operations in

Although the original judgment found that special interest groups had the ability to sue the Corporation, SEFR was not found to have the necessary "special interest" to bring the case. SEFR then appealed, and the full bench of the NSW Court of Appeal unanimously overturned the LEC decision, recognising SEFR's deep and longstanding commitment to protection of native forests. The Corporation then applied to the High Court and special leave was granted in September 2024.

"This judgment confirms that organisations with a deep and ongoing commitment to environmental protection can hold government-owned entities accountable to the law," said Scott Daines, spokesperson for SEFR.

SEFR says the appeal was an attempt to shield the Corporation from public scrutiny, and to avoid answering questions about whether its activities comply with environmental law.

"Forestry Corporation tried to shut down this case before it even began. That strategy has failed," said Mr Daines. "Rather than engaging with the substance of our claims, Forestry Corporation has fought to deny our right to bring them to court. It is disappointing that taxpayer money was spent trying to avoid scrutiny rather than to address the environmental harm in question."

"This judgment recognises the essential role that dedicated special interest litigants play in upholding the law," Ms Natalija Nikolic, lawyer for SEFR, said. "It locks in the ability for environmental groups to take Forestry Corporation to court, especially when regulators fail to do so."

The case is expected to return to the Land and Environment Court later this year. SEFR is seeking court orders to restrain the Forestry Corporation from logging in NSW north and south coast State forests unless proper surveys for Greater Gliders, Yellow-bellied Gliders, and Squirrel Gliders are completed, and appropriate protections around their den trees are put in place. "This decision gives us a measure of hope amid an escalating extinction crisis," said Mr Daines. "It's frustrating that groups like ours have to step in, but it shows that accountability is still possible when organisations are willing to act."

Save water, money and the planet with appliance rebates

Saving thousands of litres of water each year will also see you saving big on big water-bills says **Eurobodalla Council's sustainability education officer**

Kirsten Pitot, before adding "But wait, there's more!"

"Council offers rebates when you install water-efficient toilets or washing machines. It's \$200 dollars back when you replace a single-flush toilet with a dual flush with efficiency rating of 4 stars or higher. You can claim for two toilets on each residential property and up to 10 for commercial properties," Ms Pitot says.

"There's another \$150 cash back for washing machines rated 4.5 stars or higher and connected to Eurobodalla's water supply system.

"Apply for your rebate soon – don't leave it until the end of financial year. Complete the rebate application form on Council's website, including the original receipt with brand make and model for any appliances purchased within the last six months."

Labor to deliver one million energy bill busting batteries

Media Release

A re-elected Albanese Labor Government will make batteries cheaper, slashing energy bills for households, small businesses and community facilities by up to 90 per cent. We will roll out our \$2.3 billion Cheaper Home Batteries Program from 1 July 2025 reducing the cost of a typical installed battery by 30 per cent – with over one million new batteries expected by 2030.

Analysis by the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water shows a household with existing rooftop solar could save up to \$1,100 off their power bill every year, and a household installing a new solar and a battery system could save up to \$2,300 a year – up to 90 per cent of a typical family electricity bill.

This will help households reduce reliance on the grid – and take back control of their power hill

There have been four million rooftop solar installations across Australia. One in three Australian households now have solar – but only one in forty households have a battery. Through our scheme, households will be able to purchase a typical battery with a 30 per cent discount on installed costs – saving around \$4000 on a typical battery.

The battery will be installed at home and store power from solar panels for the household to use when needed.

The discount will be delivered through the existing Small-scale Renewable Energy Scheme – the same program that has successfully and safely been delivering solar subsidies since 2011.

It will help push down peak demand with fewer homes needing to be on the grid at one time, pushing down prices for everyone.

Small businesses and community facilities will also be able to access the subsidy, with support for up to 50 kWh of batteries sized up to 100 kWh eliqible.

This is part of Labor's plan for households and businesses to benefit from cheaper, cleaner power:

- More Direct Energy Bill Relief: an additional \$150 direct energy bill relief for every household and around one million small businesses from July 1.
- \$1 billion Household Energy Upgrades Fund: provides existing low-cost finance options to reduce up-front costs to assist people to upgrade their homes with modern energy efficient appliances and other energy efficient improvements.
- \$800 million Social Housing Energy Performance Initiative: to reduce energy bills for people in social housing, keep homes more liveable all year round and lower emissions.
- \$100 million Community Energy
 Upgrades Fund: supporting energy
 upgrades at community facilities,
 cutting emissions and driving down
 bills such as upgrading energy efficient lighting and battery storage at
 sporting fields, libraries and
 community centres.

South Coast locals and Friends of the Forest direct action halts logging in Mogo State Forest to support residents and wildlife

On Monday morning 7 April, over 20 south coast locals walked into an active logging operation to stop logging for the day. On arrival they unfurled an End Native Forest Logging banner in front of logging machinery and cut-down spotted gum trees piled up for transport. "We took drastic action today to represent heartbroken Maulbrook and Pollwombra Road South Coast residents who have come to us about the logging of this significant forest", Joslyn van der Moolen from Friends of the Forest (Mogo) said. "Locals have told us they are devastated by the logging of this forest that is full of wildlife that escaped the black summer fires".

Concerned residents have already held three <u>Forest Embassies</u> beside the Princes Highway in Moruya in late 2024 and on Friday 4 April 2025 over 20 locals attended a <u>Knit-In</u> at the Orient Street Batemans Bay Forestry Corporation office. Logging continues despite this area being full of wildlife, including endangered greater gliders, glossy black cockatoos and gang gangs as much of this forest escaped being badly burnt so it's a wildlife refugia.

"As the concerns of the community are being ignored, we have taken this direct action to raise the stakes about these critical issues" Joslyn said.

Over the last six months, <u>eight reports</u> raising issues about the logging have been sent to the EPA and copied to local state MP Michael Holland and federal MP Fiona Philips.

One of the first reports to the EPA was about the need to protect all the endangered greater gliders that survived the fires. These had been found by infrared drone by the federally funded Koala Fund commissioned survey.

Protected casuarinas—feed trees for red tailed glossy black cockatoos—were allegedly cut down and the forest inadequately surveyed for these trees. Residents have also had to knock back forestry requests to access state forest through their properties and a request for a logging buffer on a property boundary has been refused by Forestry.

Over the last two months, noisy operations commenced daily at 4.30am, well before the official 6am start time specified in the harvest plan, resulting in a noise complaint being taken up with the EPA.

Residents face increased fuel load from entire treetops left as waste between Maulbrooks Rd and Pollwombra Rd (over sixty per cent of the tree being left on the forest floor - the entire treetop, bark and stump). In this forest, the yield plan has 36% going to export woodchips and 29% to firewood totalling 65% to short lived products that end up as carbon emissions. Dave from Pollwombra Rd said, "The Forestry NSW hardwood division lost \$29 million in 2024. If this was spent on housing at \$500,000 apiece, we could have 29 units in Batemans Bay and 29 units in Moruya, to address homelessness from the Black Summer fires burning people's houses down. The federal election talks up the cost of living crisis, yet the Feds are also pouring millions each year into propping up native forest logging for woodchips."

Joslyn said, "The federal NSW Greens Senator David Shoebridge <u>visited</u> RHA Firetrail in August 2024 with locals, demanding this forest be protected. In December 2024, the Australian Greens announced that a condition of forming government with a minority federal Labor government is ending native forest logging. Labor needs to move 100% to plantations that already provides most of the construction wood and skilled milling forestry jobs in Australia as argued by the Labor Environment Action Network <u>Lean</u>.










100 years ago from the Moruya & District Historical Society

The Premier has presented to the Eurobodalla Shire Council a photo of the R.M.A.S. Australia. The teak frame is made from part of the woodwork of the historic flagship.

A record in silo building on the South Coast has been established by Mr. Bert Coppin, of Moruya, who completed two large silos at Bodalla in 23 days. One of these necessary adjuncts on a farm was erected on Mr. A. F. Emmott's "Home Farm," and the other on Mr. J. Hansen's "Widget" property. Each measures 27ft x 16ft inside and has a capacity of 120 tons. The buildings which are of re-inforced concrete bricks, do infinite credit to the contractor, Mr. Coppin.

One of the Tilba district's oldest identities in the person of Mr. R. M. Bate passed over the Great Divide on Monday, at the age of 78 years. The deceased was a brother of Messrs. S. W. Bate, of Central Tilba, and John Bate, of Tilba Tilba, and the father of Mr. H. J. Bate, a valued member of the Eurobodalla Shire Council.

There passed away at his son's residence, Eurobodalla, on the 30th March, Mr. Michael Stormon, Senior, one of the very oldest pioneers of the South Coast District, at the ripe old age of 87 years. He was a native of Tipperary, Ireland, but came to New South Wales when an infant in 1836 with his parents. He lived in his parents home in Mullenderree till 1860 when he decided to explore the country south of Moruya. At this time there were no roads nor bridges only cattle tracks, through dense scrubs, and over ranges. He succeeded in penetrating the district as far as Cobargo. But the beautiful flats he saw on the banks of the Tuross River impressed him, and he finally selected there, and acquired a comfortable home. ... He was a splendid horseman, and his help was always sought when bush stock-keeping had to be done in any part of the district; few riders could keep pace with him in the bush, and few wild horses managed to escape from his chase. In 1864 he married Miss Hanoria Corbett, who predeceased him by four years. He leaves five sons, Bartholomew and William (Sydney), John (Lismore), and Michael and Ignatius, (Eurobodalla), and seven daughters, Mrs. D. J. Coman, (Toowoomba, Queensland), Mesdames Schuback, Latty, and McGrade (Sydney), Mrs. Heartneddy (Braidwood), Mrs. Moffit (Ballarat, Victoria), and Mary, (Hong Kong). One son, Edward, predeceased his father by three years. Mr. Stormon also leaves thirty-five grandchildren, and fourteen greatgrandchildren. He was buried in the Catholic Cemetery at Moruya, the Rev. Father Deenihan officiating at the grave.

Federal Labor to help households slash their electricity bills by subsidising home batteries

The Southcoast Health and Sustainability Alliance (SHASA) strongly supports Federal Labor's pledge of \$2.3b for a 30% subsidy for household batteries. Labor expects the discount to help see 1 million new batteries installed by 2030, with the policy to be in place from July 2025. Currently there are four million household roof top solar systems and only 100,000 batteries, due to the upfront cost of batteries. A 30% subsidy (approx \$4000) will assist up to one million households to install batteries. These batteries will save households up to \$1,100 per annum on their electricity bills.

SHASA President Kathryn Maxwell said "this is the smartest and most cost effective way to enable the excess solar generated during the day to be stored and then made available for the peak in consumption in the evening. Importantly it will reduce the amount of peaking gas used in the evenings which is very expensive. Unlike big batteries household batteries do not require extra transmission lines which are also very expensive. And there is little need for extra investment in poles and wires and power stations as the electricity provider and the electricity consumer are co-located so everyone will be better off".

SHASA President Kathryn Maxwell said "I have roof top solar, batteries and an electric vehicle charged by solar, and only draw 1-2kWh of electricity from the grid. I save money and reduce pressure on Essential Energy's poles and wires, its a win for the whole community".

Proposed public service cuts causes concern for locals

The Coalition's plan to slash 41,000 public service jobs will lead to longer wait times, reduced access to vital assistance and job losses for Batemans Bay locals, according to the Community and Public Sector Union (CPSU). In the electorate of Gilmore, there are:

- 27,925 Age Pension recipients
- 7,270 Disability Support Pension recipients
- 4,477 NDIS participants
- 5,347 Veterans and their families
- 5,450 JobSeeker recipients

The electorate of Gilmore has the 4th highest number of pensioners in the country and more than 90 people visit the Batemans Bay Services Australia service centre every day, meaning these proposed cuts will impact significantly.

Melissa Donnelly, CPSU National Secretary, said "Gilmore locals deserve better than this. Families deserve to be able to access Medicare, older people in aged care deserve to be protected, Veterans deserve to get the support they need from DVA, and our farmers need to know that biosecurity is well-resourced and effective."

Marilyn Beaumont OAM is a 74 year old Broulee pensioner and is most concerned about the potential loss of services and speaks of personal experience.

Marilyn said "I tried to amend my assets online to continue receiving my pension. I was unsuccessful and phoned Services Australia but they could not fix it over the phone. They made an appointment with Services Australia in Batemans Bay and although there was a long wait I was assisted by a very helpful public servant. In fact, I had to return the next day with more required documentation and the same public servant recognised me, saved me from going through the whole story again, and fixed the problem quickly. The service saved me a trip to either Ulladulla or Canberra to have the matter addressed. This office is always busy so cuts in staff will have a huge impact on delivery of services." She is also concerned about loss of jobs for locals and limiting the capability to respond to natural disasters.

Marilyn said "The public service extends way beyond Canberra. The proposed cuts of over 41,000 employees will have a major impact locally and deny a career path for our young locals. We also need to be able to 'scale up' rapidly to meet local needs in times of need such bushfires or floods. Without doubt the potential loss of over 41,000 leaves us very vulnerable here in Gilmore."

The proposed Australian Public Services are already a major

Fiona Phillips, Federal Member for Gilmore said "Under the Liberals, APS job losses will hit hard right across the south coast. It will hurt families, tradies and workers who travel to Canberra for work, and adversely impact tourism and spending in our region. I'm very concerned about the impact these cuts would have on our local Services Australia call centre at Batemans Bay, emergency response and recovery from natural disasters, and defence locally.

We are creating jobs and fantastic opportunities on the South Coast and Dutton wants to slash them with no regard for local workers or the impact on our region."

Farmers welcome write-off clarity NSW Farmers has welcomed the Prime Minister's announcement that the

\$20,000 instant asset write-off will be extended, if re-elected.

Introduced in 2015, the instant asset write-off allowed businesses to claim a deduction for the cost of an asset up to a prescribed value and had been widely used for the purchase of tools, IT equipment and even small vehicles.

While the commitment to extend the scheme for another 12 months was welcome, NSW Farmers President Xavier Martin said, farm businesses wanted to see a permanent, practical solution to support a stronger farming future.

"It's great that it's been extended but farming businesses need more certainty going forward," Mr Martin said.

"When it was \$150,000 during COVID businesses used this scheme to buy utes or side-by-sides, it was a practical business support both for the buyer and the seller. "The instant asset write-off is an important tool for managing cost of business pressures and making it \$30,000 or \$50,000 as some suggest would give us better certainty for those larger, more strategic purchases."

According to the Prime Minister, the threshold applied per asset – meaning businesses could claim multiple purchases from tools to computers and tablets, office equipment to kitchen equipment and coffee machines for cafes.

Mr Martin urged all sides of politics to talk to farmers about how the instant asset write-off scheme could support strategic investment, and take the opportunity of the election campaign to support a stronger farming future.

"Espresso machines and iPads are great, but you can't get a new ute for under \$30,000, let alone \$20,000," Mr Martin said. "Opening it up a bit will provide more certainty and ease the decision-making process.

"This could be a real driver for rural and regional communities where agriculture underpins the whole economy."

Calling all tittle-tats, dob in a dumper

Eurobodalla Council is encouraging locals to 'dob in a dumper'.

Following on from Clean Up Australia Day early in March, Council is putting renewed focus on illegal dumping, which appears to be on the increase. In addition to 152 'clean up' bags of rubbish collected by volunteers and school children for the event, an additional 32 cubic metres of bulky dumped items were dragged out of bush and parkland. These items included furniture and bathroom utilities, foam and building materials, shopping trolleys, bicycle frames and car tyres. The largest amount of dumped waste was collected from Tuross Head, and estimated at 20 cubic metres. Council has a ranger dedicated to monitoring illegal dumping of materials ranging from small bits of litter, to hazardous waste, to burnt-out cars. With an average 200 tonnes of illegally dumped material

David Ramsland has been painting since childhood, with a deep passion that was further ignited by artist Bela Ivanyi, whose influence helped him connect with his artistic self. His subject matter often centres around traditional seascapes and landscapes, which he finds plentiful in the natural beauty of the South Coast of NSW, where he has lived

David said "This exhibition comprises paintings I have created over the recent past, both as studio pieces and as plein air compositions. Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

Moruya River.

The weekend is certainly looking better than the one just gone. We did receive a good drop of rain last weekend, and as such the river was looking a little on the murky side. Fortunately, this has cleared up with the influence of some clean tides this week.

The lower sections of the river will be fishing alot better than the upper sections this weekend.

Prospect the airport flats area, up to the quarry wharf and the Preddy's wharf and back of the hole in the wall area if you are chasing flathead, bream, whiting and trevally. There have been a few small tailor around the spur wall and the Preddy's wharf area as well.

The town bridge will start to see estuary perch's school's build up as we move into the cooler seasons. The southern bank of the river over the weed beds are my favourite areas to throw small soft plastics after dark for these hard pulling species. The middle of the river under the bridge, is still holding good numbers of bream and whiting, with the flathead being a little less obvious. I would pump some nippers on a low tide and come back on the full tide to try and tempt a bream or whiting over the flats this weekend.

Tuross River.

Coila has good numbers of bream available this weekend that have been hitting soft plastics, hard body lures and baits. The Tuross system itself is still producing good numbers of flathead, bream and whiting, with the sand flats and adjacent drop off areas holding good numbers of all these species. The deeper holes in this system will also hold the mighty mulloway, for those wanting target something a bit bigger. The lower areas of the system will have the higher concentrations of fish this weekend after last weekends rainfall, so I would be concentrating my efforts here.

Rock and beach.

Now that the huge seas have abated, the local beaches will again be a fishable option for those that enjoy the sand between their toes. The salmon, bream and whiting will be available along the coastal beaches, with the Moruya breakwall having flathead, bream, trevally along with salmon and tailor. Get out and chase a few fish this weekend.

Offshore.

I don't have much in the way of offshore reports to go on for this weekend, as no one was getting out this week. One can only assume that the snapper, who enjoy a bit of a turn over, will be feeding again on the deeper reefs in and around the 40-50m marks. While the flathead will be readily available in closer. With the water temps still up, Mahi Mahi should be around the local fads along with bonito. Lets us know how you go this weekend if you do manage to get offshore this weekend.

The bait freezer is between bait trucks visit this weekend, so there are a few items missing, tuna fillet, worms, mullet fillet are all absent this weekend. But there should be enough for you to find something the fish will bite on.



In Pennant the Grade 6 side all but cemented their place in the Regional play-offs with a strong win against Tomakin in the game deferred from the rain affected weekend. 
