The Elephant in the Campaign

The argument about the Coalition's plans to replace our aging coal-fired power plants with nuclear facilities is centred on time scale, costs and the down-grading of Labor's support for renewables. It has become such a polarised debate that I thought I would research it myself. Below is a summary of what I found. In relation to time: the Australian Energy Market Operator (AEMO) projects that all the old coalfired power stations will likely have retired by 2037 and replacement capacity must be put in place well in advance. That's less than twelve years from now. However, before any nuclear power plants can be built, we would first need to establish an Australian regulatory system for them. Apparently, this could take up to five years. Additionally, the existing state and federal laws that now prevent the construction/operation of nuclear energy plants would have to be repealed. In Queensland this would require a plebiscite. Perhaps the legal changes could be made before a regulatory system is in place - but if so, juar imagine the time-consuming argy-bargy and court cases, especially from residents living around proposed reactor sites! On top of this, according to the CSIRO, in countries with strict regulations and democratic processes like Australia, construction times can potentially exceed 15 years. This includes the preconstruction phase, which can take several years for planning, licensing, and site preparation, here prolonged by the multiple levels of government which would have jurisdiction over design and delivery. I was surprised to find that the Coalition's plan is not vet decided on which is the best: small power plants to start delivering power by 2035 or large plants to start delivery in 2037. Nothing is said about a date for actually completing delivery. And how long would it take to decide? By 2037, of course, coal power stations will be gone and, although the Coalition does not believe in the possibility of 100% renewable energy, it appears that by that date renewables will already power Australia. Tasmania has now achieved 99.4% renewable electricity and South Australia, presently at over 70%, is projected to achieve 100% by 2027.

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Despite this, Dutton promises a blow to renewables through scrapping Labor's \$20bn Rewiring the Nation Fund for building the necessary transmission links across the country.

As for costs: the ĆSIRO/AEMO GenCost Study shows that, even including the cost of additional transmission and storage required for solar and wind farms, renewables are almost half the price of large-scale nuclear – and even cheaper still compared to small-scale modular reactors.

However, what neither the Coalition (nor Labor for that matter) seems to want to talk about - the elephant in the room - is radioactivity and waste disposal. Most nuclear waste currently created in Australia is "low level" waste of radioactive material created through research, industrial and medical activities. It is stored in containers at 100 sites around Australia, awaiting the establishment of a national waste repository, a perennial promise since the late 1970s. Our small amount of "high level" nuclear waste is transported under guard by road to ports and shipped overseas for reprocessing. This waste is chockers with radioactive elements such as uranium and plutonium which remain deadly for millions of years. Presumably the additional high level waste created by the spent fuel from our new nuclear reactors will likewise travel along the byways and highways of the nation. I could find no mention in the Coalition plan of its disposal but I can't imagine Dutton will be brandishing a lump of it in Parliament to show how safe it is.

Nuclear power plants are designed to be safe. And of course they are... until they're not. I found a Wikipedia list of scores of what the International Atomic Energy Agency defines as a nuclear and radiation accident, namely "an event that has led to significant consequences to people, the environment or the facility". Many of these seemed to me to be serious but "relatively" minor; others are called Chernoble, Three Mile Island, Windscale or Fukishima. None of them were predictable. And as for Lithgow, the Hunter Valley, LaTrobe Valley, Port Augusta – what could possibly go wrong? Look at these sites and decide for yourself!

Delivering a new Seahawks Clubhouse at Hanging Rock

A re-elected Albanese Labor Government would put \$3 million towards the construction of a new clubhouse for the Batemans Bay Seahawks Australian Football Club.

The Seahawks AFL club is booming, with around 300 current players and a 184 per cent growth in player numbers over the past two years. There are four women's teams.

The new clubhouse will include changerooms, rooms for trainers and umpires, a first aid room, storage and amenities.

The project will also help rejuvenate the Hanging Rock precinct, which was an important evacuation centre during the 2019/20 bushfires.

This election commitment recognises advocacy from the Eurobodalla Shire Council.

Consistent with past practice, election commitments will be delivered in line with Commonwealth Grants Rules and Principles. Member for Gilmore, Fiona Phillips said "I know there is huge community support of a new building at Hanging Rock that can support the Seahawks club as it grows and revitalise this sporting precinct. This announcement will be a game-changer for the club, providing facilities that are modern and fit for purpose."

This announcement matches the same commitment made by Candidate for Gilmore Andrew Constance last month. Liberal candidate for Gilmore, Andrew Constance, said the facilities at Hanging Rock need urgent upgrades, with just two change rooms serving dozens of male and female Seahawks teams, across AFL South Coast and Canberra competitions.

Coalition pledge a promising step towards rural health equity National Rural Health Alliance

Construction underway on new \$20 million Batemans Bay Community Health facility

Construction is underway on the new Batemans Bay Community Health facility, which will provide a sustainable, purpose-built community health service for the local community.

Parliamentary Secretary for Health and Regional Health and Member for Bega Dr Michael Holland attended a sod turn event to mark the major milestone, which included planting three trees on site.

The NSW Government is investing \$20 million to deliver a range of community-based services in one location for the communities of Batemans Bay and surrounding areas.

The new, purpose-built Batemans Bay Community Health facility will include: • Allied health

- Child, youth and family services
- Women's health
- · Sexual health
- · Community nursing and wound management
- Palliative care
- · Aboriginal health
- · Community mental health and drug & alcohol
- · Specialist outpatient clinics

Pathology

The new facility will be built on the existing Batemans Bay Hospital site and located close to the Medicare Urgent Care Clinic which opened it 2023. The build will deliver a modern health facility with more spaces to better support healthcare teams in providing enhanced care to the local community.

The facility will include interview, consultation, and treatment rooms for a range of services, a gymnasium, as well as larger rooms that can accommodate groups and families and be used as education spaces.

The investment into community health in Batemans Bay builds on the \$330 million new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital which will deliver an enhanced level of healthcare service and more beds than Moruya and Batemans Bay hospitals combined.

The new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital will include a new and expanded Emergency Department, an eight bed Intensive Care Unit and the first paediatric unit for the region. There will also be increased access to chemotherapy treatments and renal dialysis, modern surgical and operating theatres, expanded medical imaging, mental health service, ambulatory care and outpatient services; and education facilities which will support the needs of the entire Eurobodalla Shire from Narooma to Batemans Bay.

Monarch Building Solutions Pty Limited has been awarded the contract to deliver the new Batemans Bay Community Health facility following a competitive tender process. Site establishment works will commence in the coming weeks, which will include the installation of site fencing and sheds.

Batemans Bay Hospital, including the current Community Health service, will continue to operate while the new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital and Batemans Bay Community Health facility are built.

Minister for Regional Health, Ryan Park said, "It is terrific to see construction underway on the new, purpose-built Batemans Bay Community Health facility, which will be transformative for staff and the local community.

"Having services including child and family health, Aboriginal and women's health and drug and alcohol services all under the one roof will enhance accessibility and better support the health needs of people in Batemans Bay and surrounding areas."

Member for Bega, Dr Michael Holland said, "I look forward to seeing the new Batemans Bay Community Health facility come to life, with the contractor appointed and construction underway.

"The new health facility will complement the \$330 million Eurobodalla Regional Hospital, currently under construction, ensuring our community always has access to the right healthcare in the most appropriate setting."

Construction of the new health facility is expected to be completed in 2026, followed by an operational commissioning stage to support staff moving into the new facility.



Expansion of alternative

sentencing options on South Coast The NSW Government has expanded access to alternative sentencing for Aboriginal offenders on the South Coast to help reduce reoffending, improve justice outcomes and improve community safety.

Circle Sentencing Courts are now operating at Moruya and Narooma in addition to Batemans Bay.

Circle sentencing is available to eligible defendants who plead guilty to or are found guilty of criminal offences in a local court. Rather than being sentenced by a magistrate alone, defendants are sentenced by a magistrate alongside representatives from the local Aboriginal community, such as elders

In addition, the police prosecutor is always involved, while the victim can choose to participate if they wish.

The court has the full sentencing power of a traditional court for offenders who meet the criteria and are assessed as suitable.

Circle Sentencing currently operates at 22 high-priority locations after beginning in Nowra in 2002.

Five defendants have already participated in Circle Sentencing across Moruya and Narooma, and another four at Batemans Bay. A 2020 study by NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research found Aboriginal people who participated in Circle Sentencing were 9.6 per cent less likely to reoffend, compared to those sentenced to a noncustodial sentence in a traditional way. In developing the sentence, the group discusses factors including the impact on the victim and what can be done to prevent further offending.

Attorney General Michael Daley said "The NSW Government is proud to support the expansion of Circle Sentencing on the South Coast.

"Aboriginal people who participate in Circle Sentencing are less likely to end up in jail or reoffend. It gives Aboriginal communities a say in the sentencing process"

Local Solar Battery Installations soar

Households and businesses in Bega are among the 7,800 across NSW enjoying lower energy bills thanks to the strong early adoption of the Minns Labor Government's household battery incentive, which delivers thousands of dollars off the cost of installation. Since the incentive was launched in November, more than 7,800 batteries have been installed in homes and businesses across NSW. That includes premises in the following

Local Government Areas in and around the electorate of Bega:-

Bega Valley- 45 installations.

Eurobodalla - 58 installations By using the incentive scheme, eligible homeowners and businesses get an upfront discount on the cost of battery installation through installers working with government-accredited suppliers. The discount amount is related to the size of the battery, meaning larger batteries attract bigger discounts. For a typical household battery with 13.5 kilowatt-hours of capacity, this isa discount of more than \$2000 on average and is available for both new and existing solar systems. A typical household with an \$1850 annual electricity bill can save around \$1500 per year by installing solar and a battery.

More than half of the 7,800 installations have taken place outside the Sydney Region. The scheme has reached more than 90% of all Local Government Areas in NSW, with more than 600 installers taking part across the state. With more than one-third of NSW homes now equipped with rooftop solar systems, the ability to store this solar energy in batteries for later use offers significant benefits for household budgets and energy reliability.

The household battery incentive is part of the NSW Government's Peak Demand Reduction Scheme, reducing peak electricity demand in NSW, maintaining grid stability during periods of high electricity demand and reducing the grid's reliance on fossil fuels.

The Minns Labor Government is delivering cost of living relief through \$435 million in annual energy bill rebates, \$200 million to support the roll-out of public EV charging stations and \$175 million to make energy savings upgrades for 24,000 social housing homes.

Minister for Climate Change and Energy Penny Sharpe said: "NSW has set a cracking pace for battery adoption across the country, and we only see this momentum picking up. These installations are providing cost of living relief through lower energy bills and are making a valuable contribution to a more sustainable and secure energy system." Member for Bega Dr Michael Holland said: "It's great to see a strong uptake of the NSW solar battery incentive here in Bega and Eurobodalla, where more than 100 homes and businesses have connected a battery to their solar systems.

"It's a win-win – action that reduces power bills and benefits our environment. I encourage all locals to explore options for installing solar and batteries on their home or business.'

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Two million properties in the firing line: Data reveals how Climate Change threatens the Great Australian Dream

NEW DATA OUT TODAY exposes the electorates where homes and businesses are most at risk from climate-fuelled flooding, bushfires, tropical cyclone winds, coastal inundation, and extreme wind. The <u>Climate Risk Map</u>, an interactive online map using fresh data from

<u>Climate Valuation</u>, allows every Australian to see the climate risks in their local area.

A new report, <u>At Our Front Door</u>, analyses this data at a national level. It finds:

- One in 23 Australian homes and businesses, or 652,424 properties (4.4%), across the country are already at high risk today from one or more hazards that have been made more dangerous by climate pollution.
- Another 1.55 million properties (10.4%) nationally are at moderate risk

 for which insurance costs will be abnormally high. That's a further
 one in 10 properties.
- At high levels of climate pollution, our exposure to climate risk is set to get much worse, with twice as many properties (more than 1.3 million) at high risk by 2100.
- Further, the analysis finds that more than 72,000 homes and businesses are located in 86 suburbs categorised as "critical climate risk zones", where 80-100% of properties are classified as high risk and insurance may soon become unaffordable or withdrawn entirely.

Climate Councillor and economist Nicki Hutley said: "The climate crisis is literally at the doorstep of Australian households, as worsening extreme weather driven by climate pollution risks their greatest asset: the home. "We keep getting hit by disasters in Australia and that's driving insurance bills through the roof, but we cannot insure our way out of this crisis. "It's not just Australian voters in risky areas who should be looking closely at this. Five of the top 10 ASX-listed companies are banks with significant exposure to climate disaster risk through residential mortgages and loans for commercial property and businesses.

"This election there is a stark contrast between the two major parties' climate policies. The Coalition plans will release billions of tonnes of more climate pollution which will contribute to worsening extreme weather, while the ALP has concrete policies to reduce pollution."

"The Climate Council and Climate Valuation are releasing this data free to the public as we believe people have a right to know the threats they're facing now and into the future."

Climate Valuation founder Karl Mallon said: "Our data draws on 15 million commercial and residential properties in over 15,000 Australian suburbs and 150 electorates. The numbers show us that climate change is not a far-off future event: it threatens entire communities today.

"Most alarmingly, our analysis has identified 86 critical climate risk zones requiring urgent and major government interventions, such as flood levies, buy backs or other measures. It is imperative that decision makers at all levels look seriously at the stark statistics presented here and work to address questions head-on: What adaptation action are all levels of government going to take now to protect our vulnerable communities? And, how will this be financed?"

Climate Councillor and Former NSW Fire & Rescue Chief Greg Mullins said: "As the climate risk map and report makes distressingly clear, no home or business is now safe from the devastating consequences of burning fossil fuels.


"Even if your electorate is in a low risk zone, it does not mean fires or floods won't happen in your local area because climate change has rewritten the rules.

"As the recent fires in LA and Japan show, massive fires can now happen in winter. They can happen in rainforests like the Daintree or in the suburbs of London. We've been through Black Summer, Black Saturday, and the 2003 fires that badly impacted Canberra. Unfortunately, we've already locked in conditions for similar fires again, but we have a choice for the future. We must drive down global climate pollution faster and continue the shift to clean energy. The cost of failing to do so is spelled out in this climate risk map."

Labor delivering \$600,000 to Ozfish for Saltmarsh Management

Fiona Phillips and Carol Berry (Federal Labor Candidate for Whitlam) have announced that a re-elected Albanese Labor Government will clean up saltmarshes in three locations: the Clyde River at Batemans Bay, Burrill Lake and Lake Illawarra. Saltmarsh ecosystems provide shelter for juvenile fish and popular recreational fish species, as well as being prawnproduction powerhouses.

Unfortunately, there has been a large decline in saltmarshes across the NSW South Coast. This election commitment will deliver \$600,000 to OzFish who will partner with local recreational fishers, traditional owners and municipal councils to monitor and improve the saltmarshes.

OzFish is a not-for-profit organisation dedicated to helping the millions of Aussie recreational fishers take control of the health of their rivers, lakes and estuaries.

Restoration at this scale will only happen by engaging local volunteers in the community. This \$600,000 election commitment will help OzFish to maintain these saltmarshes and with the help of over 100 volunteers allow them to undertake:

1.Weed removal and native species planting 2.Rubbish removal

3.Educational workshops and events

4.Ecosystem health assessments

OzFish will continue to maintain these sites for years to come.

This project would build on the Government's other investments to better protect our environment, including over \$550 million to better protect threatened plants and animals and tackle invasive pests.

Consistent with past practice, election commitments will be delivered in line with Commonwealth Grants Rules and Principles.

Tanya Plibersek, Member for Sydney said "We know Australians care deeply about nature and want to do their bit to protect the environment for their kids and grandkids. "This project will help restore saltmarshes and boost water quality, better protecting the native species that rely on these waterways.

"Healthy saltmarshes support fish and prawn breeding that's why people who love fishing are so keen to get involved in these projects.

"It's also a great way to get more locals in the Illawarra and South Coast involved in looking after nature in their community.

"This builds on our \$200 million investment in over 100 projects to clean up rivers and waterways in urban areas. These include things like removing weeds in the Lane Cove River corridor to better protect the Glossy Black-Cockatoo, restoring more than 3 hectares of native oyster reefs that had been decimated by disease in the Georges River, and improving wetland connectivity to support fish populations in Cairns.

Councils cheer return of Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program

ALGA has warmly welcomed the Coalition's commitment this week to reinstate their highly successful Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program if elected on 3 May. ALGA President Matt Burnett said:

"Introduced by the Coalition in 2020, the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program was a game-changer, supporting all 537 of our councils to build, maintain and upgrade thousands of libraries, recreation centres, playgrounds, skate parks, bike paths, and of course the roads we all use every day."

"The formula-based program was an extraordinary success, driving an almost \$1 billion improvement in the condition of our local facilities over three years."

"Unfortunately, the final round of LRCI funding was allocated in July 2023, and since then we have been advocating for the program's return.

"We are thrilled that the Coalition has recognised the value of investing in our communities, and committed to bringing back the Local Roads and Community infrastructure Program at \$1 billion per year if

they form government."

"Reinstating the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program will support every council, and more importantly, provide tangible benefits to every Australian community.

"The state of our regional roads is a big concern, and we are pleased that the renewed LRCI will include funding for regional councils to build and maintain safer local roads." Mayor Burnett said the non-competitive formula-based structure of the LRCI was one of its biggest strengths.

"Many Australian councils are facing a financial sustainability crisis, and it is formulabased, non-competitive federal funding provided to all local governments that provides our communities with the best results," said Mayor Burnett. "What we need now is for this commitment to be enshrined in legislation like Roads to Recovery. Without funding certainty we cannot do the long-term planning that our communities need."

"In the lead up to this year's election, ALGA is calling for \$3.5 billion through five new formula-based, non-competitive funding programs for all councils, which would include:

- \$1.1 billion per year for enabling infrastructure to unlock housing supply,
- \$500 million per year for community infrastructure,
- · \$600 million per year for safer local roads,
- \$900 million per year for increased local government emergency management capability and capacity, and
- \$400 million per year for climate adaptation.







Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report Moruya River.

With the forecast looking pretty good for the weekend, I'm keen to see what everyone gets up to this weekend. Be sure to post you captures from this weekend below.

Moruya river is fishing pretty well at the moment, the tides are well placed for an evening session this weekend, with the high tide occurring just after dark.

I would look at the areas around Quarry wharf, Preddy's wharf and under the town bridge. Flathead, bream, mulloway and tailor could on the cards.

Soft plastics or baits will all work well. Live nippers pumped from the Garlandtown flats work particularly well under the town bridge for flathead, bream, whiting or trevally.

The spur wall at the front of the system usually fishes well with soft plastics for those chasing flathead. Bloodworm Squidgie Wigglers in 80-100mm size are a good option.

The upper sections of the river do have higher fresh water levels, as the system is still draining after the rains a few weeks ago.

Tuross River.

The same conditions will apply for the Tuross system as Moruya this weekend, with the lower to middle sections offering the best chance at finding a flathead, bream, whiting, mulloway or tailor.

The sand flats will be holding flathead, bream and whiting, while the deeper holes should hold the odd mulloway, bigger flathead or the odd tailor during the low light periods that will coincide with the tide changes this weekend. Live poddy mullet are a gun bait for the bigger predators, while a live nipper should tempt both the smaller and large predators alike.

As we get closer to May, the Estuary Perch will be starting to school up for their annual breeding cycle. Good sized fish can be targeted during this time, and I know a few local anglers that enjoy catching and releasing some trophy sized fish this time of year.

Rock and Beach.

I will be out on the local beaches, Rockwall and local headlands this weekend throwing some big plastics for hopefully a big flahead or mulloway, now that the swell conditions are more favourable. Fingers crossed I can find a fish or two. But will be happy to find a few of the salmon that have been around of late.

There are also still good numbers of bream and whiting in the gutters in close. Having looked at the water temp chart, there are signs of the temps starting to drop. It's only a matter of a few weeks before the warm currents get pushed back to the north as winter edges closer. There are good schools of slimey mackerel off Broulee headland, so maybe there may be the odd bonito or even a king hanging round. Trevally and Luderick are also in good numbers from this particular ledge at the moment.

Offshore.

Good sized snapper have been coming over the sides of a few local boats this week, with fish to 60cm reported. Flathead have also been readily available over the sand adjacent to the local reefs. With seas looking to be less than a metre this weekend, and the start of the school holidays, I'm expecting that we will see an increase in boat traffic at the local ramps. Please make sure you boat is ready to launch before you back your car down the ramp. Bungs in, tie downs off and tackle ready to go. The boat ramp is not the place to be rigging your rods up, you are only going to delay everyone else behind you by doing so.

The bait freezer is well stocked this weekend, we have worms back in stock, with mullet fillet being the only no show this week on the bait truck. We have had a few shipments arrive of stock that sees us resupplied for the holidays and upcoming Easter and Anzac Day long weekends. We are open every day during these times. Stay safe everybody and remember, "Every day's a good day for fishing..."

Tuross Teams Strike Pennant Success

Both Tuross Head's Pennant sides chalked up excellent wins in the penultimate round of the 2024/25 Open Pennant season. In Grade 6 Tuross had another great come from behind performance to defeat Dalmeny and confirm their place in the Regional Finals. The Grade 7 side had a surprise win over the ladder leading Moruya side who will now struggle to qualify for the Regional playoffs. Both games were played at Tuross

Phil Welsh, Lori Bird, Denise Lidbury and Bruce Lidbury had the better of a close struggle on their rink. After 14 ends that had a 12 -7 lead that quickly became 12 all after the Dalmeny side picked up 5 shots in two ends. Tuross managed to regain the lead and had a 16 -13 lead with two ends to play. The last two ends were very closely fought with the Tuross players able win each by a single shot to record a 18 - 13 win.

Jim Macklan, Doreen Monks, Ben Hewison and Allan Etheredge had a real battle on their rink in another low scoring match. After 13 ends they trailed Dalmeny 6 – 10 with neither side scoring more than 2 shots on any end. Tuross slowly bridged the gap with the two sides sharing the lead after 16 ends at 10 all.The next two ends determined the result! Tuross picked up 5 shots on the 17^{th} end followed by 3 shots on the 18^{th} end to set up an 18 - 10 lead with just 3 ends to play. Dalmeny fought back but could not manage enough shots to close the gap. Tuross won 19 - 12.

Rose Farrington, Bruce Magilton, Sue Fahey and Marcel Kors were able to recover from a 11 shot deficit after 12 ends to win their match on the last end! Down 4 - 15 after 12 ends they won seven of the last 9 ends to win. With an end to play they were still behind at 16 -17 having not held the lead at any stage. They finished with the biggest score of the day when they scored 4 shots to take the lead for the first time at 20 - 17 at the most important stage of the game – the end!

Wins on all three rinks gave the side another 10 – 0 win – the sixth out of seven games. The 'big board' was very close with Dalmeny in front until the 54th end (out of 63). Their strong finish gave Tuross a 57 – 43 aggregate victory.

The Grade 7 side won a very tight match over Moruya with the key 'big board' aggregate not determined until the final ends were played all three rinks. After 60 of the total 63 ends the two sides were locked at 53 shots apiece! The outcome in the aggregate score is crucial as it is allocated 7 of 10 points that the sides are playing for.

Fran O'Connell, Chris Bright, Dagmar Voges and Lorraine Wake were the key to the Tuross victory. After a close start to their game they gradually took control and by the 16th end they had a commanding 20 - 6 lead. After being stuck on 6 for 8 ends the Moruya side did fight back but the Tuross team were able to win 24 - 12.

Vickie Wheelahan, Marg Downey, Lorraine Johnston and Ray Downey started slowly and found themselves down 10 - 3 after 8 ends. On the 11^{th} and 13^{th} ends they were able to pick up 5 and 3 shots respectively to grab the lead at 15 - 12 after 13 ends. Moruya hit back to be again in front by 18 to 16 after 16 ends. Tuross was able to win 4 of the last 5 ends to take the game 24 - 19. Ray Brown, Graeme Garner, Alan McLeod and John Fahey were well in their match when they trailed by 8 – 10 after 11 ends. The Moruya players were able to win 8 of the last 10 ends to take the rink 22 – 10.


With the big board locked at 53 all with just three ends to play the result on the final end of each game was critical. Tuross was able to win all three ends with Downey scoring 3, Wake 1 and Fahey, with a fantastic final bowl, also picking up 1. This gave Tuross a 58 – 53 aggregate win and the win on two of the three rinks gave them a 9 – 1 win. Moruya now need the results of the final round and one deferred match to go their way for them to have any chance of making the Regional finals.

The final round will be played on April 26 with the Grade 6 travelling to Braidwood. Grade 7 have a final round by but have their washed out clash with Malua Bay scheduled to be played on Sunday April 27.



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New mountain bike trail brings 63,000 riders to the Far South Coast and major economic boost



As part of the Minns Government's plans to encourage healthy lifestyles and outdoor activities, the upgraded Narooma Mountain Bike Trails are attracting thousands of visitors, young and old, to the region while at the same time being a major boost to the local economy.

More than 63,000 riders have visited the extended Narooma Mountain Bike Trails in the first year since they opened - an almost 89 per cent increase in visitors, compared to 2023. Following \$4.1 million in funding from the Australian and NSW Government's Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund, a further 58 kilometres of mountain trails have been added to the existing 30 kilometres in Bodalla State Forest. This has created some 250 kilometres of trails across

Narooma, Eden and Mogo making the region one of Australia's foremost mountain biking regions with restaurants, breweries, accommodation, bike repair shops among just a few of the local businesses benefitting.

The funding also added a new trail head carpark at the base in Bodalla State Forest, which opened alongside the additional trails in early 2024.

The Narooma township has experienced the flow on impacts of this economic boost, with visitors spending \$69.5 million in 2024.

While precise figures are not available as to the direct impact of the mountain trails, local businesses are clearly reaping the benefits.

Southbound Escapes, a tour operator that offers mountain bike shuttles on the trails, went from employing two part-time workers in 2023, to three full-time workers and eight casuals. The additional staff are a direct response to the increase in visitors to the trails, with the Southbound Escapes café and shuttle service attributing to 74 per cent of the business revenue in 2024.

In 2025, Southbound Escapes has already recorded more than 9,300 people using the mountain bike shuttles service, with mountain bikers coming from across Australia.

Local business Whale Coast Realty manages more than 153 holiday properties in the area and has also seen the overflow of benefits from mountain bike tourism in the region,

Local Federal Member for Eden-Monaro Kristy McBain said "The Narooma Mountain Bike Trails have been a real game changer for our economy on the coast - they are providing a welcome boost for our fabulous local businesses.

"But they have also been warmly embraced by locals – and provide a fun and healthy activity for local families. I'm so proud to see the positive impact they are having on our local community." Local State MP for Bega, Dr Michael Holland said "The Narooma Mountain Bike Trails have put Narooma on the map as a must-visit destination for bike riders of all ages. It's projects like this that not only showcase the unique charm of the Far South Coast, but also attract visitors, encourage spending, and create lasting opportunities for the community.

Eurobodalla Shire Council economic manager, Teresa Lever said "While we can't contribute all the increase in spending to the trails, we know the opening of the extended trails has been a major contributor. "One unexpected benefit of the trails is the increase in locals of all ages taking up the recreational activity. This has huge economic benefits for Eurobodalla due to improved health and social outcomes for residents."

Southbound Escapes director, Sally Bouckley said "The opening of the Narooma Mountain Bike Trails has added a few extra income streams to Southbound Escapes, including the mountain bike shuttles, which include a service that quickly takes riders to the top of the trail. "We have also seen an increase in visitation to our cafe, The Hub Espresso Bar, which is a popular place for mountain bikers to grab a coffee and snack before they go riding. Since the opening of the park, mountain bikers are coming all year around and especially in off peak times and they are staying for longer, with most riding Mogo, Eden, Tathra and even Thredbo in the same trip. '

Whale Coast Realty principal, John Murray said "The opening of the Narooma Mountain Bike Trails and the extended trails has improved many businesses like ours, not just in the peak period but also outside of the peak periods. We can see the benefits and have made changes in our business so we can offer visitors more bike friendly options because of that. "We've seen an increased demand for our accommodation as a direct result of the mountain bike trails, and our bookings are up by almost one third since the trails opened."
