Not For Profit End of Life Hub 'Transition - End of Life Haven'

The current situation in regards to end of life services in the Eurobodalla is very concerning. The only Hospice/Palliative Care beds available are in the hospitals and there are about four of them. People generally don't want to die in a hospital setting and often can't die at home, even with the support of Palliative Care, and I believe we need an alternative here. People need to have a choice as to where they would prefer to die. Everybody deserves to feel safe and supported at this monumental time

With the 2021 population in the Shire being 40,593, and increase of 3,361 from 2016, and the population continuing to grow, I was concerned to discover that the Eurobodalla doesn't have a dedicated end of life or Hospice facility.

I am proposing to set up and create a Not-For-Profit End of Life facility with Charity status.

The proposal is for an end of life facility with homeaway-from-home accommodation, spaces to care for the deceased and life celebration spaces, all in a beautiful, peaceful environment.

This facility will be a real asset to the people of the Eurobodalla well into the future.

To make this a reality, I need the help of our community. I need people to join me on the initial planning Committee and then the Governing Board. I will need to apply to all levels of Government for financial assistance, Grants, etc. I will be applying to all available philanthropic organisations in the area and ensuring it is all set up correctly, but we will also need Government funding and assistance. I am an ex-Nurse, an experienced End of Life Doula, Funeral Director and Celebrant, and have researched what is needed to make this happen and I am more than willing to donate a huge amount of my valuable time and expertise in getting this up and running but won't be able to do it without the assistance of the people of the Eurobodalla Shire and the willing cooperation of government. Double demerits in place for safer roads this Anzac Day lona weekend

Motorists are reminded to slow down and follow the road rules as double demerits are back in place tor all speeding, seatbelt, illegal mobile phone use, and motorcycle helmet offences from Thursday 24 to Sunday 27 April for the Anzac Day long weekend.

Roads across the state are expected to be busy as people attend Anzac Day events, travel out of town to make the most of the long weekend, and make their way home ahead of school resuming.

Transport for NSW Transport for NSW Executive Director Transport Safety, Chadi Chalhoub said it's important that we all do our part to keep our roads safe for everyone travelling and ensure that everyone returns home safely. "Road safety is a shared responsibility, and I urge all motorists to make safe decisions this long weekend. One bad decision on the road can cost you more than double demerits - it could cost a life.

"Sadly, six people died on our roads during the double demerit period for the Anzac Day long weekend last year," Mr Chalhoub said.

"We don't want more families to lose their loved ones so be vigilant and always allow extra time to travel even for short trips.

"If you're travelling on regional roads, be sure to take regular breaks and watch out for animals on the road," Mr Chalhoub said.

During this time, double demerits will apply to all speeding, seatbelt, illegal mobile phone use, and motorcycle helmet offences.

New figures show sharp increase in crimes solved by NSW Police The Minns Labor Government welcomes data from the NSW Bureau of

Crime Statistics and Research (BOCSAR) showing a sharp increase in crimes solved by police. The study, Trends in police legal action rates 2009-2023, examines the rate of legal action taken by police across 11 categories of offences over 15 years.

It reveals a significant increase in charges laid over violent offences including robbery (up 20 percentage points), between 2009 and 2023.

There were also increases across the rates of legal action for domestic violence-related assault (up 7 percentage points), non-domestic assault (up 2 percentage points), sexual touching and other sexual offences (up 2 percentage points).

The rate of legal action taken over malicious damage to property offences rose 14 percentage points over the same period. Significant increases were also recorded across non-dwelling break and the over 50s for close to 30 years. As an organisation, enters (up 13 percentage points), dwelling break and enters (up 8 percentage points), motor vehicle theft (up 8 percentage points) and steal from motor véhicle (up 3 percentage points).

The Government pays tribute to the hard work of the NSW Police Force in delivering these results, which show the risk of being caught is higher than ever before.

The Minns Labor Government is backing our police force through boosting pay for officers, along with paying recruits to attend the Goulburn academy as part of our commitment to community safety.

Why voting for a safe climate matters

"Vote as if the future of your kids depends on it because it does'! This is how we are urged to vote by climate action scorecards developed by the South East Climate Alliance (SECA). The scorecards rate the climate action policies and promises of the four main candidates for Gilmore. Ratings are based on how each of the candidates have indicated they will perform on renewables roll out, fossil fuel phase out, nature protection and economic response to climate change. The scorecards have been distributed through the Eurobodalla and will be available at polling booths. Already we are experiencing the impacts of climate change in real time. Things will continue to get worse, far worse, without determined action. Scientists have confirmed that the intensity of ongoing catastrophic weather events are linked to climate change. For decades, they have predicted that climate change will bring increased frequency and intensity of adverse weather events such as storms, floods, bushfires, cyclones, drought. Such events are now regularly turning our lives upside down, both in Australia and globally.

Yet it is cost of living that is identified as the most pressing issue affecting voters at this election. This is followed by other critical survival issues such as housing and health. What many voters might overlook is the link between the soaring cost of living and the climate crisis. It has been shown that climate related catastrophes, such as last month's Cyclone Alfred and the devastating Queensland floods that followed it, directly contribute to the rising cost of living.

Research by the Australia Institute (Cost-of-Living and the Climate Crisis, February 2025) showed that important components of the cost-of-living crisis are a direct result of the climate crisis. Key among these soaring price impacts are the cost of insurance, food and energy. The report found that climate change and fossil fuel exports have caused the cost of basic human needs, such as shelter, warmth and food, to

'The pressures of day to day survival can be so intense that it is not surprising many people will not see the bigger picture,' spokesperson for 350 Eurobodalla and trauma counsellor Marie Jamieson said. 'The Australia Institute report makes clear that each year we fail to mitigate emissions is another year we bake in cost-of-living pressure for the future. Tragically, it means we risk exposing our children and future generations to an uncertain world, to the trauma of worsening adverse weather events and climate catastrophes. We have a responsibility to act to secure long term climate safety and food security. Short term antidotes will not touch deeper causes and complexities'.

This election is more critical than ever to turn the tide on advancing climate chaos and to build on the work already done to transition to renewables. Climate scientists stress that the next five to ten years will be pivotal for positive action to ensure a safer future. Waiting to act or holding out for costly long term projects like nuclear will make it far too late. 'We want to see a world with more equity, with better access to basics and free of the spiralling costs, the personal and

business losses, traumas and mental health impacts that a worsening climate will bring'.

Voters are encouraged to study the scorecard and to think carefully about how they vote. All our futures, and especially the future of our children, will depend on it.

A scorecard may have been delivered to your mailbox or you should be able to access one when you go to vote. It can be viewed on the Facebook page of 350 Eurobodalla. SECA is an alliance of twelve conservation groups from the south east. It includes 350 Eurobodalla, SHASA, Nature Coast Marine Group, Bushfire Survivors for Climate Action and Friends of the Forest (Mogo)."

Young and old urged to get vaccinated before challenging winter season

The NSW Government is today launching its official winter vaccines campaign ahead of the peak respiratory virus season

International experience indicates the possibility of a higher than usual influenza activity season this year.

To ensure people have the essential services they rely on, the Minns Labor Government has worked to get the supply of vaccines out to doctors and pharmacists.

Vaccination rates for vulnerable groups have been declining nationally as well as globally.

In NSW, the influenza vaccine rate for six-month to five-year-olds has declined from 28.3 per cent in 2023 to 25 per cent in 2024, and for over 65s it was down from 62 per cent in 2023 to 60 per cent in 2024.

Influenza vaccine is free under the National Immunisation Program (NIP) for:

- · Children aged 6 months to less than 5 years
- · People aged 65 years and older
- · Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 6 months and olde
- · Pregnant women
- · Those with serious health conditions such as diabetes, cancer, immune disorders, obesity, severe asthma, kidney, heart, lung or liver disease.

People can access flu vaccinations through their pharmacist or local GP.

Last month, the NSW Government announced an investment of \$16.6 million to ensure all newborns in NSW can be protected from serious illness from respiratory syncytial virus (RSV). It means newborns can either receive free protection from RSV through maternal vaccination or immunisation before they leave the hospital.

The NSW Government has invested \$15 million to improve vaccine access to vulnerable communities across NSW such as culturally and linguistically diverse groups.

Gadfly

My thanks to all those kind people who wished me a 'Happy Easter' on 'Good Friday'. I took their words to heart and had a nice sleep-in. In the afternoon I planned to read a book about Christianity by an historian but couldn't concentrate.

Those kindly wishes kept rattling around in my head. They'd been delivered by people including Christians and I couldn't help wondering what was so 'good' about that Friday when their leader, Jesus of Nazareth, was nailed to a cross. I'm guessing the 'happy' bit is discovering three days later that the stone covering the tomb that held his lifeless body had been rolled away and according to some disciples he was up and about again.

Of course, we Australians were not the only ones marking the occasion. According to *New York Times*' writer Ruth Graham, 'President Trump's White House spent much of this week celebrating, including at a livestreamed Easter prayer service and a dinner attended by the president. Trump told attendees he hoped it would be "one of the great Easters ever".' (Well, that's Donald for you).

According to Ruth, he and the First Lady said they were celebrating, "the living Son of God who conquered death, freed us from sin, and unlocked the gates of Heaven for all of humanity." She said, 'Prayer sessions and even hymn-singing have broken out in the West Wing, in public and in private, and even Cabinet meetings opened with prayer "in Jesus name".' Nothing surprising there.

But what does amaze me is the paucity of genuine academic curiosity about what really happened at those crucial nascent times in religious stories. The Buddhists and the Hindus had their beginnings too far back in time to pin down the difference between the empirical and the spiritual.

The Muslims are passionate about their Prophet Muhammad and the seventh century revelations, social and spiritual, of the Quran. Christianity is unique in that the story of Jesus is a mixture of Judaism which the early Apostles used to validate his supernatural relationship to their God, a notion that the Jewish religion rejects. But since both Christianity and Judaism rest on the written word, it is surely within our scientific capability to discover the truth of the matter.

In fact, that's what the eminent Swedish historian Prof Elvar Ellegard attempted in my Easter reading. His meticulous research in 'Jesus. One Hundred Years before Christ' is, in my view, the closest we have yet come to untangling the written sources to produce a viable reality.

His thesis is that the name Jesus ('The help of Yahweh') applied to the Essenes' Teacher of Righteousness. He lived at least a century before a small group of Essenes in Jerusalem had 'visions' of his sitting on the righthand of God and imagined he would rid them of their Roman persecutors. They, and the Apostle Paul who had a similar vision, spread the word.

New devotees included Gnostics who believed Jesus was a spirit and as individuals they could communicate directly with God. But organisers, including Bishop Ignatius, favoured a Church. So in the second century he and church followers developed an entirely fictitious story of Jesus' life on earth – including all the usual miraculous elements of supernatural behaviour – which became the Gospels. And it worked. People love a story; the Gnostics gave up the ghost; and the rest is history.





Gas is No Fix: SHASA Calls for Climate-Smart Energy Choices

As climate change impacts intensify across the NSW South Coast, the Southcoast Health and Sustainability Alliance (SHASA) is urging governments and the community to focus on clean, affordable, and future-proof energy solutions.

"Our region has faced bushfires, storms, and recordbreaking heatwaves," said SHASA President Kathryn Maxwell. "The decisions we make now will determine the safety, health, and economic wellbeing of our communities for years to come."

SHASA warns that recent calls to expand gas supply to reduce energy costs are misguided.

"Even at reduced prices, gas-fired electricity is still among the most expensive and polluting options available," Ms Maxwell said. "It's no longer just a climate issue—it's an economic liability."

According to the CSIRO, electricity from \$10/gigajoule gas still costs around \$170 per megawatt hour—more than twice the cost of wind and solar at \$40 to \$80. The Australian Energy Regulator reports that gas power averaged \$235 per megawatt

With over 80% of Australia's gas exported, boosting supply offers little price relief for local consumers. "Gas doesn't provide price security or climate security," said SHASA Vice President Steve Colman. "Communities like ours are paying the price with rising bills, disaster recovery costs, and a future locked into outdated infrastructure."


SHASA is also sounding the alarm on proposals to invest in nuclear energy, calling it an expensive distraction from real solutions.

"Nuclear is slow, costly, and comes with long-term risks," Ms Maxwell said. "It can't compete with renewables on speed, price, or flexibility." Instead, SHASA is calling for accelerated investment in rooftop solar, local battery storage, microgrids, and energy efficiency programs.

"These technologies are already cutting emissions and energy bills on the South Coast," Ms Maxwell said. "We need political and financial commitment to scale them up."

With the federal election approaching, SHASA urges voters to support candidates whose energy policies will help deliver climate action, cost-of-living relief, and long-term resilience.

Wimbie Beach finalist in Gallipoli Art Prize



A painting of the Dawn Anzac Day ceremony at Wimbie Beach by Canberra artist Margaret Hadfield has been selected as a finalist in the Gallipoli Art Prize in Sydney.

The painting **Lest We forget @ Wimbie Beach** (Acrylic on canvas 151 x 121cm) depicted the lighting of hundreds of candles at dawn. Hadfield said "My interest in military history was sparked after a 6-day visit to the Gallipoli Peninsula in Turkey 2004. After winning the inaugural Gallipoli Art Prize in 2006 my passion in exploring imagery to express ideas continues to this day. Paint is the medium for my exploration into history and its impact today. I have more than 25 paintings in the 'Gallipoli Series'. I had heard about the South Coast community near Batemans Bay NSW, commemorating ANZAC dawn at Wimbie Beach. My friends showed me images of a solo piper in the semi darkness with candles in glass jars spread along the shore. This event had been going since 2022. The beach was chosen for its likeness and feeling of Anzac Cove.

The dawn services around Australia and New Zealand are a real and emotive way the community remember those souls who lost their lives and experienced an involvement in war. We are reminded of the landing boats at Gallipoli shoreline and connect with the heroic people who took part in this and other campaigns.

Everyone has a mobile phone today, for filming and sharing. I have included people with phones seeing the todays dawn with the piper, when I have painted the dark sea as seen in memory of the landing. The lovely little beach and the community involvement is such a wonderful image that it really represented to me the true meaning of 'Lest We Forget'. The 2025 Gallipoli Art Prize will be on exhibition at <u>6-8 Atherden Street</u>, <u>The Rocks</u> until 11 May. Open every day, free to the public from 10am-4pm. Escaped Burns Spark Warning on Safe Burning Practices

The RFS is reminding landholders to follow safe burning practices and ensure they notify their local fire authority and neighbours, after 30 escaped burns were reported across NSW in April - including a dozen over the Easter long weekend.

Although the Bush Fire Danger Period has ended, landholders are still required to notify their intent to burn and ensure they check local weather conditions before undertaking any burning activity. The RFS provides an online notification portal, enabling residents to easily inform fire authorities of planned hazard reduction or pile burns at any time, via mobile device or desktop computer.

Commissioner of the RFS Rob Rogers said using the notification tool at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify plays a key role in preventing unnecessary emergency responses.

"Over the coming months, many landholders will take the opportunity to reduce fuel loads through burning. It's critical they burn safely and notify both the RFS and their neighbours," Commissioner Rogers said.

"Even when the official Bush Fire Danger Period has ended, landholders must ensure they've obtained any required permits and permissions and provide at least 24 hours' notice before lighting up." "If fire authorities are aware of your burn, it helps prevent unnecessary emergency calls and the deployment of firefighting resources."

The online notification tool also provides notifications about any Total Fire Bans, helping landholders make informed decisions about whether to proceed with their planned burn. Commissioner of the RFS Rob Rogers stressed that while reducing fuel on private properties is encouraged, it must always be done safely and legally.

"Before lighting any fire, landholders should check local conditions and ensure they have cleared adequate fire breaks and have firefighting equipment on hand to prevent the fire from escaping," Commissioner Rogers said.

"Every landholder has a responsibility to prevent fire spreading from their property. There are serious consequences for those who light fires and fail to manage them properly."



The book is a collection of stories divided into seasons and is diverse in genre, timeline and settings as life's journey itself. The Moruya Mail (MM) caught up with Audrey last week for a chat.

MM: Firstly, congratulations on your book, I understand you were born in South Africa.

Audrey: Thank you. Yes, I was born in a very tiny village in South Africa called Prince Albert. My parents were on the verge of moving to another town and Dad had already left. Mum was supervising loading of the removalist's van of the very the last itemsj when it was suddenly my time to arrive. The removalists hastily pulled a mattress out and placed it on the floor in the now empty house... and I arrived. Mum was convinced that it meant when I wanted to do something I would do it and nothing would

That has been mostly true. Most of my life I have not let obstacles stop me from doing something that I really wanted to do, as long as it wasn't going to harm anybody.

All I ever wanted to do from the age of about five was to read and write stories. I wanted to be like Enid Blyton who was my heroine from the time I learned to read. In

high school I wanted to study typing and pursue a career as a journalist. My conservative (bank manager) father wouldn't allow that and hence I ended up in a completely different career with an accounting background, as an entrepreneur and an interior designer.

The itch to write never left me and my lifelong ambition to write a book was realised when I moved to Australia in 2021.

MM: That's quite a physical and emotional journey. The title of the book 'Intertwined' intrigues me.

Audrey: I have a personality that wants to know what happens next as well as know the story behind the story. I love to unravel or re-invent the outcome if its unknown.

So this book is about those stories behind the stories. It's about relationships that are sometimes tangled and sometimes perfectly

Its about life's journeys - the unravelling and weaving together of the many emotions, experiences and encounters...and what we do with them. It's about regret and joy, anguish and hope, hostility and love ...and more.

MM: Interestingly, the book is divided into the seasons; Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter.

Audrey: The quote on the back cover of the book best summarises this decision; "a time to laugh and to cry, a time to tear down and a time to mend. For everything there is a season". The reader is invited to match their emotions to the various seasons when reading the stories.

MM: The book cover does evoke a sense of mystery or intrigue. I assume that is deliberate?

Audrey: Yes...very much so... the black background represents the complexities and unknown parts of life. The young climbing vine represents growth and determination as it overcomes obstacles. The light on the leaf symbolises positivity.

MM: Your life experience across three different countries without doubt are reflected in the stories.

Audrey: Yes...of course, I put them all together in a melting pot of different cultures and of different goals and outlooks. A lot of research went into the stories. Some have historical background and some have far more than a mere grain of truth in them.

MM: Thanks for joining us, Audrey.

Audrey: Thank you so much. When I received the hard copies of my book, it was a wonderful feeling to finally hold my dream in my hand as well as to see it on line available at Amazon as a paperback and on Kindle as and ebook. M







Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

18.4.25

Moruya River.

While the weather forecast looks good for the next few days, the sea state is a different story. As I watch the live feed of the Moruya Bar Cam, the swells that are predicted to reach 4m today are already building. The sets are already starting to break over the end of the breakwall. We have a straight easterly swell today and tomorrow, which makes the Moruya bar a very dubious prospect to cross this weekend. If you have bought your boat down for Easter this weekend, best to stay to the rivers untill the swell drops. Which isn't too bad of an option to be honest. The river has been fishing well this week, with flathead, bream, trevally and whiting all being caught this week.

All techniques have been working this week, with lures being my preferred option but baits have also accounted for plenty of fish also

Pump some live nippers or squirt worms, as both these baits are supreme live bait options. But any frozen bait will also produce. The airport flats, hole in the wall, Preddy's wharf, quarry wharf and town wharf will all see plenty of activity this weekend as holiday makers take advantage of the still warm weather conditions.

Tuross River.

Coila lake has been producing some nice bream on lures and baits this week, with the hole lake holding fish.

The Tuross system, is as usual the areas premier stretch of water. Good flathead, bream, whiting, Luderick and mulloway have all be taken this past week, and this activity should continue this weekend. With a predominantly easterly wind this weekend, there are plenty of arms that can be fished to get out of the breeze this weekend. Both the bait soakers and lure throwers will be looked after this long weekend, with plenty on offer for both.

Tuross is a big system, and offers plenty of areas to fish, with those that have access to a boat having more areas to explore.

Rock and beach.

With big seas this weekend, stay away from the rock platforms, as no fish is worth dying for. The beaches, while a safer option, will be difficult to fish with big seas. Maybe wait till Monday for the swell to drop.

Offshore.

Only the brave or fool hardy would consider crossing the Moruya Bar this weekend, so I'm not expecting too much boat traffic to head out. If you do want to consider going out, check the bar cam, check in with marine rescue and assess if it is for you. Stay safe this weekend.

The bait freezer was restocked this week, there are a few items getting low or non existent at the moment. Mullet Fillet is still a no show, hawksbury prawns are getting very low also. We do have a hood supply of worms and everything else however.

There are a few new offerings from Shimano in the reel cabinet, with the new seasons BFS bait cast reels starting to show up, as well as the heavier Tranx reels. Along with the Ultegra spin reels, we are well stocked.

We are open all weekend for your fishing, camping and boating needs.

Happy Easter everyone.

More funding available for war memorials in NSW

Applications for the Community War Memorials Fund 2025/26 are open, with \$250,000 in funding available for the protection and conservation of war memorials.

The program supports the conservation, repair and protection of local memorials throughout NSW.

This year sees changes to enhance the grant program and deliver greater funding opportunities to organisations seeking to undertake conservation work on war memorials in local communities across NSW.

There is now one grant round per year with a total of \$250,000 funding available. The maximum individual grant amount has also increased to \$15,000.

Applications can also be submitted under a new category for works to war memorial precincts, as well as the existing categories for condition assessments and physical works. Recipients of funding from previous rounds of the program include the Windsor and District RSL sub-Branch who received \$6,700 for conservation works to two honour rolls at the Colo War Memorial dedicated to those from the local community who served in the First and Second World Wars. The memorial is a valuable part of the Colo community's commemorative events honouring the service of its veterans,

including Anzac Day services. To be eligible for funding, the memorial must be listed on the NSW War Memorials Register:


