Local group seeking justice for Palestine

Eurobodalla Justice for Palestine is raising awareness of the continued bombing in Gaza, where more than 52,000 Gazans have been killed by the Israeli Defence Forces since October, 2023.

All the hospitals in Gaza have been bombed. Medical supplies and equipment are in acute short supply and 90% of the population has been displaced from their homes, many of them multiple times. Small children have seen their whole extended families and homes obliterated. Displacement is also occurring in the West Bank, with 40,000 Palestinians forced to leave their homes.

"It would be easier to die in an airstrike than die of hunger."

These were the words one Gazan said recently when the UN ran out of food supplies, leaving the population facing starvation. The Israeli Government has not allowed food trucks into Gaza since it broke off the ceasefire two months ago.

It has been 78 years since the war on Palestinians started, 58 years of illegal occupation, 18 years of the siege on Gaza and 57 days of total blockade on Gaza without any water, flour or medical aid getting into Gaza. Israel is now planning to increase its military campaign there to take control of the whole territory and force the Gazans into a small area in the south.

The International Court of Justice (ICJ) is assessing allegations of genocide against Israel for its military campaign in Gaza, and last year issued a series of provisional measures that included orders for Israel to "take all measures" to prevent genocide being committed or incited, and to allow the "unhindered provision" of humanitarian assistance across the territory's southern border with Egypt. The International Criminal Court (ICC) has issued arrest warrants for Netanyahu and former defence minister Yoav Gallant, and the

Hamas leaders have also been censured by these international courts.

ICC prosecutor is reported to be preparing

more warrant requests.

Justice for Palestine, a member of the Australia Palestine Advocacy Network, is calling on the Australian Government to –

-Advocate for a permanent ceasefire between Israel and pro-Palestinian forces;

-Ban the export of weapons and military components to Israel from Australia:

-Recognise Palestine as a full UN member state;

-Call for the end of the occupation of Palestine and a just and sustainable peace in accordance with UN resolutions, including the removal of illegal settlements, the withdrawal of Israel from all Palestinian land and the dismantling of the separation wall;

-Oppose any annexation of Palestinian land by the Israeli government;

-Expel the Israeli ambassador so long as Israel continues assaults and occupation.

To this end, the people of Eurobodalla have -Sent over 2,000 petition signatures to the federal parliament;

Sent over 1,000 postcards to the federal member for Gilmore;

Donated over \$6,000 to UNWRA (United Nations Works and Relief Agency).

On Sunday 4 May SHASA President Kathryn Maxwell and her partner Thomas Schild participated in the RENEW Sustainable House Day. Thomas ran 4 tours with 25 attendees. They learnt about how to build a home that is comfortable, cheap to run and with a lower building cost.

Key features of the house include:

- -steel floor frame and particle board floor with expanded polystyrene underfloor insulation
- -structural Insulated panels for walls and ceiling
- -double glazing on all windows and glass doors -the building is 95% recyclable and has much lower
- embodied energy than conventional homes
- -north facing with large floor to ceiling glass doors opening onto a large sunny deck
- -awning on eastern window to keep out the summer heat and let in the morning winter sun
- -curtains and blinds on all windows to keep out the winter cold
- 9kW of rooftop solar and 12kWh house battery
- 7kW EV home charger.

- -15,000 litres of rainwater tanks plumbed into the toilet and laundry

Wallaga Lake Bridge Works

Essential maintenance work will resume on Wallaga Lake Bridge from Monday 19 May, focusing on restoring the remaining bridge piles. Last year, a specialist diving crew installed a carbon fibre composite jacket system to 52 of the 69 bridge piles. The remaining 17 piles will now be wrapped using the same method and filled with grout.

Work completed in the closures last year means this time around we can implement a temporary bracing system that will allow the bridge to remain open while this work is carried out.

To minimise disruptions, traffic access across the bridge will be maintained for vehicles up to six tonnes. Special provisions will allow access for school buses in the mornings and afternoons and emergency vehicles under a reduced speed limit and escort.

From Monday 26 May, vehicles over six tonnes will be detoured via Cobargo Bermagui Road and the Princes Highway for the duration of the work. Work will be carried between 7am to 6pm, Monday to Friday, and 8am to 1pm on Saturdays. We do not anticipate any out of hours work will be required, however the community will be updated should this change. For the safety of workers and the community, and due to the temporary bracing in place, a reduced speed limit of 20 km/h will be in place. Work is expected to take around 10 weeks to complete, weather permitting.

Have your Say on future dredging projects in Batemans Bay

Transport for NSW is now seeking your feedback on the Review of Environmental Factors and proposed dredging of the Batemans Bay Bar in response to coastal erosion at Surfside Beach at Myamba Parade.

The dredging proposal will:

- Remove about 30,000 cubic metres of sand each dredging campaign
- Provide a minimum 40-metre-wide channel and -2.9 LAT
- Place the dredge sand in water to use the natural power of waves and currents to nourish nearby beaches.

Mathew Hatcher - Mayor Eurobodalla Shire said "I'm pleased that the New South Wales government has responded to the advocacy work we have been doing to deliver dredging for the Clyde River that considers our unique environment. Boater safety and sand renourishment of Surfside are two important issues so it's a win-win to do them both. Cr[']Hatcher said "I want to thank Dr Michael Holland MP – Member for Bega and Jenny Aitchison MP for their support and work to deliver on this. Very encouraging to get to meet with them both at NSW Parliament today and I look forward to this all happening in Q3 of this year."

Have your say

Transport for NSW has prepared a Review of Environmental Factors (REF) that will give us environmental approval to dredge when needed for the next 10 years in Batemans Bay. This may be every 2-5 years. Your feedback will inform the project

We have been working with the local council and other agencies during the development of the REF and we would now like your feedback on proposed future dredging operations in Batemans Bay.

The REF describes the key features of a dredging project and assesses the potential environmental and social impacts during construction and operation.

Your feedback will inform the final REF and will be published as part of the submissions report.

he proposed dredging operations

As outlined in the REF, our proposed dredging operations will allow for dredging to occur at the Clyde River entrance

It will allow us to dredge up to 30,000 cubic metres each dredging campaign, aiming to maintain a navigable channel about 40 metres wide and a depth of-2.9 metres at Lowest Astronomical Tide (LAT).

We propose to place the dredged sand in-water, in front of Surfside Beach about 600 metres from the shore. Placing dredge sand in-water is a common practice for our dredging projects and allows the waves to move sand naturally and potentially will nourish northern beaches.

Adopting this dredging and sand placement method, a dredging campaign would generally take about four weeks. This is subject to the conditions of the channel at the time of dredging.

We are aiming to complete a dredging campaign this year, as funding is available. We will continue to monitor the area for the next 10 years and dredge when needed, subject to funding availability.

Considerations for sand placement


When determining what to do with dredged sand, there are several factors that need to be considered.

TfNSW have undertaken investigations into a variety of dredging methods, dredging machinery or vessels and sand placement options.

The preferred type of machinery or dredging vessel for this project is a trailer suction split hopper dredge.

This dredging vessel offers the greatest benefits for the project, however it can't get close enough to the northern beaches to place sand on the shore.

Our investigations, and modelling completed by the University of NSW shows that the preferred in-water sand placement location (see above map) will still provide some beach nourishment benefits.



TfNSW investigated other sand placement options such as rainbowing, which shoots the sand in the air spraying it closer to the beach, and the use of alternative dredging vessels with pipes to pump to the beach.

As outlined in the REF, our proposed sand placement area is the best option given the engineering (shallow water depths and swell conditions), cost constraints and proximity to the Marine Park. Working with University of NSW

We are fortunate that the University of NSW and its Australian Research Consortium for Coast Management team have been collecting data on sand and water movement in this area for some

We have partnered with the team from University of NSW to provide detailed modelling on how sand moves in Batemans Bay. This level of scientific modelling is the first of its kind in our dredging program across NSW.

This modelling shows that the proposed in-water sand placement location is the best option for the project and will provide some beach nourishment benefits to nearby areas.

NSW councils ready to work with returned Federal Government

The Prime Minister and his new Government have been congratulated on their electoral success by Local Government NSW. Acting President of LGNSW Mayor Claire Pontin says councils across NSW look forward to continuing to work with the Federal Government to deliver much-needed services and infrastructure for our communities. "Now the election is over, NSW Councils are keen to get on with the business of service delivery," Mayor Pontin said.

"Prime Minister Albanese was given a strong endorsement from the electorate and we encourage him now to show strong leadership in delivering the Government's agenda.'

Mayor Pontin said councils could offer considerable expertise and local insight to members of cabinet across portfolios from roads and infrastructure to emergency management, community harmony and regional development; but she indicated they were especially keen to continue working with Ministers Catherine King and Kristy McBain, who have been re-appointed to their Local Government portfolios.

"These are two very hard working Ministers for the local government sector and we congratulate Minister McBain for adding Emergency Management to her portfolio – an area of great importance for councils that stand at the forefront of disaster response.

"Both Ministers have put considerable effort into firming up their relationships with councils right across Australia and we look forward to now getting on with the next steps and getting back to business." In particular, the re-appointed Federal Ministers are being encouraged to continue the work of the Commonwealth Parliament's inquiry into the financial sustainability of councils across Australia. During the election campaign, the

local government sector called on the Federal Government to commit to restoring Commonwealth funding to councils to the appropriate level of 1% of Commonwealth taxation revenue. Mayor Pontin reissued that request to the Prime Minister and relevant Ministers.

"Restoring funding to 1% of taxation revenue will simply mean that councils can continue to deliver on the needs of our communities without adding to cost of living burdens by increasing rates or cutting services," she said. "We can't wait to get on with the job with our colleagues in Canberra."

Summit drives action on Rural and Regional Council Challenges LGNSW

Elected Representatives and senior staff from more than 70 councils across NSW gathered in Sydney yesterday for the third annual <u>Rural and Regional Summit</u>, hosted by Local Government NSW (LGNSW).

Delegates were joined by State Government leaders to focus on the unique challenges faced by councils and their communities outside the metropolitan areas.

This year's summit provided a platform for discussing the financial sustainability of the local government sector, recovery from natural disasters, managing water utilities, and dealing with emerging invasive species threats, and building reforms for rural and regional areas.

Speakers at the summit included the Hon Ron Hoenig, Minister for Local Government; the Hon Rose Jackson MLC, Minister for Water, Minister for Housing, Minister for Homelessness, Minister for Mental Health, and Minister for Youth; Wendy Tuckerman MP, Shadow Minister for Local Government; Brett Whitworth, Deputy Secretary, Office of Local Government; James Sherrard, NSW Building Commissioner; and Dr Marion Healy PSM, NSW Independent Biosecurity Commissioner, Department Primary Industries and Regional Development NSW. The event included a moving panel discussion with council leaders whose communities were significantly affected by natural disasters over the past five years. This was followed by a discussion with Mal Lanyon APM, Acting Chief Executive Officer, NSW Reconstruction Authority, and Brendan Moon AM, Coordinator General, National Emergency Management Agency. LGNSW Rural and Regional Vice-President Mayor Claire Pontin said the summit

was a tremendous success and emphasised the importance of collaborative efforts in tackling the challenges unique to rural and regional councils. "Our Rural and Regional Summit brings together the key voices and decision-makers best positioned to drive solutions to secure a strong future for regional

communities," Mayor Pontin said.
"Rural and regional councils are pillars of resilience and innovation, but they face distinctive hurdles, from workforce attraction and retention to infrastructure management covering vast areas, to the mounting costs of climate-driven natural


disasters.

A safer pathway for the future of e-bikes and e-scooters

The **NSW Government** is moving forward with a safety-focused framework for e-scooters and e-bikes that includes rules and speed limits for e-scooters on shared paths, a review of road rules and work to ensure e-bikes are not modified and battery fires reduced.

The Government's response to recommendations from a recent Parliamentary inquiry into the use of e-scooters, e-bikes and related mobility options, is due to be tabled in Parliament on Tuesday.

The response builds on the E-micromobility Action Plan released by the NSW Government last year.

There are more than a million e-bikes and e-scooters in NSW and we continue to prepare rules for their legal use outside of the current trial areas.

The Government is proposing e-scooters will be able to be ridden on shared paths, with a default speed limit of 10-20kmh and a 20kmh speed limit on roads that are signposted at 50kmh and below.

The use of e-scooters would be legal for independent riders over 16 years old, in line with Victoria, South Australia, Tasmania, Queensland and Western Australia.

The NSW Government is not proposing any new speed limits for e-bikes. Work is going on to create a better framework for shared e-bike schemes that will reduce clutter on streets.

E-bikes must be mostly propelled by riders; a motor cannot be the only source of power and is there to help riders, for example when getting started or going uphill.

E-bikes that comply with requirements in the Road Rules are defined as 'bicycles' and the same rules and responsibilities apply to riders of an e-bike as a traditional bicycle. NSW

Police are responsible for the enforcement of road transport offences for illegal e-bikes.

To help ensure the ongoing safety of road legal e-bikes, the NSW Government will review the definition of an e-bike in the NSW Road Rules, with reference to a national definition and international standards.

E-bikes and e-scooters can bring many benefits to help people move around in a healthy and affordable way, reduce congestion, demand for parking, and boost our economy and environmental outcomes.

The latest data in NSW shows:

- · There are around 1.35 million e-micromobility devices in NSW homes
- 47% of people use them to connect to public transport
- · 34% of trips replace car trips in Greater Sydney, 45% in Regional NSW
- The highest usage is among those aged 18-29, followed by 11-17, followed by 30-49 including working parents

Action is already under way and the majority of the inquiry recommendations are supported, including:

- \cdot Reviewing the definition of an e-bike and potential for footpath riding in the NSW Road Rules
- · Establishing safety standards and risk-based protocols to reduce the likelihood of battery fires, with nation-leading product safety requirements for lithium-ion e-micromobility devices
- · Boosting rider and road user education, with new voluntary tests, campaigns, and updates to in-school road safety education programs and the Driver Knowledge Test online
- · Considering appropriate fines and opportunities to in collaboration with NSW Police
- · Ongoing investment in critical infrastructure and improving future design of shared paths
- · Greater collection of e-bike and e-scooter data to improve safety outcomes.

In the coming months, the Government will progress the proposed regulation of e-scooters and Road rule changes will be supported by communication initiatives to build awareness of all community members. Gadfly

Last year, as Donald Trump took the lead in the presidential race, I penned a column noting that a win for the MAGA man was not necessarily a bad thing. When his outlandish economic and foreign policies confronted reality, I wrote, it would be an experiment in real time. They might just work. But if they failed, then the result would be available to the rest of the world...and maybe even to Trump himself.

What I didn't expect was just how quickly we'd get that result. Gaza rebuilt as a giant Club Med, Ukraine as a card game and Greenland for sale were bad enough. But his Mad Hatter acts with the Tariff as some kind of magic wand was hilarious.

There were so many changes to the countries, the rates, the industry exemptions and even the creatures (of Heard Island) to be taxed that the whole world stared open-mouthed. Economists buried their faces in their hands to staunch the tears of laughter or despair. National leaders protested or kow-towed but only Canada and China fought back.

In the end play there can only be one winner. In simple terms that battle is already over – Trump is still living in the 1970s with his concentration on old fashioned power generation and manufacturing...even to the point of boosting the coal industry which is fading everywhere else. China by contrast has taken a leap into the future with renewable energy, electric batteries, robots, artificial intelligence, E.V.s and autonomous driving cars. And while Trump is spreading raw protectionism, China is favouring the globalisation of trade with as few impediments as possible. In short, Trump is the herald of stagflation while Xi offers the kind of prosperity we've enjoyed in the decades since World War II and a prospect of escaping the worst effects of existential climate change.

Where does that leave Australia? Do we really have to choose between the economic prosperity offered by China and a fair chance of a bearable climate, or the reassurance of the ANZUS Treaty from Donald J. Trump?

Ah, if only it were that simple. America used to be democracy's light on the hill. But Trump is turning it into an autocracy just as fast as his little fingers can write executive orders. So what happens in the next few years when Australia's Defence Department reckons Xi Jinping will make his move to restore the Taiwan province to Beijing's control? Would Trump really go to war to save it for 'democracy'? Or American autocracy? Would we? And if so what kind of war would that be?


The opening salvo would not be a bomb but rather the sudden loss of power Australia-wide. I have no idea what would follow but whatever it is, it would be horrific.

There is, however, a bright side to contemplate. I do not believe that Trump will be successful in his attack on American democracy. The resistance is too deeply ingrained in the American psyche for a phony Wizard of Oz to prevail. It might be a near-run contest, but I believe there are many more sane people in the United States than those of unsound mind.

Either way, the conjunction of events makes clear the underlying lesson for Australia, one that we have resisted throughout our entire existence: the assertion of true nationhood, with the embrace of our Aboriginal forebears, the declaration of a republic, and the recognition of our geographical strength through genuine independence. robert@robertmacklin.com

The following team of **Moruya second grade footballers** will play Bateman's Bay on the latter's ground tomorrow: - C. Chesher, Lance Walker, J. Chesher, Roy Coppin, Leo Pike, H. Thomson, H. Crapp, W. Constable, A. Coppin, R. Rose, D. Coppin.

At the Police Court on Wednesday before Mr. J. B. Scobie, relieving P.M., 8 local residents were fined 5s per beast and costs, and some of them extra 5s for a second offence for suffering cattle to stray. The Magistrate said that 5s per beast would be the minimum penalty as previous warnings had been disregarded.

Eurobodalla Shire Council. – At the monthly meeting on the 6th inst., President T. Flood drew the attention of the Council to the death of Ex-Councillor Richard M. The Tuross players fought back to win the last three ends. A critical 3 shots on the last end meant they snatched a crucial 17 all draw.

The final rink was also very close where Rose Farrington, Bruce Magilton, Sue Fahey and Marcel Kors recovered from a slow start to be at 8 all after 10 ends. In a very tight battle Tuross held a 16 – 13 lead with three to ends to play. The Ulladulla side finished well to score 6 shots winning the three ends to give them a 19 – 16 win. Tuross won overall on the big board by 63 shots to 50. They scored 8.5 points for their big board win and for winning and drawing a rink.Ulladulla scored 1.5 points for winning one rink and drawing another.

After lunch Tuross played Shoalhaven Heads and all three sides managed to record good wins. The Kors side had several high scoring ends to keep them well in front of their opponents throughout the game. Five shots on each of the 4^{th} and 21^{st} ends allowed them to win 32-19.

The Lidbury foursome wasable to lead throughout their match. They won 15 of the 21 ends to run out winners by 26 - 11. All but 3 ends resulted in scores of 1 or 2 shots that indicated that game was closer than the final result showed.

On the third rink the game was closer with Etheredge's team challenged all the way. After a very close, low scoring start to the game the score was 7 all after 10 ends. They scored a crucial 5 shots on the 13th end that broke the deadlock and gave them the upper hand. By the 18th end they led by 19 -12. Shoalhaven scored 3 shots on the 19th end to give them some chance at 19 – 15 but the Tuross team won the final two very close ends to close the match out 21 – 15. Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report

9.5.25

Moruya River.

With Mothers Day this weekend, you had best get in and pick up some of the specials we have running! We have combos, shirts, tackle trays and hats all ready for the most special person around.

With dropping air temps the waters are feeling very inviting for those that like to go for a swim. Ocean temps are sitting around 20-21deg at the moment, with morning air temps a good bit below that.

The fishing in the river has been very good, with large schools of tailor moving into the river and creating hazing around the spur wall and Preddy's wharf areas around dawn and dusk. Small metals cast and retrieved will work well, as will baits. The bite of chance is high however with chopper tailor. Fishing light around the Preddy's wharf area is still producing some good sized bream and Trevally as well.

The quarry wharf area a bit further upstream, is another good place to look for a tailor or two, or even a flathead or mulloway that will lurk below the tailor schools. Getting your baits or lures past the tailor, can be a chore however. The town bridge will start to see a reduction in whiting numbers as the water temps further up stream start to drop, the estuary perch should be around in good numbers however.

The big bend at Yarragee, always seems to hold big aggregations of estuary perch this time of year as well. Just remember that there is a zero bag limit on these fish this ti e of year.

Tuross River.

The tailor that have moved into the lower reaches of the Moruya river, will also be present in the Tuross system this weekend as well. The flathead should still be on the chew, as they take advantage of the warmer water temps to feed up before the water temps start to drop. I am already having reports that the upper areas of the Tuross system, have already dropped substantially,with the areas around Bumbo creek already sitting at about 14-15deg. This will make all the resident species up there, a bit more on the inactive side. The fish will still be there, you will have to work a little harder to get them to bite however.

The boat shed area will be a prime spot to prospect this weekend for a mulloway, flathead, tailor or bream. The holes in front of the boat sheds there are quite productive, and easily accessible for everyone.

Rock and beach.

The Moruya breakwall has seen an increase in good sized tailor during the dawn and dusk bite window, with good 40-50cm fish being reported. The salmon are more concentrated during the day time periods along with the usual trevally, bream and the odd mulloway.

The beaches also are trending the same, with tailor during the low light bite times, salmon, bream and whiting during the day. The seas state looks pretty good for a beach or rock session this weekend, so leapt me know how you go.

Öffshore.

Snapper & flathead will the main targets this weekend for this who like to fish the offshore areas. Try around the magic 30-40m marks for both species. The bait freezer isn't looking to bad at the moment, with the usual suspects still a no show, everything else however is pretty good.

From its humble beginnings as a 10-Mogo Trails network has expanded to an impressive 125 kilometres.

Weaving through the bush of Mogo, the back of Batehaven, now stretching out to Mount Wandera in the west - all trails will be ready to ride from Saturday 10 May. Eurobodalla Mayor Mathew Hatcher says the excitement over Mogo Trails keeps

growing.
"Since opening part of the network last August, we've seen an influx of riders keen to explore the trails - over the Easter holidays it felt like every second car had bike racks," Mayor Hatcher said.

"As we head into the cooler months, the mountain bike trails at Mogo as well as Narooma will continue drawing visitors, keeping them active outdoors and supporting our local businesses.

"The newly finished trails will be ready to ride on Saturday, but we're also planning a community event in July as part of a grand opening celebration - details coming soon." Mogo Trails project manager Shane Spicer said five new trails and a skills park have been added to the eastern side of Mogo Trails, and a 28-kilometre trail will be opening on the western side - as well as a shuttle service to be announced soon. "The new 28-kilometre trail – called Burnaaga - is a special addition to the network that will put Mogo Trails on the must-visit list," Mr Spicer said.

"It's a one-way trail from the top of Mount Wandera that's a remote and untamed experience - not for the rookies!' "It's built for riders who know their

way around technical lines and have the skills and fitness to tackle challenging terrain. You kilometre loop around Deep Creek Dam, the must be self-sufficient, carry water, food, basic first aid and be prepared to ride for 1.5 - 3.5 hours.

> Local elders named the trail Burnaaga meaning goanna in dhurga language. With its remote four-wheel drive access to the starting point, a shuttle service is necessary and will make the experience much safer and smoother.

> 'We have been supporting a shuttle operator through the setup process, and they'll announce their offerings before Saturday," Mr Spicer said.

> Additionally, Mr Spicer said there's so much more in the works - new amenities and a bike wash station at Mogo Oval, as well as a new

pathway to a pump track.

'Mogo Óval is shaping up to be a great trailhead and a hub for mountain bikers, families and young riders," Mr Spicer said. Eurobodalla businesses have been interested in Mogo Trails, wanting a slice of the mountain bike tourism. Council's final Ride Ready sessions in March provided businesses with valuable insights into potential opportunities. Participants heard from the Mogo Trails project team as well as Narooma Mountain Bike Club and Sea Otter Australia. President of Narooma Mountain Bike Club, Georgie Staley, highlighted the history and achievements of Narooma's trails. She encouraged businesses to get involved and familiarise themselves.

You don't need to learn to ride but you should definitely take the time to understand the trails and have a basic grasp of mountain biking so you can talk to your people - they love when you are interested," Ms Staley said.

"Visitor experience is everything. When riders have a great time, they spread the word, and that impact is huge. Narooma Mountain Bike Club's surveys showed 52 percent of visitors learned about Narooma's trails through word of mouth, while 32 percent discovered them

"It really shows how important it is to give riders a great experience, so they keep coming back," Ms Staley said.

Over the past two years, Ride Ready sessions helped more than 131 people in Eurobodalla's businesses community connect and learn about mountain bike
