Bega and Eurobodalla Visitor Economy to benefit from NSW Government Regional Event Fund

Minister for Jobs and Tourism, Steve Kamper, said "Regional events are the heartbeat of local communities – they celebrate what makes each region unique while also driving real economic benefits by attracting visitors, creating jobs and supporting local businesses.

Repurposing for Resilience at the Moruya Transfer Station

Community-led beekeeping, solar and education projects funded across regional, rural and remote NSW

Repurposing for Resilience, Eurobodalla, is included in the inspiring community-led projects renewable energy initiatives, to receive funding through Essential Energy's Essential Grants Program.

Thirteen community groups across NSW have been announced as winning recipients of the program, which provides financial support for groups, service providers, registered charities and not-for-profit organisations working to drive significant environmental and social change in their communities.

This is the inaugural year of the Essential Grants program, which offers grants of up to \$15,000 for community projects that provide a positive impact across regional, rural and remote NSW. Winners are chosen across the 10 operating areas of the network for the benefits they provide to their local community through initiatives supporting the environment, education, resilience or the energy transition.

Many of the groups among this year's winners have demonstrated immense resilience over the last few years, affected by recent floods, storms, fires and the cost-of-living crisis. Amid such difficulties, they have continued to support their communities through initiatives that contribute to a more sustainable future.

Repurposing for Resilience (RfR), Eurobodalla: RfR are delivering the "Plate Forward: RfR Wash Trailer Initiative", a mobile dishwashing facility to assist with reducing single-use packaging at festivals and events on the NSW South Coast. The completely solar powered initiative will support the regional community to minimise waste, promote a circular economy and foster community collaboration

According to Essential Energy's Head of Sustainability, Sophie Cruickshank funding community-led projects in these challenging times is important to the organisation.

"We're proud to invest in the groups who give so much to their local community, working hard to implement positive and lasting change. We look forward to seeing how the grants can further support the winners in delivering their initiatives and the benefits to their local area and beyond," Sophie says.

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Councils protecting communities from the changing climate

Australia's councils are expected to spend more than \$2 billion over the next five years to future-proof their communities from the changing climate, according to new Australian-first research released last week.

ALGA's **Adapting Together: Local Government Leadership in a Changing Climate** report showed the climate-resilient investments by councils are estimated to provide up to \$4.7 billion in avoided costs and benefits to communities by 2030.

Speaking at the National General Assembly (NGA) in Canberra, ALGA President Mayor Matt Burnett said: "The changing climate is putting pressure on communities, and this ground-breaking research shows councils are leading the way in preparing for and managing these ever-increasing impacts, including from natural disasters.

"These examples include planting trees to combat heat, providing community education and preparation for bushfires, coastal hazard management systems and upgrading stormwater systems and flood resilience programs," Mayor Burnett said.

"The climate of every community is different, and it's impressive to see innovative examples and strong leadership by councils across Australia to reduce climate risks and future-proof their communities." The new report used more than 200 examples of councils taking action to address climate impacts, and five case studies to model the national value of local government climate adaptation.

"Climate-resilient infrastructure is expensive and takes time to build, so we need sustainable funding from the Federal Government to implement long-term planning and adaptation now and into the future," Mayor Burnett said.

"We are asking the Government for a new \$400 million climate adaptation fund, distributed to all Australia's councils each year, to deliver ongoing and sustainable place-based climate solutions." Lord Mayor of Hobart Anna Reynolds said: "The Federal Government rightly recognises the best climate solutions come from those closest to the risks but there's a huge gap between recognising this principle and providing the funding needed to deliver it to local communities. "In Hobart, we've seen how collaboration through the 'Sparking Conversations, Igniting Action' program helped households prepare for bushfires, manage vegetation, and strengthen community connections."

Lockyer Valley Regional Council Mayor Tanya Milligan said: "We have built a strong reputation for ensuring we adapt to climate challenges through a range of measures such as flood modelling, limited development zones, buy-backs and flood mitigation.

"Adapting to climate challenges is critical for local governments, and it's vital other levels of government consider and invest in the recommendations of this new report, to ensure communities at risk have a safer and more hope-filled future."

Cheaper home batteries program begins

The **Federal Government** is helping households, small businesses and community groups bring down their energy bills with the roll out of the Cheaper Home Batteries program beginning today.

The government's Cheaper Home Batteries program will help bring down the cost of a typical battery discounted by around 30 per cent. This will save households with existing rooftop solar up to \$1,100 off their power bill every year, and those installing a new solar and battery system could save up to \$2,300 a year – up to 90 per cent of a typical family electricity bill.

One in three Australian households have rooftop solar – but only one in 40 have a battery.

The Albanese Labor Government is fixing that, by giving all Australians a proper leg up towards the cost of a battery – around 30 per cent, or around \$4,000 – off the cost of a typical home battery.

This will help Australians take control of their own power bill while reducing reliance on the grid, helping to drive down prices for everyone, and slashing bills for good. The support could drive over 1 million battery installations to 2030.

The Clean Energy Regulator (CER) is delivering the program through the existing Small-scale Renewable Energy Scheme that has safely and successfully delivered solar subsidies since 2011, making Australia a world leader when it comes to rooftop solar.

The subsidy is proportionate to the size of the battery installed – ensuring people are able to pick an affordable battery that is right for their needs. This works out to 30% off a typically sized home battery – around \$4,000 off a 11.5 kilowatt hour battery, which usually costs around \$14.000.

A smaller 5 kilowatt hour battery would often cost around half as much, and will now be discounted by around \$1,800 under the scheme.

The Cheaper Home Batteries Program is part of our plan to create a fairer, cleaner, and more reliable energy system for all Australians, with an additional \$150 in direct bill relief for households and businesses also commencing today. And we're making sure no one gets left behind with our historic investments to improve 100,000 social housing properties with upgrades such as thermal shell improvements, efficient electric appliances, solar and batteries.

We're also making solar more accessible to apartments and renters through our Solar Banks program – including Commonwealth investment of \$100 million to reach 25,000 households in partnership with States and Territories. And community-led projects will help bring everyone on the journey – from suburb-wide electrification pilots through ARENA to programs like our Community Energy Upgrades Fund.

Batemans Bay town clock is back!

Batemans Bay Rotary

Following two months of refurbishment work, the Batemans Bay town clock, near the foreshore in Clyde St is back on site. It is not quite working yet as we are waiting for the power to be reconnected and the new master clock that is automatically adjusted by GPS timing installed. It is good to see the Rotary clock back in place with its new shiny blue powder coating.

The iconic town clock has been gracing the foreshore since 1999. The tripod structure topped by a stylised dolphin features in many tourist photos. Not many would know that the dolphin on top of the clock town was Batemans Bay's new town logo at the time.

This is the second town clock with the original clock being built by the Rotary Club in1978. The original clock was removed by council in 1994 and replaced with the public toilets.

Design, construction and fundraising under the capable hands of Rotarians, Ron Sydenham and David Wood saw, in 1999, the workings of the old clock rebuilt and placed in this stylised structure in the town centre. The design won a Rotary district community service award at the time. Up until the recent renovation, Rotary volunteers manually adjusted the clock for day light saving each autumn and spring and ensured the clock was set to the correct time. The town clock mechanism and faces were refurbished in January 2018 and installed with LED lighting. However, it was apparent that the clock tower structure needed some attention. In 2024 the Rotary Club secured a NSW Government Grant to assist in the cost of refurbishing the clock.

Work commenced in November 2024 with a plan to have the existing structure removed, dismantled, sand blasted and powder coated. The clock faces and mechanisms were to be updated.

The clock was removed in April 2025 and over the next two months has had the necessary repairs and refurbishments carried out. The clock was lifted back into place on Thursday 26 June 2025. It is expected the Rotary clock will be again displaying the correct time after the instalment of the new master clock timer during the next month.

Batemans Bay Rotary would like to pass on our gratitude to Eurobodalla Shire Council and Eurobodalla Cranes who assisted in the removal and replacement of the clock tower. Our thanks to H&S Sheds who provided the transport to and from Queanbeyan for the refurbishment work and trailer to move and return the clock tower from the site. Simplex has provided the new master clock and carried out the maintenance on the existing clock mechanisms. We also acknowledge the grant provided by the NSW Government that made the whole project feasible.







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\$10,000 incentive for home building apprentices starts today

"Today (June 1) marks the beginning of the Key Apprentice Program which will provide new commencing apprentices working in residential building trades with financial incentives totalling \$10,000," said Geordan Murray, HIA Executive Director - Future Workforce.

Under the Key Apprentices Program, eligible apprentices will receive \$2,000 at 6, 12, 24, 36 months, and at the completion of their apprenticeship.

"It is critical that we accelerate the growth of the housing industry's tradie workforce if we are to get anywhere near building the number of homes set out in the National Housing Accord," added Mr Murray. "These incentives make apprenticeships in residential building trades far more appealing for those weighing up their career options. This should translate into much stronger numbers looking for apprenticeships.

"While we are optimistic about the government's continued support for apprentices, encouraging young people into apprenticeships is only addressing part of the problem.

"We also need to increase in the number apprentice jobs being created and boost the Vocational Education and Training sector's capacity to deliver training.

"While employers recognise the importance of training the next generation of tradies, many see apprenticeships as too costly or risky to justify within their business.

"Financial support for employers who create the training and employment opportunities for apprentices is critical if we're serious about meeting skilled labour demand over the next decade. "There are existing commonwealth financial support measures available to employers, however, they are generally inadequate to encourage builders and trades to take on an apprentice. Current incentives are also only guaranteed until the end of 2025. "A much longer-term commitment is needed, as businesses are

already planning for their workforce needs in 2026 and beyond, and we need apprenticeships to be front of mind."

Backing the Future for youth in

Applications now open for \$50,000

FRRR and VFFF are now inviting applications for grants of \$50,000 from individuals to develop innovative ideas that enhance the lives of young people (aged 12-30) in remote, rural, and regional NSW.

The grants are available through the Backing the Future program. In NSW, the program has already supported 28 individuals by investing \$1.4 million in their rural youth-focussed projects.

Jenny Wheatley, VFFF CEO, said VFFF is excited about Backing the Future's potential to discover transformative ideas.

"Our experience shows that the hardest part of getting a project off the ground is securing initial funding to test the idea. This is especially true in rural and remote areas, where high costs and smaller populations make piloting new projects even more challenging.

"Backing the Future bridges this gap by trusting that leaders in local communities can create transformative opportunities for young people, when provided with the right resources.

'Applicants not only get the grant funding, but they are also connected in with the staff from FRRR, who provide additional capacity building, connections and networking to ensure that grantees have an opportunity to pilot innovative ideas," Ms Wheatley explained.

NSW News in Brief New tobacco licensing scheme comes into force across NSW

NSW retailers and wholesalers who wish to sell tobacco, or non-tobacco smoking products, now must apply for a licence as part of the NSW Government's Tobacco Licensing Scheme.

Applications will be screened to check if the applicant has been found guilty of an offence relating to the sale or supply of tobacco or vaping goods under any relevant state, territory, and

Commonwealth legislation, which could see them refused a licence to sell these products.

The new Tobacco Licensing Scheme, which has come into effect today (1 July), will give retailers and wholesalers a grace period until 1 October 2025 to apply for a licence.

Retailers must display their tobacco licence at the point of sale.

In NSW, vaping goods can only be purchased from pharmacies. It is illegal for all other retailers to sell any type of vaping good, regardless of its nicotine content. Pharmacies do not need a tobacco licence to sell vaping goods.

New penalties have also been introduced for anyone caught selling products without a valid licence.

The maximum penalties will be:

- · For individuals \$11,000 for a first offence, and \$44,000 for a second or subsequent offence
- · For a corporation \$220,000

NSW Government only 4% off 2030 emissions target with new Net Zero Plan to come

and moving closer to reaching its Net Zero targets. The state will bridge the gap with a new plan to get to net zero by 2050. The legislated climate targets for NSW are to reach 50% reduction by 2030, 70% reduction by 2035, and net zero by 2050. Latest updates from the emissions projections show a strong improvement to the state's reductions, with NSW estimated to reduce emissions by 46% in 2030 and 62% in 2035.

A new Net Zero Plan will be designed to ensure NSW can meets the 2030 & 2035 targets.

NSW Government delivers 3.5% pay rise for community services workers

Tens of thousands of frontline community services workers will receive a 3.5 per cent pay rise as part of the Minns Labor Government's 2025-26 Budget. The pay rise is the result of a Budget decision to provide \$122 million of additional funding to Non-Government Organisations so they can pay the increase in the minimum wage for community services workers. It follows the Fair Work Commission's annual minimum wage determination.

Those receiving the pay rise include crisis accommodation workers, counsellors, social workers, youth workers and legal officers working for organisations with relevant NSW government contracts.

\$200,000 up for grabs to engage seniors

Applications are now open for the \$200,000 The NSW Government is reducing emissions NSW Seniors Festival Grant Program 2026. with funding of up to \$5,000 and \$10,000 available for events taking place during next year's festival taking place from 2-15 March. The theme for 2026 is 'Live life in colour', to encourage seniors to celebrate new adventures and embrace creativity, new connections and an active lifestyle. The grant program offers funding of \$1.500 to \$5,000 for community programs and activities, and up to \$10,000 for local government hosted large-scale activities. Applications close on Tuesday 12 August 2025.

New federal funding for councils to support housing delivery

"The Federal government's <u>announcement</u> that Councils are to receive \$1.7 billion early funding to assist with the provision of shovel ready housing projects is a key part of addressing the nation's housing puzzle," **HIA** Chief Executive Industry & Policy, Simon Croft said.

"These funds are an important investment and should predominantly be directed toward enabling infrastructure such as roads, water and sewerage to unlock residential land across a range of development settings.

"As all local governments, metropolitan and regional, are being encouraged to meet housing targets this is a key measure for investment in infrastructure where it is needed most.

"Funding of infrastructure is a burden that has been unfairly placed on builders who then have little choice but to pass this cost onto home buyers. Councils have equally been struggling to fund the necessary infrastructure and this early funding from the Federal government can help ease this burden to enable the provision of more affordable housing delivery.

"The other key investment from this funding, should be directed towards supporting council planning areas to fast track approvals. The current resource shortages across local councils, is one of the primary reasons for protracted approval timelines being experienced across the country. "HIA would also urge that this funding have a specific percentage directed towards regional areas.

"With regional Australia now home to more than 8.5 million people and growing, it is important the funding be allocated proportionally to support the delivery of new homes in regional Australia.

"We need to build 240,000 homes every year just to meet demand, yet last year we fell 60,000 homes short. This funding can play a key role in supporting local councils to bring forward housing approvals to get keys in the door faster," concluded Mr Croft.

Environment in Freefall: NSW State of the Environment Report "Truly Alarming"

The NSW State of the Environment Report, release last week, paints a grim picture of the health of NSW ecosystems according to the **Nature Conservation Council of NSW**, the state's leading environmental organisation.

<u>The State of the Environment report</u> is NSW's premier scientific report card, released every three years. It describes the health of our life support systems – the land, water, air and ecosystems, and it tracks trends over time. This year almost all indicators are "getting worse".

Key Report Findings

Since the last report, 36 more animal and plant species have been listed as threatened with extinction.

Since 2021, there have been 190 fish kill events, with tens of millions of fish dying in some events.

Alarmingly, the fastest growing segment of threatened animals is those which are critically endangered, which grew by 35 species over the same period. This is a stark indicator of the worsening biodiversity crisis, and shows current settings to protect endangered species are not working.

Across the state, distribution of native land mammals continues to shrink, with fewer habitats left to offer safe refuge. The clearing of native vegetation remains significantly higher than before land clearing laws were loosened in 2016, with agriculture the main driver.

Projections show that only half of all native animal species currently listed are expected to survive the next 100 years.

Recommendations

In response to the State of the Environment report card, NCC is calling on the NSW Government to:

- Rein in land clearing for agriculture by closing legal loopholes.
- End native forest logging, protecting 1 million hectares of our most precious forest for conservation and recreation.
- Reduce water extraction by irrigators, allowing inland rivers to connect and flow
- Restore coastal estuaries to protect communities from climate impacts.
- Increase funding for environmental programs from 1.6% to at least 2% of state expenditure to resource an effective NSW Nature Strategy.

Jacqui Mumford, Chief Executive Officer of Nature Conservation Council NSW said - "Every NSW resident should be outraged that our shared natural heritage is being stolen from under our feet. The risk to First Nations cultural heritage is intolerable. Indigenous knowledge must be informing the protection and restoration of Country.

"This report confirms what we already know, and the message couldn't be clearer. Nature in NSW is in deep trouble and those in power are failing to turn this alarming trajectory around. Our state's environment is being mismanaged, and until the developers, irrigators, and logging companies are kicked out of government back-rooms, nothing will change. The ecological carrying capacity of NSW has been slashed to 29% of its natural level since colonisation.

"Our rivers are being sucked dry, forests are shrinking, and species are vanishing. We need the NSW Government to act with the urgency that the biodiversity crisis demands

"The NSW Government urgently needs to develop and implement their Nature Strategy, fix the laws that aren't working and truly chart a path out of this crisis."

Whether your child loves art, science, or nature, there's something magical waiting to be discovered in the whimsical world of fungi.

Creative Kids Workshops

Let imaginations bloom with Fungi Art and Craft sessions in Bermagui, Bodalla, Moruya and Batemans Bay. At Art Central in Moruya 19 July, kids can get hands-on with rock painting, clay moulds and paper sculptures – all mushroom-themed, of course!

At Bermagui on 5 and 19 July, children's educator Caitlin Brown leads a playful journey into fungi using natural materials to build tiny forest ecosystems full of colourful mushrooms and forest creatures.

Storytime with Science

Children's author Ailsa Wild visits Narooma and Bega Libraries with readings from The Forest in the Tree, her charming picture book about chocolate trees and the underground world of mycorrhizal fungi. 

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Far more than pub grub at Nelligen

The Steampacket Hotel in Nelligen has thrown down the challenge for a great pub food experience in the Eurobodalla Shire.

Without poker machines the hotel exudes a sense of community and a strong family vibe.

Head Chef Jeffrey Razon was trained in Sydney and has worked in the industry for some 23 years, including stints at 'Est' in George Street, 'Cafe Del Mar' at Cockle Bay Wharf and 'The Hermitage' in south west Sydney.

He moved to the Shire twelve months ago and brings his skills preparing modern Australian fare as well as South East Asian dishes and all the way through to classic French cuisine. The revamped pub menu ranges from all the classic pub fare such as the compulsory 'Chicken Parmi' through to burgers and steaks.

The more adventurous are welcomed to sample the 'Baked Camembert" or even the 'Nelligen Nachos-Bean (vegetarian) or Beef Chilli'.

With four other chefs with a Nepalese origin working at the Steampacket Hotel, unsurprisingly curries are a menu speciality and the winter clientele has been treated to weekly specials. The butter chicken served with basmati rice and roti canai was a winner last week.

All meats for the regular big spits are sourced locally from Ronny at Haven Quality Meats Batehaven.

Wood fired pizzas are also bringing the crowds in and are served after 5.30pm from Thursday through to Saturday. A favourite amongst the locals in the Salsiccia pizza with a serving of Nduja sausage a spicy, spreadable pork sausage originally from the Calabria region of Italy. It is sourced from a providore in Sydney, whose identity would not be revealed by the Head Chef.

For the sweet toothed, it is a toss up between the sticky date pudding or the churros for a delightful dessert.

Servings across the menu are generous and well presented. A very reasonably priced children's menu at \$12.00 makes family dining affordable.

In an attempt to cater for all, there is even a 'Best Mate Menu' for dogs with a serving of fresh ground beef with egg for \$10. Head Chef Jeffery Razon praised his kitchen team for the transformation of the dining at the hotel.

Jeffery said "I have a great team in the kitchen. And couldn't achieve the great product without them."

In a first for the Eurobodalla Shire, it is now possible to indulge in a late lunch or an early dinner at the Steampacket Hotel. Whilst the bar is open from 11.30am until late, the kitchen is open from 12.00am all the way through to 9.00pm every day. The hotel also runs a courtesy bus is in operation from Long Beach to Broulee and patrons are encouraged to call (02 64211092) to enjoy a stress free meal.



Until recently, I regarded A.I. as just another technical assist, a natural enhancement of Google where one finds the perfect word to complete a sentence, or to expand on the broad brush of Wikipedia info. From last month when I returned to writing fiction after several decades of Australian history, I used its ChatGPT version when seeking the answer to a complex question about a bleeding shark. It was a very scary experience, of which more later.

I'd had a big surprise when the Australian Writers Guild told me that seventeen of my non-fiction books had been plundered by the thieves of Silicon Valley to enhance their A.I. development. Naturally, I joined the class action for compensation from Meta for illegal use of our copyrights. Last week a San Francisco judge ruled against one aspect of our claim. It was time, I felt, to come to grips with those two seemingly ingenuous initials: A.I.

Forests have been sacrificed to arguments over their rights and wrongs so went directly to A.I. itself to see what the fuss was about. 'At its core,' said Mr/Ms Chat, 'A.I. simulates aspects of human cognition. Some systems are narrow or "weak", designed to perform specific tasks (like playing chess or identifying photos of cats.) Others are pushing the boundaries towards artificial general intelligence, a hypothetical form of A.I. that could understand, learn, and apply knowledge across a broad array of tasks like a human being.'

Yes, that's the one I wanted. They were more than happy to oblige. They're salespersons supreme - eager and deferential. I found myself thanking them for answers and apologising for having to decline their offer to stay and chat!

'The future of A.I,' they said, (pretending to be impartial) 'is simultaneously promising and challenging. On one hand it has the potential to revolutionise industries. In healthcare, it can help detect diseases earlier and personalise treatments. In education, it can tailor learning to each student's pace and style. In business it can enhance productivity, automate repetitive tasks, and generate insights from big data. It also plays a growing role in climate science, transportation, and space exploration.

'However, with great power comes great responsibility.' (Not only impartial but ethical too) 'As A.I. systems become more capable, concerns around ethics, privacy, bias, and job displacement become more pressing. There is a global conversation underway about creating policies and standards to ensure A.I. development is safe, transparent and beneficial to society. Organisations and governments are working on frameworks to align A.I. with human values...Looking ahead, A.I.'s trajectory will likely be shaped by how well we navigate these tensions. A.I. could become one of the most transformative tools humanity has ever created.' (What is the downside? Not a word from Mr/Ms Chat.)

Here's the really scary part. Look around. If, as suggested, we 'align A.I. with human values' we will destroy humanity and perhaps the globe itself.

We are a species that has normalised war. That has refused to respond to the horrors of climate change. That profits the strong over the weak. The wrecker over the carer. The fable over the fact. The gun over the compromise. The man over the woman. Excess over moderation.

And who is conducting that 'global conversation'? Not the Silicon Valley thieves. Not the autocratic governments of Russia, China and Trump's America. They are inventing and using it to become impossibly rich or to destroy the voices of democracy (or both) where they decide what's news, who's taxed, and who goes to war with whom.

Frankly, I'd prefer to be in a pool with my fictional bleeding shark.


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A Beer with Bazz #197



Close to 100 people attended the opening of Heidi Smith - A South Coast Selection last Saturday at the Basil Sellers Exhibition Centre (Bas).

In attendance were Canberra Press Gallery photographer and 2025 National Photographic Portrait Prize finalist Hilary Wardhaugh, and Brian Rope OAM, long-time member of the Canberra Photographic Society and photography reviewer for the Canberra Critics Circle.

The exhibition was officially opened by Lt. General John Sanderson AC, a long-time friend and colleague of both Heide and Brian Smith.

Heide Smith is widely regarded as one of Australia's most significant photographers of the past five decades.

This exhibition highlights Heide's deep relationship with the south coast of New South Wales, where she now lives and works. Through her images, viewers are invited to experience the quiet beauty, character, and community of the region. Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report 20.6.25

Moruya River.

There hasn't been a lot of reports from the river this week. A combination of cold temps and not a lot of people fishing, or coming into the shop does make for quiet week days.

The lower sections of the river, on an incoming tide seem to be the best period to try the river. The spur wall seems to have the most activity at the moment, with bream, flathead and salmon the common captures at the moment.

With the clarity of the water at the moment, longer, lighter leaders are required to get the bite. You have to balance how light you go with the chance of getting a bigger salmon that could break you off. Start at around 10lb fluorocarbon, and go down to 6lb or lower if needed.

Tuross River.

This time of year is a good time to target some big black bream in both Coila lake and the Tuross system. Hard body lures are one of my favourite options to chase them this time of year. But for those skilled enough, soft plastics are also a great option. 2.5" minnow or grub style patterns work really well, slowly worked this time of year, as do blade style lures.

Look for the drop offs or weed bed edges for the best chance at finding a blue nose black bream.

The deeper holes will also hold the odd mulloway this time of year, but the colder water does make them a bit less active. Persistence is the key to finding fish and getting them to bite.

Rock and beach.

Warmer ocean temps are providing more fish activity in and down the coast this week. Salmon are the main stay, with drummer also offering plenty of opportunity for a feed from the stones.

There have also been a few reports of snapper from the rocks for those anglers that are prepared to walk into the better spots this time of year. Squid baits do offer a better chance at finding a red from the stones.

Offshore.

Local anglers chasing snapper this time of year are finding a few nice fish around, with fish being found in as little as 10m of water all the way out to 40m. Flathead are also available over sand areas.

The swell and winds look ok for the weekend, but are building early next week.

Multi-million dollar injection for community sport

The Minns Labor Government has announced that community sporting organisations can apply for up to \$4.65 million following the opening of the Local Sport Grant Program.

The Program provides grants for facility upgrades, new equipment and programs that support and encourage participation in sport and active recreation in NSW. Grants of \$2,000 - \$20,000 are available, with up to \$50,000 available in each electorate.

Last year the Local Sport Grant Program injected \$4.4 million into community sport through funding for 579 projects.

Minister for Sport Steve Kamper said "The Minns Labor Government is backing grassroots clubs to grow participation across all ages and abilities.

"The Local Sport Grant Program delivers where it matters - better gear, safer facilities, and more opportunities for people to get active and love their sport.

"If your club needs new equipment or has a great program idea but hasn't had the resources to make it happen - now's the time to apply."

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
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Bruce Lidbury wins the Lightning Singles at Tuross

Bruce Lidbury has won the 2025 Barry Sloane Lightning Singles at the Tuross Head Bowling Club. This is a very popular variation of the singles format of bowls where players are competing for the Barry Sloane Trophy. The Trophy is in memory of Club stalwart, great singles player and the winner of the first Lightning Singles held in 2014 – Barry Sloane. The competition involves the entrants being drawn in groups of 3 who play games of two sets of five ends with a one end tie breaker if needed when the sets are shared. The player who has a bye in each round acts as the marker. Each group play a round robin. In each game the players earn 1 point for each set they win and a bonus point if they win the game. Three points are allocated for each game.

As there were 24 entries there where 8 groups playing in the round robin competing for 8 positions in the knock-out finals section. After the round robin section only one player had the maximum 6 points with Lorraine Johnston winning both of her games two sets to nil. Steph Dennett, Bruce Lidbury, Sean Monaghan and Jonathan Green won both sets in their sections but needed a tie breaker to win one of their sets. The final 3 positions went to Sue Fahey, Irene Macdonald, and Lorrie Bird who were among 5 players who scored 4 points. They advanced as they had

the best 'for and against' records.

Before the knockout section each of the qualifiers randomly drew a number to determine who they would play. In the first round Irene Macdonald drew Sean Monaghan and despite her long break from bowls, due to an extended overseas trip, she showed her skills and experience to win two sets to nil. Lorrie Bird also proved too strong for the tenacious Step Dennett and won two sets to nil. Lorraine Johnston and Sue Fahey had a very tight first set that ended in a 3 all draw meaning that the winner of the second set would move on to the semifinals. Johnston played some wonderful bowls to win the second set 6-1 and a place in the semis. Bruce Lidbury had the better of the first set against Jonathan Green winning 6-1 but the never say die Green fought back to win the second set 4-3 forcing the game into a tie breaker. Lidbury prevailed 2-0 in this end to be the 'last man standing'!

In the semi-finals Macdonald played Bird. The first set was very close with Bird just getting home 4-3. Despite her best efforts, Macdonald's big day in her first competitive match in near on 3 months finally caught up with her. Bird qualified for the final with a 6-2 win.

In the second semi-final Lidbury was too consistent for Lorraine Johnston. After winning the first set 5-2 he dominated the second set to win 8-0.

The final between Bird and Lidbury was extremely tight. The five ends in the first set were all won by a single shot with Bird grabbing the advantage 3-2 and striking the first blow. The second set started the same way with Lidbury holding a 2-1 lead after 3 ends. Then things changed! Lidbury picked up a maximum 4 shots on the fourth end to take an unbeatable 6-1 lead forcing the final into a single end shot out!

Full of confidence after his second set win, Lidbury bowled 3 'resting touchers' on this end to force Bird to attempt some low percentage shots as a conservative second shot was not possible and not sufficient to win the match. Lidbury took the title with a second 4 shot haul!! Congratulations to both finalists for their great efforts on the day. Both entered with some challenges. Bird had just returned from Newcastle where she had a needed medical procedure. Lidbury had also been unwell during the week and he was down on confidence after bowing out of the mixed pairs last week – ironically to Bird!

Also, congratulations to everyone who participated in the event, the other club members who came to support them and Bowls Organiser Marcel Kors (who is recovering from a knee replacement) for his great running of the day!
