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### Another big cheque heading to Children's Hospital from Rally for Recovery - Tomakin

Rally for Recovery - Tomakin has made another large donation of \$200,000 to the Sydney Children's Hospital Foundation.

The Rally "Thanks to everyone, donors and buyer and volunteers, for making this \$200,000 donation to SCHF possible."

The Rally are also excited about replacing their many small sheds with one large new shed on coming weeks.

They will close from late July, early August for about 3 weeks.

### Transport talks on improving traffic flow

Eurobodalla Council is working with the NSW Government to find and implement solutions to fix highway choke points at Moruva.

Earlier this year Eurobodalla Council staff met with representatives from Transport for NSW to identify options that reduce Moruya CBD peak-period congestion on the Princes Highway. Given delays in funding and TfNSW not identifying the bypass in its long-term plans, Mayor Hatcher says the two organisations must cooperate to find ways that improve traffic flow.

"We've asked the department to model flow through the traffic lights where the highway intersects Church Street, and also to look at the Shore and Queen Street intersections for ways to improve traffic flow, access, safety and parking," says the Mayor. Mayor Hatcher says TfNSW will undertake work assisting traffic flow on the highway just north of the Moruya River and has asked the department to provide a timeframe for that. "Council wants to attract more tourists to Eurobodalla and that means more traffic. We also need to assure people in the shire's north they won't face delays accessing health services at the

new Moruya hospital," he says. "In the meantime, we appreciate these short-term measures by the department, helping with highway congestion until the Moruya bypass attracts funding.'



### North head Road stablisation



Road work on Moruya's North Head Drive has started this week. Eurobodalla Shire Council will stabilise the steep slope to stop rocks from falling onto the road. Big machinery is on site to cut into the cliff face, with trucks carting that material off to Guerilla Bay to be recycled into another road-safety project.

One lane will be closed during work, with traffic lights allowing vehicles through one direction at a time. It's going to take a few months but we'll end up with a safer road for drivers and cyclists, and reduced runoff into the river.

North Head Drive is one of Eurobodalla's busiest roads, with more than 4,000 vehicles using it every day. It forms a key part of the coastal route connecting Batemans Bay and Moruya. It also serves as the primary access to Moruya Airport. Funding this project of \$1,182,166 came from the Australian and NSW governments.

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<u>Moruya</u> Mail Council to test for 'forever chemicals' at Moruya sites



Eurobodalla Council has begun testing for PFAS, known as 'forever chemicals', at sites along Moruya's Campbell Street and Thomas Street road verges, and at Gundary Oval. The voluntary testing is associated with the decommissioning of a fuel site in Campbell Street and started Friday 11 July. A spokesperson for Council said the testing will take two weeks and involves soil sampling with hand tools at some locations or the installation of PVC wells to collect groundwater at others. Testing will provide Council with information on the level of PFAS at the sites, if any, and prepare the way for remediation if required. PFAS (per-and-poly-fluoroalkyl substances) are a group of synthetic chemicals developed in the 1950s and are commonly used in many everyday products - clothing, furniture, make-up, food packaging, non-stick pans, firefighting foam, cleaning products - as they repel oil, stains or water.

They are also known as 'forever chemicals' as they can persist for thousands of years.

There are many different forms of PFAS and at high concentrations some can lead to potential health problems. The presence of PFAS in the environment does not necessarily pose a risk to human health or the environment.

Residents with properties adjacent to the road verge testing sites have been notified, along with users of Gundary Oval.

Gundary Oval will remain open during the testing. Results are expected within six weeks of the testing, and the community will be advised of the results. Further information is available on the PFAS webpage.

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### Calling heritage heroes, 2025 Fergus Thomson OAM Award now open

Nominations are open for the 2025 Fergus Thomson OAM Heritage Award, which recognises outstanding contributions to the appreciation and preservation of Eurobodalla's rich cultural heritage. Established in 2020, the annual \$1,500 award honours the late Fergus Thomson OAM, Eurobodalla's first popularly elected mayor and a passionate advocate for cultural heritage and Aboriginal community engagement. Mr Thomson served as a councillor until his passing in 2015, leaving behind a legacy dedicated to the protection of culture and Country.

Eurobodalla Mayor Mathew Hatcher encourages individuals, groups, and organisations to submit nominations.

"This award continues Fergus's efforts by recognising people who actively promote and preserve our shire's heritage," Mayor Hatcher says. "Whether through writing, restoration, music, or digital media, we want to celebrate efforts that deepen our community's connection to its history." Eligible projects must have been completed within the past two years and can include initiatives such as historical publications, building restorations, educational programs, or creative works highlighting Eurobodalla's heritage.

A diverse range of projects have been selected for the award in recent years:

- 2024 Michelle Garcia and Lynne Thomas for their song Country Comes First, developed through Narooma Public School's music and creative culture program. The project combined local Aboriginal history, language and music to teach students about environmental stewardship and cultural heritage.
- 2023 Kevin Setter for his extensive research for and publication of Stage Coaches and Royal Mail Southern Eastern NSW 1841-1913, a comprehensive history of stagecoach travel in southeast NSW.
- 2022 Gary Traynor for work highlighting Moruya's role in World War II through the establishment of the Moruya Remembers Committee, annual bunker tours, and the When War Came to Moruya Facebook page.
- 2021 Shirley Jurmann for her extensive historical documentation of Moruya and its people, particularly through her involvement with the Moruya and District Historical Society.

### New youth wellbeing event brings heart to Batemans Bay

#### THE LOCAL GATHO

By John Longhurst A new monthly initiative is putting youth wellbeing front and centre in Batemans Bay. The Local Gatho, launched by local changemaker Sofia Keady, is a free, community-led event supporting young people aged 15 to 25 with connection, care, and creativity. Held on the second Sunday of each month, The Local Gatho offers a welcoming space where participants can share a meal, explore wellbeing activities like breathwork and yoga, and engage in meaningful conversations. Each gathering also features guest speakers and creative workshops focused on resilience, mental health, and self-expression.

"The idea came directly from listening to young people—and Christine McDonald from AMP Workforce," said Sofia, who also leads the Batemans Bay Community Picnic. "They told us they needed something consistent, something that felt like it was for them not clinical or formal, but real, supportive, and human."

Backed by a passionate team including Matte Willis, Alexandra Stewart, Bela Suarez, and Angus McClelland, and with breathwork facilitated by Jay Prothero, the initiative aims to fill a much-needed gap in local youth services.

Thanks to the financial support of Fire to Flourish Eurobodalla, ClubGRANTS from the Catalina Club, and the Batemans Bay Soldier's Club, the initiative is set to launch its first event on Sunday, 10 August, at Clyde Street Park, under the Batemans Bay Bridge near the boat ramp.

Designed for young people navigating life challenges or simply looking for community-The Local Gatho's goals are clear: reduce social isolation, promote positive mental health, and build a grassroots support network that grows stronger each month. "Our mission is simple," Sofia adds. "To help young people connect, nourish, and thrive. We want them to feel seen, supported, and inspired-like they belong, and like their future matters." "It's more than an event-it's a movement," she says. "One that reminds young people they're not alone and their voices matter."

# Digital skill, analog heart – the Tech Café is back

**Eurobodalla's Tech Café sessions** are back, with a new round of drop-in digital support at Moruya and Batemans Bay from Wednesday 23 July to Thursday 25 September. The free weekly sessions pair residents with trained volunteer mentors who provide one-on-one help with phones, tablets, laptops, and online safety.

Eurobodalla Council's coordinator of community development Rhonnie South says the program has supported over 100 locals to date.

"Many attendees are older residents or people living alone. They're looking to build confidence and stay connected in this increasingly digital world," Ms South says.

"It's not only about tech skills but also about inclusion, independence and peace of mind. People come in not knowing how to spot a scam or update their device and they leave feeling empowered."

With a median age of 54, Eurobodalla also has high rates of social isolation and solo households.

"We know digital exclusion is linked to age, income and education and can be a major barrier to participation in the contemporary world. The Tech Café offers practical,

personalised support in a relaxed social setting," says Ms South. "Tech Café mentors help attendees with everything from installing apps and sending emails, to removing malware and understanding Al. A common issue is outdated device operating systems that leave people vulnerable to cybersecurity threats. Our mentors include some young people looking at careers in the industry, so Tech Café is also giving them real-world experience."

The program is a collaborative effort: local business The Tec Exec trains the volunteer mentors, while Council provides funding, logistics, and promotion, with additional support from community partners.

Ms South says the Tech Café is a grassroots solution to a growing problem.

"Digital inclusion is about more than access – it's about agency. It's heartening to see local volunteers stepping up to make that happen."

Tech Café sessions run weekly in Moruya and Batemans Bay from Wednesday 23 July to Thursday 25 September 2025. Events are free but bookings are essential through Michael Lawrence Taylor by <u>email</u> or phone 4474 1276.

New Housing Pattern Book designs that can be approved in ten days are launched

The **NSW Government** is today launching the NSW Housing Pattern Book of low-rise designs, alongside a a world-first new Complying Development pathway, that will speed up the delivery of new homes significantly. Housing remains the single biggest cost of living pressure people across NSW are facing with a recent NSW Productivity Commission report finding that Sydney is losing twice as many young people as it is gaining, putting us at risk of becoming a city with no grandchildren. Following the launch of an international pattern book design competition in 2024, the Government Architect has now endorsed eight terrace, townhouse and manor house designs for families, young people and downsizers that will be available for \$1,000 a design.

However, for the first six months, the Government is significantly subsidising access to these world class designs with each pattern being made available to everyone for \$1 per pattern.

The price for each design is a significant discount on the professional fees that potential builders or homeowners would usually pay for a custom architecturally designed home that could be estimated to cost over \$20,000. The Pattern Book was created to be affordable, easy to build, and sustainable. With each design to be adaptable for different family sizes and housing needs, this includes different room formations and layout, helping to create vibrant, diverse communities that reflect the people who live in them.

Every purchase of a design, also comes with a complimentary Landscape Pattern to help new homeowners design their own garden that maximises biodiversity and suits the climate they're living in. A new ten-day approval pathway has been developed by the NSW Government alongside the Pattern Book to fasttrack these high-quality homes, cutting major costs and delays that normally plague home-builders.

This new, fast-tracked pathway will create the opportunity for these architect designed homes to commence construction within ten days of an application being made, subject to all appropriate assessments being completed.

The Complying Development pathway will be available from 30 July 2025.

The delivery of homes through the NSW Housing Pattern Book is further supported by the Minns Labor Government's Low and Mid-Rise Housing reforms that have made terraces, townhouses and manorhouses broadly permissable across NSW.

This laid the groundwork for the arrival of the Pattern Book, unlocking expansive opportunities for the designs to be adopted and built around transport hubs and town centres.

The NSW Housing Pattern Book will be advertised to potential home-buyers and builders through an advertising campaign that is also being launched today, highlighting the benefits of using a pattern book design.

The NSW Housing Pattern Book, together with the Low and Mid-Rise Housing policy, is designed to make the housing system fairer by increasing housing supply, giving people more choice in where they want to live and supporting communities that have been locked out of housing for too long, held back by rising costs and a planning system that made it too hard to build homes. This is all part of the Minns Government's plan to build a better and fairer NSW with more homes and services, so young people, families and downsizers have somewhere to live in the communities they choose.

The Housing Industry Association welcomed the release of the new NSW Housing Pattern Book, "which is another tool that could help make the delivery of new housing in NSW easier," said Brad Armitage, HIA NSW Executive Director.

"The Pattern Book designs are a great starting point and provide a level of certainty for builders, developers and property owners looking to undertake low rise medium density housing. "It is fantastic to see that the pattern designs will be supported by a new 10 day complying development approval pathway" said Mr Armitage.

Malcolm Fraser is still the Prime Minister, ABBA break up, Lindy Chamberlain is convicted of murdering her daughter, Azaria, average weekly wages for men are \$121 and \$101 for women and a loaf of bread costs 77c. The population of Batemans Bay is about half the size it is today.

It is also the year well known local businessman, Ken Davis (KD) moved to Batemans Bay. Come December this year, after more than forty years in business and at the grand age of 75 years he has decided to call it quits. His business 'Bay Bargain Shoes' is set to close its doors at the end of the year.

The Moruya Mail (MM) caught up with Ken last week.

MM: Thanks for joining us, Ken. You came to us from Ballarat way back then as South Coast Manager for Australian United Foods but are retiring as the owner/manager of Bay Bargain Shoes. That is quite a change. Please fill in the gaps.

KD: As you can imagine, there was a great deal of travel involved with my role as Manager and with a young family, I sought other opportunities. In 1984, I purchased Batemans Bay Dry Cleaners and even though I knew very little about dry cleaning, it proved to be a successful venture. In fact, its success gave me the confidence to purchase my current business 'Bay Bargain Shoes' in 1990. For a period of time, I was running both businesses so life was pretty hectic.

I eventually focused on 'Bay Bargain Shoes' and built the business up over the years. We knocked the wall out with the adjourning shop in the early 2000's and created our very own shoe emporium. We have 10,000 shoes on display, making it the largest range of footwear on the South Coast.

We have a very loyal customer base. In fact, customers who once accompanied grandparents to the shop now come in with their own children.

MM: What is the secret, Ken ... how do you compete with online shopping?

KD: It is all about the relationship with the customer. Over the years we have tried to make the shopping experience fun. We have run promotions on St Patrick's Day through to 'Christmas in July'. Staff and family dress ups such as Superwoman, Kid Shoehorn and the Caped Crusader have generated plenty of laughs and sales. The staff have been instrumental in fostering this relationship. We treat the staff as if they are part of the business, so in many respects we are old fashioned and the loyalty is reciprocated.

The online shopping experience cannot replicate a face to face shopping experience that is engaging, fun and professional.



MM: Now.... there has also been some serious engagement with the community. I read some newspaper clippings about visits to nursing homes.

KD: Yes... when required we have taken 'Bay Bargain Shoes' to the customer for fittings and a chat. We also raised money for Cystic Fibrosis in 2010 with a fundraising rally from Echuca to Batemans Bay via Kangaroo Island. We continued the fundraising effort beyond the rally with the generosity of the people of the Eurobodalla Shire.

MM: And it all comes to an end in December?

KD: Yes...the lease expires in December so it is the end of an era. We are holding a massive sale from now to the end of the year with 40 percent off. Shoes will 'walk' out the door at cost price.

I am still very active and continue to play tennis and squash. I intend to enjoy retirement with some domestic travel in winter and more engagement with community groups.

MM: Thanks for the chat, Ken and all the best for retirement.

# Over 10 million vapes seized and fewer young people taking up vaping

The Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) and Australian Border Force (ABF) have seized more than 10 million illicit vapes, with a current street value of almost half a billion dollars, from the Australian market since January 2024.

This strong action at the border and across the country has kept profits out of the black market and vapes out of the hands of our most vulnerable and impressionable, young people.

Interceptions at the border, coupled with ongoing domestic enforcement activity by the TGA and state and territory authorities, continue to disrupt the supply of illegal vapes.

South Australia has some of the toughest laws in the nation when it comes to combatting illicit tobacco and vapes with a dedicated tobacco taskforce raiding stores and shutting them down.

Since 5 June – when the state's new closure laws came into effect – almost 20 stores have been hit with 28 day closure orders. The Magistrates Court can order longer term closures on application by the Minister.

In total, \$35 million worth of illicit tobacco and vapes has been taken off the streets in SA over the past year with state and federal authorities working cleach, to shut this illicit trade down

authorities working closely to shut this illicit trade down. In the twelve months since Australia's world leading vaping reform legislation was passed there is evidence fewer young Australians are taking up vaping.

The latest research from the Generation Vape Project, the most comprehensive survey on vaping in Australia, has found the rate of vaping dropped from 20 to 18 per cent among 18-24-year-olds from 2023 to now.

Among 14-17-year-olds, the rate of vaping was rapidly rising in recent years but started to drop in the last quarter of last year, falling from 18 per cent in early 2023 to 15 per cent in the latest data.

The Generation Vape Project also finds that young people are reporting less of their friends vape in 2025 (7.6 per cent) compared to 2023 (14.9 per cent), and they are being exposed to less vape advertisements on popular social media platforms in 2025 compared to early 2024.

Young people aged 14-17 years are vaping less, those who have never vaped or even had a few puffs has increased to 85 per cent compared to 83 per cent in early 2023. Those who have never smoked or even had a few puffs of a cigarette is at its highest rate on record at 94 per cent.In South Australia, 106,500 vapes worth more than \$4.5 million have been seized by state authorities.

Across the country, South Australia's nation leading approach to enforcement is working with the South Australian Health and Medical Research Institute (SAHMRI) finding vaping rates among 15 to 29year-olds in 2024 reduced by around a third when compared to 2023. Young Australians who vape are significantly more likely to take up cigarette smoking. That's why the Albanese government is taking such strong action, to prevent future generations from the serious health harms of vaping and smoking.

We continue to significantly invest in ensuring young people understand the harms of vaping, smoking and nicotine addiction to spark this conversation.

Tobacco use remains the leading cause of preventable death in Australia and is estimated to kill more than 24,000 Australians a year. People interested in quitting smoking or vaping should speak to their healthcare practitioner, visit quit.org.au for support or download the My QuitBuddy app.

Through the flood having left the old house unfit for habitation, Mr. G. Mitchell is having another erected on his property at Wamban for Mr. E. Collett. Mr. A. H. Preddey, who has the contract, has already commenced the work of construction.

Mr. A. H. Preddy and family have moved into their fine new and commodious house at the corner of Page and Murray Streets. The building, which is a two-storey one, is composed of concrete bricks. It contains 11 spacious rooms with a 7ft hall. Water is laid on through-out, and it is lighted by a Delco electric plant.

Mr. P. Mylott had a narrow escape from death on Wednesday evening. After having the gas generator cleaned out and the container refilled with carbide, Mr. Mylott was placing it into position, when there was a terrific explosion and a ball of fire ascended. Mr. Mylott was thrown a considerable distance away. He is still suffering from shock and severe burns to the arms, his face being also scorched. His son "Rick," who was standing ten yards away, was in a semi-conscious state for a while. Mr. Mylott cannot account for the explosion, as there was not a naked light anywhere in the vicinity.

NSW launches Australia's largest cash music prize

The NSW Government is launching the country's largest prize for music, to celebrate the state's exceptional contemporary musicians and give them a career-boosting cash injection.

Aiming to inspire the next AC/DC, Delta Goodrem or The Kid Laroi, the NSW Music Prize will be awarded at an award ceremony in November 2025 during Ausmusic Month. There will be three categories:

- \$80,000 NSW Music Prize, to be awarded to the NSW artist or act whose release has had the most significant impact.
- \$40,000 NSW First Nations Music Prize for an NSW First Nations artist or act whose release has had significant and meaningful impact.
- \$40,000 NSW Breakthrough Artist of the Year for an emerging NSW artist or act who has had a aroundbreaking year.

The prizes will be awarded to NSW-based artists or acts who have demonstrated exceptional creative achievements and meaningful impact between 1 July 2024 and 30 June 2025 by releasing music or achieving a major career breakthrough.

A Selection Committee of 20 music industry experts will nominate artists and create a longlist for the NSW Music Prize and NSW Breakthrough Artist of the Year. An expert Judging Panel of five will then determine the winners. A Nominations Committee of five First Nations industry experts will be appointed to submit nominations for the NSW First Nations Music Prize and deliver finalists for a Judging Panel of three First Nations experts from the music industry to select the winner.

Delivering the annual prize is the latest action from the NSW Government's 10-year Contemporary Music Strategy. The strategy aims to grow the sector in the face of significant headwinds including unpredictable ticket sales, a retraction in music festivals and competition from international artists on streaming services. Since coming to office in 2023 the government has:

 Introduced 'Michael's Rule' incentives for international touring artists to book local supports.

•Established the Contemporary Music Festival Viability Fund in September 2024 which has allocated a combined \$2.25 million of emergency funding to five festivals. Delivered recording, touring and promotion grants to help artists and bands create new work, grow audiences and build their careers.

•Initiated Venue Upgrade grants for operators to install sound proofing and get their venues gig ready. •Offered extended trading hours and an 80% discount on licensing fees for venues that program live music which has tripled the number of venues receiving these incentives.

•Reformed the noise complaints system so single serial noise complainants can no longer shut down existing live music venues.

•Rolling out Special Entertainment Precincts that future proof entertainment districts.

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#### Consultation extended on proposed amendments to the Land Management Code Local Land Services

Public consultation on the proposed amendments to the Land Management (Native Vegetation) Code 2018 (the Code) has been extended to Friday 1 August. The consultation, which started on Friday 6 June, is inviting feedback on proposed amendments to the Code, which are designed to improve native vegetation management and environmental outcomes on private rural land.

A discussion paper has been released for landholders, stakeholders and community members to have their say on proposed amendments to the Code.

The Code regulates native vegetation management on private rural land in NSW and sets out the types of management and clearing activities allowed and how these are to be conducted.

The Code is part of the Land Management Framework and supports landholders to manage their land using productive farming methods and systems, while responding to environmental risks.

The amendments aim to improve environmental outcomes in key parts of the Code. This includes strengthening prescriptions for invasive native species management and mosaic thinning, and ensuring vegetation set aside areas, that are required under parts of the Code, are larger than the area to be cleared.

In 2024, the NSW Government released the NSW Plan for Nature, its response to the statutory reviews of the Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016 and the native vegetation provisions of the Local Land Services Act 2013.

The NSW Government committed to amending the Code as part of the NSW Plan for Nature and implementing all 13 recommendations from the Local Land Services Act statutory review, with two variations.

# Stack it, sort it, see it gone – hard waste collection starts 21 July

Eurobodalla's annual hard waste collection is back, giving households a chance to clear the decks and move on from the old, the broken and the nolonger-useful. Starting Monday 21 July in the shire's south, the pick-up works steadily north over ten weeks to wrap up at South Durras in late September.

"It's your chance to offload those bulky broken items – the collapsed chair you swore you'd fix or that microwave that gave up the ghost back in 2022," says Eurobodalla Councils waste services manager Nathan Ladmore.

Each residence gets one pickup with three separate trucks coming through: one for metal recycling, one for collecting and degassing fridges, freezers and air conditioners, and one for everything else.

"To keep the collection easy and running on time, we ask residents to separate out their metal from the other items. There's a total limit of two cubic metres per household, so before you place something out, think – can it be reused, recycled or donated instead," Mr Ladmore says.

Every year residents put out items that will not be picked up. TVs, computers and other electronics will not be collected but can be dropped at the shire's waste facilities for free. Chemical and hazardous materials will not be collected either – these can be taken to the Community Recycling Centre at Surf Beach or to Council's annual household chemical cleanout events.

"Other things that won't be collected include mattresses, tyres, motor vehicle parts, vegetation, and building material – you'll need to take these to the tip yourself," says Mr Ladmore.

"Every year we see people putting out their bulky items well before collection week. Please don't – a day or two before is fine. This keeps streets tidy and everyone safe from your items flying down the road if the wind gets up.

### Tackle World Moruya Fishing Report 11.7.25 Moruya River.

The weekend is looking to be nice and clear, with minimal winds on Saturday and only moderate winds on Sunday with sunny skies and cool but stable temps. Just in time for Saturday's 21st Birthday celebrations! The river is still a bit on the dirty side, but is starting to slowly clear up, it is still cold however, sitting around the 13 deg mark. The dirtier waters is a slight blessing, as it provide coverage for the fish to hunt and feed. This is the polar opposite of what winter water clarity is normally, gin clear with no where to hide.

The deeper holes are the go to areas in Moruya to fish at the moment, with bladed style lures the pick. Metal or soft vibes are the go to, and we have plenty in stock.

On the bait front, mullet fillet will be the hardiest and best option, due to the fact it stays on the hooks and has a high oil content for added scent. Hole in the wall, the anchorage and quarry wharf all have some good holes close by that will hold the potential for some good fish. The hospital also has a nice hole out the front of it, it is a fair way upstream and will be cold.

#### **Tuross River.**

Coila lake has had a few nice black bream taken this week, partially towards the front of the system. Look for the weed bed edges where the bream like to hunt for prawns or small bait fish. Where the weed meet the sand, flathead will also lay in wait, looking for an easy feed.

The Tuross lake itself has seem a few salmon within the entrance that have made their way into the system. The mud flats lakes that this system has, are also holding a flathead or two. The dark substrate the mud based lakes does hold a bit more temperature than the adjacent sandy areas. 1/2 to 1 degree can make all the difference when trying to find where the fish are holding this time of year.

One thing that Tuross does have over Moruya, is the number and size of the deeper holes or stretches that fish will hide in this time of year. A good sounder can make the difference in find bait and suspended fish, particularly when chasing bream.

#### Rock and beach.

Salmon and tailor have been on all the beach anglers lips this past week, with reports of good sized fish all along the coast.

The Moruya breakwall, as always is well worth a look, as are any beaches that have a good deep gutter with in casting distance. There have been many reports of a fish a cast sessions this past week all up and down the coast.

Drummer are also a great option of the local rock ledges this weekend, as are the snapper along the ledges north of the bay. Fresh squid baits are the best option when chasing reds from the stones.

Offshore.

After the swell and stir up of the last few weeks, the offshore scene has been fishing well for those that like to chase a red or two. While the game crews are find some good sized tuna out wide as well.

Conditions this weekend are looking good if you are wanting to get outside and chase a few reef or pelagic species.

The bait freezer has been restocked this week, just in time for this weekends 21st Birthday celebrations!

### Open Triples Semi-finalists Determined

**Tuross Head bowlers** were blessed with another beautiful winter's day to play the quarter-finals of the 2025/26 Open Triples championship. The mild sunny conditions, with little to no wind, and an excellent playing surface made for some very competitive matches.

Phil Welsh, Chris Bright and Allan Etheredge staged a great second half of their game to get the points against Lorraine Johnston, Doreen Monks and John Monks. The game was pretty even for the opening ends before Monks started to build a good lead. After 13 ends they led 11 - 6 in a low scoring encounter. From this point Etheredge slowly chipped away at the margin and drew level at 12 all after 17 ends. Etheredge's team then dominated the final 7 ends of the game scoring a total of 12 shots to 3 shots to run out winners 24 - 15.

Graeme Garner, Carol Williams and Doug Williams had a very even, low scoring tussle with Alan McLeod, Col Fletcher (subbing for John Fahey) and Sue Fahey. After 10 ends they were locked at 7 all. Fahey's side made the first move when they scored 4 shots on the 13 end and followed it up by winning the next two ends. This gave them the biggest lead of the match at 14 - 10. Williams fought back to cut the margin to 1 shot – 14-13 – after 17 ends. Fahey moved away again with 3 shots on the next end. In a very close-struggle the last 7 ends were all decided by 1 shot with Fahey taking the honours on four of the ends to give them a hard fought 21 – 16 victory.

Mark Velder, Ben Hewison and Bruce Magilton played Neil Alexander, Denise Lidbury and Bruce Lidbury that appeared, on paper, as the toughest of the matches. After a tight start, Magilton's team was able to slowly built a strong lead with Hewison and Magilton prominent. After 14 ends they had a comfortable 18 – 5 advantage. Lidbury's team started to find their range. They won 7 of the next 10 ends but were not able to get the big score they needed to really cut the margin.Magilton's side moved into the semi-finals with a very good 24 – 16 win.

The final match between Shaun Monaghan, Stephanie Dennett (subbing for Mike Bromfield) and Cheryl McRae and Jim Macklan, Marg Downey and Ray Downey was another very close game that was not decided until the last couple of ends. Downey's team had the better of the early ends winning 9 of the first 12 ends but the score never blew out as McRae was able to pick up two lots of 3 shots. After 12 ends Downey led 11 – 7. In a very close battle Downey's team looked like creating a nice break when they dominated the 15<sup>th</sup> end but a wonderful shot from McRae with her last bowl of the end gave her the shot and effectively a 5 shot turn around!Dennett followed her skip's lead on the next end with a great resting toucher that cut the Downey lead to 12 -11.After Downey extended the lead to 14 – 11 on the 17<sup>th</sup> end, McRae's team fought back well to win the next three end to take a 16 – 14 lead.

Downey's side regained the lead with 4 shots on the 21<sup>st</sup> end but McRae hit back on the 22<sup>nd</sup> end to draw level at 18 all. The experience of the Downey team helped them to win the last 3 ends and take the entertaining game 25 – 18. In next week's semi-finals Downey will play Magilton while Fahey will do battle with Etheredge.

### Increase in NSW adults getting sunburnt

People are being reminded to protect themselves from the sun even during winter, with a new report estimating that almost one million adults across the state were sunburnt at least once over a four-week period.

**Cancer Institute NSW**'s latest Sun Protection Behaviours Report, released today, shows 15 per cent of people surveyed reported being sunburnt, up from 12 per cent in the previous report. The report found young people were more likely to be exposed to the sun and experience sunburn, with one in four 18-24 year olds reporting a sunburn in a four-week period. Young adults were also less likely to adopt sun protection behaviours such as wearing a hat and sunglasses.

Encouragingly, the report found more than 80 per cent of respondents used at least one form of sun protection, though only 35 per cent always or often used three or more. It also found exposure to the sun for more than 15 minutes when UV is at its highest reduced among NSW adults overall from 46 to 41 per cent. Ninety-five per cent of melanoma and 99 per cent of non-melanoma skin cancers are caused by overexposure to UV radiation from the sun and can be prevented with proper sun protection. The general rule is to protect your skin from the sun when the UV index is at three or above, which in NSW is most of the year including in winter.

### The most effective defence against overexposure to UV radiation is to follow these five key steps:

- 1. Slip on protective clothing
- 2 Slop on SPF50+ sunscreen. Sunscreen should always be applied
- 20 minutes before heading outdoors and re-applied every two hours.
- 3. Slap on a wide brimmed hat
- 4. Seek shade
- 5. Slide on sunglasses

#### Other report insights

• Close to 50 per cent of young adults (aged 18 -24 years) reported higher levels of sun exposure, compared to 41 per cent in the overall population.

Close to 26 per cent of young adults reported sunburn, compared to close to 15 per cent of the overall population.

- Almost 50 per cent of males were likely to report being exposed to the sun, compared to about 34 per cent of females.
- Participants from Sydney metropolitan local health districts (LHDs) were significantly less likely to report often or always being exposed to the sun compared to coastal and regional/rural LHDs.

Shade is harder to come by, with a reduction in ease of finding shade down three per cent to 77 per cent. The latest Sun Protection Behaviours Report analyses data from the 2022 NSW Health Population Health Survey, which asked about 13,000 people to report on their sun exposure, episodes of sunburn, adoption of the five sun protection behaviours and the ease of finding shade at public parks.

The Cancer Institute NSW has several initiatives in place to reduce the impact of skin cancer in NSW as part of its <u>Skin Cancer</u> <u>Prevention Strategy 2023-2030</u>.
