

Long Beach protection - more work on the way

ESC report: "We're gearing up to start work on a new coastal protection structure at the eastern end of Long Beach. The final plans are now complete, and we're just waiting on the last few approvals before construction begins.

Large sandbags are currently in place along the shoreline, providing temporary protection while we've been planning a more permanent solution. They've helped shield Bay Road from erosion, although the area did take a hit during recent storms. Our plan is to sort out those issues first so everything's ready to go when construction begins. What we're building

We're building a 248-metre-long rock revetment that follows the natural curve of the shoreline along Bay Road – from just past Fauna Avenue to a little beyond the cul-de-sac.

This sloped structure will be made from large igneous rocks embedded in the sand, rising toward Bay Road.

The lower part of the revetment will be buried beneath the sand, while the top will be planted with native vegetation to help stabilise the area and create a more natural look.

Designed to absorb wave energy and reduce erosion, it will provide long-term protection for Bay Road – lasting around 50 years. To keep costs down and get things moving quickly, our own crews will build the revetment. Once we've locked in a start date, we'll share info about how the work will unfurl and what to expect over the coming months."

Over 1.5 Million kids a year missing out on Free Dental Care

With a massive underuse of a Free Dental Scheme for kids which sees 1.5m kids a year missing out, dentists are calling on the Government to put an end to the misinformation surrounding the scheme - and better promote it to parents. It's Dental Health Week (4-10 Aug), and new data from an Australian Dental Association (ADA) survey of 25,000 adults shows that 29% (1) or around one in four parents believe their child is eligible for free dental treatment under the government's Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS). Yet only 36% or around one in three families who are eligible for the free treatment, actually use it. (2) Meanwhile the ADA survey has found the scheme is shrouded in confusion and misinformation, with many parents unaware of its existence or unsure of their eligibility, leaving millions of young mouths at risk. (1)

In real terms, this dramatic under-utilization rate means of the 2,595,862 children who were eligible for the CDBS in 2020-2021, just 1,003,838 children used its services. That means around 1.59 million children are going without the free dental care that's rightfully theirs.(3)

ADA President Dr Chris Sanzaro said "It's a scheme that's shrouded in mystery and confusion - and with over 1.5m Australian kids missing out, the government urgently needs to better promote it to ensure eligible families can access this care."

For eligible families, typically those in receipt of Family Tax Benefit A, the CDBS provides up to \$1,132 over a two-year period for dental services such as examinations, x-rays, cleaning, fissure sealing, fillings, root canals and extractions for children aged from newborn to 17.

Of those who believed they were eligible for the scheme, only 56% have used it for their children, and 38% said they hadn't, the survey found. Many parents who took part in the survey said they didn't use the CDBS as it doesn't cover orthodontics which is so frequently needed with children. They were also under the incorrect impression that neither restorative nor cosmetic dental care were covered.



Calling for digital mentors to upskill the community

Eurobodalla's Tech Cafes have been successfully attracting a wider range of residents seeking help with their devices. The free weekly sessions pair residents with trained volunteer mentors who provide one-on-one help with phones, tablets, laptops, and online safety.

Tricia Pye AKA The Tec Exec has been running training courses for decades.

Tricia says "a lot of people just need help with their phones" "It's a computer in your pocket. And just like a car it needs regular maintenance, upgrading and security checks. Tricia said "I failed computers at school and said I'd never touch them again. Then started first business at 18 and quickly adjusted

when she could see the how helpful computers were." Tricia's background in business and administration which gives a very practical approach to training for using technology, and is currently working with many community groups, not-for-profit organisations and local councils providing Microsoft and Google Workspace training and communications in preparedness for

emergency situations.

The Tech Cafes have catered to clients from teenagers to 90 year olds. The training model is based on the 'Be Connected' Program, which is an Australia wide program

The Tec Exec has been a network partner, which has provided hundreds of thousands of dollars to run the workshops over the years.

The current Tech Café is a copy of what has been running in one location in Narooma for 7 years. Council recently came on board for regular workshops for Batemans Bay and Moruya. Council involvement was based on a concern for social isolation. Tricia would like to have a Café in every town in the Eurobodalla where people can get tech support.

Tec Exec has also been training Mentors who help clients attending the Cafes. The Mentors range from 17 to 70s. The Tec Exec is looking for more mentors to train up for the Cafes and for emergency preparedness. Lead Mentor Esther Krizmancic has trained as a mentor for 3 years. "I love being a mentor because it offers many benefits to my community knowing that they are safe online" she said. Esther says the Tech Cafes help others to overcome the fear of the new technology and assisting individuals to maximise their digital practice for their specific needs and purposes."

The Tech Cafes provide a safe and trustworthy "go to source" person as well as providing social contact with people who may otherwise feel isolated.

"It's rewarding to helping the community to stay safe online and minimising the fear of new technology" she added.

Esther also outlined some of the benefits of being a mentor. "It helps me keep abreast of digital changes and updates. It has made me more aware and savvy about scams and scamming calls and texts and it has helped me understand safety and security settings on my digital devices.

I also have access to others with more knowledge and experience which gives me freedom to enhance my digital practice online and try new applications without fear of being scammed."

The Tech Café sessions run weekly in Moruya 9.30 – 11.30am on Thursdays at the CWA Rooms, and Batemans Bay 10- 12 noon Wednesdays at The Bay Pavilions until Thursday 25 September 2025.

Papuans to visit Moruya for 80th Anniversary of end of WWII

The Honourable Gary Juffa, a sitting member of the 10th Parliament of Papua New Guinea has funded the travel costs of two Papuans to travel to Moruya to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the ending of WWII. The Honourable Gary Juffa's electorate includes a large portion of the historically significant Kokoda Track (a 96 km track through the

Track (a 96 km track through the challenging Owen Stanley Ranges). Moruya local Gary Traynor is Chief Organiser of the Victory in the Pacific Weekend (15th and 16th August) and author of the facebook page 'When War Came to Moruya' and is organising the anniversary in conjunction with the Moruya RSL Sub

Gary said "I have completed the Kokoda Track a number of times with Cletus Waigha who traces his ancestry back to the 'Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels'. Cletus and another representative of the Honourable Gary Juffa's Office will be special guests over the weekend commemorations.

Branch.

They are bringing traditional ceremonial Papuan attire and will treat guests at the Charity Concert on the night of the 16th to some Papuan culture. They will also lay a wreath, representing Papua New Guinea, at our bush war memorial during the service we are conducting for the 80th anniversary of the end of WW2. It is highly likely the two representatives will be the only ones from Papua New Guinea to celebrate this historical event anywhere in Australia."

Whilst their travel is being paid for by the Office of the Honourable Gary Juffa's, Gary Traynor is calling on the local community to assist with accommodation and associated costs.

Gary said "If any local motels, hotels or caravan parks can help out it would be very much appreciated. I realise the notice is short but I am hoping the generosity of our local community will shine through.

This journey marks the beginning of an exciting new chapter between Moruya and Papua New Guinea that was initially forged during WW2. Moruya had several Kokoda veterans, who have all since passed away, including Owen Baskett and brothers Trevor and Laurie Knight, who all served in the Australian 3rd Infantry Battalion CMF alongside our brave Papuan allies."

Cletus Waigha visited Moruya in 2008, meeting with the late Owen Baskett who passed away in 2015.

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New resources set to boost learning of Dhurga Aboriginal language at TAFE NSW Moruya



Dhurga language resources launch performance

Dhurga Aboriginal language students at TAFE NSW Moruya are set to benefit from a suite of new resources developed by a local Aboriginal choir to help preserve the language.

The four new Dhurga language books have been developed by the Djinama Yilaga Choir, a group from Yuin country on the Far South Coast that sings in the Dhurga language.

Choir member and proud Walbunga/Monero-Ngarigo woman, Aunty Iris White, said the learning resources will be valuable for all students enrolled in TAFE NSW's Dhurga language courses, such as the Certificate I Aboriginal Languages for Everyday Use (Dhurga), and Certificate II Aboriginal Languages for Interacting with Others (Dhurga). "We've created four story and song books with the support of the NSW Aboriginal Trust, designed to share the Dhurga language through music and storytelling for all ages, from young children through to adults," Aunty Iris said. "The Djinama Yilaga choir has been on this language journey for years now, and many of us, including myself, have been part of the Dhurga classes at TAFE NSW Moruya since they began, which helped us grow our skills and deepen our connection to our traditional language."

Teacher of Equity, Foundation Skills, Aboriginal Culture and Languages, Patricia Ellis, said the books are a meaningful celebration of language, learning, and community connection. "The books will be invaluable in the classroom. They support different learning styles, make language accessible across age groups, and bring Dhurga to life in a way that's culturally authentic," she said.

"They're a powerful and practical addition to our teaching, especially because they've been created by community, for community. It's incredibly special to see former students like Iris and other members of the Djinama Yilaga choir become creators of resources that will benefit future learners. It's a full-circle moment."

Aunty Iris said she hopes the books will contribute to the ongoing preservation of the Dhurga language.

"We wanted to launch these books at TAFE NSW Moruya to give back, to share what we've created, and to inspire other students who've also done incredible work to keep our language strong," she said.

"Revitalising language is about more than words; it's about identity, pride, and cultural survival. When we speak Dhurga, we're strengthening the future for our community and honouring our ancestors."



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Beyond bins, your say on waste strategy

If you're fired up about landfill, litter or lazy recylcers then now's the time to speak up. Eurobodalla's draft Waste and Resource Recovery Strategy 2025–2035 is open for public feedback and Council is all ears.

With an emphasis on resource recovery and reuse, Eurobodalla Council's waste services manager Nathan Ladmore says the draft strategy presents reliable and consistent approaches to waste management for the next ten years.

"We've put a lot of focus on avoiding waste in the first place, encouraging ownership through reuse and repair, and recovering as much as possible of what's left. We're planning future infrastructure, better ways to tackle plastics and illegal dumping, and ensuring the right services are in place as our population grows," Mr Ladmore says.

"In short, less landfill, more robust recycling, and serious solutions for managing our mess. People in Eurobodalla already divert 56 percent of waste from landfill. This compares very well to other local government areas but this strategy should take us even further."

Eurobodalla Mayor Mathew Hatcher says the draft strategy is about more than bins and trucks.

"No one doubts Eurobodalla's beauty and residents know how lucky they are to live here - they already look after it really well," Mayor Hatcher says.

"This strategy steps things up by supporting our waste-wise community with education programs, ensuring we all know what waste goes where, and with a renewed push for local solutions supporting the circular economy - that's less waste and more jobs.

NSW launches ultimate biosecurity guide to weed control

NSW Chief Invasive Species Officer, Scott Charlton, has launched the latest NSW Government weed management guide at the 23rd NSW Weeds Conference in Port Macquarie.

Welcomed by more than 280 biosecurity specialists at the event, the popular New South Wales Weed Control Handbook: A guide to weed control in non-crop, aquatic and bushland situations has been in high demand across the state since the first edition was published in 2001.

"Whether you're managing weeds in bushland, pastures, yards or aquatic situations, this Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) handbook is the ultimate guide to weed control for NSW," Mr Charlton said.

"The guide supports the shared biosecurity responsibility we all have to protect NSW from invasive plant species by providing land managers with the most up-to-date weed control information.

"You can check on the latest integrated weed management tactics, learn your legal responsibilities, and find the latest updates on herbicide use and how to manage chemical resistance."

Local council and weed management biosecurity officers, land managers, farmers, gardeners and environmentalists use the handy guide in the field, supported by DPIRD training and digital resources, to manage weeds across the state.

The 8th edition of the DPIRD New South Wales Weed Control Handbook highlights integrated weed management strategies and new control options, including herbicide capsules which are sealed in woody weeds for safer application and effervescent tablets to control water weeds. Listing state priority weeds, including prohibited matter, there are now 336 weed species covered in the latest edition, 25 more than the last edition.

DPIRD training, including an induction course for new council weeds officers, understanding Prohibited Matter, vehicle and machinery hygiene, identifying Opuntioid cacti, water weeds and grasses, and biosecurity essentials complement the quide.

NSW Government delivers world-first foot and mouth vaccine to protect livestock industries & food supply

In a world-first, the NSW Government and international biotechnology leader, Tiba BioTech, have developed a breakthrough foot-and-mouth disease (FMD) vaccine that is fast to produce and will see Australia become one of the few nations with the capacity to produce its own vaccine.

FMD is a highly infectious viral disease that affects cattle, sheep, goats, and pigs. It remains widespread globally and is endemic in many countries, particularly in Africa, Asia and Middle East.

The development of this new vaccine is part of the Minns Government's \$1 billion biosecurity plan to protect the state's \$8 billion livestock industry and Australia's food security.

Australia is one of the few fortunate countries free of FMD but if a widespread outbreak was to occur it would have a catastrophic impact on meat supply and exports costing the Australian economy up to \$80 billion.

The aim of the vaccine is to protect our community from the potential dramatic impact from FMD on the supply of meat, milk or lamb into Australian supermarkets due to reducing domestic livestock, disrupted processing and transport, and potential shortages for consumers. As a result of the vaccine's development, Australia is now one of only a handful of countries with the local capacity to produce a FMD vaccine.

Developing this capacity to guard against emergency animal diseases is a critical priority for the Minns Government to protect our agricultural industries and build a better economy.

The vaccine has taken less than 18 months to develop and has cost about \$2.5 million. The work is part of a \$20 million project funded by Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA) and the NSW Government. This FMD vaccine is an mRNA vaccine which is unique in that it is fully synthetic making it safer and much faster to produce.

Using this technique, the vaccine can be manufactured without the use of infectious material. This is an important consideration for safely managing an outbreak and the overall response.

The vaccine is now undergoing further testing to demonstrate it meets the standards set by the Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority (APVMA) before it can be approved for use in an emergency if there was a FMD incursion into Australia.

The project is a consortium of local and international partners with the biotechnology leader, Tiba Biotech, the NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, Meat & Livestock Australia, the German Friedrich –Loeffler Institut.

Local manufacture of mRNA animal vaccines is supported by the University of NSW's RNA Institute who have a demonstrated capacity to manufacture mRNA vaccines.

In recent overseas trials, vaccinated cattle exposed to the virus did not contract the disease and importantly did not shed the virus to infect others.

Minister for Agriculture, Regional and Western NSW, Tara Moriarty, said: "The delivery of an FMD vaccine is part of the Minns Labor Government's commitment to safeguarding livestock from key biosecurity threats and ensuring the state's agriculture industry can thrive. "Developing local manufacturing capacity to produce vaccines against emergency animal diseases is a critical priority for the Minns Government so that we can protect Australia's livestock industries, our economy and our food supply.

"The Minns Government is determined to build a better agricultural sector and grow our livestock industry and that is why we have invested a historic \$1.05 billion into biosecurity.

"We have a plan we are implementing to strengthen our research sector and have funded an additional \$100 million into modernising the state's research and development program so it can keep on delivering world class work like this vaccine.

"If diseases like Foot and Mouth were to enter the country it would cause major disruptions to the livestock industry and catastrophic market impacts across rural Australia, so this breakthrough is greatly received."

Parents, carers and children across NSW will benefit from a new hospital initiative aimed at better supporting parents to raise concerns about their child's condition if they feel it is

The new tool will require healthcare workers to regularly ask families: "Are you worried they are getting worse?" to help capture important changes in their child's condition.

The question will be embedded in paediatric and neonatal observation charts in emergency department and inpatient units across the state.

The potentially life-saving tool Worried they're getting worse is based on new research from Monash Health and developed by the Clinical Excellence Commission, and recognises parents, families and carers know their children best.

The question recognises that parents and carers are oftentimes able to detect early changes or deterioration in their child's behaviour or temperament that could signal a clinical concern.

If parents or caregivers indicate they believe their child is getting worse or deteriorating, it will trigger a review by a senior healthcare worker.

All NSW public hospitals will implement the tool by October 2025 and the program will be extended into maternity and adult wards in early 2026.

The tool was first trialled at Hunter New England Local Health District in March 2025 and began its statewide rollout at Sydney Children's Hospital Network on 21 July 2025. Separately, the <u>REACH</u> program is also available for parents and carers when they have concerns their child is becoming seriously unwell. A RÉACH call prompts an urgent patient review by a senior health worker. This program continues to be accessible in all NSW hospitals with work underway to strengthen this safety net.

BUSINESS SCAMS

'Watch out for Scams' with Horizon Bank. Amanda Welsh, Fraud Manager.

Scammers take advantage of the busy nature of many businesses to swindle them.

How the scam works

Scams targeting businesses come in all sorts of guises and are likely to strike at the busiest times, like the end of the financial year.

A false billing scam is the most common trick scammers use against businesses. Scammers issue fake bills for unwanted or unauthorised listings, advertisements, products or services. The business directory scam is a well-known example, where you receive a bill for a listing in a supposedly well-known directory. Scammers trick you to sign up by disguising the offer as an outstanding invoice or a free listing, but with a hidden subscription agreement in the fine print.

The domain name scam is another ploy used by scammers, where you are deceived into signing up for an unsolicited internet domain registration very similar to your own. You may also receive a fake renewal notice for your actual domain name and pay without realising.

An office supply scam involves you receiving and being charged for products that you did not order. These scams often involve products or services that you regularly order such as stationery and cleaning supplies. Scammers typically call your business pretending that a service or product has already been ordered. Payment redirection scams involve a scammer using information they have obtained by hacking your computer systems. They then pose as one of your regular suppliers and tell you that their banking details have changed. They may tell you they have recently changed banks, and may use copied letterhead and branding to convince you they are legitimate. They will provide you with a new bank account number and ask that all future payments are processed accordingly. The scam is often only detected when your regular supplier asks why they have not

Protect yourself

- Don't agree to offers or deals straight away always ask for an offer in writing and seek independent advice if the deal involves money, time or a long-term commitment.
- Never provide your business' banking, financial and accounting details to someone that contacts you unexpectedly and that you don't know and trust.
- Effective management procedures can go a long way towards preventing scams - have clearly defined processes for verifying and paying accounts and invoices and look very carefully at requests to change banking details.
- Train your staff to recognise scams.








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Let's do coffee with ... Sophie Counsell

Feeling the cold this winter? Batemans Bay local, 31 year old Sophie Counsell (SC) knows all about cold. Sophie is back home after spending 12 months working in Antarctica at Mawson Research Station (MRS), 5,200 kilometres southwest of Perth. The Moruya Mail (MM) had coffee with Sophie last week.

MM: Thanks for joining us. You were educated at St Peter's Anglican College in Broulee and then on to study at the University of Wollongong and graduated as a Mechatronic Engineer* but end up in the Antarctica. My head spins... so please fill in the gaps, Sophie.

SC: Thanks for the coffee. I actually applied to be a Bureau of Meteorology Technical Officer for a posting to Antarctica five years ago and made it to the reserve list. I applied for the January 2024 to February 2025 posting again in 2023 and was successful. I undertook three months of weather related training with the Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) in Melbourne and then another two months of survival training in Tasmania as well as picking up skills such as fire fighting and leadership.

It was then a two week voyage on the RSV Nuyina (an Australian ice breaker) to (MRS) via stops at Casey and Davis Stations. With eleven metre swells and being susceptible to sea sickness, it was an early test of my resilience

MM: Ok...you finally arrive at MRS and you are one of three females amongst the 30 people working there in summer and down to 20 people in winter, with ages ranging from mid twenties to sixties. I take it these people are total strangers and you have to share confined space at the bottom of the earth for 12 months. You cannot go off and build your own igloo if you do not get along.

SC: (laughs)... Exactly and it was my greatest anxiety on the way down. Fortunately, we all got along really well and I kind of ended up with 20-30 new family members. In fact, I came back with a boyfriend.

Teamwork is really important. Although my primary role was cloud observations, entering data, checking overnight data, replacing and maintaining equipment, air samples, project work and undertaking tasks for organisations such as the CSIRO, We all had secondary jobs. I was Deputy Station Leader as well as working on the search and rescue team.

With my primary job it was vital that we release a weather balloon at precisely 4.00pm each day. All around the world, thousands of these weather balloons are released at the same time each day. At a certain height these balloons collect data such as temperature, wind, humidity and air pressure. It is a snapshot of the world's weather and is coordinated by the World Meteorology Organisation and shared. Without getting too technical, weather patterns often originate from the bottom of the earth... and that is us... in Antarctica... so we play a vital role in weather forecasting around the world.

Now... our remoteness, particularly in winter, means we have to cover all the skills we take for granted in Australia, ranging from medical requirements, emergency responses such as fire through to all maintenance needs. It is not as if you can call someone up to come out and fix something.

MM: (laughs)... Yeah, I get that. Now, it is not just all work. What do you do in your free time and how do you stop from going crazy in the middle of winter when it is super freezing with an air temperature of -25 degrees Celsius (C), that has a feel like of -45C and no sun?

SC: Go for an ocean swim of course... the water is warm at -1.5C!!

MM: Are you serious?

SC: Yes it's a tradition. No wetsuits... just swimmers and boots as bare feet would freeze to the iron ladder we use to enter the hole we dig in the ice. It is a pretty quick dip and you go numb all over.

Apart from that moment of madness, we have a gym, the internet is functional, workshops, crafts, theatre and darts. We celebrate birthdays, have trivia nights as well as special dinners for Easter and Christmas.

Winter is really challenging. For 6 weeks there is no sun and we need a head torch to perform our daytime tasks. As you would expect, the ocean freezes ... to about 1.8 metres which means we can travel up to 10 kilometres 'out to sea'. It is a bit disconcerting at first, but we constantly drill for depth and even if we do fall through the ice the vehicles we use (Hagglunds) are designed to float and, of course, we are well trained in rescue.

Winter can be a bit like 'groundhog day' but I made a real attempt to at least get outside each day even though it meant dressing in merino thermals as a base layer, two fleece jumpers and track pants, Carhartt jackets and pants as well as glove liners, mittens, balaclava, beanie and boots. It does take a while but my mantra was to say 'yes' to all challenges.

A highlight of winter is the auroras every clear night in winter. Simply spectacular! Every shade of pinks, greens, purples, oranges, yellows and reds sweep across the night sky. We have glimpses of them here on the south coast so you can imagine the sight of an ever changing sky full of rainbow colours.

The Auster Emperor Penguin Colony is a 2 hour drive away. Thousands of Emperor Penguins breed over winter and we can observe the whole ritual so well portrayed in the documentary 'March of the Penguins' at close range. It was a major highlight for me.



Whilst the chefs do a fantastic job, by winter deliveries are non existent so there is great reliance on frozen produce. The bio security restrictions are very strict so fresh food is limited to what can be grown hydroponically.

The time either side of winter was my favourite in terms of the landscape. There is more ice than snow so nature's sculptures are breathtaking.

In summer, the temperature soars to 5C and we have 24 hours of sunlight. We go on field trips and spend time camping, hiking or going up to spend time in huts in the mountains.

MM: It has been great chatting to you Sophie. You are giving a presentation at Bay Pavilions on the 13th August at 6.30pm called 'Peaks and Penguins". I assume after that you will settle back to a more sedate life on the south coast?

SC: I am sharing that evening with my uncle who is talking about his trekking adventures in the Himalayas and is the first Australian to complete both the Everest and Annapurna marathons.

As for a more sedate life...not really... my partner and I are headed for Macquarie Island Research Station which is located halfway between Tasmania and Antarctica for a year next April.

MM: I think we need another coffee.

Mr. C. Johnston has purchased the shop and two storied house in which he lives in Vulcan St. from Mr. A. F. Emmott.


Trawlers are operating freely along the coast between Moruya and Narooma, in consequence of which rockhoppers are having a slow time.





Wander Wonder opens at The Bas







RACGP urges NSW residents to get seasonal flu jab as cases continue to rise

Royal Australian College of GPs

With influenza on the rise across New South Wales over winter and low vaccination rates compared to other states, GPs are calling on patients to roll up their sleeves and get vaccinated. The latest data has shown a jump of more than 78% in the number of cases, up from 21,257 in June to 37,895 in July. The Royal Australian College of GPs (RACGP) is calling on patients to protect themselves and others to minimise the risks of further increases and hospitalisations in August. Last year, NSW accounted for more than a third of flu related deaths across Australia, 267 of the 783 total. RACGP NSW&ACT Chair Dr Rebekah Hoffman highlighted a worrying trend of low immunity across the state. "I've diagnosed more influenza A and B

cases in the last few weeks than I have

Sydney-based GP said.

"We would urge them strongly to take action. People aged 65 years and over are more likely to require hospitalisation or have serious complications due to influenza, such as pneumonia or a heart attack.

Vaccination is the best way to stop the flu from spreading and protection against severe infection and the Australian Immunisation Handbook recommends everyone receives a flu vaccine each year. In NSW, influenza vaccination is free for patients who are:


- children aged 6 months to under 5
- pregnant
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 6 months and over
- aged 65+

living with serious health conditions. Dr Hoffman said flu vaccines should be free in NSW, and reiterated her call for free MenB vaccination, which prevents a rare but high-risk meningococcal B infection. "Cases have almost doubled, and

vaccinations are low - flu jabs need to be prioritised for those most vulnerable in our community- it is definitely still not too late to have your flu vaccine!" she said. "Winter is almost over, but as we saw with the surge in flu cases at the start of the

"We've also called on the NSW state Government to make the MenB vaccine free for all children under two and teens aged 15-19, as well. "Meningococcal B is a devastating disease, and kids and young people are the most vulnerable. But a vaccine is available to protect against the risk of death or disability, and we must do more to allow its take up." All state governments announced free vaccinations when cases surged in 2022.



Tough new illicit tobacco reforms

The NSW Government's tough new laws to crack down on the sale of illicit tobacco and illegal vaping goods will be introduced to parliament today, with new penalties announced for retailers selling without a license.

The NSW Government announced last week it would bring in some of the toughest penalties in the country for the sale and commercial possession of illicit tobacco and will grant substantial powers for inspectors to close premises found to be in breach of the new rules. The Government will also unveil new penalties for selling tobacco without a licence. This will now carry a maximum penalty of \$660,000 for an individual or \$880,000 for a corporation.

The amendments form part of the NSW Government's commitment to protecting the community from the harms of tobacco and vapes, and will also include:

- · A new offence for the commercial possession of illicit tobacco with a maximum penalty of over \$1.5 million and 7 years' imprisonment.
- · New penalties for the sale of illicit tobacco with a maximum penalty of over \$1.5 million and 7 years' imprisonment.
- · The introduction of short-term (up to 90 days) and long-term (up to 12 months) closure orders for premises selling illicit tobacco, illegal vaping goods, or selling tobacco without a licence.
- · New offences and penalties for anyone who breaches these closure orders, including for entering closed premises or selling products from closed premises.
- New lease termination powers for landlords where a closure order is in place.
- · New nation-leading offences for falsely claiming to be licensed; resisting seizure; and attempting to retake seized products.

The NSW Government will also commence a targeted consultation on a new offence for landlords who knowingly lease their premises to illicit tobacco and vape suppliers. These new penalties and offences will complement the tobacco licensing scheme which came into effect from 1 July 2025. The scheme ensures accurate information is collected on tobacco retailing and wholesaling activities in NSW to support enforcement efforts, deter tobacco retailing businesses from operating outside of the law and provide greater oversight of the tobacco retail industry.

If an applicant has been found guilty of an offence relating to the sale or supply of tobacco or vaping goods, they could be refused a licence to sell these products.



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\$1 million to establish independent NSW recreational fishing peak body

The NSW Government is delivering on another election commitment by commencing consultation on an independent peak body to represent the interests of the State's more than one million recreational fishers.

This is part of the NSW Government's plan to build a better NSW and to boost economic activity in regional

More than \$1 million has been earmarked to fund the new body and to assist it drive on ground outcomes for the State's recreational fishers.

The recreational fishing industry is major contributor to our coastal and inland communities and generates about \$3.4 billion of economic activity in NSW each year. The industry also creates the equivalent of about 14,000 fulltime jobs.

The NSW Government made an election commitment to establish a peak body for the State's recreational fishers and has worked with the fishing representatives to develop their vision for a peak body that is:

- A viable and respected professional body: to deliver representation that effectively champions the future of recreational fishing,
- Representative of all NSW recreational fishers: including affiliated and unaffiliated fishers from diverse backgrounds,
- Independent of Government: to enable apolitical representation to advance the priorities and needs of recreational fishers,
- Collaborative and solutions-oriented: to work constructively with Government and other bodies to deliver solutions for recreational fishers.

Tackle Works Moruya Fishing report Moruya River. 1.8.25

Sorry about no report last week. We were on the Gold Coast for the AFTA show, checking out all the cool new gear coming out later this year. There is some very cool stuff in the works, so expect to see some cool new things in the shop over the next few months. If you follow us on the social media platforms, you will have seen some of the new stuff on offer, but believe me there is a heap of stuff we didn't film as well. Stay tuned! On to the fishing report.

The river is very much in the depths of winter mode at the moment, with minimal activity to report from within the Moruya river system.

The lower reaches are by far the best option at the moment, with a few visiting salmon spicing activity levels up.

There are a few bream available in the deeper holes, particularly on bladed style lures, both hard or soft variations will work.

The spur wall and the hole in the wall are two areas that are well worth a look at this time of year.

Tuross River.

The same can be said for Tuross as can be said for moruya this time of year. Cold, clear water conditions make the fishing hard in this system also.

Fish deep and slow for the best chance at finding anything that is active at the moment.

Burley can make a big difference at attracting fish to where you a choosing to fish, a lightly weighted bait drifted down the burley trail can be the undoing of anything that is looking for a low activity level feed. Mullet fillet is one of my preferred baits for these conditions. It has a good oil content for attracting fish, and it has a good layer of skin that resists pickers taking the bait too soon.

Rock and Beach.

The salmon and drummer are the one thing that winter brings on that can consistently be relied on, to be around this time of year. They are in good numbers on all of the beaches and rock ledges at the moment, and can be a lot of fun to catch with minimal investment in gear.

Pilchards on gang hooks for the salmon, and bread burley and prawns for the drummer. Simple, uncomplicated techniques that will reward anglers with two species of fish that pull hard and are plentiful this time of year.

Offshore.

Winter reds are in full force at the moment, with fish coming from most of the local reefs, in as little as 10-15m of water out to the magic 20-30m mark as well.

Pilchards and squid are going to be your best baits options, but slow pitch jigs and soft plastics will also account for some good fish as well.

The bait freezer was restocked last week, and most baits are still in good supply at the moment. We do have good stock of the better quality Hunter river green prawns at the moment, which are a better offering than the red coral prawns that have been the only things available for the last year.

This weeks special is 20% of RRP on all dive gear! If you are looking at getting into diving or looking to upgrade you gear, come in and see us!


