Shoring up Long Beach



ESC advises truckloads of rock will arrive at Long Beach this month as work to protect Bay Road from coastal erosion gets underway.

To protect the shoreline and shield vital infrastructure, Eurobodalla Council will build a 250-metre rock revetment along the eastern end of the beach. Council's director of infrastructure Graham Attenborough says the structure will hug the natural curve of the beach, with durable igneous rock sloping up from the sand to the road.

"We'll blend along the top with coastal vegetation, with rocks still visible depending on natural sand movement. We'll be doing all we can to protect those magnificent and much-loved Norfolk pines too," Mr Attenborough says.

The project is the first on-the-ground rollout from Council's <u>Open Coast Coastal</u> <u>Management Program</u>, which guides work on public land and identifies community infrastructure that needs protecting. Mr Attenborough says it's a big, noisy project with big, noisy trucks and excavators in the area for the next few months.

"We're repositioning sandbags, moving large rocks onto the foreshore and, eventually, returning sand to the beach. Access will be restricted at times, shifting as work progresses. We'll store material on the reserve as you head toward Long Beach Road," he says.

While sandbags have been used as an interim measure, Mr Attenborough acknowledges local frustration at the pace of progress.

"It's tough seeing your shoreline disappear. We feel that too and we're glad to be finally moving forward. There are a lot of hoops to jump through before all levels of government sign off the work."

The project is part of Eurobodalla Council's <u>Batemans Bay coastal protection program</u>, with funding provided by the NSW and Commonwealth Governments. The work is expected to finish in early 2026, with the beach accessible over the Christmas break when work shuts down and the area made safe.



TAFE NSW Moruya trades teachers to wear vibrant shirts in new awareness drive



Mental Health Matters

TAFE NSW Moruya teachers are backing the future of the South Coast's construction workforce by wearing a custom-designed shirt as part of a new state-wide initiative to raise awareness of mental health and provide vital support to trades students

A recent survey by Beyond Blue revealed almost half (45 per cent) of workers in trade occupations reported poor mental health negatively affected their relationships. Furthermore, one-fifth (20 per cent) of respondents said they would not disclose if they had depression.

TAFE NSW, in collaboration with mental health organisation, TradeMutt, has developed a unique and vibrant workwear shirt to encourage apprentices and trainees to prioritise their physical and mental health and access mentoring support while they study, learn on the job, and complete their qualifications.

It comes during Tradies National Health Month (August), which shines a spotlight on the health and injury risks that affect tradespeople, and the benefits of safe work practices and early intervention.

Featuring the slogan "This is a conversation starter" and a QR code on every shirt, the collaboration will create a supportive learning environment where students can connect with teachers and peers, and use their mobile phone to access free, professional support.

TAFE NSW Moruya will be one of 42 TAFE NSW campuses taking part in the initiative, alongside more than 500 TAFE NSW Carpentry, Electrotechnology, and Plumbing teachers. Member for Bega, Dr. Michael Holland said "I'm proud to see Moruya TAFE leading the way in supporting the next generation of tradespeople — not just in their skills, but in their wellbeing.

"This initiative sends a strong and visible message that mental health matters. By making support services easy to access and conversations easier to start, we're helping students stay connected, succeed in their training, and contribute to a stronger, more resilient and well supported community." Minister for Skills, TAFE and Tertiary Education, Steve Whan said "The construction industry is the backbone of our state's future – building the infrastructure we need and supporting economic growth.

"But it is also an industry full of humans and we need to make sure they know they are valued and supported. That's vital for their lives but it is also important for building the workforce our state needs. It builds on the type of work the Government is doing working closely with the Commonwealth, industry, and unions to ensure apprentices get the support they need to complete their qualifications and secure long-term careers. "This initiative is a significant step forward safeguarding young talent, so NSW has a skilled and thriving workforce now and, in the future." Minister Whan said.

Yesterday's IRT drop-in session at the Mechanics Institute on its Seniors' Living Project was very well attended. Residents of Moruya were invited to help shape a new chapter for seniors' living, with IRT unveiling early plans for a vibrant and purposebuilt seniors' living community on vacant land at 11 Spencer Street.

IRT presented its initial concept plans and seeks feedback to help inform the next phase of the design.

The draft masterplan includes a mix of residential aged care, retirement living and key workers accommodation, supported by on-site amenities such as a health centre, library, café and clubhouse. It also proposes small-scale retail spaces, landscaped green areas and walkable streets to promote an active and accessible lifestyle, while encouraging genuine connection with the local community.

IRT has a long-standing presence in the Eurobodalla region, with established communities in Moruya, Dalmeny and Batemans Bay All interested parties are encouraged to attend the community drop-in session or webinar to learn more, ask questions and provide feedback.

Australia's food security future strategy

The Federal Government is today kicking off the development of a new national food security strategy, with consultation opening on the Feeding Australia discussion paper.

Key priorities outlined in the discussion paper include resilient supply chains, productivity, innovation and economic growth, and competition which will help shape the scope of the Feeding Australia strategy, with submissions on the paper open until 24 September.

Supported by \$3.5 million in the 2025-26 Budget, progressing this election commitment will build on work the Albanese Labor Government has already undertaken to improve food security and the Australian food system.

All Australians benefit from improved food security and Feeding Australia will be developed with all Australians having the opportunity to contribute, including our proud farmers and producers.

Australia is a food secure nation, serving our domestic needs and our international trade partners, with around 70 per cent of all agricultural production exported.

While Australia has a world class food system, supported by strict food safety and biosecurity measures, we cannot afford to be complacent, or to ignore the new and emerging challenges facing our food and supply chains.

The Government is also opening an expression of interest process to fill positions on the new National Food Council, which will advise government on the development of the strategy. Applications will be open until 10 September. The skills-based council will be made up of members with considerable knowledge and experience from across our food system, ensuring Feeding Australia is a comprehensive plan for our nation's future.

The Australian Conservation Foundation has welcomed the <u>release</u> of the federal government's National Food Security Strategy discussion paper as a once-in-a-generation opportunity, and renewed calls to deliver a food system that works for nature, consumers and farmers.

The announcement by Agriculture Minister Julie Collins, is part of the government's election promise to develop Feeding Australia: a <u>national food security strategy</u>, and follows a CSIRO <u>report</u>that revealed the hidden environmental and health costs of Australia's broken food system could be as high as \$274 billion.



LRS in Eurobodalla - Another round of procrastination and delays?

The local radiotherapy saga so far:

- 2019 Greg Hunt, the previous Federal Health Minister, formally identifies Eurobodalla as one of the NSW regions in urgent need of a radiotherapy centre and offers a Commonwealth grant to initiate the process.
- 2020 NSW Health / SNSWLHD declines to apply for the funding, arguing there is insufficient demand for radiotherapy services on the Far South Coast.
- 2021, 2022,2023 Petitions in Eurobodalla and Bega Valley Shires demand local access to radiotherapy services, specifically advocating for the inclusion of radiotherapy at the new Eurobodalla Level 4 Hospital.
- March 2023 The new government commissions Professor Reid to conduct a feasibility study on the need for a local radiotherapy service.
- August 2023 The Reid Report is delivered to the Ministry, confirming sufficient demand for a local radiotherapy service, with forecasts showing a strong increase in demand. The report recommends the construction of a local facility.
- November 2024 The Ministry / Buy NSW issues a Market Sounding initiative "to assess the potential to enhance radiotherapy services for patients in the Southern NSW Local Health District" (Market Sounding Radiation Therapy Services Eurobodalla Region HAC_2411161 | buy.nsw).
- April 3, 2025 Minister's media release announces that "tender preparations are underway."
- March 2025 Tender for proposals opens, with submissions due by May 25, 2025 (Tender: Radiation Therapy Services Proposal – Eurobodalla Region – HealthShare NSW | Health & Medical | GovMarket).
- Campaigners attempt to learn the progress of the tender and discover that it remains closed.
- July 2025 SNSWLHD holds puzzlingly underpublicised workshops to plan Cancer Services for the next 5 years. During the Moruya session, after intense questioning, the GM of Corporate Services reveals that the tender process has been suspended. Calls to the local Member and the Minister confirm their belief that the tender process is still ongoing, with both parties expressing confusion about the suspension.



A small but engaged group attended the Southern NSW Local Health District update last Thursday at the Golf Club.

Latest update:

Last Thursday (7/08/25), during a new hospital update session in Moruya, Southern NSW Local Health District (SNSWLHD) formally confirmed that the LRS tender process had been suspended due to "multiple complex issues" preventing its restart. A resolution is "hoped for by the end of the year".

Among the issues contributing to the current delays:

- Scope of the original tender The initial tender combined three elements: Design, Construction, and Operation. This may have overcomplicated the process. Separate tenders for construction and operation may now be required, which could creat earner funding issues and potentially involve a third party in the construction phase.
- More complexity arises if a private operator wins the tender, as several issues need to be addressed, for instance:
 - a. Exclusive Access Agreement The current hospital builder, Multiplex, has a contract providing exclusive access to the hospital precinct.
 - b. **Legal Complications** There are legal concerns about allowing a private operator to build assets on Crown land (NB: the March 25 Market Sounding proposal anticipated this and mentions 2 options: build in the hospital precinct or build on private land in the vicinity).
 - c. **Economic Sustainability Concerns** There is a need to ensure the long-term sustainability of operations.

Given the two-year timeline involved since delivery of the Reid Report, these issues should have been reasonably anticipated and competently addressed before the original tender for proposals was issued.

Retired senior medical practitioner and LRS supporter Dr Arn Sprogis, who has had long experience dealing with Health bureaucracies at the highest levels, commented:

"My reading is that the Ministry is now trying to meet the Ministers stated objective but has discovered that no fundamental work has been completed and is working out how to progress it. The Tenderer on the other side also realising that no fundamental work has been done is likely to be insisting that their risks be covered before they proceed."

At the Moruya Hospital Update session when asked how many years the suspension of the tendering process and the unclear timeline for its restart might delay the construction and opening of the LRS, the panel, despite their very best intentions, apologetically stated that they could offer no guidance.

In response to this question, SNSWLHD advised via an email on the 8 August 2025 that (our brackets) "the (new) Request for Proposal will be released later in 2025". This seems to almost guarantee previous LRS timeline projections publicly flagged by our Local Member and the Minister for Health have little hope of being met and will be missed. This is a bitter pill for our community to swallow—patients, carers, and dedicated medical professionals alike.

We can only hope that the unwavering support from our Local Member and our Health Minister will ultimately win the day.

All we need now is for the Departments involved to focus on prompt delivery. Interestingly, the SNSWLHD team relayed an unexpected but very timely message from their Chief Executive, expressing her public commitment to, and full support of, our LRS. The many across our region who have campaigned tirelessly for the project – some no longer with us but remembered – welcome this assurance and look forward to seeing these words swiftly translated into concrete action on the ground.

Koalas face extinction while most Aussies cling to conservation complacency

Australia Post / WWF-Australia.

Koalas face extinction on Australia's east coast without urgent action, yet many Australians believe enough is being done or remain unsure how to help, according to a new survey¹ commissioned by Australia Post and WWF-Australia.

The research has spurred the launch of a national awareness campaign to close the knowledge gap, spark action, and secure the future of one of Australia's most iconic species.

Shockingly, nearly two-thirds of Australians (65%) think koalas are only "somewhat" at risk of extinction or not at risk, and 40% still think Australia is doing enough to protect koalas and their habitat.

This is despite koala numbers on the east coast having declined by more than 50% over the past two decades due to habitat loss, bushfires, drought and disease, and a parliamentary inquiry finding that koalas will become extinct in NSW by 2050 without urgent intervention.

To shift perceptions and inspire action, Australia Post and its community partner WWF-Australia have launched the Koala Champions campaign, encouraging Aussies to improve their knowledge by taking WWF-Australia's koala quiz, donating vital funds to conservation programs and advocating for the future of koalas in their local communities.


The need for greater awareness and action is underscored by the research that reveals a troubling disconnect between perception and reality when it comes to the status of koalas. Sadly, almost a third of all Aussies (31%) have never seen a koala in the wild and roughly six in ten (57%) said they have never taken any action to support koala conservation.

WWF-Australia's CEO, Dermot O'Gorman said all Australians can play a role in saving koalas.

"We can all become koala champions by discussing the threats facing these Aussie icons and taking action to protect their forest homes.

"WWF-Australia is working across multiple fronts to give koalas a future in the wild. This means restoring and reconnecting fragmented forests to build koala corridors, working with landholders and Traditional Owners to replant habitats, and supporting partners to monitor koala health and trial a chlamydia vaccine.

"With the support of Australia Post, we're expanding our efforts to deliver educational resources across the country to engage young people, schools and local communities in koala conservation. These initiatives are crucial for closing the awareness gap and equipping people with the knowledge and tools to make a difference," Mr O'Gorman said.



Uncertainty highest in youth

The YouGov survey found the knowledge gap is most pronounced among younger generations and Australians living in metropolitan areas:

- 71% of Gen Z agree enough is being done to protect koalas or are unsure.
- 77% of Millennials agree or are unsure.
- 56% of Gen X agree or are unsure.
- 52% of Baby Boomers agree or are unsure.

Nationwide koala support is surging

Despite the current projections, the research revealed widespread affection and support for koalas. Every respondent said koalas were an iconic symbol of Australia and encouragingly, the vast majority (78%) said they would like more focus on wildlife conservation in schools, with almost half agreeing they would do more to help if they knew how.

Australia Post General Manager Community and Stakeholder Engagement, Nicky Tracey, said by leveraging Australia Post's national network, the organisation can help to deliver vital conservation messaging to Australians across the country.

"This campaign underscores Australia Post's deep commitment to protecting Australia's biodiversity. Since partnering with WWF-Australia in 2022, we've raised vital funds, directly to supporting a future where our most iconic native species can thrive – and have raised awareness of the koala crisis directly to communities across the country," Ms Tracey said.

Eyes in the sky in search for Eurobodalla Koalas



Eurobodalla Koala Project Drone purchase

The Eurobodalla Koala Project (EKP) recently managed to secure \$10,000 funding from Fire to Flourish to purchase a drone to help support conservation and monitoring projects.

"The drone will assist EKP field work immensely as we will be able to follow up sighting in real time as we get information from landholders etc." said Candace Wirth. "It is just one more step forward for EKP."

"Forestry Corp has recently sent me their own song meter surveys of the areas we had identified earlier this year with our own song meter surveys. Song meters were lent to us by Dept of Environment & Heritage and also analysed with their software."

"Forestry's acoustic meter placement has confirmed our findings in the same areas, and even found more koalas than what we did - potentially leading one to believe that the koalas are not just 'passing through' but could indeed be a somewhat permanent group in a particular area" she added.

"The new drone is an exciting step forward in monitoring not only koala, but other critters.

It will help us to:

- ·Monitor habitats
- ·Spot invasive species and record
- ·Track the health of native bushland over time
- ·Observe local wildlife, including koala colonies identified in the Eurobodalla
- ·Share to the community through images, raising public awareness generally and working with schools and Landcare bodies
- ·Work with local aboriginal groups to learn, and to enable caring for country."

EKP have had engagement with Cobowra LALC who are collaborating into the future. When they became aware of our koala sightings, they said they are very moved to see koala 'back on country.'

EKP has moved into largely an advocacy and education role as we also continue to follow up koala hot spots with trail cams and liaising with land holders where we can, and just clambering about the bush basically.

Candace said "So all the above leads into the advocacy and education of the koala story in the Eurobodalla. The koala story from then to now little known to most in the area sadly, but certainly opens up a myriad of opportunities for tourism and indigenous ranger programs." EKP is looking for experienced drone pilots who can share their skills and mentor our volunteer pilots as they gain confidence and experience. New guidelines launched to streamline disaster adaptation planning across the state

Disaster adaptation planning guidelines have been launched to establish a consistent and streamlined approach to reducing disaster risk across the State.

This will bring a more consistent state-wide approach to build safer and more resilient communities.

Disaster Adaptation Plans (DAPs) are a legislative responsibility of the NSW Reconstruction Authority and a key feature of the first State Disaster Mitigation Plan (SDMP), released in February 2024. This comprehensive plan outlines how the rising costs of disasters can be addressed by investing in risk-reduction. Work is already underway on the state's first DAPs in the Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley, focussed on flood risk, and the Northern Rivers, to adapt for multiple hazards.

Across the state, a further five regional organisations of councils have received funding for projects that enable early actions in adaptation planning.

A DAP is a regional plan developed by the NSW Reconstruction Authority, working collaboratively councils, communities and all government agencies to help reduce disaster risk and adapt to future hazards through long-term mitigation and adaptation actions.

DAPs were also a key recommendation of the 2022 Independent Flood Inquiry, which called for effective and cross-government engagement to adapt to disaster risk across the state. Since July 2019, NSW has experienced 111 declared natural disasters, with more than 20,000 homes damaged in 2022 alone. The SDMP indicated that the annual cost of floods, fires and storms is projected to reach \$9.1 billion by 2060 highlighting the urgent need for comprehensive disaster adaptation planning. Each DAP assesses the unique geography and characteristics of the region to identify the most effective risk reduction measures for different natural hazards.

The plans provide communities with a clear understanding of local risks and insights into how disasters impact people, homes, infrastructure, services and local economies.

Extensive community and stakeholder engagement is central to DAP development, including the establishment of regional steering committees, community reference groups and integration of cultural knowledge from First Nations stakeholders. By preparing DAPs, communities will have a clear pipeline of projects that reduce risk.

Minister for Recovery Janelle Saffin said "Hundreds of thousands of residents live in high-risk areas across our state. This is why we are undertaking this vital work in developing regional DAPs, so communities are better prepared to respond to and recover from disasters.

"We're shifting the dial on how we prepare for and deal with disasters by working together with local government and community to identify a pathway for adaptation actions and resilience across the state.

"We are empowering communities and organisations to adapt for future disasters and recover from them faster."

NSW Reconstruction Authority CEO Mal Lanyon said: "The NSW Reconstruction Authority is the first organisation of its kind in NSW with the dual responsibility of both proactively reducing the impact of future disasters before they happen and responding when they do.

"Years of unprecedented disasters have highlighted the need for NSW to meet the challenges of the future by working to reduce both the actual and social costs of natural hazards to our communities, which is why the NSW Government is investing in reducing risks before disaster occur to empower and better protect communities. "The increasing risk of natural hazards puts mounting pressure on our emergency services staff and volunteers,

who are on the line keeping communities safe. These DAPs will help to manage that risk by reducing the impact of disasters before they occur."

Wellness Walk opens at Eurobodalla Regional Botanic Garden



On Tuesday 29 July Friends of Eurobodalla Regional Botanic Garden (ERBG) hosted a lunch for more than 70 Friends' members, ERBG staff and staff volunteers. They were joined by Councillor Sharon Winslade and senior Council staff for the opening of Eurobodalla Regional Botanic Garden's new Wellness Walk.

The Walk was made possible with funding contributed by Foundation for Rural Regional Renewal (FRRR) and Friends of Eurobodalla Regional Botanic Garden (ERBG) and the significant in-kind support of ERBG staff and Garden volunteers. With input from local Aboriginal knowledge, the Walk also includes a Welcome to Country, creation stories, stories of healing and acknowledgement of history. The Wellness Walk is based on the Japanese practice of shinrin-yoku (forest bathing). This practice, through numerous scientific studies, has been shown to be beneficial to an individual's physical and mental wellbeing. There is clear evidence nature connectedness increases:

- Overall mental resilience
- · An improved sense of life feeling worthwhile
- Joy and happiness
- Care for others and the community
- Greater resilience

BUYING & SELLING SCAMS

'Watch out for Scams' with Horizon Bank Amanda Welsh, Fraud Manager Scammers love the ease of online shopping too.

How the scam works

Consumers and businesses are increasingly buying and selling online. Unfortunately, scammers like to shop online for victims.

Scammers can create very convincing fake retailer websites that look like the real thing, including on social media like Facebook. The biggest tip-off that a retail website is a scam is the method of payment – be wary if you are asked to pay by wire transfer or other unusual methods.

An online auction scam involves a scammer claiming that you have a second chance to buy an item that you placed a bid on because the winner has pulled out. The scammer will ask you to pay outside of the auction site's secure payment facility; if you do, your money will be lost you won't get what you paid for and the auction site will not be able to help you. The online classifieds scam is a common scam targeting both buyers and sellers. Buyers should beware of scammers who post fake ads on legitimate classifieds website.

The ads can be for anything from rental properties to pets, used cars or cameras, and will often be cheaply priced. If you show interest in the item, the scammer may claim that they are travelling or have moved overseas and that an agent will deliver the goods following receipt of payment. Following payment you will not receive the goods or be able to contact the seller.

For sellers, a classified scammer will respond to your advertisement with a generous offer. If you accept it, the scammer will pay by cheque or money order. However, the amount that you receive is for more than the agreed price. In this overpayment scam, the 'buyer' may tell you that this was a mistake and will ask you to refund the excess amount by money transfer. The scammer hopes that you will transfer the money before you discover that their cheque has bounced or that the money order was phony. You will lose the money, as well as the item you sold if you have already sent it.



Protect yourself

- Find out exactly who you are dealing with. If it is an Australian retailer, you are in a much better position to sort out the problem if something goes wrong.
- Check if the seller is reputable, has a refund policy and complaint handling services.
- Avoid any arrangement that asks for up-front payment via money order, wire transfer, international funds transfer, pre-loaded card or electronic currency. It is rare to recover money sent this way. Never send money or give credit card or online account details to anyone you don't know or trust and never by email.
- Only pay via the website's secure payment method

 look for a web address starting with 'https' and a closed padlock symbol.
- Never accept a cheque or money order for payment that is more than what you agreed upon or forward money on for anyone.

Let's do coffee with ... Alice Ansara

From inner city Sydney, to places far and wide all over Australia, starring in films from age seven, to Colombia and back, a star performance in a major Australian movie and then off to Perth, to set yourself up for the next three years ... Alice Ansara (AA) then turns seventeen years of age. The Moruya Mail (MM) shared a coffee with Alice last week.

MM: I think I will need a double shot latte to get through this interview, Alice. Thanks for joining me. For most of us, adventure begins at 17 years of age, but you seem to have squeezed a lifetime into your teenage years.

AA: (Laughs) ... Thanks for the coffee. I was born in Campsie some 43 years ago. My mum, Martha Ansara, was a pioneer in many ways in Australian filmmaking and her work took us all over Australia, from capital cities to regional centres such as Brewarrina - so I got quite a diverse education - both in and out of formal schooling, wherever mum was filming.

I was immersed in the film industry at a very young age and have been a member of Actors Equity since 1989. At 7 years of age I played the role of young Ann in the 1990 film 'Breaking Through' and have been acting ever since.

When I was 15 years old I went to Colombia as an exchange student. I was a bit of a rebel teenager and even though I got ejected from the exchange program, I did come home with tattoos and speaking fluent Spanish!

MM: With your acting experience since the age of 7 and the ability to speak Spanish, you land the role of Lucia in 'La Spagnola' in 2001 at age 17.

AA: Yes, it is a film described by Screen Australia as "A vivid and comic portrayal of a migrant mother and daughter surviving life in a dusty Australian town in the 1960s". I played the role of the daughter, Lucia.

MM: And ... played 'Lucia' to wide acclaim. Not only is it the closing night film at the prestigious Sydney Film Festival, but it garners you a Best Actress nomination at the 2001 Australian Film Institute Awards. You are in pretty elite company. Nicole Kidman is also a nominee for her role in 'Moulin Rouge' and Kerry Armstrong is the eventual winner starring in 'Lantana'. You are 17 years of age...Hollywood must beckon?

AA: No, I was lacking in confidence and felt that I simply must get proper acting training - so without even finishing Year 12, I was accepted into the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA) in Perth and spent the next three years honing the acting craft. It was a fantastic experience with up to 60 hours of total immersion per week.

MM: Let's bring you back to the east coast.

AA: After WAAPA I was in the film 'Rosebery 7470' and picked up a Best actress Award at the 2006 Melbourne Underground Film Festival and then onto working in theatre with the Griffin Theatre Company, Melbourne Theatre Company and Bell Shakespeare. Of course, jobs are sporadic and I am also doing work in call centres and hospitality.

MM: But you strike 'acting gold' in 2009.

AA: (Laughs)... yes... Cate Blanchett and Andrew Upton chose me as one of the nine actors in the Sydney Theatre Company (STC) acting ensemble known as 'The Residents'. It was the only permanent acting gig in theatre in Australia. It was such a shock to be working full time in theatre and on a payroll! In fact, when I got my first holidays pay I contacted Human Resources at STC and told them I had been overpaid. I was told to relax and enjoy my holiday leave loading.

At the STC, the ensemble covered the whole gambit of live theatre, from Shakespeare to Greek tragedy to contemporary Australian works.

During my time at STC, I discovered a passion for Australian Sign Language and went on to complete a Diploma of Auslan. I've worked extensively with the Deaf community—a connection I deeply value—and I'm keen to know if there's any Auslan signers here on the South Coast.

MM: How did Moruya manage to kidnap Alice Ansara?

AA: (Laughs)...I absolutely love Moruya and its small intimate community, I love being on Yuin Country- the beach to the bush.

About 13 years ago, I partnered up with a teacher come garlic farmer and we ended up in Wonthaggi, a couple of hours south east of Melbourne. But by 2017, I had a child and

the isolation of Wonthaggi won out, so we bought a caravan and with our 1 year old we travelled from Eden to Wollongong for a year. Moruya was perfect and we moved here permanently in 2019. I had another child by then and being a mother whilst living regionally, doesn't lend itself to a flourishing career as an actor. So I looked more to volunteer work here in the Eurobodalla.

MM: Okay... so in 2019, you knock on the door of 2EARFM Community Radio in Moruya and very soon are presenting 'In the Ladies Lounge'.

AA: I fell in love with radio very quickly. 'In the Ladies Lounge' was a program of female only music and interviewees across all fields. It explored themes from female carpenters to women in space - even menstruation (have a listen to Dolly Parton's 'PMS Blues'!)



I went on to make a radio documentary called 'The CWA and the 'F' Word'. I was then commissioned to make radio documentaries about the 2019-20 bushfires called 'From the Embers'

About 2 years ago, ABC South East asked me to present the Brekkie Show on Saturday mornings. I love the early starts for the 6:30am show which goes until 10am and covers weekend leisure activities, Dhurga language learning, interviews with local organisations and interesting people across the South East. I am always on the scout for great things that are happening in our patch and love the chance to talk with everyone - from farmers to volunteers, politicians to really anybody who wants to call in and chat about whatever is our talkback topic! My favourite thing is when our listeners give feedback and engage - so please do... if you're ever listening to 103.5 on a Satdee morn.

I'm still acting too. I'm in a STAN show called 'Black Snow' and am about to go to Queensland to shoot an ABC TV drama about a female detective.

Locally, I'm really keen on building LGBTQIA+ community. Together with my new partner, I helped create the Queerobodalla Festival—a joyful celebration that brings greater visibility and pride to our queer community.

MM: For someone whose lifelong ambition was just to present 'Play School' on ABC TV, you have achieved a lot. Thank you so much, Alice.

AA: Thank you.... And just in case the programmers at ABC are reading... I still want to present 'Play School'.

Mick tapped his glass for silence as Know All Ron cleared his throat.

"Thanks Mick, now dates are important. This week marks the 80th anniversary of the end of WWII. Whilst Japan unconditionally surrendered on the 14th August, 1945, the formal surrender did not take place until 2nd September on board the USS Missouri. In fact, the same USA Flag used by Commodore Perry with the opening of Japan to the west through 'gunboat diplomacy' in 1853 was on display at the surrender."

Mick's eyes were saucers and his open mouth oscillated like a sideshow alley laughing clown.

"By gee, Ron, you never cease to amaze me. You really should be on the ABC's 'Hard Quiz', but take us to the lead up to the surrender. I mean the Japanese have a fighting mentality of return home victorious or die in battle.'

I think it had more to do with sending a signal to the Soviet Union as the world was about to enter the Cold War. But the response to the Potsdam Declaration by the Japanese Prime Minister, Kantarō Suzuki, has always fascinated me."

"Don't start rewriting history, Bazza. There is one history and Ron is across the detail."

Bazza chuckled.

"I am not sure about that, Mick. Anyhow, The Potsdam Declaration pledged that Japan would not be "enslaved" or "destroyed", and warned that a negative response would result in "prompt and utter destruction." Speaking off the cuff to reporters and before the government had formally decided on its response, Prime Minister Suzuki used the word 'mokusatsu', which has a number of meanings. It can mean 'to withhold comment' and given the context, it may have been what he meant, as in 'no comment' at this stage. It's pretty common pollie speak to allow time for consideration."

Bazza took a measured sip.

"But here's the key....'mokusatsu' can also be translated 'to ignore' or 'treat with silent contempt', which is what the international press ran with. The Allies, particularly the USA, interpreted the response as a rude rejection, contributing to the decision to drop atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. <u>Linguists</u> have called it the world's most tragic translation**."

Gadfly

When I first heard of the kerfuffle over the fate of the earless lizard – some twenty-seven years ago – I honestly thought it was a joke. I guess that proves you can take the boy out of Queensland, but you can't take Queensland out of the boy. Not all of it anyway.

Over the decades since, as the environment enthusiasts have raised its continued reptilian existence to an issue of high spiritual and political moment, I've become a dedicatee. I have never set eyes on one of the little chaps, but would now defend the species' right to life as passionately as I would a koala's.

Koalas are cute, but we humans retain a 'lizard brain'. While the koala's cerebellum chooses to doze for 23 hours out of 24, we and the lizard have our 'fight or flight' instinct whenever danger threatens. And nothing is more threatening than building a road over where we live. That's NIMBY in spades.

Until now, a protective government has resisted the Canberra Airport Group's pressure to destroy the vital habitat of Canberra's very own lizard whose hold on existence is tenuous at best. Alas, in their struggle to retain government support, the Friends of the Grasslands Earless Lizard have made a couple of basic mistakes.

One was their decision to call it the Earless Dragon. In the mind's eye, there's a mighty big difference between the tiny 7cm head and body length of a earless lizard, and a Dragon of the same size. Dragons breathe fire and those who kill them are mostly Saints. Whereas a 7cm lizard reminds us of a friendly Gecko.

The other mistake was to direct their fire against a plethora of lizardry dangers. For example, the latest plea by the worthy Executive Director of the Conservation Council, Dr Simon Copland blames 'increasing road kill, increasing predation and dividing the population into two fragments, each too small to survive.' It would be far better (I suggest) to blame the great road busting machines crushing the poor little hard-of-hearing lizards and their even tinier offspring in their humble tunnels.

The other problem, I suspect, is the power of the airline and airport industry in our fair land...and the dollars they bring to the negotiating table.

The lizard supporters directed their lobbying to the then Labor Environment Ministers, Peter Garrett and Tanya Plibersek, and Sussan Ley when the Libs ran the show.

And you will not be surprised to hear that while they hummed and harred, Prime Minister Scott Morrison intervened on behalf of the airlines and the Canberra Airport Group. It didn't matter that the earless lizard defenders had some runs on the board, Morrison was deaf to their pleas.

Vice President of Friends of Grasslands, an obviously tearful Matt Whiting says, 'With so few of our Earless Dragons [read Lizards] left in the wild, the loss of even one individual threatens the whole species. This case is a travesty. This northern road is entirely unnecessary. The loss of our Earless Dragon [read Lizard] is avoidable.'

Dr Simon Copland backs him up. 'The arguments in favour of this road are rubbish. No expensive breeding program can replace the need to retain quality habitat for our Earless Dragon [read Lizard].

The current PM Anthony Albanese has not yet shown his hand. But if the flying fortress of Australia's international goodwill could ponder the fate of the little mother and son lizards each time his aircraft passes over their shuddering home as he sets forth on yet another mission, perhaps he'll find it in his heart to save them.

I really think he's that kind of guy.

In addition to tuition money, the scholarships offer performance opportunities and mentoring from the adjudicators who are invited to judge the auditions. The finalists perform at The St Cecilia Finalists Concert in November and encounter the joy of showcasing their talents in front of the whole community. The response from an appreciative audience is often sufficient to encourage students to continue their instrumental and vocal studies.

Age Group win for local in London Triathlon

Batemans Bay local, Lachlan Brown has taken out first place in the 55-59 years age group in the prestigious London Triathlon last Sunday.

The festival was held in the Docklands with over 6000 competitors in total. The Olympic distance race, a UK national team selection event, had 1608 finishers.

In Lachlan's age group, 61 competitors from around the world completed the 1.5km swim, 40km bike ride and the 10km run. Lachlan's winning time was 2 hours and 21 minutes. It was Lachlan's second attempt at the Triathlon. Lachlan said "I competed in the 2023 event but did not finish due to mechanical issues on the bike leg. It was very much a case of unfinished business."

Lachlan took up the sport 20 years ago and has gone on to compete in New Zealand, USA, France and the UK.

He trains with the Eurocoast Triathlon Club and over any given week of training, swims 4-6 kms, runs 20-30 kms and cycles 80 to 100kms.

The Eurocoast Triathlon Club has grown from strength in recent years and now has over 40 members, with approximately half female and an age group from teenagers to seventy year olds. Lachlan said "We welcome new members and can offer coaching expertise with swimming and bike skills. It is much more fun to train with a group of like minded people. Over winter we are doing swim training at the Bay Pavilions every Wednesday evening at 5.30pm. In summer there is also a weekly swim session at the Moruya pool. It is a very accessible sport as most people can swim, ride a bike and run. There is a regular series of triathlons on the South Coast. Our local event at Tomakin is coming up in early February next year."

Lachlan is now training for the World Triathlon Championship which will be held in Wollongong in October.
