#### Stronger Communities Grants boost Gilmore groups

The Sussex Inlet Marine Rescue NSW unit is one of nine community organisations across Gilmore that will share in more than \$112,000 in grants as part of the Federal Government's Stronger Communities Programme.

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips has delivered a \$17,962 grant to Sussex Inlet Marine Rescue to upgrade its radio room.

"The grant will allow the aging radio room to be re-fitted and radios, computers and phones to be replaced with current, state-of-the art communications equipment," Mrs Phillips said after visiting the unit on Monday.

"With an influx of new members, and existing members keen to become radio operators, it is vital that the service has a dedicated space and equipment that is fit for purpose. The Sussex Inlet Marine Rescue volunteers do such an incredible job keeping local and visiting boaters safe all year-round, but particularly over the summer holidays when the population swells."

"With around 70 active members giving their time to our community, I was really pleased to be able to help out with a grant for the upgrade in appreciation of the wonderful work they do in Sussex Inlet and beyond."

The Sussex Inlet Chamber of Commerce has also received a \$15,000 boost from the Stronger Communities Program, to equip the Ellmoos Community Event Centre with an energy efficient heating and cooling system, as well as solar panels to help reduce running costs.

To the north of the electorate, a \$15,000 grant will assist the Kiama Downs Surf Life Saving Club's upgrade of the female, gender-neutral and parent room amenities, while the Jamberoo Youth Hall will also receive \$15,000 to install solar panels and air conditioning.

Mrs Phillips said she was pleased to support the Albatross Musical Theatre Company with a \$15,000 grant to replace audio visual equipment to enhance their "wonderful local performances".

The Bomaderry Scout Hall will receive an injection of \$3,448 to replace aging lights with high efficiency LED lighting which will help lower running costs and reduce the group's carbon footprint.

In the south of the electorate, the Milton-Ulladulla Panthers Football Club will receive \$6,200 for first aid kits and a stretcher for the 10 female teams, while the Moruya **Soccer Club** will install defibrillators thanks to a \$6,490 grant.

Volunteers and visitors to Tomakin's Rally For Recovery op-shop will soon enjoy a new accessible shed, thanks to a \$18,500 grant from the Stronger Communities Programme.

Mrs Phillips said she was delighted to help those groups that continue to enhance the local community.

"These organisations support and engage people in our communities, whether that is through sport, music, social activities or keeping us safe," Mrs Phillips said. "The Stronger Communities grants deliver small infrastructure projects and equipment that support local organisations and encourage participation. I congratulate the nine recipients and thank all the volunteers that give their time and skills to help create vibrant communities on the South Coast."

Tomakin's Rally For Recovery accessibility grant



Volunteers and visitors to Tomakin's Rally For Recovery op-shop will soon enjoy a new accessible shed, thanks to a \$18,500 grant from the Albanese Labor Government's Stronger Communities Programme.

During a visit to the region, Federal Minister for the National Disability Insurance Scheme, Senator Jenny McAllister, and Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips dropped into the shed on Thursday 14 August to congratulate the volunteers.

The funding boost will upgrade the Rally For Recovery facility to make it accessible for the volunteers who have raised more than \$4 million for the Sydney Children's Hospital Foundation (SCHF), as well as visitors. The grant is one of nine that have been awarded to organisations across Gilmore for infrastructure projects that deliver social benefits for local communities.

"These upgrades will mean that people with disability can volunteer more easily, connect with the community and take part in the wonderful fundraising efforts at Rally for Recovery," Senator McAllister said.

Mrs Phillips said she was pleased to support the Rally For Recovery that has been run entirely by volunteers for almost 25 years.

"This organisation does amazing work and their new shed will provide better access for the more than 40 volunteers as well as people dropping off donations and buying goods," she said.
"What started out as a car rally has morphed into a fantastic op-shop where

"What started out as a car rally has morphed into a fantastic op-shop where people can grab a bargain for their house or garden, while reducing landfill and, importantly, helping kids with cancer."

Rally For recovery vice president Michael Hitchcock said the new shed was due for completion in late August, early September.

"We'll have an 18 metre by 7.5 metre shed that is fully insulated and fully accessible," he said.

"We're demolishing the mish-mash of old sheds that we have been operating out of. The new shed will have air-con and departments, such as furniture, books and tools, and people will be able to walk around and see everything much easier."

The shed is open from 8.30am until 12pm Wednesday and Saturdays.



### Councils can unlock Australia's future productivity - ALGA

With all eyes on the Federal Government's Economic Reform Roundtable, it's important to remember the importance and key role of Australia's councils.

Everyone, everywhere and every day depends on the infrastructure, services and benefits provided by the nation's 537 local councils – the closest level of government to our communities.

Whether it's transporting goods on the 680,000 kilometres of local roads, providing public assets or enjoying the myriad of community-based facilities, including local swimming pools, libraries, parks, sporting fields and cultural centres.

Sustainably funded councils can partner with the Government to play a significant role in unlocking the nation's productivity goals and deliver economic growth by providing 'local solutions to national priorities'.

This was outlined in ALGA's recent <u>submission</u> to the Economic Reform Roundtable, which addressed the Government's three priority areas of improving productivity, economic resilience and budget sustainability.

We can help our nation to better prepare for and adapt to changing climate conditions, create safer roads, facilitate more housing and support our communities to be their best.

Our recent <u>research</u> shows councils are already delivering more than \$400 million per year in projects to prepare communities for the changing climate needs. This type of long-term view is essential to the future productivity of our communities.

Local roads form the backbone of our nation's productivity. It's the first mile and last mile that connect farms, mines and homes to our highways. As local road asset managers, local governments are an essential link to progress the automation and efficiency of our road network.

But the future of these national productivity gains remains at risk as local government grapples with its biggest challenge – to remain financially sustainable.

Many councils are financially stretched after having to fill gaps in local service delivery, including healthcare, childcare, aged care and funeral services.

Other essential services and infrastructure, once the responsibility of State and Federal governments, are increasingly being met by local government, without any extra support provided. This continues to impact councils' budgets.

This funding emergency was recognised by a recent <u>Federal Parliamentary inquiry</u> into local government sustainability, showing many councils have reached breaking point after years of being asked to do more with less money.

Published earlier this year, the inquiry's <u>interim report</u> highlighted how councils across urban, regional, rural, and remote areas, are all facing pressures from changing population trends, aging infrastructure and increased service delivery obligations.

Fortunately, political leaders from both sides of federal politics are listening after Local Government Minister Kristy McBain and Shadow Minister for Local Government Dr Anne Webster recently said the inquiry needs to be reinstated and progressed during the new term of Parliament.

The Government's final response to the inquiry must

include a significant increase in untied, formula-based funding for all councils, including through federal Financial Assistance Grants. We have called for an extra \$3.5 billion in federal funding to bring us back to one per cent of national taxation revenue. We also seek to reform cumbersome grant administration. Too often, councils in need miss out on funding because they can't afford the research and resources to create a shiny grant application. Grant assessment creates a burden on government officials and slows down funding getting into communities. That's why we need more formula-based funding – where councils are provided with a clear forward allocation so they can plan their budgets.

forward allocation so they can plan their budgets. We stand ready to deliver for our nation but need foundation funding to do so. We can't afford for the Government to simply re-cut the funding model – we need a significant uplift for all council budgets across Australia.

We urgently need serious funding increases and not just pocket money.

Every day councils achieve so much – just imagine what we could do with secure, long-term and untied funding to deliver the nation's priorities.

Importantly, local government can create effective place-based partnerships with the Government – we are local, we are in every community, and we stand ready to help.

Having a strong, sustainable local government sector is critical not just for local communities but also for the future growth and productivity of our nation.

# Call for Minns to step in as parliamentary inquiry fails to back changes to protect wildlife from roaming pet cats

The **Invasive Species Council**, NSW Nature Conservation Council and the Biodiversity Council have criticised a <u>NSW Upper House inquiry report</u> by the Animal Justice Party for failing to back legal changes to allow local governments to bring in cat containment rules to protect wildlife and pet cats. NSW is lagging behind the rest of Australia and millions of native animals are paying the price.

While the committee found "there is an urgent need to implement cat management strategies in NSW to address the overpopulation of cats, both in urban environments and in the wild", they also found NSW "may not be ready to adopt mandatory cat containment laws".

The conservation organisations say evidence from expert witnesses and other states proved otherwise – and are urging Premier Chris Minns to listen to the community and deliver these important reforms through the current <a href="Companion Animals Act review.">Companion Animals Act review.</a>

Invasive Species Council CEO, Jack Gough said: 'It's disappointing that this parliamentary committee didn't support a clear statement backing cat containment, but we continue to have positive engagement with the Labor Government and understand that this is under serious consideration through the Companion Animal Act review. 'Roaming pet cats are sending our suburbs silent. Every year of inaction results in the death of <u>66 million</u> native animals in Greater Sydney alone.

"Despite strong public backing for cat containment, outdated laws in NSW prevent councils from acting. This is a stark contrast to other states like Victoria which empower councils to introduce containment rules, and over half have done so. The ACT has also mandated cat containment territory-wide.

'It's time to bring NSW in line with every other state. The idea that NSW is not ready flies in the face of evidence and experience in other states. This is a simple change to empower communities to protect wildlife and protect cats. 'It's great to see Liberals, Nationals and Greens backing this overdue reform. If Premier Minns steps up and makes this change, he will be surprised by the overwhelming community and political support he receives.

'It's time for Premier Minns to act to make sure cat containment is supported, for the sake of our backyard birds, lizards and small mammals and the health of our pet cats."


A very successful Souper Douper Soup, Slice and Sandwich lunch was held at the Moruya Red Door Hall, near St John's Anglican Church, last Thursday.



# Water in the tank, money in the bank

Residents on Eurobodalla's town-water supply can save water – and money – with a new rainwater tank rebate program. The rebates range from \$200 to \$600 depending on the tank's size and cost. To be eligible, tanks must be purchased after 1 July 2025, hold at least 2,000 litres – either as one tank or two 1,000 litre tanks – and be connected to garden irrigation. Additional rebates are available if the tanks also supply toilets and washing machines.

Eurobodalla Mayor Mathew Hatcher says the rebate is a practical way to reduce water consumption and ease demand on town supply.

"Using water wisely at home is a win for you and for the environment," the Mayor says.

"The trial runs for three months and it's easy to apply using Rebately. Just be aware, you can't use the rebate for BASIX or Development Application compliance." #### New bridge to keep Potato Point Road open

Potato Point residents will have one less rainy-day worry with an upgrade to improve access to the coastal village.

During heavy rain Potato Point can be cut off due to flooding at Borang Creek, about one kilometre east of the Princes Highway. Eurobodalla Council is building a bridge to replace the existing culvert at the trouble spot.

The two-lane bridge will be two metres above the current road level, allowing water to flow freely and reducing the risk of flooding and damage to the environment. The bridge will be build next to the road and, once complete, the road realigned to connect to it. Portable traffic lights will guide traffic flow during the work.

The project is supported by a \$997,500 grant from the Australian Government's Disaster Ready Fund, with additional funding from Council. For more information visit the <u>Borang</u> Creek bridge webpage.

#### NSW leads the way towards national solar panel reuse and recycling scheme **NSW Government**

Commonwealth, state and territory governments have agreed to progress work towards a national product stewardship scheme

for solar panels, ensuring they are managed from start to end of

At Friday's meeting of the Energy and Climate Change Ministerial Council in Sydney, NSW presented a paper advocating a national mandated scheme to prevent solar panels ending up in landfill, instead directing them towards remanufacture or recycling. NSW is already developing a mandated stewardship program for batteries.

Annual solar panel waste volumes in Australia are predicted to nearly double over the next five years, from 59,340 tonnes in 2025 to 91,165 tonnes in 2030. The surge in waste is expected to be greatest in metropolitan cities from domestic use, with volumes beginning to grow in regional areas from large-scale solar facilities after 2030.

Energy Ministers recognised increasing calls for improved endof-life management of solar panels, including those at largescale facilities. Many solar panels are disposed of well before the end of their useful life and typically end up in landfill, stockpiled, or exported.

More than 95% of a solar panel is recyclable and contains valuable materials, including aluminium, glass, copper, silver and silicon, which can be beneficially recovered and reused.

The Smart Energy Council estimates that around one-third of solar panels could be re-used instead of being thrown away. This could contribute up to 24 gigawatts of energy by 2040, enough to power six million homes a year.

Energy Ministers agreed that NSW will lead preliminary work, together with other jurisdictions, in drawing up a Regulatory Impact Statement.

The draft will help the Government evaluate options for a national mandatory product stewardship scheme that could catalyse a national recycling and reuse sector for solar panels and their batteries.

The Commonwealth is also supporting low-cost recycling technologies for solar PV through the Australian Renewable Energy Agency, to help support the feasibility and costeffectiveness of industry approaches to solar product stewardship.

Minister for Energy and the Environment, Penny Sharpe said:

"We are proud to be leading the charge to create a unified approach to solar panel waste management and recycling. "This work builds on the momentum of our nation-leading reform on batteries, and the new legislation already in place in NSW to enable a mandatory product stewardship scheme - ensuring suppliers take responsibility for the safe design, recycling and disposal of their products." Smart Energy Council CEO, John Grimes said:

"It's been a decade since the federal government acknowledged solar panels going into landfill was a problem. Now, four million panels are coming off roofs a year with less than 5% being recycled.

"The time for talk has passed, an immediate first step is a national solar stewardship pilot to keep the industry alive and inform the Regulatory Impact Statement.

"The Smart Energy Council welcomes the restated focus from governments on the critical need for stewardship of solar PV, and particularly acknowledges the efforts of the NSW government for leading on this.'

Australian Manufacturing Workers' Union NSW/ACT State Secretary Brad Pidgeon said:

"A national solar panel stewardship scheme is a major opportunity for Australian jobs.

"Remanufacturing and recycling panels here means more onshore work in the renewable energy supply chain instead of shipping valuable materials offshore or losing them as waste."

#### 'Watch out for Scams' with Horizon Bank Amanda Welsh, Fraud Manager

Scammers are heartless and can strike during desperate times of need.

#### How the scam works

Scammers take advantage of people seeking to donate to a good cause or find an answer to a health problem.

Charity scams involve scammers collecting money by pretending to work for a legitimate cause or charity, or a fictitious one they have created. Often scammers will exploit a recent natural disaster or crisis that has been in the news.

These scams divert much-needed donations away from legitimate charities. Charities must be registered with government – donate confidently by checking their registration first.

Miracle cure scams offer a range of products and services that can appear to be legitimate alternative medicines, usually promising quick and effective remedies for serious medical conditions. The treatments are often promoted using false testimonies from people who have been 'cured'

Weight loss scams promise dramatic weight loss with little or no effort. This type of scam may involve an unusual or restrictive diet, revolutionary exercise, a 'fatbusting' device, breakthrough pills, patches or creams. You may be required to make a large advance payment or enter into a long-term contract to receive ongoing supplies.

Fake online pharmacies offer counterfeit drugs and medicine at very cheap prices, and sometimes provide them without a doctor's prescription. These drugs may have limited or no active ingredients, which can have lethal consequences for users.



#### Protect yourself

- If you are approached by a charity street collector, ask to see their identification. If you have any doubts about who they are, do not pay.
- Check the Australian Charities Not for Profit Association's list of registered charities.
- Consult your healthcare professional if you are considering a 'miracle' or 'instant-fix' claim about medicines, supplements or other treatments.
- Ask yourself: if this really is a miracle cure, wouldn't your healthcare professional have told you about it.

# Let's do coffee with ... Jaylah Hancock-Cameron

Behind the unassuming and modest demeanour of a bar attendant serving locals at the Catalina Club at Batemans Bay, a world class distance runner can be found who pounds the beaches and backroads of Broulee on any given day. After considerable persuasion, the Moruya Mail (MM) was finally able to convince Jaylah Hancock-Cameron (JHC) to share a coffee.

MM: Born in Batemans Bay and now 23 years of age, you a true local, thanks for joining me. What is the Jaylah back story?

JHC: Thank you. It's good to chat. Yes ... I live in Broulee. I love the area and coastal living. I went to primary school at Broulee Public School and onto Moruya High School, completing the Higher School Certificate (HSC) in 2019.

I got into cross-country running through school and have been enjoying it since I was 8 years old.

I was also keen on netball and represented the Eurobodalla Shire.

I got into competitive running when I was 14 years of age. We heard about a coach in the area and I thought it would not hurt to give it a try. The coach is Anda'e Kalemusic from Limitless Track Team. Anda'e has considerable experience coaching athletes at the national level. She convinced me of my potential, so it was goodbye netball and hello competitive running and Anda'e has coached me ever since.

MM: And run Jaylah run! You have won many state and national medals in the 800 and 1500 metres as well as cross country events and have represented Australia on several occasions. At the Youth Olympics in Buenos Aires, Argentina, you ran in the 1500 metres event and also picked up a Silver Medal in the Cross Country. Also there was selection to represent Australia in the World Under 20 years of age competition in Kenya in 2021 but Covid 19 prevented travel.

In 2022 and 2023 selectionin the Australian Under 23 Years Touring Team and travelled to Europe to compete.

All very impressive, Jaylah, particularly given there is no dedicated athletic training field in the district. What is the training routine and the diet limitations?

JHC: (laughs)... we make do... I train with a group twice a week at the football fields at Hanging Rock, complete stair/hill sessions on Saturdays if I am not competing. On the other days, I do a variety of different intensity runs at home... easy/steady/fartlek\*runs. Friday is a rest day.

I wouldn't necessarily say I have any dietary restrictions, more so eating certain foods in moderation, taking into consideration what I am eating and that I am fuelling myself correctly leading into each training session/run to get the most benefit.

MM: Without doubt, there must be a team behind Jaylah?

JHC: Yes of course. My Mum, Leanne Hancock and my Nan have played a huge role in my success. My family has been incredibly supportive. As you can imagine competing at the elite level from Broulee has been very challenging with travel and accommodation costs. I have lost count of the kilometres family have freighted me from event to event before I could get my license.

My coach, Anda'e and the Limitless Track Team, keep me motivated and focused on the short and medium term goals. Even though we compete as individuals it's great to have a team that offers support and of course, to celebrate our successes.

Catalina Country Club have not only been flexible with my employment but have donated to the costs to keep running. I am most grateful.

Sports Physio Ulladulla, Better Bodies Fitness Centre in Moruya and Musashi Protein Products have also been very supportive sponsors. And of course, my community continues to offer lots of encouragement.

MM: What is best and what is worst about being a world class athlete?

JHC: The best part is being able to compete in a sport that I love, it also opens pathways for new experiences, being able to travel the world and meeting lots of people. The challenges of being an athlete generally come through injury, I have been pretty lucky over the years. I have only had minor injuries that have put me out for only a few weeks.



MM: Now...rankings are based on a points system and not necessarily on times. The more a competitor races the distance, the more points accumulated. Where are you currently ranked nationally and what is next for Jaylah?

JHC: That's correct...nationally, I am ranked 12th in the 800 metres but I did not run in many events this season. I am ranked 6th in the 1500 metres and am unsure about my cross country ranking.

I am aiming for selection to represent Australia for the 2026 Commonwealth Games to be held in Glasgow, Scotland in 2026 and the ultimate dream is to go to the Summer Olympics in Los Angeles in 2028.

MM: I know one of your role models is 28 year old Jessica Hull who lives up the road at Albion Park. Of course, Jess Hull holds the World Record for the 2000 metres and won a Silver Medal in the 1500 metres at the Paris Olympics in 2024. Some key quotes from her include: "I don't really want to make up the numbers anymore", reflecting a shift in her goals towards aiming for medals, and "Why not me?". So... Jaylah Hancock-Cameron when we see you run our streets many of us will ponder "Why not Jaylah?" It's been great chatting to you.

\*Fartlek training, meaning "speed play" in Swedish, is a form of interval training that involves alternating between faster and slower running paces over a continuous period, without specific rest intervals. It's a flexible and less structured approach to improving speed and endurance, allowing runners to adjust their pace based on feel and terrain.

# Gadfly

They slipped the story into the ABC's internet newsfeed at 6 o'clock on a Wednesday morning and there it died. Nothing on any of the TV news programs that evening and by the following morning it was gone. Yet it was unquestionably the most consequential story of the day, the week and perhaps the entirety of 2025.

The opening paragraph set the scene. It could hardly have been more engaging: 'In April this year, China installed more solar power than Australia has in all its history. In one month.'

It then provides a context: 'This isn't a story about Australia's poor track record on solar; Australia is a global leader. Rather this shows the astonishing rate at which China is embracing renewable technologies across every aspect of its society.'

There is, however, a more mind-bending context further down in the story when it notes what we all know from the tale of woe pouring out of Donald Trump's Washington: America is heading in exactly the opposite direction.

I am not criticising that placement. I have no criticism of the story at all. Indeed, I think it's a small masterpiece of the reporter/analysist genre. My concern is with the ABC's perception of its worth to an Australian readership trapped in a trade versus defence dilemma between the two great Pacific nations.

The identity of the author might be a factor. It was written by Jo Lauder, a bright young woman (by her photograph) who works as a reporter and broadcaster for triplej's national current affairs program *Hack* and is host of the podcast, *Who's gonna save us* 'which explores climate solutions and the people fighting for climate action.'

The ABC, it seems, is wary of anyone writing positive things about China - especially 'young people' - even when they appear to be on the side of sustaining the human race on planet Earth. Jo is obviously aware of this. Before telling the astonishing story of a possible rescue from the jaws of hellishly hot weather, she says, 'Don't make the mistake of thinking this [Chinese] transformation is driven by a moral obligation to act on climate change. But by doing so 'it is accelerating the end of the fossil fuel era and bringing about the age of the electrostate.'

In the four-page story, she then provides a potted history of China's economic pathway from the 1990s until the 10-year 'Made in China' plan made renewable energy essential to bring their heating emissions down.

She quotes Chinese women scientists revealing the country's energy transformation as 'staggering'. Caroline Wang, the China engagement lead at the think tank Climate Energy Finance says 'clean manufacturers have made themselves indispensable in the new kind of global economy.'


China is [now] home to half of the world's solar, half of the world's wind power and half of the world's electric cars. 'If you go to Beijing today,' Jo Lauder quotes a western scientist, 'you can honestly stand at intersections with four lanes going every way and it'll be quiet as a mouse. The noisiest thing coming past will be a creaky bicycle.'

Moreover, by bringing renewable costs down, China has helped the rest of the world lower the bar to embark on their transition. Caroline Wang told her, 'I think a gap in Australia and other Western countries is knowledge and understanding. China is a complex country...it's got good and bad. For the energy transition space, which is full of complexity, there's a real need, for our [joint] strategic national interests, for Australia to understand what's happening in China.'

# 100 years ago from the Moruya Examiner

#### 22-08-1925

FIRE AT GUNDARY. On Saturday morning last a fire broke out in a cottage situated in Thomas Street, Gundary, [Moruya] owned by Mrs. Chas. Colefax, and leased by Mr. Hilton Little as a dwelling. The fire, which originated in one of the back rooms made its presence known at about 5.30 o'clock and might have had far reaching consequences had not Mr. Dick Smith (brother-in-law to Mrs. Little) been astir about that hour. Noticing smoke issuing from the rear portion of the building he immediately forced an entrance (for the inmates were asleep) and gave the alarm. But for this prompt action the women and children must have perished. It was with difficulty that they were removed to a place of safety. Mrs. Little, although dazed, carried her mother from the burning building. Mr. Little was in the country at the time and not expected home until Saturday evening. The furniture and personal effects were uninsured, and the loss a serious one to Mr. Little. Mrs. Colefax is also a loser, for the building was only insured for about £100.

**Mr. Jack Coppin, of Gundary**, has contracted to move about 4 acres of sand from the property of Mr. J. Behringer, of Yarragee – some undertaking.

An electrician at Dorman Long's Quarry had an exciting experience one day last week. While in the performance of his duties it was found necessary to do a little navigating and unfortunately for the gentleman in question he was caught by a tow-rope and lifted unceremoniously into the briny. His knowledge of "currents" however enabled him to reach the boat in safety.

Horses – without visible means of support – are becoming a menace to pedestrians at night. Our representative, on returning from a meeting in the Shire Hall last Tuesday, damaged his nervous system by coming in contact with such an animal, which had apparently taken to stabling itself for the night across the footpath.

A public meeting was held on Tuesday night to discuss ways and means of assisting Mr. Little and his family in their loss. There was a good attendance and Mr. Flood was voted to Chair. After Mr. Flood had gone into details regarding the fire and urged the necessity for prompt action, it was decided to canvas the town for subscriptions, and the following were appointed as collectors. – Town, Misses Donna Tessier and Muriel Parbery and Mr. Feneley; Gundary, Mr. Jack Coppin; Quarry, Mr. W. Thomas; Mullenderree, Mrs. James Turnbull; Mantle Hill and Dwyer's Creek, Mr. C. Chesher; Bergalia, Mr. F. Hutchings; Turlinjah, Mr. J. Berriman. Mr. G. Mitchell was appointed Treasurer.

## ACCC to investigate energy plans that potentially mislead consumers

The **ACCC** will investigate whether energy retailers are misleading consumers by promoting energy plans that promise savings or value to consumers when they actually offer poor value for the customer, following CHOICE making a designated complaint to the ACCC.

This is the first designated complaint received by the ACCC from CHOICE and the second complaint received under the new designated complaints framework.

The ACCC is satisfied that the designated complaint made by CHOICE relates to a significant or systemic market issue that affects consumers.

"Energy plans that promote 'savings' or value may entice many consumers to a particular plan and influence their decision making," ACCC Deputy Chair Catriona Lowe said.

"We are concerned that consumers may be misled or deceived by plan names or descriptions of plans that offer 'savings' that are not genuine, or that consumers may be discouraged from switching to cheaper plans that are available to them."

"It is essential that energy retailers provide clear and accurate information about their energy plans so that consumers can make informed decisions when choosing an energy provider and plan," Ms Lowe said.

If the ACCC identifies conduct that may contravene the Australian Consumer Law following its investigation of the issues raised by this complaint, it may take enforcement action where appropriate. The ACCC may also prepare industry guidance or contribute to policy or law reform initiatives. CHOICE's designated complaint to the ACCC also raises issues in relation to consumer confusion from retailers' use of identical names for plans with different rates and energy retailers prompting consumers to change plans when the recommended plan is not available to them.

These additional issues arise particularly in the context of 'Better Offer' and 'Best Offer' messages included on consumers' energy bills. Energy retailers are required to regularly include a message on bills to residential customers to alert them if they can save money by switching to a different plan with the retailer. These messages are referred to as Better or Best Offer messages.

"The issues raised by CHOICE exacerbate the challenges and confusion that consumers may face when navigating the often complex energy market," Ms Lowe said.

A recent decision by the <u>Australian Energy Regulator (AER)</u> requires retailers that elect to re-use plan names, to provide additional information below certain "Better Offer" messages. This aims to address any customer confusion from some retailers creating newer (and differently priced) versions of existing plans using identical plan names.

The ACCC will continue to engage with the AER and Victorian Essential Services Commission (ESC) on their upcoming review and law reform processes including on their consideration of the issues raised in CHOICE's complaint.

After careful consideration, the ACCC considers that the issues raised by CHOICE relating to the use of identical plan names in Better or Best Offer messaging with different rates, and Better or Best Offer messages with plans that consumers may not be eligible for, are most effectively addressed through the review and law reform processes currently underway by the AER and the ESC.

"The upcoming reviews by the Australian Energy Regulatory and Victorian Essential Services will provide the opportunity to consider some of the issues raised by CHOICE while reflecting on the broader issues facing consumers in the energy market." "We thank CHOICE for the work that has gone into submitting this designated complaint. CHOICE is an important member of the ACCC's Consumer Consultative Committee and we value its insights as a leading consumer advocate group. The designated complaints framework is one of several avenues for highlighting important issues that cause consumer harm," Ms Lowe said.



# First artist announced for Eurobodalla Regional Hospital art project and upcoming community workshops

The Eurobodalla community is invited to take part in a series of free art workshops to contribute and inspire artworks that will feature in the new \$330 million Eurobodalla Regional Hospital.

The Program integrates arts into NSW Health capital works to create engaging public health spaces and improve health outcomes for patients, staff and visitors. Health Infrastructure delivers the program in partnership with Local Health Districts, artists and communities.

Artists are commissioned through a selection process with advice from local stakeholders and guidance from the Eurobodalla Regional Hospital Arts Working Group.

The Health and the Arts Framework 2024-2032 highlights the role of the arts in providing patients, staff and communities with positive experiences within healthcare settings. The arts play a significant role in complementing the experience of care. The Framework recognises this impact across the NSW Health system, integrating the arts to support key health challenges such as workforce strategies, Aboriginal health, aged care and mental health. The new Eurobodalla Regional Hospital is expected to be completed in 2027. Dr Erica Seccombe said "These workshops are a unique opportunity for community to shape the look of their new hospital and give it a unique and distinctive identity that will leave a positive and lasting legacy. "We'll be using local plants as inspiration and inviting staff and community



members to reflect on their connection to place through drawing."







#### Tackle World Moruya Fishing report

15 8 25

#### Moruya River.

With the very large delivery of our new range of Nomad Live Ops plastics last Friday, last weeks fishing reports got missed. Sorry about that.

But with the store looking full and fresh, I am back on top of things, at least that's what I'm telling myself!

We had a little bit of rain last week, which didn't help the rivers clarity much, this however has eased up a fair bit this week. Waters temps are typical for this time of year, COLD! As such, the activity in the river is pretty slow.

Most of the action has been found towards the front of the system, where the ocean currents are starting to show signs of turning over, and as such are putting water that is marginally warmer back into the system.

Expect to find a few visitors in the lower reaches of river, with salmon and tailor both being seen and encountered around the spur wall and the Preddy's wharf areas of late. Small metals will work well on light tackle, for those that want a bit of fun. There will be a few bream and flathead to be found in the deeper

pools at the moment, you will need to get your baits or lures down deep however to try and entice a bite.

#### Tuross River.

Coila lake should be holding a few winter black bream at moment, try around the weed bed edges and towards the front of the system. Coila must be getting close to the trigger point, where the council open it back up, as it is VERY full right now.

The Tuross system itself, will be fishing much the same as Moruya at the moment, with one small exception. Tuross does have several back lakes, Borang and Bumbo, that both have a muddy substrate bottom. This base layer will tend to start to hold more heat, as the days get longer, and the shallow nature of these lakes allows for these darker areas to warm up before the rest of the system. Anglers in the know, will start to target some good sized flathead this time of year over these areas. Slowly worked soft plastics or shallow running hard body lures are the weapon of choice in these

#### Rock and beach.

The big swells of last week did make fishing the beaches and headlands a bit on the trickle side, but the sea state has eased this week and will make for more favourable conditions this weekend. Salmon and tailor on the beaches have been the saving grace this time of year, while the rock ledges are still holding good numbers of drummer as well.

#### Offshore.

I did hear a few reports from keen boaters this week, that they did get out last week, for an inshore session on reds and flathead. Fingers crossed that the weather gods will allow a few more anglers to get out this weekend and catch a feed of winter snapper and flathead.

The bait freezer is between Tweed visits this week, and as such we are out, or running low on a few offerings. The bait truck is due next week, and I will be restocking with everything they have on board.

The shop is looking really good at the moment, with new additions to the soft plastics wall, and a few new models of rods and reels, either here or waiting to be shipped. You really should stop in and have a chat if there is anything that is of interest. While we don't have the room to stock everything, we are more than happy to get it in for you, if we have access to it. We still have 20% off all dive gear this week, so if your idea of a good time is under the water, come in and checkout what we have to offer.

We are also clearing out our range of Kings Titan draws at cost price! So get in quick as stock is very limited!

Stay safe everyone and remember, "Every day's a good day for fishing..."
