SAVE OUR COMMUNITY LAND

While reviewing the draft Batemans Bay Master Plan, a number of residents were alarmed that it included the possible construction of high-rise commercial and residential buildings on the site of the old Batemans Bay Bowling Club on what has been, since 1918, community recreational land. A Eurobodalla Welcome Park Group has been formed to lobby Council to reconsider this proposal. "The history of this site should guide its future use, and that should be its retention by the community as an open space," said Neil Gow, Convenor of the Eurobodalla Welcome Park Group.

"It is surrounded by other key recreational areas, including the Mackay Park football facility and the Pavilion Aquatic and Arts Centre. Let's keep the precinct for the enjoyment of the community".

The Welcome Park Group believes that the site of the old Bowling Club, which runs along Princes Highway/Vesper Street, would serve the community's best interest if it became a beautiful community park, a true gateway feature to welcome visitors to our Nature Coast and provide recreational activities for us all.

The site is bounded by the wetlands of McLeod's Creek in the Clyde River Estuary. The mangroves, salt marshes and swamp oak floodplain forest are of high conservation value and classed under NSW legislation as threatened and protected ecological communities.

As community land, the site would blend into and help protect these wetlands, and allow Smoke Point and the Pavilion to be linked by a walking track with interpretive signage to explain both Aboriginal and European heritage. "Council should not sell this land, a community asset, to a private developer," said Mr Gow. "This can be assured by Council voting to change its function from operational to community use. Its retention as community land would overcome the central issue of the conflict of roles involved in commercial negotiations to date, which have dogged the Council since the purchase of the site in 2016, its declaration as operational land, and more recently the discussions with potential buyers and developers. If Council agrees to reclassify the land as community use, we will be asking them to undertake a community consultative process to develop a Plan of Management for this site".

8th Bushfire and Heatwave Haven completed at Southern Life Church



Monday was a very significant day for SHASA (South coast Health and Sustainability Alliance), with the opening of the 8th Bushfire and Heatwave Haven in the Eurobodalla at Southern Life Church. This is 4th Haven in Moruya.

SHASA a not for profit charity undertaking practical projects to achieve a more resilience community and help with the transition to renewable energy in the Eurobodalla. So far SHASA have secured 64 grants with a value of over \$7.5m.

President Kathryn Maxwell said "SHASA has partnered with Southern Life Church to make the haven a reality. Not only do we have two buildings with independent power systems, satellite communications, but also temperature control and air quality control. This will enable our more vulnerable members of the community to escape the heat and smoke during bushfires. The back up power system will keep the freezers running no matter what the climate throws at us.

"SHASA would like to thank the following local businesses for their excellent work – Micro Energy Systems – thanks Steve Cornthwaite, Blue N Grey Water and Septic Solutions, Tec Exec – thanks Trish Pye and Betta Batemans Bay – thanks Geoff Hatton" said Kathryn.

SHASA, in partnership with the Tilba Halls Committee, is anticipating opening our 9th Haven at the Tilba Halls later this year.

"Our goal, funding permitting, is to establish a network of 12 Bushfire and Heatwave Havens" said Kathryn.

SHASA has also developed maps of the location and services provided at the Havens.

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

8th Bushfire and Heatwave Haven completed at Southern Life Church

Speaking at the launch Member for Bega Dr Michael Holland's said "SHASA received a NSW Government Infrastructure Grant of \$168,667 to undertake works to enable the Food Hall and Church Hall to operate as havens during extreme weather events."

Works included nearly 30kW of solar and a 30kWh battery on the Church Building, 26.4kw of solar panels and 30kWh battery on the Food Hall, Electrical upgrade to the switch board to both building, Installation of Starlink (satellite communications) and training from Tec Exec, 2 steel rainwater tanks, fire pump, hoses and fittings to be able to fight ember attack during bushfires, 4 internal air filters to address wood smoke during bushfires, Back up 30kVa diesel generator for the food hall., Weather proof enclosures for the electrical equipment. Southern Life Church has funded a 22kVA generator for the Church Hall, an additional rainwater tank, and concrete slabs for the rainwater tanks and generators.

These upgrades provide Southern Church with an independent power system if the grid goes down, a communications system if telecommunications goes down and equipment to fight ember attack. The Southern Life Church Haven will be a refuge for vulnerable members of the Food Pantry and Church members and their families during extreme events like bushfires and heatwaves. It will cater for up to 200 people.

ESC Interim GM Mark Fergusen said "Council is very excited to see the opening of the Eurobodalla's 8th Bushfire and Heatwave Haven at the Southern Life Church, Moruya. Moruya now has 4 havens - the Anglican Parish Red Door Hall, CWA Moruya, Moruya Pre School Kindergarten and Southern Life Church. There is also another one at the Moruya Surf Life Saving Club at Moruya Heads."

"The upgrades outlined by Dr Michael Holland will also significantly reduce the electricity bills for Southern Life Church. In particular it will significantly improve the financial sustainability of the Food Pantry which uses lots of electricity to run the freezers and fridges."

Mr Fergusen added "Since 2018 SHASA has secured 62 grants, totaling \$7.5m for practical projects to achieve a more resilient community and install solar PV and/or batteries in community facilities all over the Eurobodalla. This includes Marine Rescue bases, CWAs, Men's Sheds, Rally for Recovery, Batemans Bay Heritage Museum and Pre Schools."

"Recently SHASA secured a Community Building Partnership grant of \$54,974 (GST Inclusive) to install solar and batteries on the Dr McKay Community Centre as well as upgrade the gas commercial kitchen to electric. A big thank you to Dr Michael Holland for securing this grant."

Mr Fergusen said "Council will continue to partner with SHASA to upgrade key community halls across the Eurobodalla."

He commended SHASA for being at the forefront of resilience in the Shire.



Eurobodalla's own emergency preparedness guide hits mailboxes

Created by locals for locals, the Eurobodalla Preparedness Guide is a one-stop guide for individual, family, neighbourhood and community disaster

Arriving in mailboxes across the shire from Monday 10 November, the easy-to-use guide has practical starting tools and information on preparing for, responding to, and recovering from natural disasters and emergencies, with:

- up-to-date local emergency contact information, all in one place
- personal and property preparation planning tools
- step-by-step instructions for preparing, monitoring and responding to emergencies
- local support hubs, communication and connection resources

The guide's creators Sandra Makdessi and Von Hutcheson want every household in the shire to be empowered with the information and tools to keep them safe in times of crisis, make informed decisions, and support each other before, during and after emergencies. That includes better preparing you property ahead of time, making an effective bushfire plan, or simply feeling more confident about what to do when the unexpected happens. Von said, "The Eurobodalla Preparedness Guide is the beginning of a wider movement towards more connection and community strength around disasters and it is so valuable in our region".

Accessible to everyone - digitally connected or not - a hardcopy of the guide will be delivered to every home in the shire and also continually updated and available on SHASA's website.

The Eurobodalla Preparedness Guide was officially launched on Tuesday 14 October at Moruya's Mechanics Institute to a large group including dignitaries, local emergency services, community support groups, media, and enthusiastic supporters and wellwishers.

A key message for the people in the room was: "We encourage you to use the guide, read it, share it, talk to family, friends and neighbours and your community - stick it on your fridge, create your emergency action plans, prepare a survival kit and prepare your property, before the emergency. Together, we'll build a more resilient shire." Sandra said.

Speaking at the launch, emergency management professional Dr Brett Henderson said effective emergency management depends on every household and organisation doing their bit before the crisis occurs. Dr Henderson is a retired police commander, SES volunteer, and has recently completed his doctoral thesis 'Sharing the Responsibility for Emergency Management', which focuses on Eurobodalla.

"The Eurobodalla Preparedness Guide focuses on individual preparedness, an essential component of our ever-changing disaster environment." Dr Henderson said.

The Eurobodalla Preparedness Guide was made possible with support from SHASA, Anglicare, Eurobodalla Council, Moruya Rotary, Supporting Spontaneous Volunteers Program, ECSN and SAGE.

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Lifetime Achievement Award for Peter Freeman OAM

Moruya heritage architect Peter Freeman has received the Award for Lifetime Achievement at the ACT National Trust Heritage Awards 2025...

The Lifetime Achievement Award recognises a demonstrated commitment and achievements over a period of two or more decades in the conservation of built, cultural, natural or First Nations heritage by an individual in the ACT.

Peter Freeman OAM is an architect who has dedicated more than four decades to the conservation, documentation and celebration of Australia's architectural heritage through his practice as an architect, conservation architect, historian and author.

Peter, a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Architects was the inaugural ACT Heritage Advisor and has been a Chair of the ACT Heritage Council. He has authored and edited a number of books devoted to Canberra's architectural heritage including 'The Early Canberra House' (1995) and more recently Thoroughly Modern: Moir + Sutherland Architects (2021). Peter's work in the ACT was prolific in the years between 1988 and 2011.

He was involved with Ainslie School, ACT Government Housing Stock, Ginninderra Schoolhouse, Gudgenby homestead, Kingston Powerhouse Precinct and St Johns to name a few.

Peter has also authored many books on Australia's heritage and vernacular buildings, including The Woolshed, The Homestead, The Wall Papered Manse and more recently The St Clair Villa: 175 years of Goulburn History.

Peter has worked across the country on heritage conservation projects, including the Robin Boyd-design Manning Clark House here in the ACT, the Hobart Town Hall and the Theatre Royal in Hobart, the Toganmain Woolshed restoration and the Presbyterian Manse in Moruya, the NSW south coast town where he and his wife Tanny now live.

The Awards was presented last week at a ceremony on Canberra.

5000 Koala recordings at Morton National Park and surrounds

Abundant koala populations have been recorded between Morton to Bungonia which were ravaged by the Black Summer bushfires, proving the resilience of the bush and native species.

Close to 5,000 koala bellows have been recorded during a survey stretching over 4,000 hectares between Marulan and Kangaroo Valley. The distinctive male koala bellow is a deep, guttural 'snore' and is heard loud and clear from mating male koalas above the cacophony of nighttime

More than 115 tiny box-shaped sound recorders were strapped to trees at sites during the last breeding season, capturing the sounds of the bush every night for two weeks. Koala bellows were detected up to about 200

With the help of Al, 19,000 hours of recordings identified 4,991 bellows across 43 sites in Morton National Park, and on some neighbouring private properties. One site recorded the sounds of male koalas 19 out of 21 nights. As the largest and most comprehensive koala survey undertaken in the area, the data confirms the presence of koalas and will be an invaluable baseline for future research work.

The project received funding from the Australian Government Saving Koalas Fund and was jointly delivered by experts from the NSW Government's Local Land Services and the NSW Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water. The NSW Government has recently expanded Morton National Park, with

the addition of 380 hectares of prime koala habitat.

This new parcel of land offers greater protection to a range of threatened species in the region such as the brush-tailed rock wallaby, glossy black cockatoos and the spotted-tailed quoll.

National Parks will introduce fire management practices, weed and feral animal control, and threatened species conservation. This will further strengthen wildlife populations and improve the landscape's resilience to climate change, fires and drought.

Federal Minister for the Environment, Murray Watt said "The Albanese Government supported this important project with a \$3 million investment - knowing there is a strong koala presence around NSW's Southern Highlands is vital information for ecologists to keep supporting the longterm conservation of koalas and their habitat.

"Our Saving Koalas Fund is delivering more than \$76 million to ensure koala populations across the country not only survive – but thrive." NSW Minister for the Environment, Penny Sharpe said "The survey results are proof the koala population not only survived the fires but are spreading right across the Morton-Bungonia landscape.

"The Minns Labor Government is working hard to rollout conservation work to protect and boost koala populations, which includes expanding Morton National Park to protect more vital koala habitat.

NSW Minister for Agriculture, Tara Moriarty said "This project is a great example of how technology and ecology can come together to support native species conservation.

'The data collected will help inform land management decisions to ensure a safe and sustainable future for koala populations.

NSW Member for Monaro, Minister Steve Whan said "This project highlights the value of ongoing research and mapping of NSW's threatened koala population.

"A strong and protected koala population on our doorstep in Monaro is a great addition to our already rich biodiversity."

NSW Member for the South Coast, Liza Butler said "These were some of

the hardest-hit areas during the Black Summer. The return and persistence of koalas here is a powerful sign of resilience, both in the landscape and the species.

"Expanding Morton National Park means more safe ground for koalas and a host of other threatened species. It's a win for biodiversity and a vital step in securing this region's ecological future."

NSW Member Elect for Kiama, Katelin McInerney said "Adding 380 hectares of prime koala habitat to Morton National Park helps us protect not only koalas, but other endangered species such as the southernmost colony of brush-tailed rock-wallabies."

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Eurobodalla Koala Conservation takes to new heights

The Eurobodalla Koala Project volunteers have taken their conservation work to new heights with drone training held in the Eurobodalla last week. The drone training held by experienced drone pilot Peter Quick, is helping volunteers develop new skills in wildlife monitoring and habitat mapping. The team's state of the art \$10,000 drone, purchased through Fire to Flourish funding is already proving to be a valuable tool in the field and observing other native wildlife from above. The technology also allows the group to monitor vegetation changes and identify areas where habitat corridor restoration may be helpful.

This hands on training is part of an ongoing program to build local capacity in conservation technology and strengthen community involvement in protecting the region's koalas. Future sessions will continue to train new volunteers, including members of the local aboriginal community, who bring deep knowledge of the land and its wildlife.

With a blend of traditional care for country and modern technology, Eurobodalla's volunteer team is creating a powerful new way to understand and protect the landscapes our koalas call home.

You can also help us spot koalas!

Spokesperson, Candace Wirth stated, 'We are inviting land owners to take part and use our motion activated trail cameras that we can place on your property for a two week period to see what wildlife (including koalas) may be around. West of Bodalla is the spot we are looking at currently. We will handle the setup and collection - all you need to do is provide access to a spot on your property. We want to work with our community to discover more about our local wildlife'.

Presentations to Public Access Forum at Council 14th October 2025

Eurobodalla Coastal Vulnerability and Climate Change, with Particular Reference to Batemans Bay - ABE

Good Morning Councillors. This morning I want to address Council regarding coastal vulnerability and climate change in the Eurobodalla, with particular reference to the Batemans Bay Master Plan (BBMP). I am presenting as Co-Convenor of A Better Eurobodalla (ABE), a community forum dedicated to having effective and open governance in our region. This topic is also relevant to my own tertiary qualifications, consisting of B.Sc. First Class Honours in physical geography and a Ph.D. in coastal processes. I have a long term interest in the Eurobodalla coast, having camped for 11 days at the back of Bengello Beach 50 years ago to collect beach profile data for my honours project.

September 2025 was a significant period for Australian climate change policy and governance, with the release of Australia's National Climate Risk Assessment (NCRA), a landmark report that comprehensively details how climate change will affect Australia's health, infrastructure, economy, and environment. It identifies 63 national climate risks, with a focus on 11 priority areas, and warns of increasing hazards including extreme storms, heatwaves, and sea-level rise, which lead to significant economic costs and impacts on communities and ecosystems. Key findings and risks are:

- Economic and financial impacts: The NCRA projects a substantial increase in the cost of disasters, potentially reaching over \$40 billion annually by 2050. Property values are also at risk, with one study estimating a half-trillion dollar hit by 2090.
- Health and social impacts:
 The report warns of a significant rise in heat-related deaths, particularly in densely populated areas.
- Infrastructure and coastal impacts: Millions of Australians are at risk from coastal erosion and sea-level rise, with projections showing a 400% increase in coastal flooding days in some areas by 2090.
- Natural environment and food systems: Risks to the natural environment and food systems are expected to increase from high to very high by 2050.
- Cascading and compounding risks: The report emphasizes that climate change impacts will be interconnected, compounding each other and occurring simultaneously across different systems.
- New government report warns that Australia could face severe ...

The Mandarin - In the context of Eurobodalla policy and governance, the NCRA identifies 10 priority hazards, including 4 directly applicable to Batemans Bay. These four are:

- 1) Coastal erosion and shoreline change,
- 2) Coastal and estuarine flooding
- 3) Riverine and flash flooding, and
- 4) Bushfires.

In the case of Batemans Bay, it is notable that 3 of these priority hazards can interact and trigger the cascading and compounding effects highlighted in the NCRA. Batemans Bay is a low lying swampy area on an exposed coastal site located at the mouth of the Clyde River, a major riverine system with a documented flood history. It is exposed to hazards of both coastal inundation from oceanic storm surge and sea level rise, as well as riverine flooding, together with coastal erosion and shoreline change. These impacts can occur simultaneously, increasing the magnitude of the resultant inundation at Batemans Bay.

The NCRA identifies major urban centres and cities across coastal areas as primary hotspots for risks from sea level rise. The following quote from the NCRA is particularly relevant to the draft Batemans Bay Master Plan: "Exposure is increased in coastal areas that have high population density, residential buildings in close proximity to soft shorelines, and erosion due to higher sea levels and shoreline characteristics." This quote mirrors what is proposed in the Batemans Bay Master Plan, with multiple high-rise residential buildings up to 100m high containing an additional 8,000 dwellings being constructed on a low lying coastal area already experiencing coastal erosion and retreat.

Looking to the future, peer-reviewed research by the IPCC (Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change). Bureau of Meteorology and CSIRO all indicate that sea level rise will accelerate during the projected time horizon of the BBMP through to 2100, and that storm flooding events will intensify in magnitude and duration (as evidenced by recent floods in Taree, Lismore and Port Macquarie). The NCRA also indicates that present-day extremes and flood events will become increasingly frequent, and eventually chronic, under the sea-level rise increments considered for the 21st century. For example, an additional 0.14 m sea-level rise will result in an eight-fold increase in frequency of sea-level extremes on average.

Under 0.32 m sea-level rise, this becomes an average 118-fold increase, and a more-than-200-fold increase under 0.54 m sea level rise. This means a typical 1-in-100-year event becomes an annual occurrence at most locations with only 0.32 m additional sea-level rise. This result has huge implications for the current Eurobodalla Coastal Hazard Code, which utilises a 1 in 100 year event as a key yardstick for many of its assessments – the term is mentioned 34 times in this 14 page document. The NCRA indicates that our current tools significantly underestimate the likelihood of future flooding impacts, engendering a false sense of security.

The current serious coastal erosion problems already occurring at Caseys Beach (just a few kms from the BBMP site) and Surfside underscore the intractable and financially expensive nature of the "wicked problem" created when urban development is located on an unsuitable and vulnerable site. If it were implemented, the long term costs of the draft BBMP would make the cost of coastal protection works at Surfside look minuscule. These costs would be borne by Eurobodalla ratepayers and NSW taxpayers.

Vulnerability impacts are not limited to direct physical impacts. For example, the NCRA notes that many insurance policies exclude coverage for 'actions of the sea', creating financial challenges for affected residents and businesses, particularly those with high-value properties. Home insurance often inadequately addresses these risks, and while some insurers are starting to incorporate climate risk assessments when providing insurance, coverage remains limited and can vary widely, as well as being unaffordable for many people, particularly in LGAs of below average income such as Eurobodalla Shire.

highlighted by the NCRA, ABE considers that the deficiencies in the draft BBMP are of a scale and nature that cannot be resolved at subsequent individual project management or Development Application stages of planning. The shortcomings need to be addressed now in an integrated manner via best practice strategic planning, including incorporation of community engagement from the outset. They cannot be "kicked down the road" for later consideration. ABE therefore urges Council to suspend work on the BBMP until the full implications of the NCRA have been examined and assessed. It would be useful for Council to arrange for Australian Climate Services staff to provide an NCRA briefing for Councillors and interested ratepayers. This could be done via video conferencing to encourage wider participation. Such a briefing would assist Councillors, Council staff, ratepayers and taxpayers to be fully informed of the risks, hazards and cost implications for the proposed urban redevelopment in Batemans Bay. Housing and town planning in the Eurobodalla: why we need to work with the whole community Presentation by Cid Mateo to ESC Public Access, 14 October 2025

Walawaani njindiwan. Budyari mullinawul. I hope you all had a good journey today. Good morning.

Thank you for the opportunity to speak. I recognise the First Peoples of this nation and their ongoing connection to culture and country. I acknowledge First Nations Peoples as the Traditional Owners, Custodians and Lore Keepers of the world's oldest living culture and pay respects to their Elders past, present and emerging. My name is Cid Mateo. I'm here to speak to you as a new member of our community. I would like to speak about two community priorities on Council's agenda at present; housing and town planning for all of our Eurobodalla community.Like most of us, I am an immigrant to this region. My connection to the Eurobodalla is a mere 50 years, a speck of time when compared to the 45-60,000 years our Aboriginal ancestors have been here. I like to get involved and support the local community. What a strong community we have. The depth and breadth of volunteering and unpaid work in the Eurobodalla Shire, at around one in six members of our community, is impressive. This motivates and inspires me. This is an enormous community resource, especially, when we consider that one in three households in the Eurobodalla survive on \$800 a week or less, or in other words, one-third of households in the Eurobodalla survive on less than the equivalent of one full-time worker on the minimum wage. Turning to two vital policy issues in the Eurobodalla at present: the Housing Strategy and the Batemans Bay Master Plan. I have studied the history of these projects, and this is what I've found. First, the Council has presented the Eurobodalla community with two draft policy documents, the draft Housing Strategy in 2024 and the draft Batemans Bay Master Plan in 2025. The draft Housing Strategy appears to have been drafted to support the existing draft Batemans Bay Master Plan. This has 'put the planning cart before the housing horse'. It should be the other way around. The draft Housing Strategy should be the plan to implement Shire-wide housing based on community need. At present, it fails to do this. Second, the Council has largely ignored the previous housing policy work by the Eurobodalla community. The 2015 community consultations on housing gathered valuable community feedback on housing needs and preferences to inform the development of a Housing Strategy and to improve the twin local issues of housing unaffordability and lack of diversity in housing options. This consultation was part of ongoing efforts to make sure that the housing supply met the demands of the existing and future residents and visitors to the Shire.

Third, the Council appears to have ignored its own commissioned housing policy research and advice in the development of the draft Housing Strategy and the draft Batemans Bay Master Plan. The Local Housing Strategy Background Report, 20 November 2023, by Judith Stubbs and Associates, sets out comprehensive research and analysis to inform the development of the Eurobodalla Housing Strategy, and outlines the policy context, and the strategies and mechanisms that will be most effective in meeting housing needs in the Eurobodalla.

The way forward

Council, I commend you for your efforts to realign our Housing Strategy and the Batemans Bay Master Plan with the Stubbs Report and the 2015 community consultation. The community has been waiting 10 years for this.

I commend you for the Probity Review into these processes and outcomes. This is a critical step to get our Housing Strategy and town planning back on track. To bring the community along, I recommend you make the Terms of Reference of the Review public, including when the community can expect the Review's report.

The Probity Review must be completed first to inform a revised Housing Strategy. Once the Housing Strategy is finalised, this should in turn inform the Batemans Bay Master Plan and other town plans. This follows best practice planning guidance provided by the NSW Government, and has been followed by our neighbouring councils.

Unfortunately, the Council has not demonstrated the capacity to develop the Eurobodalla Housing Strategy and Batemans Bay Master Plan concurrently and up to standard, and in trying to do so, these plans have deviated from their intended purpose, which is to diversify housing and meet the housing needs of our community. This is where we are today.

In moving forward, one option the Council could consider is to form a Housing and Planning Steering Committee to guide the next steps, and to finalise and implement the housing strategy and town plans. The Steering Committee would comprise representatives from all housing and planning stakeholders in the community. They would provide expertise, guidance and advice to the Council. The Steering Committee would ensure that all stakeholder perspectives and interests are considered, debated, valued and resolved transparently. The Steering Committee would be tasked with keeping the work on track and on time. The Steering Committee would not favour any stakeholder over another to benefit the whole community, not only a few. Councillors, our most precious assets, our environment and our people, are in your hands. You have an onerous workload and few resources to work with, to represent, protect and empower our community. On the other side, the Eurobodalla community is fortunate to have a wealth of expertise, public interest and goodwill.Sadly, it continues to be disadvantaged by poor process, policy, visibility and outcomes. The community deserves better than this. Indeed Councillors, you are better than this. Council, lets get this work back on track.

Presentations to Public Access Forum at Council 14th October 2025

Congo Road - Presentation by Geoff Sharpe to ESC Public Access, 14 October 2025

Good morning Mayor and Councillors. I would like to thank you for allowing me to address you today. My name is Geoff Sharpe and I live on the north side of Congo Creek, my property borders the Creek adjacent to the Congo Quarry. My wife and I purchased the property in 1980 and we have since lived and raised a family there.

We have been an integral part of the Congo Community for nearly 45 years. In those years I have driven and cycled through the quarry to access Congo to visit my family,

friends and of course the beach. You can appreciate my

surprise when I read through the Judgement of the ill fated Supreme Court Case one of the agreed facts was that the public used the road "from time to time". Since 1980, the only time the road was not used was when the few occasions when the causeway crossing Congo Creek was flooded.

In the early 1980s, the Quarry was initially small scale affair with one loader and one or two trucks now it is extracting on an industrial scale. Since the road closure, I have seen the original 1979 development application for the Quarry. In this application a hatched area was clearly drawn south of the original "track in use" where extraction was proposed. The subsequent Development Approval has several condition attached, three of which were;

- Only mining their own land This condition means the paper road (which is excluded from the title) is excluded from the DA.
- Permission is required for arty tree removal.

There appears to be no application in the council records for tree removal or subsequent permission given.

• After the completion of mining the land needs to be restored to the satisfaction of the Council.

It seems that the Council has the legal right to have the land holder restore the paper road that runs through the property. In 1983 the State Government formalised the many quarries and mines throughout state. In the application, the Landowner stated that:

that the expected life of the pit was 15 years, taking it to 1998. That is: the life of the mine is already 27 years longer than expected.

No large trees Would be removed from section of the property north of the track in

It is my view that there is no legal right for the landholder to mine on the northern side closer to Congo Creek on his current development approval. He has the legal right to submit a new development application but the Council has the right to deny it.

The mining of the sand closer to Congo Creek could cause environmental problems. I have a Masters Degree in Environmental Pollution Control. The fine sands were laid down in fairly recent sedimentary processes somewhere between 10000 to 6000 years ago. When the sediments are deposited there are often adjacent organic materials trapped as well. This organic matter can decay slowly in the absence of oxygen. In so called anaerobic conditions. The Sulphurous compounds produced when exposed to the oxygen in the atmosphere, form acid sulphate compounds. I recall a time in the 1980s my neighbours (who live opposite the quarry) dug a shallow well from which a strong rotten egg smell, this is a classic example of acid sulphate soils. The expansion of the mine to norths and the leaching of acid compounds would have a severe Impact on the relatively pristine creek, a most loved waterway for tourists and locals alike. I appreciate that the fine sands are of significant value to the landholder. However, the extraction of these sands is limited to DA.

The amount of sand removed Is also another Issue. I understand that if there is removal of over 30000 tons a year from the existing site, there needs to be an Impact assessment for the State Pollution Control Commission or the Environment Protection Agency. Does Council hold records of how much sand Is removed annually?

Turning to more personal Issues
I have a more personal reason for the reopening of the road. My son, his partner and our granddaughter have lived in Congo 15 years and have just finished building in the Congo village. What was once a pleasant 3 minute commute

from my house to theirs is now a 25 minute trip via the Princes Highway and the infamous Bingie turnoff. Childcare and picking my granddaughter up from preschool has been difficult.

Lastly in a bush fire situation my wife arid 1 and many other households on North Congo Road are in a dire position. During the last bushfire scare, when the road was open, our Bushfire plan was to escape to the beach in the Congo Village, With any fire from the West, Northwest, North and

Northeast we have no escape route, with access through the Quarry now denied. The Royal Commission into Bushfires clearly recommended that towns should have two roads in.

Arguing that similar villages like Potato Point have only one does not justify a village that has two should lose one.

The Council can - and should - reopen Congo road, including via compulsory acquisition if heeded. If there are no mining rights to the northern Side of the property, than the compensation would be minimal. Thank you.

Let's do coffee with ... Andrew Radford

Featuring in the first season one of 'The Assembly' on ABC television is just one of the many achievements of Batehaven local, Andrew Radford (AR). The Moruya Mail (MM) caught up with Andrew for a hot chocolate last week.

MM: I am a tad nervous, Andrew. I am relatively new to this gig and here I am interviewing the interviewer mentored by Leigh Sales. I shall play it safe first up... who is Andrew Radford?

AR: (Laughs)... I was born in 1983 in Cronulla and my dad worked for Qantas and my mum in banking. I have an older sister. I have autism and an intellectual disability.

MM: When did you become aware of your disability?

AR: Back in the 1980's it was difficult to get an autism diagnosis. It was a less understood concept with limited knowledge among professionals. But I was certainly aware that I was different from a very young age. In my case, I was non-verbal until about 10 years of age. Any doubts about my disability were blown away when I started school at six years of age. I was mercilessly teased with name calling. Formal school was a horrendous experience for me. Teachers had very little understanding and I was often isolated.

My disability means I will avoid social interactions. I worry intensely that I will annoy people. Reading facial expressions and body language is really difficult so it is easy to miss shifts in mood and interest when I am talking. Asking too many questions is also an issue and because my mind races, I often forget what has already been answered. These days, when I first meet someone, I may also steer the chat to one of my favourite topics such as cars very quickly which I guess ... some people find disconcerting. MM: How did you end up on the South Coast of NSW?

AR: My family made the decision to make a fresh start for me. The bullying in Cronulla was relentless. In 2000, we moved to Batemans Bay. It was the best decision. I enrolled in Moruya Technical and Further Education (TAFE) in a one year full time computer course. They were fantastic and provided me with supported learning. TAFE funded a note taker who was with me at all times to help me understand the course content.

In 2001, the Disability Trust, a not-forprofit disability services and support provider, found employment for me at Batemans Bay Library as a library assistant and I have been working there ever since on Tuesdays and Fridays. In 2021, the Disability Trust again helped me set up a car detailing business which of course links to my passion for cars. I also returned to studies at Moruya TAFE and completed a Certificate III in Horticulture and a Certificate II in Animal Care in 2021. Animal care links to my passion for my dog 'Sadie'. Once again the learning support was fantastic from Moruya TAFE.

MM: What's life like outside of work?

AR: It has been pretty exciting to tell you the truth. When I moved to the South Coast, I took up sports such as swimming and basketball. People were far more accepting of me and my confidence grew as I integrated more into the community. In 2013, I was selected for Australia in ten pin bowling for the Special Olympics Trans Tasman Games in Cairns. Í was also made an **Ambassador for Special Olympics** Australia and even met William and Kate, Prince and Princess of Wales in 2014. Given my experiences, I am very passionate these days about advocating for people with disabilities. I have been a a member of the Aspect Advisory Council of Australia since 2019. The purpose of the Council is to talk about things that are important to Autistic people and make sure our voices are heard in decision making at all levels. This year I was the first person with an intellectual disability to be appointed to The Disability Trust (TDT) Board. It means TDT is one of the very first large not-for-profit organisations to have someone with an intellectual disability on its Board Of Directors. It is good to be able to pay back as the TDT literally turned my life around. I am fully committed to the values and mission of the TDT.

I also presented at the Autism Asia Pacific Conference (APAC) in Singapore in 2019 and will travel to Perth next month to speak at this year's APAC. 'VALID' invited me to speak at their 'Having a Say Conference' in Geelong in 2024. It is the largest gathering for people with intellectual disabilities within Australia.

Speaking roles for the Council for Intellectual Disability (CID), a disability rights organisation led by people with intellectual disabilities, is another of my passions.

I also take on mentoring roles for young people with intellectual disabilities and autism.

MM: (Laughs and shakes head).... Now, here is me thinking we would be spending our time talking about Leigh Sales and 'The Assembly' on ABC. I am surprised you found the time to be involved.

AR: (smiles)...Before you even ask ... Leigh Sales is simply amazing; generous with her time and taught us to research for questions others would not ask.

It was a four stage process to make it through to 'The Assembly'. There was a series of interviews and meetings with the producers in Sydney. I had to make a video to support my application.



We studied Journalism at Macquarie University along with the other successful candidates with Autism. It was so good to study with others. My confidence went through the roof and for probably the first time in my life new friendships were easy to make. It really was a case of feeling extremely comfortable being myself and doing something that was extremely rewarding.

In the interviews we were mindful from the start to make sure the interviewee and, of course, the interviewers felt comfortable, hence, the reason behind the inclusion statement*. 'Aspect' developed the Inclusion Statement jointly with Autistic staff.

Whilst all the interviewees were fantastic, my favourite was Albo. He really does come across as a good bloke on and off the camera.

As part of my internship with the ABC, I went on to make a news item that is close to my heart. I have a long-standing interest in Botany. I just love plants and you might remember my gift of a Grevillea to Adam Goodes on 'The Assembly'. I spent a month in Canberra working with ABC's TV and radio teams. During this time, I visited the National Arboretum to create a TV piece on its 'Living Collections'.

The story shines a spotlight on just a few of the people who care for the Arboretum's unique and beautiful forests and gardens. It celebrates not only the breathtaking work happening at the Arboretum but also the dedication of the people who make it all possible. It was screened on ABC TV during the News Segment on the evening of 29 December 2024.

MM: Thanks Andrew. A most enjoyable chat.

AR: Pleasure, I always like to conclude with 'nothing about us without us'.

Americans are acting out the truth or otherwise of the notion that a frog in water coming slowly to the boil will remain submerged till it dies. It was first expressed by a German writer, the eponymous E.W. Scripture in 1897. In America's case, the frog is democracy, and its death signals the arrival of autocracy, or perhaps theocracy.

Indeed, last week the New York Times gave an extraordinary seventy-six-minute positive discussion between two scripture lovers, their Catholic evangelical columnist, Ross Douthat and a leading theocrat, Pastor Doug Wilson, on the details of a theocratic America.

It followed the country's Justice Department charging New York's Attorney-General Letitia James, and James Comey, the former FBI Director whose 'crimes' were a mistake on a personal home loan document and 'lying' to the Senate respectively. In each case the department had previously found there were no cases to answer. The NYT board then engaged Kate Andrias, Law Professor at Columbia University, to trace Trump's corruption of the legal system: 'In case after case over the past eight months, a majority of justices on the Supreme Court have acquiesced to President Trump's lawless and authoritarian actions, often without offering any explanation,' she wrote.

'Mr. Trump's authoritarian moves and the Supreme Court's authorization of them has produced, for many, a deepening despair. But here is the essential fact: The Constitution's meaning is not the Supreme Court's alone to define. It belongs to "we the people." When enough people have organized around a constitutional vision, they have managed to prevail even against a hostile Supreme Court.'

But here's the other essential fact. 'The people' are exactly like the frog in Mr Scripture's simile. They don't seem to realise that they're in a pot that will surely boil and kill their democracy. No marches, no mass protests.


It gets worse...much worse. The rest of the world might well be looking aghast at what Trump is doing at home, without realising what it means for them. Climate Change is just the start. His 'Dig, baby, dig' cry to the fossil fuel industry is an invitation to hell on earth. If America lets loose on CO2, Methane, and the other elements heating our atmosphere, it doesn't matter much what the rest of the world does. America, Russia and the big oil exporters of the Middle East will pile more fuel under the pot.

The water will quickly reach boiling point, but not before there's a global explosion of migrants from the countries most affected to the rest. Their governments – including Australia – know perfectly well that in the ensuing chaos the collateral death toll will make the 20th century wars seem like a picnic, albeit of the butchers' variety. Yet they say nothing that might in any way displease the White House Narcissus.

And last week I learned of Australia's latest response to Trump, following its \$800 million 'down payment' on the AUKUS submarines. This one is so bizarre that it had been kept off the DoD website. Brig. Gen. Christopher Gardiner, space and cyber attaché at the Australian Embassy in Washington, spilled the beans. The answer is 'Space'.

The Defence Department has made a commitment to invest \$9 to \$12 billion over the next decade to military space programs, he noted. 'We need to partner, and we need to cooperate to generate the resiliency effect,' Gardiner said. With whom do we partner? Why, the good old USA, Mr President. ow

The Centennial Hall was gay on Friday night when the children's plain and fancy and paper ball was held. It was the second of a similar kind held in connection with the Moruya Public School. The hall was not nearly big enough to hold the large number of juveniles as well as the adults who attended. Some of the children's dresses were very pretty, and had evidently been given much time and thought; others were humorous and suggested the working out of the child's own idea. The ladies delighted the hearts of the little ones by regaling them with a sumptuous repast of tea cakes and soft drinks.

The Moruya Mail was invited to a full dress rehearsal of the Bay Theatre Players' (BTP) production of 'Ladies in Black' last Sunday. Ladies in Black is an Australian stage musical written by Split Enz and Crowded House co-founder Tim Finn (Music and Lyrics) and Carolyn Burns (Book). It is a coming-of-age story set in Sydney in 1959. It tells of young. intelligent Lisa, who embarks on a summer job between completing her Leaving Certificate and following her university dreams. Lisa joins the sales staff in the fashionable department store, Goode's. It's a summer that changes her life as she befriends the colourful characters of Ladies

Frocks. Each character is on the precipice of change - facing independence, working for a living immigration and the changing role

of women as we moved into the

1960's. The musical opens with the song 'I Got it at Goodes' and with a blaze of colours, thirteen immaculately frocked women treat the audience to a song and dance routine using the whole stage. This kaleidoscope of colours whets the audience's expectations and over the next two and a half hours plus, over thirty custom made frocks as well as numerous sourced ones necessitate more costume changes than this reviewer could count. It would also be amiss not to mention the sheer red and black negligee in the intimate scene. Whilst the costumes are so true to the 1950's, it is the exquisite attention to detail that transforms the audience to the mid 20th Century. The high heels, hairstyles, make up and of course the pearl necklaces are, in a manner of

speaking, the icing on the cake.

The set is also classic 1950's.



The Formica furniture in the kitchen setting with the accompanying laminated sideboard housing the Royal Doulton Crockery, the Singer Sewing Machine with the feet pedal, an original 1959 Women's Weekly and the crackling old wireless will bring smiles to a certain generation.

The themes of 'Ladies in Black' unite the audience across generations. For the old, it is time travel to how confined the role of women was in society and the extent of male control. For the young, who wonder why the feminist movement was necessary, it should be compulsory viewing.

The star of the show is Erin Drewsen who is currently undertaking her Higher School Certificate (HSC). In a word, Erin is brilliant in the role of 'Lisa'. The almost timid singing of "Soon I will be me" in her opening song is countered by the confident and certainty of her rendition of 'Tomorrow becomes Today' in her concluding number. This transformation is also achieved with the subtlety of her acting. It must be mentioned that Erin's mother, Erica Drewsen, excels as Lisa's mother in the musical.

There are standout performances across the cast and with rehearsals ongoing since May of this year it is a truly polished performance. The musical back up is superb and the difficult harmonies smoothly achieved. The lighting is effectively used throughout.

Director Candy Burgess has overseen a very polished production. The very clever use of the stage and dialogue means at times up to three narratives are explored on stage simultaneously. The timing and sequencing is quite breathtaking and really did allow the audience to float through this superb musical.

'Bravery & Betrayal': The True Story of the SAS in Afghanistan Screening at Catalina Club

The powerful stories of ex- Special Air Services (SAS) servicemen fighting in Afghanistan in the award-winning documentary film, 'Bravery & Betrayal: The True Story of the SAS in Afghanistan' will be screened at the Catalina Club at 6pm on Sunday, 26th October, 2025.





Tackle World Moruya Fishing report 10.10.25

Moruya River.

How good is spring!! Warmer, longer days (for a sneaky arvo session), and an increase in fish activity. The river is well in its way to waking up. The lower section

The river is well in its way to waking up. The lower section around the airport flats, back of the hole in the wall and up to the Quarry Wharf have all been fishing well this past week

There have been a few nice whiting starting to show up on a rising tide back of the hole in the wall. With live nippers, squirt worms or even surface lures finding a few hard fighting, good eating 'ting'.

The shallow sand flats around the airport are the place to start looking for both bream and flathead, as the warmer ocean currents push into the system, the fish are becoming more active. All manner of techniques will work this weekend, baits and lures should account for some nice fish. Under the town bridge, the flathead, bream, estuary perch and whiting will all be taking advantage of the warming river temps, you can expect to see plenty of fish on the flats under the bridge itself.

Up in the fresh, I managed a great start to the summer bass season, with a 42-45cm fish on a home made spinner bait to tick the season over. The fish are there and starting to activate, you just have to find them. I'll be back out again this weekend.

Tuross River.

Good numbers of flathead, bream and mulloway have been caught this past week. Several 75cm+ mulloway have been caught by several of my keen juniors, Adam Walsh managed a cracking 84cm fish on a Daiwa Bait Junkie Prawn under the metal bridge at Bodalla, and Jackson Eke managed a nice 75cm version further down the system. Nice work boys. Coila is fishing well at the moment, but is best in the mornings before he spring time winds pick up and blow you off the lake. Bream and flathead will all eagerly take a soft plastic or hard body lure presentation.

As we race towards summer, it's time to dust off you prawning gear. If you don't have any, come in and pay us a visit, and we can get you started. We have prawn lights, scoop nets and drag nets to get you into a feed of summer run prawns.

Up in the fresh, the bass action has been off the charts. Tuross has lots of shallow sand runs, where the water temp has plenty of opportunity to warm rapidly. Good size fish have been taken for the past few weeks, with one regular losing a cracking Bass to a seal of all things!! Sorry to hear about that loss Jack, at least you have a good story to tell. Rock and Beach.

Early morning beach sessions are the go this time of year, once you get past 10am, the wind comes up, and makes fishing the open beaches a chore. There are plenty of salmon around, as well as the odd tailor, bream, flathead and whiting.

Pick a beach, and go for a look, the fish will be where you find them.

Offshore

The warm currents pushing down the coast have really gone into over drive, take a look at this weeks seas surface temp

As a result the YFT have pushed well south of us, or out wide. In their place however have been good numbers of Albacore tuna.

The snapper and flathead crews have been happy with what has been in offer, with the magic 30-40m mark working well this last week.

The bait freezer has been restocked, with worms and hawksbury prawns the only notable absentees.

We have some great prices on Shimano Ice Boxes at the moment, with 25% off RRP. We also have some super prices on Shakespeare Intrepid combos, in the 8', 10', and 12' sizes priced to clear.

The Arma lure range has seen a big injection of new models in both the metal and soft plastic range, so come and check out the new goodies.

Batemans Bay Sailing Club Report

It was a great day for sailing on October 11th when Batemans Bay Sailing Club held the first Lady skipper/Crew skipper race of the season followed by the second Bay Cup race. The Lady skipper's race was a handicap start race where boats were given a headstart based on past performances so that all the boats would theoretically finish at the same time. A very light north west breeze was blowing at the start which built throughout the race. First off the start line at Caseys Beach was "Horizon" (Michelle Grybaitis) followed by "Sail La Vie" (Steve Masterton) and "Red Dwarf" (Bruce Bailey). They hadn't covered that much distance by the time the back markers "Wishful Thinking" (Elyse Gresty), "Moonmist" (Dave Boardman) and "Accolade" (Tony Bonouvrie) were starting.

The first leg was a broad reach from Caseys Beach to Chain Bay. "Accolade" was able to carry a spinnaker which gave her a break over the other back markers. "Red Dwarf" sailed into some light air inshore on the leg from Chain Bay to Wimbie Beach which "Accolade" was able to skirt around the outside of. Some big NW gusts made things lively on the final leg from Wimbie back to Caseys Beach. Tony Bonouvrie held his nerve to win the Crew Skipper race. The first Lady Skipper home was Elyse Gresty.

Dogs were being blown off chains by the time the Bay Cup race was due to start. "Red Dwarf", "Sail La Vie" and "Horizon" headed back in while the remaining yachts' crews were hard at work shortening sail for the now delayed Bay Cup race. Race officer Terry Paton and his trusty team of James Anderson, Andrew Bain and Peter Withington set an even start line.

"Wishful Thinking" (Simon Dunlop) was just able to keep clear to windward of "Moonmist" (Tony Sutton) at the pin end of the line. "Accolade" (Lachlan Brown) got a clean midline start and led around the windward mark off Square Head. "Wishful Thinking" sailed over the top on the run down to the Marine Park middle mark to lead by the barest of margins, although "Accolade' regained the lead ahead of "Moonmist" on the next upwind leg.

There followed broad reaching legs to the Chain Bay mark and hence back out to the middle mark. The breeze was moderating so all the crews shook the reefs out their mainsails. "Accolade" was disadvantaged by carrying a rather ancient #4 headsail while the other boats had #3 headsails up. Paton sensibly shortened the course at the next windward mark rounding due to a falling tide. "Moonmist" came past just before the finish to score the line honours/PHS/AMS treble ahead of "Accolade" and "Wishful.


Thank you to Club Malua and staff for hosting this very special event.

- Bike Park: An area with progressive mountain bike features and downhill-focused trails that can be easily ridden repeatedly either by using a chair lift, shuttle system or climb return trail. Bike parks can be private, where you have to pay to access the trails, or public.
- Bonk:
 - a. (verb) To run out of energy (fuel) during a mountain bike ride or race. "I bonked so hard on that climb.'
 - b. (noun... or verb) A mountain bike jumping technique where you tap a feature with only the front wheel. "Watch while I attempt to do a nose bonk on that tree stump." "You totally nose bonked that table top.'
- Bunny Hop: A mountain bike skill where the rider lifts their front wheel, followed by the rear wheel . into the air so both wheels are in the air at the same time.
- Case: To come up short on a mountain bike jump or drop. Casing can sometimes, but not always, lead to a crash.
- Clean: Successfully making it over an obstacle in the trail without putting a foot down or falling off your bike. "I just cleaned that technical climb for the first time."
- Clear: To land smoothly when jumping a table top, double, or landing a drop.
- Cross Country: Cross country (also referred to simply as XC) is a form of mountain biking where covering distance is emphasized over technicality. Cross country does not literally mean "across country."
- Dab: To take a foot off the pedal and put it down to avoid crashing. "I haven't made it through that section without dabbing yet."

- Double: A mountain bike jump that has two distinct mounds - a "lip" that helps launch a rider into the air and a "landing" where the rider is aiming to set their wheels down. A double can also be referred to as a "gap jump", because there is a gap between the take-off and landing. Casing a double is likely to result in a crash.
- Downhill: Downhill (also referred to as DH) is a form of gravity-fed mountain biking where there is little to no uphill riding involved. Downhill trails are accessed by chair lifts or a
- ·Drop: A trail feature where the rider must launch their bike off of a height and land on a lower surface. Drops can be man-made or natural and consist of dirt, wood, rocks or roots as the take-off and/or landing.
- Dropper: Short for "dropper seatpost", which is a height adjustable seatpost. Droppers enable a rider to quickly lower their seat height with the push of a lever mounted to the handlebars.
- E-MTB: Electric mountain bike.
- Endo: An advanced mountain bike skill that involves shifting your body weight forward as you apply the front brake to lift the rear wheel. Endo turns can be used to navigate tight downhill switchbacks. Performing this skill on flat ground while coming to a stop is referred to as a "stoppie".
- Flats: Refers to flat pedals and shoes, where the pedal has a large platform, usually with pins, that are compatible with the grippy rubber soles of <u>mountain bike shoes</u>.
- Gnarly: Used to describe a section of trail or trail feature that is extremely difficult or where failure has high consequence. "That rock garden back there is super gnarly." Can also be used as a noun. "Are you ready to shred the gnar?"
- Grom: A young mountain biker who is also typically extremely skilled.
- Hero Dirt: When the trail surface is the perfect consistency for riding and provides nearly infinite levels of traction. "After that rain three days ago, we're going to have hero dirt!"
