NSW Government extinguishes red tape with common sense reform for Farm Firefighting Vehicles

The **NSW Government** is delivering common sense reform to support farmers during the bushfire season, allowing farmers and rural landholders to register and use Farm Firefighting Vehicles (FFVs) to respond to emergency bushfires near their

The move follows recent trials of around 350 FFVs, which supported their use in emergencies and proposed a conditional registration scheme.

FFVs are often used on private property and are not typically registered for use on public roads.

The legal use of these vehicles on public roads in emergency situations is an important reform which will allow farmers and rural landholders to attend nearby fires, not just those on their own property.

The new scheme offers a lower cost conditional registration, which includes inspection for a light vehicle and the issuing of a licence plate expected to be a maximum of \$209.

The cost for conditional registration will drop after the first year with the cost, including an inspection estimated at \$126 (or only \$75 when inspection not required), subject to CPI and CTP increases.

Conditional registration balances the practical need for FFVs to be available as an emergency resource while ensuring vehicle safety standards on NSW roads remain high.

Under the scheme, vehicles will be subject to the following requirements:

- Vehicle inspections as per the Authorised Inspection Scheme to establish registration, with inspection required every second year and registration to be renewed annually.
- Firefighting equipment must be permanently and securely attached to the vehicle.
- Vehicles must only be used for emergencies, not regular operations.
- May use roads up to 50km away from garaging address east of the Newell Highway, with no distance limit from garaging addresses west of the Newell Highway.

The scheme will commence on 7 October.

Service NSW is ready to assist people with their applications with eligible customers able to apply and pay their registrations inperson at their nearest Service NSW Centre.

More details including eligibility requirements are available on the Service NSW website.

North Head Drive temporary long weekend opening

Moruya's North Head Drive will be open for four days to ease traffic in the are across the busy long weekend. The road will allow alternating one-way traffic flow from 5pm Thursday 2 October to 7am Tuesday 7 October 2025.

The road will then be closed through to November, when the single alternating lane will come into effect before the road fully reopens in December. Roadside signs and Live Traffic NSW will list the latest openings and closings, and Council's North Head Drive slope stabilisation webpage has more project information.

Following talks between Eurobodalla Council and Transport for NSW, the latter will delay until 2026 its pavement reconstruction and the extension of the overtaking lane for the Princes Highway near Malabar Drive, although the current shoulder works and intersection upgrade will continue until complete.


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Textile artwork takes out the 2025 River of Art Festival Prize

Araluen artist Lilaea van der See has been awarded the 2025 River of Art Prize for her work 'When Stillness Dances... 2025' a textile installation featuring botanical printing on raw silk

More than 200 people filled the Mechanics Institute in Moruya on Friday evening to celebrate the launch of the 21st River of Art Festival and hear the judges' decision for the Art Prize.

Judges Cath Bowdler and Tony Oates praised the winning entry as "an outstanding piece of work, noting that it might be a surprise. Tony and I circled around this one, but we were drawn back to it as a fully realised complex work, and as we looked at the detail, all the elements work together and was assembled with care, great skill and consideration." The artist Lilaea van der See said: "I'm honoured and humbled to receive the River of Art Prize. There are so many beautiful artists here, and it means a lot to have my work recognised. My artwork is about being in harmony with the land and with each other — creating something sustainable and different."

"This dress was made from a single three-metre piece of fabric with no waste. The plants spoke to the fabric and created their own magic. I've been doing botanical ecoprinting for over a decade, often using upcycled materials. For me, the process takes a lifetime of learning, not just weeks in the studio."

The winning work also included lyre bird and kookaburra feathers, sarsaparilla and freshwater mussel shells from the Deua.

Second Prize went to Felicite Briggs for 'The Stolen Pomegranates 2024' a coloured pencil on cotton paper drawing featuring luminescent fruit.

The judges described the piece as "a beautiful, technically excellent life drawing, intimate but glowing with life." Felicite gave her apologies as she was unable to attend the event.

The Highly Commended Award was presented to Ritchey Sealy for 'Containment 2025' oil painting. The judges said 'It was an animated painterly work depicting fire trucks at work."

The artist said "This painting is deeply personal — it reflects my experience as a division commander during the 2019–20 fires and the lasting impact of post-traumatic stress. Rather than dramatize the flames, I chose to depict a containment line — the long, exhausting work of trying to manage the fire alongside crews from across the country.'

A special mention was made to 91 year old artist Ian McKenzie from Tomakin for his intricately detailed 'Mars Botanicus' watercolour.

River of Art Chair Corin Rossouw said this year's Art Prize had attracted a record 136 entries from across Australia.

"We are thrilled with the quality and diversity of entries this year. The River of Art Prize is a real showcase of creativity — from painting, photography, and sculpture through to textiles, glass, and jewellery. We invite everyone to come and see the exhibition in Moruya and vote for the People's Choice Award" said Ms

Council coffers are scraping the 'bottom of barrel'

At its meeting on 23 September 2025, Eurobodalla Shire Council released the draft Financial Statements for the year ending 30 June 2025. The draft Statements tell us the financial position of the Eurobodalla community's public funds, activities and assets, which are managed by the Council.

The Council also released the special purpose financial statements for the year to 30 June 2025, which contain the financial figures for our business services, namely, our water supply services, sewerage services, the Bay Pavilions and the Batemans Bay Beach Resort.

Council's finances continue to weigh down the Eurobodalla community with large costs and will do so for many years to come. Buckle-up ratepayers.

For example, did you know the Bay Pavilions still has a deficit of close to \$16,500 a day? That was \$6 million for the year up to 30 June 2025, up from a \$5.3 million deficit to 30 June 2024 and a \$4.8 million deficit to 30 June 2023. Since opening in the first half of 2022, the Bay Pavilions have made an accumulated deficit of around \$18 million in today's dollars. Add to this the \$19 million it cost the Eurobodalla ratepayers to finish the build, on top of the \$51 million it cost Australian and NSW taxpayers, and you can see the Pavs have turned out to be an irresponsible investment by the Council and a costly ticking-time-bomb. That's over \$1,400 for each of the 26,000 ratepayers.

In spruiking the Pavs, the Council told the community we would only need to wear a small annual deficit of between \$330,000 in the first year reducing to \$100,000 a year within 10 years. In reality, the Pavs went past that 10-year deficit in the first year of operation. The Council has been telling the community since the opening of the Pavs that it will find a solution to the deficits. There's no solution yet, while the deficits are getting bigger not smaller.

Another very expensive horse in the Eurobodalla has bolted. On its website, the Council tells us the Southern Water Supply Storage Facility is expected to cost \$150 million, with Australian taxpayers putting in \$51.2 million, NSW taxpayers putting in \$25.6 million, with the Eurobodalla community to fund the remainder or \$73.2 million. This is a lot of ratepayer funding.

It is even more than what the draft Financial Statements say, which is that we have big infrastructure spending commitments, \$80.7 million in total, including \$45 million for water supply and the Southern Water Supply Storage Facility construction, and around \$21.6 million for sewer construction.

Council will need to borrow, take on debt and pay the interest for the build. The ongoing maintenance cost of the Water Storage Facility is yet to hit ratepayers. Better drill another hole in your belt and tighten it up.

Eurobodalla Shire's income from ongoing community and business activities for the year ended 30 June 2025 was \$185.7 million. Over two-fifths of our income, \$79.9 million, came from rates and annual charges paid by Eurobodalla's 26,000 ratepayer properties for things like water, sewerage, waste and stormwater services. Around a fifth, \$35.8 million, came from user charges for things like our water supply services, landfill, community services and swimming centres. On top of this, Australian and NSW taxpayers gave us about a quarter of our income, \$45.4 million through their respective governments, while building and development income for infrastructure projects was about 6 per cent of our income, \$10.9 million.

Eurobodalla Shire's expenses from ongoing operations for the

year ended 30 June 2025 were \$111.6 million, while the value of our community assets depreciated by \$47 million over the year. The community will need to pay for depreciated assets in the future when we need to replace our assets. Eurobodalla Shire is dependent on grants and contributions from other sources to make ends meet. Taking out the Australian and NSW Government taxpayer grants and the developer contributions, Eurobodalla's net operating result was a deficit of \$29.2 million for 2024-25, about the same as the year before. When our infrastructure spending commitments are included, our deficit blows out to \$109.9 million for 2024-25. Ultimately, deficits not covered by the Australian and NSW government grants and the developer contributions will need to be paid for by Eurobodalla ratepayers and users of our services.

The Council referred the draft Financial Statements to audit at its meeting on 23 September 2025. The Council expects the audited statements to come back to the Council at its meeting on 25 November 2025, before they are put on public exhibition for public comment.

Respected pilot dies following Moruya plane crash

On Saturday, 27 September local pilot and Master of Sport Parachuting died following a plane crash at Moruya.

Shortly after 2pm emergency services were called to bushland west of George Bass Drive, 2km north of Moruya Airport, following reports of a plane crash.

Officers from South Coast Police District attended the scene and found a plane, used by a skydiving business, had crashed.

The pilot 54 year old Paul Smith, was the only person onboard. The aircraft was returning to Moruya airport after conducting a skydiving drop when it collided with terrain.

The Australian Transport Safety Bureau (ATSB) commenced a transport safety investigation into an accident involving a turboprop Pilatus Porter aircraft.

"The ATSB deployed a team of transport safety investigators from its Canberra and Brisbane offices, specialising in aircraft operations, maintenance and engineering, to the accident site.

Once on site on Sunday morning, investigators conducted a range of evidence-gathering activities including site survey with a drone, wreckage examination, and recovery of any aircraft components for further examination at the ATSB's technical facilities in Canberra. Investigators will also seek to interview involved parties and witnesses, and collect relevant recorded information including flight tracking data, pilot and aircraft maintenance records, and weather information.

The ATSB asks anyone with video footage of the aircraft at any phase of the flight, or in the immediate aftermath of the accident, to make contact via the witness form on our website: atsb.gov.au/witness at their earliest opportunity."

The Australian Parachute Foundation issued a statement saying "With immense sadness, we acknowledge the passing of Paul 'Poo' Smith, who tragically lost his life whilst flying in Moruya on Saturday.

Paul was a beloved and highly respected member of the Australian skydiving community, known by many for his exceptional skill, generosity, and almost 40 years of dedication to the sport. In recognition of his decades of outstanding contributions and achievements in our sport — particularly in the areas of aircraft operations, training and competition skydiving — Paul was awarded the APF's highest honour last year: Master of Sport Parachuting.

From 2011 to 2024, Paul built and ran Skydive Oz in Moruya Heads, a purpose-built drop zone offering world-class facilities and training that drew aspiring skydivers from all around the globe. Following the drop zone's acquisition last year, Paul remained deeply involved in operations as Chief Instructor, continuing to shape and support the community he had worked so hard to grow.

Whether as a pilot, drop zone owner, instructor, competitor, display jumper, consultant, mentor, or friend, Paul had a profound impact on countless individuals — more than he would ever realise — and his enduring influence on our sport will always be remembered.

His loss is deeply felt across our community.

We extend our heartfelt condolences to Paul's family, friends, and all who had the privilege of knowing him during this difficult time."

Shoalhaven Council announces new CEO

Yesterday **Shoalhaven Council Mayor Patricia White** announced Andrew Constance as Chief Executive Officer of Council.

"Andrew's commitment to the Shoalhaven and his proven leadership make him an outstanding choice to guide our organisation," said Mayor Patricia White.

"His deep understanding of regional issues, infrastructure, and community engagement positions him strongly to lead the Council into its next chapter," Cr White said.

"We look forward to working with him to realise a bold vision for Shoalhaven — one that champions long-term financial sustainability while shaping a thriving, inclusive future for our entire community," she said.

The appointment follows a comprehensive recruitment process led by Council and supported by independent advisors, Stephen Blackadder Consulting (SBC).


Connect Eurobodalla community online platform is designed to provide Eurobodalla voluntary community organisations with a reliable technology to access services, share ideas and resources.

Yesterday, Dr Michael Holland MP was provided with an overview of the new website with Neil Sampson from Rotary Batemans Bay and Tricia Pye, The Tec Exec.

The platform uses up to date technology for Eurobodalla voluntary community organisations offering them a way of promoting and communicating events, activities and request for assistance from other volunteer organisations. The platform will provide a platform for a range of services and opportunities for voluntary community organisations to collaborate and share their knowledge, skills and expertise.

For years, many of our voluntary community organisations provide much needed services, they tend to work in isolation. They may be aware that other local organisations provide similar support exist, but find it difficult to make and sustain effective contact with them. At present most contact and conversations are made through 'word of mouth', supplemented by random searches on Facebook and the Internet. While this works, in many cases effective contact is limited.

Over the last four years we have been assisting local community organisations to update their technology capabilities and skill base. They include: University of the Third Age, Eurobodalla Show Society, CanAssist, Lions Batemans Bay, CWA, Probus, Men's Shed and Batemans Bay Heritage Museum. This has been possible through the fabulous support of the Foundation for Regional and Rural Renewal (FRRR).

Factors that have led us to develop the Connect Eurobodalla community online platform

- A huge lack of technology competence across the Eurobodalla community.
- Many community organisations are being supported by a small loyal band of volunteers who are working across several sectors.
- Many volunteers are retired and have many other conflicting priorities, including personal commitments. Their enthusiasm can be spasmodic when travel and medical concerns take priority.
- Key volunteers are over committed just trying to keep their organisation viable.
- Personal ownership issues limit effective communication.
- Things take time!
- At least twelve months to negotiate, install and train personal in Starlink technology.
- The continual rotating door of key members of organisations including Eurobodalla Shire Council personnel.
- Covid has had a devastating impact on our community organisations.

THREATS AND EXTORTION **SCAMS**

'Watch out for Scams' with Horizon Bank Amanda Welsh, Fraud Manager

If a government authority or trusted company is telling you to pay up, stop, think and double-check.

How the scam works

Instead of offering a prize, money or rebate, these scams use threats designed to frighten you into handing over your money. The scammer may call you and threaten you with arrest or send you an email claiming you owe money for a speeding fine, a tax office debt or an unpaid bill.

During the phone call, scammers will pressure you into paying immediately and tell you the police will be sent to your house if you refuse. Scammers have been known to target vulnerable people in our community, such as newly arrived migrants. They pretend to be Immigration Department officials and threaten victims with deportation unless fees are paid to correct errors in their visas. A very similar scam involves the scammer pretending to be from the Australian Tax Office telling their victims they have an outstanding tax bill.

Scammers also pretend to be trusted companies such as your bank, gas, electricity, water or phone provider. They will threaten to cancel your service or charge you excessive penalty fees if you don't pay the bill immediately. Sometimes they may impersonate a business like Australia Post stating you have an item to pick up or you will be charged a holding fee every day you don't pay.

Whatever the case, they try to make you worried and act without stopping to think and check that the story is true.

If the scam is sent by email, it is likely to include an attachment or link to a fake website where you will be asked to download proof of the 'bill', 'fine' or 'delivery details'. Opening the attachment or downloading the file will result in infecting your computer with malware.

Protect yourself

- Don't be pressured by a threatening caller. Stop, think and check whether their story is true.
- A government agency or trusted company will never ask you to pay by unusual methods such as by gift card, wire transfers or Bitcoins.
- Verify the identity of the contact by calling the relevant organization directly - find them through an independent source such as a phone book, past bill or online search.
- Do not use the contact details provided in emails or given to you during phone calls. Again, find them through an independent source.

Consultation now open on major mobile coverage reform

Residents, businesses and community groups are invited to have their say on a major reform that aims to dramatically improve mobile coverage in regional and remote areas. The Albanese Government has released draft legislation for the Universal Outdoor Mobile Obligation (UOMO), which will require mobile providers to deliver outdoor voice and text coverage almost anywhere Australians can see the sky. The proposed reforms are expected to expand mobile coverage by more than 5 million square kilometres, using a combination of existing infrastructure and emerging Directto-Device technology delivered via Low Earth Orbit

The legislation is part of the Government's response to the 2024 Regional Telecommunications Review, which identified the need for stronger, more reliable mobile services. The consultation is open until 19 October 2025, and feedback is being sought from industry, stakeholders and the




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Breakfast Boost for Business at Batemans Bay

Council bypasses traffic solutions for Moruya

Last week the Council unanimously passed a motion to advocate for a Moruya bypass. In reality, at \$1.7 billion it's not likely to get built for years. The Moruya bypass is an unaffordable pipe dream. In consultation, the Eurobodalla community overwhelmingly supported the cheaper 'Purple' bypass route. The NSW Government instead chose the community's least preferred more expensive route, the 'Orange' route. Why? So, what is happening to keep the traffic flowing and to keep residents and visitors safe along the Princes Highway at Moruya until a bypass is ready?

At the same Council Meeting on 23 September 2025 the Eurobodalla Road Safety Plan 2025 to 2028, was tabled. At around 70 pages, our community's Road Safety Plan for the next four years does not mention any special traffic control measures to keep traffic flowing along the Princes Highway at Moruya. This tells the community that this is not a priority for the Council.

While the Council calls for a bypass by press release, the Council then adopts a road plan without an interim solution for Moruya.

Australia consistently scores highly in healthcare among high-income countries for its effective and equitable system*. Whilst Medicare is a major reason for this ranking, much can also be attributed to some key personnel within the sector who have advocated for fairness. Broulee resident, Marilyn Beaumont (MB), Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) is one of those people. The Moruya Mail (MM) had a coffee with Marilyn last week.

MM: Thanks for joining me, Marilyn. It has been quite the journey. Born in Canberra in 1951 through to being awarded the OAM in 2017. Please fill in the years.

MB: Thank you. Yes... I am one of those rare souls who was born in Canberra. My education was Yarralumla Primary School and Telopea Park High School. After completing the Intermediate Certificate**, I left school at 15 years of age in the mid 60's and commenced work at the retailer, J.B. Young Kingston in the 'Fancy Department', selling stockings, haberdashery, lace, ribbon and the like. In fact, pantyhose had just come on the market so we had to show women how to wear them.

MM: (laughs) ... I am pretty sure that is not the reason you were awarded an OAM.

MB: (smiles) ... At 17 years of age I commenced nursing at Prince Henry Hospital, Sydney and graduated in 1971. I then took a break from nursing and travelled inQueensland and NSW undertaking itinerant work in agriculture and hospitality.

After a year or so I came back to nursing and completed my psychiatric training at Kenmore Hospital in Goulburn.

MM: A move to Perth is then pivotal in your career.

MB: In various hospital based roles in Perth, I was increasingly frustrated with options for nursing being so limited and it sparked an interest in community nursing. I then moved back to Sydney and through the Community Nursing Diploma at Cumberland College, I met Dr Charles Blower G.P. I began working with homeless people through the setting up of the Haymarket Clinic for Homeless and with Federal Government funding, I was Senior Nursing Officer for 5 years, a nurse practitioner role.

A move to Adelaide in the late 1970's enabled me to be part of setting up a new therapeutic community for young people with drug

addictions.

In 1981, I commenced work as an organiser with the Royal Australian Nursing Federation South Australian (SA) Branch. There were only two organisers for the whole state so there was much travel and to the outer reaches of SA.

MM: And a rocky career in the nursing union commences.

MB: (laughs)...Yes, I was elected Secretary of the SA Branch in 1982. Over the next five years I played a key role in big changes. This included the action and process to transfer the education of nursing to the universities. We also had significant industrial action on wage cases and clinical career structures for nursing's predominantly female workforce. This meant new categories of nursing were developed such as clinical nurse, clinical nurse consultant and nurse practitioner. I promoted and implemented greater participation of the membership through union delegate training and delegate conferences. In 1987, I moved to Melbourne when I was elected Federal secretary of union. This was a time of significant change with industrial action by nurses and major national nurses wage cases. Industry superannuation through HESTÁ was achieved, the first time most nurses had access to retirement funding.

In 1992 our work led to national registration of nurses which was a huge breakthrough, allowing nurses to work anywhere in the country. The effectiveness of the federal organisation was enhanced through bringing the New South Wales Nurses' Association and Queensland Nurses' Union into the Federal organisation which doubled our

membership

During the 1980's and 1990's, the peak of the HIV/AIDS crisis, as a member of the HIV/AIDS strategy advisory groups, I chaired a national consultation concerned with treatment services and care. Nurses unions in particular pushed back against moves to introduce a discriminatory strategy to identify and isolate people with HIV/AIDS, and for the first time, universal infection control precautions were introduced nationally.



MM: In 1995, internal divisions within the union result in you no longer holding the position of Federal Secretary but rather than throw the towel in, you head in another direction.

MB: (laughs)... That is a polite way of putting Federal/State/Territory politics. Yes, I take up a position as Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Women's Health Victoria for the next 15 years, a statewide advocacy service. In this time, I coordinated the 5 year campaign to remove abortion from the Victorian Crimes Act 2008. Our work also ensured policy level recognition of the health impact of violence against women and children in the state and we contributed to the Royal Commission into Family Violence. Alongside this work, I also sat on a number of national and state health service boards, and others focusing on women's issues ranging from Australian Women's Health Network Board through to a member of Victorian Women's Correctional Services Advisory Committee. These days I am a voluntary Board member at Banksia Villages Pty Ltd, Broulee and also mentor young women on

MM: Your work has been widely recognised with honours and I know you are too modest to list them but I will, and include Australian Centenary of Federation Medal in 2003 inducted into the Victorian Honour Roll of Women for leadership and advocacy in 2007 and of course, the OAM in 2017 for significant contribution to community, in particular to women's health. Can you summarise the driving forces that have resulted in a very impressive career?

boards and working in executive positions in Australia

MB: I use my nursing skill and experience to influence an accessible, inclusive, safe and caring health and community services system across Australia. The longer I have worked in advocacy the more I've learnt to speak the truth, even though it may come at a personal cost, and to bring others along with me. I trust my instincts and give voice to what I see around me that isn't right. To act upon it, stand up and say it, being courageous together, across so many really big issues.

MM: Thanks so much, Marilyn... and as a beneficiary of a health system that delivers more equity than most in the world ... I say thank you. It has been a delightful chat.

The character of the Australian War Memorial is about to change from a memorial to the fallen, to a sideshow for recruits. It doesn't just normalise war as an appropriate human activity, but as a fulfilling career for the boys and girls of a new generation.

I have no problem with recruiting commercials in the media. And if the government wants to present them as something other than a kill-or-be-killed operation, good luck to them. Defence technology is heading in the other direction entirely. The days of massed armies are long gone. Indeed, we might well be inventing the final enemy ourselves: called Al.

Certainly, we've chosen to make the world as scary as possible through Climate Change. Al might come as a welcome stranger to take our place as the apex predator. But honestly, do we really have to trash the AWM to get a few more hands on the levers of destruction on the way to Gaza for all. Surely it is better served to become a memorial to our victory over war itself.

I realise, of course, that I am one of the culprits in spreading stories that normalise, and even celebrate, our men of war. No fewer that eight of my books characterise the Australian 'heroes' of war – ten if you include the Aboriginal battle against the British invasion. Aside from the latter – which the AWM continues to ignore – they covered the period from Gallipoli to Afghanistan, beginning with the biography of Albert Jacka VC in 2006. Already, I was concerned about the process. In an Author's Note, I wrote, 'The research of military literature exposed me to...an attitude towards death in war that I fund deeply troubling.

'The premature, violent death of a single human being is a shocking tragedy. Often, it involves terrible agony. Always, it represents the loss of great human potential. Without exception, it causes the most devastating anguish and pain among those who loved the young man – for they are overwhelmingly young men – who is suddenly no more. One life is gone forever; other lives are scarred in ways that can never be repaired.

'Yet when we write of soldiers, we employ words like gallantry, honour and sacrifice to somehow justify the horror. And we speak, not of single deaths, but armies – millions – in a murderous obscenity. And we do so with a kind of fatalist calm that in itself is horrific. I do not excuse myself from the charge, though I have tried, wherever possible, to expose the enormity of the crime against humanity.'

I had in mind characters like the WWI British Generals Hamilton and Haig who from the luxury of their suites far behind the lines ordered the certain deaths of many thousands of young Australians. Thereafter I was forever prejudiced against the British class system – and its membership - from the rulers to the ruled who permitted it...and to its bunyip shadow.

World War II produced The Battle of Brisbane with my classmate Peter Thompson where only one man died, but at the hands of an American ally; thence to the Special Forces against the Japanese invaders; and more recently the SAS before the Ben Roberts-Smith scandal. They were not killers in their thousands; that was the fate of the civilians when we tagged along with the American military-industrial complex in Iraq, Syria and Afghanistan.

That leads us back to the AWM under the charge of the councillors and the director, Matt Anderson, who numbers a Duntroon graduation among his many academic achievements. They fitted a Black Hawk chopper in the showplace and decided to retain the Roberts-Smith uniform and weapons. Smart moves. No doubt they'll draw crowds of little boys.

Owners are therefore reminded that from to-day there are only 11 days' grace allowed in which to comply with the law, which distinctly states that every dog over the age of six months must be registered. On last Saturday morning last Mr. and Mrs. E. Hawdon, Miss V. Armstrong and Mr. C. Irwin set out per motor for Bega to attend the Spring Show. When about five miles this side of Cobargo the steering gear failed to act. Mrs. Hawdon, who was at the wheel, with great presence of mind, applied the brakes. The car swerved off the road over a log, but fortunately did not overturn. The occupants received a severe shock for a while. Mr. Irwin, who had to officiate as a judge of poultry at the show, went on by lorry. After Mr. D. Hearne had placed the car in order, the remainder of the party proceeded on the journey. Mr. L. T. Jenner has recently made a subdivision of his land at Moruya Heads. The land immediately adjoins the pilot station and has been cut into 29 allotments, all of 66 feet frontage or more. They are splendidly situated, being convenient to the beach and to the river, and the land is easily the best available on the river or at the Heads for residential or week-end purposes.

The wedding of Miss Madge Donovan, youngest daughter of Mrs. M. Donovan, of Gundary, and Mr. James Honan, took place at the Sacred Heart Church, on Tuesday morning.

Lost at Sea, Lost in Time: The Case of the Missing Cannon

A shipwreck, a daring rescue, and a cannon that vanished without a trace—the story of the Rover has all the ingredients of a historical mystery.

The Rover was a small coastal trading vessel built in 1841 on the Manning River. Later that same year, seeking shelter in a storm, the captain anchored in Broulee Bay. It was a fatal decision. The anchor dragged in the heavy seas, and the ship was wrecked. The captain and 11 others drowned, while survivors were saved by local Aboriginal people—an act of bravery that was later formally recognised by Captain Oldrey, who awarded four breastplates in gratitude.

Sixty years later, the Rover made headlines again when wreckage washed ashore in Broulee Bay in 1901. Among the salvaged pieces was a cannon, retrieved by Tomakin sawmiller Abraham Jennings. In 1907, Jennings wrote to the Sydney Town Council, offering to donate the cannon. The Council accepted, and Jennings believed he had delivered it—but no record of the cannon's arrival exists.

Did it remain in Coffs Harbour, where Jennings later lived with his son, or was it left behind somewhere closer to Moruya or Tomakin? Over a century later, the fate of the Rover's cannon remains a mystery.

For local historians and maritime enthusiasts, it's more than just a lost relic. The cannon represents a tangible link to a tragic shipwreck, acts of heroism, and the coastal life of 19th-century New South Wales.

If you have any clues or family stories that might shed light on the missing cannon, the search is still on.

Defibrillators for communities in need and new map to help save lives

The Minns Labor Government has announced an investment of \$500,000 to enable sporting organisations to install life-saving defibrillators at their facilities, while a new project will map facilities that have this critical equipment.

Heartbeat of Football Foundation has also received a \$150,000 grant from the Minns Labor Government to conduct the first ever research into which NSW sports facilities have Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) installed.

The findings will provide vital insight into which facilities do not have the equipment and guide any future government investment in the devices.

Heartbeat of Football will also use the funding to expand its #HeartHealthMatters Program to deliver AED familiarisation and CPR training to sporting organisations across regional NSW.

The Local Sport Defibrillator Grant Program provides up to \$3,000 to eligible sport and active recreation organisations for the purchase of AEDs at sports facilities.

Since the program commenced, more than 2,300 defibrillators have been funded for use at sports and recreation facilities across NSW. Applications for the Local Sport Defibrillator Grant Program close 1 December or when funding is exhausted.

Enforcement of tobacco licensing to commence as grace period ends for retailers

The three-month grace period for NSW retailers and wholesalers to apply for a licence to sell tobacco or non-tobacco smoking products as part of the NSW Government's new Tobacco Licensing Scheme ends today.

Retailers must now have a valid tobacco licence and display it at the point of sale to sell tobacco or non-tobacco smoking products. Those who continue to do so without holding and displaying the license will face penalties.

If a retailer or wholesaler has submitted a valid licence application on or before 1 October 2025, they can continue to trade until notified of the outcome of their application.

The Minns Labor Government gave retailers and wholesalers a three-month grace period from 1 July to 1 October to apply for a licence, after the Tobacco Licensing Scheme laws came into effect. The new Centre for Regulation and Enforcement (CRE) in NSW Health is a dedicated unit created to strengthen compliance and enforcement and will work closely with state and federal agencies to ensure a unified approach.

The licensing scheme comes into effect after the previous Liberal Government failed to implement the reform, leaving NSW the last state in the nation to do so.

The Minns Labor Government has now also passed the Tobacco Legislation (Closure Orders) Amendment Act 2025, adding to some of the toughest illegal tobacco penalties in Australia.

This Act, expected to be in effect in the coming months, will increase the maximum penalties for anyone caught selling products without a valid licence from \$11,000 (first offence) or \$44,000 (second offence) up to \$660,000 for individuals and from \$220,000 up to \$880,000 for a corporation.

The Act will also introduce the power to issue short-term (up to 90 days) and long-term (up to 12 months) closure orders for premises selling illicit tobacco or illegal vaping goods or selling tobacco or non-tobacco smoking products without a licence.

A new offence will also come into effect for the commercial possession of illicit tobacco, with a maximum penalty of up to \$1.54 million, 7 years' imprisonment, or both, and a new maximum penalty will commence for the sale of illicit tobacco of up to \$1.54 million, 7 years' imprisonment, or both.

Businesses can apply for a licence online using their MyServiceNSW account via the Service NSW website. Applicants are required to complete an online application, provide a recent criminal records check and pay the yearly licence fee. Businesses can get support to submit their licence application by calling the Tobacco Information Line on 1800 357 412.





The even greater outdoors: Red tape overhaul frees up venues and outdoor events

The next round of **NSW Government** vibrancy reforms is amping up culture making it easier for councils, businesses and communities to stage events, host live performances and activate outdoor spaces.

The new Cultural State Environmental Planning Policy will reduce the amount of time it takes to have an event, gig or festival approved by the local council or state agency, removing outdated and lengthy planning pathways for simple and fun events. This responds to the recent NSW Productivity Commissioner's report which highlighted a potential \$8 billion uplift in the NSW night-time economy if unnecessary red tape was reduced to allow venues and events to expand their offering.

It also delivers on a Labor election commitment to support music venues, energise the 24-hour economy and make it simpler for cafes, bars, restaurants and venues to host events and extend trading hours.

We're giving councils, businesses, and communities greater flexibility to create and support local entertainment opportunities, allowing more events, extended trading and easier outdoor activation.

The Minns Labor Government is building better communities and that means rebuilding vibrancy and the 24-hour economy which is still recovering from a decade of lockouts and then lockdowns.

To support the rollout, the NSW Government will release practical resources including a Vibrancy Guidelines and an Events Guide to help councils and businesses make the most of the new opportunities.

These changes are part of the Cultural SEPP, that will be implemented through updates to the Codes SEPP 2008, to support creative, cultural and hospitality opportunities across NSW, and drive a thriving, inclusive 24-hour economy. For more information, visit Night-time economy | Planning







Marine Rescue Batemans Bay enhances lifesaving capability with new rescue watercraft

Marine Rescue Batemans Bay has taken delivery of two new state-of-the-art rescue watercraft (RWCs - jet skis), significantly boosting the unit's ability to respond rapidly to emergencies on local waters.

The Seadoo jet skis, known as BM 10 and BM 11, are capable of speeds up to 93 km/h and are designed to operate on enclosed and offshore waters around Batemans Bay. Each craft can carry two crew members and transport a rescued person on a sled, providing vital versatility in time-critical missions.

This is the first time the Batemans Bay unit has operated RWCs, with Marine Rescue Tuross Moruya the only other South Coast unit with the vessels currently in their fleet. Both RWCs are expected to be operational before the end of spring.

Marine Rescue Batemans Bay Unit Commander Rod Ingamells said the new watercraft would enable volunteers to reach casualties in areas inaccessible to larger vessels.

"These are rapid-response craft; they are very quick, and they can get into areas that our normal rescue craft cannot access, particularly shallow areas," he said.

"The training for rescue watercraft operators is comprehensive, and a certain level of fitness is required because of the nature of the craft and the operating environment." The unit is now calling for new volunteers to join its 90-strong team, particularly to operate the rescue watercraft.

"We are hoping to recruit the next generation of volunteer to Marine Rescue Batemans Bay," Unit Commander Ingamells said. "People interested in volunteering with the unit can contact us directly or visit the Marine Rescue NSW website at

www.marinerescuensw.com.au. No prior experience is required - we provide full training, uniforms and support."

Since the start of 2025, Marine Rescue Batemans Bay volunteers have carried out 93 search and rescue missions, including 56 emergency responses, bringing 170 people safely back to shore.

The new RWCs have been funded through community donations and the unit's own fundraising initiatives. Unit Commander Ingamells thanked local residents and businesses for their ongoing support.

"We are grateful for the generosity of the community and local businesses, who play a vital role in helping us continue our mission of saving lives on the water," he said.

Tackle World Moruya Fishing report

26.9.25

Moruya River.

The fishing in the river is starting to improve incrementally as the days get longer, and the water gets warmer. If we have a look at the sea surface temp charts, the cold water that has been hugging the coast is slowly starting to be displaced by the warmer currents that are moving down the coast.

This will mea that the water coming into the Moruya system on an incoming tide will quickly start to warm as the cooler water is replaced with the warmer currents that are pushing south. There are still good schools of salmon and tailor working the river on an oncoming tide, with the areas lower down the system (spur wall and Preddy's wharf), having the greater pelagic activity.

The shallow sand flats are warming quickly this time of year, and the bream and flatties are looking for a feed over these warmer areas, a great place to throw a soft plastic, hardy body or position a bait.

If you have been pumping nippers, then fish the area you were collecting bait, as you have provided plenty of turned over ground and food for cruising bream or flathead. We do need a bit more water temp for the whiting to become more active, but there may be a few lurking around.

Upstream in the fresh, the bass will be starting to move upstream, and become more active as the days get longer. If you like throwing surface lures at bass, come in and check out the new Daiwa Bait Junkie Kicker Walker frogs, with a walk the dog action, these surface lures will stay in the strike zone longer for those explosive surface bites we all like.

Tuross River.

Coila lake continues to warm quickly with lots of sun and longer days helping things along. Bream and flathead will all be concentrating their predatory efforts over these shallow warm areas, chasing prawns and the small bait fish this system is full of. Hard body lures and soft plastics are great options in this system, while bait is always a constant performer and a more relaxed way to fish.

The Tuross system itself, is also waking from a long cold winter period. The lower section are seeing good numbers of salmon working the incoming tide, but as the water temps climb, expect them to leave the system.

Flathead are becoming more active as we move into spring along with the bream.

Estuary perch will also be a good option to chase, look for good lay down snags for the fish to school up in, or they will also be found over ribbon weed beds.

The deeper holes are always worth a look, as mulloway, flathead and bream are always lurking in these deeper holes. Up in the fresh, the bass are also on the move, so get out and explore this weekend, there are plenty of places to search!

Rock and Beach.

The salmon are plentiful along all the local beaches at the moment, you just need to find where they are hiding. Windsock always has a good gutter, and is a good place to start looking. The breakwall at Moruya is always worth a look, just remember the road to the airport along north head drive is currently closed for road works, so you will have to take the detour through Broulee to fish here or windsock.

Offshore.

The YFT bite has pushed out wider this week, as the cold water in close has been pushed further south as the warm currents continue to push down the coast. They are still a very viable option, but a bit more travelling will be required. Snapper and flathead have started to once again dominate the inshore bite this week, so there are plenty of options if you want to push offshore this weekend. Saturday does look to have the better conditions, as a southerly will push through on Sunday. We have old model Shimano Nasci reels on sale, at 30% off RRP, with the arrival of this seasons new model in store. I have a restock on Saragossa 14000 size reels, if you are wanting to chase the YFT. Don't forget we still have that deal on the lan Miller popper rod/ Saltiga reel deal available that has free line, lure and leader when you buy the rod and reel at full price. Saty safe everyone and remember, "Everyday's a good day for fishing..
