**Eurobodalla Council is seeking expressions of** interest from organisations interested in leasing the former Batemans Bay Community Centre, 3-5 Museum Place, Batemans Bay.

The facility includes a range of rooms – small and large – and toilets, kitchenette and outdoor space. Expressions should include detailed information on expected community benefits from the lease and how its proposed use can generate economic activity.

The full assessment criteria can be found on the tenders and eoi page on Council's website, with the expressions of interest period extended and now closing at 4pm on Thursday 18 December 2025.

## Have Your Say on the new Disability Inclusion Action Plan

**Eurobodalla Council** is inviting residents, businesses, and service providers to have their say on the development of the new Disability Inclusion Action Plan 2026–2029, a key document shaping a more accessible and inclusive future for the shire.

The DIAP is Council's commitment to ensuring every ability is celebrated, every voice is heard, and everyone belongs in our community. It builds on the success of the previous iteration and aligns with the NSW Disability Inclusion Act 2014 by identifying and outlining actions to remove barriers to participation for people with disability. Director of community arts & recreation Kathy Arthur said the DIAP is our roadmap to creating equal opportunities for all residents. "It focuses on tangible actions to help people living with disability fully participate in community life, access services, and find meaningful employment in Eurobodalla."

The DIAP 2026-2029 is underpinned by four key pillars that drive meaningful inclusion across the community:

Attitudes and Behaviours: Challenging societal attitudes, prejudices, and behaviours to foster an inclusive, welcoming environment.

Liveable Communities: Ensuring communities are accessible, safe, and adaptable, promoting inclusion in both physical spaces and services.

Employment: Enhancing opportunities for meaningful employment, fostering inclusive workplaces, and reducing barriers for people with disability in the workforce.

Systems and Processes: Streamlining processes, systems, and service delivery to ensure accessibility, efficiency, and responsiveness. Consultation on the new DIAP began with the Disability Inclusion Advisory Committee in October 2025, ensuring community engagement and the Plan itself are informed by people with lived experience of disability.

Community consultation is now open and concludes on 15 December 2025. You can provide feedback and contribute to the new Plan by: completing the <u>online survey</u> or picking up a printed version from Eurobodalla libraries, leisure centres, the ESC Customer Service Centre, or the Botanical Gardens Garden Shop.

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## Concerns over proposed closure and sale of Coopers Island Road



A Eurobodalla Council proposal to close and sell a public road reserve known as Coopers Island Road, Bodalla, has raised concerned from the community.

Council is proposing to close and sell Coopers Island Road at Trunketabella, following a Crown Lands survey confirming there is no access to public land or water. Upon closure, Eurobodalla Shire Council proposes to negotiate the sale of the land. This proposal reverses a decision made in 2021 to keep the road open to the public.

Coopers Island Road had traditionally been used to access the waterway of Bowns Creek for fishing, kayaking and prawning.

In 2017 the property at Coopers Island changed hands and in 2019 a gate was constructed by the landowner at the entrance from the Princes Highway.

In 2021 a dozen concerned residents (some representing larger groups) presented to council on the closure of the road by a gate, installed in 2019.

#### In June 2021 a report to Council said:

"Coopers Island Road was converted to a public road in the 1930s and is currently a public road. The road is used by the owners to access their property and has been used by the public to access the Tuross Lake system for recreational fishing. Recreational fishers park near the causeway to fish from the causeway, bank and bridge and to launch kayaks into the waterway. This provides access to a long arm of the Tuross Lake system.

The Department of Primary Industries (Fisheries) has designated the Tuross River and estuary (Lake) as a Recreational Fishing Haven (RFH). The waterway adjacent to Coopers Island Road is part of this designated RFH. RFH, areas largely free of commercial fishing, were created along the NSW coast to provide better angling opportunities for recreational fishers. Money raised from the NSW Recreational Fishing Fee enabled a \$20 million buyout to create the areas. These havens also promote tourism and create employment in the local area. Public access to Crown Waterways over Council owned or Crown Roads

Representation has been received from the Office of the NSW Crown Land Commissioner on 31 May 2021 regarding public access to Crown Waterways over Council owned or Crown Roads which states: 'Please be advised that the Commissioner is of the view that, as a matter of principle, it is of the utmost importance to retain public access to Crown Waterways over Council owned or Crown Roads, and that those roads should not be privatised to exclude that public access'."

Also that "The rural zoning of the farmland does not preclude fishers or other members of the public accessing Bowns Creek via Coopers Island Road."

"The landowner, the fishers and the public alike, must obey the relevant road rules made under the Roads Act and any signs or notices that may be erected by Council with respect to the use of the road.

"These rules make it clear that the users of public roads must behave in a way that accommodates the rights of all other users of the road, subject to any specific requirement to the contrary in the legislation. Hence, the landowner must accommodate the fishers' right to use the road to gain access to, and to stop and fish on or near, the crossing, and, similarly, the fishers and the public must accommodate the landowner's right to pass along the road, move machinery along the road and drive stock along the road.

The public road currently consists of the causeway and the bridge and the road reserves. Maintenance of the road and the bridge over Bowns Creek by Council is approximately \$4000 to \$6000 annually. If the road reserve is sold, maintenance and replacement costs will be borne by the owners. The replacement value of the assets are \$389,000.

A MOTION was carried (Crs Pollock/Mayne) THAT Council: 1. Does not close or sell Coopers Island Road to the property owner of Lot 2 DP 12290 as noted in the confidential attachment.

2. Allocates up to \$40,000 from the 2020-21 budget to realign the road back onto the road reserve and other associated works to improve safety and the operational management of the property to ensure minimising conflict between livestock and road users.

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


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#### Concerns over proposed closure and sale of Coopers Island Rd Submissions Batemans Bay

Continued from previous page >> On 10<sup>th</sup> November 2025 Council advised "a detailed Crown Solicitors' investigation has revealed the causeway and adjoining land are privately owned.

Council's director of finance and corporate services Stephanie Speedy says it makes sense to close the road and transfer ownership to the adjoining property owner.

"Without access to public land and water, there is no community benefit to keeping and maintaining Coopers Island Road," Ms Speedy says.

After multiple requests from the public, Crown Lands released a map and explanation for their new advice, that the causeway is not Crown Land.

## A spokesperson for Crown Lands in the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure said:

· Coopers Island Road is a public council road managed by Eurobodalla Shire Council.

. Crown Lands completed a detailed historical status investigation to establish ownership of the Coopers Island causeway which determined the causeway was not Crown land.

#### On background

- · Crown Lands has advised Council that:
- •The causeway is constructed on land forming the bed and banks of Bowns Creek, which separates Lot 2 from Lot 2A DP 12290.
- •The causeway is categorised as a fixture and is owned by the owner of the land to which it is affixed, being Lots 2 and 2A.
- ·A survey commissioned by Crown Lands confirmed there is no public access to the causeway or Bowns Creek from the Council managed public road Coopers Island Road.
- · For fishers, there is fishing access and facilities around the area of Tuross Bridge including a public boat ramp offering access into the river.
- · A sketch showing indicative ownership of the Coopers Island Road and causeway site is below: See at left.

Yesterday Crown Lands wrote to a resident saying: "Due to significant public safety concerns at Coopers Island causeway (and bridge), the Department undertook a detailed historical status investigation into ownership of the causeway."

Council will accept written submissions regarding this proposal until 12 December 2025 at 4pm. Any person is entitled to make submissions to Council with respect to the proposed road closure.

There will be a Public Access forum at Council on Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> December and the last Monthly meeting for the year on Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> December

## Free Mobile Vet Clinic comes to Moruva

The AWL NSW Animal Care Truck has been touring regional NSW for nearly three years thanks to support from the NSW Government The Animal Welfare League NSW are parking their state-of-the-art mobile vet clinic in Moruya this Friday offering free pet vaccinations, health checks and microchipping to local pet owners. Environmental health & regulatory services coordinator Noel Fuller is inviting the community to come along, save money and keep their cats and dogs healthy.

"Rangers are called to collect hundreds of lost and wandering animals every year," Mr Fuller said. "When a pet is microchipped, we're able to identify the owner and return their animal quickly and safely."

In NSW, it's mandatory to have your pet microchipped by the time they reach 12 weeks of age, with the cost of the procedure ranging between \$60 to \$90.

Mr. Fuller also encouraged local pet owners to take advantage of discount desexing vouchers which will be available on the day.

"Desexing can cost around \$500, depending on the size of the dog. To help with the cost, come and meet the AWL volunteers who'll be giving out desexing vouchers."

The AWL NSW Animal Care Truck will be at Gundary Oval, Moruya, on Friday 5 December, from 8am to 11am.

## Southern Phone penalised \$2.5M for anti-scam breaches

Southern Phone Company Limited has paid a \$2,500,560 penalty for breaching anti-scam laws following an Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) crackdown on mobile number fraud.

The **ACMA** <u>investigation</u> found Southern Phone breached the rules on 168 occasions over an 8-month period between July 2024 and February 2025, when scammers were able to manipulate the telco's systems to bypass required identity verification processes.

Scammers were able to gain control of consumers' mobile number services and access their bank accounts, with 20 consumers reporting combined losses of at least \$393,000. Authority Member Samantha Yorke said Southern Phone had exposed people to serious financial harm and stress over a long period.

"Many individuals suffered substantial financial losses, and we know that identity fraud can cause lasting emotional distress," Ms Yorke said.

"The vulnerabilities in Southern Phone's systems went undetected for over a year and should have been identified and addressed much earlier to prevent consumers experiencing this harm.

"The penalty paid in this case is the highest imposed by the ACMA for breaches of this kind and reflects the seriousness and scale of Southern Phone's failures."

In addition to the financial penalty, the ACMA has accepted a 36-month court-enforceable undertaking from the business that requires an independent review of its processes, regular security tests of its systems and reporting to the ACMA.

Disrupting mobile number fraud is a current ACMA <u>compliance priority</u>. The ACMA is actively monitoring compliance with fraud prevention obligations and will take strong enforcement action if non-compliance is found. Telcos have paid over \$4.6M in penalties under the current crackdown.

"This is the third enforcement action we have taken this year that has involved scammers exploiting a vulnerability in a telco's number porting processes. Telcos need to acknowledge that this is an established technique being used by scammers and harden their defences," Ms Yorke said.

The Telecommunications (Mobile Number Pre-Porting Additional Identity Verification) Industry Standard 2020 sets out rules requiring telcos to verify the identity of people wanting to transfer their numbers to a new provider before a transfer is completed.

Consumers should contact their telco and financial institution immediately if they think they have been a victim of a phone scam. It also helps other Australians by <u>reporting scams to Scamwatch</u>.

Brad said "With the closure of stores such as 'Rivers' in Batemans Bay we hope to fill a gap and will specialise in quality fashion, bric-a-brac and manchester. Our new store is centrally located and close to the business district of Batemans Bay. There is an abundance of parking and with our experienced volunteer workforce, service is prompt and helpful."

The store has a spacious layout.

Brad said "We have deliberately not crowded the store with merchandise. People can move freely and the entrance and aisles are wheelchair accessible. This store is bigger than our old one and we are providing quality second hand items as well as some new stock."

All profits from the store are funnelled back into the community by way of the Salvation Army Church run programs.

Brad said "The Church runs a number of social programs including the weekly Wednesday community kitchen providing meals for those in need. There are a range of other services such as assistance with domestic violence and a referral centre for persons seeking assistance."

Batemans Bay's beloved Crank It Up Festival has taken out the top honour at the 2025 NSW Tourism Awards, winning Gold for Best Festival and Event Under 50,000 People. The accolade marks a remarkable milestone for an event that began only four years ago with a simple goal: to bring the community together and help revitalise the region after the devastating 2019/20 bushfires and the challenges of Covid shutdowns. What started as a one-night retro music gathering has grown into a four-day celebration of all things vintage, nostalgic, and custom culture—set along the picturesque Batemans Bay foreshore. Today, Crank It Up attracts more than 8,500 attendees, with 82% travelling from outside the local area, delivering significant economic benefits to the Eurobodalla region.

Created and run by local couple Leisa and Chris Tague, the festival has become a fixture on the NSW events calendar.

"We had been to a few other similar festivals around Australia and could see the happiness in everyone who attended," said Festival Director Chris Tague. "But more importantly, we could see the huge benefit it brings to the local economy from all the visitors to the area."

For those unfamiliar, Crank It Up showcases the very best of 1950s culture with a modern twist:

- •14 bands across 6 stages
- •Over 300 pre-1980 show cars including hot rods, classics, and customs
- Vintage-inspired market stalls
- Interactive kids' areas
- And dancing... lots and lots of dancing.

"It's primarily free for the community to come and enjoy," added Chris. "The event is designed for everyone—from young families to long-time rockers. We close Clyde Street and activate the entire foreshore to show off the best the Bay has to offer."

The Crank It Up team says the win came as a genuine surprise, given the high calibre of finalists. They were especially delighted to see the Narooma Oyster Festival take home Silver in the same category—another major win for the region.



"We are continually amazed at the feedback from people who attend our event," said Chris. "They go away as ambassadors—not just for Crank It Up, but for the entire Eurobodalla. Many of them are already planning their return." Although the festival wasn't intended to become Batemans Bay's signature event,

Crank It Up has grown into a cultural cornerstone. For one long weekend each year, it transforms the town into a vibrant hub of music, colour, chrome, and community spirit—creating memories that last a lifetime.

Dr Michael Holland MP Member for Bega congratulated the award winners.

Dr Holland said "Crank It Up is a homegrown success story. What began as an idea to lift community spirits after the bushfires has become a dynamic and iconic event. A well-earned accolade at the 2025 NSW Tourism Awards.

This award is a testament to the creativity, passion and sheer hard work of Leisa and Chris Tague and their dedicated volunteer team. They've created an event that brings joy to thousands and delivers real economic benefits for the Eurobodalla. Projects like this remind us how refreshing and inspiring community collaboration can be. A bright future indeed!"



## new mid-rise homes on the fast track

The Minns Labor Government has launch 9 new architectdesigned mid-rise apartment building patterns as the next phase of the world leading NSW Housing Pattern Book, which is helping to accelerate the delivery of new homes across the state.

This follows over a decade of inaction to address the lack of housing in NSW under the former Government, which has resulted in Sydney losing twice as many young people as it's gaining according to a recent NSW Productivity Commission

The mid-rise apartment designs unveiled today range from 3 to 6 storeys and are in addition to the 8 low-rise home patterns released in July offering a broad suite of new housing options for growing communities. The 9 patterns include 4 designs for small lots, 3 designs for large lots and 2 designs for corner lots.

Designed by leading architectural firms from Australia and New Zealand, the new mid-rise patterns support housing needs at every stage of life.

The patterns will help enable the Minns Labor Government's Low and Mid-rise Housing Policy that is set to deliver 112,000 homes across New South Wales over the next five years, responding to growing demand for terraces, town houses and mid-rise apartment buildings in well-located areas. The patterns are light-filled and cross-ventilated, maximise solar access and have been designed to Australian Building Codes Board Liveable Housing Design Standard They have been designed to enable ease of construction, while also offering architect designs that are modern, adaptable, cost effective and energy-efficient.

The mid-rise patterns currently require a DA to be submitted to local councils, however the Government has reduced assessment requirements by providing guidance to councils that will allow them to halve the average DA assessment times for these patterns.

New planning laws just passed by the Parliament will enable an even faster and simpler planning pathway in the new year, with the mid-rise pattern book to be prioritised for access to the Government's newly created targeted assessment

The patterns will be available at a subsidised introductory price of \$1500 for small lot and corner lot designs and \$2500 for large lot designs for the first 6 months, which is only one per cent of the typical costs for architect designs.

#### Farmers back historic Right to Repair reform

Farmers have thrown their support behind the Federal Albanese Labor Government's decision to extend Right to Repair reforms to agricultural machinery, a practical change that will deliver fairness, competition and productivity gains across the farm sector. For too long, farmers have faced costly delays because critical repair information was locked away by manufacturers. When a tractor breaks down in the middle of harvest, every hour counts. This reform means farmers will have real choice about who repairs their machinery, and independent repairers will have the information they need to compete.

The Productivity Commission estimates that extending Right to Repair to agriculture could lift annual GDP by \$97 million through increased grain outputs alone, simply by reducing downtime during harvest.

This is on top of new figures released this week showing the agriculture industry is on track to reach a record value of almost \$100 billion this financial year under the Albanese Labor Government. Farmers have welcomed the announcement.

National Farmers' Federation President Hamish McIntyre said the reform will deliver "less downtime, lower costs, and more control over their own businesses." GrainGrowers CEO Shona Gawel called the commitment "landmark," while Victorian Farmers' Federation President Brett Hosking described it as "game-changing." NSW Farmers President Xavier Martin said the reform will allow farmers to support qualified local repairers, reducing costs and wait times. Treasury, working with the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, will engage farmers, manufacturers and repairers on expanding Australia's existing Right to Repair framework to agricultural machinery. This collaborative approach mirrors the success of the Motor Vehicle Service and Repair Information Sharing Scheme, which has already boosted productivity for independent mechanics by up to 40 per cent.

Right to Repair is about more than fixing machines. It's about fairness, resilience and sustainability. It reduces waste, keeps valuable equipment in use and strengthens local skills. Every harvest saved from delay, every dollar kept in a regional town, adds up to a stronger economy.




#### Magnitude 3.5 earthquake strikes near Narooma

## Let's do coffee with ... Rachel McInnes

Newcastle, Alice Springs, Tenant Creek, South East Asia backpacking, London, Scotland, Bournemouth, New York, Canada all over, Alaska, Kambalda, Adelaide, Argentina, crisscross Australia ... and, now ... Potato Point. Rachel McInnes (RM) likes to travel ... a lot. The Moruya Mail (MM) had a coffee with Rachel in Narooma last week.

MM: It's Newcastle 1964. If Rachel McInnes was born a decade or so earlier. she surely would have been an 'Ask the Leyland Sister'\* given your penchant for travel and adventure rivalled the famous brothers located in your home town. Take us back to the 1960's in Newcastle, Rachel.

RM: (Smiles ...) Thanks for the coffee ... well ... my dad was a civil draftsman working for the local gas company. He taught himself to draw up house plans and it was a skill he passed on to me. As per the times, mum was 'stay at home' and looked after myself and my younger sister. I do have fond memories of visiting my

grandma's every Wednesday evening for dinner and as well as being a passionate gardener, she excelled at crafts, a skill I willingly acquired.

I went to Hillsborough Primary School and onto Cardiff High School. At 15 years and 9 months, I left school in Year 10. My mum would describe me as 'pigheaded' and only agreed I could leave school if I learned how to type. I duly complied and also took up employment with John Lewis & Partners' Department Store selling haberdashery.

By the age of 16 years I was secretary for the Store's management team, given my competency in typing ... thanks mum! I studied drafting at Tighes Hill Technical College at night for 2 years to become a tracer\*. At the ripe old age of 18 years I set up my own business as a contractor, skilled in tracing ... thanks dad! In that same year, I had a disagreement with my then boyfriend, saw an advertisement for a 3 months contract as a tracer in Alice Springs, packed my swag and headed to 'Alice'.

It is now 1983, and I am working on a mine site, 600 kms northwest of Alice Springs. I was hired as a draftsperson and the money was great. There were 120 people on site, only 5 women and we were accommodated in dongas. We flew back to Alice Springs for

weekends.

By 1st January 1988, I was on a plane to Southeast Asia along with every other young person following the 'Lonely Planet' bible all the way to London and even purchased the compulsory Volkswagen Kombi (with obligatory breakdowns) to end up in Scotland.

Following that adventure, I took a job as a draftsperson working in an architect's office in Bournemouth, 150 kms southwest of London.

Now ... my mother observed I use my hands a lot when I speak ... so I also studied 'sign language' at night ... thanks again, mum!

It is now 1990 and I head to the USA by myself to backpack the east coast. Of course, I was in and out of love numerous times, but we won't go into

I loved the idea of just backpacking, living simply and soaking up experiences and enjoying new friends. I would write home once a week, squeezing my adventures into tiny paragraphs inside flimsy blue aerograms.

A friend from England met up with me in New York and we headed to Canada and hitch hiked the east and west coasts and then up to Alaska. In hindsight, all so risky ... 2 girls on the road ... but fortunately, we only had one bad experience which we managed to talk our way out of trouble. We were literally travelling on a shoestring and stayed at youth hostels. Instead of paying for accommodation we would volunteer our labour. It was lots of fun. We ended up in Vancouver. My friend went back to England and I secured a job as a draftsperson in an architect's office.

1992 rolls around and my sister sorts a job for me at a mine site in Tenant Creek, so I head back to Australia.

MM: If adventure is measured in years, my calculations are you are about 102 years old. It must be time to settle down?

RM: (Laughs ...) Not really ... kind of .... sort of. Anyhow, to Tenant Creek. It was a very social town and buzzing on weekends. I also had a stall at the weekend markets selling my craft ware ... sewing, cards, nicnacs and the like ... thanks grandma!

At the end of 1993 a friend of a neighbour invited me to a party. The friend forewarned me that one of the invited guests, from Alice Springs, was somewhat of a 'charmer' and to be careful.

Six days later, this 24 year old geophysicist charmer proposed and three months later we are married, with all of Tenant Creek attending the wedding. My mum thought I was being my impetuous self up until she met him, and changed her mind rather

MM: What advice would you give a young Rachel McInnes?


RM: (Laughs ...) there is nothing wrong with being a little bit impetuous ... but seriously, life is easier, if you do the right thing and do not hurt others.


MM: It's been a great chat, Rachel. I am off for a nana nap after that yarn.

## 100 years ago from the Moruya Examiner





05-12-1925

For the month of November the Eurobodalla Shire Council will distribute £1,119 in wages alone. Sixty-six workmen will share in the distribution at an average of £16 19s 1d per man. Liberality of the newly constructed Main Roads Board in giving grants for repairs to flood damages, and maintenance of main roads, is chiefly responsible for the Shire Council to employ so many men on necessary works.

The Master, Mr. Lee, informs us that the dredge Ballina has not to go into dock, but is now doing excellent work in the channel near Mynora. [Moruya] The Crown Land sale of 40 acres of land at Schnapper Point, Bateman's Bay, was held on Wednesday last, the property being purchased by Mr. J. B. Farley, of Sydney.

Moruya's newly ordained Priest, Rev. Cletus Heffernan, will celebrate both Masses at the Sacred Heart Church tomorrow.

On Monday last one of Nerrigundah's oldest inhabitants passed away after a short illness, in the person of Daniel McVeity. Dan was the last of the McVeity brothers who came in the early days of the Gulph Diggings. They were well and favourably known throughout the district. Dan had complained of not feeling well, and on Friday his feet began to swell. He walked down to town on Saturday and went to church on Sunday. He then decided to consult the doctor in Moruya. After seeing the doctor he returned to O'Toole's home, where he was attended to by Nerrigundah's "Florence Nightingale," Mrs. O'Toole, until he passed peacefully away on Monday evening. The funeral was largely attended.

A sad burning fatality occurred at Mogo on Thursday, when an old age pensioner named Christie Yanner, aged 88, met his death. The District Coroner, Mr. R. J. Anderson, held an inquest. Several people were called to give statements. Neighbour Harold John Hawke deposed: Deceased was an invalid and I have frequently seen him smoking in bed. He was in the habit of reading whilst in bed by the light of a kerosene lamp set on a box close to the bed. About six weeks ago I was attracted by a fire in the bedroom. I ran from my place about 100 yards distant and found the building on fire, which I extinguished with water. Had I not noticed the fire on this occasion I am of the opinion the building would have been burnt. After hearing the evidence the Coroner found that the deceased had died through being burned in a fire which took place at his residence situated in Ison St., Mogo, on the 1st December, 1925, but whether the fire originated accidentally or otherwise, the evidence did not enable him to say.

#### Dog days of summer, drama free

Nobody wants their trip to the beach ruined by a dog running over towels, knocking over children, stealing fishing bait or – maybe worst of all – by stepping in dog poop.

That's the message from **Council's coordinator of environmental health and compliance Noel Fuller**. And he wants dog owners to act, particularly with the busy summer season in sight.

"The majority of dog owners do the right thing but a small percentage continue to turn a blind eye to wayward hounds, particularly at popular off-leash beaches. There a balance between the needs of dogs, their owners and other beach goers, and responsibility lies with the dog owners," Mr Fuller says.

"Except at signposted areas, dogs must always be leashed in public – that includes walking to any designated off-leash beaches and parks. Off leash is a privilege not a right, and if a dog wont' reliably come when called, it shouldn't be off leash."

Until Thursday 30 April 2026 dogs are only allowed at timeshare beaches – whether on or off leash – before 9am or after 5pm. From Friday 1 May to Saturday 31 October 2026, timeshare areas revert to 24-hour dog access. Council's website has an interactive map listing locations for 24-hour off leash, time share, and dogsprohibited beaches and parks.

Mr Fuller says dog owners should take other steps to ensure all beach users can enjoy a safe summer holiday.

"Off leash and dog walking etiquette keeps public areas harmonious. Do the right thing so everyone can enjoy their time outdoors."

Responsible dog walkers understand:

- Just because your dog is friendly, doesn't mean other dogs are. Some dogs can be anxious and easily overwhelmed.
- Never let your dog run up to another dog. Check with its owner first to see if your dog can say hello.
- ·Respect others' space and always put your dog on a leash when arriving and leaving the beach.
- Observe your dog's behaviour and keep them in sight. Owners often confuse dominant behaviours with play behaviours. Behaviours like inappropriate mounting and excessive barking is not acceptable.
- ·Take a bag and pick up your dog's poo.
- ·Avoid taking your dog to crowded areas and keep them away from children and people fishing.
- ·If a beach or area is not signposted, it means dogs are required to be on a leash.

## Early flying fox influx sees WIRES rescues surge in Eurobodalla

Flying foxes returned to Eurobodalla weeks ahead of their usual schedule this year.

**Eurobodalla Council's** natural resources officer India Howlett says that may be due to many reasons, including dry spring conditions along much of the coast.

"With less forest flowers currently blooming, we expect more of the bats to follow their nose into gardens seeking food. For residents protecting their fruit trees, it's essential they use wildlife-friendly netting." Ms Howlett says.

"Standard household nets easily entangle flying foxes, as well as birds and other wildlife. If you can push your finger through the holes, the net's not safe for wildlife."

Flying foxes are key to forest health, pollinating eucalypt species and spreading native seeds across large distances to keep ecosystems functioning. Grey-headed flying foxes – the species found in Eurobodalla – are listed as threatened and are fully protected.

"It's wrong, and illegal, to harass flying foxes. And if you come across a flying fox in trouble do not touch it as special handling is needed and appropriate vaccinations essential – for the bat's health and for yours," Ms Howlett says.

"This applies if you see a flying fox that is alone hanging low to or on the the ground, caught on powerlines or fences, or is a pup without its mother. In these cases, call WIRES so trained experts can rescue and rehabilitate the troubled bat. There's also the IFAW Wildlife Rescue app for our phone that lists your options based on your location."

The local WIRES branch has already juggled a bumper season of flying fox rescues, with their first call-out on Friday 17 October for a powerline electrocution, though calls for help have now stabilised. Many rescues involved females carrying babies and powerline incidents remain the most common.

WIRES Mid-South Coast flying fox coordinator Shelley Clarke says the pattern is consistent across rescue groups along the coast.

"Dry conditions and scarce food are pushing flying foxes into riskier spots, and volunteers are seeing more babies coming into care as a result," Ms Clarke says.

"Barbed wire, particularly on farms, is another hazard for flying foxes, especially during lean times when they are travelling further for food. Smooth wire or removing the top strand entirely can save the lives of flying foxes and other wildlife like gliders and raptors."

Ms Howlett says Eurobodalla has nine flying fox camps at Batemans Bay water gardens, the Catalina golf club, Moruya Heads, Moruya's Riverside Park, Moruya central (by the golf course), Moruya east (near the Princes Highway and South Head Road intersection), Tuross Head, Potato Point and Narooma.



Young flying foxes in WIRES care. The organisations qualified rescuers had a bumper crop this year, with bats arriving early than usual to Eurobodalla.

Currently there are 250 flying foxes at Catalina and 500 at Riverside Park. While numbers can fluctuate Council keeps up-to-date estimates of local populations, which generally visit the shire from early summer to mid-winter.

"People interested in the numbers can visit the <u>flying foxes page</u> on Council's website," says Ms Howlett.

"Those numbers are accurate and updated frequently while the bats visit our region. There is also the <u>Australian Flying Fox Monitor</u> site that keeps track of numbers nationally, but keep in mind it is not always timely."

Ms Howlett reminds residents that Council is not able to move flying foxes on from their camps but can help minimise their impact on residents.

"Just get in touch and we can offer advice and assistance on managing noise and odour if they are a problem. Council also has its <u>Flying Fox Management Plan</u>, which is worth a look for people wanting to know more about living with this keystone species," she says.

"Just use common sense. If you are walking near a flying fox camp, stick to the tracks where the bats are used to seeing people – that helps reduce their stress. Get your washing off the line before dark if you are under a flight path.

"Flying foxes have been part of Eurobodalla's landscape for thousands of years. The key is balance – supporting a critical species that is struggling while keeping people safe and residents living comfortably alongside these great nocturnal gardeners."

## Wild about Eurobodalla - Gillie and Marc sculpture donations



The Splendid Fairywren Loved Adventure with Rabbitwoman and Dogman' installation in Narooma.

No, you're not seeing things. Council is installing 22 large bronze sculptures around the shire (as reported in the MM in May). This week a 3.5m high, 1.2 tonne Gorilla called Mina was installed at Batehaven and another 'The Splendid Fairywren Loved Adventure with Rabbitwoman and Dogman' in Narooma.

These are part of 22 sculptures by Gillie and Marc donated to Eurobodalla Shire Council under the Cultural Gifts program which provides a tax break for the artists. Valued at \$1.6m the installation budget is \$27,000 for the Shire.

Part of the 'Wild About Babies' collection, these sculptures are found all around the word.

Wild About Babies celebrates endangered species and raises awareness of their plight, highlighting the importance of wildlife conservation in a way that's accessible and fun.

The sculptures from this series include: Wild Mother Eastern Lowland Gorilla, Wild Baby Sumatran Orangutan, Wild Baby Leopard, Wild Baby Giraffe, Wild Baby Bengal Tiger, Wild Baby Grevy's Zebra, Wild Baby Giant Panda, Wild Baby Cheetah, Wild Baby White Rhino, Wild Baby Marsican Brown Bear, Wild Baby Chimpanzee, Wild Baby Polar Bear, Wild Baby Lion, Wild Baby Arctic Fox, Wild Baby Indian Elephant, Wild Baby Western Lowland, Wild Baby African Elephant, Wild Baby Giant Tortoise, Wild Baby Rock Wallaby, Wild Baby Javan Rhino, and Wild Baby Hippo.

The sculptures are proposed for sites across Eurobodalla, stretching from Nelligen to Narooma. Locations have been carefully selected to align with existing amenities and natural foot traffic—places where people already gather for recreation and connection.

Moruya is set to see an arctic fax and rock wallaby near the Council chambers and bear and a tortoise at Riverside Park.

# Southern Annular Mode in most positive state in 1,000 years, review finds Monash University

A new scientific review has revealed that the Southern Annular Mode (SAM), the Southern Hemisphere's most influential climate driver, is now in its most positive state in over 1,000 years. If greenhouse gas emissions continue to rise, this positive state is projected to persist throughout the 21st Century, with long-term implications for Antarctica and the Southern Ocean.

Published yesterday in <u>Nature Reviews Earth and Environment</u>, the review was led by Monash University researcher, Dr Ariaan Purich, from <u>Securing Antarctica's Environmental Future</u> (SAEF), in collaboration with scientists from across the Australian climate and Antarctic science communities. The paper synthesises the current knowledge on the dynamics and projections of the SAM, and its impacts on Antarctica and the Southern Ocean.

Dr Purich said understanding how the SAM will change is essential to inform climate projections over the 21st Century and beyond. "The SAM influences temperature, rainfall, ocean circulation and Antarctic ice. Because it affects so many parts of the climate system, we need to know how it will change so we can better anticipate the challenges facing Antarctica and the Southern Hemisphere in the decades ahead," Dr Purich said.

The SAM's three phases, neutral, positive and negative, describe the shifts in atmospheric pressure between Antarctica and the mid-latitudes, which influence the strength and position of the westerly winds that circle the Southern Ocean. When the SAM enters a positive phase, the westerly winds tighten and move towards Antarctica. When it moves into a negative phase, these winds expand back towards Australia.

SAM's influence can be significant. In the spring of 2022, a positive SAM contributed to the unusually high rainfall across southeastern Australia, leading to flooding across Victoria and the Melbourne region.

"Our review shows that since the mid-20th Century, the SAM has trended towards more frequent positive phases due to both ozone depletion and increasing greenhouse gas concentrations," Dr Purich said.

"With ozone levels now stabilising and projected to recover due to the success of the Montreal Protocol, greenhouse gases are becoming the dominant driver of the SAM's ongoing positive trend." Modelling assessed in the review shows that under high emission pathways, SAM is likely to continue trending towards its positive phase over the coming century. However, under low emissions pathways, the SAM could stabilise by 2050 and begin returning to its historical range by 2100.

A persistent positive SAM is expected to reduce the Southern Ocean's ability to absorb excess carbon dioxide, causing our climate to become warmer. This is because stronger, southward-shifted winds bring more warm, nutrient-rich water to the surface, releasing more carbon from deep in the ocean into the atmosphere, in turn reducing the ocean's capacity as a net carbon sink.

## Tis the Season... 3 sea turtles in 3 days

Conservation of Australian Seabirds and Turtles Incorporated reports: As the weather warms and ocean conditions shift, we're entering the time of year when distressed sea turtles are more frequently washed ashore. These turtles may be exhausted, injured, sick, entangled, or suffering from buoyancy issues — and they urgently need help.

If you spot a sea turtle on the beach, whether it appears alive, weak, or unresponsive, please report it immediately. Early intervention is often the difference between life and death.

Contact Conservation of Australian Seabirds and Turtles Incorporated (COAST) 24/7 Hotline: 0431 282 238

Download the IFAW Wildlife Rescue App to find your closest wildlife rescue group, as they will have trained responders who can attend, assess the turtle, and bring it into care if needed.

These cases are then transferred to Wildlife Rescue South Coast (WRSC) – the licensed rehabilitation organisation for sea turtles in our region. Belinda, in particular, is the dedicated rehabilitator who received the three turtles featured in the photos shared.

Even turtles that look "just resting" may be in serious trouble. Never attempt to push them back into the water. Your call ensures they get the proper veterinary and rehabilitation support.

What to do if you find a turtle:

- Call the COAST rescue hotline or use the IFAW App ASAP
- Keep a safe distance and avoid touching the animal unless directed to by the rescue hotline coordinator under their guidance
- Take a photo from each side of the animal if it is safe to do so
- Note its condition and exact location where it was found
- If safe, stay nearby until help arrives

Every report helps protect these endangered species — thank you for keeping an eye out along our coastline.

#### Tackle World Moruya Fishing report 28.11.25

#### Moruya River.

We are officially in the Black Friday Sale weekend, and fingers crossed the weather brings a few people into town this weekend to make the most of the store wide savings we have until Monday afternoon. 20-50% off RRP storewide, some exceptions do apply.

The river has been fishing well, with flathead, bream, trevally, whiting and Luderick all being reported throughout the system. The whiting have been readily taking live nippers or squirt worms, with the surface bite really only a degree or two of water temp increase away. Back of the hole in the wall, the airport flats, quarry wharf and the flats under the town bridge are good places to start looking, with Preddy's wharf and the town wharf also well worth a look.

Further upstream, the flats and holes around the hospital are always worth a look, and up in the fresh the bass are plentiful.

#### Turóss River.

I have had reports that the Pros did reasonably well on the prawns this dark in Coila lake. While the dark has passed, there should still be a few prawns around.

The Tuross system itself, yet again, tops the local fishing activity, with bream, flathead, whiting, mulloway and Luderick all being reported.

We really are spoilt for choice in the Tuross system, as it offers excellent lure and bait fishing for a myriad of species. If you have an itch for something, Tuross more than likely can help you scratch that itch.

#### Rock and Beach.

The wind the last few days, has made fishing the exposed beaches very difficult. For those that have managed to get out, salmon, bream and whiting have all been options along the coast this past week.

Paternoster rigged pilchards on gang hooks for the salmon, and worms or pipis on either running sinker or light paternoster rigs have bought a bream or whiting undone.

As the water temps continue to warm, expect to start seeing kings or Bonito from the stones on either lures or live baits.

#### Offshore.

There has been reports from much further north, that the first Marlin of the season have been caught, tagged and released, which can only mean that it won't be too long now before those northern fish find their way down south.

Snapper continue to be available in slightly deeper water now that the temps are coming up. Try in and around the 30-50m marks for a red or two, while flathead are readily available in waters as shallow as 10m.

Keep an eye on the weather conditions, as the wind are still predicted for the weekend along with seas to 2m.

The bait freezer has been restocked again this week, with a good supply of worms acquired, and hawksbury prawns still available, along wit's all the usual baits required to find a fish or two this weekend.

Black Friday deals continue u til close of business on Monday, so come in and make the most of the savings, 20-50% off, store wide. As usual, some exceptions apply.

Moonmist Accolade

"It was another great day for sailing when Batemans Bay SC held the fourth Bay Cup race of the 2025/26 season. The forecast promised a bit of everything and so it turned out. Three boats ventured forth along with race officer Terry Paton and his trusty sidekicks Andrew Bain and Jim Anderson aboard the committee boat "Dave Magill".

Paton set the familiar boat end favoured start in what was, initially, a light ESE breeze. "Moonmist" (Tony Sutton) had to slow down dramatically to avoid being over at the boat end. "Wishful Thinking" (Simon Dunlop) was slightly to leeward but carrying better speed at the start.

"Moonmist" sailed on to a comfortable win. "Wishful" kept a close cover on "Accolade" all the way up the work to the finish line near Snapper Island, finishing 35 seconds ahead. Crews celebrated afterwards at the BBSC Christmas Party. Accolade's bowperson was in an acting role so attended the Bay Theatre Players gala dinner instead.
