Council strengthens backup power for emergencies

As we begin to feel the heat of summer, Eurobodalla residents can have peace of mind knowing emergency evacuation centres across the shire will have reliable back-up power ready to go.

Eurobodalla Council has installed generator changeover switches at various key locations, including emergency evacuation centres, allowing generators to be connected and brought online as required. Council secured a \$440,000 grant from the NSW

Reconstruction Authority to support the project.

Six generators have been delivered and are ready to be deployed to emergency evacuation centres as needed. Council's local emergency management officer Angus Barnes worked with Council's infrastructure team to confirm coverage, site suitability and make sure the generators were fit for purpose.

"Now we can provide a greater level of comfort for people who have evacuated during emergencies," Mr Barnes said. On Tuesday December 9, Mr Barnes briefed Councillors on the government-released fireseason outlook. The briefing included bushfire and storm preparedness, updates on expected conditions and how Council is working with emergency services to prepare. Eurobodalla Mayor Mathew Hatcher urged residents to do their bit and have a plan now. "Everyone should get their plan ready now so they can spend the rest of summer enjoying themselves and not worrying about if they're ready," Mayor Hatcher said.

"Our emergency services crews do an incredible job in dangerous conditions, and we can support them by being ready, listening to warnings and acting early when needed.

"It is important everyone has a plan, knows it. and has an evacuation kit with a batterypowered radio so they can stay informed and know where to go if the power goes out. "I encourage everyone to check out the Eurobodalla Preparedness Guide recently delivered to mailboxes or pick up a copy at our libraries - use it to double-check plans for the season ahead.'

Social Media was abuzz last week as Council started installing the first two of 22 Gillie and Marc sculptures donated to Council through the Cultural Gifts Program. (See MM107)

Coopers Island Road sell-off opposed by speakers

Four of the five presenters to Council Public Access session on Tuesday addressed Council proposal to sell Coopers Island Road to the landholder of Coopers Island. (see pages 10 - 12 for some of the presentations).

Max Castle, répresenting for the Peak Recreational Fishing Body -Recreational Fishing Alliance for NSW said "It is disappointing access to Bowns Creek and Trunketabella Lake has not been reopened as instructed by a previous General Manager. Her instructions to remove fencing has been ignored."

"The proposed Coopers Is Road closure will eliminate safe and reasonable access to a public waterway which as existed for at least 100 years. I understand our first nations people are very concerned and they express their concerns."

"The proposed sale of Coopers Is Road eliminates safe and easy access by using Coopers rd. On that basis Council are effectively closing down part of a public waterway. This position needs to be challenged as Council don't have that authority."



Uncle Ron Mason Snr, Bodalla Elder Uncle Cecil Stewart and Uncle Terry Hill attended the ESC Public Access on Tuesday.

Mylene Boulting asked "what has happened since 2021 that has led to a 180 degree about-turn and instead propose to sell this road?

Recreation fisher Sue Dunk called for retaining public and cultural access. "It's not just fishers and kayakers."

Tuross River Bridge is 18 km round trip - It's not an option. Doubt anyone in the room could do it.

40m x 15m strip of crown land.

Chris Jones, past secretary of Tuross Lakes Preservation Group recalled work to replant degraded banks from the 1990s.

Walbunja elder Terry Hill called the actions of council being used as a tool of dispossession. "The site is important... it's not just a Koori issue - it's a whole of community issue."

Mr Hill said "If causeway was crown land and the given away it's has breached the native title act....Let's put a ramp in and develop it for everyone.... Council is being used to take away our birthright."






New Eurobodalla Southern Storage Dam wall now completed

The dam wall for Eurobodalla's southern water storage facility is finished. A major step in securing the shire's future water supply, the 3,000 megalitre off-river storage by the Tuross River is ready for site revegetation and the final electrical and mechanical systems to be installed before testing begins.


Eurobodalla Council's director of infrastructure Graham Attenborough says it will take some time to fill the dam.

"Once testing is complete, we need the right conditions – with good flow in the Tuross, before we can begin pumping water into storage. Likely it will take another six months to fill and fully commission the facility," Mr Attenborough says.

Council's project manager Harvey Lane says the project is critical to the shire's long-term water security.

"The southern storage complements our main facility at Deep Creek Dam and, in the short term, provides a backup supply during dry periods," Mr Lane says.

"For the near future, residents will only draw on the southern storage if the region is in drought and Deep Creek is depleted.



Mr Attenborough says plans are afoot to open up the facility for community inspection some time I the new year, once some water is in the storage.

"We're proud of this project and want residents to see the benefits for themselves," he says.

Shifting gears, roundabout reducing summer congestion



With just a few finishing touches still remaining, Malua Bay's residents and visitors are enjoying new-found flow around the new roundabout on George Bass Drive.

Summer traffic congestion has turned a corner with a new roundabout at Malua Bay. This is Eurobodalla's second major roundabout for George Bass Drive this year, with the first finished at Broulee in July.

Eurobodalla Council's director of infrastructure Graham Attenborough says the Malua Bay roundabout will tame peak-period traffic, where the intersection with Sylvan Street and Kuppa Avenue serves both a large number of homes and a popular beachfront reserve and shops.

"It's smoother and safer for everyone. Roundabouts don't just keep traffic moving – they reduce the number and severity of accidents, and add crossing points for pedestrians," Mr Attenborough says. Roundabouts are part of Council's <u>Transport Network Plan</u> – which outlines a shire-wide approach to a safe, accessible and built to last roads. Construction of another major roundabout will soon be underway, this time on the Princes Highway at the southern edge of Moruya, supporting housing development in the town's south and improving access to TAFE, the Essential Energy station and future emergency operations centre.

"We're not stopping there," Mr Attenborough says.

"We're working hard to secure funding for another roundabout from our Transport Network Plan, this time at Broulee's Train Street – again to reduce congestion and improve safety."

Big roundabouts come with a big price tag and need to be part of the bigger plan for a safe and efficient road network that serves the shire into the future. Council secured \$4 million of Australian Government Community Enabling Infrastructure Stream money for Moruya and \$3.3 million of NSW Government Fixing Country Roads funding for Malua Bay. The NSW Government is also building a roundabout to service the new Eurobodalla Hospital.

Prune in secret, pay in public says Council



No mere stealthy trimming, Eurobodalla's seaside trees and shrubs are being brazenly cut or poisoned. Along clifftops, foreshores and reserves this vandalism is deliberate and damaging, with residents paying the price for newfound views.

Eurobodalla Council's coordinator of environmental health and compliance Noel Fuller says vandalising vegetation is the same as attacking any other public asset. "Poisoning a tree is the same as spraying graffiti on a toilet block or smashing a park bench," Mr Fuller says

"By removing seaside vegetation you are losing food, shelter and breeding sites for small birds and mammals, and increasing the risk of weeds and erosion." Mr Fuller says.

erosion," Mr Fuller says.
"In fact, frequently targeted vegetation includes listed vulnerable ecosystems like coastal heath, which persists in areas between homes and the ocean. Clearing for views takes from these valuable remnant ecosystems. Once they are gone, they're gone."

Penalties for illegally clearing or injuring native vegetation on public land are significant, with on-the-spot fines for breaking branches, sawing limbs or trimming for views. If matters proceed to court the penalties are more serious. As a deterrent to further damage, Council also installs view screens at sites where trees have been illegally removed.

"View-blocking screens are left in place until vegetation is restored through natural regeneration – this can take several years," Mr Fuller says.

"It's not something we want to do, but in the absence of an identified offender it's the most effective way to deter further damage and protect the area. We also encourage the community to dob-in any suspected tree vandalism as it happens. Reporting in real time means we can actively protect biodiversity – a quick call can make all the difference." Government's health inquiry response sets out reform agenda

The **Minns Labor Government** has formally responded to the Special Commission of Inquiry into Healthcare Funding (Health Inquiry), placing health workers, preventative care, hospital infrastructure, and federal funding, at the cornerstones of its agenda for reform

The Health Inquiry visited every local health district and speciality health network across metropolitan as well as regional NSW, receiving 226 written submissions; hearing testimony from 225 witnesses over 70 days of hearings, including clinicians, patients, unions, providers and policy experts.

The Minns Labor Government response supports in full or in principle the majority of the 41 recommendations from the over 1,000-page report prepared by the Inquiry, with work already underway to address a number of the recommendations.

Supporting and empowering health workers

Health workers are at the centre of the Minns Labor Government's health reform agenda. Priority work in progress includes the development of an internal locum agency within NSW Health, working closely with the Health Services Union (HSU) to support an award modernisation process, and supporting clinicians to work to their full scope of practice across the healthcare workforce.

As part of the Minns Labor Government response, NSW Health will:

- · review its approach to statewide clinical service planning over the next 12 months, to determine the best ways to identify health needs and shape future public health services; · enhance transparency by establishing a central workforce unit to better monitor data on workforce supply and demand to guide workforce strategies that will help to fill vacancies, address and prevent future workforce supply challenges, and to inform future workforce planning across local health districts:
- strengthen the focus of workforce wellbeing by creating a Chief Wellbeing Officer to lead system wide wellbeing strategies and actions from the People Matter Employment Survey to enhance staff wellbeing and engagement; and • strengthen prevention and early intervention on staff safety and wellbeing, along with the enhancement of the complaints and grievance portal for staff.

Priority work already underway, in conjunction with the Health Services Union (HSU), includes:

- · Establishing an internal locum agency, to provide an alternative service offering in addition to the third-party locum agency model. A central approach to the management of this critical workforce will reduce the recruitment burden on hospital staff, the administrative burden on doctors, as well as the State's spend on locum agency fees over the coming decade.
- · Modernising industrial awards. NSW Health has committed to working with the Health Services Union to reform allied health industrial awards and is committed to working with states, territories and the Commonwealth to remove barriers to support health practitioners to work to their optimal scope of practice.

· Supporting practitioners to work to their full scope of practice through innovative workforce models, including recent trials of paramedics working within emergency departments and within the community.

Preventative healthcare

It is clear from escalating demand on our hospitals from an increasingly aged population that preventative healthcare will become even more central to the function of our health system. To that end, the Minns Labor Government, through NSW Health, will: develop a statewide paediatric strategic plan to clearly define roles and care pathways for the delivery of world-class care to children across the state; and · continue to examine low value, cost inefficient medical interventions and diagnostics while also invest in alternate and preventative models of care to deliver outcomes that matter to patients and provide long-term sustainability for the health system.

This builds on the existing work of our health system geared towards prevention, including promoting healthy eating and active living, reducing the prevalence of diabetes, supporting a healthy start to life in the first 2000 days, improving oral, mental and sexual health, and reducing tobacco and e-cigarette, and drug and alcohol related harms.

Hospitals meeting community health needs

The Health Inquiry examined health infrastructure noting our hospitals must 'reflect an assessment of the health needs of the population'.

The Minns Labor Government is committed to delivering the hospitals and beds our community needs and deserves, including delivering new hospitals for Rouse Hill and Bankstown, new upgrades to Blacktown, Fairfield and Canterbury, and more beds for Blacktown and Mount Druitt Hospitals.

Further work completed by NSW Health or currently underway includes:

- · An Infrastructure and Asset
 Management Division has been
 established within NSW Health,
 streamlining capital planning,
 infrastructure delivery and strategic asset
 management to ensure investments are
 sustainable, efficient and responsive to
 emerging challenges.
- Expanded wait time monitoring including moving to increased central oversight of wait time monitoring in public specialist outpatient clinics through the rollout of the Single Digital Patient Record. Emergency department wait time reporting measures have also been expanded to include quarterly reporting against new Hospital Access Targets.

NSW's fair share of Commonwealth funding

The Health Inquiry made two sobering observations – the challenges in accessing primary care (GPs); and the lack of Commonwealth Government aged care and NDIS placements, are both placing tremendous pressure on state hospitals.

State governments are responsible for hospitals, and we're making record investment in the NSW public hospital system.

Meanwhile, the Commonwealth is responsible for primary care, aged care and NDIS. The difficulty accessing these services however are impacting state hospitals as people who are unable to find a GP end up presenting to emergency departments.

Patients ready to be discharged lay waiting in hospital beds because they cannot access an aged care or NDIS placement.

The NSW Government's response makes it clear that it will continue to strongly advocate with fellow states and territories, for its fair share of health funding from the Commonwealth Government.

Reforming the health system

The Health Inquiry and the changes arising from it build on the Minns Labor Government's reform of the health system, delivering more staff, building more hospitals, delivering more beds, and beginning to turnaround the long wait times – wait times that exploded under the Liberals who cut staff, delayed hospital construction, and planned to privatise hospitals.

The NSW Government will continue to closely monitor progress and report on the implementation of the recommendations, which will benefit both the people who work for NSW Health and the communities they serve.

Minister for Health Ryan Park said

"The completion of this inquiry and the Government's response to it makes good on a core election commitment, first championed by the HSU, for a root and branch review of our health system. "Let me be clear, today's response does not mark the end, but the beginning of a new chapter of reform that supports and empowers health workers; embraces preventative care; ensures hospitals meet the health needs of the community; and secures NSW's fair share of health funding.

"We know the Liberals are determined to brush over this health inquiry – but they cannot rewrite their history of cuts to wages; cuts to staff; and delays in delivering the hospitals and beds our community needs and deserves."



WILL THIS RESCUE A FAILING HEALTH

SYSTEM ON THE FAR SOUTH COAST

The content of the recent NSW Governments press release (see previous page) is a potential lifeline for the Far South Coast (FSC) Health System.

The decades long widening gap for access to healthcare in our region means we have much lower funding per person than the city, greater rates of deaths from cancer and significant delays in accessing healthcare. Over 40 years of reading health system press releases from governments, I always use a brief check list to test if the content meets community needs, here are the

Supporting and empowering health

"Health workers are at the centre of the Minns Labor Government's health reform

A long overdue and welcome commitment. Local health workers are the glue which currently holds our health system together. Their efforts are what overcomes dysfunctional Commonwealth and State funding but their efforts are reaching its

A range of useful activity including assessing the needs of regions is proposed by the Labor NSW Government and their track record of delivery over the past nearly 3 years gives some cause for optimism. What is missing:

·Equity of access and funding (fairness) is a core Australian value and although there are mentions of needs assessments for services there is no clear commitment to equity, how it will be assessed, acted on and publicly reported.

·Timeframes for the steps in the reform are missing or minimal and this is always a red flag. Without timeframes there is no certainty and denies the workforce and community ability to plan for the future.

·The language in the release is managerialist and political which is not community centred language. What will be the benefits for the community, motherhood statements aren't good enough.

·How will we know the reform is on track? What are the indicators for success?

Preventative healthcare

What is missing?

- ·Equity, Timelines, Community Centredness and Indicators as in the previous section are mostly missing.
- ·There needs to be a commitment to fast action and community communication. If there is then the NSW Government will be genuine reformers.
- ·Prevention needs an integrated health system with the non-hospital health sector. eg. GPs and other primary care providers. The community is let down by the Commonwealths lack of activity and funding on integration. There has been silence from the Commonwealth in our area.

What is missing?

- ·Real reform needs a commitment to equity of funding and workforce otherwise the same old managerial and political needs lead to same worsening outcomes.
- The wait time section is managerial speak at its worst with no mention of reducing waiting times which is what benefits patients. I am surprised the Minister let this get past him as he is usually very community centred.

NSW's fair share of Commonwealth funding

'The Health Inquiry made two sobering observations - the challenges in accessing primary care (GPs); and the lack of Commonwealth Government aged care and NDIS placements, are both placing tremendous pressure on state hospitals.'

What is missing?

·The Commonwealth is missing and has been missing for decades in its areas of responsibility leaving the underfunded heavy lifting to the state government.

·The key to any modern health system reform based on overseas trends is to focus attention on providing healthcare close to a person's home as quickly as possible with hospitals reserved for urgent and major health events.

·To quote the press release "the Commonwealth is responsible for primary care, aged care and NDIS", the shortfall of funding and lack of attention by the Commonwealth on their responsibilities has made a seamless, integrated system of care an impossibility." The Commonwealth continues to underfund all its areas of responsibility compared to city populations with no action in sight. ·Overseas the primary care level is specially funded to enable patients be treated close to home as the priority, eg.

Patients can be home on discharge from hospital in 1-2 days to be managed by the primary care team (no funding for delayed hospital discharge).

Suggested Actions

- ·That NSW Health Minister Ryan Park take a leadership role on behalf of the Eurobodalla in discussions with the Commonwealth to urgently fund a seamless, integrated, fair health system in our region.
- ·That all initiatives have timelines and indicators provided to the communities affected and progress is reported on a regular basis
- ·That all future actions focus on community and individual patients' needs as the drivers for reform with a high level of local community control.
- ·The need for reform was yesterday, urgent action is needed today, nothing less is acceptable.

Funding desperately needed for NSW hospitals under strain like never before The **NSW Nurses and Midwives**'

Association (NSWNMA) has called for urgent investment in our hospitals and healthcare workers, in the wake of unprecedented pressure on emergency departments (ED) and wards.

The Bureau of Health Information's (BHI) latest Healthcare Quarterly data shows a record amount of presentations for the most acutely unwell patients during July to September, while the volume of admitted patients also reached unprecedented levels.

NSWNMA General Secretary, Shaye Candish, said the BHI data demonstrated nurses and midwives worked increasingly harder with limited resources.

"Triage one, two and three presentations in the ED have increased considerably this quarter, highlighting the rise in patient acuity our members are experiencing on a daily basis. Alarmingly, more than 73,000 people left without, or before, completing treatment as well," said Ms Candish. "The complex, and often invisible skills, nurses and midwives are expected to have in their toolkit has dramatically changed. This is a key component of our argument in the union's historic legal case which is hearing closing submissions in the Industrial Relations Commission this week. "As part of our landmark case, we've put a

claim for a 35% pay increase over three years. We hope the decision corrects the long-standing gender undervaluation we know has occurred and compensates for the complexities and changes experienced in nursing and midwifery over the last two decades.

"We are pleased the rollout of nurse-topatient ratios is continuing in EDs across the state, after years of campaigning by the Association. As our EDs get busier, staffing ratios will be crucial to keep both staff and patients safe and ensure quality care can be provided."

NSWNMA Assistant General Secretary, Michael Whaites, said more investment in our public healthcare system was desperately needed.

"The BHI data shows there are still almost 95,000 patients on the elective surgery waitlist. In order to bring these down permanently, we must see the federal government contribute more funding to the states - they can't do it alone," said Mr

"We are seeing extreme bed block across hospitals because of patients awaiting places in residential aged care. We've provided the NSW government a solution to this, one that will reduce costs over time. It is a solution that the federal and state governments could, and should, work on

"This would help to reduce bed block and provide more permanent, efficient and appropriate accommodation for hundreds of elderly patients currently occupying hospital beds. Until this is addressed, our hospitals and healthcare workers will continue to operate under increasing pressures that we see through the latest BHI data.'

More support for victim-survivors in South-eastern NSW

From today, women and children leaving family, domestic and sexual violence (FDSV) in south-eastern NSW will receive additional holistic care and support through an Albanese Government pilot program.

The Supporting Outreach Healthcare FDSV Pilot will provide accommodation services in Eurobodalla, Goulburn and the Shoalhaven with access to a team of health professionals including on-site GPs, nurses and service navigators. Service navigators coordinate between health, housing, justice and education services, giving victim-survivors access to support across the health system.

The pilot program is designed to reduce barriers to care by improving coordination across health and social services. It also comes as the government marks the United Nations' global 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence. We know family, domestic and sexual violence disproportionately affects women. In 2021-22, 1 in 4 women and 1 in 14 men had experienced violence from an intimate partner

in 14 men had experienced violence from an intimate partner since the age of 15, and 13% of adults witnessed partner violence against a parent before the age of 15.

The participating crisis accommodation services are:

- Supported Accommodation and Homelessness Services Shoalhaven Illawarra (SAHSSI) – Nowra
- South East Women and Children's Services (SEWACS) Budjangal – Moruya
- Anglicare NSW South, NSW West & ACT Goulburn The government has provided COORDINARE – through the South Eastern NSW Primary Health Network (PHN) – almost \$1 million to deliver the pilot.

The initiative is part of a \$6 million investment, with five other pilot programs to be established through the Hunter New England and Central Coast PHN, Central and Eastern Sydney PHN, Gippsland PHN, Northern Queensland PHN, and Western Queensland PHN.

The Albanese Government, in conjunction with state and territory governments, is acting on all forms of gender-based violence through the National Plan to End Violence against Women and Children 2022-2032.

Assistant Minister Rebecca White said "Too many women and children suffer at the hands of those close to them. This pilot is an all-encompassing approach to support victim-survivors, to protect them and help them recover. In Australia, one in four women has experienced family or domestic violence and one in five has experienced sexual violence from the age of 15. "A whole-of-system response is needed to respond to FDSV. Choice, safety and continuity of care are the centrepieces of this pilot."

Federal Member for Gilmore Fiona Phillips said "It's really fantastic that the pilot program is being rolled out in the north and south of Gilmore, to assist women and children in the Nowra and Moruya areas.

"I've heard so many harrowing stories from women who have experienced family and domestic violence, and I know they face significant challenges when they decide it's time to leave. "It's so important that we provide the vital support that women and children need to move forward right across the health system.

"One life lost to violence against women is too many, and deaths of women at the hands of men who profess to love and care for them has to end."

The National Plan recognises the importance of all people experiencing FDSV being able to access support and services. Since 2022-23 the government has invested more than \$4 billion in initiatives to support implementation of the National Plan, with a further \$4.4 billion in funding committed to address gender-based violence and respond to the Rapid Review into Prevention Approaches.

Time Returns to Batemans Bay

The iconic town clock of Batemans Bay is back ticking following twelve months of refurbishment.

With its stylised dolphin features, the clock has been gracing the foreshore since 1999 and is a compulsory photo opportunity for many tourists.

Batemans Bay Rotary Club has a long association with the clock dating back to the first town clock built by the Club in 1978. It was removed by council in 1994 for the building of public facilities. Intent on ensuring Batemans Bay had a town clock, Rotarians Ron Sydenham and David Wood oversaw the rebuilding of the old clock and stylised the structure in the town centre in 1999. Up until the recent renovation, Rotary volunteers manually adjusted the clock for daylight saving.

Although the clock mechanism and faces were refurbished in 2018 and LED lighting installed, it was apparent that the structure needed some attention.

In 2024, the Rotary Club secured a NSW Government Grant to carry out the necessary work. Work commenced in November 2024 with a plan to have the existing structure removed, dismantled, sand blasted and powder coated. The clock faces and mechanisms were also to be updated.

Work was completed and by mid this year, the clock was restored to its rightful place in the town centre. With the installation of the new master timer, time has returned to Batemans Bay.

Batemans Bay Rotary Club Community Service Director, David Ashford oversaw the project.

David said "A big thank you to Eurobodalla Shire Council and Eurobodalla Cranes who assisted in the removal and replacement of the clock. Our thanks also to H&S Sheds who provided the transport to and from Queanbeyan. Simplex provided the new master clock and carried out the maintenance on the existing mechanisms. We also acknowledge the grant provided by the NSW Government that made the whole project feasible. It is fantastic to have the clock restored to its rightful place as a focal point, providing a sense of history and uniting our community." Dr Michael Holland MP for Bega has followed the progress of the refurbishment and officiated at the opening of the clock last Thursday.

Dr Holland said "It's wonderful to see the iconic Batemans Bay town clock restored and ticking proudly once again. This clock is more than a landmark — it's a symbol of community spirit, local history and the dedication of the Batemans Bay Rotary Club over many decades.

The Rotary Gear Wheel is all about service, movement and keeping things turning, so it feels fitting that Rotary has led the charge on bringing this clock back to life.

This refurbishment preserves a piece of our town's character and restores a focal point that locals and visitors treasure."

Mylene Boulting on Sale of Coopers Island Road

Good Morning Councillors and all present, I'd like to begin by acknowledging the Traditional Owners of the land on which we meet today and pay my respects to Elders past and present.

Thank you for the opportunity to speak to you today regarding the proposed sale of Coopers Island Road.

My name is Mylene Boulting. For the past 15 years, I have had the privilege of living close by the shores of the beautiful Tuross Lake, a part of the expansive Tuross River Estuary. I was very surprised to recently learn through local media about the Council's proposal to close and sell Coopers Island Road.

Recent history

As you know, since the Coopers Island farm changed hands in 2017, the landowner has consistently sought to purchase this public road.

I would like to take a moment to commend the hard work of the Council staff, who have for years listened to the community's concerns and supported our desire to keep this road in public hands. I distinctly remember the site inspections and meetings led by the then Infrastructure Services Director and his team. The comprehensive report produced by Carlisle Ginger played a key role in shaping the Council's previous decision.

It was a relief when, in June 2021, we learned that the Council had formally determined not to sell Coopers Island Road. The Council even organised and paid for the road realignment to meet title requirements. There were also discussions about improving the parking area near the causeway, with plans to enhance accessibility for people with mobility impairment, allowing more members of the community to enjoy the natural beauty of Bowns Creek.

So, what has happened since 2021 that has led to a 180 degree about-turn and instead propose to sell this road?

Council's media release states: "A detailed Crown Solicitor's investigation has revealed the causeway and adjoining land are privately owned." This was astonishing to us, as it seems nobody—perhaps not even the landowner—was aware of this.

Preliminary enquiries made with Crown Lands show that their historical research indicated the causeway belonged to no one. It wasn't included in the original land grant, nor was it listed as Crown land. Yet, the Crown Solicitor now recommends transferring it to the island's landowner, with apparently little reference to other closely interested parties such as the local community whose wishes the Council is supposed to represent.

This decision, which one experienced commentator has described as "very unusual", has effectively transformed Coopers Island Road into a road to nowhere for the public.

I would appreciate it if the Council could help clarify the following questions:

- Who decided that the best way to facilitate the sale of this road was to make it effectively useless to the public?
- Who initiated the historical status searches with Crown Lands and what was the rationale behind it?
- How has the Crown Solicitor concluded that the causeway should be gifted to the landowner, especially when it clearly serves as a natural extension of a public road?
- Is the Council accepting the Crown Solicitor's advice without the further scrutiny or examination all the circumstances and the above questions would very much seem to require?
- I, along with many others in the community, also seek to understand the rationale behind the urgency in moving forward with the sale. The Council became aware of the Crown Solicitor's findings in September of last year. Given this, why has it taken over a year to proceed with the closure and sale? Additionally, the timing of the community consultation period noticeably set at the bare legal minimum of 28 days and coinciding with the start of the holiday season—does not provide adequate opportunity for meaningful public input. This timeline clearly limits the community's ability to fully engage with the proposal, to further investigate with Council and relevant agencies, and to canvas the alternative solutions. I appreciate the Council's time and consideration in reviewing these concerns. The issues raised are of great importance to many in the community, as evidenced by the reactions posted on Community Noticeboards. I look forward to your response and hope that the Council will take these matters into careful consideration rather than proceeding precipitously.

Presentation by Sue Dunk on the proposed sale of Coopers Island Road

I make this submission regarding the proposed closure and sale of Coopers Island Road, and urge Council to consider alternatives that protect public access, recreational use, and Aboriginal cultural heritage. Specifically, I request that Council:

1.Explore the sale or transfer of the road to a community-managed trust or Local Aboriginal Land Council (LALC) rather than to a private owner.

2.Support the compulsory acquisition of a very small parcel of private land to secure an access corridor to the foreshore below the mean high tide mark, ensuring continued access for all.

2. Background / Context

·Historic public use: Coopers Island Road and causeway have provided access to Tuross Lake and Bowns Creek for recreational fishers and kayakers for over 100 years.

·Cultural heritage significance: The area holds Aboriginal cultural and traditional fishing significance, with evidence of thousands of years of Indigenous access. Artifacts and middens can be found in this area.

Current land status: Council's exhibition notes that the land is partly privately owned, but historically functions as a public road and access corridor.

3. Risks of Sale to a Private Owner Restricts longstanding public and recreational access.

·Could limit Aboriginal access to traditional cultural sites, contrary to the Aboriginal Heritage Act 2006.

·Ignores the community benefit of retaining public and cultural access.
·Councillors, are you aware, this area is used by other community groups besides fishers and kayakers including birdwatchers, photographers, artists and those with disabilities. I have personally witnessed members of the public photographing and watching waterhens at the end of the road

4. Proposed Solutions

a) Community Trust or LALC Ownership
·Council could transfer ownership to a
trust or Aboriginal Land Council, ensuring
management, maintenance, and
governance remain community-led.
·Supports long-term stewardship,

·Supports long-term stewardship, protects cultural heritage, and maintains public access.

b) Compulsory Acquisition of Small Private Parcel

I request the NSW Government and Council support compulsory acquisition under the Land Acquisition (Just Terms Compensation) Act 1991 to establish a permanent access corridor to the foreshore below mean high tide mark.

·This guarantees:

- o Over 100 years of continued access for fishers and kayakers.
- o Thousands of years of traditional Aboriginal access.
- o Protection of recreational and cultural heritage values for future generations.
- o Access to the Eastern Riverbank. A strip of land measuring approx. 40mtrs by 15mtrs has been identified as Crownland in the latest Crownland Survey.
- c) Legal / Policy Support
 ·Crown Lands policy allows vesting of closed roads as reserves for community or public purposes rather than private sale.

·Why is Crownlands not releasing its findings on how the Crownland Solicitors gifted the Causeway to the landowner? ESC is now claiming it was a safety issue, and Crownlands claim it was a Land Title issue. What is the truth?

·Easements or heritage agreements could formalize public and Aboriginal access rights while ensuring maintenance and cultural protection.

On 8th June 2020, ESC voted that the road was not to be sold. ESC granted \$40,000 to pay for realignment of the road, grading, survey, fencing and installation of a carpark. I asked ESC how much was actually spent on this project. I received an answer on 8th December 2025 and the council employee could not / did not know the total amount spent.

Councillors where is the transparency in this. There is none. You have wasted so much of RATE PAYERS money on Coopers Island Road and now only one rate payer will benefit. Are you ever going to tell the ratepayers the truth. I lodged a GIPA request Sept 2024 with ESC. Debbie Abbott asked for an extension of time which I granted. As it was coming into the Christmas break another extension was granted. As of today, 12 months later, I am still awaiting an answer. It's obvious that ESC does not take GIPA requests seriously

It is wonderful that ESC has spent \$130,000 on the upgrade of Tuross River Bridge carpark. It needs to be noted that you DID NOT upgrade the boat ramp. For ESC to suggest that kayakers can use this boat ramp to access Coopers Island / Bowns Creek is ludicrous as well as laughable. This is an 18km round trip, without even fishing and I would love to see ever Councillor undertake this task. It would be fair to say, nobody in this room would be able to manage that task. There are also safety concerns in the event of inclement weather and the distance needed to paddle. ESC, don't push this agenda onto the community as it is clearly not an option.

5. Recommendation

I respectfully request Council to:

1. Withdraw the current proposal to sell the road to a private owner.

2.Negotiate with Local Aboriginal Land Council or a community trust for ownership and management.

3.Support compulsory acquisition of the small private parcel to secure a permanent foreshore access corridor.

4.Implement easements, heritage agreements, or management plans to protect access, cultural sites, and public recreational use.

5.Conclusion

Following a call for submissions, Stan Konstantaras, President RFANSW, is presenting to the NSW Upper House Inquiry Team, today 9th December 2025, to the Select Committee on access restrictions to public lands which includes Coopers Island Road. Bodalla.

I am asking the ESC Couuncillors, to defer their decision on the sale of Coopers Island Road until the recommendations of the Upper House Select Committee are known and can be considered and implemented. Taking these steps ensures Council demonstrates leadership in protecting cultural heritage, recreational access, and community interests. It balances legal, cultural, and social considerations, preserves longstanding use of Coopers Island Road, and secures public and Indigenous access for generations to come.

Presentation on Creative Arts in Eurobodalla

I am presenting today wearing 2 hats: as co-convenor of A Better Eurobodalla and as the Public Officer and member of the Arts Council of Eurobodalla

My presentation is in two parts but I'll make it clear which hat I am wearing.

PART 1:

Firstly as A Better Eurobodalla (ABE) a community forum working to achieve open, transparent, accountable and responsive government in Eurobodalla. ABE has applied our principles of good governance to the Creative Arts Strategy development. The ESC website tells us that:

'Eurobodalla Shire Council is developing a Creative Arts Strategy to guide how we support and grow arts, culture and creativity across the region.

We're inviting community members, artists, educators, organisations, and creative businesses to share their ideas, experiences and aspirations.'

The last Creative Arts Strategy was produced in 2019 and as we know our world has changed since then. Fires, Covid and other forces have impacted on Eurobodalla in profound ways. One aspect of this is how the landscape of the arts and culture community has changed and grown. The 2019 strategy had many good things in it and I am not here to critique the document. But it has limitations and we are seeing some of that now in the current process.

The strategy commits to 'measure our progress against each of the (identified) strategic outcomes and track our success in achieving our creative arts vision for Eurobodalla and the region' (pg5) The strategy has 4 strategic outcome areas with actions and measures identified for

The outcomes are:

Places and spaces which has 15 ACTIONS and 14 MEASURES

Connections and collaboration which has 10 ACTIONS and 10 MEASURES Creative capacity with 11 ACTIONS and 10 MEASURES and

Participation and access with 10 ACTIONS and 10 MEASURES

There are 46 actions and 44 measures with 13 actions identifies as high priority, 15 identified as medium, 3 identified as low priority and 14 as ongoing.

For the community and council to understand what a 2026 strategy should look like, and provide meaningful input, we need to understand what has worked since 2019. Did the last strategy achieve its desired outcomes and realise the stated vision 'for Eurobodalla to become known as the creative arts destination for South east NSW, with significant growth in creative arts infrastructure, programming and audiences' (pg5).

ABE is mindful that in common with many areas of council, small staff numbers and limited budget impact on what can be achieved. Reviewing the actions and measures in the 2019 strategy is a basic requirement to give guidance about how those precious resources can be best directed and how community can be fruitfully engaged. The 2019 Strategy states that progress will be measured against each of the strategic outcomes and success tracked. Currently the proposal is to provide a summary of these in the draft strategy next year. This is too late for any considered input from anyone outside ESC. We need a report on progress to know what to input.

Robust consultation based on good information is basic to good governance. ABE is requesting that a comprehensive review of progress against the 2019 strategy be made available to the community to allow considered input to the next strategy. If this information is not available now, and my understanding is that it is not, then the consultation period should be extended beyond the identified consultation cut of date of end December to allow this to happen. An extension into the early part of 2026 should not negatively impact the timeline to complete the strategy.

PART 2:

I am speaking now as the Public Officer and member of the Arts Council of Eurobodalla. The Arts Council is a volunteer run organisation that has been operating out of Art Central here in Moruya for over 20 years. As well as running our fabulous community arts centre, the Arts Council has as one of its objectives to 'act as an umbrella organisation for artists and as an advocate for the arts'.

In this role we have been considering how best to help Council to meaningfully engage with and support our arts and culture community. In Eurobodalla we have a fantastic arts and culture sector. From successful professional artists to community arts organisations and individuals and groups operating in fields including theatre, dance, music, fabric art, writing, mosaics, visual arts, sculpture and design. And as mentioned earlier, this sector is growing and diversifying. In addition, we have disadvantage in our community that makes it challenging for young artists, Indigenous artists and emerging artists to connect with other artists and have opportunities to learn, perform or exhibit in Eurobodalla.

With the Creative Arts Strategy being developed it is timely to revisit how Council can best connect to this vital part of our community.

At its 17 December 2024 meeting, Council decided to defer forming the Public Art Committee. That Committee had a role focussing on public art on public land. A year later it is timely to revisit a committee structure to support a more broad-based role in relation to arts and culture. Recently the Arts Council has been in touch with a range of arts organisations and individual artists to discuss how our community can more effectively engage with council and assist council staff.

Many councils in city and regional NSW have advisory committees focussing on arts and culture. An arts and culture advisory committee to Eurobodalla Shire Council could advise and make recommendations to Council on arts, culture and creative interests in Eurobodalla and arts and cultural opportunities within our region.

It could have membership that capitalised on the substantial skills and experience of our regional arts practitioners while covering the geographic spread of the shire, the diversity of arts practice and member-based arts and cultural organisations.

To help our thinking, we have drawn on how the ESC Visitor Economy Advisory Committee works. It is a strategic advisory body in partnership with Council, offering practical insight, coordinating engagement, and identifying opportunities that deliver positive long-term outcomes. With a skillbased membership, an arts and culture advisory committee could work in a similar way and with similar goals for the arts sector. Unlike other sectors such as disability, tourism, Aboriginal and heritage, the arts and culture sector has no clear path to Council.

The 2019 Strategy states that council will 'Champion the role creativity and the arts play in building a strong and healthy community' (pg14). Council correctly capitalises in its communications on how the arts and culture sector contributes to the wellbeing and richness of life in Eurobodalla. Having an advisory committee will help council understand and support this significant contribution by our creative community.

Mr. J. Keyte had the misfortune on Wednesday to lose his promising 4year-old colt, Coolview, by Coolotta - Moruya Lass. The animal was turned out in a paddock to get a drink, and shortly after was found with one of its knees shattered, and it was immediately put out of its misery. The injury is supposed to have been caused by a bullet.

Eroni Bros. and Barton's Circus opened here on Thursday night, when over 300 people witnessed a very good performance by the troupe, the particular features being the sensational flying trapeze act, the tight rope walking, the trick ponies and mule, and the high jumping dog. The show is one which we can pass on to our Southern friends as worthy of patronage.

A pioneer resident of the Araluen district, Mr. W. R. Smith, died at his residence, Gundary, on Sunday last, at the ripe old age of 87 years. Deceased, who was a native of England, arrived in Australia when a boy. He resided at Araluen for a number of years, and many were the interesting stories he could recount of the balmy days of the golden valley when 37 hotels opened their doors to the thousands of men who delved for earth's precious metal. A few years ago, he came to live in Moruya where he was tenderly nursed in his declining days by his daughter Miss Smith and son Mr. A. Smith, assisted by his married daughter, Mrs. J. Coppin, jnr. His wife predeceased him two years ago. The funeral took place on Monday, the remains being interred in the Methodist portion of the Moruya cemetery.

Let's do coffee with ... Pei-Shan Wu

For many of us, Taiwan only figures in the news as one of the major flashpoints in a world dominated by war or pending conflict. The good news is, it is also the birthplace of the multi talented and community minded Pei-Shan Wu (PSW), who now calls Moruya home. The Moruya Mail (MM) had a coffee with Pei-Shan last week

MM: I was hoping to have this chat much earlier Pei-Shan, but you are a hard woman to track down. I first met you at a Eurobodalla Multicultural Group meeting, spotted you in a support role in the intimate theatre at the Red Door, Moruya, spied you belting out tunes on the main stage at a charity gig and finally on the violin with the Eurobodalla Chamber Orchestra. It's good to finally catch up ... let's fasten seatbelts and head to Taiwan.

PSW: (Laughs ...) Wow ... that is some introduction! Okay, I was born in 1978. My mum was the senior officer at the Department of Health and dad was the general manager at the family pharmaceutical business which my grandfather built. We grew up in Taipei, the capital of Taiwan.

I became aware of the political tensions in Taiwan at a young age. I have a very clear memory of my sister being punished for speaking Taiwanese at school and forced to wear a sign around her neck for all to see.

From that point, mum and dad would only speak to me in Mandarin, in case I accidentally spoke Taiwanese at school and got punished.

MM: That's an incredibly powerful memory. It sounds like a difficult time.

PSW: It was but when I was around 4 years old mum secured a scholarship for overseas studies in health and I stayed with my A-Ma (grandmother) who can only speak Taiwanese, so luckily for me, I was finally able to learn my mother-tongue.

Not surprisingly, I had a very close relationship with my A-Ma who passed away 20 years ago. I wrote a song about A-Ma which I shared at Open Mic at Moruya some time ago. Here are some lines;

A-Ma, I miss you so. A-Ma, I miss you so. Though I haven't held you close for many, many years,

You are still the compass, the guiding North star that led my life right here. You are the whispered calm that settles all my fears.

A-Ma, I miss you so. A-Ma, I miss you so.

MM: That image of your sister being punished is stark. Despite a happy childhood, the political climate must have been constantly tense. What finally made you leave Taiwan for Australia at just 18 years of age.

PSW: By 1996 the political situation was extremely volatile in Taiwan. Missile tests were conducted by China in the waters surrounding Taiwan in 1995 and 1996*. Taiwan is about half the size of Tasmania and 160 kms from China so we are in a very vulnerable position.

My parents had the foresight to organise passports for us and I arrived in Australia by myself at 18 years of age.

After an intense 6 months of English language tuition, I enrolled in a Bachelor of Arts (BA) majoring in Psychology at the University of Wollongong (UoW).

Value of the control of the control

In 1999, I graduated from UoW with Distinction and secured a position as a community worker with the Chinese Australian Services Society in Campsie and later as a Community Information and Officer with Canterbury City Council.

At age 24, I embarked on lots of overseas travel, securing paid or volunteer work whenever I could, to immerse myself in the cultures. In Colombia, I learnt to dance and that passion led me to my partner, Shane, whom I met At the Marrickville Markets in 2004. Before the kids arrived, we used to dance a lot - salsa, merengue and bachata. Dancing is so fun! We settled in Cherrybrook and by 2013 we had 3 boys and 1 girl.

MM: How did Moruya manage to kidnap you?

PSW: (Laughs ...) I've been a city girl my whole life so I have never considered moving to a country town. In 2014 something clicked in my brain and I felt like getting out of the city. Shane grew up in the country so he has always been keen to move out of the city. We came across Moruya randomly in our house search and fell in love with the place. Something in my heart told me this is home. The feeling was so strong that even though we didn't know a single person there and had no jobs secured, I knew this is where we were meant to be so we made the move in early 2015. For awhile, I was a 'stay at home' mum and we home schooled our children. We found very passionate music teachers for our kids and I literally got infected with their enthusiasm. When each one of our children learnt an instrument, I would do the same, so I have ended up playing the piano,

violin and saxophone.



Now I have a five piece jazz and bossa band called 'Blueberry Jam', playing easy-listening jazz and Latin music from around the world. Work wise, Ive been a support worker in disability and aged care since my youngest started pre-school. I studied my Certificate III in Individual Support at South coast Colleges in Batemans Bay to enter the care industry. I started out at a nursing home before working for a large disability provider. I eventually left my employer and started working independently. Working independently as a sole trader gave me more flexibility so I can better cater for the needs of the people whom I'm supporting.

There are downsides to working solo - not having backup to go on leave, not having access to training and no other team mates to collaborate or brainstorm with ... so a group of us got together and started a workers' co-op to help each other. We're called the Eurobodalla Community Care Co-op. We are now a registered cooperative and charity (which took us a lot of time to get there!) Our goal is to give independent workers the support and training we need so we can deliver a high standard of care. You can check out our temporary landing page at www.eccc.coop.

MM: You've made huge life change, from the missile crisis of 1996 to building a new life and Co-op right here in Moruya. Looking back at that 18 year old who arrived in Wollongong alone - what is the one piece of wisdom you would whisper back to your younger self? PSW: (Smiles ...) My life has been defined by big pivots - leaving home, learning a new language, switching careers, moving to Moruya, even learning instruments! So my advice to my younger self would be; lean into the change. You don't have to have the whole plan, just trust your heart enough to move your feet.

Right road, right category: Minns Labor Government rewrites the rules for how roads are managed in NSW

The Minns Labor Government is rewriting the framework that determines road management in NSW, today announcing a modern road recategorisation system that provides councils with certainty over who will manage and maintain different roads, allowing for more targeted investment where communities need it most. Road recategorisation is the process used to decide whether a road

Road recategorisation is the process used to decide whether a road should be managed as a State, Regional or Local road. This system determines who maintains it, who funds it and how it fits into the broader transport network.

Previously, there was no system in place for recategorisation. Under the former government, we saw a politicisation of the process and a report which sat on the former Minister's desk for four months and was never released.

Due to the former government's approach, many roads are still categorised based on how they were used decades ago, despite major changes in population, traffic volumes, freight movements and local growth.

The unfair, outdated approach created long backlogs and increased pressure on local councils, who manage around 90 per cent of the state's road network and continue to face huge challenges from climate change, worsening weather events, rising construction costs and a growing workload after repeated natural disasters.

The Minns Labor Government's new road recategorisation framework puts evidence ahead of politics, replacing an ad-hoc political approach with a clearer, fairer and more responsive model that focuses on how a road functions within the network.

The new framework includes:

- · Clear statewide criteria to support consistent, needs-based decision making
- An always-open application pathway, replacing decade-long review cycles
- \cdot A new online self-assessment data tool to help councils understand early whether a proposal is likely to meet the criteria, reducing administrative burdens
- · Prioritisation for roads that unlock housing, freight efficiency, resilience and major infrastructure delivery.

This is a major reform that will put the right roads in the right category, cutting red tape, reducing duplication and improving how maintenance and investment are delivered across the network. It won't fix every challenge at once, but it's a strong step forward. With the portal now live, local councils and road managers will be able to put forward proposals for recategorisation.

Reviews of the system and processes will be conducted at three months, six months and then annually to refine the model.

Hospital logjam can only be fixed with genuine reform and significant investment

The federal AMA is calling for genuine reform and substantial investment in the next hospital funding agreement, saying the federal government must play its part and invest \$34.7 billion over the next five years.

AMA President Dr Danielle McMullen said Australia's public hospitals are in crisis and the time for band-aid solutions and patch up approaches was over. "The next National Health Reform Agreement (NHRA) must fix the crisis, or to put it simply, patients will die," Dr McMullen said.

"We know the answers. Over the last five years, the AMA has released reports detailing the issues plaguing the public hospital system, issues that have led to long waits for essential surgeries; ambulance ramping; declining performance and mental health care shortfalls.

"We launched our call for a new funding agreement in 2021 and have been relentless in our Clear the Hospital Logjam campaign every day since."

Dr McMullen said the Australian Government had commissioned an independent, expert led mid-term review of the NHRA, with many real reform recommendations put forward by Rosemary Huxtable AO PSM.

"Yet here we are, five minutes to midnight, having already kicked the can down the road for 12 months, without a new funding agreement. The analysis is there. The answers are there. And we certainly know the ramped ambulances, patients waiting in pain and overworked doctors and nurses are there.

"Now is the time for the ministers to step up and deliver." The AMA's funding call for public hospitals, released today, shows the scale of investment needed. It calls on the federal government to meet its commitment to reach 45 per cent of total funding, but by 2030 — as resolving the crisis can't wait until 2035. It also calls for the cap on funding growth to be lifted.

Conservative estimates put the cost of the investment at \$34.7 billion over 5 years, and potentially up to \$49.8 billion if public hospital costs continue to increase at a rate of 5.6 percent each year.

Based on AMA projections, states and territories will need to find \$17.6 billion, and potentially up to \$36.7 billion, if hospital costs continue to grow at 5.6 percent per year over the next 5 years. The AMA is also calling for states to invest their freed-up funds resulting from any federal government injection into addressing the logjam.

"The AMA is calling for all ministers to sign up to an agreement that has separate funding mechanisms to expand capacity, improve performance through specific initiatives and address avoidable admissions," Dr McMullen said

"It's clear the current funding agreement doesn't fund hospitals to work with GPs and manage avoidable admissions effectively. When we know we have an ageing population, increasing chronic disease, and an incredible amount of aged care and NDIS bed-block.

"When we operate and fund the health system in silos, patients get stuck in the cracks. Until a reform agreement includes funding and action to address aged care and NDIS bed-lock and avoidable admissions, the cycles of crisis we first predicted back in 2021 will continue.

"That cannot be allowed to happen. The AMA is calling on all Australians to support the 'Clear the hospital logjam' campaign. Write to your MP, share your stories and demand change."

Southern Women's Group Assistant Manager Samantha Monck said her team receives an influx of support requests in the Batemans Bay area during the festive season:

"We see a significant increase, on average around 30% in referrals during the Christmas period. This is a particularly difficult time for many families, as the added emotional and financial pressure often intensifies existing challenges."

"The lack of viable housing options becomes even more critical during this time, especially as our beautiful South Coast becomes a popular holiday destination. The tourism surge limits the availability of emergency and short-term accommodation, leaving many women and children facing homelessness.

"In addition to the housing crisis, many families are without access to basic essentials such as food, clothing, and hygiene products. The financial burden of the holiday season also weighs heavily on mothers in particular, many of whom reach out seeking support to provide gifts for their children, simply wanting to offer a sense of normalcy and joy during a time that should feel safe and celebratory.

"We're continuing to do everything we can to meet the needs of our community, and Catalina Club's support helps make that possible."

Mr Chapman says their Make A Wish initiative is one of the myriad ways Catalina Club is achieving its Club Mission to support local community: "Every point and dollar counts when supporting families in need."

New national network to accelerate EVgrid integration and drive climate action

Australia is taking an important step toward decarbonising transport and energy systems with the Vehicle-Grid Network – a national collaboration designed to accelerate electric vehicle-to-grid integration.

Today, **Minister for Climate Change and Energy Chris Bowen** officially launched the <u>Vehicle-Grid Network</u> (VGN), alongside a suite of initiatives aimed at supporting Australia's transition to a low-emissions economy.

The project is funded by the Australian Renewable Energy Agency (ARENA), the RACE for 2030 CRC and industry partners from across the electric vehicle (EV) and energy value chain. VGN will be led by Climate-KIC Australia and the University of Technology Sydney's (UTS) Institute for Sustainable Futures (ISF).

VGN is launching at a time when EVs' role in Australia's decarbonisation is becoming better understood. Along with rising sales, knowledge of EVs' potential to be a flexible source of energy storage is gaining traction.

Vehicle-to-Grid (V2G) bidirectional charging allows users to not only charge their EV, but to send power back to a home or the grid, which can save consumers money and help stabilise the energy grid. But these benefits are hard to access for most Australian people and businesses. VGN will address current technical, regulatory and market challenges to widespread V2G uptake. It will accelerate action to enable large-scale adoption of V2G by:

establishing a nationally coordinated industry collaboration network to align industry, government and researchers on shared priorities for V2G integration

•strengthening technical and market foundations by enabling interoperability, supporting evolving domestic and international standards, and unlocking shared commercial and regulatory barriers •building sector and consumer capability through trusted information, educational resources, events, and practical tools

positioning Australia for international leadership in V2G to deliver a cleaner, more resilient and affordable transport and energy systems. "The Vehicle-Grid Network builds on RACE for 2030's partnership with ARENA in producing the National Roadmap for Bidirectional EV Charging," said Oliver Hill, Program Leader – RACE for Electric Vehicles. "This network will serve as a national point of synthesis for research and knowledge, showcasing the depth of expertise and leadership actively contributing to innovative distributed energy resource management in Australia."

Climate-KIC Australia CEO and UTS ISF Industry Professor Chris Lee said, "Smooth transitions don't happen in silos, they happen when the right people and organisations come together."

"Through the Vehicle-Grid Network, we're creating the space for industry, government and researchers to share what's working, make sense of emerging technologies together, and identify opportunities to accelerate bidirectional charging at scale and make EVs a win for people, businesses, and the grid."

Australia makes history with the social media minimum age eSafety

eSafety will begin monitoring and enforcing compliance with the Australian Government's social media minimum age from today, supporting parents and providing a crucial buffer for under 16s developing digital literacy and resilience. eSafety Commissioner Julie Inman Grant said the world-leading initiative was an important new addition to Australia's online safety framework. "Enforcing a minimum account age of 16 will create normative change and give young people a reprieve from powerful and persuasive design features built to keep them hooked, often enabling harmful content and conduct online. "We recognise no single safety measure is a silver bullet but restricting social media accounts for under 16s is part of a holistic approach that includes eSafety's education and outreach; our complaint schemes; our role ensuring industry transparency and compliance with unlawful and age-restricted material codes and standards; and our work promoting Safety by Design.

"On this historic day, I urge all Australians to visit eSafety.gov.au to access our comprehensive online safety resources, including our social media minimum age information hub for educators, parents and young people themselves."

eSafety will continue engaging with industry and educating the public, however, from today its focus will shift from preparing for the social media minimum age to enforcing it.

Age assurance can involve a range of steps for both new and current users, including reviews and appeals processes.

These processes may take several days or even weeks to complete fairly and accurately and may include applying multiple age assurance measures to accounts over time. However, eSafety will not hesitate to take enforcement action where it identifies systemic breaches of the law, including seeking penalties of up to \$49.5 million. As previously indicated, eSafety will be monitoring platforms' compliance through a variety of channels, including information gathering notices.

eSafety will provide transparency about enforcement outcomes; however, it must protect the integrity of any investigations it undertakes and therefore will not be commenting on individual investigations.

New program will see cancer services unite to achieve equity in cancer care Cancer Australia

The Australian Government today announced \$1 million to fund projects that build stronger networks between cancer services in outer metropolitan, regional, rural, and remote communities, and larger metropolitan centres.

The Australian Comprehensive Cancer Network (ACCN) Networking for Cancer Equity Grant Program will strengthen connections between cancer services and improve access to quality care for people living in outer-metropolitan, regional, rural and remote communities, including priority populations such as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

This initiative will bring comprehensive cancer care closer to home for Australians living outside major cities. By connecting smaller services with larger services, multidisciplinary teams can collaborate, share expertise, and deliver optimal care to people closer to home. These networks will improve coordination across the system and support sustainable models of care.

Each project will involve partnerships between smaller cancer services and larger cancer services, building capacity and sharing expertise across the system.

Successful grant recipients are expected to run their activities from April 2026 to June 2027.

The program supports the activation of the <u>ACCN</u> – a national virtual network launched in May 2024, connecting cancer services across Australia with over 1200 members and growing. The ACCN enables knowledge sharing, collaboration, and systemwide innovation to deliver more equitable access to high quality cancer care and improve outcomes for all Australians.

Shire starts sketching new arts strategy

There were painters, photographers and pot-throwers. Dabblers, dreamers and arts administrators. Creatives of all persuasions met recently at the Basil Sellers Exhibition Centre to help draft a new Creative Arts Strategy for the shire.

Eurobodalla Council's coordinator of creative arts development Indi Carmichael says whether you're a full-time artist whose worked every day since COVID or that person who once accidentally wandered into a gallery looking for coffee, she wants to know your thoughts.

"Every person wanting a dash of colour and culture in their day should share their perspective and help sketch the vision," Ms

Carmichael savs.

"The strategy is more than art for art's sake. Rather it's understanding how creativity shapes the shire's identity, creates connections, and fosters wellbeing. By linking and integrating art and artists with tourism, education and business we're creating something bigger than the summed parts.'

So far, consultation for the draft has included presentations to relevant advisory committees, in-person surveys at markets, shows and forums, an internal Council staff survey, articles in the Arts Canvas newsletter, and several posts on the Bas' Facebook and Instagram.

An online survey to collect ideas, wish-lists and grumbles can be found on Council's engagement platform Our Eurobodalla, which also shares additional information and lists contact details for providing additional suggestions. Input is accepted until Friday 19 December with the draft Creative Arts Strategy is expected to go on public exhibition in April 2026 for further public comment before being presented to councillors for adoption in the middle of next year.

Council's director of community, arts and recreation services Kathy Arthur says the arts continue to evolve rapidly in Eurobodalla.

"Our last Creative Arts Strategy was written in 2019. Despite the fires, despite COVID, the strategy helped drive a remarkable list of artistic endeavour that has seen Eurobodalla become a thriving creative destination," Ms Arthur says.
"We're talking things like completion of the Basil Sellers

Exhibition Centre, performing and creative arts facilities at Bay Pavilions, a Public Art Policy and Public Art Code of Practice, development of a Public Art Strategy, growth of the \$50,000 Basil Sellers Art Prize, a budgeted commitment to public art, and a new creative arts volunteer program."

Ms Arthur says a changing arts landscape needs a dynamic Creative Arts Strategy to provide impetus for fresh possibilities. "The explosion in public sculpture is a good example," she says. "In 2019, we had 13 public sculptures in Eurobodalla – soon there will be 55. We're not saying that's only due to the strategy - it's just one, though an important one, of many drivers of artistic change supporting creative work by many individuals and

The 55 public sculptures include 22 works by international artists Gillie and Marc, donated through the Australian Government's Cultural Gifts Program. The sculptures are currently being installed at locations across the shire. These are already living up to their promise as community talking points and hotspots for Instagrammers looking to share their Eurobodalla experience. The rollout is expected to be finished

by June 2026.



Tackle World Moruya Fishing report 5.12.25

Moruya River.

With see surface temp charts starting to have a lot more red on them, the water temps continue climb. The temps off the coast here are sitting around 19-20 degrees, and the fishing activity is showing the improvement we expect with the warmer waters.

Flathead and bream have been readily encountered this week, from the lower reaches to all the way up to Yarragee. That's a lot of potential ground to cover and options to explore.

The airport flats, Garlandtown flats, hole in the wall, and the flats under the town bridge have all had bream, flathead, whiting and trevally. While all of the local wharves have had bream, Luderick, trevally, flathead and the odd salmon.

Tuross River.

Coila lake will have good numbers of bream and flathead to find throughout the lake, with the weed bed edges being the place to start looking. Bream and flathead love to ambush prey items that live in the weed beds, so concentrate around these areas with lures or baits for your best chance at finding a fish or two.

The main Tuross system itself has been fishing exceptionally well, with bream, flathead, whiting, Luderick and mulloway all being reported this week. One of my customers managed to up grade his PB to 92cm on a healthy Tuross River mulloway only last night. Pic will be below.

Congrats Geordan!

Whiting on the flats are a regular catch at the moment on nippers or squirt worms, while the surface action can only be a week or two away, with the warm currents pushing quickly down the coast. Given the warm days we have had, a quick prospect with a surface lure wouldn't be wasted time this weekend.

Rock and Beach.

Salmon, bream and whiting have all been captures this week along the coast, once you can get a break from the wind that is. Mullimburra point has reports of both squid and kings this week, so it could be worth a look.

Any beach that has a good gutter has the potential to hold good numbers of fish, along with the Moruya breakwall. If you haven't had any luck within 30-45 mins, pack up and head to another location untill you find an active area.

Offshore.

Flathead and snapper, along with gummies should be around in numbers this weekend. The snapper will be out wider, as they move to deeper waters. The flathead will be in close in waters around the 10-15m mark. I haven't had any confirmed reports of marlin or Mahi Mahi off the coast yet, but water temps indicate they can't be too far away.

The shop is looking full, and the last of the Xmas stock is trickling in. We have heaps of great Xmas present and stocking stuffer ideas I store this year, more than I can remember stocking.

Yoga Pose of the Week with Clare Lovelace

Hi, it's Clare from Soul Tribe Studio, your local yoga home in Batemans Bay since 2018.

My Pose of the Week is Child's Pose (Balasana). This gentle, grounding shape is perfect for the busy

holiday season. It's simple, restorative, and accessible for most bodies.

If your knees are tight or sore, place a folded blanket underneath them or between your calves and thighs for extra support.

How to practise Child's Pose

Begin on your hands and knees.

Bring your big toes together and take your knees a little wider than your hips.

Slowly sink your hips back towards your heels, only as far as feels comfortable.

Walk your hands forward and rest your forehead on the floor, a pillow, or a bolster.

Let your belly soften and allow your breath to deepen. Stay for anywhere from thirty seconds to a few minutes.

Let this be a posture of ease. If anything feels pinchy or compressed, adjust the width of your knees or add more support under your torso.

Benefits of Child's Pose

- Calms and regulates the nervous system
- Activates the parasympathetic rest and digest response
- Releases tension from the lower back and spine
- Gently opens and softens the hips
- Hydrates and nourishes the joints
- Lengthens the muscles along the back body
- Supports deeper, slower breathing
- Helps reduce feelings of stress, overwhelm, or anxiety
- Offers a simple way to pause and reset throughout the day

Marine Rescue NSW volunteers return 800+ boaters to safety in November

Marine Rescue NSW volunteers across the state returned 823 people safely to shore during November, completing more than 370 search and rescue missions, including 108 emergency responses.

Acting Commissioner Todd Andrews said demand remains high for the volunteer service.

"Following successive record months in September and October, our volunteers were in high demand throughout November, completing 373 search and rescue missions, just 18 fewer than the record set in 2022.

"We are seeing more boaters out on the water and expect those numbers to rise as we head into the summer holidays. Boaters need to ensure their vessel is well maintained, carry ample clean fuel, and always wear a lifejacket to avoid becoming a statistic," he said.

Last month, 56% of responses were for engine, battery, and fuel issues, while crews also attended 22 groundings.

"Groundings are avoidable. Boaters must be aware of the tides, the environment, and conditions. If boating in an unfamiliar area, consult local charts and speak with the nearest Marine Rescue NSW unit before heading out," Acting Commissioner Andrews said.

Marine Rescue NSW radio operators managed 17,566 calls in November and kept watch over 19,467 people on board Logged On vessels. "Logging On is quick and simple and could save your life. Boaters can Log On 24/7 via the free Marine Rescue NSW app or VHF channel 16. Logging On ensures our skilled volunteers can monitor a boater's safe return, and if they go overdue, a search will be initiated," Acting Commissioner Andrews said.

MONARO – 13 search & rescue missions including 6 emergency responses with 22 people safely returned to shore across all 8 Monaro units – Batemans Bay, Tuross Moruya, Narooma, Bermagui, Merimbula, Eden, Alpine Lakes & Moama.

Tight Finish in Batemns bay Sailing Club Bhundoo Cup

The annual Batemans Bay Sailing Club (BBSC) Bhundoo Cup was a tightly fought contest with 7 boats competing last Sunday.

The race started at 10:00am and finished at 11:30 about 4 nautical miles upstream on the Bhundoo (Yuin Nation name for the Clyde River) from the Batemans Bay Bridge.

The aim of the Bhundoo Cup Race is to sail as far up the river as you can within the ninety-minute time limit or the first to reach the bridge at Nelligen. Any competing boat needs to be able to fit under the Bridge (clearance 12 metres at high tide).

With all the variables in river sailing it is particularly challenging as the tide and wind shifts play their part.

The following boats participated; Lucky Drifter, Passing Wind, Red Dwarf, Scenario, Slow Motion, Red Dwarf and Windrush.

The start line was opposite the new public wharf/floating jetty at the Bay adjacent to where the Batemans Bay Sunday markets were in full swing. The race started at 10:00am and finished at 11:30 about 4 nautical miles upstream of the bridge.

The boats were favoured with a rising tide which helped them upriver. There was a good following wind at the start, but further upstream the wind became fluky, and the boats had to sail against the wind.

The lead changed many times, but in a thrilling finish to the race and in a good breeze the catamaran Windrush, skippered by the Allan Rees, narrowly beat the BBSC Sailing Academy Team on board Red Dwarf, skippered by Jack Egan, by a mere half a boat length.
